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PASADENA'S BELOVED SID TYLER PASSES

One thing is certain; everyone was fond of former councilmember Sid Tyler and news of his sudden death last week came as a shock to those that knew him. He died March 28, after falling in a bicycling accident.

"There is a tremendous outpouring of grief and surprise because he was so vital [to the community], I mean he was bicycling around the neighborhood everybody saw him," Councilmember Terry Tornek, said. "He was the epitome of what it means to be a public official."

Tornek was elected to District 7 after Tyler chose not seek another term in 2009.

According to reports, Tyler fell off his bicycle March 27 after losing his balance riding on California Boulevard just blocks from his home on South Madison Avenue.

ILLEGAL "HIT PIECE" SURFACES IN SIERRA MADRE ELECTION

Anonymous Mailer Containing False and Misleading Statements Target Two Sierra Madre Council Candidates In An Apparent Effort To Influence Voters

At press time, the Mountain Views News was notified of an unidentified political mailer targeting candidates Gene Goss and Noah Green. Both candidates have denied the accuracy of the allegations contained in the mailer. (See related story on page B5).

The mailer, which at a glance carries the colors of the individual campaigns and looks like official literature from the Goss and Green campaigns, was sent via U.S. Mail without any indication of the source. The content for the most part is blatantly false according to the candidates and in other parts of it, the wording is misleading. When comparing the allegations in the mailer against public records and transcripts, the mailer borders on being a piece of hate mail.

The mailer does not attack the two female candidates, but it must be noted that both Goss and Green are supporters of the Utility User's Tax.

Recipients who spoke to the Mountain Views News, each residents of Sierra Madre for decades, expressed their total disgust that the council race had stooped to new lows. "No wonder no one wants to run for office. This is just awful".

Although not the first time the mail has been used to attempt to discourage or destroy candidates, this may well become the most expensive effort as the card was professionally printed. It also had first class postage, considerably more expensive than permit mail, which is the common method of posting campaign materials. By using regular postage the senders cannot

be traced back to a particular mailing permit.

At press time it was not clear how extensive the mailing was, but, according to both State and Federal laws, the document is illegal. At least two recipients of the mailer, notified the paper of their intent to file claims with the California Fair Political Practices Commission (FPPC) and the United States Postal Service (USPS) Inspector General's office.

The illegality of the piece is in part due to the fact that it does not carry any return address information, as required by law, as well as it violates several other State and possible Federal statutes. The FPPC requires that all campaign literature carry a statement which discloses the source of the expenditures for the item. It is also a requirement that the name of the committee (or individual acting as a committee) appear on the mailer, as well as a statement indicating its' association (or not) with any campaign.

In addition, using the postal service to facilitate illegal activities is also against the law. There also is the possibility that the Los Angeles County District Attorney's Office of Public Integrity could investigate the incident.

Penalties for such violations can be expensive. FPPC fines alone, according to their website can be hefty. "The penalty for failing to comply with the Act's disclaimer requirements is a fine of up to \$5,000 per violation."

EDITORIAL: Mayor Pro Tem John Harabedian Speaks Up:



When deciding how to vote on Measure UUT on Tuesday, residents should be asking themselves one overarching question: what type of city do I want to live in five or ten years from now? The reason why I am voting Yes on Measure UUT is because I want to ensure that Sierra Madre will continue to be the safe and vibrant community that we live in today for years to come.

My "Yes" vote is directly informed by my experience as a long-time Sierra Madre resident. Having grown up in Sierra Madre, I have a few vivid memories about my childhood. One is always feeling

safe within the City's confines. There was not a day in my life in which I felt vulnerable while riding my bike with friends, playing in Sierra Vista Park, or walking home from school. The second memory is playing baseball at Heasley and Dapper fields for hours on end. My weekends were consumed by playing sports, and the most enjoyable of those times was always spent on those fields. The third is having a library right down the street from my house, where I knew the librarians by first name and would be consumed for hours in a vast array of books, magazines, and computer games.

I would say that my experience was typical of my friends in Sierra Madre and is shared by most children growing up here today. But what I took for granted then, and appreciate now, is what made that idyllic experience possible.

I never realized that knowing police officers and firefighters by their first name, or continuously seeing those officers and firefighters around town, was a unique privilege not shared by most individuals in surrounding communities. I have no doubt that my constant feeling of safety resulted from Sierra Madre having its own police and fire departments, both of whose presence were and still are constantly felt throughout town. I also never realized that being able to play on a pristine baseball field in the City in which I lived was an experience that kids in many other communities did not enjoy, and was made possible only through Sierra Madre's concerted devotion to providing various community services for our youth. I also never realized that having a fully operational library down the street with staff members who lived in town was a unique thing. Only when I grew older did I realize that community libraries, like the one in Sierra

Madre, were only surviving in cities where they remained a priority, which required unwavering devotion from community leaders and volunteer groups alike.

Put simply, the cherished experience I had as a child in Sierra Madre did not happen by accident. It was made possible by the hard work of our elected leaders and volunteers, and through the continued sacrifice of our residents to protect the City's services. As a council member today, I want to make sure that future generations in Sierra Madre are also able to have this same experience.

If Measure UUT fails, however, that will likely not be possible. Sierra Madre will lose approximately \$1 million in annual revenue from its \$8 million General Fund. The General Fund pays for services such as police, fire, paramedics, library, public works, and

community services. To put that loss into perspective, the City would have to eliminate both the library and its recreation department to shed \$1 million in expenses. Or, alternatively, outsource its police department, fire department or paramedic services. In other words, if Measure UUT fails, it would have a drastic effect on this community, while only resulting in a very small savings for each household – on average \$18.50 per month.

By voting Yes on Measure UUT, I am making the personal choice to spend that \$18.50 per month to protect Sierra Madre. To me, it is a small sacrifice to preserve the truly special place in which we live. I would respectfully ask each resident to make the same choice.

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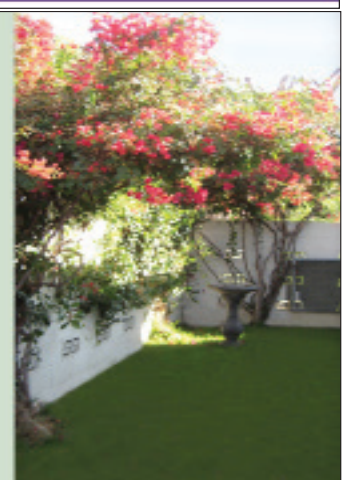

MY PLATFORM

I have spent my life studying government and practicing law. That training and experience has helped me to understand the issues our town faces on a detailed level and develop proposed solutions. I am not trying to appeal to you with vague promises or hollow campaign slogans. I offer specifics and I am going to try and earn your vote with my ideas.

Budget Control

Our City already does a good job of providing excellent service on a tight budget. That being said, there is always room for improvement. Here are some ways we might cut back:

Our 1998 and 2003 water bonds have a combined outstanding balance of about \$9.4 million. That debt is being repaid at 5% interest with total annual payments of about \$850,000 per year. If the bonds can be combined and refinanced at 5% interest (or better) for another 30 years we can save about \$250,000 per year. We pay an average of \$60,000 per month in attorney's fees. I believe that number can be cut in half to save the City approximately \$360,000 per year.

We should incentivize those who understand the budget better than anyone: Our City employees. Let's offer a two-week paid vacation to any employee who comes up with an idea that saves the City at least \$50,000 per year.

Why I am Voting "Yes" on the UUT

A "Yes" vote does not raise your UUT tax rate. It just freezes it at 10%. The signs that say "Stop the UUT Tax Increase" are dishonest. Read the ballot and you will see. Low-income resident already have a UUT tax rate of 0%. This exemption applies to individuals who make less than \$46,400 a year, and families of up to four who make less than \$66,250.

If the "No" votes succeed, they will only be saving us each about \$20 per month, but force \$1,000,000 in cuts to the police, paramedics, street repairs, the library, and/or community services. While I would not mind having an extra \$20 per month per month to go out for lunch or buy a ½ tank of gas, I would much rather have a fully functioning police department, well-paved streets, a free library, and nice parks.

Please also consider this: Most City employees do not live here because they cannot afford to. Saving our middle and upper income taxpayers \$20 per month will cause our hardworking City employees to suffer layoffs or reductions in pay. That is simply not a good reason to give the rest of us an inconsequential tax break.

Water

While the water shortage must be addressed on a national and state-wide level, there are things we can do to help here in Sierra Madre. Aside from reducing consumption and creating drought-resistant lawns, we can re-direct over half of our used water back into the underground aquifer by converting to grey water plumbing.

"Grey water" is a term that means to recycle water used in sinks, laundry, and showers. It does not include waste water from toilets. Grey water can be used for lawn irrigation or be piped directly into the ground. It also reduces our consumption of fresh water – your grass does not need pure drinking water. Soapy (grey) water is more than adequate.

The cost of installing such systems ranges from \$2,000-\$4,000. I therefore support two measures:

Requiring new construction to incorporate grey water plumbing;
and
Applying to the US Department of the Interior for a grant to create a common fund for Sierra Madre residents who want financial assistance to retrofit their homes for grey water. See <http://www.usbr.gov/lc/socal/wtrcons.html>.

Support for Local Business

Our town does not want heavy industry or big box retailers. We favor small "mom and pop" businesses. Those small businesses sometimes struggle and our store fronts go empty because there are only about 11,000 customers in town with few outside visitors. Here are three ideas to stimulate local businesses:

Moving the Farmers Market from Wednesday afternoons on Hermosa to Saturday or Sunday in Kersting court will bring more shoppers into downtown on the week-ends. Last year I had most of the merchants in Kersting Court sign a petition in support of this proposal.

Create a second Wistaria-like festival around Halloween. We already attract many visitors with the Alegria decorations. We can expand that into the downtown area with a haunted house and Halloween-themed events.

Coordinate and publicize a "Sierra Madre Open House" day with commercial realtors and the landlords of empty store fronts to attract potential businesses to town.

PASADENA UNIFIED TO HOST COMMUNITY UPDATE ON SIERRA MADRE MIDDLE SCHOOL CONSTRUCTION

The meeting will convene at 6 p.m. and will be held in the Sierra Madre Elementary School Auditorium, 141 West Highland Avenue, Sierra Madre. Also at the meeting will be a briefing from the project's architect on the school design.

The \$27 million Sierra Madre Middle School project will have 20 classrooms, a multipurpose room, music rooms, computer lab, library, administration area, atrium and other features. When com-

pleted, SMMS will be able to serve 600-650 students, including residents living within the SMMS attendance boundary, middle school students enrolled in district's Mandarin dual language immersion program and other students from across the district who apply via PUSD's open enrollment process.

Construction of the middle school began July 1, 2013 and is scheduled to be completed May 2015. Construction of the new campus is being funded by Measure TT, the \$350 million school bond initiative approved by voters in 2008.

Reward Offered in Altadena Homicide

Officials from the County of Los Angeles announced Tuesday they are now offering a \$20,000 reward for information leading to the arrest and/or conviction of the suspect(s) responsible for the homicide of 27-year-old Marcus Nieto in Altadena on or about February 16th, 2013.

According to authorities the investigation by the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department Homicide Bureau revealed that Nieto was last seen alive at his residence on February 15, 2013.

They said two riders on horseback discovered his body around 8 a.m. the following day on the Altadena Crest trail, in the 3800 block of Canon Boulevard. According to reports at the time, Nieto was found after being shoot shot in the head.

A student on his way to school called 911 after being told of the body by the riders.

Nieto was pronounced dead at the scene by paramedics.

Nieto was visiting an acquaintance in Pomona -- but may have been in the Covina/Azusa area at some point before he went missing.

All leads in this case have been exhausted resulting in this request by the Sheriff's Homicide Bureau to obtain the public's assistance with information to solve this crime.

The Board of Supervisors unanimously approved a motion by Supervisor Michael Antonovich Tuesday offering the reward.

has not been released, police said he collided with a vehicle waiting at an intersection near Marengo Avenue. At press time it was not known if any health issues played a roll, Tyler was 81. Pasadena Mayor Bill Bogaard said he has known Tyler since the 1980s. The two were close friends and avid bike riders.

"We did not bicycle together but gave each other support for a wonderful activity," he said. "It's ironic, and somewhat special, that his end came in connection with a bicycle ride."

According to city officials, he served on the city council from 1997 to 2009; his steadfast advocacy for Pasadena's Urban Forest was well known and he (cont. from page 1) helped shape what Pasadena is today.

"Sid will go down in history as the strongest defender of Pasadena's trees, its urban forests," Bogaard said. "He was valiant when battles came up over trees, he was a conscience

to the council, reminding us all to support trees and not make any exception."

In 2011 the city dedicated a park named for him, Sidney F. Tyler Park, located on the median between South Lake Avenue and Lakewood Place.

As a City Councilmember, he was instrumental in shaping the City's decision to retain our electric utility during deregulation. He provided valuable oversight and leadership with the Fire and Police Retirement System and was a passionate voice for the City's role as an environmental leader an official city statement read.

"Right from his campaign it became obvious he was passionately devoted, not only to district 7 but to parks, open space and fiscal responsibility," said former City Public Information Officer Ann Erdman.

Erdman said one of her most fond memories of Tyler was at

the ground breaking for Fire Station 34 1360 E. Del Mar Blvd.

"The ribbon cutting, which he performed with the fire chief, was done with a fire axe," she explained. "The ribbon was across a log."

Tyler is survived by his wife Betsey, their four children and eight grandchildren. A funeral service is planned for 2 p.m., Saturday, April 12, at All Saints Episcopal Church. A further celebration of his life will follow at 3 p.m. in the City Hall Courtyard.

DUI/Drivers License Checkpoint Planned

Pasadena Police Department Traffic Unit will be conducting a DUI/Driver's License Checkpoint on Friday at an undisclosed location within the city limits between the hours of 8:00 p.m. to 3:00 a.m. "Over the course of the past three years, DUI collisions have claimed 4 lives and resulted in 70 injury crashes harming 95 of our friends and neighbors," said Pasadena Police Chief Phillip Sanchez. Officers will be looking for signs of alcohol and/or drug impairment with officers checking drivers for proper licensing delaying motorists only momentarily. When possible, specially trained officers will be available to evaluate those suspected of drug-impaired driving. Recent statistics reveal that 30 percent of drivers in fatal crashes had one or more drugs in their systems. A study of active drivers showed more tested positive for drugs that may impair driving (14 percent) than did for alcohol (7.3 percent). Of the drugs, marijuana was most prevalent, at 7.4 percent, slightly more than alcohol.

DUI Checkpoints are placed in locations based on collision statistics and frequency of DUI arrests affording the greatest opportunity for achieving drunk and drugged driving deterrence. Locations are chosen with safety considerations for the officers and the public.

Drivers caught driving impaired can expect the impact of a DUI arrest to include jail time, fines, fees, DUI classes, other expenses that can exceed \$10,000 not to mention the embarrassment when friends and family find out.

Chick-fil-A Appeal to be Heard again Monday

The city council will again discuss a proposed Chick-fil-A restaurant after the Board of Zoning Appeals approved a minor conditional use permit to expand the current vacant Burger King location on east Colorado Blvd. and to add a second drive-thru lane. Two protected trees will also be removed.

The issues were reviewed by the Board of Zoning Appeals on March 19, the city council was given 10 days to stay the decision and request that it be called up for further review. Council member Terry Tornek made that request.

Although Tornek said he has concerns over the expansion of the drive-thru, many in the community are troubled by the Georgia based chicken sandwich eatery known for its conservative views.

"My concern is that Chick-fil-A as cooperation is notorious for being anti-gay, their CEO helped fund the movement against the repeal of DOMA [Defense of Marriage Act]," said a resident during public comment at a January

council meeting, "And here they want to plant their flag and ride in our parade next year. Pasadena is greater than that... I don't think Chick-fil-A belongs in Pasadena."

Pasadena City College students and staff made similar comments at the March 19 Board of Zoning Appeals meeting. LGBT (lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender) students have actively protested the restaurant's opening.

If approved, the expansion would increase the exiting Burger King at 1700 East Colorado from 3,100 square feet to 4,600 square feet. The Board of Zoning Appeals also approved the removal of one Chinese Elm tree and one Southern Magnolia tree.

Chick-fil-A representatives said they choose the location because it is next to Pasadena City College.

Chick-fil-A also plans a float in next year's Rose Parade to coincide with the opening of the first restaurant in Pasadena.

Over the years, the city has rejected six other properties Chick-fil-A had sought to open, including the last attempt on South Lake.

On Tuesday, April 1, the LA Times ran an article in their business section entitled, “For \$75, Yelp will make man’s Yelp problems go away.” The writer was David Lazarus and I’m glad he ran the column.

Four special women were in the spotlight at the “Live Your Dream” luncheon, sponsored by Soroptimist International of Altadena-Pasadena. This annual event, held this year on March 26th at the Women’s City Club, celebrates the power of women who have made a difference in their community.

The Soroptimists began the presentation ceremony by honoring Dr. Mikala Rahn with the organization’s Ruby Award (named after Soroptimists’ first president, Ruby Lee Minar). This award recognizes women who have enriched the lives of women and girls through their professional and/or volunteer work. In 2008, Dr. Rahn founded Learning Works Charter School, which focuses on students who are often underserved by the mainstream educational system, including dropouts, youths on probation, and pregnant teens. She also serves as Executive Director of Public Works, an educational research firm focused on pre K-12 education, with extensive experience in the areas of school reform, and is a co-founder of artWORKS, which offers the opportunity for youth to participate in the visual and performing arts.

Two high school seniors, Gillian Ferguson of San Gabriel and Nicoletta Baffo of San Marino, were recognized with the Violet Richardson award, named after the Soroptimists’ founder. This award honors young women between the ages of 14 and 17 who have made the community a better place through their volunteer efforts. Gillian’s love of music and her experience as a drummer in her high school marching band inspired her to create “Notes of Glory,” a community service project that expands and enriches music opportunities for students at Eliot Middle School in Altadena. Gillian, who is also a Girl Scout, collected and donated gently used instruments from local families, and raised \$400 in cookie sales to purchase band uniform pants. PREPARING FOR EARTHQUAKES

With our recent earthquakes, I overhear folks at Bean Town talking about ways to be prepared in case something worse occurs.

In my book “Self-Sufficient Home,” I tell the story of Dude McLean, who lived through the famous 1971 Sylmar earthquake. Because he was prepared through his camping and Marine experience, he fared much better than the average resident.

ONE MAN’S STORY

Here is McLean’s story of how he and his family began on the path of self-reliance, and how an earthquake tested his level of preparedness.

In 1965, Dude McLean and his young family moved into a house in Kagel Canyon, located in the hilly northern section of Los Angeles County. He liked the house because there was a live stream behind the house, which flowed year-round. “It was in the L.A. area, but I always felt distant from the L.A. craziness,” says McLean. Kagel Canyon is nestled right up to the Angeles National Forest, a small canyon community of about 200 families. “My children barely realized that they were growing up in the L.A. area,” says McLean.

FOOD PRODUCTION

McLean, a former U.S. Marine, wanted a place where he could be as self-reliant as possible, even though his property didn’t have a lot of land. He began doing French-intensive gardening – which required a lot of digging, and then switched to square-foot gardening and raised beds. He grew carrots, kale, corn, beans, squash and more in his garden. “We grew 90% of our own produce,” says McLean. He learned how to garden by doing lots of reading and lots of experimenting. “Most of the work of gardening and producing your own food is in the preparation stages,” explains McLean, who brought in horse and chicken manure and lots of mulch. “After two years, I could shove my arm into my garden soil and it would go all the way up to my elbow,” he says with a laugh. Once his garden was established, he could water it well in summer and go away for two weeks. Upon returning, the garden would be fine, even when it was very hot and dry.

Though he grew no fruit trees, he was glad that he’d produced an environment that would feed his family.

OTHER SUPPLIES

McLean wanted more than simply food preparation, so he began to build up the family’s supply of camping gear. “I already had a pickup truck with a camper on it, and I began to purchase camping gear such as Coleman stoves, lanterns, sleeping bags, an ice chest, and even a porta-potty. And we always purchased our gear used, if possible,” he says. McLean explains that his family frequently went camping, and so the entire family was well-versed in what it took to live in the field and live well. “We all knew how to camp,” says McLean

LIGHTING

Since his canyon home was somewhat remote, it would lose electrical power for various reasons. McLean purchased kerosene lamps for the home, and eventually had 35 gallons of kerosene fuel stored. He felt that the kerosene lanterns would ensure a more-reliable long-term lighting than would battery-operated lanterns. “Batteries can fail,” he commented. “Well, you can also run out of kerosene, but I felt that the kerosene was a better choice.”

He continued to obtain kerosene lanterns (eventually he had 6), extra tents, blankets, spaced out in the house, garage, and in his camper. His camper, fully equipped for camping, had been customized with dual gas tanks, and had a range of about 800 miles.

WATER

“We had our own water supply in the canyon, supplied by artesian wells, but it always bothered me that the water supply could be interrupted for various reasons. So I always liked the fact that we had this stream behind the house,” says McLean.

Still, he began to store water. He obtained two 40 gallon barrels, and started to store water by filling up used pop bottles (glass), with his goal being to supply enough water for the entire family. He eventually obtained 10 of the large glass Sparkletts Water bottles for water storage.

He also collected rain water when he could.

FOOD

“We began to experiment with drying our own food, and we did so on old window screens. We put the sliced food on the screens, and put another screen on top to keep off the flies. Some of these experiments didn’t work out, but mostly they did and we stored a lot of what we dried,” explains McLean.

He then began to store canned goods, such as meats, fruits, vegetables, and other items they used. “You have to remember,” he says, “that we never had any extra money. I couldn’t go out and just buy a lot of stuff, even if I wanted to. I had 3 children, and was self-employed. I would just spend a few extra dollars each time I went shopping and would store a little more food. I never went out and made some big purchase. It was all done little by little, and I often purchased canned items when they were on sale.”

As the first five years proceeded, McLean learned the need to label all his stored items, so that he would always use the oldest items first.

THE TEST

Then in 1971, the 7.1 Sylmar Earthquake hit. “As the crow flies, we were only about 5 miles from the epicenter of this quake,” explains McLean.

It was early in the morning, about 5 a.m., and McLean pauses to recall the event. “The noise of the quake was deafening. I can’t even describe it. It was like being next to a train going by and you can’t hear your conversation, but multiply that by 1000. The earth was grinding and moving, and it was like a giant shock wave hit the house. It was like some giant had wrapped his hands around the house and shook it every which way. It was very much like being hit with a bomb. My first words when the quake began was ‘They got us,’ thinking we were hit by a Russian bomb.”

But he just as instantly realized it was an earthquake. There was crashing in his house as stuff was falling everywhere, and he ran into the bedroom of his two youngest children, and while the house was still shaking, held one under each arm and ran them out of the house to a big field across the street.

“The house had four doors as exits, but I could only get one open because the others were jammed. So I took the two youngest to the field, set them down, and told them to stay. Then I ran back into the house, naked and barefoot, and got the older daughter out of

the house.” McLean took her to the field across the street with the other children, and then went back to the house.

“My wife was turning in circles in the house,” said McLean. He explains that all the walls were lined with plates and bookshelves and everything was being tossed into the center of the room, falling over and breaking. In the kitchen, every cabinet had emptied onto the floor which was littered with broken glass.

“I don’t know how I escaped getting my feet cut,” says McLean, “but I just grabbed my wife, and we all went over the field and stood there while everything was still shaking. Other neighbors started coming out and some came to the field. I could see that all the transformers on the telephone poles were down, and some houses up the creek had been thrown off their foundations and into the creek.”

DAMAGE ASSESSMENT

McLean explains that when it got light, neighbors checked on other neighbors, and there were no major injuries or deaths. Some neighbors just stayed to themselves and wouldn’t check on others. The water line that provided water to the approximately 200 homes in the canyon was broken every 6 to 20 feet, and telephone, electricity, and gas lines were out. The main access road to the canyon had shifted about two feet, so you needed a truck to get in or out.

About 30% of the homes in the canyon were totally destroyed. Some people packed up and departed and never came back. About a dozen houses were shaken down to rubble piles about four feet high. Homes were down in the creek.

McLean’s family didn’t want to go back into the house, but they went back to get clothes since it was cold. Eventually, they all sat in the truck, and cooked some food on Coleman stoves for breakfast. Since there was no electricity, the family had no idea how bad the situation was beyond the canyon since they had no news. They got through that first day by cleaning up the living room, planning to use it as the bedroom that night. But when night came, no one wanted to sleep, so they all piled into the truck and drove out of the canyon to assess the damage.

There was electricity in Hollywood, and other places, and they learned about the range of the quake’s damage from scant news reports. The media focused on a collapsed hospital, and the many bridges and overpasses that collapsed. “I believe there was much more widespread damage,” says McLean, “but we didn’t have the freeway through here then, and we didn’t have the instant media that we have now.”

The family came back home, and spent the first night at home. The next day, since they had relatives in the high desert, McLean took the family to the relatives and then returned back to the house. But because so many bridges and overpasses had collapsed, he only made it to the desert and back because he was so familiar with the old unused roads that were built before the freeway to the desert was constructed.

THE CLEAN UP

McLean worked on cleaning up the house for the following week by himself. He noted that it took four days for the government emergency services to get to the canyon bringing water supplies. It also took at least three weeks for the regular water supply to be restored, and at least that long for electricity to be restored. “The government can be very slow in reacting to emergencies, but we had plenty of supplies in food and water,” he says. “I had a porta-potti, and I could bury the contents in the yard when full. But our toilet was actually on a septic system that still worked if I poured water into the bowl.” He had a total of 120 gallons of stored water, some of it in glass containers that did not break because they were packed well.

“I took short baths with just a little water. I cooked on the Coleman stoves with the food we’d stored. Plus, I didn’t just take care of myself. I shared food and water with neighbors. I showed neighbors how to get water from the creek and boil it. It is still amazing to me that some people didn’t know to do this. In general, everyone helped those who needed help. Perhaps the best thing we had going for us was that most of the neighbors knew each other. We had a community center at the park, and there were regular meetings there with teen and adult activities. Knowing your neighbors is probably the best way to prepare for emergencies, beside storing things and learning skills.”

McLean stayed at the house for the first week after the Sylmar earthquake, cleaning things up for the family to come back. The family came back a week later, and everyone slept together in the living room. Gas lines were out, so they cut their own firewood using hand saws. They walked up the canyon, and cut dead oak and sycamore branches and burned it in their living room fire place.

Eventually, little by little, the utilities were restored and life got back to normal.

“After the quake, I remember thinking, wow!, I did the right thing,” says McLean. “Here I was preparing maybe for war, for the Russians to bomb us, or maybe for unemployment, but not for an earthquake like this. And I was very happy to be prepared.”

“To this day, my son still vividly recalls that earthquake,” says McLean. “That experience spurred me on to do even more extensive preparations. A disaster can be a job loss, a fire, anything. It’s important to know what to store, where to store things, and how to store them.”

McLean explains how he continued to study self-reliance and survival skills, and built up an extensive research library of over 600 books. “But all the books in the world are no good if you don’t put the information into practice,” he adds. “I got to the point where I had a whole room in storage, and if I didn’t have to go to the store for two years, I could have done that. We could have lived off the grid for two years, and I had back-ups systems for my back-ups,” he laughs.

ADVICE

According to McLean, “The most basic thing for people to do is to have at least a few weeks of food and water. Plan at least a gallon of water per person per day. And don’t store everything in one place, since you may not be able to get to your gear. Think through all your daily needs, make a list, and began to get your supplies for sleeping, shelter, eating, cooking, lighting – everything.”

With the pride of a father, he points out that all 3 of his children are very self-reliant today because they grew up that way, knowing how to camp and knowing how to deal with the needs of life. “Remember, I had to learn all this little by little, and we experimented,” he added. “Sure, we were also preparing for possible emergencies, but we all had a great time doing it.”

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THE REEL DEAL: by Ben Show DIVERGENT



I had not heard very much about the book series before seeing the movie. All that I knew was that there was a teenage girl who had to choose between five factions to live in. I did not know about the other characters, the central conflict, or anything else. Now that I have seen the movie, I can say that I will be reading the trilogy and seeing the next two movies in the series.

Beatrice Prior (Shailene Woodley) must choose to live under one of five different traits, split into five factions. But before she chooses, she has to take a test that will tell her which one to choose. The test, however, does not work on her, and she soon discovers she is part of a rare group of people, called divergents, who can fit into all five factions and cannot be controlled by the tyrannical government ruling over them.

'Divergent' is a triumph for the genre of young adult book-to-movie adaptations. In many ways it is more complex and much more interesting than 'The Hunger Games' series and delves into much deeper and darker topics. The story is amazingly intricate in the way it builds the futuristic world from the ground up, introduces you to the huge cast of characters, and depicts the conflict between two groups of people with different views on how to be human.

DILLS DOES DOGS

Sierra Madre has its first hot dog joint! Vicious Dogs has taken over the location of the Mountain View Sushi Restaurant. I've been there twice in the past two weeks, and I give it two thumbs up, (actually, that should be three visits since I first discovered the original Vicious Dogs in North Hollywood). Vicious Dogs is operated by partners Alex Fedial and Ruben Sauyun - Alex is the nephew of the founder Bill Fedial, and is scoping out other locations for Vicious #3. When I asked Alex why a hot dog restaurant in Sierra Madre, Alex replied, "we are filling a need that there are no hot dog places within five miles". Great answer Alex!! By the look of the line of people waiting to get in, he might be on to something. Alex and Ruben have even gotten to know the regulars orders, though on my second visit I threw him a change-up by ordering the Spicy Pastrami Dog (\$7), a polish dog that comes with mustard and pickle served with cut up pastrami on a french roll (on my first visit I had the Sweet and Spicy 1/3-lb Kielbasa Link (\$6) on a poppy seed bun, which Alex tells me is the #1 seller).



Vicious 2 has done their homework as Alex and Ruben plan to expand their menu, but for now they offer the top 15 sellers from the original location for their menu. You can mix and match and make your own from a selection of beef, kosher, pork, veggie, or turkey links with an amazing number of toppings. Sides are plentiful as well - how about garlic feta fries or chili cheese fries? The fries are good, but if you have been following my column you know I only approve of freshly cut fries. And, since my first visit, you can now get a beer with your hot dog!! Of course all entrees are under \$10, dine in or take out.

Here are a few fun Hot Dog Facts:

Every year, the typical American will eat an average of 60 hot dogs. The cylinder wrapped in a blanket is consistently one of the country's most beloved and most misunderstood comfort foods. Like most great events in history, there are varying accounts of how it all began and who started it. The history of the hot dog is no different. You will find many references throughout history to the origins of a hot dog-like thing called a sausage. Here are a handful of the most entertaining accounts of how the hot dog was born.

The invention of the hot dog is often attributed to the 1904 Louisiana Purchase Exposition. However, similar sausages were made and consumed in Europe, particularly in Germany, as early as 1864, and the earliest example of a hot dog bun dates to New York City in the 1860s. German immigrants appear to have sold hot dogs, along with milk rolls and sauerkraut, from pushcarts in New York City's Bowery during the 1860s. The hot dog's association with baseball also predates the 1904 World's Fair. Chris von der Ahe, owner of the St. Louis Browns, sold hot dogs at his ballpark in the 1880s. But, who served the first hot dog? Wieners and frankfurters don't become hot dogs until someone puts them in a roll or a bun, and there are several stories as to how this first happened. Several people have been credited for supposedly inventing the hot dog, most notably Charles Feltman and Antoinine Feuchtwanger.

In 1867, Charles Feltman, a German butcher, opened up the first Coney Island hot dog stand in Brooklyn, New York and sold 3,684 dachshund sausages in a roll during his first year in business. He is also credited with the idea of the warm bun.



In 1880, Antoinine Feuchtwanger, a German peddler, sold hot sausages in the streets of St. Louis, Missouri. He would supply white gloves with each purchase so that his customers would not burn their hands while eating the sausage. However, he saw his profits shrinking because the customers kept taking the gloves and walking off with them. His wife suggested that he put the sausages in a split bun instead. He reportedly asked his brother-in-law, a baker, for help. The baker improvised long soft rolls that fit the meat, thus inventing the hot dog bun. When he did that, the hot dog was born; he called them red hots.

Although the exact origins of the Chicago Dog are not documented, Vienna Beef of Chicago claims two European immigrants at the Chicago World's Fair invented the "Chicago-style" hot dog .

INGREDIENTS

- 12 ounce(s) linguine
- 1 tablespoon(s) canola oil
- 12 ounce(s) ground pork
- 1/4 teaspoon(s) red pepper flakes
- 6 scallions, cut in 1 1/2-in. pieces
- 1 large carrot, shredded
- 3 clove(s) garlic, finely chopped
- 1 piece(s) (2-in.) fresh ginger
- 1 cup(s) low-sodium chicken broth or water
- 2 tablespoon(s) low-sodium soy sauce
- 3 tablespoon(s) creamy peanut butter
- Chopped fresh cilantro, for serving

DIRECTIONS

Cook the linguine according to package directions. Reserve 1 cup of the cooking liquid.

Drain the pasta and return it to the pot.

Meanwhile heat the oil in a large skillet over medium heat. Add the ground pork and red pepper flakes and cook, breaking it up with a spoon, until browned, 5 to 6 minutes. Add the scallions, carrot, garlic and ginger and cook, stirring, for 3 minutes.

Stir the chicken broth, soy sauce and peanut butter into the pork mixture. Cook, stirring, until the peanut butter is melted and fully incorporated. Toss with the pasta, adding some of the reserved cooking liquid if the pasta seems dry. Sprinkle with the cilantro, if desired.

SAVOR THE FLAVOR!

Savor the Flavor Teaches You How To Taste Chocolate



Tasting chocolate can be as simple as ripping open a bag and digging in. But to fully appreciate chocolate, you should experience as many of its moods and flavors as possible. Here's how to do a more formal tasting.

Sample Several: Buy several different kinds. Try white, milk and dark. Experiment with chocolates you've never had before. Choose various brands, cacao percentages and countries of origin. Select different varieties of beans—rare Criollo, and Forastero and Trinitario. Experiment with unusual add-ins, such as chilies, sea salt or bacon.

Arrange Them: Lay them out, from light to dark, and from lower cacao percentages to higher.

Sense Your Chocolate: Notice the gloss and color of each chocolate. Color may be a clue to its taste; darker colors generally have a richer flavor. However, lighter colors may actually be an indication of the bean's characteristics, rather than the chocolate's cacao content or the presence of milk. Starting with the chocolate with the lightest color and lowest cacao percentage, break off a piece. Listen for a sharp snap, which indicates freshness and quality. Dark chocolate, with its higher concentration of cocoa liquor, will have the cleanest break.

Breathe It In: Next, bring your chocolate to your nose and inhale its aroma. A chocolate's aroma will vary depending on its variety, where it's from and how it was made. A chocolate may be reminiscent of fruits, nuts, spices, flowers, herbs, dairy products, sugar, alcohol, bread or wood. Its scent may even be like a color—green for grass or purple for tartness.

Taste It: Bite off a small amount, and let it melt on your tongue. Then bite another small piece and chew it slowly. Notice how creamy it feels in your mouth and whether it melts all the way. Higher-quality chocolates often have a smoother texture.

Feel the flavors swirl. Dark chocolate is the most complex. Pay attention to the different flavors of the ingredients—the cocoa, the sugar, the vanilla. You may taste the same characteristics that you could smell when breathing in that particular chocolate, or you may find that the flavors differ from the aromas. Blackberry, butter, brown sugar, mint, coffee, pepper, even wine or ash—the list goes on and on. These are all flavors that may appear in the chocolate itself, even if those ingredients weren't added at the factory.

Repeat: Cleanse your palate with a bland, unsalted cracker or a slice of green apple and a sip of water or seltzer. Then try the next in line; sample them all! (*Excerpt from www.thestoryofchocolate.com*)

DOGGIE DOOMSDAY Are Your Pets Prepared For a Potential Disaster?

Being prepared to successfully endure, survive and thrive through a major earthquake, tornado, hurricane or any other type of "doomsday disaster" is by no means a new concept to us these days. However, if you are anything like me, you will agree that it can't hurt to re-visit the issue now and then, and allow yourself to subscribe to any fresh ideas or suggestions on doomsday preparedness, when and if one should occur.

I read an article in the June 2012 issue of "Dog Fancy" magazine entitled "Ready for Anything", by Kitson Jazynka, about a true experience had by the Anastasias, a Maryland family who found themselves dealing with three very frightened dogs, two of which went missing during Hurricane Irene last year. For a while, during the ordeal, the Anastasias began to think that they might never see their precious pups again. It happened while they were running across the yard, trying desperately to escape their home after a huge oak tree had been pushed over by the high winds and landed on their roof. They ran to find refuge at a neighbor's house, and were making their way across the field when two of their three dogs broke away and ran randomly without direction in the dark night.

I could so relate to how the Anastasias must have felt when their dogs got away and ran in fear, and I could so imagine that happening at my house if I should find myself in a similar situation. That article forced me to face the fact that, although I love my pets, and I like to think I am a responsible pet owner, I am no where near as 'pet-ready' for a major disaster as I should and could be. It also brought to mind the fact that I would never forgive myself if my pets went missing or perished during a major disaster, knowing that I had not done everything possible to avoid loss of life or limb on their behalf.

Fortunately, the Anastasias did manage to find their two frightened dogs and gathered them in to safety before they were lost or hurt, but the end result could have been grim, considering their lack of preparedness. The key element of advantage that came from that experience was the fact that the family realized how important pet preparedness is for potential doomsday disasters and shared what they learned. First and foremost, they realized that it is very important not to wait until the night of the 'storm' or disaster, to prepare! To really be ready for a potential disaster, one must take the time to plan ahead.

Preparing your cats and dogs for a "doomsday" event includes several factors and should begin with writing out a plan. Ideally, the plan will include a list of various scenarios with corresponding actions to be taken. For example, how can you be best prepared to care for your pets in the

case of a mandatory evacuation due to a fire or flood? Or like in the case of the Anastasias, what if you are forced to flee from your home during a raging storm? Conversely, what steps of preparation should you take to protect your pets if you are forced to stay inside your house without power after a blizzard? We may not have blizzards in Sierra Madre, but this could happen while you are on vacation in the mountains, or visiting a friend or family member in another part of the country. Preparation plans will vary depending on the specific needs of your pet, but here are a few basic tips that will pertain to nearly any home with domestic pets:

- Microchip your dog. Collars and tags can easily fall off and get lost, and the appearance of your pet may vary depending on the elements and whether your dog is injured. A registered chip implanted under your dog's skin will ensure its unmistakable identity, should s/he get lost. Ask your veterinarian about microchip implants and registering.
- Crate train your dog, or at least train him to be accustomed to walking in and out of a storm cellar or underground crawl space. If a dog is fearful of small spaces, he may not be willing to take shelter.
- Keep extra copies of your pet's vaccination records and photos on hand to help identify and prove ownership of your pet.
- Establish a buddy system with one of your neighbors to keep your dog out of harm's way in case you are unable to get home during a disaster.
- Keep a box of extra pet foods and any other pet necessities you may need in case the stores are closed for an extended period of time after a disaster. The pet supply box should be stored along with your own "human" survival kit for easy retrieval in case of an evacuation.
- Regardless of the circumstances, it is very important that you secure your pet on a leash or in a crate, at the onset of a major storm or earthquake. If your pet is not secured, he is much more likely to escape and run out into the street where he could be hit by a car, or roam randomly out into the neighborhood or up into the forest where you may not be able to find him.

Animals often become very nervous during a storm or earthquake and they also pick up on our own vibrations if we ourselves are nervous or afraid. If you plan ahead, and practice the basic steps of preparedness before a disaster hits, you will be much more apt to remain calm throughout the ordeal, and in that way help your pets to do the same. Do what you can to be prepared and let your pets depend on you to keep them safe in the case of an emergency. And, as always remember to love and let live!

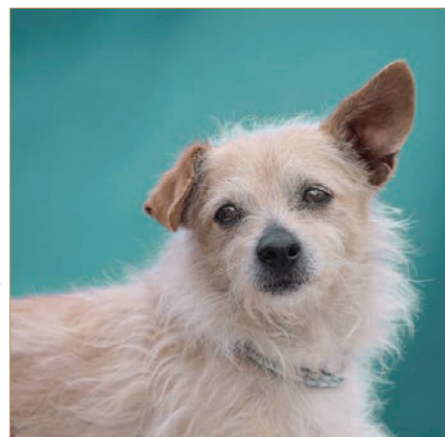

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3 MORE WAYS TO A TOXIC FREE LIFE

In last week's article I talked about some simple ways to reduce the toxins we are exposed to. The main problem with toxins is we can't see, smell or feel them, at least not right away. We don't realize that we're being affected by toxic substances until we have a problem. Sometimes it takes years of subtle exposure to a combination of these toxins for a problem to arise. At that point it is hard to figure out if it was exposure to one toxin that caused the problem or was it a cumulative effect of many toxins. It is not hard to notice that we have an increasing number of cancers, immune system disorders, neurological problems, chronic fatigue syndrome, multiple chemical sensitivities, and allergies than ever before.

Again, the best advice is to avoid exposure to toxins in the first place. Here are a few more simple ways to reduce your toxin exposure or eliminate the toxins that enter your body:

1. Stop eating pesticide laden, genetically modified and processed foods. According to the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), 60 percent of herbicides, 90 percent of fungicides and 30 percent of insecticides are known to be carcinogenic. Pesticide residues have been detected in 50 percent to 95 percent of U.S. foods. To help your body with the toxins you unknowingly take in, you should regularly consume these foods as they are great liver detoxifiers: grapefruit, onions, garlic, cruciferous veggies, cilantro, and parsley. Remember that most if not all processed foods contain chemicals.

2. Stop any form of substance abuse. This includes tobacco, excessive alcohol, drugs, and even excessive caffeine! There is a lot of research that says one cup of coffee or a glass of red wine may be good for us but in this case, more is not better.

3. Lose excess fat. Fat stores toxins. The body's solution to the toxins and pollution we absorb is to dilute them, most toxins are fat soluble, so the body dilutes the blood content of these by forcing them into the fat cells.

Hopefully, some of these simple ideas from the last two weeks will help you reduce the toxic load that your body will have to deal with!



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HOW TO SHOP FOR A HEARING AID

Dear Savvy Senior: What tips can you offer people who are shopping for hearing aids? Overwhelmed Senior

Dear Overwhelmed:
With so many choices and options available today, shopping for a hearing aid that meets your needs, lifestyle and budget can be challenging. Here are some tips that can help you locate a good hearing aid provider and choose an appropriate aid.

Choose a Provider

The first step in buying a hearing aid is to choose a good provider. The best option – as recommended by Consumer Reports – is an otolaryngologist (an ear, nose and throat doctor) who employs an audiologist that fits and dispenses hearing aids.

An otolaryngologist will first examine your ears and rule out any medical conditions such as a tumor, bacterial infection or ear wax that can affect your hearing. Medicare will cover the medical exam and an audiologist's test if ordered by a physician.

If you can't find a conveniently located doctor's office that dispenses aids, an independent audiologist or hearing instrument specialist is a good alternative. To search for these professionals in your area, see howsyourhearing.org and ihsinfo.org. Big box retailers like Wal-Mart and Costco also sell hearing aids.

Or, if you're a veteran, be sure to check with your nearest VA health facility. Eligible veterans may be able to get hearing aids for free.

During Your Visit

After you locate a provider, when you go in for your first visit you need to be prepared to discuss your lifestyle and hearing needs. For example: Do you just want to hear the TV, or other people speaking? Do you talk on the phone a lot? Do you need to hear in a lot of noisy places, like restaurants? Knowing your priorities will help your provider determine what style and hearing aid technology is best for you.

You'll also be given a hearing test in a soundproof booth to determine what type of hearing loss you have. After the test, your provider should give you a choice of hearing aid brands, features and styles to consider.

To help you decide, ask for a demonstration. Many providers are able to put a disposable plug on the tip of a behind-the-ear hearing aid and program the device to your hearing loss so you can experience how it works.

Also ask about popular add-on features like "telecoils" that helps with phone conversations, "directional microphones" that can help you hear in noisy places, and "feedback cancellation" that prevents the aid from squealing when you get too close to other audio equipment. But, keep in mind that the extra features will drive up the price.

At the Fitting

After you buy your hearing aid, don't leave the office without making sure it physically fits your ear and that it does what you want it to do. To help with this, ask to have a "real-ear" test which measures the match between your hearing loss and the response of your hearing aid.

Also get a signed copy of a contract that outlines the hearing aid you're buying, along with the price, trial period, any nonrefundable fees and the warranty. Most manufacturers allow a 30 to 60-day trial period to be sure you're satisfied, and provide follow-up visits to help you with needed adjustments or questions.

Resources

You also need to know that digital hearing aids are expensive, typically costing between \$1,000 and \$3,500 per ear, and they're not covered by traditional Medicare or most private insurance companies. To look for help, call the National Institute on Deafness and Other Communication Disorders at 800-241-1044 and ask them to mail you their list of financial resources for hearing aids.

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SEAN'S SHAMELESS REVIEWS:

SABOTAGE

Co-writer/director David Ayer returns with another cop film after his

sensational 2012 sleeper hit, "End Of Watch." While that flick packed a whole lot of emotional punch, Ayer's new flick, "Sabotage" is about as pointless as two-dollar bill. It features Arnold Schwarzenegger as John "Breacher" Wharton, the commander of a DEA elite group in his darkest post-political role. The group consists of the usual ragtag, booze-lovin', foul mouthed, testosterone driven sociopaths. "Sabotage" begins with Breacher viewing a videotape of a woman being tortured and subsequently killed by Mexican drug cartel. Eight months passes and his team is about to infiltrate a drug house in Atlanta. The team blows through bad guys left and right in an incredibly bloody affair. Once they get down to the bottom level of the mansion, it becomes clear Arnold and his band of brothers (and one female) are there to skim some cash off the pile of millions that's neatly wrapped up. To be exact, the agents are taking ten million to split between them, which is a fraction of what is actually there. After successfully tying the cash to a rope and sending it down the toilet drain, one of their comrades is taken down by a guy left over from upstairs. The team quickly kills him, but the FBI, who initiated the raid, hears the commotion. Arnold, quick to stall them, gets the group out of there right before blowing up the rest of the money. The following night, the team heads down to the sewers and to their amazement, the rope has been cut and their ten million is missing. Coincidentally, the FBI knew exactly how much was missing from the drug house and it leads into a full investigation of the team.

After integrations of all the members and months of being followed, the FBI finally drops the case. However, it becomes real serious when someone starts taking down these members one man at a time. The real story begins when the team has to figure out who wants them dead after two of their members are mysteriously murdered. "Sabotage" also stars Sam Worthington as "Monster," Mireille Enos as Lizzy, Terrence Howard as "Sugar," Joe Manganiello as "Grinder," Josh Holloway as "Neck" and Max Martini as Tom "Pyro" Roberts. It is suspected that the Mexican drug cartel doesn't take too lightly to those trying to rip them off, even if there is no hard evidence these guys stole their money. The film starts off promising. I don't mind the excessive and gory violence, but there's

little merit for any of it. In fact, each supporting character is nearly identical in personality. Unlike "End of Watch," in which you honestly care about the two men with badges, these guys are just too

gung-ho on drinking and killing. Another side note is what the hell is Oscar nominated actor Terrance Howard even doing in this? Not that he has done many good films over the past few years, but he has maybe a dozen lines in "Sabotage." Like most of the supporting characters, you have no clue what these guys are really all about, but in a film such as this, maybe that doesn't really matter. Arnold's character is the most flushed out. In the second half of the film, it's really more geared toward him, David Ayer didn't write the first draft, but he received writing credit. The original writer was Skip Woods, a screenwriter with a less than stellar track record ("Swordfish," "Hitman," "The A-Team," "A Good Day To Die"). However, Ayer is still masterful behind the camera and brings a lot of kinetic energy to the screen. While the dialogue is far from anything remotely good, Ayer keeps the energy relatively high despite some clunky scenes.

"Sabotage" suffers from a nearly inconceivable late third act. The reasoning behind what occurs to some of the members has no motive beyond pure speculation. Once you find out the real answer to the missing money, it leads into an ending that is so far-fetched, you can't help but not to laugh. It turns into a modern day western set in a seedy Mexico bar. I've come to realize everything leading up to it, along with the big plotline of DEA agents being taken down, holds little purpose. "Sabotage" is only recommended for the true Arnold diehards and anyone looking for a reason to see extreme violence on screen. There are a few laughs, some good action scenes, and Arnold using the f-word in nearly every other sentence amongst the preposterously crafted storyline. If that doesn't pop your cork, then steer clear before you self-sabotage yourself.

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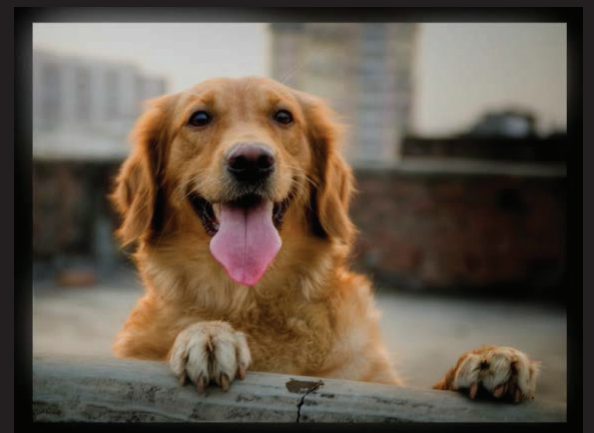

ROSETTA SETS SIGHTS ON DESTINATION COMET

The European Space Agency's Rosetta spacecraft has caught a first glimpse of its destination comet, after waking up from deep-space hibernation on 20 January.

Two ‘first light’ images were taken on 20 and 21 March by the OSIRIS wide-angle camera and narrow-angle camera, as part of six weeks of activities dedicated to preparing the spacecraft’s science instruments for close-up study of comet 67P/Churyumov-Gerasimenko.

OSIRIS is the Optical, Spectroscopic and Infrared Remote Imaging system aboard the spacecraft, developed under the leadership of the Max-Planck-Institut für Sonnensystemforschung in Göttingen, Germany, has two cameras for imaging the comet. One covers a wide angle, while the narrow-angle camera covers a smaller field at higher resolution.

OSIRIS is one of a suite of 11 science instruments on the Rosetta orbiter that together will provide details on the comet's surface geology, its gravity, mass, shape and internal structure, its gaseous, dust-laden atmosphere and its plasma environment.

Rosetta has been traveling through the solar system for 10 years, and will finally arrive at the comet in August this year. It first imaged the comet in a long exposure of over 13 hours from a distance of 163 million kilometers, three years ago, before entering deep-space hibernation.

Rosetta is currently around 5 million kilometers from the comet, and at this distance it is still too far away to resolve—its light is seen in less than a pixel and required a series of 60- to 300-second exposures taken with the wide-angle and narrow-angle camera. The data then travelled 37 minutes through space to reach Earth, with the download taking about an hour per image.

“Finally seeing our target after a 10-year journey through space is an incredible feeling,” says OSIRIS Principal Investigator Holger Sierks from the Max Planck Institute for Solar System Research in Germany. “These first images taken from such a huge distance show us that OSIRIS is ready for the upcoming adventure.”

"This is a great start to our instrument commissioning period, and we are looking forward to having all 11 instruments plus lander Philae back online and ready for arriving at the comet in just a few months' time," says Matt Taylor, ESA's Rosetta project scientist.

OSIRIS and the spacecraft's dedicated navigation cameras will regularly acquire images over the coming weeks to help refine Rosetta's trajectory in order to bring it steadily in line with the comet ahead of the rendezvous.

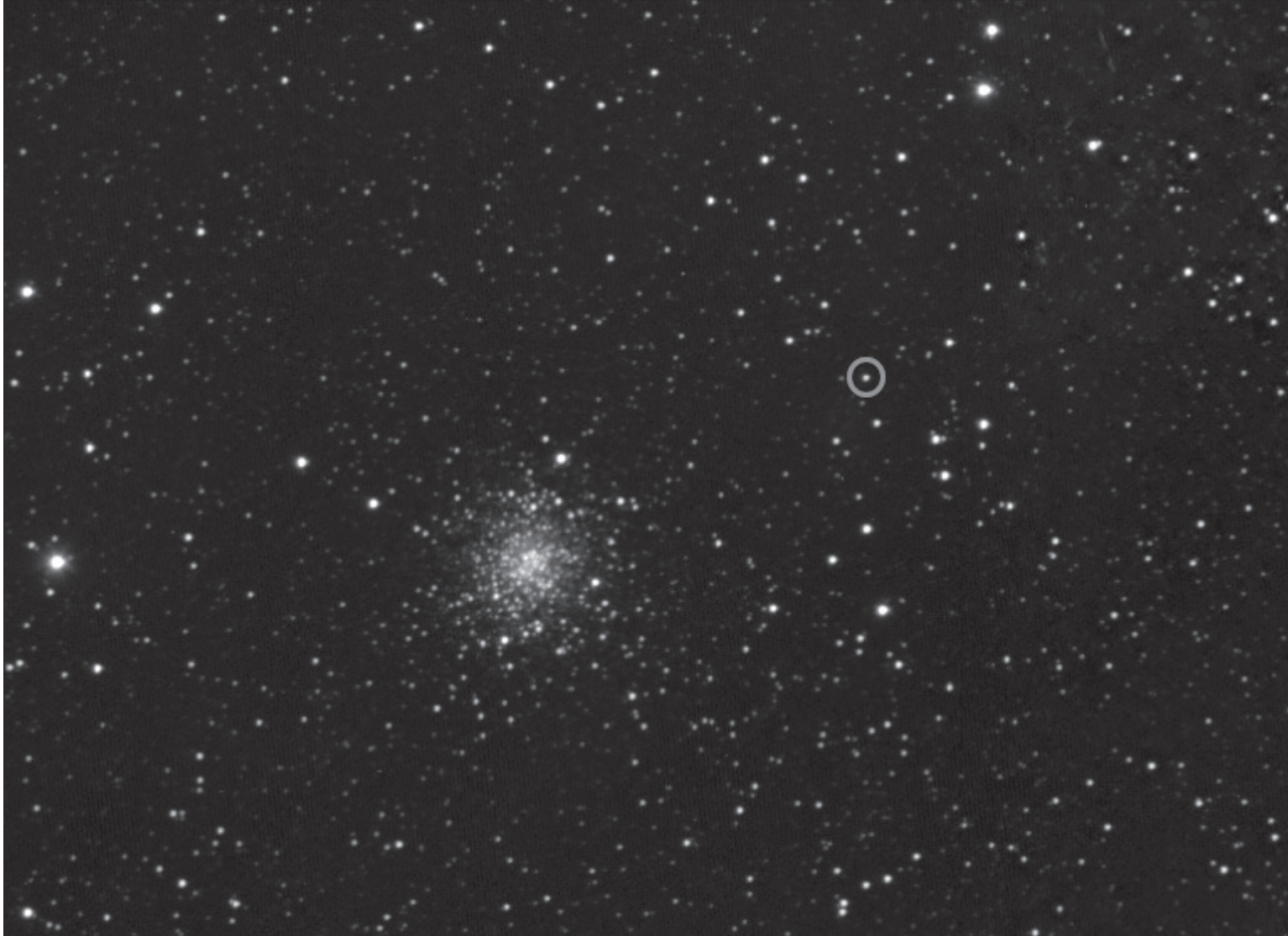
Currently, Rosetta is on a trajectory that would, if unchanged, take it past the comet at a distance of approximately 50,000 km and at a relative speed of 800 m/s. A critical series of maneuvers beginning in May will gradually reduce Rosetta's velocity relative to the comet to just 1 m/s and bring it to within 100 km by the first week of August.

Between May and August the 4-km-wide comet will gradually 'grow' in Rosetta's field of view from appearing to have a diameter of less than one camera pixel to well over 2,000 pixels—equivalent to a resolution of around 2 m per pixel—allowing the first surface features to be resolved.

These early observations will allow the rotation rate and the shape of the nucleus to be better understood, crucial for planning maneuvers around the comet. An initial assessment of the comet's activity will also be possible.

With OSIRIS re-activated in the first week of instrument commissioning, Rosetta's 10 other science experiments, along with lander Philae, will provide the focus for the next months' activities.

BILLS WOULD ADDRESS CALIFORNIA'S DROUGHT

Recently I joined the Los Angeles Area Chamber of Commerce on a trip to Washington, D.C. to talk to legislators about managing California's drought. We received a good reception. Water is a bi-partisan issue. Inside the "Washington bubble" we found that support for programs that provide water crosses party lines. However, what those programs should contain can take very different paths. Elected officials from California and across the nation know about the California drought.

A drought in California isn't just a California problem. The \$44.7 billion agricultural sector in California helps feed the nation. Southern California is the eighth largest economy in the world.If our economy suffers, the country suffers. This is the worst drought since at least 1976 --1977. While Southern California's long term investments in storage and conservation are providing the supplies that are needed here, for now, other parts of the state which haven't made these investments are suffering. Safe drinking water is in danger of running out in as many as 10 California communities.Long term investments are needed to address California's water supply and use challenges. But as a wise philosopher once said, "When the alligator is nipping at your butt it is hard to remember that your goal was to drain the swamp." So most of the conversations for now are about what to do now.There are several bills proposed to help manage the drought.

The ones getting the most attention are House Resolution 3964 introduced by Congressman Valadao (R) from the Sacramento - San Joaquin Valley, Senate Resolution 2016 introduced by

Senator Feinstein (D) and a similar bill, House Resolution 4039, introduced by Congressman Costa (D) from Mercer, Madera and Fresno Counties. HR 3964 focuses on the needs of the farmers who have had to fallow land for lack of irrigation water. It proposes to direct more water to farming by reducing regulatory requirements.

There could also be an increase in the water available for the State Water Project that brings water to southern California. Republicans say HR 3964 would help both farmers and urban interests. Democrats say it is in direct conflict with California's co-equal goals of meeting both Delta and urban water needs, pits interests group against each other, and damages the efforts of divergent groups to agree on long-term water solutions for the state. SR 2016 and HR 4039 direct federal agencies to use operational changes to maximize the flow of water especially to the communities hardest hit in the central valley, provides \$300 million in federal funding for a variety of water programs that both conserve water and increase supply, and expedites federal regulatory control without changing or exempting any environmental requirements.

Democrats say it will provide more water by opening cross channels in the Delta when fish aren't migrating, allowing water to reach the communities who need it most, and without damaging the environment. Republicans say it is too little too late. Conservation projects to increase supply take too long and won't provide water soon enough. It is an important debate. There are no easy answers. The wrong answer is to do nothing.

A recent article in the New York Post about brothers battling over a painting from their uncle's estate serves as a reminder of the importance of designating specific beneficiaries for your personal property, either through a will or by gifting while you are still alive.

The brotherly brawl came about after noted Manhattan interior designer David Barrett died and left his two nephews – Richard and Alan Barrett -- “equal shares” in his \$5.6 million estate. Richard lost the coin flip – and then flipped out, filing a lawsuit to gain ownership of the painting, which held up payment to the two estate executors and his brother.

The lesson: simply splitting an estate without detailed bequests can, and often does, lead to litigation.

no question as to who you intend to inherit your prized possessions. 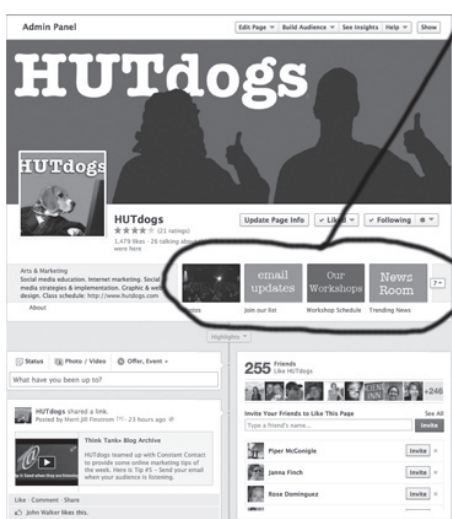

If there's one thing Republicans hate even more than health insurance for a growing number of Americans, it's empirical evidence that Obamacare is insuring a growing number of Americans.

As we hit the first enrollment deadline, the raw stats demonstrate that the health reform law is very much alive and threading itself into the national fabric. Well over 6 million people have signed up on the state-run marketplace exchanges, nearly matching the original forecast - a minor miracle, given last autumn's website disaster. Roughly one-third of those signers were previously uninsured. Plus, another 4.5 million previously uninsured people have signed up for Obamacare, via the expanded Medicaid program that's now available in half the states. Plus, 3 million previously uninsured young adults are now covered under their parents' plans, via a popular Obamacare provision.

In other words, at least 9.5 million previously uninsured Americans now have coverage; indeed, the nonpartisan Congressional Budget Office says in a new report that the uninsured population will drop more than 20 percent during 2014. Meanwhile, the public opinion vibes are bullish. The latest ABC News-Washington Post poll says that a plurality of Americans now favor Obamacare, 49 to 48 percent. (That's a new high, driven by a surge in Democratic support.) And while Republicans continue to jerk their knees for repeal, pollsters at the Kaiser Family Foundation say that only 29 percent of Americans want repeal.

But we all know how the haters in the conservative cocoon react to facts.

The basic mindset: "No this isn't happening!" Or as Republican Sen. John Barrasso of Wyoming insisted, the Obama administration is simply "cooking the books."

By now, of course, we recognize the symptoms of this denial psychosis. Like when they insist that virtually every climate change scientist on the planet is making stuff up. And when they insisted, in October 2012, that all the pollsters forecasting an Obama victory were just cooking the numbers. And when they insisted, in October 2012, that the

reported drop in the jobless rate was actually a Labor Department plot to cook the stats.

I know, I know. Obamacare comes with many caveats; its fine print has yet to be delineated. To borrow the immortal Donald Rumsfeld phrase, there are many unknown unknowns. We won't know for awhile how many of the signers have started paying premiums, or what percentage of young healthy people have enrolled, or whether large uninsured communities (such as Hispanics) can be persuaded to sign up, or whether insurance companies will hike their premiums (as they typically did, pre-Obamacare), or how the law's postponed provisions will work when they finally kick in.

And I will be shocked if the Republicans don't win big in the autumn midterm elections. Their votes (older white people) typically dominate the midterms, and this year they'll be highly motivated by hatred of Obamacare. President Obama's coalition (younger and racially diverse) isn't well attuned to the midterms, and even if they like Obamacare, their intensity level probably isn't sufficient to propel them to the polls en masse.

But even if Republicans take the Senate and agitate anew for repeal in 2015, they'll be forced to face political reality - not just Obama's veto power, but the virtually impossible task of stopping a train that has already left the station. Anyone who signs up for Obamacare is a voter who would resent Republican meddling; in politics, the most suicidal thing you can do is try to take away something that people have. And certainly by 2016, the Obamacare constituency will be in the tens of millions.

The process hasn't been smooth or pretty - as they say in football, it's "two yards and a cloud of dust" - but the health reform team continues to move the ball downfield despite carping from the sidelines.

Ross Douthat, the New York Times' conservative columnist, framed it best in his wake-up message to the haters. Obamacare, he said, "is taking place on a significant scale." For Republicans, the big political risk is that they "would end up stripping coverage from millions of newly-insured Americans...But wherever they go and whatever they do, they will have to deal with the reality that Obamacare, thrice-buried, looks very much alive."

Or they can just keep telling themselves that reality is merely a mirage. Sounds about right.

I'm not sure what bothers me more; that some folks just can't admit to having been wrong, or that some can't stand seeing something succeed, especially when that something actually helps people.

When President Obama's stimulus bill kicked in one year after his inauguration, the effect on job creation and economic recovery was immediate - as was the effect on those who'd fought so hard to kill it. All of a sudden, those responsible for the Great Recession in the first place were griping about the slowness of the recovery. Coming from the brink of a full-blown depression, the president was branded a failure for not having single-handedly restored full employment in a few months' time.

When it became clear that policies were working and recovery seemed assured, opponents of the president resolved to prevent it - trying to sabotage the whole thing with "fiscal cliffs" and debt ceiling deadlock. It risked plunging us back into recession, but if it did they'd be able to gloat they'd been right all along about this president presiding over a disastrous economy.

There are those who can't hide their disappointment when we avoid war - for whom diplomatic solutions seem some sort of failure. "Red lines" and ultimatums are simply preliminaries for military aggression; whether demanding Saddam Hussein account for weapons of mass destruction, or that Ukrainians stop mistreating ethnic Russians within their borders.

President Obama's "red line" against Syria was its use of chemical weapons against its people. When air strikes led by the U.S. and France appeared imminent, Syrian President Assad agreed to talk. As of last October, all declared facilities and equipment for producing chemical weapons had been destroyed. As of today, half the weapons themselves are gone - and the process continues under international supervision.

Sens. John McCain (R-AZ) and Lindsey Graham (R-SC) complained that our avoiding war against Syria will be regarded by others as "an act of provocative weakness".

As to Ukraine, columnist Greg Welborn and others seem miffed that, by focusing on working with European Union and NATO allies in putting political and economic pressure on Russia's President Putin, we're passing up a golden opportunity to re-start a global nuclear-arms race.

An item that doesn't seem to be getting much coverage is the fact that March 2014 marked the first month in over ten years in which there were no deaths of American troops engaged in combat. I'm sure there are those who see this as a sign we must be doing something wrong.

The big news was the announcement that first-year enrollments through exchanges under the Affordable Care Act surpassed the Congressional Budget Office's projection of 7 million - a projection made prior to the two

months of downtime following the rollout of the federal website. (The CBO had revised its projection down to 6 million earlier this year.) This is in addition to 4.5 million enrolled through states' expansion of Medicaid coverage, and 3 million young adults able to keep coverage under their parents' plans.

Millions of Americans getting real, affordable coverage - not the kind that excludes pre-existing conditions or ends once a "cap" in benefits is reached; free preventive care like mammograms and contraception; millions of seniors saving nearly \$10 billion in prescription drug costs - and some people can't stand it.

Years of warnings of the program's inevitable "train wreck" and "death spiral" proved baseless; tens of millions sunk on failed campaigns bankrolled by Koch-backed front groups to scare people away from even trying to enroll - What could be worse?

As Jonathan Chait writes in New York Magazine, "at its root the idea of Obamacare's collapse was tinged heavily all along with right-wing wish fulfillment". Those wishes die hard, so now it's the spin. Michael Hiltzik addressed some of the talking points in the L.A. Times:

First, there's the charge that many who've enrolled haven't paid. Most wouldn't see much reason to pay before receiving their first bill, anyway - while states have reported that between 85% and 90% have paid on time.

They claim that most enrollees were already insured. It's based on a survey that doesn't separate those who enrolled through the exchanges from those who did so with their current carriers. Kentucky reports 75% of exchange enrollees as previously uninsured; the figure out of New York is 92%.

They argue the ACA resulted in more cancellations than new enrollees. A Rand study puts the number of newly-uninsured at less than a million, while most cancellations involved moving into better policies.

We hear they're "cooking the books". The figures coming out of Washington reflect those states that refused to set up their own exchanges - not the better figures from states that did. As Hiltzik put it, "If the feds are cooking the books, they've cooked them to look worse, not better."

More insurance companies are seeking to join their states' exchanges this fall for the next round of enrollments, and more states are looking to get with the program and expand their Medicaid eligibility.

Thanks to the ACA, healthcare costs as a percentage of GDP have dropped for the first time in over fifteen years. CNN Money projects that over the next four years enrollments through the exchanges will increase to 25 million, and the number of uninsured Americans will drop from 45 million to 30 million.

Eighty years after enactment, there are still those decrying Social Security as a doomed "Ponzi scheme". Fifty years into the program, Rep. Paul Ryan (R-WI) wants to dump Medicare and instead give seniors a "voucher" and wish them luck in the private insurance market.

Decades from now, they'll still be railing against the ACA. And, they'll no more concede they were wrong in predicting its demise than they were in their predictions of Republican success in the 2014 midterms.

WHY CAN'T THEY GET GREG Welborn JOBS?

This has been a week rich with events worthy of commentary. Many of them are sad beyond comprehension and as of this writing just too close to warrant political commentary. I refer, of course, to the second attack on Fort Hood, so let me simply offer my prayers for recovery for those who were wounded and for peace for those who lost a loved one. I offer nothing for the shooter.

With that acknowledgement, let me address the topic I did choose. Admittedly, I did so because my son is directly affected: my very qualified and very motivated son (please pardon a father's pride) is having a tough time finding a job, or an internship, even a non-paying internship. Yes, he's willing to work hard for free and still can't find any takers. He is not alone, and so I want to address why they can't find jobs.

Let's move away from my son's anecdotal experience. Despite the recent White House press conference showcasing a beaming President claiming success in his signature legislation and pointing to signs visible only to him of a strong recovery, all is not well in the American job market. According to the Wall Street Journal, today, 57 months after the end of the great recession and 32 months after real GDP surpassed its previous high, fewer people have jobs than in December of 2007.

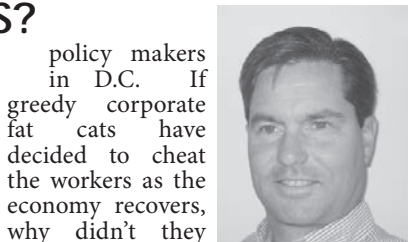
What employment recapture has occurred has not been at the same economic level as the jobs lost. In other words, a job lost at \$30,000 per year is not equal to a job regained at \$20,000. There's more to this than just the head count of who's employed, although there are still many millions of people who want jobs and can't find them.

One of the most telling statistics is that median household income now stands 4.4% lower than when the great recession ended. We need to let that sink in! The recession is over, economic growth has resumed, has surpassed where it was before the damn thing was broken, and yet, median income has continued to fall.

The President's defenders, and all those left of center, will point to the fact that corporate profits have risen to postwar highs while total compensation has fallen to its lowest level in 50+ years. Clearly, they say, Obama's policies have healed the economy; it's the greedy corporate profiteers who have chosen to not share the wealth. It's their fault people aren't being hired and that family income is down.

It's a soothing theory, but then any theory with a convenient scapegoat will ease the pain and deflect anger from where it rightly belongs - on

policy makers in D.C. If greedy corporate fat cats have decided to cheat the workers as the economy recovers, why didn't they do it earlier? Why wait til 2011, or 2012, or 2013 to fire the little guy? Why didn't they do it in 2007, or 2006 when the political fallout would have been less? This isn't a flippant question. If fat cats simply want to take more money, doesn't it stand to reason they would have done so during good times when the terminations would have received less scrutiny?



Perhaps, it's not unbridled greed or pure spite which motivates them. Perhaps the cost and uncertainty of employment has increased to the point where it is eminently logical to use technology instead of human labor to accomplish the job at hand.

Every one of us - white collar, blue collar, management or labor - is motivated to act in our own best interest. If a worker can do a job more economically than a machine, business owners will hire the worker. But if the government steps in and mandates an increase in the minimum wage - as Obama announced last week - above what the worker actually produces and/or above the level of what a machine costs to do the job, then the machine will get the job. That's not mean, spiteful or greedy. It's common sense.

Add to Obama's promise to use executive order to raise the minimum wage 39% the fact that Obamacare's health insurance tax is equivalent to the entire gross income of McDonalds Corporation, and it shouldn't be any wonder at all that businesses are very, very cautious about hiring more workers.

So, we return to my son, your children, and perhaps a few of you dads and moms also looking for jobs. It's not the employer's fault. My son would take an internship for free, but several firms have told him they're afraid of being sued for not paying the minimum wage. The reason Americans can't get jobs is because the wizard in the White House has made it too expensive to hire them. It's not greed on Wall Street; it's stupidity in Washington.

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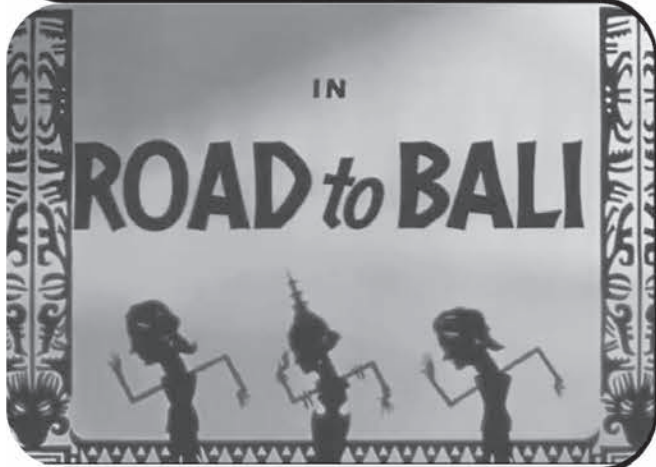

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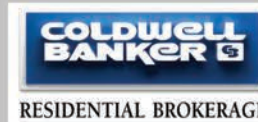
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
