One thing for sure, Matt Gallagher, his wife and two teenagers will not be sleeping at home in the house they've lived in since 2001 tonight, after fire swept through their home early this morning, leav-ing it uninhabitable for now, if not for good. Insurance investigators were at the site on West Laurel Ave. just west of Baldwin Ave., when I dropped by late this afternoon to see the Gallagher home, which caught fire shortly after nine. A neighbor reported that the fire department was there within minutes, and while they were able to put it out fairly quickly, the damage to the house is extensive. Mr. Gallagher didn't know if any of the house would be salvageable, noting that this had just happened hours ago and he was waiting to hear from the people who do this type of work for a living. "I don't do this every day," said Gallagher. Mr. Gallagher tells me that he heard some early

speculation that the fire may have been electrical in origin, but that Fire Marshal Rich Snyder is investigating, and he'll know more about how it started after the results of that investigation are completed. He said that he had been impressed that the insurance people had arranged for the house to be boarded up and protected from the weather within hours of the fire being extin-guished, and even had folks come by to gather clothing to get dry cleaned in an effort to salvage them before the smoke damage set in permanently.

He seemed to be in a pretty upbeat mood considering how his day was going. He told me "I've got great friends and neighbors, Sierra Madre rocks. Mr. Newsom from Sierra Madre School came by, and someone from St. Rita also dropped by and told us to let them know if there's any-thing they can do." We're glad to hear everyone is safe and no one was injured.

Yes, aloneness and peace almost every other day of the week except the Saturday of Memorial Day Weekend when the Mt. Wilson Trail Race is happening! This year, the 106th running of this grueling 8.6 mile race will feature more runners than ever before, including my very favorite race participants, the kids!

Former Trail Race winners Sharon Pevsner and Jill Liston have, for the second year in a row, hosted the Mt. Wilson Kids Training Camp. On April 16th and again on May 10th kids, ages three to eleven, stretched, exercised and ran laps around Sierra Vista Park in preparation for their race this Saturday.

The first kid's race will feature the older crowd, ages seven to twelve who will run all the way up to the top of Baldwin, make a quick water stop at the water station there, then dash all the way back to the starting line. In the second race, those ferociously competitive three to six year olds will make a fast break and go all the way to Highland and back. Each race participant will receive a shirt and a ribbon and it's all free! Kids just need to register Saturday morning. Sharon and Jill are expecting almost 250 junior racers this year.

The kids are so great to watch. Every year one or two of the littlest ones start the race crying but then that natural competitiveness kicks in, they start to run and, as none of them know what they're actually capable of, it's a delight to see some tiny little person get up and back in a breathtakingly short time. We love watching them, those huge shirts looking a lot like nightgowns, racing up the hill. Some of the parents run with their kids, frequently holding some tiny future Trail Race winner on the way up or down.

The bigger kids are much faster than you'd expect and they, too, are in it to win it. There will be many special volunteers available

to be sure that the bigger kids don't run right over the little ones. Dick Hoyt, who has pushed his wheelchair bound son, Rick, in many marathons will be heading up the volunteers for the kid's races. There will be one extremely special volunteer: Simon Cooper aka The Rabbit, who will run in front of the kids to get them started, possibly sporting ears and a fluffy tail. Talk about good sports!

Got to spend a few minutes with Sharon talking about her trip to the Boston Marathon a few weeks ago. You need to hunt her down and get her to tell you some of her stories, just so you can see the joy on her face. Sharon went to Boston and ran the marathon purely to join in solidarity with everyone there. She took pictures, encouraged runners, hugged folks who needed a hug, and mentioned a woman named Melanie from North Carolina who was back in Boston this year. Melanie was there last year, fifty feet from the finish line when the bomb went off. She was there on pre-race Saturday for a practice 5K but found she just couldn't bring herself to cross the finish line. Just couldn't. But she was able to finish the race and cross the finish line on Marathon Monday. She and Sharon are FaceBook friends now along with many others Sharon met in Boston last month.

This year eighty Sierra Madre residents will be competing in the Mt. Wilson Trail Race, some of whom have never run it before. This is great! Hopefully, it won't be too hot, runners will be safe and runners and spectators will thoroughly enjoy a wonderful community event. There will be some new bike rack fencing sort of things to help spectators stay safe and in the right place during the race. My own Mt. Wilson Trail hiker, the non-competing but highly supportive John, has reported glorious times hiking up to First Water to look out over the valley and appreciate the beauty of the Trail terrain. He highly recommends one Mt. Wilson Trail hike per week.

ARRESTED ON CHARGES
OF CHILD PORNOGRAPHY
RELEASED FROM JAIL



At press time, the Mountain Views News learned that Edward L. Sanchez, arrested Wednesday morning on child pornography charges was released on bail at 5:29 pm Friday.

The following statement was issued by SMPD Chief Larry Giannone immediately after the arrest:

"An early morning Search Warrant was served at a residence in the 400 Blk of Sturtevant Dr., in the City of Sierra Madre. The Sierra Madre Police Department and the Internet Crimes against Children (ICAC) Task Force were involved in the investigation. Edward L. Sanchez, 66, of Sierra Madre was taken into custody without incident at the location. Computers and other items were seized as evidence in the case.

Police Chief Larry Giannone said" this has been a lengthy investigation and is ongoing... we are urging anyone who has minor children that may have had personal contact with Mr. Sanchez to contact the Police Department".

Sanchez was booked at the Los Angeles County Jail for Penal Code Section 311 (a) Possession of Obscene Matter involving a minor and is being held on \$20,000 bail."

The investigation was conducted by the ICAC, a task force comprised of several law enforcement agencies including Homeland Security.

During the week of Sunday, May 11th, to Sunday May 18th, the Sierra Madre Police Department responded to approximately 340 calls for service.

Monday May 12th, 2014

At 1:30 pm, Sierra Madre Police responded to the 200 block of E. Alegria Avenue regarding a report of vandalism. Upon arrival, officers were informed by the victim and witness that the victim's vehicle had been keyed after an altercation. Further investigation uncovered that the suspect was the victim's ex. The suspect was later brought into the station for questioning regarding the incident. The case has been forwarded to the Detectives Bureau for further investigation.

Tuesday May 13th, 2014

At 4:37 pm, Sierra Madre Police responded to the 1900 block of Liliano Drive regarding an auto burglary. Upon arrival, the victim informed officers that her purse, containing several hundred dollars, was stolen from the passenger side floorboard. Further investigation proved the suspect was able to gain access by unlocking the car through a partially open window. At 6:15 pm, Sierra Madre Police responded to the 600 block of E. Sierra Madre Boulevard regarding an auto burglary reported by a passerby. Upon arrival, officers discovered the vehicle with a smashed left-passenger side window. Upon contacting the owner, they informed the officers that two bags were taken from the vehicle, estimating a total loss of approximately \$2,480. This case has been forwarded to the Detectives Bureau for further investigation.

Wednesday May 14th, 2014

At 10 am, Sierra Madre Police responded to the 400 block of N. Michillinda Avenue regarding an auto burglary. The victim informed officers that her front driver side window had been smashed and her purse which she had attempted to hide under a towel, had been stolen. The total loss was estimated to approximately \$1,300. The victim provided officers with a possible suspect description of a white male driving a white four door vehicle. This case has been forwarded to the Detectives Bureau for further investigation.

THE HISTORY OF MEMORIAL DAY

Three years after the Civil War ended, on May 5, 1868, the head of an organization of Union veterans — the Grand Army of the Republic (GAR) — established Decoration Day as a time for the nation to decorate the graves of the war dead with flowers. Maj. Gen. John A. Logan declared that Decoration Day should be observed on May 30. It is believed that date was chosen because flowers would be in bloom all over the country.

The first large observance was held that year at Arlington National Cemetery, across the Potomac River from Washington, D.C.

The ceremonies centered around the mourning-draped veranda of the Arlington mansion, once the home of Gen. Robert E. Lee. Various Washington officials, including Gen. and Mrs. Ulysses S. Grant, presided over the ceremonies. After speeches, children from the Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphan Home and members of the GAR made their way through the cemetery, strewing flowers on both Union and Confederate graves, reciting prayers and singing hymns.

Local Observances Claim To Be First Local springtime tributes to the Civil War dead already had been held in various places. One of the first occurred in Colum-bus, Miss., April 25, 1866, when a group of women visited a cemetery to decorate the graves of Confederate soldiers who had fallen in battle at Shiloh. Nearby were the graves of Union soldiers, neglected because they were the enemy. Disturbed at the sight of the bare graves, the women placed some of their flowers on those graves, as well.

Today, cities in the North and the South claim to be the birthplace of Memorial Day in 1866. Both Macon and Columbus, Ga., claim the title, as well as Richmond, Va. The village of Boalsburg, Pa., claims it began there two years earlier. A stone in a Carbondale, Ill., cemetery carries the statement that the first Decoration Day ceremony took place there on April 29, 1866. Carbondale was the wartime home of Gen. Logan. Approximately 25 places have been named in connection with the origin of Memorial Day, many of them in the South where most of the war dead were buried.

Official Birthplace Declared In 1966, Congress and President Lyndon Johnson declared Waterloo, N.Y., the "birthplace" of Memorial Day. There, a ceremony on May 5, 1866, honored local veterans who had fought in the Civil War. Businesses closed and residents flew flags at half-staff. Supporters of Waterloo's claim say earlier observances in other places were either informal, not community-wide or one-time events.

By the end of the 19th century, Memorial Day ceremonies were being held on May 30 throughout the nation. State legislatures passed proclamations designating the day, and the Army and Navy adopted regulations for proper observance at their facilities.

It was not until after World War I, however, that the day was expanded to honor those who have died in all American wars. In 1971, Memorial Day was declared a national holiday by an act of Congress, though it is still often called Decoration Day. It was then also placed on the last Monday in May, as were some other federal holidays.

Some States Have Confederate Observances Many Southern states also have their own days for honoring the Confederate dead. Mississippi celebrates Confederate Memorial Day on the last Monday of April, Alabama on the fourth Monday of April, and Georgia on

April 26. North and South Carolina observe it on May 10, Louisiana on June 3 and Tennessee calls that date Confederate Decoration Day. Texas celebrates Confederate Heroes Day January 19 and Virginia calls the last Monday in May Confederate Memorial Day.

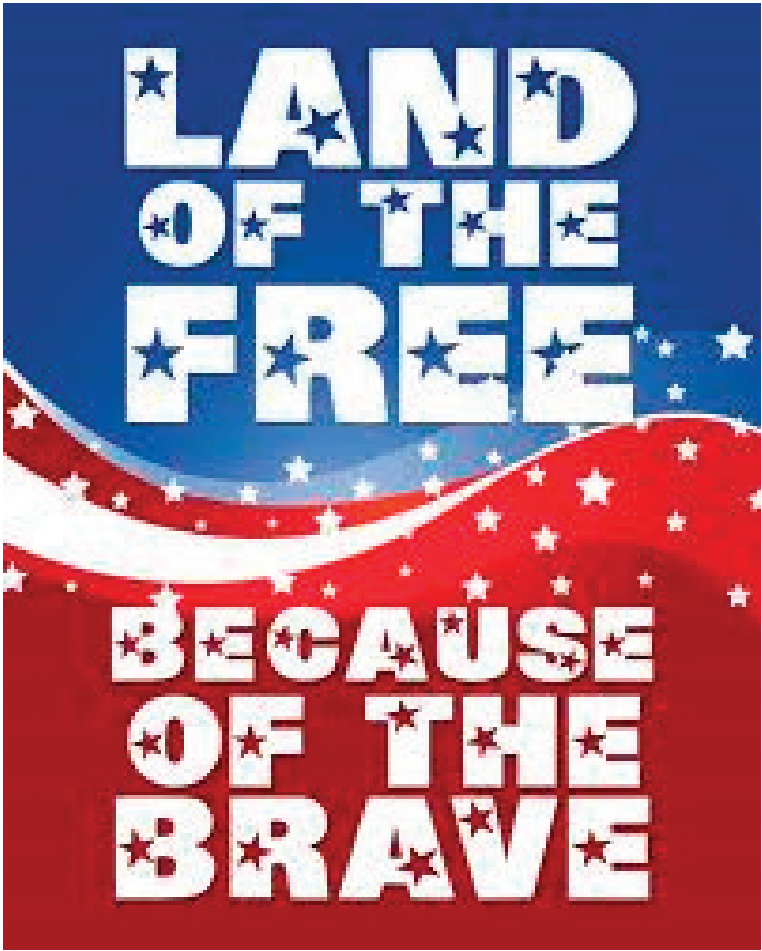
Gen. Logan's order for his posts to decorate graves in 1868 "with the choicest flowers of springtime" urged: "We should guard their graves with sacred vigilance. ... Let pleasant paths invite the coming and going of reverent visitors and fond mourners. Let no neglect, no ravages of time, testify to the present or to the coming generations that we have forgotten as a people the cost of a free and undivided republic."

The crowd attending the first Memorial Day ceremony at Arlington National Cemetery was approximately the same size as those that attend today's observance, about 5,000 people. Then, as now, small American flags were placed on each grave — a tradition followed at many national cemeteries today. In recent years, the custom has grown in many families to decorate the graves of all departed loved ones.

The origins of special services to honor those who die in war can be found in antiquity. The Athenian leader Pericles offered a tribute to the fallen heroes of the Peloponnesian War over 24 centuries ago that could be applied today to the 1.1 million Americans who have died in the nation's wars: "Not only are they commemorated by columns and inscriptions, but there dwells also an unwritten memorial of them, graven not on stone but in the hearts of men."

To ensure the sacrifices of America's fallen heroes are never forgotten, in December 2000, the U.S. Congress passed and the president signed into law "The National Moment of Remembrance Act," P.L. 106-579, creating the White House Commission on the National Moment of Remembrance. The commission's charter is to "encourage the people of the United States to give something back to their country, which provides them so much freedom and opportunity" by encouraging and coordinating commemorations in the United States of Memorial Day and the National Moment of Remembrance.

The National Moment of Remembrance encourages all Americans to pause wherever they are at 3 p.m. local time on Memorial Day for a minute of silence to re-member and honor those who have died in service to the nation. As Moment of Remembrance founder Carmella LaSpada states: "It's a way we can all help put the memorial back in Memorial Day."



JUST BEFORE MEMORIAL DAY, HOUSE PASSES REP. SCHIFF AMENDMENT URGING SECRETARY HAGEL TO PUT NAMES OF "LOST 74" ON VIETNAM WALL

74 Sailors on U.S.S. Frank E. Evans Died in Service in South China Sea During the Vietnam War Amendment Was Attached to Defense Authorization Legislation, Adopted Unanimously

Washington, DC – Today, Rep. Adam Schiff (D-Burbank) announced that on the eve of Memorial Day, the House of Representatives has passed an amendment to the annual defense authorization bill urging Department of Defense Secretary Chuck Hagel to add the names of 74 sailors lost on the U.S.S. Frank E. Evans during the Vietnam War to the Vietnam Wall.

On June 3, 1969, the USS Frank E. Evans was cut in half by an Australian aircraft carrier in the South China Sea – 74 American sailors lost their lives. The USS Frank E. Evans was participating in a joint South-east Asia Treaty Organization (SEATO) exercise called "Sea Spirit" in the South China Sea with more than 40 ships of SEATO nations, at the time of the collision with HMAS Melbourne. Despite operating in Vietnamese waters immediately before deployment to Exercise Sea Spirit, and being scheduled to return to activities supporting the war effort after the exercise, it was determined that since Exercise Sea Spirit took place outside the geographical limit for the combat zone the crew was ineligible for inclusion on the Vietnam Veterans Memorial.

While the U.S.S. Frank E. Evans was not in the combat zone as defined by Executive Order 11216, the ship was supporting the ongoing military conflict in Vietnam and the crew was instrumental in advancing American military objectives in Vietnam. Not to mention, the crew had participated in conflict just days before the collision. Vietnam veterans have long argued that inclusion on the monument should not be determined by geographic location, and exceptions to this rule have previously been made for service members killed as part of the conflict but not in Vietnam itself. For example, those involved in operations in Laos (Laos was later included in the combat zone) and those dying in transit to or from Vietnam have been made eligible for the memorial.

Since first being approached several years ago by a family of a sailor lost on the ship, Rep. Schiff has been pushing the Administration and successive Defense Secretaries to rectify this situation. After meeting with Rep. Schiff in Nov. 2010, Secretary of the Navy Mabus expressed his support for adding the 74 sailors to the Vietnam Veterans Memorial.

After the vote in the House, Schiff stated: "Hopefully today's vote puts us one step closer to the reality of seeing the names of the Lost 74 of the U.S.S. Frank E. Evans on the Vietnam Wall. They died serving our country during the Vietnam War and there is no reason for to deny these sailors their rightful place on the memorial."

The U.S.S. Frank E. Evans Association praised the amendment and urged the Secretary to act quickly.

"The tragic loss of the USS Frank E Evans on 3 June, 1969, continues to haunt the families and ship-mates of the 74 lost sailors who gave their lives for their country," said Tim Wendler, President of the Association. "I lost my father days before my second birthday, and my mom, became a much too young 21 year-old widow. This haunting continues because we, as a nation, have failed to adequately address an issue which could, once and for all, provide closure to the families, shipmates and survivors of this tragedy. We deeply appreciate the action of the House today, led by Congressman Adam Schiff, to remember our Lost 74 Heroes and begin the healing process."

The Vice President of the Association, Steve Kraus, stated: "I can't think how awful it must have felt in 1985 when the Box Family traveled to visit the Vietnam Memorial in Washington D.C.

to find their son, Thomas Belue Box was not on the Wall. Forty-five years later his name and the names of the other 73 lost are still not recognized for the greatest sacrifice one can give, their lives. Eunice Sage once told me all she ever wanted was 'Her Boys' to be added to the Vietnam Memorial Wall – she died never seeing that come true." Eunice Sage lost three sons, Gary, Greg, and Kelly Jo on USS Frank E. Evans.

William "Randy" Slaughter, a constituent of Schiff's in Glendale, stated: "I served on the aircraft carrier U.S.S. Kearsarge at the time of the incident and the Evans was one of our escort ships and we were close by when the accident happened. The cause for the fallen 74 has been close to my heart since that morning when the sun came up and I looked down from the Kearsarge flight deck at what I used to know as a proud American Navy destroyer. It's time to right a major wrong and get the names of the 74 on The Wall before any more of their families and the survivors and their families aren't with us anymore to witness it. We owe it to them."

Rep. Schiff has continued to keep close contact with the USS Frank E. Evans Association and has once again sought to right this injustice. This summer, Schiff wrote to Secretary of Defense Hagel to ask for a meeting so that he can make the case personally that the names of the Lost 74 sailors of the USS Frank E. Evans be added to the memorial – Hagel is a Vietnam veteran, himself – and Schiff has now met with Hagel, and is continuing to follow up. Schiff also wrote to Secretary Panetta.

Schiff's amendment to the defense authorization bill reads:

Whereas the Congress notes the continued popularity and importance of the Vietnam Veterans Memorial as a place of reflection and healing for a generation;

Whereas the simple inscriptions of the names of the Nation's dead bear mute testimony to the sacrifice of more than 58,000 Americans, serving as a deep source of comfort and pride for the families of those who were lost;

Whereas, 74 sailors were lost aboard the USS Frank E. Evans, which sank after colliding with the HMAS Melbourne on June 3, 1969 during a Southeast Asia Treaty Organization exercise just outside the designated combat zone;

Whereas the Frank Evans had been providing support fire for combat operations in Vietnam before the exercise that resulted in the accident and was scheduled to return after the exercise;

Whereas the families of the 74 men lost aboard the USS Frank E. Evans have been fighting for decades to have their loved ones added to the Memorial;

Whereas exceptions have been granted to inscribe the names on the Vietnam Veterans Memorial for other servicemembers who were killed outside of the designated combat zone, including in 1983 when President Ronald Reagan ordered that 68 Marines who died on a flight outside the combat zone be added to the wall;

Whereas Secretary of the Navy Ray Mabus, in a letter dated December 15, 2010, expressed support for the addition of the 74 names to the Vietnam Veterans Memorial;

Whereas heroism and sacrifice should never go unrecognized because of an arbitrary line on a map;

Now be it therefore resolved that it is the sense of Congress that the Secretary of Defense should order that the names of the 74 military personnel lost aboard the USS Frank E. Evans on June 3, 1969 be added to the Vietnam Veterans Memorial

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Real Estate Broker, Associate Charged with Fraud

A former Pasadena city council candidate and sitting member of the city's Northwest Commission along with a former Altadena licensed real estate salesperson, both, pled not guilty Wednesday after being charged with grand theft, recording false documents and perjury, stemming from a 2005 residential property purchase.

Police investigators alleged that employment, income and financial information, including a counterfeit bank statement submitted, by Eddie Turner, of Altadena with the assistance of Allen Shay, of Pasadena, to Countrywide Home Loans in 2005, and again in 2007, to purchase and refinance a residential property on Altadena Drive were false.

The total amount of the fraudulently obtained loans was a little over \$2.3 million.

Shay is also being charged with misrepresenting the source of a \$29,916 down payment which was deposited into escrow to obtain the loans.

Investigators said Turner filed a false identity theft report, to avoid foreclosure, with the Sheriff's Department claiming he did not take out the 2007 loans. He then filed a lawsuit under penalty of perjury against Bank of America, which had acquired Countrywide Home Loans.

While investigating Turner's identity theft claim, sheriff's detectives uncovered the fraud.

1963 Rose Parade Mural Finds New Home

Pasadena City College's Hutto-Patterson Gymnasium's East Entrance is the new home for the 1963 Millard Sheets mural, Tournament of Roses, 1890. The recently installed 75 foot mural was dedicated Thursday by Pasadena Mayor Bill Bogaard. In 2012, the mural was removed from display inside the former Home Savings on Colorado Boulevard.

Tony Sheets, who has essentially become the gatekeeper of his

father's art said, "I saw the piece when it was originally installed. Dad would be very pleased that there is so much respect for his work and that it is being reinstalled where people can see it."

The mural, which dates from 1963, consists of 20 oil painted panels on walnut veneer that reveal an historical narrative of the first Tournament of Rose Parade in Pasadena. The installation depicts the

earliest days of the parade and features images of participants in late 19th century attire in horse-drawn carriages and on horseback as they proceed along a backdrop of iconic Pasadena landmarks including City Hall, parade floats, and marching bands.

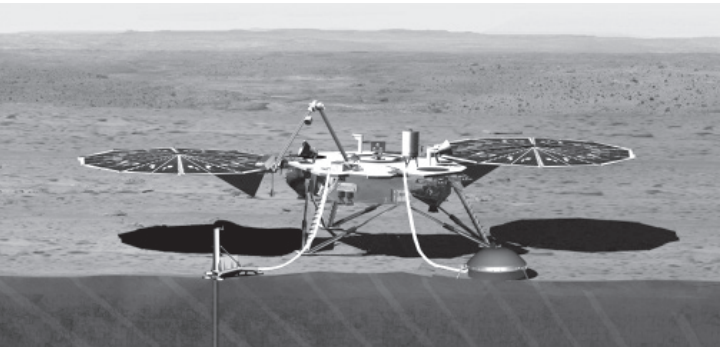

Construction to Begin on New Mars Lander 'InSight'



NASA and its international partners got the go-ahead to begin construction on a new Mars lander, after it completed a successful Mission Critical Design Review last week. The mission will help the agency's goal of sending a human mission to Mars in the 2030s.

NASA's Interior Exploration Using Seismic Investigations, Geodesy and Heat Transport (InSight) mission will pierce beneath the Martian surface to study its interior. The mission will investigate how Earth-like planets formed and developed their layered inner structure of core, mantle and crust, and will collect information about those interior zones using instruments never before used on Mars.

InSight will launch from Vandenberg Air Force Base in March 2016. This will be the first interplanetary mission ever to launch from California.

"Our partners across the globe have made significant progress in getting to this point and are fully prepared to deliver their hardware to system integration starting this November, which is the next major milestone for the project," said Tom Hoffman, InSight project manager of NASA's Jet Propulsion Laboratory,

California. "We now move from doing the design and analysis to building and testing the hardware and software that will get us to Mars and collect the science that we need to achieve mission success."

To investigate the planet's interior, the stationary lander will carry a robotic arm that will deploy surface and burrowing instruments.

"Mars actually offers an advantage over Earth itself for understanding how habitable planetary surfaces can form," said Bruce Banerdt, InSight principal investigator from JPL. "Both planets underwent the same early processes. But Mars, being smaller, cooled faster and became less active while Earth kept churning. So Mars better preserves the evidence about the early stages of rocky planets' development."

The three-legged lander will go to a site near the Martian equator and provide information for a planned mission length of about two years. InSight adapts a design from the successful NASA Phoenix Mars Lander, which examined ice and soil on far-northern Mars in 2008.

The last new recruit academy was in 2009 although through attrition, there was an immediate need to hire new recruits which included a very extensive written, psychological, physical, background and tiered interview process.



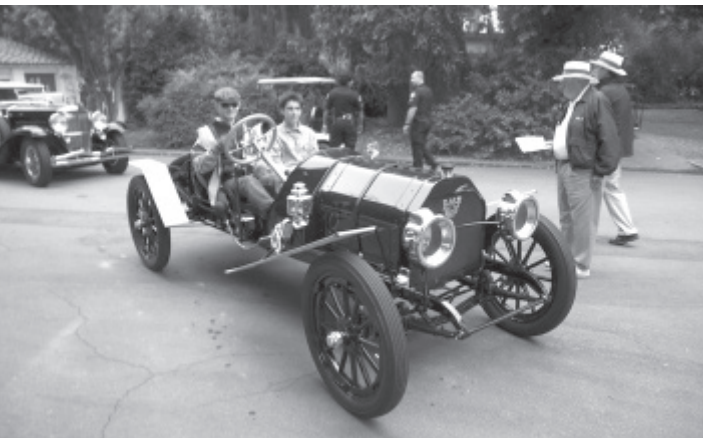

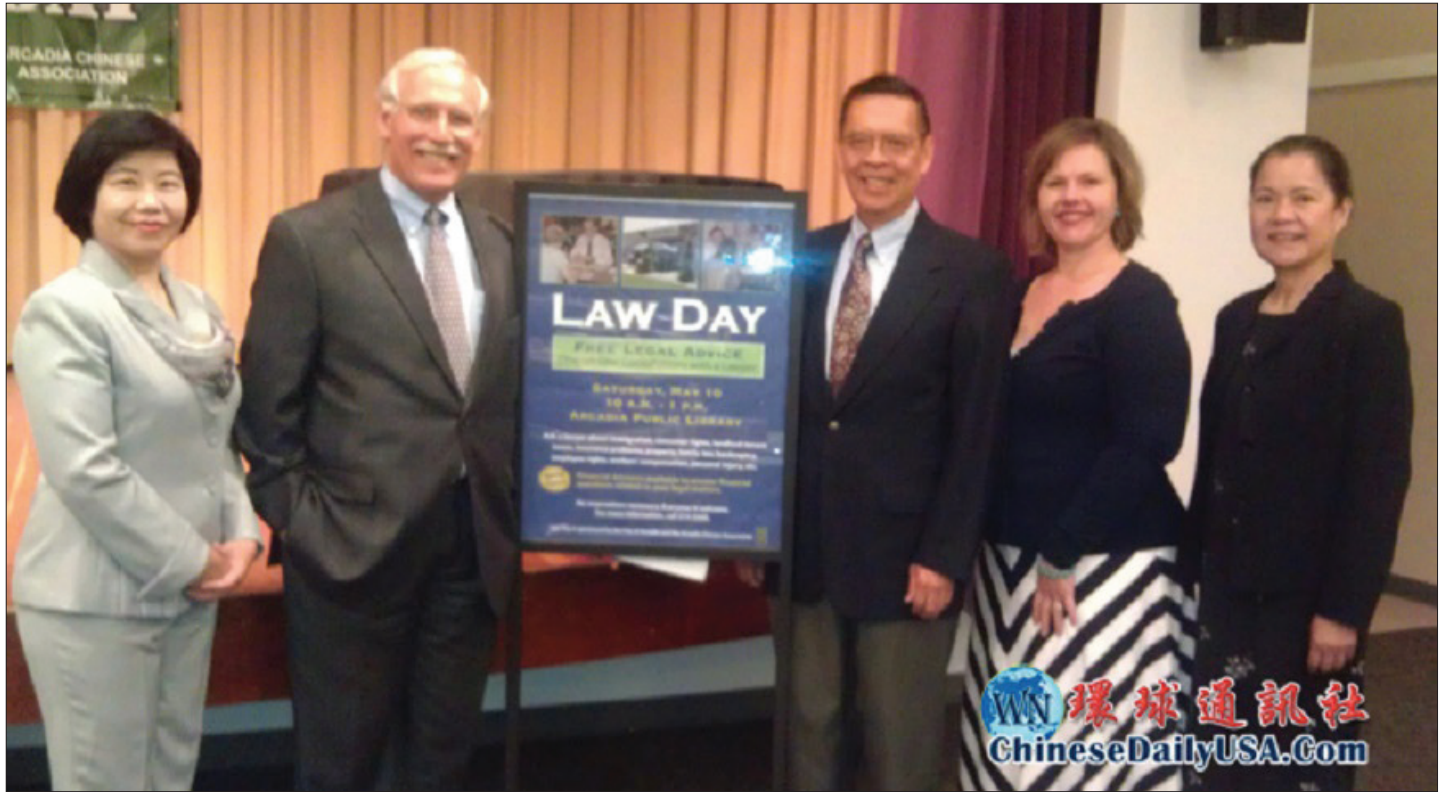
irrigation, lighting, ventilation, and electrical wiring run throughout. It appears there was possible utility theft since electricity used to power the grow had bypassed the electrical meter.

For five years he was the Artistic Director of the Los Angeles Bach Festival and for seventeen years he was Artistic Director of the Cambridge Singers in Pasadena. He frequently did Russian language coaching for, and occasionally sang with, the Los Angeles Master Chorale. He conducted numerous church choirs in the Los Angeles area, Wichita Falls, TX, and Detroit, MI, over his extensive career.

Alex Ruggieri was a man of talent, passion and presence. With a keen mind, a sincere and abiding love of great music, and a booming bass voice, he was an imposing figure that housed sharp wit and a kind heart. He was well-known in Southern California and well beyond, as his tenacity and deep knowledge of choral repertoire made him a sought-after conductor, coach and author. An award-winning composer, Alex was a man of many diverse passions, reading extensively and fostering interests in film, literature, science, history, sports and travel, as well as the performing arts.

Mr. Ruggieri passed away in July 2012, after a two-year battle with pancreatic cancer.

We honor his memory and his love of music with the Alexander Ruggieri Memorial Music Scholarship. This scholarship is given annually, that his legacy live on through the continued music education of young people.

THE MORAL OF THE PRICKLY, PRECARIOUS PORCUPINE

I recently received an e-mail from a good friend of mine, offering an interesting moral derivative about what might be considered a somewhat controversial survival technique employed by the prickly porcupine. When I read the e-mail I was immediately inspired to write about that curiously contentious, yet undeniably cute little creature.

The e-mailed story was entitled, "The Moral of the Porcupine" and it included a few photos of infant porcupines nestled in a human's hand. To me, the baby "porcs" in the pictures looked a lot like small bundled-up balls of fur with minute, mouse-like faces that you can't help falling in love with. As far as my memory serves me, I don't think I had ever seen a baby porcupine before, and I was amazed at how adorable the small ones really are.

The baby porcupine somehow reminds me of the woodlouse, which is a strangely pre-historic looking insect that most of us have seen crawling about in our yards and gardens. Very much like the woodlouse (more commonly known to lay-persons such as myself as a "rollie pollie"), baby porcupines know how to curl themselves up into a tight round ball as a means of protecting their soft and very vulnerable underbellies any time they sense the danger of a potential intruder.

Although the two have very little else in common, the porcupine and the oddly armored woodlouse termite do happen to share one particularly unique characteristic. They both have upper sides to their bodies that serve as an effective protective defense mechanism. The main difference is that the upper side of the woodlouse's body

is comprised of a hard shell, whereas the porcupine's upper side is designed more like a prickly bed of needle-like nails!

The basic gist of the "moral" given in the e-mail I received, is that while the long, pointy pokers on the upper side of the porcupine may serve as an important means of survival against a threatening predator, they also have the potential to prohibit vital bonding, by getting in the way when the infants simply want to snuggle with their siblings. Indeed, this is where the valuable lesson comes in to play. And, if it is interpreted, understood and applied properly, this is a lesson that can actually help lead to a longer, happier life for we simple-minded human beings.

The fond fable of the porcupine goes a little like this: It was the coldest winter ever, and many of the wild animals in that region had already died from exposure to the freezing temperatures. Realizing the situation, the thoughtful porcupines decided to group together to keep warm. It seemed like the logical thing to do, to share the warmth of each other's bodies and thereby survive through the cold winter. However, the closer the tiny porcs came together, the more their quills began to inflict wounds on the soft under flesh of the loved ones they were closest to.

After a while, the little porcupines decided to distance themselves from one another

to prevent the poking effect, and before long they each began to die alone and frozen like the other animals that had succumbed to the elements that season. Soon it became clear that they had to make a choice; either accept the painful pricks of their closest companions' quills, or die alone. Wisely, the young porcupines opted to stick close together and learn to live with the wounds caused by the quills of their siblings, in order to share the warmth and survive the chill.

And so, the moral of the story is that the best relationships in life are not necessarily those that bring together perfect people who do not chafe or "rub one another wrong", rather one must learn to live with the prickly, uncomfortable wounds that come with close relationships while learning to appreciate the good qualities of a companion and the warmth they share in order to survive and thrive in this world.

For what it's worth, this simple short but sweet story about the precarious porcupine comes with an enormous moral, and it had a huge impact on me, personally. I hope the moral of this story will be valued by others who hear it. Animals can teach us so many wonderful unique lessons in life. I say, let them be our teachers. May we humans learn to respect all living things, and may we learn to humble ourselves enough to love and let live!

"SQUATTER IN LOS ANGELES"

"Squatter in Los Angeles: Life on the Edge" is the true story of my year and a half as a squatter in the Highland Park district of Los Angeles. This book is not intended as a how-to guide, nor is it meant to encourage anyone to break any laws. It happens to be the true story of what I did during a very influential time in my life. I learned how to get more for less, and I realized – just like Thoreau at his pond in the woods – that we can live quite well and fulfilled if we attempt to differentiate our true needs from mere wants.

I share how I came to be a squatter, and some of the details of moving into an empty house. In the book I describe the concern of never knowing when someone would come up the driveway and tell me to get out (which never quite happened), and how I took the time to learn about gardening, permaculture, recycling of resources and water recycling.

It's true I had no rent to pay so I was able to devote more time to learning things. But I also had hardly any income, which made it clear to me why most people get regular jobs. But I was in my early 20s at the time, and still trying to figure things out.

"Squatter in Los Angeles" is about 100 pages on Kindle, and it's a fast moving story of the mixed experiences during this short period in my life: dealing with a ghost, a near-death experience, learning how to recycle everything, learning how to dowse, insights into sustainable gardening, an emergency toilet test, and also a rain dance in August with rain the next day. The book also includes a period of homelessness and how I dealt with it, and what I learned from it.

According to Dude McLean, author of "The Songwriters Survival Guide to Success,"

"Your story is filled with a lot of truth -- some might even be uncomfortable with it. All that means is you have touched them in a manner they never thought of in the past. Few authors make you think. They are writing to please others rather than being truthful to themselves. I think this is a very interesting and unique book. The book has a great lack of desperation. I feel it is a very positive outlook. Good job!"

The quality of the 2011 vintage is apparent in the wine’s density and strong regional expression of black cherry and blackberry fruit and soft tannins. INGREDIENTS

2 boneless, skinless chicken breasts (about 1 pound)
 Extra-virgin olive oil, for drizzling
 Kosher salt and freshly ground pepper
 3 tablespoons orange marmalade
 1 medium shallot, minced
 1 green apple, diced
 1 cup red seedless grapes, halved
 Juice of 1 lime
 1 cup low-fat Greek yogurt, mixed well
 1 tablespoon canola or peanut oil
 1 teaspoon brown mustard seeds or cumin seeds
 1 clove garlic, minced
 2 teaspoons curry powder
 2 tablespoons roasted salted cashews, chopped
 Fresh cilantro leaves, for sprinkling

DIRECTIONS

Preheat the oven to 425 degrees F. Line a baking sheet with foil. Put the chicken breasts on the foil and drizzle with olive oil. Sprinkle with salt and pepper and rub until coated. Pop the chicken in the oven and roast until a thermometer inserted into the thickest part registers 150 degrees F, 15 to 20 minutes.

Switch the oven to the broiler setting. Brush 1 tablespoon marmalade on each chicken breast. Broil, brushing occasionally with the pan drippings, until the chicken is cooked through and golden, about 5 minutes. Let cool.

Meanwhile, build the salad: Toss the shallot, apple, grapes, lime juice, yogurt, 1/2 teaspoon salt and the remaining 1 tablespoon marmalade in a large bowl.

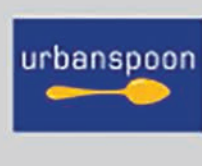
Heat the canola oil in a small skillet over medium heat until shimmering. Add the mustard seeds and garlic; cook until the seeds stop popping (cover if they’re popping out of the pan). Quickly add the curry powder; cook, stirring, 30 seconds, then pour the spiced oil over the yogurt mixture. Stir until combined.

Once the chicken breasts are cool, thinly slice them. Fold into the salad and adjust the salt and pepper. Top with the cashews and cilantro.

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Going upside down is what we call the “anti-aging” and “anti-depressant” secret of yoga. Going upside down changes your mood in seconds and leaves you with a smile, every time. You do not need to stand on your head. There are surprising techniques that can help you get all the benefits with out the fear or the strain on your neck. Going up side down or inversions, change the way the prana flows. It gets that vital life energy moving upward toward the head and it lifts the corners of the mouth and the corners of the eyes. It lifts your spirits and it’s great for the immune system. Yogis have been doing inversions for years. If you are in a bad mood and need an immediate change, go upside down. I never dreamed I would be able to do a hand stand. I could not do one when I was a kid. But I soon learned it’s possible and fun! Shoulder stand is easier, especially with a block under your low back. But you can just do what we call legs up the wall.

Sit right next to a wall, with your hip touching the wall. Roll onto your side keeping that hip at the wall, so you are in a tight little ball on your side with your bum at the wall. Then swing your legs up the wall and come onto your back. Close your eyes and slow your breath for 5, 10 or 20 minutes. Come out by rolling back onto your side and pressing to your hands and knees. ‘Legs up the wall’ pose is better than a nap. It will leave you feeling rejuvenated and fresh, not groggy like a nap. Everyone can do legs up the wall. It’s safe and relaxing. For other inversions you need the instructions of an experienced teacher. There are some medical conditions that are not good for going upside down. Be sure to tell your teacher if you have glaucoma or blood pressure issues.

Going upside down gives us a new perspective. You will love it. It can be scary to those of us that have never done it. You are never to old to try it and you will soon learn that it is natural and fun. Give ‘legs up the wall’ pose a try and let me know what you think. *Namasté, René*

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CHASE THE BLUES AWAY WITH GREENS

Frequent consumption of vegetables appears to cut one's odds of depression significantly. A recent review in a nutritional journal suggests that eating lots of fruits and vegetables “may present a noninvasive natural and inexpensive therapeutic means to support a healthy brain.”

To understand this research, we need to understand the underlying biology of depression. It is thought that depression may arise out of a chemical imbalance in the brain. In order for the billions of nerves in our brain to communicate with each other they need chemical signals called neurotransmitters. Nerve cells do not touch, there is a gap between them. When one nerve wants to communicate with another nerve they release a neurotransmitter into the gap. As soon as the first nerve has got its message across the gap it sucks the neurotransmitter back up to use again some other time. The nerves also produce substances that digest the neurotransmitters so just the correct amount is kept. If the levels of our neurotransmitter digesting substances is elevated, then our levels of neurotransmitters drops, and we become depressed.

So why then would fruits and vegetables improve our mood? They contain substances that can be inhibitors of depression. Spices, such as clove, oregano, cinnamon, and nutmeg, can also inhibit the substance

that digest neurotransmitters, but people don't eat enough to have an effect by themselves. There are special nutrients found in apples, berries, grapes, kale, onions, and green tea that may indeed affect our brain biology enough to improve our mood. It has been shown that those with superior mental health eat a lot of fruits and vegetables. And who doesn't want superior mental health.... eat up!

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HEALTH INSURANCE OPTIONS FOR EARLY RETIREES

Dear Savvy Senior:

At age 63, I will be retiring in a few months and need to find some health insurance coverage for my wife and me until Medicare kicks in. Is Obamacare my only option?

About to Retire

Dear About:

There are actually several places early (pre-Medicare) retirees can go to find health insurance coverage – Obamacare isn't the only game in town. Here are your options depending on your in-come and health care needs.

Government Marketplaces

If your yearly income falls below the 400 percent poverty level, the Obamacare insurance marketplace is probably your best option for getting health coverage because of the federal tax credits they offer, which will reduce the amount you'll have to pay for a policy.

To qualify for the tax credits, your household's modified adjusted gross income for 2013 must have been under \$45,960 for an individual, or \$62,040 for a couple. If your income will drop below the 400 percent poverty level in 2014 or 2015 because of your retirement, it may still make sense to buy coverage through the Obamacare marketplace, even if you don't qualify for the tax credits based on last year's income.

To help you see how much you can save, see the subsidy calculator on the Kaiser Family Foundation website at kff.org/interactive/subsidy-calculator.

To shop for marketplace plans in your state, visit Healthcare.gov or call their toll-free helpline at 800-318-2596.

Outside the Marketplace

If you aren't eligible for the government subsidy, or you want additional policy options to what Obamacare offers, you can also buy health coverage outside the government marketplaces directly through insurance companies, brokers or agents. This option is not available if you live in Washington D.C. or Vermont.

These policies do not offer the federal tax credits, but they are required to offer the same menu of essential benefits as Obamacare policies do, and they can't deny you coverage or charge extra for pre-existing health conditions. You might even find slightly lower premiums on outside policies, assuming that you don't qualify for the tax credits.

Another possible reason for shopping outside the marketplace is to find a plan that has your preferred doctors and hospitals in its network. Many plans offered in the Obamacare marketplaces provide a very limited number of health care providers.

To shop for these policies, contact insurance companies, brokers or agents and ask them if they offer policies that are not available through the government marketplaces.

To find a local broker or agent that sells insurance plans, check the National Association of Health Underwriters website (nahu.org) which has an online directory. But keep in mind that agents won't necessarily show you all available policies, just the ones from insurers they work with.

You can also look for these plans at insurance shopping sites like eHealthInsurance.com or GoHealth.com, which lists plans and providers that may not be listed on Healthcare.gov.

COBRA

If you only need health insurance coverage for a short period of time before becoming Medicare eligible, another option you may want to consider is COBRA. COBRA coverage allows you to remain on your former employer's group health plan for up to 18 months, but not every employer plan is COBRA eligible. Contact your employer benefits administrator to find out if yours is.

In most cases COBRA is expensive, requiring you to pay the full monthly premium yourself. But, if you've already met or nearly met your employer plan's deductible and/or out-of-pocket maximum for the year, and don't want to start over with a new plan; or if you find your employer's health plan to be better or more affordable than the government or off-marketplace options, it makes sense to keep your current coverage under COBRA.

CAL FIRE - Urging Caution for Memorial Day Weekend Severe Drought Leading to Higher Fire Threat

Sacramento - Memorial Day weekend is often considered to be the kick-off for summer vacations and outdoor activities, but CAL FIRE officials are asking the public to use caution as fire danger remains higher than normal. As the weekend approaches, temperatures are forecast to increase leading to a higher fire threat in California.

"We are asking the public to be extra vigilant and take steps to prevent sparking a wildfire," said Chief Ken Pimlott, CAL FIRE director. "All it takes is a single spark to start a fire and with the dry conditions caused by drought, we are seeing fires burn with unseasonable intensity."

Since the beginning of the year, wildfires have already caused major destruction. Most recently Southern California endured wildfires fanned by Santa Ana winds, burning nearly 27,000 acres and de-destroying dozens of homes. California is in the midst of a severe drought, creating conditions that are ripe for devastating and extremely dangerous wildfires. Everyone is encouraged to be vigilant and remember that one less spark is one less wildfire.

Camping:

- Obtain a campfire permit (www.PreventWildfireCA.org)
- Check for local fire restrictions
- Clear away grass, leaves and other debris within a 10-foot perimeter of any campfire
- Have a responsible person in attendance at all times
- Ensure all campfires are completely extinguished before leaving
- When barbecuing, never leave the grill unattended

Fire is not the only danger that can occur in the outdoors, as water drownings also increase dramatically during the holiday weekend. Warm temperatures make the cool waters of California's beautiful rivers and lakes very enticing, yet very dangerous. In recent weeks, CAL FIRE crews have responded to water rescues across the state, many of which have tragically led to fatalities.

In the Water:

- Always wear a life jacket!
- Children should always be supervised by a responsible adult
- Never swim alone
- Drinking and swimming is just as dangerous as drinking and driving.

Incumbent Judy Matthews is the only one running in CT 4603.01, as is new-comer Gloria Sanyika in CT4603.02, Jennifer Lee in 4612, and incumbent Diane Mar-cussen in CT 4613.

There are no candidates running in CT 4601 and 4611. Residents of those census tracts are encouraged to apply directly to the Town Council after the election to be considered for those seats.

Three polling locations for Election Day, June 7th and one pre-voting location on June 3rd were announced. Pre-voting will be from 4:00 to 7:00 pm, and Election Day voting will be from 9:00 am to 3:00 pm. Locations will be Gordys Garage- 843 W. Woodbury Road, Farnsworth Park- 568 E. Mount Curve Avenue, S&J Auto- 1904 New York Drive, and for the pre-vote on June 3rd, Altadena Community Center- 730 E. Altadena Drive.

SUPERVISOR ANTONOVICH BLASTS JUDGE'S ORDER TO RELEASE PILLOWCASE RAPIST -- UNCONSCIONABLE THREAT TO PUBLIC SAFETY

LOS ANGELES COUNTY — Supervisor Michael D. Antonovich said Judge Gilbert Brown's order to release Christopher Evans Hubbard, a violent, serial sex predator, to the Antelope Valley is "an unconscionable threat to public safety."

The Santa Clara Superior Court judge issued his order today granting the release of the "Pillowcase Rapist," on or before July 7, 2014. Pursuant to the order, he will reside at 20315 E. Ave R in an unincorporated area near Palmdale.

"Despite the best efforts by the Los Angeles County District Attorney Jackie Lacey, Judge Brown re-fused to order Hubbard to undergo a new mental health evaluation to determine his mental state prior to his release," said Antonovich. "His last mental health evaluation was fifteen months ago."

"The Judge's order failed to consider the objections by law enforcement as well as the grave concerns expressed by the community who sent thousands of opposition letters," he said. "It's outrageous that an admitted sexual predator with

a long history of brutal crimes against women be released in this community - or any community."

Hubbard is a violent sex predator believed to have raped as many as 40 women in a 10-year period. He has admitted to raping 26 women in the Los Angeles area in the early 1970's and an additional 15 women were raped in the San Francisco Bay area in the early 1980's. His parole was revoked numerous times due to assaulting women, his mental condition and his threat to public safety.

In 2012-13, approximately \$3.8 billion in financial aid was distributed to 319,000 CSU students—nearly 76 percent of the total student population. The rating system proposed by the White House is intended to provide prospective students and their families with information that will allow them to select higher education institutions that provide the best value. “Neighbors” features the same Seth Rogen you’ve seen in every comedy he’s ever been in. For most people, there is certainly nothing wrong about that, but the real draw for me is whom he surrounds himself with. In this case, Rogen is paired with Zac Efron and Rose Byrne, among a few other notable characters. The outrageously advertised comedy isn’t quite as daring and bold as I imagined, but kept my attention for its 96 minutes duration. It features some very funny moments, but never gets deeper than surface level. The film features Mac and Kelly Radner (Rogen and Byrne) as new parents and their lives are turned upside when a fraternity moves in next door to them. At first it seems all will be swell, but when Teddy (Efron), Pete (Dave Franco) and their band of brothers can’t keep the noise level down night after night, Rogen calls the cops, which eventually leads us to family vs. fraternity. “Neighbors” generally moves along in a brisk pace, but any longer I think the film would have completely lost steam. The raunchy humor isn’t anything new for R-rated comedies. Obligatory penis jokes and weed references are present, like in all of Rogen’s pictures. As far as comedies go, the film does deliver jokes, mostly hits than misses. However, as story purposes go, the script is paper thin, ultimately being a one-note film.

Rogen plays the same old character—chubby dude that scores a hot wife. We’ve come to expect that in this day and age with comedies. He’s fine in his role (coming from a script he didn’t write), which he isn’t going too overboard like he’s done in previous flicks. Byrne is great because she isn’t simply just Rogen’s wife but plays a vital role in the take down of the fraternity. Efron, who I can’t say I’m a fan of, does a pretty bang up job here. His character Teddy, who is the president of their fraternity, wants to be up on their wall of fame of sorts by throwing the craziest party in history. He’ll stop at nothing to make sure Mac and Kelly never interferes with his goal in mind. The other members of the brotherhood have small roles and none of them take away from Efron’s spotlight. His best buddy in the film, Pete, has the second most screen time, but he can’t surpass Efron. On the other side of the fence, Rogen’s co-worker Jimmy (Ike Barinholtz) is hilarious in his role. I often wished there was more of him because with the little time he had on screen compared to the rest of the crew, he came through each and every time. New writers Andrew J. Cohen and Brendan O’Brien wrote a very funny script, but they ran into some problems with the story. First of all, they tried to give Efron’s character a little more depth with a scene that depicts him not going to be ready for the real world when he finishes up college. They hinted at this side story as if he was going to change his tune about being remembered by his fraternity but he keeps along doing what he does best (partying and getting back at his neighbors).

“Neighbors” is still one of the better comedies in recent years since 2013 was void of many standouts. This summer still features two other R-rated comedies, “22nd Jump Street” and “Let’s Be Cops.” I liked “Neighbors” for what it was. It’s not a classic by any means and does get a little weary in its closing stages. It’s Efron’s best performance (which sadly isn’t saying all that much). Director Nicholas Stoller (“Forgetting Sarah Marshall,” “Get Him To The Greek,” “The Five-Year Engagement”) keeps things moving quickly and offers some really cool sequences usually not found in broad comedies. Overall, “Neighbors” gets a recommendation for me, but as I seem to grow older, the immaturity side of Rogen is wearing thin for me. I can only laugh at genital and bong jokes for how long?

ASTRONOMERS FIND SUN’S ‘LONG LOST BROTHER’

A team of researchers led by University of Texas at Austin astronomer Ivan Ramirez has identified the first “sibling” of the Sun—a star that was almost certainly born from the same cloud of gas and dust as our star. Ramirez’ methods will help other astronomers find other “solar siblings,” work that could lead to an understanding of how and where our Sun formed, and how our solar system became hospitable for life. The work will be published in the June 1 issue of The Astrophysical Journal.

“We want to know where we were born,” Ramirez said. “If we can figure out in what part of the galaxy the Sun formed, we can constrain conditions on the early solar system. That could help us understand why we are here.”

Additionally, there is a chance, “small, but not zero,” Ramirez said, that these solar sibling stars could host planets that harbor life. In their earliest days within their birth cluster, he explains, collisions could have knocked chunks off of planets, and these fragments could have travelled between solar systems, and perhaps even may have been responsible for bringing primitive life to Earth. Or, fragments from Earth could have transported life to planets orbiting solar siblings. “So it could be argued that solar siblings are key candidates in the search for extraterrestrial life,” Ramirez said.

The solar sibling his team identified is a star called HD 162826, a star 15 percent more massive than the Sun, located 110 light-years away in the constellation Hercules. The star is not visible to the unaided eye, but easily can be seen with low-power binoculars, not far from the bright star Vega.

The team identified HD 162826 as the Sun’s sibling by following up on 30 possible candidates found by several groups around the world looking for solar siblings. Ramirez’ team studied 23 of these stars in depth with the Harlan J. Smith Telescope at McDonald Observatory, and the remaining stars (visible only from the southern hemisphere) with the Clay Magellan Telescope at Las Campanas Observatory in Chile. All of these observations used high-resolution spectroscopy to get a deep understanding of the stars’ chemical make-up.

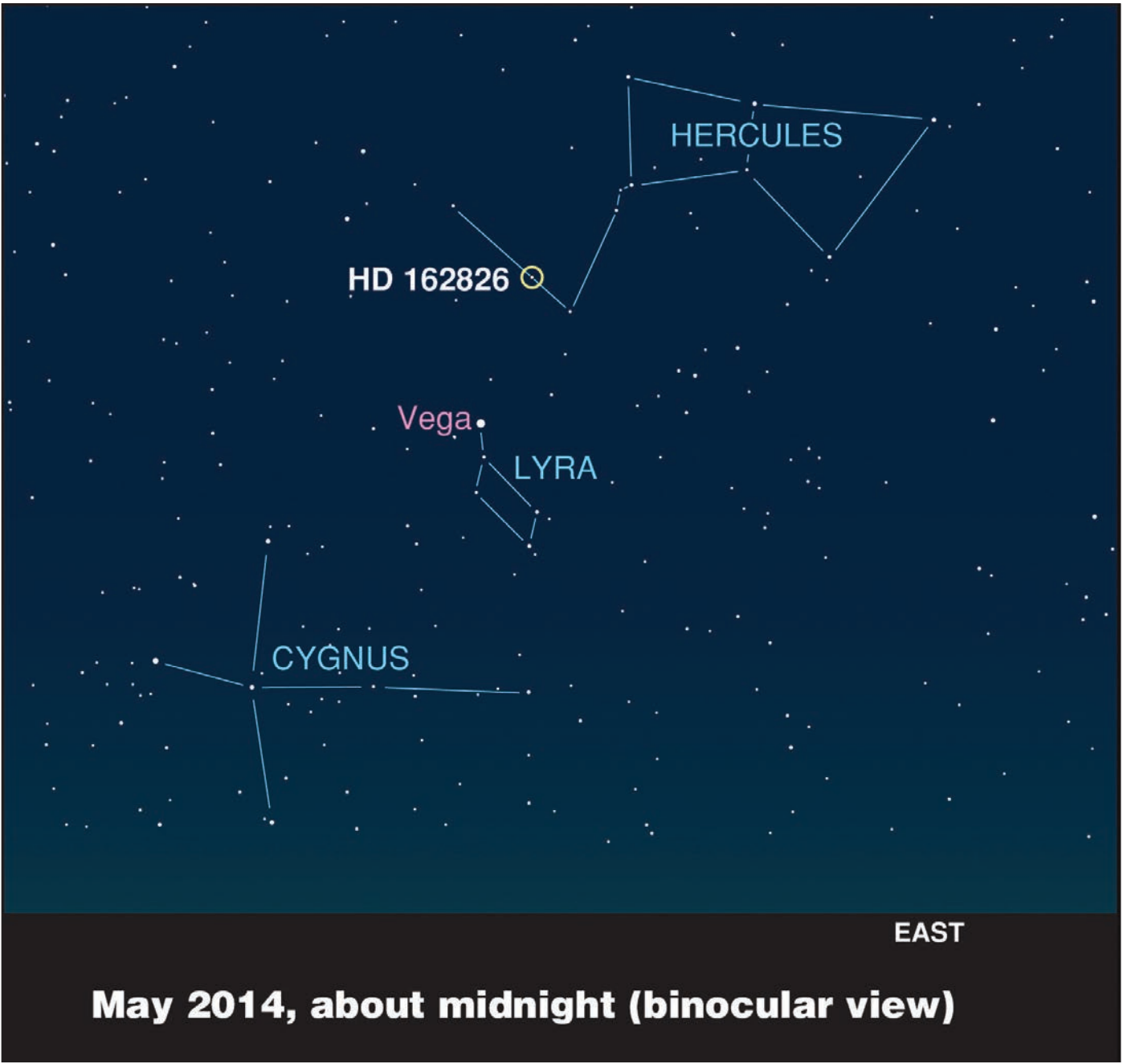
But several factors are needed to really pin down a solar sibling, Ramirez said. In addition to chemical analysis, his team also included information about the stars’ orbits—where they had been and where they are going in their paths around the center of the Milky Way galaxy. The team’s experts in this field, which is called “dynamics,” are A. T. Bajkova of the Pulkovo Astronomical Observatory in St. Petersburg, Russia, and V. V. Bobylev of St. Petersburg State University.

Combining information on both chemical make-up and dynamics of the candidates narrowed the field down to one star: HD 162826.

While the finding of a single solar sibling is intriguing, Ramirez points out that the project has a larger purpose: to create a road map for how to identify solar siblings, in preparation for the flood of data expected from future surveys.

“The idea is that the Sun was born in a cluster with a thousand or a hundred thousand stars. This cluster, which formed more than 4.5 billion years ago, has since broken up,” he says. “A lot of things can happen in that amount of time.” The member stars have broken off into their own orbits around the galactic center, taking them to different parts of the Milky Way today. A few, like HD 162826, are still nearby. Others are much farther afield.

SHOULD YOU CONTRIBUTE TO A ROTH 401(K)?

Someone recently asked me whether they should contribute to their employer's 401(k) Roth option, which is simply the ability to open a Roth account inside an employer's 401(k) plan. It was tempting to say yes because Roths offer a number of great benefits, but the correct answer has to be more nuanced and depends on a couple of factors.

Regular 401(k)s offer a tax deduction for contributions made from your paycheck so they reduce your current income taxes. Any growth in the account is tax free until you withdraw the money.

You are allowed to withdraw only when you're 59 ½ and have separated from employment. Any withdrawal is treated as income in the year withdrawn, but premature withdrawals are subject to a 10% penalty tax on top of the income taxes.

Roth 401(k)s reverse many of these benefits. There is no tax deduction for contributions. The growth in the account remains tax free, and withdrawals are also tax free; this is the major difference from a regular 401(k).

So when should you contribute to a Roth as opposed to a regular 401(k)? It depends on what you expect your tax rate to be in retirement and how long you intend to keep the money in the retirement account. If you anticipate your tax rate to be the same, or less, in retirement as it is now and you're only going to keep the money in the account for 5 years, there's not much advantage to the Roth. Contribute to the regular 401(k) and at least get a tax deduction for 5 years.

On the other extreme, if your tax rate might be higher in retirement

A listing that offers a home warranty presents a win-win for all parties. Sellers can use this attractive marketing tool to give buyers some added assurance and confidence in their purchase, by giving the buyers protection against failures in the home's systems and appliances.

and if you plan on keeping money in the account for 20 years, then the Roth will make more sense. Giving up a tax deduction now in return for 20 years of tax free growth AND tax free withdrawals almost always provides substantial benefits.

The decision is less obvious between these two extremes. The longer the money stays in the Roth and the larger it grows, the greater is the tax-free withdrawal benefit of the Roth. The shorter the investing timeframe, the greater is the tax deduction benefit of the regular 401(k). A little analysis is needed to make the right decision. It's not complicated, but it's not necessarily easy. Any qualified financial advisor should be able to do it.

WHY DID GOD GIVE US COFFEE?

This week I came face-to-face with a genuine dilemma. I had several meetings across town and for some reason I miscalculated and ended up with a 2-1/2 hour gap between meetings. I hate to waste time, but if I drove back to my office, I would simply have to return to my meeting later and with the cost of gas these days, one cannot be too cautious.

You know gas is getting high when it costs more to fill up the car than the car is really worth. The most valuable thing in my car is in my gas tank, at least when it is filled.

I remedied the situation by stopping in a small coffee shop for cup of Joe. As far as I am concerned, there is no bad time to have a cup of coffee, in spite of the price. I ordered my coffee and when the waitress brought it to me, I began to think about coffee. Why did God give us coffee?

Then my mind went back to my grandfather, whose greatest gift to me was a love of coffee. Nobody loved coffee more. I remember one of his favorite quotes, "You can always tell a man by the coffee he drinks."

Anathema to my grandfather was the idea of instant coffee. No man, in his judgment, would ever drink anything of the kind. "If a man would drink instant coffee," my grandfather perked, "there's no telling what else he would do. Never trust a man who drinks instant coffee."

Making coffee was an art form to my grandfather. There was a right way and a wrong way to make coffee, and he always insisted on the right way. Of course, the right way was the way he made coffee.

In grandfather's kitchen was an old wood-burning cook stove. On this old-fashioned stove, my grandfa-ther brewed his famous mud broth. He never allowed my grandmother to make the brew; it was his job, which he took seriously.

Once for his birthday, we all chipped in and bought him an electric coffee pot. I had never seen my grandfather so mad. When he saw what it was, he would not even take it out of the box.

He had strong ideas about coffee and how it should be brewed and woe be to the person who contra-dicted his ideas.

Grandfather always kept a fire in the old wood cook stove and on the back of the stove he kept his coffee pot, a large 2-gallon pot — one of those old-fashioned percolators long since gone out of style. The coffee was always on, and no matter when you stopped in to see him, he always had "fresh" coffee brewing.

When I say, "fresh," I need to explain. Actually, the coffee was only fresh on

Sunday. On Saturday night, he routinely emptied the coffee pot and prepared fresh coffee for Sunday morning.

He had an old coffee grinder and ground the coffee beans on Saturday night. He put some other things in the coffee, I have never figured out what. One thing I know he put in was a crushed eggshell. What it did to his coffee, I have no idea but grandfather was sure it was an important ingredient.

The freshly ground coffee beans were put in, the pot filled with fresh water and set on the back of the stove to slowly perk. This coffee would last the entire week. The coffee was so strong on Sunday that if it did not wake you in the morning, you were dead.

In fact, Cousin Ernie died on a Sunday afternoon, so my grandfather tells the story, and one sip of his black coffee roused him and he lived seven more years, which was unfortunate for grandfather, as he had to support him.

Before going to bed each evening my grandfather took care of his coffee. He would freshly grind a few coffee beans, sprinkle it on top of the old coffee grounds and then add a newly crushed eggshell. Then he would refill the coffee pot with water.

His coffee percolated 24/7 and by Saturday it was so strong you needed a half-cup of sugar just to drink one cup. It was thick enough to use as syrup on your pancakes, but so strong, it dissolved your pan-cakes before you could eat them.

My grandmother once tried washing the coffee pot. When my grandfather saw her, he became furious, "Never wash that coffee pot," he spouted, "you'll ruin its character and a coffee pot needs a lot of character to make good coffee."

When my grandfather died, I looked at his old black coffee pot and discovered two things. One, the original color was blue. And two, although it was originally a 2-gallon pot, it only could take three quarts of water. The "character," so important to my grandfather, had built up so much over the years its capacity was diminished.

In pondering my grandfather, I thought about my Heavenly Father and His gifts. The Bible puts it this way; "Every good gift and every perfect gift is from above, and cometh down from the Father of lights, with whom is no variableness, neither shadow of turning" (James 1:17 KJV).

I really do not know why God gave us coffee, but I do know God's character is of such a nature that it never diminishes His ability to bless me each day.

I hadn't intended to write another rebuttal to a Greg Welborn column. He'd suggested that if Michelle Obama is unwilling / unable to persuade her husband to launch an attack on Nigeria to rescue those kidnapped schoolgirls, she should just shut up about it. Expressing concern and support through social media is "insipid" and "demeaning".

Myself, I was glad to see our First Lady publicly express her concern and support – whatever the medium; but didn't see much need to argue the point.

Greg also complained about scheduled commencement speakers withdrawing from their engagements; "forced" to do so out of concern their views might interfere with the indoctrination of liberal dogma.

No, I was going to let that slide, as well – until I saw the L.A. Times editorializing on the same subject of students being overly picky in selecting their commencement speakers. The mere idea of Greg and the Times' editorial board agreeing on something impelled me to look into it.

The Times objects to the "uncompromising nature of the opposition" to certain speakers; an insistence they "agree 100%" with protestors. It condemns "rhetoric" described as "strident and overblown".

An example cited by both Greg and the Times was the withdrawal of former UC Berkeley Chancellor Robert Bergeneau from his engagement to give the commencement address at Pennsylvania's Haverford College. Greg says the alleged offense was that as Chancellor he'd "allowed police to arrest Occupy protestors".

Not quite. The allegation was that in 2011 he'd condoned the use of batons against students protesting non-violently against tuition fee hikes. Bergeneau later rationalized that once the students had linked arms, it ceased being "non-violent". This led several Haverford students and faculty members to question the appropriateness of Bergeneau receiving a high honor from a Quaker university.

Both Greg and the Times also brought up the withdrawal of International Monetary Fund Dir. Christine Lagarde from her commencement engagement at Smith College. The online petition asking the school to "reconsider" states that "although we do not wish to disregard all of Ms. Lagarde's accomplishments as a strong female leader", it describes IMF policies as having "led directly to the strengthening of imperialist and patriarchal systems that oppress and abuse women worldwide." Any show of support for the IMF would be "going against Smith's values to stand in unity with equality for all women, regardless of race, ethnicity or class." Greg mentions Brandeis University's revocation of its invitation to Ayaan Hirsi Ali. She's known not so much for her "feminism" as for her personal war on Islam. ("You mean radical Islam?" she was asked to clarify in an interview with Reason magazine. "No, Islam. Period" she replied.)

Brandeis Prof. Jytte Klausen wrote that while there might be a suitable opportunity for Ali to speak, offering her an honorary degree "undermines years of careful work to show that Brandeis University promotes the ideals

of shared learning, religious toleration and coexistence, irrespective of religion."

The Southern Poverty Law Center describes Dr. Charles Murray as one who uses "racist pseudoscience and misleading statistics to argue that social inequality is caused by the genetic inferiority of the black and Latino communities, women and the poor." Greg bemoans the withdrawal of Dr. Murray's invitation to speak at Azusa Pacific University ("Sadly, even in the Christian realm," as he put it).

Hard to think, but most of those graduating have no real memory of 9/11. They've only recently begun to experience a period when their country is not at war. But, with recent news of VA hospitals and by tens of thousands of first-hand impacts on family and friends, it's clear the effects of recent history will last for generations.

Students and faculty at Rutgers were aware of this history when, as noted in the Times editorial, they protested the invitation for Condoleezza Rice to give their commencement address (along with an honorary degree and \$35,000). They are aware of how she dismissed warnings from outgoing Clinton national security staffers of threats posed by Osama bin Laden and Al-Qaeda (a "star wars" missile defense shield was her priority at the time); how she just couldn't bring herself to admit before a Senate committee that the CIA daily briefing ignored by President Bush in August 2001 was titled, "Bin Ladin Determined To Strike in US"; how, when pushing for war in Iraq, she warned us, "We don't want the smoking gun to be a mushroom cloud."

The Rutgers faculty council forwarded a resolution stating Rice "played a prominent role in (the Bush) administration's effort to mislead the American people about the presence of weapons of mass destruction", and "at the very least condoned the Bush administration's policy of 'enhanced interrogation techniques' such as waterboarding . . . An honorary Doctor of Laws degree should not honor someone who participated in a political effort to circumvent the law."

I hadn't intended to weigh in on a subject that's primarily a matter for students and their schools. It led me to reflect on personal memories, though: of a time when an undergrad enrollment no longer guaranteed a 4F deferment; when if you were nineteen and your lottery number was low enough, and you couldn't swing a National Guard enlistment, you were faced with a major disruption of your life's plan.

With nothing comparable to focus the attention of students today, I've wondered how much they'd stay concerned and involved with their community, their country and the world we live in.

This commencement controversy, if anything, shows that with issues like protecting the right to protest, fighting economic exploitation, protecting rights of women and refusing to tolerate religious persecution, racism and lying the country into war, there are voices on our campuses being heard loud and clear.

This is ample reason to be optimistic for our future, and ample reason to congratulate the Class of 2014.

THE LEFT HONORS NOTHING

Last week we were treated to stories about political correctness in our universities, but this week a little middle school has upped the ante. That's right; the Cole Middle School of Providence Road Island has shown its betters about how to really implement Liberal philosophy. The school cancelled "Honor's Night" because, as the principal explained, it was "too exclusive".

It's tempting to just ridicule this as the idiocy it truly is, but that would not do justice to the lessons we can learn. You see, this principal – and those parents who support the decision – truly believes that her decision was the right thing to do. This is not maliciousness, cruelty, or anger. Principal Alexis Meyer believes so much in the liberal dogma of egalitarianism that she sees Honor's Night as a moral wrong and cancelling it as a moral right. The stridency of this belief allows Liberals to be blind to the harm they do.

The first issue to be addressed is simply the practicality of implementing the principle. To banish any sign of exclusivity is to make life unworkable. Every award, every degree, and every program that has competitive admissions standards is exclusive by definition. Honoring junior high students who have achieved excludes those who have not. Admitting some into college excludes those who are rejected. Awarding a degree to college students who pass their classes excludes those students who do not. And lastly, awarding Ph.D.s to lofty Liberals is itself an act of exclusion against those who don't earn the degree. There's no comment about these exclusive programs and degrees because to deal with them is to unravel the basic argument.

But let's look beyond the logistical considerations. What would be the effect of banning the vast majority of exclusive events or awards? As much as Liberals would like to deny the basics of human nature, or to believe that they can be readily changed, human nature changes only slightly more than glaciers (pre-global warming of course). The truth is that if you reward something, you'll get more of it; if you punish something, you'll get less of it. The corollary is that if you fail to reward difficult but needed activity, you'll get less of the needed activity.

It should be axiomatic that we want people to work hard. Whether it is completing homework, perfecting a sport, practicing medicine carefully, or managing a company, city, state or nation well, we want to incentivize people to do the hard work necessary. We cannot expect them to do so without rewarding them more than the people who choose not to do the hard necessary work.

Psychologically, we also do great harm when we teach people – implicitly or explicitly – that hard work is not good or that rewards should be given without having been earned. When people receive something for nothing, or when they know it is unwarranted by their actions,

they become self-absorbed, even narcissistic, and dissatisfied with life. There is no legitimate self-worth that is not truly earned. On the other hand, when people know they have earned what they receive, they learn contentment and humility and develop a true sense of self-worth.

Lastly, turning to basic moral principles, we must recognize that egalitarianism – the belief that all must be equal – comes from the good side of human nature. This is not one of the seven deadly sins. Humans have a good side to their nature and a bad side. What's too often missed is that both sides taken to an extreme result in bad outcomes and often in outright evil.

Avarice taken to an extreme is obvious. It is part of our bad nature, and taken to an extreme is the base cause for most crimes of property. Egalitarianism is less obvious. Basic equality is a very noble value. But taking equality of outcome to its extreme is the base cause of the crimes of communism and the vast majority of the evil of the 20th century. Those true believers in equality of outcome have been willing to send millions to re-education camps for no reason other than the fact that they owned more than their neighbors. In China, it was routine for egalitarian spasms to prompt the arrests of shop owners because they were shop owners. In Cambodia, the extreme was seen in the forced starvation of people for no reason other than they wore glasses and thus likely were more educated than the average citizen. Millions have died horrible deaths because of the excesses of egalitarianism.

The greatness of America is that we have largely found the solution for balancing the various passions of the people – the good ones and the bad ones. Our founders were not as afraid of the meanness of the masses as they were of the excesses of their good intentions. They built a system to provide equality before the law while allowing the warranted and earned inequality of outcomes. In so doing, they drew on a deep understanding of human nature and a solid grounding in biblical wisdom. The Scriptures are full of exhortations to care for the downtrodden, but also to allow the hard working the fruits of their efforts. When middle schools forbid the awarding of honors, we've lost our way. We've strayed from a path that has blessed us with fairness, unity and prosperity for several hundred years against all odds of success and every other example of history.

The *Jungle Book* is playing Sunday Morning at 7:00 a.m. Rudyard Kipling's famous story of Mowgli the jungle boy comes alive with Sabu as the boy raised by wolves learns to live among people.

Rudyard Kipling was a British Nobel laureate that published a series of stories in magazines of 1893 and 1894. Kipling was born in India, and lived there, in Britain, and later in Vermont, US, where he wrote and published his stories. Most of his stories were fantasy tales about the animals of India, and Mowgli, a boy raised by wolves that returns to civilization.

This telling of the story of Mowgli starts with an English woman on Safari in India that takes a picture of an old sage telling stories of the past. He tells her and us the story of the wolf boy, a child raised by wolves that can speak the language of all of the animals of the jungle. A group of people find a spot in the Indian jungle that they decide will be the home of their new village. There is a little baby boy that walks off into the jungle while no one is paying attention. His father discovers that he is missing and goes off into the jungle calling his son's name and searching for him, but he is killed, leaving his mother as a widow without her son. The boy is raised by a pack of wolves, and one day is chased by a terrible tiger that promises to kill him, but the boy escapes the tiger and stumbles upon the village of his mother. He is discovered by the tribesmen, and they eventually decide that he must be the boy that wandered away many years ago. His mother doesn't think that it is her lost son, but she is a kind woman that promises to care for him and teach him the ways of the people.

One man thinks that the boy is a devil, and wants to kill him, because he will never lose his wild animal instincts. He forbids his daughter to be around the boy, but of course the daughter and Mowgli find an immediate attraction for each other. As Mowgli learns to speak, we learn that he is afraid of the tiger named Shere Khan, who has threatened to kill the boy, and he buys a knife from the girl's father so that when he again meets Shere Khan the tiger he may be victorious in the battle. One day Mowgli and the girl go off into the jungle because she wants to experience the jungle as Mowgli sees it, and hear him converse with his jungle friends. They stumble upon the ruins of an ancient Indian city and discover a King's treasure room with untold riches that is guarded by an old cobra snake. But then the girl wakes from her nights sleep, and is not sure whether she actually experienced the jungle trip, or if it was a dream.

But her father discovers a gold coin in her hand, and when she tells the story of her and Mowgli finding the jungle treasure, her father gets a glint in his eye, and promises not to threaten harm to Mowgli any more, because he secretly wants Mowgli to lead him to the hidden treasures of the lost city. Thus begins an adventure that the whole family will enjoy while munching on freshly popped corn. Sabu, the actor who played Mowgli in this adventure, was a lad of Indian descent that appeared in 23 movies before his death in 1963 at the young age of 39.

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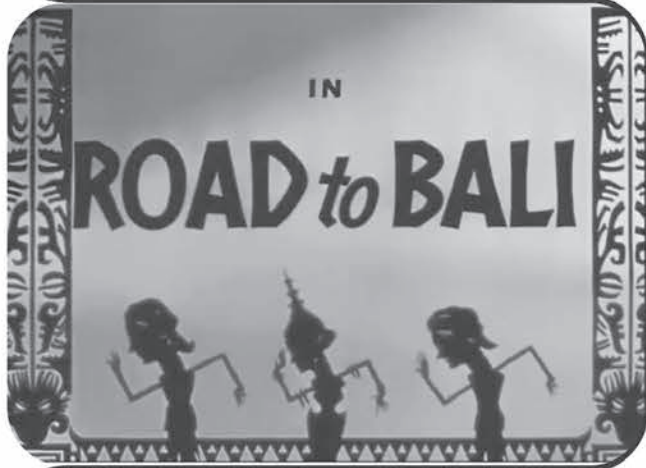
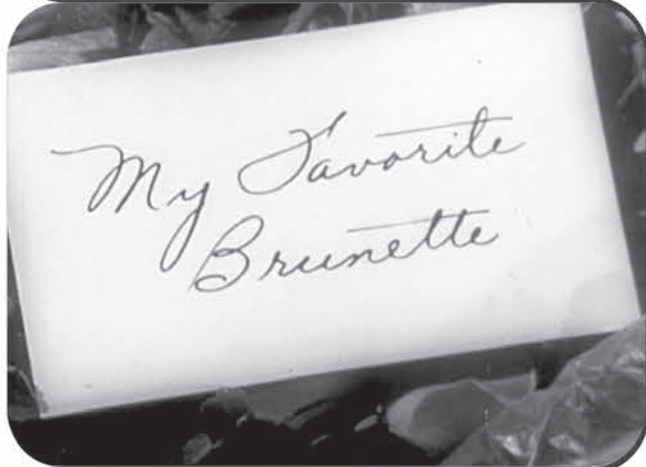

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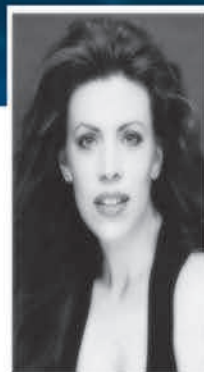
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
