With 293 provisional ballots remaining to be counted, it is clear that Gene Goss, and Rachelle Arizmendi will be sworn in as new council members at the city's reorganization meeting on April 22nd. Denise Delmar, who is leading the next candidate Noah Green by 109 votes in all likelihood was also be sworn in as the probability of the provisional votes changing the outcome is not very likely. On Measure UUT, the Utility Users Tax extension, the margin between Yes and No is considerably smaller. City Clerk Nancy Shollenberger announced that a manual count of one precinct will take place on April 14th and the final canvas on April 15th. The results will be certified at the April 22nd council meeting. *More on page 3*

Rose Bowl Considers Holding Music Festival

In an open letter to the community Thursday, City officials announced that the Rose Bowl Operating Company is exploring the idea of an annual music festival at the stadium—similar to the annual two-weekend, three-day Coachella music and arts festival held in the city of Indio California.

“While still in the conceptual phase, the vision for the festival includes top-quality musicians performing on multiple stages located inside the Rose Bowl Stadium and a portion of the Brookside Golf Course,” read the letter signed by both Pasadena Mayor Bill Bogaard and Councilmember and ROBC President Victor Gordo. “The festival may include food, art and cultural programming. Similar events have grown in popularity in recent years; each with their own unique elements and vibes.”

ROBC officials will bring the issue to the city council next month as an alternative to hosting an NFL team at the stadium.

A new music festival at the Rose Bowl could begin as soon as June 2015 according to the letter.

The city has had a similar event in June, Make Music Pasadena, since 2008. The free all-day, all-ages music celebration spans more than 20 city blocks and includes over 150 free concerts.

This year, Make Music Pasadena will be held Saturday, June 7, 11am-11pm.

FOOD CART PREPARATION FACILITY SHUT DOWN

Seven other food businesses also shut down for health violation since February 5, all have been reopened.

A push cart food staging center, along with a catering business and a Sushi restaurant were the latest establishments to have their health permits suspended, and ordered closed, for violations ranging from cockroaches, lack of hot water to the use of dangerous cleaning supplies.

According to city documents from the Environmental Health Division of the Pasadena Health Department, obtained by this newspaper, the Pasadena Street Vendors Association in the 2500 block of East Foothill Blvd was ordered shut down April 3 due to “an imminent health hazard.”

“The violations you are charged with include, vermin infestation,” the report reads. “Observed all life stages of cockroaches at the food prep/bar counter and equipment storage racks across the 2-compartment sink.”

The association was reopened Thursday after a hearing on Monday determined a licensed pest control company had eradicated the pests. An employee said the center services eight push cart venders.

The health department also provided food prep training including, no barehanded contact with food.

Perfect Equation Catering in the 2000 block of North Lincoln was also shut down March 25 during a routine inspection.

According to the report, Boric Acid powder was observed scattered throughout the kitchen area, “causing potential chemical contamination of food.”

Heath department officials also said the found several dead German cockroaches beneath shelves, and underneath the refrigeration units in the kitchen areas.

During a second inspection March 31 the business was found to be in compliance and allowed to reopen.

Sumiko Sushi and Vietnamese restaurant also had their license suspended March 25 for a long list of violations including, Inability to properly clean and sanitize, rodent droppings and allowing customers to walk

through the kitchen to access the restroom. The restaurant was also ordered to place a sign or notice advising raw and undercooked foods. Sumiko Sushi reopened April 2 after all the violations were corrected.

Since February 5, seven food businesses have been temporarily closed for violations, a list can be found

“What’s Going On?”
News and Views from Joan Schmidt



A little more than thirty years ago “Lenny” (Ellen Griffin Dunne) made a phone call to Marcella Nicholas Leach, “You don’t know me, but we have something terrible in common.”

A terrible injustice had happened to the Dunne family. Their daughter Dominique, a beautiful young actress was brutally murdered by her former boyfriend, John Sweeney. On two prior occasions, he tried to strangle her, so she broke up with him. Ultimately, he succeeded and November 4, 1982, Dominique died. The District Attorney tried Sweeney for 2nd Degree murder. The jury was not permitted to hear testimony of physical abuse from Sweeney’s previous girlfriend, so he was convicted of manslaughter and served three years in prison!

A year later, Marcella Nicholas Leach experienced the same tragedy. On November 30, 1983, her daughter, Marsalee Ann Nicholas was murdered by her ex-boyfriend who was stalking her. Marcella suffered the trauma of violent victimization by the criminal justice system. A week after the funeral, Marcella met the murderer coming out of the market. He had been released on \$50,000 bond and lived only two blocks from her. It would be almost two years before he went to trial.

This is why Justice for Homicide Victims Foundation (JHV) began. On April 6, JHV marked its 30th Anniversary by honoring its founders, Ellen Griffin Dunne (“Lenny”) and Marcella Nicholas Leach, recalling early days and paying tribute to the many victims whose posters were on display at Rose Hills Memorial Park in Whittier. The day was inspiring and brought hope to victims’ families, but at times heart-wrenching. Marcella was able to attend and welcomed attendees; Lenny passed away in 1997, but her two sons, Griffin and Alex were present.

Jane (whose parents had been murdered) and Bill Bouffard, current JHV Presidents traced the early history and read names of JHV members who had passed away.

Speaker LeeBertha Pickett-Allen spoke of her late son Ernie. Although there were many witnesses to his murder, no one would come forward. “When I met Marcella, I was grieving and crying. Then I met Lenny and we talked. We went to police and became involved. It took 14 years to bring justice for my son.”

LeeBertha mentioned other early JHV members Jack and Genelle Reilly, whose daughter Robin had been murdered and Doris Tate, mother of actress Sharon Tate, and their involvement. LeeBertha recalled that Lenny had several

fundraisers at her home and attendees included Jimmy and Gloria Stewart, Roddy Mc Dowell and Robert Wagner. Dennis and Donna Brown’s son Chris had been murdered and they felt great relief after his conviction. However in 10 years, there has been 11 appeals and the Browns are not on the notification list.

LeeBertha also told of Marcella’s son Dr. Henry T. Nicholas and his important role in the cause. He was the key backer and proponent of Marsy’s Law, California’s Victims’ Bill of Rights.

Keynote speaker, Griffin Dunne, son of Lenny and brother of slain Dominique gave an account of his sister’s horrendous death. At the time, his mom had MS, and great stress can escalate the illness. “But her spirit became stronger because of rage and love. The trial and justice system failed her; they made a mockery of Dominique’s death. ..This terrible injustice to my family...we reached out to Marcella Leach. My incredible mom went in her wheelchair. She was shy, but would go out and speak for any interview, to anyone who would listen.”

San Bernardino District Attorney Mike Ramos is also a great supporter of JHV. He feels “The Lady of Justice Scale has been tilted towards murders’ rights. Needs to be tilted more on victims’ side, needs to support victims. We get there by organizations such as JHV. Marsy’s Law has helped...sets the precedent for the entire country.”

Deputy D.A. Kathy Cady, an Honorary Board Member spoke of the fine work of JHV, who hold crime clinics for victims’ rights, restitution and unsolved murders. JHV collaborates, meets legislators and law enforcement members and recently received a Commendation from the L.A. County Board of Supervisors.

Jeannette Chavez, mother of slain Samantha Salas have become very involved and addressed the group. Her younger daughter Brittney read her poem, “Family Chains”. During the program, guitarist/singer Kevin Rose performed “Stairway to Heaven” and “Tears in Heaven”. Crystal hearts presented to Marcella Leach, and Lenny’s sons, Griffin and Alex. A most appreciative Marcella told us “JHV is the most outstanding non-profit group”. Teary-eyed she looked at board members with love and gratitude, “This would not be possible without you”. Chrystal gavels were presented to L.A. County Deputy D.A. Kathy Cady, Frank Girardot and San Bernardino County District Attorney Mike Ramos.

After the speakers, people sang, “We are the Survivors”. Doves and balloons were released, followed by the lighting of a candle in a beloved one’s memory. IN SEARCH OF REAL SURVIVAL

All of us who have devoted our lives to studying and applying skills of survival are well aware of the periodic events which beset us all: wars, droughts, floods, hurricanes, earthquakes, economic collapses, etc. Some are “acts of God,” and many are acts of man.

The practical skills of survival are direly needed by all of us. And yet, the media continues to serve up “reality” shows that provide little or no practical skills in our day to day living.

Shows like Survivor, Man vs. Wild, Survivorman, and their feral offspring can be amusing, but are designed more for entertainment value rather than providing anything of real value. These shows which often depict buff individuals in a wilderness setting often showcase the worst of human nature in order to keep us glued to our seats.

Though it amusing, and often nauseating, to see hungry men and women eating snakes, rats, and grubs, there seems to be little relevance to the millions of modern urban dwellers.

What then is real survival all about?

Our food-related survival skills necessitate our knowledge of urban food production, such as growing fruit trees, raising vegetables in limited space, raising chickens, making compost.

We need to educate ourselves to what foods have great nutritional value, and which do not. If we cannot grow at least some of our own food, we should support those farmers at local farmers markets who are providing local quality food.

Real survival in the modern world includes practical knowledge of economics. How can you get more for less money by spending less and earning more? You begin by separating need from want, and then you re-evaluate everything in your life that is touched by money. Ask yourself, “How can I obtain this thing, or service, or skill, without money?” Is it possible to trade or barter?

And then there is the ages-old good advice for how to soundly deal with material things: why buy new, if used will do? Don’t discard if it can be made into something else, etc.

Economic collapse of a country’s currency has happened many times, usually due to the over-extension of the leaders who controlled the purse strings, and who considered themselves more deserving than the general populace. A collapse of a country’s currency forces the people

to deal with stark, basic, everyday needs and concerns in a harsh manner until something new is developed.

While it is true that learning how to trap and eat a rat means you don’t have to worry about food from the store in the event of an economic collapse, it is far better to involve yourself in the practical and philosophical underpinnings of the society so that such a collapse doesn’t happen in the first place.

As our material abundance and technological advances continue, we become more and more dependent upon things which we cannot control. We’re fast on the path to a “Blade Runner” or “THX1138” world.

If you’re worried about our future, the answer does not lie with a loin-clothed man with a spear, since a thriving meaningful culture requires vastly more than that. Real survival must encompass a working knowledge of politics, economics, ecology, health, and so much more.

Our answers lie in making the time to educate ourselves to the things that really matter in life. For that matter, in today’s information-glutted world, it’s a real challenge to discern between useful and useless information, between entertainment and education, between that which leads us to freedom and that which merely titillates.

If we desire to be a part of the solution to the ills of modern civilization, then we must choose to not live our lives driven by fear and greed. Yes, real survival means that we must change ourselves first.

Sometimes, we have to realize that we’ve been hypnotized, and that we must fight our own ignorances. Real survival means that we must become like children again, and realize that there is no dishonor in going back to Square One. By reassessing everything that we think we know, and by asking questions anew, we may discover a new found joy in our very existence.

The pursuit of material survival is too often compassionless. We need compassion for each other if we want to have a society that is worth living in.

William Blake once summed up the essence of Real Survival when he stated, “I sought my soul, but my soul I could not see. I sought my God, but my God eluded me. I sought my brother, and I found all three.”

Burke, Ed.D., SCAQMD’s Governing Board Chairman. “In addition to taking advantage of this great offer, residents will also help better their community by eliminating air pollution from old gas mowers.”

In fact, an older gas-powered lawn mower can spew more pollution into the air in a single year than a car driven more than 22,000 miles.

Residents have the opportunity to register and choose from one of five Black & Decker and Greenstation battery electric models ranging from \$100 to \$250:

When the program ends this summer, SCAQMD will have scrapped more than 55,000 highly polluting gasoline mowers, removing almost 114 tons of smog-forming pollutants from the Southland’s air.

This year’s program is sponsored by the SCAQMD, in cooperation with the California Air Resources Board, Southern California Edison, Los Angeles Department of Water and Power, City of Anaheim, City of Pasadena, Long Beach City College, Bourns, Inc., UC Riverside, and Anaheim Public Utilities. The program is funded through SCAQMD’s Air Quality Investment Program (AQIP), which is financed by Southland companies that pay a fee in lieu of offering rideshare incentives as required by SCAQMD’s Rule 2202.

BECK, CHANDLER, TAY WIN ELECTION

From Arcadia's Best

after four previous unsuccessful lack of familiarity among voters

For the first time in years, Arcadia residents will have two first-time City Council Members starting new four-year terms on Tuesday, April 15 — Tom Beck and Sho Tay. Joining them to make up the trio of candidates elected Tuesday night is longtime Council Member and former Mayor Roger Chandler who returns after a mandatory two-year hiatus. The two losing candidates were Burton Brink with 46% of the vote (2,807 votes), and Paul Van Fleet with 463 votes (less than 8%).

Recently retired lawyer Beck, in his first campaign for any public office, was widely expected to win one of the three seats and probably one of the first two, but he surprised many by dominating every voting precinct in the city in Tuesday night's election results, accumulating nearly 64% (3,871) of the votes on the 6,085 ballots submitted. At his election night party at his large home in northern Arcadia, Beck attributed his victory to his wife's support and her involvement in Assistance League of Arcadia and other local organizations, and to Mayor Mickey Segal's decision not to run for re-election. Segal, who declared Beck a victor very early on when results showed Beck with more than 2,000 votes after only three of seven blocks of precincts reporting, steps down next Tuesday along with term-out Council Member Bob Harbicht. Segal and Harbicht were at Beck's house Tuesday night along with the only two current mid-term Council

Members who remain on the Council, Gary Kovacic and Mayor Pro Tem John Wu. Ironically, as much as Sho Tay campaigned on a platform of increasing voter turnout, the five-time candidate handily beat newcomer Burton Brink by eight percentage points (54% vs 46%) and by 468 votes despite one of the lowest turnouts ever for a City Council election. Tay,

campaigns, also wound up with only three fewer votes than veteran Chandler (3275 vs 3278) and garnered more votes than Chandler in three of the seven groups of voting precincts.

Only about 20% voted in the all-mail-in ballot election, with some voters observed turning in ballots in person at City Hall just 10-minutes before the 8 p.m. deadline despite having about a month to submit ballots. The lowest turnout in recent years was just 16% in 2008, an election that also involved Chandler when he and Kovacic were essentially the only two candidates running in a two-seat election that should not have been required except that a first-timer turned in an application minutes before the deadline and then never participated in the campaign.

At his election night party hosted by Kin Hui's Singpoli offices in Arcadia, Tay told media and supporters that he intends to follow through on his campaign pledges to work to unify the various cultures in town, to support and promote local businesses, and to find financial savings for the city and residents. He also thanked his wife Sherry Tay for her support over the many challenging campaigns. With a potential total of 18,255 (up to three votes per ballot), the total number of votes cast, 13,694, would seem to indicate that almost all voters cast only two votes each, or that as many as more than a third of all voters, or more than 2,000, employed the "bullet" voting strategy of voting for only one candidate while the other 3,500-plus voted for the maximum of three choices. Van Fleet said early in the campaign that he would spend virtually no money on his campaign and accept no donations, and he stuck to that, not even paying the nearly \$2,300 to include a photo and statement on the election ballot. That strategy combined with his

apparently resulted in his small number of votes. Hours after the election, he posted on his blog here at ArcadiasBest.com that he will run again in 2016.

But while his was a campaign of austerity, there was a general minimalist approach to the entire campaign coupled with a puzzling overall voter and community apathy for an election resulting in the most change on the Council in decades and with four of the five candidates all newcomers. Yet there was only a couple meet-the-candidates forums when there are usually five or six. The only time the campaign registered a blip on the radar screen was when Tay's campaign raised the eyebrows of some residents and the Arcadia police when several Tay supporters — male and female from student teens to retirement age Caucasian and Chinese-American volunteers — went door-to-door offering to provide free stamps to voters to encourage them to mail their sealed ballots. A handful of ballots were handed to campaign workers of all ages, genders, and race who offered to put them in a mailbox for the residents. When a few residents in northern Arcadia called police about the young male Chinese-American volunteers coming to their door, Arcadia police initiated citywide robo calls and text alerts and then conducted interviews with Tay and his campaign supporters. As the investigation was turned over to the District Attorney last week to determine whether any election laws were violated or any charges should be filed, Tay revised the get-out-the-vote initiative by making free stamps available to anyone to pick up at two local businesses. Now Tay will be sworn in as a City Council Member next Tuesday along with Beck and Chandler.

ANTONOVICH PUSHES FOR COUNTY SUPPORT OF FEDERAL LEGISLATION TO STEM HUMAN TRAFFICKING

LOS ANGELES COUNTY — Supervisor Michael D. Antonovich has introduced a motion to add Los Angeles County to the list of those supporting H.R. 3344 (Royce R-CA), the Fraudulent Overseas Recruitment and Trafficking Elimination (FORTE) Act of 2013.

“Los Angeles County is facing a growing epidemic in human trafficking - we must work with Federal and State leaders to address these issues and stem the widespread devastation it creates,” said Supervisor Antonovich. “This vital legislation ensures that the provision of foreign assistance does not contribute to human trafficking and will help combat the issue by requiring greater transparency in the recruitment of foreign workers.”

The requirements for foreign labor workers under the FORTE Act will help eliminate corrupt overseas recruitment and sex trafficking in foreign nations. In addition, the U.S. Department of State can utilize Certificates of Registration to maintain and make public any information regarding the identities of foreign labor contractors and their employers.

Antonovich's motion, which will be voted on during the Board's next meeting, directs the County's federal advocates to support H.R. 3344 and send a letter signed by all five Supervisors expressing their support to the Los Angeles County congressional delegation.

which also professed to be a kingdom filled with the charms of food and dance, Clearwater Café, but as so many others of that type, they danced their way into the darkness of the night.

Jack Wong burst on the Pasadena restaurant scene with the Wok N' Roll Sushi, on the north side of Colorado. It was instantly trendy, exciting, risk-taking and rewarding, exposing the palate, eyes and mind to an aesthetic and culinary adventure. That same formula has added some muscle and donned an Italian sign, Villa Sorriso. Just as the crowds that come here, I too have fallen under the night spell as their club emerges as a butterfly in the secret heart of the night as it bristles with an attractive energy that is sure to force a discovery of the newest dance step.

The pre-dance scene is a menu brimming with Italian classics, but creatively executed with a unique California twist. Chef Raul Mercado's menu showcases a field of land and ocean dishes: pizza,

pasta, steaks, fish, and a vast expression of salads. The prices for lunch seemed very reasonable, all in the (\$12 to \$15) range. Our friendly server, Kelsea, greeted us with homemade bread and cecca, which is a tomato, basil, garlic and olive oil mixture. I began my meal with the appetizer Crab Cakes (\$9), leading me to sense that I was in great hands. The crab cakes were not big enough for an entrée, but perfect for nibbling and chatting. As I raised the menu again, I overheard the couple next to me discussing their drive from Newport for the Cioppino. I was tempted to try it, but my stomach had other ideas, leading me to summon the Spicy Shrimp Linguini (\$15). Enough shrimp to start a small sea. My partner for this lunch was torn between a salad or a full Fish Salmon Lunch. Kelsea, quickly made this a win, win, suggesting we get both. "You can make salad with the grilled Salmon," she genially offered. Out of the mouths of babes comes the greatest wisdom. The plate leveled on our table with three nice portions of salmon and minutes later a disappearing act occurred as both our dishes were forked clean. In any restaurant business you often hear the expression location, location, location. But I say, food, food, food and - unbelievably - dance!! My compliments to Chef Raul, well crafted!!! Let's hope that this is one dance that never ends.

PEASANTRY AND PETS

A Personal, Positive Retrospective

When I was 4 ½ years old, I lived in Huntsville, Alabama with my 6 older siblings and my parents, who'd just experienced a spiritual epiphany that prompted them to make a major change in their lifestyle. My dad, who'd been working for Pratt & Whitney Aircraft as a tool & die maker for several years, suddenly decided to quit his job and go full time into a Christian children's outreach ministry. I have a handful of memories about what life was like in Florida, prior to that change, but my clearest memories of childhood are focused on what happened thereafter.

I was born in Florida in 1963, a year remembered by most Americans as the year President Kennedy was assassinated. Of course, I was not aware of what was going on at the time in our country, or anywhere else for that matter, but later in life it somehow became significant to me, to include as part of my "story", the fact that I was born the same year President Kennedy was assassinated.

Regardless of the political or social status that prevailed when I was a small child, one thing I can say for sure is that my family was poor in dollars, but incredibly rich in blessings. We were blessed with an enormous amount of love and spiritual nourishment on the home front. Kindness to others took top priority in any lecture that I may have had to endure from my parents. "What we have, is to be shared," still comes to mind as part of what they endeavored to teach me, and for that I am very grateful to this day.

My mom and dad also taught me how to get by with very little. Not to say that we suffered or went without, because amazingly enough, the miracles of provision that I witnessed through the faith of my parents is what has kept me believing in God after all these years. They were excellent examples of how one should live their life in faith; working hard and knowing that God will provide. Without their example, I often wonder if I would even be a believer today.

So, with all that "down home" childhood drama spilled like beans on the table, I am finally getting to the main point of this happy tale. In 1968 we were living in a duplex, located in a rural part of Huntsville, Alabama (Toll Gate Road, on Monte Sano Mountain, to be specific) that belonged to a family at our church. The center wall had been demolished, turning it into a single-family dwelling with space enough to accommodate

nine, leaving the center kitchen as the largest room in the house.

Now, I regress just to give you a little history about my folks. My mom and dad grew up in Worcester, Massachusetts during the depression. My dad left photography school to serve in the Navy on the USS Missouri during WWII. Meanwhile, my mother worked at her parents' restaurant while honing her skills singing and dancing on stage. Shortly after my dad returned home from the war, they met, married and stayed that way for 60+ years until they both passed away. Because of their own upbringing and life experiences, they had lots of valuable life lessons to share with us kids about gardening, building a home and practical ways to save money and feed a family while paying the bills. After all, God helps the man who helps himself, right?

So, in 1968, while we were living in that reformed duplex on the mountain, another church family offered us a couple of rabbits, one male and one female as a gift to our family. Knowing it would be an awesome experience for us kids to have the responsibility and benefits of owning pets, as well as a little extra cash we would gain from selling some of the rabbits, and the supplemental food they would eventually provide, my dad accepted their kind offer. He immediately went about building an enormous above-ground hutch for them to snuggle and nest in. As you can imagine, we kids were very excited when the rabbits arrived.

It didn't take long before we had our first brood of bunnies, and each of us got to pick one to be our very own pet. I remember selecting the runt of the litter for myself. He had a silky brown coat, so I named him Cocoa. As the momma and poppa rabbits continued to proliferate, we were able to sell several of the bunnies to our friends in the neighborhood at Easter time. I also remember my dad helping me tote a few of them to my second-grade classroom for show and tell. What a wonderful memory that is for me now!

Then, one day my dad came to us "little kids", as they used to call me and my sister, 2 ½ years my senior, and explained that some of the rabbits might have to give up their lives in order to provide food for the table. At first I didn't understand what he meant. I knew the chickens we kept in a coop in a separate area of the back yard were there to give us eggs, but the idea of a rabbit providing food made no sense to me whatsoever.

My father was very careful to perform the necessary task of slaughtering selected rabbits early in the morning, while everyone was sleeping, to prevent us from seeing what was going on. He knew we would notice some of them missing the next day, and would have to address the issue in another conversation to clarify why he had to do what he did to feed the family, but he didn't want us witnessing the act at such a young age. I remember asking my dad where the missing rabbits had gone, and that was the first time I finally understood that we needed to eat some of the rabbits as part of our means of survival. I cried hard for a long time when it hit me that the rabbit had to die for my sake. As I grew older, it became easier to accept the fact that some of those sweet bunny rabbits would have to sacrifice their lives to feed me and the rest of my family.

Although I don't eat rabbits today, I believe that my dad taught me a very valuable lesson by explaining how our food made its way to the table. Some kids are never told what goes on behind the grocery store counter... how some animals are sacrificed for human consumption. These days it is so easy to forget that nature and its creatures are indeed what feeds us. We go to the store and choose from an enormous selection of foods that have been prepared by other hands, and often don't give it a second thought.

After all, it is hard to think about how a steak is actually taken from a cow, or a pork loin is obtained from a pig. But I believe that carnivorous humans should have to witness the process at least once in their life, to earn the right to consume the meat they eat. The same goes for the vegetables we are blessed with. We should all have to experience the hard work that goes into planting and harvesting a garden that puts food on the table. It's a basic part of our survival, and until we appreciate it, we are missing out on a very important basic precept of life.

I hope we can all learn to value the foods we eat, particularly those who eat meat. Although I would like to see our society move away from eating animals, and having so much go to waste, I realize it is a very deeply rooted culturally accepted practice in our society. But, it is so very important for us to remember the sacrifices being made on our behalf. Show respect to all animals. Be humane in your life style by taking only what you need, and giving back what you can. Be grateful for what feeds you, and above all don't forget to love and let live!

MEDICAL ALERT DEVICES THAT CAN HELP KEEP SENIORS SAFE

Dear Savvy Senior:
I'm interested in getting my mother, who lives alone, a medical alert device with a wearable SOS button that she can push in case she falls or needs help. What kinds of devices can you recommend and how much do they cost? Searching Daughter

Dear Searching:

There's a wide variety of medical alert systems on the market today that can help keep elderly seniors safe, while living in their own home. Here's a breakdown of some different styles and prices to help you choose.

Monitored Alerts

The most popular medical alert systems available today are the ones that will connect your mom to a 24-hour emergency monitoring service when she needs help. These units come with waterproof "SOS" buttons – typically in the form of a necklace pendent or bracelet – and a base station that connects to her home phone line.

At the press of a button, your mom could call and talk to a trained operator through the system's base station receiver which works like a powerful speaker phone. The operator will find out what's wrong, and will notify family members, a neighbor, friend or emergency services as needed.

If you're interested in this type of alert, there are literally dozens of services to choose from. One of the most widely used is the Philips Lifeline Medical Alert Service (lifelinesys.com, 800-380-3111) which costs \$35 per month, plus an \$82 start-up fee. Phillips also offers a new Auto Alert option (for \$48 per month) that has fall detection sensors in the SOS button that can automatically summon help without your mom ever having to press a button.

Some other major players in the industry that are a little less expensive (under \$30 per month) include: LifeFone (lifefone.com, 877-849-8942), LifeStation (lifestation.com, 877-478-3390), Bay Alarm Medical (bayalarmmedical.com, 877-722-9633), Alert1 (alert-1.com, 888-919-3692), LifeGuardian (lifeguardianmedicalalarms.com, 800-378-2957) and MedicalAlert (medicalalert.com, 800-800-2537).

One other unique product worth consideration is the MediPendant (getmedipendant.com, 888-216-0039) which runs under \$35 a month. This system allows your mom to speak and listen to the operator directly through the SOS pendant, versus the base station speaker phone, which often makes for easier communication.

No-Fee Alerts

If you're looking for a cheaper option, consider a no-fee medical alert device that doesn't have professional monitoring services. These products, which also come with an "SOS" button and a home base station, are pre-programmed to dial personal contacts (relatives, friends, caregivers or 911) if the SOS button is pushed. Most devices store about four phone numbers, and the system dials each number, one-by-one until a connection is made.

If you like this style, the Freedom Alert made by LogicMark (logicmark.com, 800-519-2419) is a good product that allows you to speak through the pendent. The purchase price: \$300, with no ongoing monthly fees. Also check out Telemergency (telemergencysystems.com, 888-558-7420), which offers a variety on no-fee medical alert devices that cost under \$190.

Mobile Alerts


If your mom is interested in a device that works outside the home too, there are several mobile products that will let her call for help anywhere. These pendent-style devices, which fit in the palm of your hand, work like little cell phones with GPS tracking capabilities.

To call for help, your mom would simply push one button, and an operator from the device's emergency monitoring service would be on the line to assist her. And because of the GPS technology they would know her exact location, which is critical in emergency situations.

Top products to check out in this category include the new 5Star Urgent Response sold by GreatCall (greatcall.com, 800-733-6632) for \$50 plus a \$35 activation fee and \$15 monthly service fees, and MobileHelp (mobilehelpnow.com, 800-800-1710) which runs between \$37 and \$42 per month.

You also need to know that Medicare and most other insurance plans don't cover medical alert systems, although in some states Medicaid will if your mom receives Medicaid-funded homecare services.

FYI - TIPS FOR SENIORS TO STAY SAFER ONLINE

Never trust a link sent to you by someone you don't know. By clicking the link you may be taken to a site that may look like your bank or credit card company, but isn't. One thing a criminal can't fake is the actual Web site address of a company or bank. Instead of clicking a link in an e-mail, search for the Web address using a search engine to find the real one. Use that to ask the company about the message you received, or call using the number listed on your statements. Mark the real site as a favorite in your browser so that one click brings you there safely every time.

Never trust an e-mail that asks for your personal or account information (called a phishing scam). These usually seem convincing (the shabby ones have spelling errors, but the high quality scams look impeccable). No bank or reputable company is going to send you an e-mail asking you to correct your information, validate your identity, re-enter your password, and so on.

The smarter scams often contain text warning you against fraud. They do this because many people believe that an e-mail that warns them to be careful must be legitimate. That is not always true. This also extends to sites that claim they have protections in place for your privacy and security. Anybody can make these claims, but only certain sites protect you.

Never respond – or even open an e-mail with a deal that is too good to be true unless it is from a company that you know well and expect to get these kinds of offers from them. Scammers want you to react without taking time to think things through, so their e-mails frequently sound urgent, such as:

...“if we don't hear by tomorrow your account will be closed” (and you'll notice that the date of “tomorrow” never is listed).

...“this offer won't last, order now to ensure”...


Never believe that someone you don't know is going to give you money. Do not believe a person from another country who just needs you to “help transfer funds” and they need your bank account number to do so. Such scammers promise to give you a huge amount of money for helping them out. The result is an empty bank account.

If you never entered a lottery, you did not win the lottery. Such scams ask you to provide your information and bank account number so they can transfer your prize money. Don't. The result is an empty bank account.

Don't believe a really rich, famous person just wants to help you out... and that the celebrity also mysteriously needs your address, phone number, bank account information to do so. The result is an empty bank account.

Guard your information well. It is better to be rude than to be ripped off, so demand validation, verification, and authentication before giving your information to anyone. If you still feel uneasy, say no or check further.

OCEAN FOUND INSIDE SATURN MOON

NASA's Cassini spacecraft and the Deep Space Network have uncovered evidence that Saturn's moon Enceladus harbors a large underground ocean of liquid water, furthering scientific interest in that moon as a potential home to extraterrestrial microbes.

Researchers theorized the presence of an interior reservoir of water in 2005 when Cassini discovered water vapor and ice spewing from vents near the moon's south pole. The new data provide the first geophysical measurements of the internal structure of Enceladus, consistent with the existence of a hidden ocean.

"The way we deduce gravity variations is a concept in physics called the Doppler effect, the same principle used with a speed-measuring radar gun," said Sami Asmar of NASA's Jet Propulsion Laboratory in Pasadena, Calif., a coauthor of the paper. "As the spacecraft flies by Enceladus, its velocity is perturbed by an amount that depends on variations in the gravity field that we're trying to measure. We see the change in velocity as a change in radio frequency, received at our ground stations here all the way across the solar system."

The gravity measurements suggest a large, possibly regional, ocean about 6 miles deep, beneath an ice shell about 19 to 25 miles thick. The subsurface ocean evidence points to Enceladus as one of the most likely places in our solar system to host microbial life.

"Material from Enceladus' south polar jets contains salty water and organic molecules, the basic chemical ingredients for life," said Linda Spilker, Cassini's project scientist at JPL. "Their discovery expanded our view of the 'habitable zone' within our solar system and in planetary systems of other stars. This new validation that an ocean of water underlies the jets furthers understanding about this intriguing environment."

LUNAR ECLIPSE AND MARS CLOSEST APPROACH APRIL 14

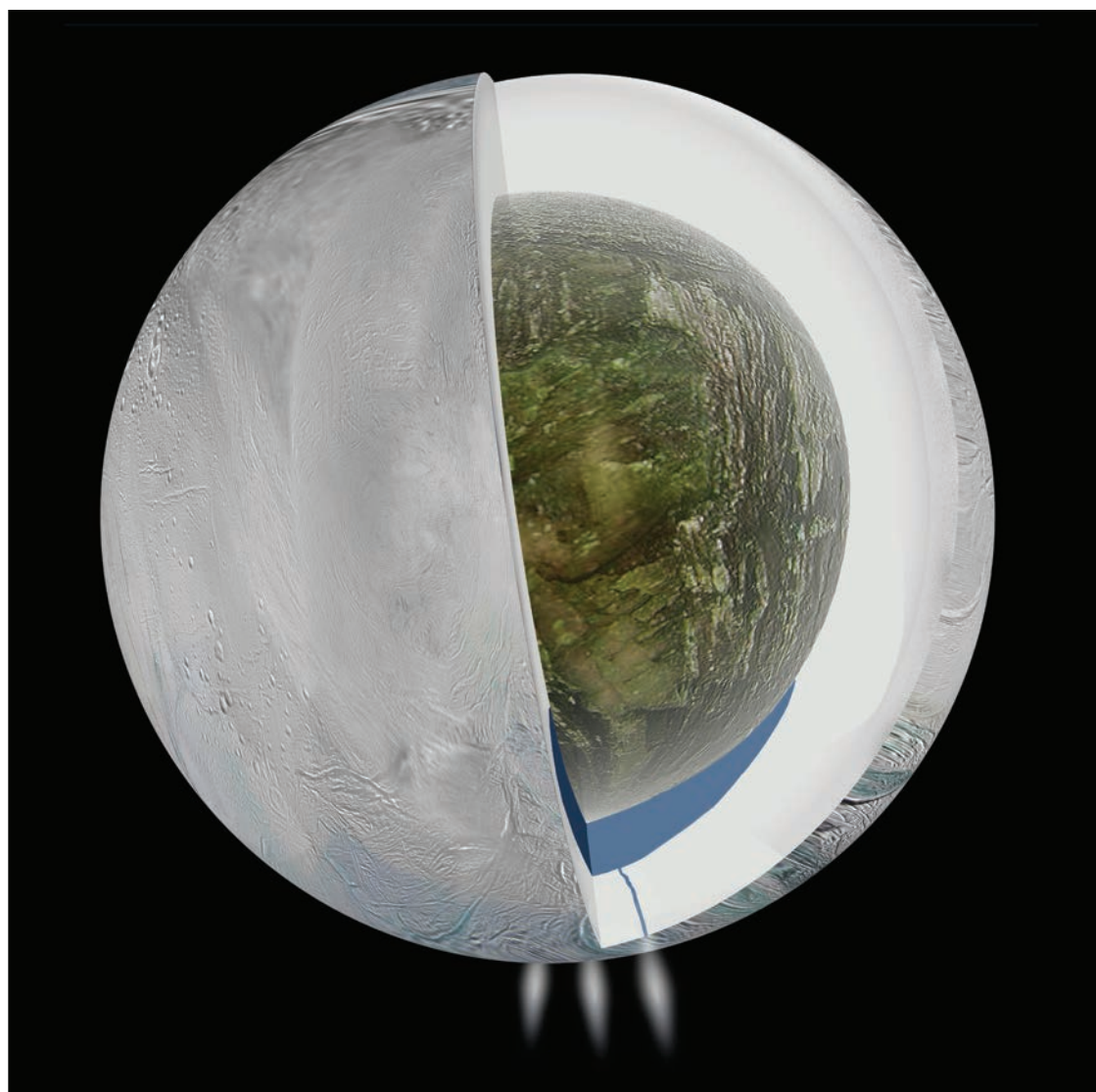
On the night of April 14th, two significant and spectacular events will take place simultaneously, as Mars reaches its closest point to Earth while the Moon will be totally eclipsed. This particular lunar eclipse is expected to draw unusual interest because it will be visible from the entire United States, and also because the reddish eclipsed Moon will float very near the striking blue star Spica, as well as hovering to the left of orange Mars. Altogether, the eclipse will be part of a dramatic sky-spectacle.

To viewers in Los Angeles, the eclipse will begin at 9:53 p.m., when the left-hand side of the Moon begins to enter the penumbra, or partial shadow, of the Earth. At 10:58 p.m., it will start to enter the umbra, or full shadow. At 12:06 a.m., it will be fully covered by the umbra. 12:45 a.m. is the time of greatest eclipse, and by 1:24 a.m. the Moon will have moved completely out of the umbra on its way to being completely free from shadow by 3:37 a.m. All times are in Pacific Daylight Time.

By coincidence, during the eclipse Mars will be making its closest approach to Earth in over four years. Mars orbits the Sun at a speed of 15 miles per second—very similar to Earth's 18.5 miles per second. The similarity means that after the two orbits align, it takes fully 26 months for them to meet again.

For those wishing to watch these events online, the Slooh Observatory will present them in real time starting with coverage of Mars at 7 pm PDT from Slooh's telescopes off the west coast of Africa in the Canary Islands and transitioning to coverage of the total lunar eclipse starting at 11 pm PDT. Viewers can watch on Slooh.com or by downloading the Slooh iPad app. Viewers can ask questions during the show by using hashtag #Slooh.

LAW AND DISORDER: THE JERRY ORBACH ESTATE BATTLE

Jerry Orbach, who starred as Detective Lennie Briscoe in the popular “Law and Order” television series, died a decade ago, but a battle is brewing over his Chase bank account.

The Chase bank account in dispute belongs to Orbach’s Mingoya Productions company, and is currently under the control of the actor’s former accountant, Patricia M. Black. Orbach added Black as a signatory to the company’s account a year before he died in 2004.

Black also served as executor of the estate of Orbach’s wife Elaine, who inherited his entire estate and who died in 2009. After Elaine died, her sister, Rita Hubbard, replaced Black as executor. Hubbard contacted Chase to inform them of the change in executor and request that Black be cut off from access to the account.

Chase says that Black has not responded to its many phone calls and letters, and is unwilling to turn the account over to Hubbard because it is unsure who the rightful owner of the account is since it has no proof that Elaine was ever a co-owner of Mingoya Productions.

Hubbard’s attorney says that Elaine’s estate is the sole owner of Mingoya Productions, and is therefore the rightful owner of the account.

A lawsuit has been filed in Manhattan to resolve the dispute.

It was already in place. We also had immediate access to that water (albeit yellow), and Joe is still the subject of unjust attacks.

The point is, that demonstrates how our city council and government should work. Their focus has got to be to find what's in the best interest of the entire community. Not just a particular segment of the community, and not out of fear of being attacked on the internet or in the media.

The concern Greg Welborn expressed in his column last week is one shared by

me and millions of other dads - the condition of the job market as our sons head off into it. Greg offered a few reasons why he thinks it's so bad.

One he missed is that while we were losing and then struggling to regain private-sector jobs, state and local governments, especially those under Republican control, were massively laying off public employees. That only makes a recession worse, and sabotages a recovery.

As of last month, we've regained all the private-sector jobs lost during the Great Recession, while adding an extra hundred thousand. But we're still short by 550,000 jobs lost in the public sector - and there are 2.8 million more Americans in the job market now than there were in January 2008. This means three job-seekers for every opening.

In an economy that's 70% consumer-driven, if companies don't have customers with spending money, they won't be hiring at any wage or salary; no matter the training, skills, work ethic or fathers-with-connections-to-publishers-of-local-newspapers the job-seeker might have.

An experience I've never had (I don't know about Greg) is that of a father with a daughter entering the job market. Recent events relating to past, present and future brought the subject of women in the workforce to mind.

I was reminded of the past with the release of a new documentary on Anita Hill, the law professor whom her former employer, Supreme Court Justice Clarence Thomas, referred to as his "most traitorous adversary".

"Can you believe it was just 22 years ago? It's like 'Mad Men'!" Hill said in a recent interview. The problem was not men committing sexual harassment in the workplace, but women who wouldn't stay silent about it.

Hill says many of her students at Brandeis University don't know who she is, and a lot of us have forgotten the basics; about how what she'd thought to be a confidential statement to investigators vetting the nomination of Thomas was leaked, followed by women in Congress urging her to publicly testify, and then how she, not Thomas, became the one vilified.

I remember Sen. Alan Simpson (R-WY) up on the panel ridiculing "this sexual harassment crap", patting the sides of his suit jacket claiming his pockets were full of notes saying, "Watch out for this woman!". I remember hearing of the women waiting outside to corroborate Hill's testimony and offer their own accounts of Thomas' behavior - but how there wasn't time; they had to get Thomas' confirmation over and done with.

Hill says testifying was bad enough, but not as much as dealing with those trying to get her fired, getting her friends fired, and the death threats after returning to her job at the University of Oklahoma.

It was only two years ago that House

Republicans refused to allow Sandra Fluke, then a Georgetown Law student (now active supporting victims of domestic abuse and child trafficking), from testifying against allowing employers to dictate preventive healthcare options to the women who work for them.

She spoke out anyway, so Rush Limbaugh went nation-wide declaring, "She's having so much sex she can't afford the contraception. She wants you and me and the taxpayers to pay her to have sex."

The first bill signed into law by President Obama was the Lilly Ledbetter Fair Pay Act. Ledbetter had filed a pay discrimination complaint, but court rulings were mixed. The 5-4 conservative majority on the Supreme Court decided the issue: though Ledbetter had just become aware of the gender discrimination by comparing paychecks, the pay rates had been set some time before. Ledbetter had a six-month window to file her lawsuit from the time the pay policy was established, not when she became aware of it - and she missed the deadline.

The new law fixed that. Now, it's six months to file from the time the discrimination is discovered - regardless of how long it'd been going on. Republicans complained it was all about more opportunities for "frivolous lawsuits".

Today, women still make on average 77% of what a man makes. According to the American Association of University Women, for women fresh out of college, with background, skills, education level all being equal, there's still an 8-9% gender gap - and it widens during the course of a career.

This past week, President Obama signed an executive order instructing the Labor Department to draft rules requiring federal contractors to report wage data tied to gender and race. Another, following up on the Ledbetter Act, prohibits them from retaliating against employees who share pay information with each other.

There was a move to expand this protection nation-wide with the Paycheck Fairness Act. Senate Republicans blocked it from even coming to the floor for debate.

Looking to the future, I was heartened to read about Olivia McConnell, an eight-year-old in South Carolina who was intrigued by the fact that one of the earliest fossil discoveries in North America was woolly mammoth teeth dug up by slaves on a South Carolina plantation in 1725. She learned hers was one of seven states without an official state fossil (ours is the saber-tooth cat), and wrote to state legislatures proposing the honor go to the Columbian Mammoth, "because fossils tell us about our past."

She made progress, until a Republican state legislator objected for "religious reasons", one proposed adding passages from Genesis on "Biblical creation", and the Republican lieutenant governor proposed language explaining the mammoth was "created on the Sixth Day with the beasts of the field." That pretty much killed it.

I predict a great future for third-grader Olivia and girls like her, in the sciences or whatever career they choose. As for the men who blocked her efforts, they should find a different line of work.

Admittedly, this title is an exaggeration, but only in order of magnitude not in principle. Last week's sacking of Mozilla CEO, Brendan Eich, should demonstrate without any possible confusion to all Americans - the danger facing this country from the Left.

The scurrilous libel, accepted as common wisdom, is that conservatives are the intolerant ones, the fascists, the ones who threaten the existence of the republic. Nothing could be further from the truth. Conservatives believe in freedom: freedom of speech, belief, the press and assembly. We also believe that products, services and companies should be judged on the basis of their consumer benefits, not on the personal, religious or political views of management or the owners. I would imagine that most leaders of Silicon Valley tech companies are liberal, yet I buy and use without reservation many software and cloud solutions they offer because they're good products and services. Steve Jobs was a genius; so is Steven Spielberg. Both are liberal, but I use Apple products and certainly enjoy Spielberg's movies.

This is what makes me, and other conservatives, different than liberals, who are indistinguishable today from leftists. Liberals don't just want to win the arguments on political and social issues. They make it personal and want to destroy the individuals and/or companies that dared to disagree with them in the first place.

As most readers know, Mozilla, the provider of the web browser, Firefox, forced the resignation of its CEO because he had contributed \$1,000 to the campaign for California's Proposition 8 which would have defined marriage as the union of one man and one woman. Mind you, this is a position which has been held by every major world religion over the last 2,000 years. It is a mainstream position - or at least it was.

The Left has decided that the stance on gay marriage is a litmus test, not just for determining political support - which I wholeheartedly believe they have a right to do - but for determining whether someone can hold any public office or even earn a living. Several judges have been forced to renounce their affiliation with the Boy Scouts. Boy Scout troops (which ban gay leaders) can't use public facilities, while Muslim groups (which tolerate honor killings) have never to my knowledge been denied use of a public meeting hall.

The hypocrisy is the most blatant I've ever seen. The Left preaches tolerance and of course claims for itself the

title of most-tolerant, even while demonstrating the opposite. "Tolerance" is encouraged, or on campuses demanded, in matters of sex, race, and economic status. But there is no tolerance of diversity of opinion. If you are woman, black or Hispanic who espouses conservative values, you are inauthentic (or a bitch, Uncle Tom, or a host of other words I shouldn't write). If you are a college student professing Christian faith, you're subject to discrimination and sometimes expulsion (please see the list of such occurrences at the end of the movie "God's Not Dead"). And now, if you are an employee who participates on the wrong side in elections, you can be deprived of a job.

The reality of this last statement may take many of you by surprise, but it is the most significant aspect of last week's events. Because Brendan Eich was an executive and probably is a member of the 1%, people forget he was also an employee. The Board of Directors employed him. He was their employee, whom they forced out for his political stance. That is the principle and the most important issue; the Left's hypocrisy is just theatre.

If an employee can be fired for supporting traditional marriage, then an employee can be fired for supporting anything: pro-life positions, gun ownership, or eventually for supporting any major religion which claims that only its adherents will enter Heaven. The principle is the important thing, not the specific circumstances.

The Left's tactics are destroying this country in two primary ways. First, they are eliminating our political freedoms. If you aren't allowed to earn a living because of your political beliefs, then you really have no political freedom. Second, they are pushing the country toward civil unrest. Our founders anticipated sharp divisions on important issues. In their wisdom, they provided a mechanism to resolve them politically - through open debate - so nobody would feel the need to reach for a gun. The process failed once, and we had a civil war. Since then, we've worked it out, but Leftism threatens the social contract. If debate is outlawed because holding the wrong position deprives you of a livelihood, we'll have less debate, but we'll have more civil unrest and perhaps eventually reach a breaking point. At that point, agree-with-me-or-die may not be an exaggeration.

Mrs. Hillcrist blackmails Hornblower with this news to stop him from building more factories and get back the land surrounding their estate. Mrs. Hillcrist promises that if Hornblower leaves them alone in the future, they will not reveal the awful secret about the Hornblower daughter-in-law. And it looks like this will work, and the terrible secret will be hidden from the Hornblower son and the rest of the town. Of course, a wise old man once said that a secret could only be kept between two people if one of them was dead. And this secret, known by so many now, will certainly find it's way to everyone involved, regardless of promises made. There will be death, revenge, hatred and sadness before these two families finish tearing each other apart. You will be hard pressed to find a more intriguing and exciting story of the lives and loves of small town England in 1931.

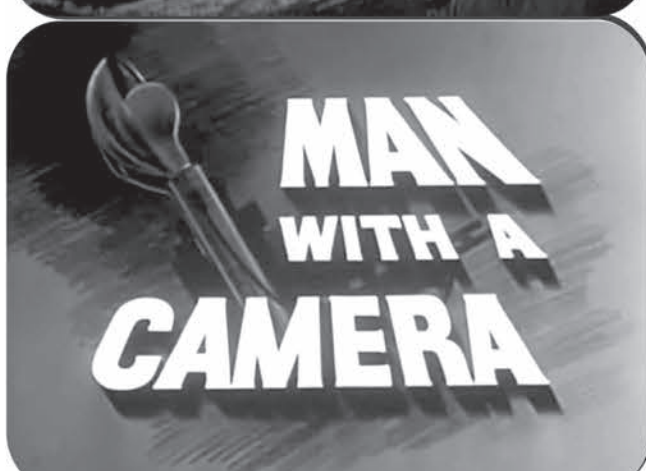
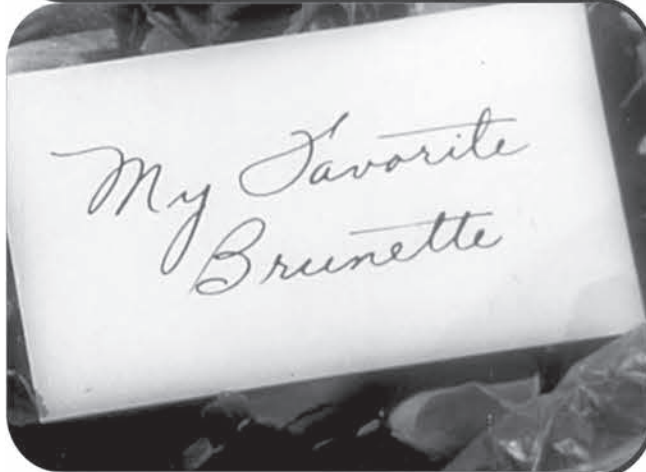
