## COMMUNITY IS SHAKEN BY SUDDEN DEATH OF ROSE FLOAT ASSOCIATION PRESIDENT ROBERT YOUNG

There are few residents in Sierra Madre who have viewed one of the city's Rose Parade entries in the last 15 years or so, that did not encounter the energetic, charming and enthusiastic leader of the SMRFA, Bob Young. And, if you didn't know him from the Rose Float, you may have known his home on Sierra Madre Blvd., where the lawn was adorned with two flamingos year round.

On Thursday, to the shock and dismay to all who knew him, Bob was found in his home dead of what appears to be natural causes.

A 'young at heart' vibrant individual, he was a few months shy of his 64th birthday.

According to his dear friend Illona Linden, after she had been unable to contact him the evening before, she went to his home and discovered Bob in his favorite recliner with his remote control in his hand. There was no evidence of foul play.

Known for his quick sense of humor and hard working ways, he epitomized the spirit of volunteerism that Sierra Madre is known for.

Bob served as President of the Sierra Madre Rose Float Association for as long as anyone can remember, more than 15 years said one source, and supported many other community organizations as well.

A lifelong resident of the San Gabriel Valley, he was born at St. Luke's Hospital in Pasadena on Friday the 13th, something he loved to joke about. He was an alumni of Arcadia High School.

Professionally, Bob was a mechanical engineer and the owner of Robert M. Young & Associates since 1978.

Bob is survived by his mother, Mary Young, well known for her volunteerism and philanthropy in Sierra Madre, his son, Robert Reid Youn, a twin sister and a brother. He is also survived by his dear friend Illona Linden.

## TRAFFIC ACCIDENTS ON THE RISE IN SIERRA MADRE

Recently, Sierra Madre Police Chief Larry Giannone held a Town Hall meeting in which he brought residents up to date with issues that his department handles on a regular basis. One of those is the growing problem of Traffic incidents in Sierra Madre, a town which prides itself on not having any traffic lights.

Distracted drivers, driving ignoring the posted speed limits, and drivers under the influence account for the almost 400 traffic stops that have occurred in the last 30 days. According to Chief Giannone, "What that means is that the motoring public in town is committing some type of vehicle code violation to get stopped.

215 were cited for the violations while 141 warnings were issued." Fortunately, while there have been accidents as a result of the violations, as of this date, none have resulted in a fatality.

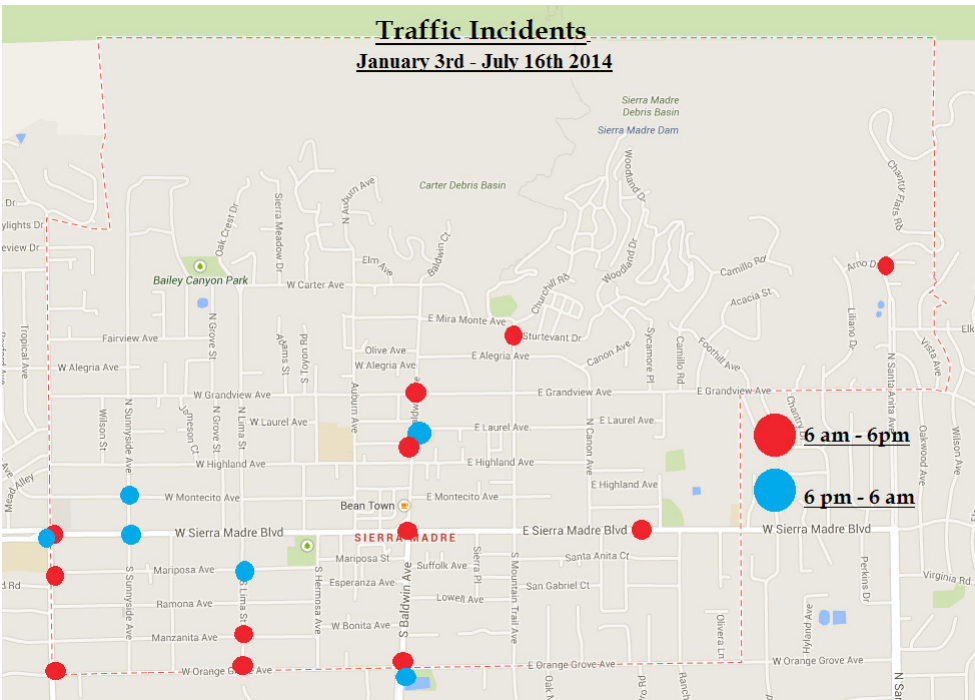
"Traffic Officer Berry has indicated that he has seen an increase in cell phone violations over the past several months" says Giannone.

In a recent article, he was named as one of the West's most influential individuals in dealing with water issues.

### GENEVIEVE COLLINS

June 29, 1920 – July 4, 2014

Five days after her 94th birthday, Genevieve Collins chose our Nation's birthday to be her very own Day of Independence. On July 4th she passed away peacefully at home surrounded by those she loved.

Surviving her are seven children, seventeen grandchildren, seventeen great grandchildren, two brothers, one sister and many nieces and nephews. Preceding her in death are her parents, three brothers, husband of more than fifty-four years, one young grandson and one young nephew.

Gen was born in Wisconsin, raised in Indiana, along with her young children, she followed her husband to bases around the U.S. during WWII, and settled in San Francisco to raise her growing family. She then spent six decades living in the Collins family home in Sierra Madre and as a parishioner at St. Rita's Catholic Church.

Throughout her life, Gen exhibited a love of learning through reading, traveling and joining in many activities. She graduated from St. Mary's College in South Bend, Indiana. In her late 40's and with 6 children still at home, Gen returned to college, earning straight A's and her teaching credential. For 11 years "Mrs. Collins" was a loved first grade teacher at St. Rita's School. Gen ended her "professional" career at Pasadena City College.

In retirement, she traveled extensively. Gen was ahead of her time with senior wellness, learning to swim in her late 60's and remaining active in water aerobics into her late 80's. She was part of the Women's Health Initiative, believing data about her life and aging process would benefit women everywhere.

Her family and others who knew Gen remember her by many names: Mom, wife, Gram Gen, Great Gram, Sissy, Aunt Gen, teacher, matriarch and friend. Everyone who met Gen loved her. She inspired generations and will be missed by all who knew her!

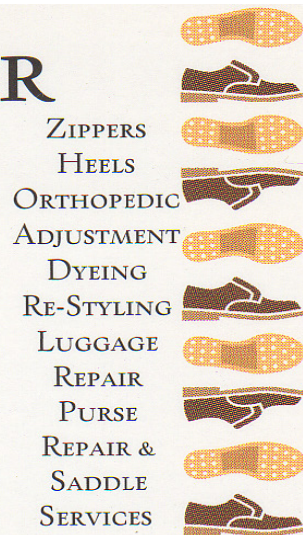

## Sierra Madre Police Blotter

During the week of Sunday, July 6th to Sunday, July 13th, the Sierra Madre Police Department responded to approximately 375 calls for service.

Tuesday, July 8th

At approximately 7:42 pm, Sierra Madre Police performed a traffic stop on a vehicle that did not have license plates displayed. Upon making contact with the suspect, he informed Officers that he had recently purchased his vehicle a year ago and his plates were stole a month prior, so he only has the dealership paper plates on the vehicle. A records check revealed the plates were never reported stolen and that the registration was expired two years. Through further investigation, an Officer removed the paper plates and uncovered the vehicle's California plates that the suspect said were stolen. The suspect ultimately admitted he did not pay the registration and placed the paper plates to avoid paying any penalties. The suspect was cited for expired registration over six months and his vehicle was towed.

Thursday, July 10th

At approximately 5:43 pm, Sierra Madre Police responded to the 140 Block of Grove Street for a medical assistance call. When Officers arrived on scene they found the male suspect bleeding from a self-inflicted wound in the bathroom. He was accompanied by a friend who stated he discovered the suspect and called the Police and Paramedics. The suspect informed Officers that he had been drinking all day and no longer wished to live, but did not actually remember cutting himself. The suspect was treated for his injuries and transported to a local hospital. The suspect was placed on a 72 hour hospital hold for evaluation.

Thursday, July 10th

At 8:48 pm, Sierra Madre Police responded to the 300 block of East Laurel Ave. regarding a restraining order violation. Upon arrival, Officers were informed by the victim that his wife, of which he has a

restraining order against, drove by his residence as he was coming up the street. He stated the vehicle slowly approached the front of his residence then quickly drove off. He took note due to the fact that the vehicle had its headlights off and it was dark out. The victim took note of the vehicle's license plate and recognized it to be that of his wife. Efforts to contact the suspect were unsuccessful as the suspect's cell phone has been disconnected. This case has been forwarded to the District Attorney's Office for violation of a restraining order.

Saturday, July 12th

At approximately 11:36 am, Sierra Madre Police responded to the station lobby regarding an identity theft report. Officers were informed by the victim that she recently had been away on a trip, and upon returning she checked her bank account online. The victim noticed a transfer in the amount of over \$5,000 from her savings to her checking was made, which then proceeded to an amount of over \$9,000 wired to a bank in North Carolina. When the victim made contact with her bank, she was informed someone called to make the transfer and the bank mistakenly thought it was in fact the victim authorizing the transfer as she has regularly done so in the past. This case has been forwarded to the Detectives Bureau.

Saturday, July 12th

At around 12:10 am, Sierra Madre Police performed a traffic stop on East Foothill Blvd. on a vehicle that failed to have its headlights on. Upon making contact with the vehicle, Officer's observed a driver and three passengers along with a strong odor of marijuana. When asked by Officer's to provide a license, the driver stated he was never issued a license. Officer's questioned about the odor of marijuana and were informed by the driver that he had a small amount in his pocket, and a few grams located in his trunk. Upon searching the trunk, the Officers located about 10 grams of marijuana and a cash amount of over \$9,500. The driver stated he obtained the money through unemployment checks and construction jobs. Due to the large amount of drugs and large amount of money, it is believed the driver was illegally selling drugs for profit. The driver was arrested at cited for Possession of Marijuana for sales, Illegal transportation of Marijuana, and Possession of Hash Oil. The three passengers of the vehicle were released at the scene.

## THREE PEOPLE KILLED IN TENANT/LANDLORD DISPUTE

*Shooting victims names, 911 audio released*

Police on Monday released 911 audio of the man they said shoot three people with a semi-automatic rifle Saturday and wounded two others —in which he admits to the killing by telling the operator, “I just shot somebody.”

Pasadena Police Chief Phillip Sanchez said John Izael Smith surrendered after barricading himself inside his home and after police dispatcher Diane Marin convicted him to give up. According to Sanchez, Marin relayed messages to police through another dispatcher Alexis Bartoli. The two kept Smith calm Sanchez said and he agreed to surrender minutes later.

All three names of the victims, including 91-year-old Luis Fernando were also released by the coroner's office later Monday. The other victims were Maria Teresa Aguiar, 59, and Joseph Uribe, 31.

The shooting started shortly before 4:30 p.m. in the 1700 block of North Summit Avenue when 911 calls came in to police, one person said he heard at least 15 gunshots in front of his house. Many of the callers said they did not know where the gunshots were coming from. Uribe a good Samaritan, heard gunshots, came to help and was gunned down.

When police arrived they came under heavy gunfire, Aguilar was lying in the street dead, as police tried to help Smith peppered their vehicle with gunfire Sanchez said.

Pasadena Mayor Bill Bogaard said at Monday's press conference that the shooting likened Pasadena to other communities know for mass murders such as Sandy Hook in Connecticut.

Smith was charged Tuesday with three counts of murder with the special circumstance of multiple murders and a special allegation of intentionally discharging a rifle. He is eligible for the death penalty prosecutors said.

## Mack Robinson Honored on 100th Birthday

The Robinson family and friends gathered Friday morning to celebrate and share stories on, what would have been, the 100th birthday of Matthew “Mack” Robinson, the brother of baseball icon Jackie Robinson.

“Mack Robinson was born on June 18, 1914 one hundred years ago,” said Pasadena Mayor Bill Bogaard. “He and his family moved to Pasadena six years later and the Robinson family has made the city of Pasadena proud all of the time since then...” Mack and his brother Jackie defied racism on an international level. Mack

returned to Pasadena after the 1936 Olympics and his life story provides an intricate look at the history of Pasadena since then.”

Bogaard continued, saying his memories of Mack Robinson date back to the fall of 1970, “the year that the Pasadena schools implemented a integration plan through bussing,” one of his own children was bussed to Cleveland Elementary School. Bogaard and Robinson were both on the PTA.

A legend in his own right, Mack

Robinson set national junior college records at Pasadena City College placing him on the 1936 United States Olympic team, where he won the silver medal in the men's 200 meters in Berlin, finishing just 0.4 seconds behind Jesse Owens.

“I had a conference with the Mayor's office and we were talking about what should I do with this medal, what should I do with some of those Olympic things I have at home,” said Delano Robinson, wife of Mack Robinson. “So, I said to myself I'm going to ask the Mayor does he have any choice to a museum? Should we go to the Smithsonian, the Pasadena library, heritage or just keep it in the home? Have a trophy room.”

Along with the celebration at the Robinson Memorial, City Hall Centennial Square the family held a reception at PCC's Creveling Lounge Friday night, to honor Mack Robinson the former PCC star athlete; watch a video of Mack Robinson's 1936 historic Berlin Olympic performance and view Mack Robinson memorabilia.

The Robinson Family Weekend will conclude Sunday, when the Baseball Reliquary will induct Rachel Robinson, Jackie Robinson's wife, into the Shrine of Eternals during a special ceremony at the Pasadena

## Tree-Killing Beetle Removal Discussed



The City's Urban Forestry Advisory Committee (UFAC) held a special meeting Wednesday night to discuss the tree-killing Polyphagous shot hole borer (PSHB) beetle that has been identified on public and private trees within the city.

The insect attacks a variety of tree species by boring into the wood of a tree and depositing a fungus known as Fusarium, which can eventually kill the host tree. The Department of Public Works has been in communication with plant pathologists and scientists who are researching this insect and its impact on trees.

Representatives from the University of California Riverside Center for Invasive Species Research and The Huntington Botanical Gardens presented current research on PSHB and best management practices for removal and disposal of PSHB.

## Earthquake Early Warning System Funds Secured

**Caltech President Thomas Rosenbaum said the vote sends a strong signal of support for implementation of an earthquake early warning for the West Coast.**

The U.S. House Appropriations Committee voted Tuesday to include \$5 million in funding, in the Fiscal Year 2015, for the Earthquake Early Warning System —the first time Congress has ever provided funding specifically for the system. Congressman Adam Schiff made the announcement.

Earlier this year, Schiff led a group of 25 Members from California, Washington and Oregon in organizing a request that the committee fund an early earthquake warning system. A limited system developed by Caltech, UC-Berkeley and University of Washington, in conjunction with the United States Geological Survey (USGS), has already been deployed and has proven that the early warning technology is sound.

This \$5 million in funding will allow those developing the statewide system to begin purchasing and installing additional sensors, hire new staff members, and come closer to deploying comprehensive early earthquake warning coverage throughout earthquake prone regions of the West Coast. The

Schiff language included in the Appropriations bill reads: “...the Committee provides \$5,000,000 from within the funds provided for Earthquake Hazards to transition the earthquake early warning demonstration project into an operational capability on the West Coast.”

“It's critical that the West Coast implement an earthquake early warning system that will give us a heads up before the ‘big one’ hits, so we can save lives and protect infrastructure,” Schiff said. “We are constantly reminded of our vulnerability – with tremors, earthquakes and aftershocks rattling our homes and businesses – and even a few seconds of warning will allow people to seek cover, automatically slow or stop trains, pause surgeries and more. This first phase of funding will allow the work to begin expanding the system, and we will continue to work to secure future funding along with our other federal, state and local partners.”

“Caltech and its partners are very grateful that the House of Representatives is sending a strong signal of support for implementation of an earthquake early warning for the West Coast,” said President Thomas Rosenbaum of the California Institute of Technology. “We look forward to moving ahead with this critical technology over the next few years.”

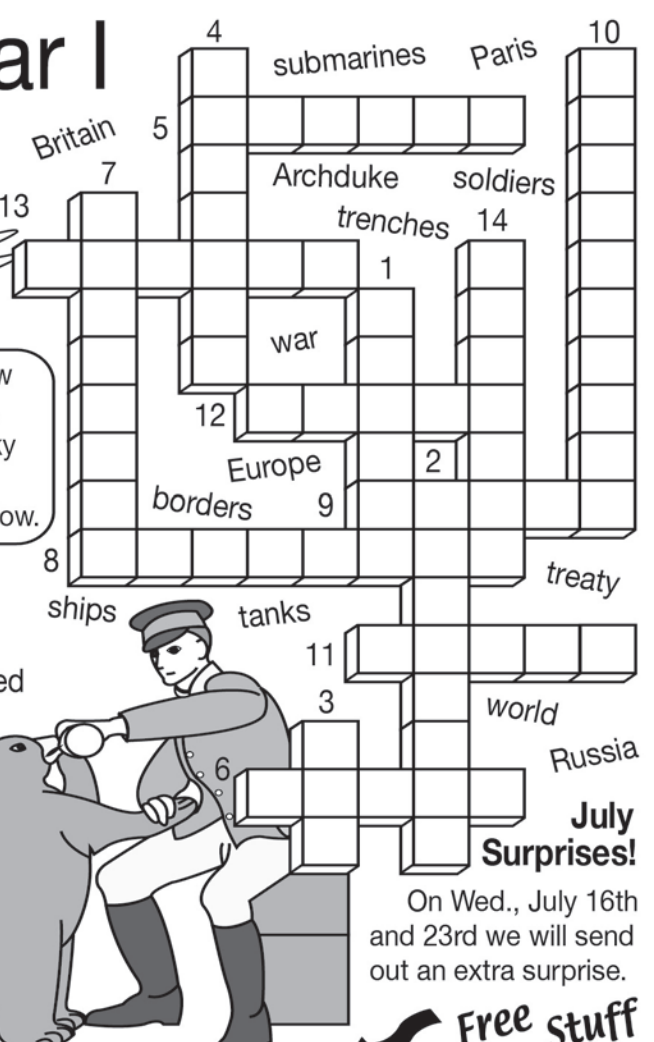

## WHAT IS A TRADITIONAL NATUROPATH?

I am often asked what a naturopath is or what is naturopathy? Naturopathy means close to nature and or benefiting from nature. As a naturopath, I believe nature has given us everything we need to get well and stay well. The basic teaching of traditional naturopathy should sound familiar, “above all, do no harm”. Whole food or herbal supplements that support the body may be used until the body is back to operating correctly on its own. Naturopathy is often effective in dealing with chronic illnesses, such as arthritis or eczema, because these conditions improve when diet, lifestyle, and nutrient deficiencies are addressed. Many clients are able to reverse diseases such as hypertension and type II diabetes through diet and lifestyle changes. Additionally, naturopathy is a great choice for non-emergency acute illnesses, such as colds and flus, because it employs nutritional and lifestyle changes that support the body's immune system.

Traditionally, naturopathy was just a system of helping people return to health or learn to maintain health by teaching them to eat healthy foods, exercise regularly and use herbs and water therapy for restoring health. Today's traditional naturopaths do just that. The traditional naturopath does not diagnose or treat illness but rather is a person's guide to information about safe, healthy ways to change a lifestyle to bring about better health. A naturopath empowers you to take charge of your life and health and to gain back the confidence to make decisions about your health and your life.

## Sloan Digital Sky Survey Expands Its Reach

Building on 14 years of extraordinary discoveries, the Sloan Digital Sky Survey (SDSS) has launched a major program of three new surveys, adding novel capabilities to expand its census of the Universe into regions it had been unable to explore before.

This new phase of SDSS will:

--Explore the compositions and motions of stars across the entire Milky Way in unprecedented detail, using a telescope in Chile along with the existing Sloan Foundation Telescope in New Mexico.

--Make detailed maps of the internal structure of thousands of nearby galaxies to determine how they have grown and changed over billions of years, using a novel optical fiber bundle technology that can take spectra of each different part of a galaxy at once.

--Measure the expansion of the Universe during a poorly understood five-billion-year period of the Universe's history when Dark Energy started to drive its expansion, using a new set of galaxies and quasars.

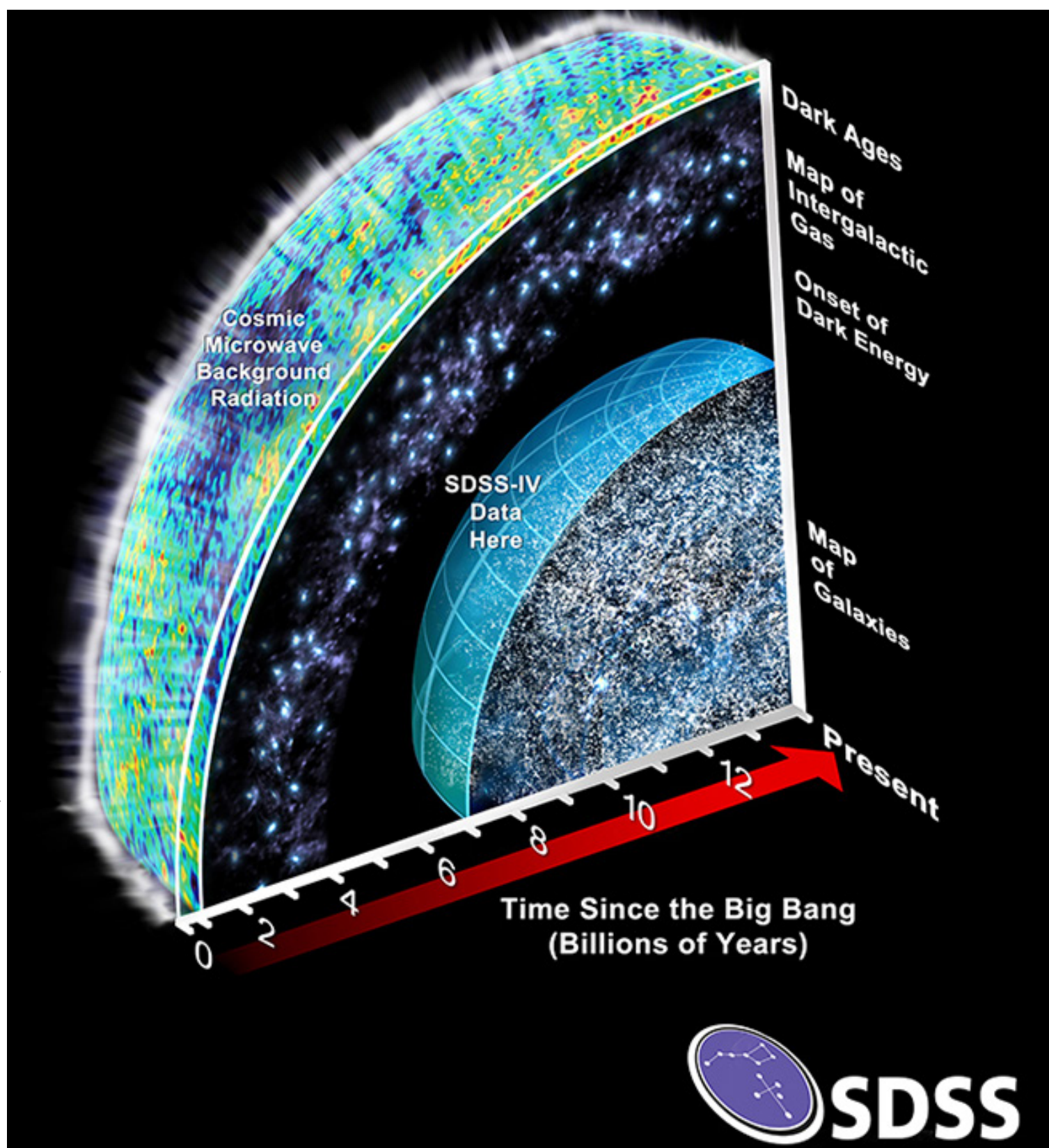
The new survey is a collaboration of more than 200 astronomers at more than 40 institutions on four continents, and it incorporates telescopes in both the Northern and Southern Hemispheres. With these two telescopes, the SDSS will be able to see the entire sky for the first time.

“Over the last fourteen years, many people have used SDSS data to make numerous discoveries that have revolutionized astronomy,” said Michael Blanton of New York University, the director of the new survey. “We have mapped the large-scale structure of the Universe, traced out previously unknown structures in the Milky Way, and made unanticipated discoveries from asteroids in our own Solar System to the most distant quasars.”

This new phase of the SDSS will provide a vast new database of observations that will significantly expand our understanding of the nature of the Universe at all scales, from our own galaxy to the distant universe. In our galaxy, the new SDSS will see hundreds of thousands of individual stars, including stars that were born at the birth of the Milky Way and stars born in the past few million years, just yesterday in cosmic terms. Measuring the compositions, positions, and motions of individual stars will reveal how the Galaxy evolved from the distant past to today.

“The SDSS has observed more than half a million Milky Way stars over the past fourteen years, which I call a good start,” said Jennifer Johnson of The Ohio State University, the Scientific Spokesperson of the new SDSS. “However, from the Northern Hemisphere, the Earth blocks our view of a quarter of the Milky Way, and mostly obscures our view of the galactic center. So there are literally entire regions of the Galaxy that the SDSS has yet to see.”

This new phase will complete the picture. In addition to the Sloan Foundation 2.5-meter Telescope in New Mexico, SDSS will use the 2.5-meter Irene du Pont Telescope at Las Campanas Observatory, high in the Chilean Andes and home to the clearest skies on the planet. In addition to completing the full study of the Milky Way, the du Pont telescope will also observe stars in the nearby Magellanic Clouds, giving astronomers a better understanding of the Milky Way's immediate environs.

## WHEN TO SEE A GERIATRICIAN

*Dear Savvy Senior:*  
*What kinds of health problems do geriatricians treat? My mother, who's 80, takes several different medications for various health problems, but she hasn't been feeling herself lately. I'm wondering if she would benefit by seeing a geriatrician in place of her regular family doctor.*  
*Inquiring Daughter*

Dear Inquiring:

If your mom is dealing with a variety of health problems and is taking multiple medications, a visit to a geriatrician may be just the antidote to help get her back on track. Here's a breakdown of the different types of health conditions geriatricians treat and some tips to help you locate one in your area.

### Geriatric Doctors

For starters, it's important to know that geriatricians are family practice or internal medicine physicians that have had additional specialized training to manage the unique and, oftentimes, multiple health concerns of older adults. Just as a pediatrician specializes in caring for children, a geriatrician is trained to provide care for seniors, usually over age 65.

While most doctors, and even general practitioners, are trained to focus on a person's particular illness or disease, geriatricians are trained to look at all aspects that can affect elderly patients – not just the physical symptoms. They also often work with a team of other health care professionals like geriatric-trained nurses, rehabilitation therapists, nutritionists, social workers and psychiatrists to provide care. And, they will coordinate treatments among a patient's specialists.

Patients who can benefit from seeing a geriatrician are elderly seniors with multiple health and age-related problems such as cardiovascular disease, stroke, confusion and memory problems, Parkinson's and Alzheimer's disease, diabetes, hypertension, depression, respiratory problems, osteoporosis, arthritis, chronic pain, mobility issues, incontinence, vision and hearing impairment, and trouble with balance and falls.

Geriatricians are also particularly adept at tackling medication problems. Because many seniors, like your mom, take multiple medications at the same time for various health conditions,



and because aging bodies often absorb and metabolize drugs differently than younger adults, unique side effects and drug interactions are not uncommon. A geriatrician will evaluate and monitor you mom's medications to be sure they are not affecting her in a harmful way.

Geriatricians can also help their patients and families determine their long-term care needs, like how long they can remain in their own homes safely without assistance, and what type of services may be necessary when they do need some extra help.

But not all seniors need to see a geriatrician. Seniors who have few health problems are just fine seeing their primary care physician.

### Find a Geriatrician

Unfortunately, there's a shortage of geriatricians in the U.S., so depending on where you live, finding one may be challenging. To locate one in your area, visit the American Board of Family Medicine website at theabfm.org where you can do a search online. Or use Medicare's online Physician Compare tool. Just go to medicare.gov/physiciancompare and type in your zip code, or city and state, then type in "Geriatric Medicine" in the "What are you searching for?" box. You can also get this information by calling Medicare at 800-633-4227.

Keep in mind, though, that locating a geriatrician doesn't guarantee your mom will be accepted as a patient. Many doctors already have a full patient roster and don't accept any new patients. You'll need to call the individual doctor's office to find out.

ALVERNO HIGH SCHOOL ALUMNA MELISSA “MO” MARTIN ‘00 WINS LPGA BRITISH OPEN

Sierra Madre, CA (July 18, 2014) – Alverno High School alumna Melissa “Mo” Martin was the surprise winner at the Women’s British Open at Royal Birkdale on Sunday, July 13.

A graduate of Alverno High School from the Class of 2000, Martin hit the best shot of her career on Sunday when she hit a three-wood hitting the pin on the par-five 18th hole at Royal Birkdale in Southport, England, settling only a few feet away from the hole to set up an eagle. An hour later, she ended the day with an even-par 72—winning the Women’s British Open by one stroke.

Martin started playing golf at the age of 4 after her brother came home with what she recalls as “a beautiful, glistening golf trophy.”

“He came home with a trophy and I just really wanted a trophy,” Martin recalls. “So I started playing golf and fell in love with the game. It really came in pieces how it happened.”

Once she fell in love with the sport, Martin’s drive was unstoppable. She spent hours in her driveway, hitting countless balls under her father’s instruction into a homemade net. She quickly started to collect trophies of her own, including the most prestigious junior tournament of its time, the Junior World Japan Cup, where she won her own “beautiful, glistening golf trophy” and got to meet the Crown Prince of Japan.

By the time Martin started at Alverno as a freshman in 1996 she had already won the Junior World Japan Cup and represented the United States there an additional three times. Although Alverno didn’t have a golf team at the time, Martin recalls the unique support and commitment the school provided her as a student and an athlete.

“Alverno was very supportive and the school’s nurturing environment helped me catch up—and not only catch up, but excel. I was allowed time to practice and to compete, which was really helpful to me,” she said. “After Alverno, I went onto UCLA and was able to join the golf program there and compete academically, which opened the door to becoming a professional and having the career I have today.”

As a female golfer, Martin has faced challenges and overcome some adversity although she is grateful to have put most of it behind her but credits the experiences she had growing up with helping her to do so.

“I got a lot of comments growing up, especially during high school, about being a female golfer. There would be individuals who wouldn’t want to play with a female,” Martin said. “I think there is still a stigma attached to female golfers, but we are gaining a lot of momentum on the professional levels and I am hopeful that young women interested in pursuing the sport, or any sport, will focus on their passions, desires, and different skill



sets. I think that when they do that, it won’t ever fail them.”



Linda Reffner, Alverno’s former Assistant Principal, recounts Martin as a student: “She was an excellent student and worked on her golf game throughout high school, but hardly ever on a course. When Melissa qualified for the CIF championship, she had to be accompanied by a school official and so I became her coach for two days. Mo didn’t win that tournament, but I was extremely impressed by her focus and determination. Most high school athletes who don’t receive a scholarship in their sport at college will give up, but Mo talked her way into a walk-on spot at UCLA and earned a scholarship as a result. I have followed her career and admired the progress she made, both at UCLA and on the Futures Tour. She has had some impressive rounds in tournaments on the LPGA and after the first round at the British Open, Alverno alums and teachers lit up Facebook. Everyone was on the edge of their seats when she almost made an albatross on the final hole. We are extremely proud of her and so happy that her hard work resulted in such a great achievement!”

When her opponent’s shot came up short to tie her at Birkdale, she turned to her caddie and said, “Is this real life?!” and it was. Ranked 99th in the world prior to Sunday’s win, Martin has been catapulted to a new level of athletic fame and certainly a new place in the LPGA history books.

“Mo Martin is truly the person she wants to be-- living the Alverno mission in her daily life,” said Julia V. Fanara, Alverno High School’s Head of School. We are proud of her accomplishments and celebrate her success as we do for all of our students and alumnae. We look forward to continuing to watch and support her growing career and this exciting new phase of her life.”

### NEW GYN ONCOLOGY CLINIC OPENS AT METHODIST HOSPITAL, ARCADIA

Recently I attended the ribbon-cutting ceremony for the new GYN Oncology Clinic at Methodist Hospital. Heading the new institute is Dr. Alan Schaerth, MD, a talented and respected GYN oncologist with over 20 years of experience. Prior to coming to Methodist, Dr. Schaerth practiced in Pasadena. Dr. Schaerth was not able to attend the ribbon-cutting; he was performing emergency surgery. Dan Ausman, President and CEO of Methodist Hospital took over.

When I arrived at the clinic, there was a warm welcome by Mr. Ausman and Kathleen Ellison, Chairman of the Methodist Hospital Board. Also attending were Mayor Pro Tem Gary Kovacic, Council Member Sho Tay and City Manager Dominic Lazzaretto. Representing the Chamber were CEO Scott Hettrick and President Denise Weaver. Right before the Ribbon-cutting, Ausman explained how this clinic came to fruition at Methodist. Fifteen years ago, a clinic was in the works at a hospital in Irvine, where Dr. Alan Schaerth was affiliated, but the clinic didn't happen. For that reason, they went to Dr. John Schaerth- Alan's father, and sought his help. Dr. John Schaerth had a network of thirty of OBGYN Oncology Clinics in California and Nevada-the largest clinic in the US. Ausman said, "This clinic (at Methodist) is the re-creation of his (Alan's) father's dream."

?The GYN Oncology Institute features updated technology in two large procedure rooms, an exam room, a private family consultation room

and a large, family-centered waiting room. The atmosphere is designed to be welcoming for both patients and family members. I was very impressed with the bright cheery rooms and was surprised to learn the building had been around a long time, but was recently refurbished. (A special "Thank You" to David Neal, Chief Nursing Officer at Methodist, for many interesting tidbits of info)

In addition to housing Dr. Alan Schaerth's practice, the institute provides multiple services-examinations, consultations, and certain outpatient procedures for patients with GYN cancers and other disorders.

The first presentation, A Certificate of Commendation on behalf of the City was by Mayor Pro Tem Gary Kovacic and Council Member Sho Tay. Mayor Pro Tem Kovacic noted, "it has been quite a "profound day". (In the morning, there had been the celebration of the life of paramedic/firefighter Mike Herdman.) ### FOOTHILL MWD REQUESTS CUSTOMERS TO COMPLY WITH STATE MANDATES

Foothill Municipal Water District (FMWD) asks customers in its service area to comply with approved State mandates to reduce water consumption through the reduction of irrigation to three days a week. The State Water Resources Control Board adopted emergency regulations that prohibit certain outdoor water uses and require urban water agencies to implement mandatory outdoor water use restrictions under their water shortage contingency plans. Fines of \$500 could be assessed by local agencies for violating the prohibitions. These restrictions are anticipated to go into effect around August 1, 2014.

"The largest use of water in our service area is for outdoor irrigation. Reducing irrigation to three days a week will help save water for the future should this drought continue into next

year or multiple years," said FMWD General Manager Nina Jazmadarian.

FMWD continues to offer rebates to assist customers in cutting water use. Rebates include a turf removal program, rotating nozzles, weather based irrigation controllers and soil moisture sensor. Foothill Municipal Water District provides imported water to Crescenta Valley Water District, La Cañada Irrigation District, Mesa Crest Water Company, Valley Water Company, Lincoln Avenue Water Company, Las Flores Water Company and Rubio Cañon Land & Water Association. Kinneloa Irrigation District, another retail agency, takes no water from Foothill.

### LOS ANGELES COUNTY APPROVES FULL IMPLEMENTATION OF LAURA'S LAW MENTAL HEALTH PROGRAM

*A Compassionate, Cost-Effective Approach, Proven to Reduce Incarceration and Homelessness*

LOS ANGELES COUNTY – The Board of Supervisors unanimously approved implementing Laura's Law, a comprehensive, treatment-based approach for the mentally ill -- many of whom are incapable of recognizing their illness, announced Supervisor Michael D. Antonovich.

"Laura's Law has proven to significantly improve the lives of program of participants, decrease incarceration, reduce homelessness, and enhance public safety," said Supervisor Antonovich. "It provides a humane alternative to the revolving door of mental hospitals, jails and the street."

Supervisor Antonovich, who has worked

tirelessly to support this effort, collaborated with former Assemblywoman Helen Thomson who authored the legislation that reformed the 1967 Lanterman-Petris-Short law.

Laura's Law was named after Laura Wilcox who was killed by a delusional individual suffering with severe mental illness and patterned after New York State's Kendra's Law. Initiated by Supervisor Antonovich, the County had previously adopted a successful pilot program which has resulted in a 78% reduction in incarcerations and a 77% reduction in hospitalizations among program participants.

### REP. SCHIFF SECURES \$5 MILLION IN APPROPRIATIONS BILL TO DEPLOY FULL WEST COAST EARTHQUAKE EARLY WARNING SYSTEM *Funding Will Be Used to Hire New Staff, Purchase Equipment, and Begin Implementation of System*

Washington, DC – Today, Rep. Adam Schiff (D-Burbank) announced that the Appropriations Committee has included \$5 million in funding in the Fiscal Year 2015 Interior and Environment Appropriations bill for the Earthquake Early Warning System, the first time Congress has ever provided funding specifically for the system. Earlier this year, Schiff led a group of 25 Members from California, Washington and Oregon in organizing a request that the committee fund an early earthquake warning system. A limited system developed by Caltech, UC-Berkeley and University of Washington, in conjunction with the United State Geological Survey (USGS), has already been deployed and has proven that the early warning technology is sound.

This \$5 million in funding will allow those developing the statewide system to begin purchasing and installing additional sensors, hire new staff members, and come closer to deploying comprehensive early earthquake warning coverage throughout earthquake prone regions of the West Coast. The Schiff language included in the Appropriations bill reads: "...the Committee provides \$5,000,000 from within the funds provided for Earthquake Hazards to transition the earthquake early warning demonstration project into an operational capability on the West Coast."

"It's critical that the West Coast implement an earthquake early warning system that will

give us a heads up before the 'big one' hits, so we can save lives and protect infrastructure," said Rep. Schiff. "We are constantly reminded of our vulnerability – with tremors, earthquakes and aftershocks rattling our homes and businesses – and even a few seconds of warning will allow people to seek cover, automatically slow or stop trains, pause surgeries and more. This first phase of funding will allow the work to begin expanding the system, and we will continue to work to secure future funding along with our other federal, state and local partners."

"Caltech and its partners are very grateful that the House of Representatives is sending a strong signal of support for implementation of an earthquake early warning for the West Coast," said President Thomas F. Rosenbaum of the California Institute of Technology. "We look forward to moving ahead with this critical technology over the next few years."

In April, Rep. Schiff and 25 Members from California, Washington and Oregon sent a letter to the Appropriations Committee urging them to fully fund an earthquake early warning system. Schiff's letter requested additional funding for the Earthquake Hazards Program in USGS to kickstart the process of building out the early warning system so we can be ready for the next big quake.

# SEAN’S SHAMELESS REVIEWS:

Matt Kivel of the indie-pop band, Princeton veers off to another land with his sophomore solo record, “Days Of Being Wild.” Princeton specializes in 80s new wave with a heavy emphasis on synthesizers. Kivel’s solo work is much more grounded and gravitates toward nostalgia and melancholy in lyricism. He ventures into minimalistic indie rock with his acoustic guitar and the occasional mellow electric tunes. Drums are also apparent, which lacked on his first solo endeavor, “Double Exposure.” Kivel isn’t here to lead the charge or revolutionize the singer/songwriter performer. However, this different side of him in many ways outshines the glitz and glamour of his dance-infused pop band. The title seems more appropriately fitting for a Princeton album, but I assume the days of being wild are clearly a past diversion.

The new record is starkly beautiful and inviting. It will bring you in just enough to make you feel something you haven’t felt in quite awhile. No yelling or shouts here, just sweet whispers that have you leaning in closer. While some lyrics get lost under much reverb, I’ve always fancied such sounds. His gentle but raw vocals blend extremely well with both his lowbeat and uplifting melodies. “You and I Only” is blissful with sweet melodies and romantic lyrics to carry you off to another place and time. Kivel appears more focused with this effort. “Days Of Being Wild” is compacted and purposeful. It nearly flows effortlessly along. While many describe the sound as post-breakup, sulking in your bed type of music, I still found much of it to be enriching in a strange way. The reflective lyrics and lounge-y sound for most

of the tunes served me very well. One of the louder tunes, “Underwater,” showcases Kivel’s tensile croon. While the reverb masks some of the lyrics, the resonance is beyond gorgeous. “Blonde Boy” and “Waiving Goodbye” definitely slow down the already mellow album way too much. At fourteen tracks, those two easily could have been cut from the roster.

All in all, “Days Of Being Wild” entices, excites, mourns and echoes with nostalgia. It’s one of the better solo albums I’ve had the pleasure to hear in awhile. Kivel’s other personality (opposite of Princeton) is rather charming. The sophomore release improves exponentially over Kivel’s green debut. The sound palette has expands here, which equals a much more satisfying listening experience. The sense of loneliness may be there, but listening to this album could be just anyone’s cure.

With his mind on track and a definite purpose for this go around, Kivel dazzles and impresses much more than anticipated. In fact, “Days Of Being Wild” is one of the strongest releases this year not only in the realm of indie-acoustic-folk rock but in any soundscape.

**ENDURING COURAGE: ACE PILOT EDDIE RICKENBACKER AND THE DAWN OF THE AGE OF SPEED**  
by John F. Ross  
At the turn of the 20th century two new technologies, the car and airplane,took the nation’s imagination by storm as they burst into American life. The brave souls that leaped into these dangerous contraptions and pushed them to unexplored extremes became new American heroes: the race car driver and the flying ace. No individual did more to create and intensify these raw new roles than the tall, gangly Eddie Rickenbacker, who defied death over and over with such courage and pluck that a generation of Americans came to know his face better than the president’s. The son of poor, German-speaking Swiss immigrants in Columbus, Ohio, Rickenbacker overcame the specter of his father’s violent death, a debilitating handicap, and, later, accusations of being a German spy, to become the American military ace of aces in World War I and a Medal of Honor recipient. He and his comrades, created a new kind of aviation warfare, as they pushed their machines to the edge of destruction, and often over it, without parachutes, radios, or radar. He was an innovator on the racetrack, a skilled aerial dualist and squadron commander, and founder of Eastern Air Lines. Decades after his heroics against the Red Baron’s Flying Circus, he again showed a war-weary nation what it took to survive against nearly insurmountable odds when he and seven others endured a harrowing ordeal adrift without food or water in the Pacific during World War II.

**THE MOCKINGBIRD NEXT DOOR: LIFE WITH HARPER LEE**

To Kill a Mockingbird is one of the best loved novels of the 20th century. But for the last 50 years, the novel’s author, Harper Lee, has said almost nothing on the record. Journalists have trekked to her hometown of Monroeville, Alabama, where Harper Lee, known to her friends as Nelle, has lived with her sister, Alice, failing to get an interview with the author. But in 2001, the Lee sisters opened their



door to Chicago journalist Marja Mills. It was the beginning of a long conversation and a great friendship. In 2004, Mills moved into the house next door to the sisters. She spent the next eighteen months there.. Nelle shared her love of history, literature, and the Southern way of life. Nelle helped make sure she was getting the story and the South right. Alice shared the stories of their family. The Mockingbird Next Door is the story of Mills’s friendship with the Lee sisters. It is a testament to the great intelligence, sharp wit, and tremendous storytelling power of these two women, especially that of Nelle. Mills was given a rare opportunity to know Nelle Harper Lee, to be part of the Lees’ life , and to hear them reflect on their upbringing, their corner of the Deep South, how To Kill a Mockingbird affected their lives, and why Nelle Harper Lee chose to never write another novel.

**MR. PENUMBRA’S 24-HOUR BOOKSTORE: A NOVEL** by Robin Sloan  
This book was the Winner of the Alex Award, a finalist for the Los Angeles Times Book Prize for First Fiction, named a Best Book of the Year by NPR, Los Angeles Times, and San Francisco Chronicle. The Great Recession has shuffled Clay Jannon away from life as a San Francisco web-design drone and into the aisles of Mr. Penumbra’s 24-Hour Bookstore. But after a few days on the job, Clay discovers that the store is more curious than either its name or its gnomic owner might suggest. The customers are few, and they never seem to buy anything—instead, they “check out” large, obscure volumes from strange corners of the store. Suspicious, Clay engineers an analysis of the clientele’s behavior, seeking help from his variously talented friends. But when they bring their findings to Mr. Penumbra, they discover the bookstore’s secrets extend far beyond its walls. Rendered with irresistible brio and dazzling intelligence, Mr. Penumbra’s 24-Hour Bookstore is exactly what it sounds like: an establishment you have to enter and will never want to leave.

### Tips of the Trade: Real Estate Revealed

#### CRUNCHING THE NUMBERS

You recently read here about formulating your offer based on the information included in a CMA (Comparative Market Analysis). You can fine-tune that offer by applying current market trends. Trends may vary by region, state, city, and even the neighborhood, so do your homework.

You and your agent can study a lot of available statistics - the CMA, local listings' DOM (Days on Market), and list to sale price ratios. The CMA compares similar properties, while the DOM figure gives you an idea of whether you're looking at a buyer's market or a seller's market (in which you'll have more competition and less negotiating power). If possible, look at DOM for

listings within a mile of the home you want to purchase - it's that area-specific.

Let's move on to the average "List Price to Sales Price Ratio" (LP:SP). Like it sounds, it's simply a percentage based on how closely the final sales price corresponds to the price at which the home was listed. A house that sells for the asking price has an LP:SP ratio of 100%. So a house that lists for \$175,000 but sells for \$160,000 has an LP:SP of 91%.

Look at the these ratios for the homes on the CMA that most closely match yours, and you'll have a sound basis for what percentage of the list price to offer.

TIMING YOUR EMAIL CAMPAIGNS

When deciding on the best time to send an email campaign, consider 2 things:

1. Studies show the majority of emails are read within the first 4 hours after sent: Even though someone can save your email and open it later, most people don't. It's important to consider the time and day you send your emails. For example, if you market to Moms, avoid sending emails between 6am and 9am, Monday – Friday. Most Moms are busy taking kids to school, making lunches, etc. and don't have time to look at your email. Get to know your audience and play around with timing. You might do a split test and divide your email list in thirds and test different days and times to find your sweet spot. You can also use social media and listen to your audience to find out what's important to them and take note of when they are most active.

2. Is there a current event or holiday you can leverage: I like to follow the big boys and see how they leverage holidays and current events. For example, I think Papa Johns does a great job with their promotions. If the Lakers are playing, they will send out an email announcing the game and start time with a coupon for 50% off game day. What current events can you take advantage of that fit with the flavor of your brand? Think outside of the box. We know a fun restaurant downtown that runs a promotion on Elvis' birthday. Is there a quirky holiday you can play with?

## HOWARD Hays As I See It



*"Are folks more interested in politics or are they more interested in solving the problem?"*  
- President Barack Obama, upon arrival in Texas

I can't imagine condoning a loved one, a child, embarking on a hellish 1,500 mile journey with limited probability of survival. Nor can I put myself in the shoes of that 17-year-old girl I heard explaining through an interpreter and through tears how she made it from Honduras after her brother was killed for refusing to join a gang, and she herself was threatened with the same unless she agreed to join up and become their "property".

(San Pedro Sula in Honduras has the highest murder rate in the world at 193 per 100,000. In NYC it's 5.1.)

It's hard to pass judgment sitting home in Sierra Madre. But I can ask myself, as suggested by the president, if I'm one who's interested in the problem, or in simply playing politics.

I gave that some thought, and figured, "Well, yes and no."

To understand the problem, we need to be clear on what it's not. In Greg Welborn's column last week, he suggests it's a matter of "border security".

The current problem has nothing to do with "border security" (other than by having to divert personnel). Deportations by ICE at the border have increased every year since President Obama took office – from 134,451 in FY 2008 to 235,093 in FY 2013. A decreasing percentage of deportees have been children, with an increasing percentage being those with criminal records.

The thousands now making the trek to the Rio Grande Valley from Central America aren't trying to sneak through, but are readily turning themselves in to authorities. These aren't illegal border-crossers, but refugees.

Greg blames us for "enticing the world's masses with the promise of ample benefits upon arrival", though there's no evidence of any such "promise" playing a role. There's the 2008 law passed unanimously under Bush which guarantees a hearing before any deportation to those under 18 from places other than Canada and Mexico. The DREAM Act's come up in the debate, but that only affects those who grew up here, were educated here and who call here home.

For root causes you could go back thirty years when under Reagan we sunk \$5 billion into supporting the military and landowners in El Salvador – fueling a conflict that cost 75,000 lives, proportional to the number we lost in our own Civil War.

We could look to the streets of L.A., where kids displaced by that war came and established the Calle 18 and Mara Salvatrucha gangs. Later deported back to their home countries, they picked up where they left off – in a country awash with weapons bought with our \$5 billion.

Five years ago under President Obama, we stood aside as the democratically elected government of Honduras was overthrown by a military coup. The oligarchs felt threatened by advocates for higher wages and increased access to education – and by a people given hope. Honduras was the original "banana republic"; now, it's the most lethal one.

This problem has roots in events under Reagan, Bush and Obama. But for the politics, it's got to be all Obama's fault.

Greg complains the administration's \$3.7 billion proposal would "allocate not one thin dime to additional border security". What the president has chosen to do instead is address the problem, not the politics.

That \$3.7 billion includes: \$1.8 billion to HHS for care of children and refugees \$1.5 billion to the Dept. of Homeland Security for "detention and removal" of adults, extra pay for ICE and Border Patrol agents, the Border Enforcement Security Task Force, air surveillance and targeting immigrant smugglers \$300 million to the State Dept for "repatriation, strengthening foreign borders, addressing root causes of migration" and media campaigns in Mexico and Central America \$64 million to the Justice Dept for additional immigration judges and legal assistance

Some Republicans suggest cutting funds for the children and spending instead on National Guard troops (who couldn't stop or arrest anyone, anyway).

Others won't support anything, seeing this as not a problem for the nation but for President Obama, "who owns this problem and created this problem", according to Rep. Randy Weber (R-TX).

Sen. Richard Shelby (R-AL) suggests the cost "be offset from Obamacare."

(In the meantime, the House just passed the "bonus depreciation" corporate tax break, adding \$287 billion to our deficit over the next ten years.)

Greg assures that Conservatives "stand ready to negotiate a comprehensive solution", but can't find "reliable negotiating partners."

The president last December endorsed \$46.3 billion over ten years for border security, adding 20,000 Border Patrol agents with "24-hour surveillance" of border areas and 225 more judges to help with the backlog. This was part of the comprehensive immigration reform bill produced by "reliable negotiating partners" from both parties, which passed the Senate with bipartisan support.

It also appears to have majority support in the House. Rep. Donna Edwards (D-MD), however, said last week it's stalled because of opposition from eighteen Republicans, and Speaker John Boehner (R-OH) won't let it come to the floor for a vote. You can't risk having an accomplishment Democrats might campaign on in the mid-terms.

The 17-year-old mentioned above, through the translator and through tears, told how "kids are dying along the way; they drown, they're murdered" and "The only thing I would beg is, please give me a chance to stay here, so I can fulfill my dreams, so I can take care of my family."

In a Times story, 800 volunteers in McAllen, Texas have served some 3,000 immigrants at their "hastily organized" immigrant relief center. Food donations have overflowed "in a region where many residents live in shacks and trailers without electricity".

Then there were the several dozen in Murrieta banging on buses carrying women and children, shouting "Send them back!", spitting at counter-protesters and forcing the buses back to San Ysidro.

This doesn't solve any problems. It isn't politics, either. It's just shameful.

### HERE WE GO, AGAIN!



The world stands on the brink of yet another war between Israel and the Palestinians. The accepted wisdom is that the Jews have once again pricked their neighbors and ignited the powder keg. But, is it really just a matter of the Jews behaving themselves and dealing fairly with their neighbors? If only the Jews would give up some land – see the legitimacy in the Palestinian cause. The problem with this scenario is that it assumes the Palestinian cause is simply to obtain a homeland for themselves and to then live peacefully with their neighbors. Were that the true Palestinian cause, we would have had peace long ago.

It is beyond ironic that the accepted wisdom retains credibility at a time when Israel's coalition government has openly accepted the recognition of a Palestinian state. Israeli opinion has moved over the years to the point where there is a strong national consensus for a two-state solution. In fact, Benjamin Netanyahu became the first prime minister to agree to a settlement freeze.

Netanyahu froze settlements for 10 months, inviting Mahmoud Abbas, Chairman of the PLO, to negotiate the border lines, terms and conditions. Abbas boycotted the talks for 9 of those months, showed up in the 10th, and then walked out when the freeze expired. That's not good faith, but it is consistent with the long history of Palestinian actions.

In 2000 at the Camp David meetings, Israeli Prime Minister, Ehud Barak, offered Yasser Arafat a Palestinian state including the unthinkable – the division of Jerusalem. Arafat refused without any counter offer, returned home and then launched a terror campaign which cost 1,000+ Israeli lives.

In 2001, the Clinton administration negotiated an even better deal for Palestinians. Both sides needed to swallow hard and release long-held demands. The Jews did; Arafat did not. Again, the Palestinians walked away from their "cause".

In 2005, Israel was actually convinced to give up Gaza. They withdrew all forces, dismantled 21 settlements and forcibly evicted 9,000 of their own citizenry from those settlements. This was then followed by a 2008 Israeli offer to give up 100% of the West Bank, acknowledge Palestinian statehood, and again divide Jerusalem. The Palestinian response? A steady increase in Palestinian rocket attacks on Israel.

An honest observer can see that the Palestinians have repeatedly been offered success for their "cause": land, statehood, and an equal claim to Jerusalem. Each time, they have rejected the solution because each time the solution didn't address their true cause. Each offer contained in it a requirement that the Palestinians accept Israel's right to exist. Each offer was meant to be a final peace, but the Palestinians have no interest in a final peace; they have no interest in allowing a Jewish state to exist.

Land for peace was the basis for peace with Egypt; it was the basis for peace in Jordan. In both cases, Arab leadership had a real interest in peace, accepted fair deals and, at least to date, has honored the agreements. Not so with the Palestinians. Palestinians are animated by a hatred which knows few boundaries, and that hatred is nurtured by both Hamas and PLO leadership which are united in a visceral hatred of Israel and will take any excuse to translate that hatred from ugly words ("pigs", "apes", "rabid dogs", "non-humans") into real sticks and stones (literally thousands of rockets).

This time around Hamas jumped on the murder of a Palestinian teenager. The murder of any person, especially a child, is a gruesome act and warrants an appropriate response. But waging a war is not an appropriate response by any stretch of domestic or international law, or even of a properly tethered imagination. First of all, the Palestinian's murder was in response to the Palestinian murder of 3 Jewish youths. That is NOT justification, only context. If murder is a legitimate cause for war, then Israel is 3-times more justified in warring against Palestinians. More telling, the different public responses to these murders reside on unequal moral planes. Israeli citizens, Jewish authorities and leading Rabbis have all condemned the murder of the Palestinian – several of the Rabbis calling for the death sentence. The response among Palestinians to the kidnapping and murder of the 3 Jewish youths was celebration. The mother of one of the Palestinian suspects commented that "if he did the kidnapping, I'll be proud of him", while the mother of another Palestinian terrorist celebrated the "martyrdom operation" which cost her son his life.

What kind of people celebrate the purposeful murder of innocents? What type of people celebrate the death of their own child, who was trying to kill and maim hundreds, if not thousands, in his "martyrdom operation"? The answer is, not people who truly want peace or with whom you can negotiate peace in good faith.

So what's left for Israel to do? Sadly, if Israel wants a fair, lasting, "final" peace, it's going to have to attack the root cause of war. That is not Jewish settlements or any amount or location of land. Israel will have to destroy Hamas as a viable political entity and as a military power even in the face of the inevitable calls for restraint or proportionate response. This does not mean the purposeful targeting of citizens – even the accidental killing of whom Israel takes great pain to avoid. Even now, Israel is warning citizens of Hamas to leave the area. This is what a great moral power does. Putting military targets next to school yards, hospitals and residential areas – as Hamas routinely does – is what a cowardly and evil power does.

The world will be better off if the Jews will wage this war until Hamas is destroyed. Secondly to that, the region will achieve long-term peace when Arabs of all political and religious affiliations come to recognize Israel's right to exist. When that happens, peace will happen.

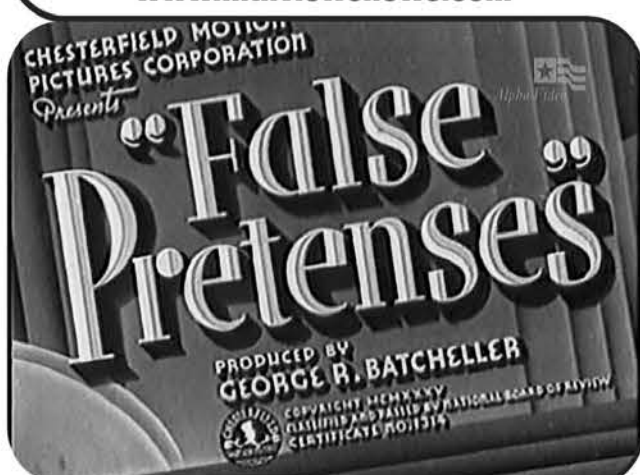
