Dollars and Sense *City Council Listens To 2010-11 Budget Forecast*

At a special meeting of the Sierra Madre City Council on Thursday, staff presented in great detail the 2010-2011 budget. City Manager Elaine Aguilar and Finance Director Karen Schnaider informed the council and public that despite the severe economic downturn of the state, county and federal governments, the City of Sierra Madre was not, at this time, in such critical condition. This has been in good part the result of the careful management of city resources since Aguilar and Schnaider came on board.

There is great anticipation and anxiety over what actions may come down from Sacramento after the defeat of the propositions put forth to ease the state's economic crisis. Among those items that the governor may implement is the withholding of property tax revenues to local governments.

Much of the city's survival thus far has been the fact that Sierra Madre is not dependent on sales tax revenues (which have declined across the country) and our property taxes have been "holding firm" says City Manager Aguilar. "We don't have the double digit increases we have had in past years, but we are holding firm."

Sierra Madre currently operates with a balanced budget and general fund reserves in excess of \$2 million. Budget projections which indicate continued success in this area, however, are predicated upon, among other things, the continuance of the User Utility Tax.

Upon completion of the 2007 FY audit, the general fund was credited with a \$1 million plus 'surplus' in the general fund. Much of that \$1 million dollar surplus is in fact interest that

has not been transferred to the appropriate restricted account. A complete picture can be reviewed in the charts below.

However, once the audit was released, Councilman Kurt Zimmerman began inquiring about the possibilities of abolishing and/or halting taxpayer authorized UUT increases over the next few years. Should either scenario occur, the city's revenue's would be adversely impacted. The Memorandum of Understanding signed between the city and the Police Officers Association in 2007 included pay increases for public safety officers. In order to cover the cost of these increases, the UUT was passed by voters. It currently generates approximately

Prudent fiscal management would continue to maintain at least that level of surplus revenue for emergencies.

There was much discussion on other methods of cutting expenses for the city. Previously, there were suggestions that the Library be removed as a budget item for the general fund and be funded by a 'parcel tax' if approved by voters.

In addition, former city councilman Rob Stockley strongly suggested that the city consider contracting out services in order to save money. Stockley asked the council to discuss with the city of Arcadia, for instance, the possibility of them taking over our paramedic services. He also suggested that the city look into

\$400,000 per year for police, fire and paramedic services. Without the UUT, as city finances currently stand, the city's reserves would have to cover the cost of public safety increases.

According to Aguilar, the city's \$2 million dollar reserves are necessary to sustain Sierra Madre during extraordinary emergencies. For instance, after last year's fire storm, the city was able to pay their share of the cost from the surplus.

contracting out other services such as Park Maintenance, Building Inspection, Fire Marshall services and Police services.

The meeting concluded with the council directing staff to prepare for a formal presentation of the budget that the next council meeting.

Mira Monte Mission - Accomplished!



Sierra Madre celebrated the completion of the Mira Monte Reservoir renovation on Wednesday. Residents who attended were treated to a Bar B Que meal and were able to tour the facility. The Mira Monte project consisted several phases, beginning with the removal and replacement of the existing steel reservoir located behind Mount Wilson Trail (or "Turtle") Park. As this phase was being completed, the second removal and replacement of the partially underground steel tank west of Mt.

Wilson Trail Road was initiated. The final phase of the project consisted with the construction of a new pump house, exterior architectural work, landscaping of the park, and replacement of water system piping throughout the location. This project was undertaken as a result of a 1997 Corps of Engineers Seismic Reliability study of the City's water system. The 1928 Mira Monte Reservoir was identified as being susceptible to failure during an earthquake. Additional research demonstrated

that both storage tanks would need to be replaced in order to enhance the safety of the community. The price of the project was approximately \$8 million. It was financed with existing water bond proceeds, a low-interest loan from San Gabriel Valley Municipal Water District, local and federal grant money and will be repaid through water rates paid by all City residents. Water rates are not expected to increase to cover the cost of this project.

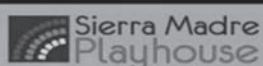

A Free Public Lecture On Bracing for Slashes after Voters Rejected Budget Measures

What can the people of California do to save the state as we know it when facing a \$21.3 billion budget deficit? That is the topic of a free, public lecture at the League of Women Voters Pasadena Area, Thursday, June 4, 12:30 p.m., at the Women's City Club, 160 N. Oakland Ave., Pasadena.

Robert M. Stern, president of the Center for Government Studies (CGS), will talk about "Where We Go From Here" after voters in May rejected Gov. Schwarzenegger's budget measures that would have cut the budget deficit by \$15.4 billion.

The Center for Government Studies is a non-profit organization that creates political and media solutions to help individuals participate more effectively in their communities and governments. It was founded in 1983 in Los Angeles. Before joining CGS, Stern was general counsel of the California Fair Political Practices Commission and was the author of the Political Reform Act of 1974.

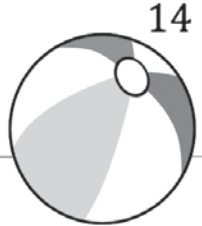
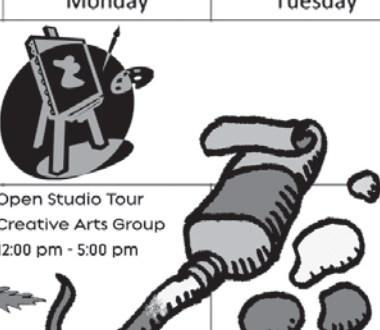

REMEMBRANCE

Frank van Dongen, 1938-2009

Art Restorer and Harlequin Gallery owner Frank van Dongen moved here to California from Holland in the late 1960's. Dutch friends in Arcadia sponsored him on his journey to a new life here. After settling in a little house in Arcadia, Frank quickly took work in construction, building homes on Santa Anita in Arcadia, studying English at night. Back in Holland, he operated a fresh food and vegetable market, and had also studied how to prepared fish for sale. He eventually opened Frank's Fresh Fish Market on Kersting Court in Sierra Madre, selling fresh and prepared fish in the space now occupied by Lucky Baldwin's. Soon he was known for serving fantastic fish and chips, lobster and clam chowder. Van Dongen opened another store in Glendora and another in Arcadia, continuing until the early 1980's. When it was time for a career change, he went back to his early tutelage in art restoration by a great-great uncle, Kees van Dongen, a famous Dutch artist.

As an only child, Frank van Dongen spent many days at his uncle's studio, first learning to clean old paintings. At the time, they used fresh bread to remove layers of accumulated dirt, soot, etc. Another retail space on Kersting Court became available. A book store and gallery, where Starbucks is now, moved. Frank decided to open an art gallery. They started a frame shop in the back and van Dongen started slowly to do restoration. The business grew for about five years. In a tragic turn of events, the building's elderly owner agreed to sell him the building and loan procedures were started, but it was not to be. An attorney bought the building unbeknownst to them, and the gallery lost its space.

The owner of Harlequin Gallery's current location at 14 N. Baldwin, heard of their predicament, and offered to build out the undeveloped lower level. A deal was struck. The Sierra Madre community banded together, with many residents helping them move across the street between Christmas and New Years. They started again, with a gallery upstairs and the framing/restoration business on the lower level. The gallery offers art from all over the world, including consignment pieces from artists. Harlequin Gallery's art restoration business grew in size and reputation, and now includes pottery, porcelain and antiques restoration. Just about anything broken can be restored here. He and his staff became renowned as exceptional restorers, giving new life to all kinds of art, including religious icons from the 16th century and later, with clients from all over the country. The highlight of van Dongen's career came a few years ago, when he was privileged to restore an original

Monet for a local Sierra Madre collector. Currently they are continuing a long standing relationship with the Robinson Gardens in Beverly Hills, restoring art and antiques like candelabras from the Robinson department store magnate's estate, which is open to the public.

Van Dongen recovered from a bout of melanoma in 1994, which returned in 2007. He continued working through chemotherapy and other treatment, including restoring "The Holy Face" which was displayed at St. Rita before it was returned to its San Francisco owner after restoration. Just last month, he donated a religious oil painting he had restored to St. Rita's Catholic Church, which was unveiled just a few days before his passing.

Frank van Dongen was very active in the Sierra Madre and Arcadia communities, as a member and president of both the Sierra Madre and Arcadia Chambers of Commerce,

and ran the beer garden for a time during Sierra Madre's July 4th celebrations. He was often deeply involved in Sierra Madre politics, even running for a city council seat in 1986.

Though Frank van Dongen will be severely missed, the business continues strong with Ilona Lietje van Dongen, his beloved wife and business partner, at the helm, plus a professional restoration and framing staff of four.

The Memorial Mass for Frank van Dongen will be held on his birthday, June 15, at 2:30 in St. Rita Church. The church is located at Baldwin and Grandview in Sierra Madre. Fr. Memorial Day at Live Oak Memorial Park in Monrovia

By now, I presume most of the viewing public knows that today, May 30th, is the original date for Memorial Day, proclaimed on May 5th, 1868 by General John A. Logan, National Commander of the Grand Army of the Republic, and first observed on May 30th, 1868, when flowers were placed on the graves of Union and Confederate soldiers at Arlington National Cemetery. However, in 1071 the last Monday in May was declared to be Memorial Day, to insure a 3-day weekend. It had been known as Decoration Day because of the flowers placed on the graves of veterans from the Civil War. Memorial Day honors servicemen and women who died serving their country, as opposed to Veteran's Day in November when all veterans of all wars are remembered.

Last Monday, May 25th, the Annual Memorial Day Tribute was held at Live Oak Memorial Park on Duarte Road in Monrovia, sponsored by the Upper San Gabriel Valley Veterans Council. Lt. Col. Charles Wiest, CAP, President of the Council, was Master of Ceremonies and has been for many years. Also on the agenda were words of wisdom from John Wou, Mayor of Arcadia, Mary Ann Lutz, Mayor of Monrovia and John Fasana, Mayor of Duarte. Speaker for the affair was Petty Officer First Class, David

Brentley, USN, Retired Iraq Veteran who was noisily interrupted for a few moments by the fantastic "Fly-over".

Every year leaders of 22 different patriotic organizations place wreaths at the Veterans' Memorial, assisted by Cadets of the Civil Air Patrol. It is a very poignant ceremony. Music was provided by the Monrovia High School Band and the entire park resembled a baseball stadium, with hundreds of all ages attending. Plus, everyone got in a good day's walking going to and from their cars.

Another Annual Memorial Day Weekend affair was the Immaculate Conception Church Fiesta, on Shamrock Ave. in Monrovia. This is a 3-day outing for all age groups. Rides of every scary description for the young group, a White Elephant Sale including furniture, for adults, every kind of food including Mexican plates for everyone and, very important, the Beer Garden with all-day and evening entertainment. Not surprisingly, Bingo in the hall was very well-attended. Twenty games at a sitting. I sat in one spot for 3 hours, winning only once. Again, lots of walking to and from one's car, with half of the San Gabriel Valley moving in and out all day and evening, until 11 pm. So much activity packed into one weekend!!

Residents Question Water Rate Hikes

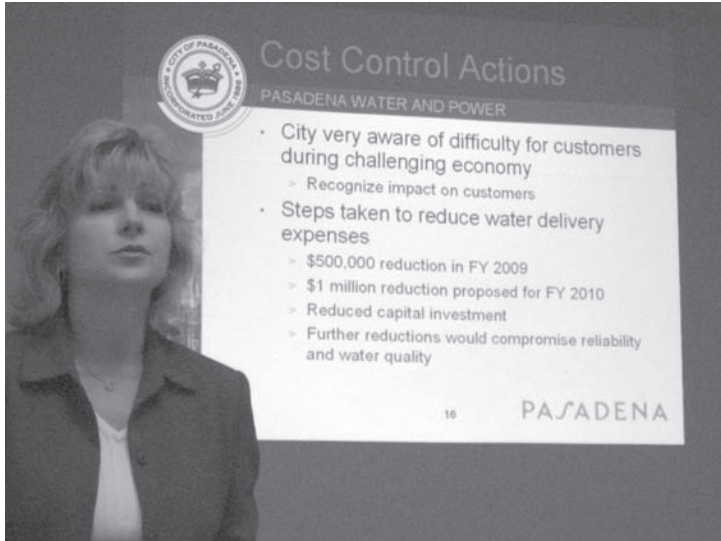
Pasadena Water and Power held the last of a series of meetings Tuesday night in an effort to help residents understand proposed water rate increases that would, in part, almost double the Distribution and Customer charge among other rates also set to go up starting July 1.

The city council will also hold a public hearing June 8, if approved rates would increase twice, first in July and then again July 1, 2010.

Assistant General Manager for PWP Shari Thomas told about 50 residents, who attended the meeting at the Jackie Robinson Center; rates are dependent on meter size. She said the average household has between a 5/8 inch pipe and 1.5 inch pipe with the latter delivering more water therefore with a higher rate charge. The D and C charge for a 1.5 inch pipe could go as high as \$48.54 a month starting in July, up from \$31.85. The rate would again rise to \$61.95 in 2010 according to the city’s website.

Although, during the meeting, Thomas did not give the exact rate increases, residents were encouraged to bring in their current bill, which many did. One resident pointed out that their current bill’s D and C was \$16.34 for two months. Thomas said by 2010 that would go up to around \$32. That was for a ¾ inch meter size they said.

Thomas spent the first 20 minutes going over how to read a current water bill. First she said the D and C charge was a flat rate everyone pays.

She said it had not gone up in years saying “The city is playing catch up.”

“If you have a cell phone or landline at home, you have a standard flat rate that you get charged every month whether you ever pick up the phone,” she said. “That is exactly what that is.” She further said, “it’s the ability to get water to your home.”

She also said the charge was about 25 percent of the total bill and then went on to explain water usage.

“Water usage is billed by hundred cubic feet,” she explained showing a picture of it. “One HCF is 748 gallons.” It is also referred to as a billing unit she said. The average household uses less than 12 of them a month according to a handout.

She also said there was a proposed block structure change which at times got confusing according to some.

Thomas said right now the city uses a three block rate system although that could change to a five block system

something that would not affect many homeowners. What she did said was that each of the other three blocks were proposed to be cut 20 percent. Currently block one allows 12 billing units that would drop to eight she said forcing users into block two with a much higher charge. Less than 10 percent of customers would be in the new blocks four and five she said adding that almost none of them are homeowners.

Block one is the city’s groundwater she said. All other blocks are supplied by Metropolitan Water District with a surcharge. New blocks four and five would be set up as a “penalty” for customers using more than 35 and 47 billing units.

Residents questioned what the city was doing to conserve water. Thomas made clear that all the rate changes also applied to them. She said they could most likely find themselves in the higher blocks four and five.

The city’s director of water resources, Shan Kwan said the city is working to reduce

water use at parks, in street medians and other publicly owned property. He also said they were working with other agencies such as Caltrans to reduce water usage along the freeways.

One resident asked about the city owned fountains, of which Kwan said there are only two.

“I know when the wind blows not all of the water stays in the fountain,” a resident said referring to the fountain in front of the PWP headquarters. “How much water does it take to refill that?”

Kwan answered to a shocked audience, “About 150 gallons a day.” He said the city had been considering shutting if off something many said was a good idea. The other fountain is located in the courtyard at city hall he said.

Letters Question Dorn Platz Continued Default

The troubled Altadena Lincoln Crossing project has again hit further stumbling blocks as letters surface from the Community Development Commission of the County of Los Angeles demanding answers as to why the project continues to stay in default —suggesting it may never enter Phase 2 as planned.

In a letter by the commission addressed to Greg Galletly, president of Dorn Platz and Altadena Lincoln Crossing, LLC, states that the developer “has committed and continues to commit events of default under the DDA [Disposition and Development Agreement], which have not been cured and which have greatly affected the community’s and our confidence in proceeding with Phase 2 of this project with ALC.”

A 365 day extension to fix any defaults had also passed according to the Community Development Commission. The letter only asked that Galletly contact them to discuss the issue further. A call by this paper to Dorn Platz went unanswered as of press time.

Harsh language in the letter outlines many woes the project has including pending litigation, liens, writs, and other encumbrances. It says the latest title report

(as of March 26) shows seven mechanic’s lines totaling \$311,000 as well as two additional abstracts of judgment totaling another \$207,000. There are also tax liens, in excess of \$500,000, recorded against the property. Each is in violation with the terms of agreement with the County of Los Angeles according to the letter.

The commission also expressed concern over a lease agreement with B&V Enterprises, Inc, granting them an option to buy the property. According to the letter, the option was granted without the commission’s consent.

“We request that you and the tenant enter into an amendment to the lease that clearly stated that the Commission’s consent was required prior to the transfer of the property and it was in the Commission’s sole discretion.”

The letter also questions a \$1.7 million deed of trust recorded against the property in January suggesting the money may have never been lent asking for proof and a history of the payments made under the loan documents.

“We were surprised to find this deed of trust in the title report,” the letter says. “Especially since you have never mentioned this to us and since neither of these companies has ever come up in our discussion in the past.”



The commission requested additional information on the structure of the trustor and beneficiary suggesting they are the same. The letter claims, Bradley Barns, of Barnust Properties, Ltd., the beneficiary, is also a manager of Dorn Platz.

According to Dorn Platz website Phase 2 should have be completed last year. The site gives no further details.

A 2007-2008 action plan of proposed Altadena projects outlines Phase 2 as, “consisting of an office building, technology school, restaurant, retail and residential housing.” The area now sits partly vacant with a “for lease” sign in the window.

“The tunnel recordings are pure and unedited,” Giordano explained. “The echo one hears is the tunnel participating in the performance. The tunnel is singing with us.”

In addition to musical art, Giordano is a singer-songwriter with a keen interest in sound design. She is majoring in Radio Production/Broadcast at PCC.

Environmentally Speaking, Did You Know?

Hummingbirds: Hefty Eaters, Hefty Pollinators

Last week I wrote about bats after seeing one flying at dusk in pursuit of insects. This week I was watching a hummingbird dart in and out of flowers in my garden. What a delight...they are truly amazing little birds.

Bats and hummingbirds have something in common-- both are pollinators.

The hummingbird, or Trochilidae, family provides vital pollination services to thousands of plant species. Hummingbirds are considered nectarivorous, meaning they feed mostly on plant nectar, although they do eat insects as well. While hummingbirds feed, pollen from flowers stick to the birds' bills and is transferred to the pistils of other flowers. Because of the hummingbird's unique means of flight, it must consume almost twice its body weight in nectar daily and can visit up to 1,500 flowers per day.

Hummingbirds have special flight muscles that control wing beats of 38 to 78 times per second. Hummingbirds can hover, fly upside down, and are the only bird that can fly backwards. They range in size from the 8 inch giant hummingbird, which lives at altitudes of 15,000 feet in the Andes Mountains, to the Cuban Bee Hummingbird, which is 2 ¼ inches, the world's smallest. Endemic to Cuba, it tips the scales at about two grams, less than the weight of a penny.

Hummingbirds have long, slender beaks and large sternums. Their wings beat about 55 times per second during feeding and up to 200 beats per second during maneuvers and courtship displays. Hummingbirds are very territorial and will perch in trees and survey the area to attack any who dare to come into their area and try to feed on their food sources. They have been known to attack larger birds like jays, crows, and even hawks.

All females nest and raise the young on their own. Usually just two eggs (half the size of a jellybean), incubated for 2 to 2 ½ weeks. She feeds the babies for about 3 weeks. Most nests contain downy plant fibers held together with spider silk. To view for yourself, go to Yahoo.com or Google.com and enter "Birth of a Hummingbird." Amazing pictures!

Hummingbirds are not known to have a sense of smell, and locate food by sight. This brings to mind the red feeders that people place in their yards to augment the wee bird's diet. **CAUTION:** Hang hummingbird feeders near the flowers and prepare a clear sugar water solution of one part table sugar to four parts water. **Do not use honey, artificial sweeteners, or red food coloring.** Clean feeders every three days with hot water and a bottle brush. **Do not use soap.**

The West Coast species of Hummingbirds are: Allen's, Anna's, Black-chinned, Broad tailed, Calliope, Costa's and Rufous.

As the end of the school year arrives, the top students of the graduating class are once again revealed as Valedictorian and Salutatorians. Contrary to popular rumor, the selection committee does indeed aim to select one valedictorian only, though multiple valedictorians are undeniably inevitable and evident in the past few graduating years alone.

Starting May, all the potential Valedictorian and Salutatorians are rounded up and alerted of their potential. From then on, they must make sure to be on the best behavior as any wrongdoing puts them on the path of getting their award revoked. Primarily recognitions of remarkable academic achievement, these positions require the basic grade point average of 3.95 after the end of the fall semester of senior year.

After this year's interview by the committee on May 28, the final results will be announced at the senior assembly on May 29.

As I See It

Pop quiz: Who represents you in our state legislature? Don't know? Well, I know as a resident of Sierra Madre my

assemblyman is Anthony Adams, and my senator is Robert Huff. I know this because it's the responsibility of every citizen to know who represents them, and also because I looked it up just now. More on that later.

With the defeats of Propositions 1A through 1E on May 19, most commentary focused on the need to cut expenses without raising taxes. Invariably, though, these commentaries fail to suggest where these cuts should be made. I won't, either, but instead offer the story of the Desk Chair (stay with me on this).

A number of years ago I worked for a rather large state agency in a rather small capacity - supervising an office of five to six employees. One afternoon a chair leg broke and an employee ended up on his rear on the floor. I went to my supervisor's assistant to request a new desk chair, and soon after she called to say they'd gotten authorization for the purchase. The chair was over \$200, and shipping from the vendor in Wisconsin would be an additional \$150. I told her I'd seen a chair on sale for \$69 at the Office Depot down the street that would do just fine, and as for shipping, I'd throw it in the back of my car on the way to work. She agreed to see if we

could get it done.

The next day I was called to my boss's office. Part of it was a dressing down for having asked his assistant to circumvent established purchasing rules, but mostly it was simple incredulity; why this would concern me because, after all, "it's not coming out of your pocket". I responded I was concerned as a California taxpayer. He gave me a blank stare. I tried to guess how many desk chairs are in use at any given time by the State of California acquired under similar purchasing rules.

The issue here was not a matter of determining what was needed. It was agreed we needed a desk chair, just as the citizens of California agree we need quality schools, police and fire protection, improved infrastructure and transportation corridors, health care for the uninsured, environmental protection, etc. - but rather it was determining the best way of obtaining it - and at what cost. I figured out myself the best way to obtain the chair, but obtaining all those other things - for that we rely on our state legislature. It's clear by now that government by ballot initiative is not a workable substitute. It was also made clear on May 19 that the consensus view, regardless of party, is that this legislature is not up to the task. Now the question becomes how best to obtain one that is. I have a couple of suggestions, which have already been made by many others.

First, the good news. Last November,

voters approved Proposition 11, turning redistricting over to a Citizens Redistricting Commission (scheduled to be impaneled by the end of 2010) and out of the hands of legislators whose main concern was ensuring "safe" districts for themselves.

Next, we need to get rid of term limits. It seems now the only ones in Sacramento with the experience and knowledge necessary to craft and enact legislation are staffers and lobbyists, whether corporate or representing organized labor. Legislators are preoccupied with raising funds and positioning themselves for their next office, rather than demonstrating they deserve re-election to their current one. Besides, they realize that whatever actions they take (or fail to take), they won't be around long enough to have to deal with the consequences.

This system of "minority rules" has proven a disaster in the current situation. With a 2/3 majority required for both tax increases and budget approval, extremes of both parties have the ability to block progress by the moderate majority. Even a 60% percent approval requirement would go a long way in preventing stalemate.

Most agree that some combination of spending cuts and revenue increases are needed, though the legislature seems incapable of dealing with even the most glaringly obvious calls for action. On the revenue side, it took years to close the "yacht loophole", allowing millionaires to avoid paying tax on their luxury vessels by

simply mooring them out of state for ninety days. Arguments were made as to the adverse effect closing this loophole might have on the yacht industry. Seriously.

On the cuts side, the legislature has so far been unable or unwilling to enact SB 685, which would ban salaries of more than \$100,000 a year to members of state boards and commissions that meet no more than twice a month - though kudos to Sen. Terry Strickland (R - Moorpark) for trying. There's the conundrum of voters having an abysmal opinion of the legislature and a wish to see them all booted out, yet when the opportunity arises to do something about it, the same bunch is returned to Sacramento. Here's where we return to the question posed at the top. The first step is to know your representatives, and to demand answers - not just on specific legislation, but on how they intend to bring about the structural changes needed to get our state government functioning again. Trite sound bites, whether "No new taxes" or "No cuts in services", simply won't cut it. Second, get to know the incumbents' opponents in upcoming elections - and make clear to the incumbent that if they aren't up to the job, someone else will be found who is.

With a sustained effort, maybe once again we'll have a state legislature that does its job - and we'll no longer be seeing budget deficit numbers so enormous they're enough to make one fall out of his desk chair.

INTERPRETERS



It is no longer a surprise to me that the most interesting people in a Courtroom are invariably the interpreters. By definition these individuals possess an ability lacking in the vast majority of Americans and particularly in those Americans who have advanced degrees. One senses the differences immediately. Conversations with lawyers are almost without exception focused upon the Lakers, vacation destinations, and how to solve money problems. Conversations with interpreters involve classical music, philosophy, traditional occult healing and spiritual practices, world history and politics, and the maintenance of cultures.

This difference in the interests of professionals who work side by side each day is undoubtedly connected to the different requirements of their vocations. Lawyers are required to endure the experience of Law School. It is a time consuming, arduous, competitive process that leaves little time to pursue unrelated interests. The actual practice of law is similarly exhausting often dissipating any other intellectual interests as attorneys attempt to meet billing hour requirements and otherwise meet their professional responsibilities.

Interpreters, on the other hand, are typically very different kinds of people. Not only are they bilingual they are usually bicultural as well. Their life experience is usually much broader than that of a typical professional in that becoming an interpreter is usually a decision made later in life after other professions have been pursued. The duty of an interpreter is not to convince, or to control, not to win or to lose, but instead simply to use their resources to understand and to communicate this understanding to someone else. It is not just words that need to be translated but rather the internal experience expressed by these words. Doubt, anger, willingness to comply with burdensome

requirements all must be communicated from client to attorney in order that the attorney may responsibly advise his client as to the best individual course of action. The most effective interpreter through their highly developed observational and communication skills will accurately convey this information. It is a vital profession which requires a highly sensitive and developed person to meet its requirements.

Living a full and responsible life also requires one to be highly sensitive and developed and I believe that the interpreters can serve as models. The development of sane, effectively functioning human beings should be the goal of Schools at every age level. Rather than burying ambitious students under mountains of repetitious time consuming homework schools could actually assist its students to identify their own desires, interests, and strengths.. Instead of functioning as glorified trade schools readying students for frequently non-existent employment our schools should assist in the creation of sane human beings who have some sense of who they are and what they want to do. If we want this society to function without the necessity of daily doses of mood altering anti-depressive medications we need to allow individuals time to develop their own resources such that they can become responsible and knowledgeable communicators regarding their own lives.

Today most individuals emerge from schools with little awareness of their own inner lives. College majors are selected almost at random and people find themselves in positions in which they are unhappy for most of their working lives. This is a dysfunction we can no longer afford. Really, no matter the state of the economy, it would be better if somewhere along the line each of us had developed the ability to hear our own inner selves and be able to communicate harmoniously with other people. It might even be nicer if we could do it in more than one language so that we could have a greater understanding of what the rest of the world is talking about.

Government Gives Residents Money to "Buy Taiwanese"

Most economists agree that the central problem in reviving the US economy is the lack of demand for goods and services. More to the point, our consumer economy has come to a screeching halt. Americans are afraid—afraid of losing their jobs, their homes and their pensions. Fear is high, money is tight and spending

is low. Fearful consumers hold on to their money, and when they do the economy suffers.

Triggered by last fall's housing market crash and subsequent foreclosure crisis, the current recession has spread rapidly into both the financial and industrial sectors—upside down mortgages, insolvent financial institutions, failing businesses, and banks refusing to lend.

And all this happened in the wake of last year's presidential campaign.

During the campaign, President Bush pushed through a \$700 billion bailout package for Wall Street. After taking office, President Obama asked for and was granted an additional \$888 billion to stimulate the economy. In less than six months nearly \$1.6 trillion has been earmarked to restart the economy.

But what if half of this money—\$800 billion—were aimed at the consumer where it would make the biggest difference. The US population is approximately 300 million. That means that every man, woman and child in residing in the US would get nearly \$2666 in consumer bailout money (\$10,664 for a family of four). How consumers spent it is entirely their choice. But the money must be spent in the US. It can't be saved or sent overseas.

Here's how it would work:

Instead of propping up failing companies or cutting taxes give the money directly to consumers. By stimulating consumer supply of money, consumer demand for goods and services would increase. Companies would expand inventories and offer improved services. This would necessitate rehiring employees. Employees, in turn, would spend their incomes as consumers buying goods and services. As a result, money changes hands and the economy improves.

That's right, what America needs is a giant shopping spree. That will get the economy moving again.

The other day I discovered an article published back in January. It describes one way Taiwan is responding to its economic downturn by giving its residents shopping vouchers. It's the latest effort by a country to try to get money flowing through its economy.

Apparently a combination of a Chinese New Year's gift and a move to stimulate the flagging economy, Taiwanese President Ma Ying-Jeou unveiled a plan January 20 to give about \$108 in vouchers to the each of the island's 23 million residents.

By that evening, more than 90 percent of eligible Taiwanese, including the president and his family, had gone to special government booths and picked up their vouchers, which are valid through September.

Taiwan's residents were eager to start spending, if mall and store traffic on the island were any indication. French retail chain Carrefour reported 30 percent higher than normal sales the first weekend vouchers were used at its Taiwan locations.

Government officials encouraged residents in more secure financial situations to donate their vouchers to charity, as well as to make an effort to buy Taiwanese-produced items.

The plan cost the government of Taiwan nearly \$2.6 billion. I know this is small compared what I am proposing. But this is America—a country noted for big ideas.

Unfortunately, the US has chosen to stimulate the economy with the usual combination of corporate bailouts and tax cuts. Although a middle class tax cut is good for the economy. The rest is simply welfare for the wealthy. Remember the "voodoo" economics of the 1980s? The problem is it doesn't work when working people need it the most. People need help now.

I say give consumers a chance. They'll know how to best spend the money.

I'm sure I can decide how to spend my 2,666 bucks.

I have to admit, though, I am guilty person when it comes to money. I would have trouble getting a fat economic stimulus check and not depositing it in my savings account. But I would love to get a shopping voucher with an expiration date on it. I'd be guilt free all the way to (and from) the mall.

Give me money and I'll spend it—I'll shop until I drop.

Utility Rate Insert Notices Inadequate Campaign to change billing system continues

Vern Hensel, the Sierra Madre resident who has taken the city to task over years of overbilling for water, has achieved a victory of sorts when the city agreed to include inserts in the water bills indicating the rate residents are charged.

However, Hensel feels as though the effort does not go far enough in protecting residents against the kind of overbilling he experienced for years.

In Hensel's case, his single family home was billed as a multi unit dwelling. The total cost of the overages was in excess of \$5,000. After years of attempting to get the city to reimburse him for his loss, Hensel took the case to court where he learned that due to a state law, the city's exposure was limited to one year's worth of billing.

Hensel's primary concern, however, was not the amount of money that he could not recoup from the city for their error, but the fact that no safeguards were in place to prevent this from happening to other residents.

His initial attempts to rectify the situation were under the administration of former City Manager John Gillison where he faced a brick wall. Since the hiring of current City Manager Elaine Aguilar, the response has been much better. It was through Hensel's efforts that the city agreed to include notification of water rates in the bills residents receive. There are still several other items that Hensel feels need to be addressed, however.

In a recent letter to the Mayor and City Council, Hensel states the following:

“Dear Mayor MacGillivray, I have been communicating with your City Manager, Elaine Aguilar, regarding some issues related to the Utility Bill (titled City of Sierra Madre – Water Dept) , and she has been a great help in answering my questions. However, there are a couple of issues that I must bring to your attention, because I believe them to be beyond the scope of her authority and ability to remedy.

The first Issue is that one of the factors in calculating the utility bill is the size of the water meter. From what I understand, there are different sizes of water meters and residents are billed based on the size of their particular meter. However, the size of the resident's meter is not disclosed on the utility bill, so the resident has no way to tell if they are being billed properly.

The solution is that (1) the size of the water meter must be included on each utility bill, or an insert can be used temporarily, until

such time as it can be added to the actual utility bill, or (2) the size of the meters can be averaged and an average amount included in the base service fee of the bill, so that it is not necessary to list the size of each meter on the utility bills. The second option is obviously the most cost effective and the way a lot of cities handle it.

The second issue is that another factor in calculating the utility bill is the “account type”, such as (1) Residential-Single Unit, (2) Residential-Multi Unit and (3) Commercial. As you all know, in the past this info was not disclosed on the utility bills, which allowed the miss-classification of properties to go undetected. The result was an overcharge to residents estimated to be over \$100,000. Also, the city's policy is to limit the credits for overcharges to only one year and it keeps the rest as income, so the residents only receive a small percentage of the overcharge.


I have been working to get this problem rectified for over three (3) years, and after all of that time the best remedy the city has agreed to is to put a utility rate insert in only 1/3 of the bills, explaining the “account type” being charged. That means that 2/3 of the bills have no inserts and not rate disclosure. The reason the city gives for not putting rate inserts in all of the bills is that it costs too much. The city says it will use the inserts until the “account type” can be added to the bill itself, and the exact time for that to be accomplished is unknown and only estimated.

The proper solution is for the city to put the utility rate inserts in EACH utility bill until it has the “account type” added to the bills themselves. The city has the responsibility to notify residents of the rate they are being charged with EACH bill, especially when you consider the city's poor track record in the past in regards to billing accuracy and its limited refund policy regarding the overcharges.

The city's argument that it is not able to put utility rate inserts in more than 1/3 of the utility bills because it costs too much is not acceptable. In the past several years the city has made plenty of utility bill overcharges, and kept over 90% of the money, so it should certainly be willing to spend some of that overcharge money to put utility rate disclosure inserts in each bill.

This is a very reasonable request and I will be looking forward to your response.”

Hensel hopes that the city's will continue to work on a system that will resolve the issue.

Tipping in Lean Times

No I don't claim to be an economist, (even though Economics was my major in College), I have noticed a cut back at many of the restaurants that I frequent. Seems there is one less bus boy, one less host and service has suffered. So what to do? Is there a new strategy in the tipping dept? I say no. You are still tipping on quality of service.

Tipping is well, to insure good service. But wait, to insure good service in advance? Only at Starbuck's would that make any sense. Very few times have I gone to a restaurant and actually tipped in advance. Opening day at The Race Track at Del Mar is the only occasion I can even remember having to tip in advance. The reason is there are very few seats available for the overflow crowd. Thus, the maitre'd just takes the tip and that really doesn't insure great service at all.

Let's get straight to it. When at a restaurant, you tip on the speed and accuracy of service not on the food. So with that being said, let's

continue on. I have heard that tipping at a fancy restaurant and tipping at a coffee shop are different. Hogwash!!!

These are my tips for tipping - not necessarily the way I tip. I even give 10% for really bad service. Seems with my picture in this paper and on my TV show "The Chef Knows" that I might get a bad rep from the Server Syndicate.

Here are my suggestions for you. Again no matter where you are.

Fair to medium service 12 to 14 %

Good to Better then Average 15 to 18%

Great Service 20%

Can't figure the whole percentage on tipping. Best way is to just double the tax.

Let me answer a few questions. Valet Parking... If there is no charge and it's a tip only, I suggest at least \$5, again depending on speed of service. What if there is a \$5 fee? I will give at least \$1 extra and maybe even \$3 if my car is brought to me quickly. How about Wine or a drink at the bar? A full bottle of a \$10 wine takes as much energy as a bottle of Dom Perignon to open. So, if the bartender keeps my glass full and clean and if the wine is kept cold and is poured for me, I suggest 10 to 12% with a minimum of \$3 for the bartender. Have Kids? Sure I do. Sometimes they make a mess, throw food and crayons on the floor. I always leave the busboy at least \$3!!! If you don't, well you could consider cleaning it yourself.

When the Sky Fell: Asteroids May Have Accelerated Life on Earth

A NASA-funded study indicates that an intense asteroid bombardment nearly 4 billion years ago may not have sterilized the early Earth as completely as previously thought. The asteroids, some the size of Kansas, possibly even provided a boost for early life.

The study focused on a particularly cataclysmic occurrence known as the Late Heavy Bombardment, or LHB. This event occurred approximately 3.9 billion years ago and lasted 20 to 200 million years. In a letter published in the May 21 issue of Nature magazine titled "Microbial Habitability of the Hadean Earth during the Late Heavy Bombardment," Oleg Abramov and Stephen J. Mojzsis, astrobiologists at the University of Colorado's Department of Geological Sciences, report on the results of a computer modeling project designed to study the heating of Earth by the bombardment.

Results from their project show that while the Late Heavy Bombardment might have generated enough heat to sterilize Earth's surface, microbial life in subsurface and underwater environments almost certainly would have survived.

"Exactly when life originated on Earth is a hotly debated topic," said Michael H. New, the

astrobiology discipline scientist and manager of the Exobiology and Evolutionary Biology Program at NASA Headquarters in Washington. "These findings are significant because they indicate that if life had begun before the LHB or some time prior to 4 billion years ago, it could have survived in limited refuges and then expanded to fill our world."

"Our new results point to the possibility life could have emerged about the same time that evidence for our planet's oceans first appears," said Mojzsis, principal investigator of the project.

A growing scientific consensus is that during our solar system's formation, planetary bodies were pummeled by debris throughout the Late Heavy Bombardment. A visual record of the event is preserved in the form of the scarred face of our moon. On Earth, all traces of the bombardment appear to have been erased by rock recycling forces like weathering, volcanoes or other conditions that cause the crust to move or change.

Surface habitats for microbial life on early Earth would have been destroyed repeatedly by the bombardment. However, at the same time, impacts could have created subsurface habitats for life, such as extensive networks of cracks or even hydrothermal vents. Any existing microbial

life on Earth could have found refuge in these habitats. If life had not yet emerged on Earth by the time of the bombardment, these new subsurface environments could have been the place where terrestrial life emerged.

"Even under the most extreme conditions we imposed on our model, the bombardment could not have sterilized Earth completely," said Abramov, lead author of the paper. "Our results are in line with the scientific consensus that hyperthermophilic ("heat-loving") microbes could have been the earliest life forms on Earth, or survivors from an even more ancient biosphere. The results also support the potential for the persistence of microbial biospheres on other planetary bodies whose surfaces were reworked by the bombardment, including Mars."

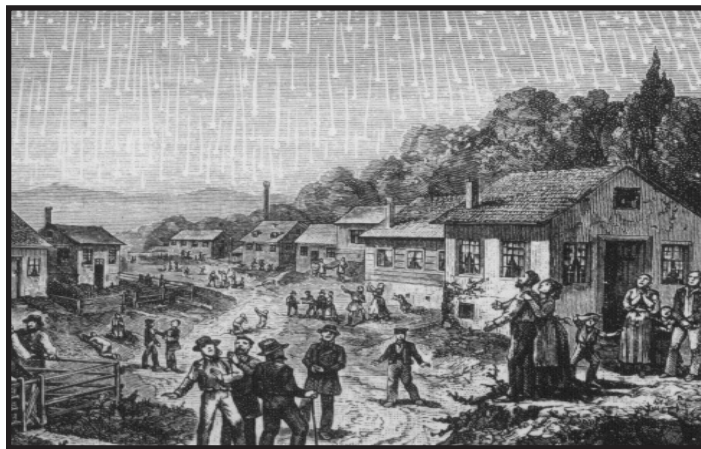

On Line The Chinese Version of the Internet

The Internet as we know it here in the US is a literal pathway to thousands of repositories of knowledge on just about any subject that one could wonder about at any given point in time. Often the made-up information available about a subject is even better than the actual information available on the subject at hand, even if only for the entertainment value alone. Internet experts guess-timate that as much as 60% of all email traveling on the Internet is Spam. There is a strong suspicion that a large part of the remaining percentage is copies of chain e-mails, jokes, YouTube links and other miscellany that can probably be best described as semi-spam, as it comes from known sources. Whether one thinks of this state of affairs as a huge waste of resources that could be used for more serious matters or not it is a very definite indicator of just how Free communication is on the Internet in the West. Individuals and Business entities actually have the ability to waste our time and resources in the name of Free Speech and Free Enterprise specifically because Free Speech is so highly valued and protected here in the West.

In China such is not the case. Here are a few points of difference about Internet Usage and Access between the US and China as reported by Network World Magazine in the May 12 issue:

The Chinese Government is believed to employ tens of thousands of censors whose primary job is to monitor subversive sources posting on

the Internet and delete offensive or subversive material. ISPs and other Internet entities are routinely forced to stop posting offending material under the threat of very real criminal prosecution.

The Chinese Government uses Internet mechanisms such as DNS to control what sites its population may access on sites outside of its borders. Foreign correspondents often report being unable to establish communications with their home offices outside of Chinese Government approved channels.

The Chinese Government often has the full cooperation of US and other Western nations and corporations in enforcing its brand of censorship on Internet access for its citizens.

For all of its efforts the Chinese Government has an Internet that is less congested with spam traffic (China produces about 4% of the world's spam while the US is the point of origin of 42% of the world's spam), has a user population that is less targeted for malicious activity such as phishing (7% for China, 31% for the US) and is developing the Next Generation IPv6 Backbone to deliver high-quality IP Services and Application for widespread use to all users of its citizens with Internet access.

Some would argue that the price paid for a safer Internet may actually be worth the cost in terms of Freedom. That depends on who you are and what you want the Internet to do for you.

NASA SELECTS STUDENT ENTRY AS NEW MARS ROVER NAME

NASA's Mars Science Laboratory rover, scheduled for launch in 2011, has a new name, thanks to a sixth-grade student from Kansas. Twelve-year-old Clara Ma from the Sunflower Elementary school in Lenexa submitted the winning entry, "Curiosity." As her prize, Ma wins a trip to NASA's Jet Propulsion Laboratory in Pasadena, Calif., where she will be invited to sign her name

directly onto the rover as it is being assembled.

A NASA panel selected the name following a nationwide student contest that attracted more than 9,000 proposals via the Internet and mail. The panel primarily took into account the quality of submitted essays. Name suggestions from the Mars Science Laboratory project leaders and a non-binding public poll also were considered.

"Students from every state suggested names for this rover. That's testimony to the excitement Mars missions spark in our next generation of explorers," said Mark Dahl, the mission's program executive at NASA Headquarters in Washington. "Many of the nominating essays were excellent and several of the names would have fit well. I am especially pleased with the choice, which recognizes something universally human and essential to science."

Ma decided to enter the rover-naming contest after she heard about it at her school. "I was really interested in space, but I thought space was something I could only read about in books and look at during the night from so far away," Ma said. "I thought that I would never be able to get close to it, so for me, naming the Mars rover would at least be one step closer."

"Curiosity is an everlasting flame that burns in everyone's mind. It makes me get out of bed in the morning and wonder what surprises life will throw at me that day,"

Ma wrote in her winning essay. "Curiosity is such a powerful force. Without it, we wouldn't be who we are today. Curiosity is the passion that drives

us through our everyday lives. We have become explorers and scientists with our need to ask questions and to wonder."

The naming contest was conducted in partnership with Disney-Pixar's animated film "WALL-E." The activity invited ideas from students 5 - 18

years old enrolled in a U.S. school. The contest started in November 2008. Entries were accepted until midnight Jan. 25.

Walt Disney Studios Motion Pictures supplied the prizes for the contest, including 30 for semifinalists related to WALL-E." Nine finalists have been invited to provide messages to be placed on a microchip mounted on Curiosity. The microchip also will contain the names of thousands of people around the world who have "signed" their names electronically via the Internet. Additional electronic signatures still are being accepted via the Internet.

"We have been eager to call the rover by name," said Pete Theisinger, who manages the JPL team building and testing Curiosity. "Giving it a name worthy of this mission's quest means a lot to the people working on it."

Curiosity will be larger and more capable than any craft previously sent to land on the Red Planet. It will check to see whether the environment in a selected landing region ever has been favorable for supporting microbial life and preserving evidence of life. The rover also will search for minerals that formed in the presence of water and look for several chemical building blocks of life.

The Mars Science Laboratory project is managed

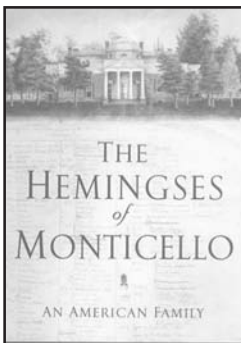

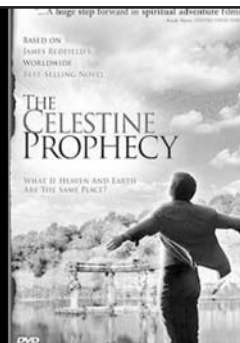


The Hemingses of Monticello: An American Family by Annette Gordon-Reed

This book is the 2009 Pulitzer Prize history winner. Historian and legal scholar Annette Gordon-Reed traces the Hemings family from its beginnings in Virginia in the 1700s to the family's movements after Jefferson's death in 1826. It brings to life not only Sally Hemings and Thomas Jefferson but also their children and Hemings's siblings, who shared a father with Jefferson's wife, Martha. The book sets the family's interesting saga against the background of Revolutionary America, Paris on the eve of their own revolution, 1790s Philadelphia, and plantation life at Monticello. Recipe of the Week: Spinach Dip



Ingredients:

- * 2 cloves garlic, minced
- * 1/3 cup butter
- * 2 cups flour
- * 2 Tbs sugar
- * 1 Tbs baking powder
- * ¼ tsp pepper
- * ½ tsp salt
- * 1/3 cup half and half
- * 1 egg, beaten
- * butter

Directions:

- 1) Preheat oven to 400 degrees F. In small microwave-safe bowl, combine onion, garlic and butter. Microwave on high for 2 minutes, and then stir. Microwave for another 1-2 minutes or until onion is tender. Remove from microwave and let cool for 10 minutes.
- 2) Combine flour, sugar, baking powder, salt and pepper in large bowl and stir to mix. Add sautéed onions with the butter remaining in the bowl, milk and egg. Stir until just combined. Gently press the dough together with your hands to form a ball.
- 3) On ungreased cookie sheet, press dough into an 8” circle. Cut the circle into 8 wedges, like you were cutting a pie. Separate the wedges slightly. Bake at 400 degrees for 12-15 minutes until lightly browned. Brush with more butter and serve immediately.

Cottage in the Canyon Morphs into a Magnificent Craftsman

Tom Cullen's extensive experience creating sets for the entertainment industry provided him with the tools and the ability to take vision into reality. What was once a nearly century old, 571 square foot summer cottage has gained a new life as the central core of a truly magnificent, 2515 square foot Craftsman... built by a true Craftsman; no... built by a true Renaissance Man.

At work, Cullen excels at the art of creating the illusion of a setting, efficiently, quickly and with an authentic appearance. At home, he prides himself on building the real thing with the best of materials. None of that faux stone stuff here. Through his work, Cullen knows just where to access the tumbled round stones similar to the ones used to construct the century old stone walls prevalent here in the Canyon.

The wood milled for the interior doors and trims came from old growth, Canadian fir, harvested in the early 1900's. Cullen points out the tight rings on the woodwork, indicating three to four centuries of growth in just the width of the window trim. The clear red oak floors give a rich warm foundation to the rooms, lit by a varying, soft green palette of paints on the interior, and the mature landscape from the outside.

Several of the lighting fixtures are custom gems, and some hark back to the 1920's. The dining area boasts hand beaded, vintage fabrics on the shades. The master suite includes a fixture with Thomas Edison, hand-blown reproduction bulbs for a period effect.

Even the cabinetry, crafted from the Douglas fir, came straight from Cullen's head to his workshop to the kitchen, baths, and to the stunning dual built-ins for the master suite. Cullen did rely on exceptional furniture maker, Stickley, for most of the pieces throughout the home. They feature inlaid details in the Craftsman style, in complementary woods.

When his real estate agent suggested a balcony for the master suite, it magically appeared a short time later. Cullen's experience laying out a set project, pre-cutting the parts, then masterfully assembling the project like a set of Tinker Toys, allowed him to create the balcony from start to finish quickly. "Not many people can envision a complete project like that," chuckles Cullen, "but it's the key to quick and accurate construction."

When he purchased the cottage in 1990, it was a very modest structure known as "The Wildwood Cabin." A quarter mile up Woodland Drive from Mary's Market, it was built

in the heart of Sierra Madre's eclectic enclave, known simply as "The Canyon."

A mountain creek gurgles along the property's perimeter part of the year. Cullen created a rock waterfall into the 12-person, in-ground spa to provide the soothing sounds of water spilling over rocks upon command, summer or winter. Dramatic night lighting illuminates the quarter acre of trees and mature landscape, creating an ambience that can be enjoyed inside or out.

Cullen loves to entertain, and built the home to accommodate a great party with a wide, circular traffic flow between the living room and the kitchen-dining room. Both areas open to the deep, post and beam porch through French doors. The porch, which runs the length of the home, is anchored by a gorgeous hand-laid wall of river-tumbled rock.

Two things are unusual about this Canyon property. Since many of the homes were initially summer cabins, the lots are usually teeny tiny. Wildwood, however, offers .30 usable acres, with a generous lawn, huge spa and waterfall, plus an attached two car garage and onsite parking for two guest cars (very unusual for the Canyon!). If there's a large party, a nearby parking area can be rented from Nature Friends.

With five bedrooms and four baths, the home now includes two main floor bedroom suites with private baths. One main floor bedroom suite also opens through French doors to the front yard, with its own covered patio slightly removed from the living areas. This suite is ideal for use as a guest or au pair suite. The second main floor bedroom is currently configured as a home office.

The home can be sold literally as a turn-key residence. Nearly all the furniture and accessories (many from his sister's Studio City home décor store, Marlow Artistic Furnishings) are available for separate sale. Cullen's ready for a new challenge, probably in Hawaii when this home sells.

As he points out, "The Stickley furniture and hand-made Pakistan rugs were specially ordered to fit and be-jewel each room, so I view it all as a complete set. I'm a destination person. When one project's finished and I've reach that destination, I'm always immensely proud of the work I've done, but I'm totally ready to move on to the next one. The Hawaii house is already evolving in my head."

Bush Roses – Easy To Have Around

There are several spectacular bush roses readily available to us in our local nurseries, some are well know to the avid gardener, while others, to my amazement, still remain unfamiliar. Needless to say, they are no substitute for stem roses if you want cut flowers in the house (stem roses hold the flower longer once cut, give you much more length on a longer stem and are unlimited in variety and color.)

Bush roses on the other hand are very heavy bloomers, generally don't get any taller than 2' to 3' and require "shearing" rather than pruning in January. In addition to all these good traits, they generally are pest and disease free. Rust and black spot, the major trouble makers to roses, seem to play a lesser role with bush roses. They work wonderfully as a showy hedge or can be incorporated in planting areas to complement your existing landscape. The most impressive ones, and the lesser known are

Tomora – 3' high

Compact rose, with gorgeous apricot-pink-yellow flower. Shaped like deep cups in the style of the romantic roses of past centuries. Leaves have a red tinge to them which makes a stunning contrast to the flower. Scented.

Gruss aus Bayern (Greetings from Bavaria)

Deep red, medium sized flowers. Heavy bloomer. Blooms practically all year round. Easily grows to 3', maybe a little taller.

Simplicities

White and red simplicities are very attractive and take quite a bit of shade compared to other bush roses. When kept at about 2' they are generally quite good bloomers, not anywhere as impressive as the (other two) above mentioned, and fill out nicely. Left to grow any taller they tend to look rather "skinny". They also come in pink and yellow. The pink is definitely the least attractive of the bunch. The yellow is awfully good looking. The leaf is such a dark green, and shiny, so it complements the yellow wonderfully.

In my opinion, these are excellent choices for your garden. All roses need full sun, light afternoon shade (later in the day) is good in the hot months. Remember, good drainage is essential, as with all plants, and don't forget to feed them throughout the growing season. If you mulch the soil around the base of the rose, you will help conserve the moisture and keep down the weeds at the same time. Stella Binns – Barristers Nursery and Garden Center

Travel Around The Globe: THE MIDDLE EAST WE HAVE FORGOTTEN

Editors Note: Daily, we hear so much about the turmoil in the world that we forget the many vibrant and rich cultures that exist and are very much a part of our history. Periodically, we shall take a look at the many places across the globe that are well worth visiting. I can tell you from personal experience, that traveling abroad will be a rewarding experience that you will never forget regardless of your culture and/or religious beliefs. We encourage travelers to submit articles of their experiences abroad to share with others. You may inspire someone to take the trip of a lifetime! For your review this month we have a jewel of the Middle East - Jordan.

Jordan – a visit to the Hashemite Kingdom



Jordan is filled with amazing historical treasures. Biblical landmarks, Greco-Roman cities, crusaders fortresses, and a modern culture with strong ties to the West. While it is often visited as an add-on to a trip to Egypt or to Israel, Jordan has more than enough treasures to make it a destination all on its own.

Petra – UNESCO describes this rose red city, sculpted from a mountain range by the Nabataeans in the Third Century BC as “one of the most precious cultural properties of Man's cultural heritage.”

Wadi Rum – “Vast, echoing and God-like” was how Lawrence of Arabia described Wadi Rum, the largest and most magnificent of Jordan's desert landscapes. Bedouin's still inhabit this area living among their camels and livestock a life run by the seasons, little changed by modern society, although they do accept some modern conveniences. Spend a night in the desert, take a camel or four-wheel drive trek, walk the sands and listen to the sounds of ancient rock formations.

Jerash – Crossroads of Civilization, remarkable for its unbroken chain of human occupation. Here in the hills of Gilead are remains from Neolithic times, as well as Greek, Roman, Byzantine and Omayyad civilizations. The Roman city equals the ruins at Ephesus, with chariot grooves carved in the stone of the amphitheatre – which is still in use for programs and concerts more than 2000 years after it was built.

Kerak – along the 5000 year old Kings Highway, this is the most impressive remains of a series of Crusader forts and outposts. Protected by a 3200 feet deep canyon, this fortress of underground galleries and secret passageways holds testament to the brave Crusaders who held out bravely for over 100 years.

Madaba - this city has a Greek Orthodox Church housing a 6th Century Byzantine mosaic map. It also is a place to shop for ceramics, local handicrafts and Dead Sea health and beauty products.

Mount Nebo –where Moses saw the Promised Land, and tradition claims this is also the site of his burial. Views of the Jordan Valley, the Dead Sea, and even the rooftops of Jerusalem and Bethlehem.

Aqaba – on the Red Sea has some of the best coral reefs of the area. Jordan has a year round resort area of beach hotels here, as well as at the Dead Sea.

Zoar – Lot's Cave, and the site archaeologists believe were the two cities of Sodom and Gomorrah.

Navigating Jordan on your own is still a bit difficult, however the cost for a driver and guide are reasonable enough that you can still afford to travel on your own or with a few friends, if you are not interested in joining an escorted group tour. While many travelers still combine Jordan with a trip to Syria, Israel or Egypt, it's become much easier to reach from the West Coast.

Emirates Air, the airline of the United Arab Emirates, began daily non-stop service from LAX and San Francisco to Dubai on May 1, with some of the worlds best in flight service, including private individual suites in First Class, and onboard showers. From there it is an easy connection to Amman, Jordan, and to combine these two US friendly Arab countries on one trip just seems to make sense. The very newest lands on earth, with Dubai's expansion into the Gulf of Arabia on manmade islands, with one of the most ancient cradles of humanity in Jordan.

There are also good connections through Europe to Amman on a variety of airlines, for example, Air France with one change in Paris, Lufthansa thru Frankfurt, British Air or Virgin Atlantic via London, or fly to New York and take Royal Jordanian or Delta non-stop from there.

While Petra is probably a ‘must see’ on most travelers lists, Jordan has so much more and is indeed a active archaeological focus with new discoveries still being made, and amazing sites which get relatively few visitors. Please expand your travel plans to include more of Jordan!
