THE LIFE AND WILD TIMES OF AVIATRIX PANCHO BARNES

On Thursday evening March 19th, the Sierra Madre Historical Preservation Society will be presenting historian and raconteur Terry Terrell's talk and slide show on aviatrix and all-around character Pancho Barnes. Born Florence Leontine Lowe in 1901 in Pasadena, she was the granddaughter of Thaddeus Lowe of Mount Lowe Railway fame, and was the daughter of Pasadena wealth, brought up in a mansion in San Marino.

A real handful, a wild tomboy, she would go on to ride horses in the early movies, and later, when she took up flying, she would pilot for the movies as well. But that was just the beginning. Over the course of her lifetime (during which she would go broke four times), she would go on to be a rum-runner, a minister's wife, an adventurer, a record-setting air racer, a composer, a union organizer, a barnstormer, and, most famously, a saloon keeper in her legendary Happy Bottom Flying Club up near Lancaster, where she entertained her Hollywood friends and the test pilots from what would become Edwards Air Force Base. Among those pilots were Chuck Yeager and Buzz Aldrin, and their good times there, as well as Pancho Barnes's colorful personality, were memorialized in the movie *The Right Stuff*.

Larry Torres Wins Seat On Pasadena Unified School Board

When the votes were tallied Tuesday evening, Educator Larry Torres had gained 57.5% of the vote to win his first foray into elected politics. He will serve as the PUSD representative for Sierra Madre in District 6.

He defeated his opponent, Sandra Siriganian who was able to capture 42.4% of the votes.

Torres survived a number of negative attacks via mailer and during at least one forum.

He will be the first elected representative for the newly created district and has promised to focus on Children and the Community.

Mayor Harabedian Delivers The State of The City Reminding

Residents of the Challenges In Sierra Madre's Future

Just two days after the election, Mayor Harabedian gave his State of the City Address reminding those in attendance of the council's top three priorities: Sierra Madre's Water Crisis, Development Issues and The Budget.

He complimented all the members of the council on how well they were working together in order to find solutions to the city's problems, building consensus despite their differences of opinion.

He also complimented the Preserve Sierra Madre grassroots organization for their efforts to help maintain Sierra Madre as the Foothill Village it is today.

The event was opened with presentations by St. Rita's Girls Scouts and Choir.

TURF REMOVAL REBATE PROGRAM

There is still funding for the Turf Removal Rebate Program! Property owners may be eligible to receive a rebate of \$1.00 per square foot of turf that is removed. The maximum rebate is \$1,000 per property owner.

Applications are available at City Hall, and applications will be processed on a "first come, first served basis." There is a total of \$48,000 in grant funds available. To be eligible, rebates are only available for turf removed from private property yard areas visible from the street. Rebates do not apply to parkways or backyards. The rebates are not retroactive, meaning that the program does not apply to properties where turf has already been removed. There are additional regulations, which are available in full at City Hall and on the City's website.

Applications are available on the City's website at www.cityofsierramadre.com, but applications must be submitted in person to City Hall. Emailed or faxed applications will not be accepted.

Walking Sierra Madre...The Social Side

*"Of Wistaria blooms, I caught sight, today,
And ever since as violet of the deepest hue,
My passion, grows ever more profound!" Ise*

That pretty much says it all. Walking Sierra Madre this week, gearing up for the Festival this weekend, we've noticed, my horticultural expert walking buddy, John, and I, that the wistaria this year all over town is spectacular and the Vine should be absolutely amazing. Don't know if it's more rain or warmer days, but we saw a wistaria on Laurel today that was beyond beautiful and I hope they took a picture of it. It's all over town, just keep an eye peeled for those lovely purple blossoms.

This weekend's activities look to be a lot of fun. The music should be great, too. How can you miss with bands like The Gem City Jazz Cats and Chico's Bail Bonds! This year we're adding a vintage auto show. I love looking at those pampered beauties which have been restored beyond their wildest dreams.

We don't know about you, but Daylight Shifting Time last Sunday took the starch out of us for a couple of days. This is one of those concepts that has definitely outlived its usefulness. Did you know there are more auto accidents right after Daylight Shifting time than usual. Could it be because drivers are crankier than usual and a little off their game, too. Apparently, it was Benjamin Franklin's original idea to save on candles. Probably needed something to fill up a blank spot in "Poor Richard's Almanac."

How did your daffodils do this year? Ours were a little disappointing...well, a lot disappointing, as they put up the usual stalks but produced few flowers. The Dutch Iris, however, are looking like they're planning to give us a bumper crop.

St. Patrick's Day is next week, March 17th, which reminded me of a really splendid family of folk singers, The Galligans, we knew a few years ago, who made an amazing Irish Soda Bread.

You might give it a try to go along with your corned beef and cabbage...

Put 3 cups of flour in a bowl with 1 TB. of baking powder, 1 tsp. baking soda, 1 tsp. salt.

Blend in 4 TB. of soft butter, add 1 TB caraway seeds, 1 cup of currants, 1 cup dark raisins, 1 cup golden raisins. Mix!

Then add ¾ cup of sugar, one beaten egg and 2 cups of buttermilk. (As few of us have 2 cups of buttermilk lounging around in our fridge, try this: 1 TB of white vinegar per cup of milk. Measure the vinegar into the cup then add the milk to get a correct measurement. Let it sit for about 10 minutes and...voila! buttermilk.)

Pour into a greased iron skillet or loaf pan. Bake 10 minutes at 400 degrees then 45 minutes at 350 degrees. Test with toothpick in the center for doneness. Let it cool a bit, spread with butter and enjoy. As Jim Galligan says on his recipe, "Grandma Galligan made it this way in Ireland, County Armagh, many years ago." He never said, "Faith and Begorra!" and probably nobody else Irish does either, but he was a fine singer and this is really good bread. Happy St. Patrick's Day!

We are going to have such great weather for the Wistaria Festival this Sunday. Be sure you plan your day to be there. We're going to check out the music, the Art & Garden Faire and the Vintage Cars. Sorry to see that Sierra Brigante is closed for remodeling so we won't be sitting out on their lovely patio enjoying a snack, a glass of something, and a spectacular view of our own personal mountains.

Did you know we have one of those curbside libraries where you can take a book and leave a book? They're called Little Free Libraries and we admired ours this morning. This is such a fantastic thing to do. It's on Laurel, if you need a book or can give a book. Their selection was excellent, btw.

Sierra Madre Police Blotter

During the week of Sunday, March 1st, to Sunday, March 8th, the Sierra Madre Police Department responded to approximately 390 calls for service.

Tuesday, March 3rd

At 9:25 am, Sierra Madre Police responded to the station lobby regarding a suspicious incident that had occurred on her residence on the 300 Block of North Baldwin Avenue. The victim informed Officers that on February 28th, between the hours of 6:00 and 7:00 pm, she left her apartment to go to the laundry facility within the apartment complex. The victim stated she left her front door open with the screen door closed but not locked. She returned a few minutes later and discovered her front door closed with the deadbolt locked and the blinds on the front door drawn. The victim looked between the blinds of the front door and saw her back door was open, which was closed and locked prior to her leaving the apartment. Nothing appeared to be missing from the apartment and she never saw anyone enter or leave the area of her apartment. This case has been forwarded to the Detectives Bureau.

Wednesday, March 4th

At 10:18 am, Sierra Madre Police responded to the station lobby regarding an identity theft report. The victim informed Officers that the night before, she attempted to file her income tax online using an online software. During the process, she received an alert from the software which informed the victim that her social security number had already been used in an income tax return. This case has been forwarded to the Detectives Bureau.

Saturday, March 7th

At 5:50 am, Sierra Madre Police responded to the 400 Block of West Highland Avenue regarding a vehicle burglary. The victim informed Officers that earlier that morning while he was getting ready to leave for work, he noticed the driver side panel of his work utility truck was open. The victim inspected the panel and discovered several of his tools were missing. Upon inspection, Officers discovered the metal hooks to keep the panels in place were bent and appeared to be damaged to gain access to the interior. Fortunately, the victim had a working security camera and recorded the incident. The video displayed a newer model dark colored sedan drive past his residence, then come back a short time later and park in front of the driveway. Two male subjects exit the vehicle, wearing grey sweatshirts and jeans,

and approach the driver's side panel. The suspects gain access to the panels and remove the tools and flee in the dark colors sedan. Estimated loss was totaled at around \$1800. This case has been forwarded to the Detectives Bureau.

At 9:11 am, Sierra Madre Police responded to the 600 Block of Valle Vista Dr. regarding a theft report. The victims informed Officers that they went out to their vehicle earlier that morning and discovered the rear passenger door was open. Upon further inspection, the victims noticed various small items were missing from the vehicle, along with petty cash and coins. The husband stated the last person to use the vehicle was his wife, who often forgets to lock the vehicle. The estimated loss was totaled to be less than \$50. This case has been forwarded to the Detectives Bureau.

At 1:00 pm, Sierra Madre Police responded to the 2100 Block of Santa Anita Ave. regarding a theft report. The victim informed Officers that earlier that day, she came out to her vehicle which was parked in her driveway, and noticed the front left door and trunk door were open. Upon further inspection, the victim discovered her car had been rummaged through with the contents of her glove compartment being strewn all over the vehicle. Other than a \$5 dollar bill, nothing more from the vehicle appeared to be missing. The victim informed Officers that she never locks her vehicle doors, as there were no signs for forced entry. This case has been forwarded to the Detectives Bureau.

Sunday, March 8th

At 2:40 pm, Sierra Madre Police to the 200 Block of North Hermosa Ave. regarding a residential burglary. The victim informed Officers that they were contacted by the fumigation company that was working on their house, after the workers discovered two tears in the tarp covering the home, with the both the front and back door left open. During the Officer's investigation, it appeared the suspect(s) entered the home by tearing the tarp and gaining access through a back door. The suspect(s) ransacked several rooms stealing various items including jewelry. The suspect(s) then tore a second hole and exited the home through the front door. Current estimation of loss is totaled to about \$1,000. A more detailed investigation will occur once the pesticide is cleared from the home. This case has been forwarded to the Detectives Bureau.

How can I get the paper delivered to my home?

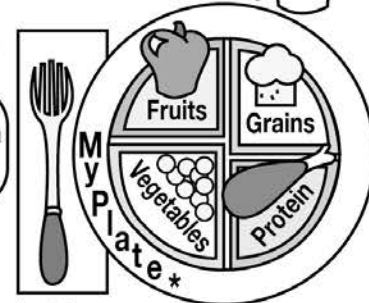

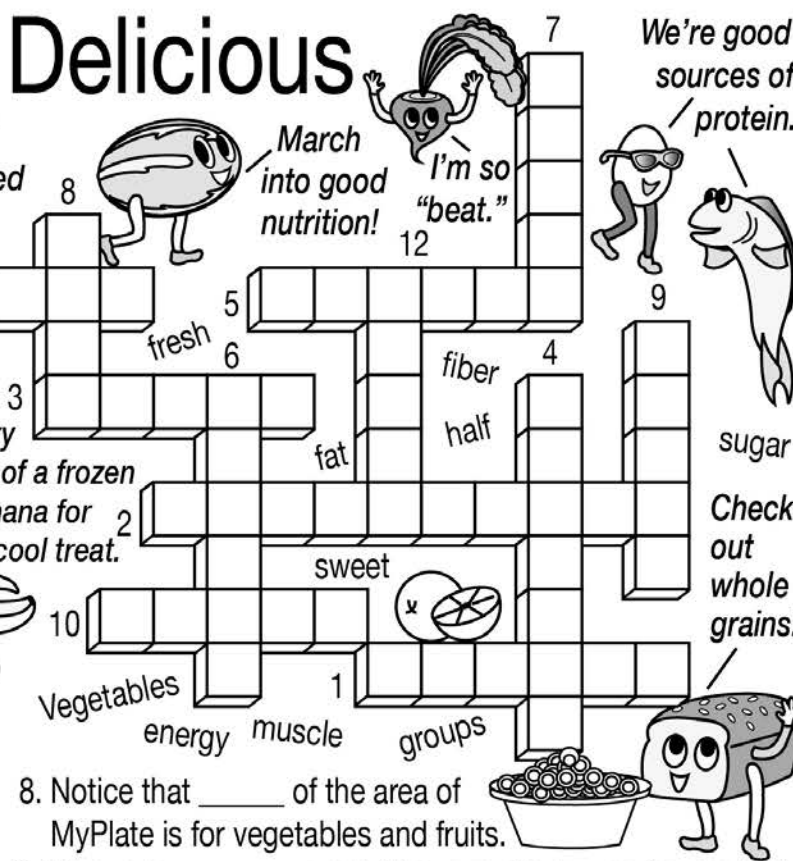

CANDIDATES TO FACE APRIL RUNOFF

None of the candidates vying for Pasadena mayor, or candidates running for the vacated district 1 city council seat, got enough votes Tuesday night to outright win, sending the mayoral race into a run-off April 21 between Vice Mayor Jacquie Robinson and District 7 Councilmember Terry Tornek.

Tornek received 4,814 votes giving him 37.1 percent. Robinson took in fewer votes with 3,931 or 30.3 percent. Candidates needed 50 percent plus one vote to win without

facing a run-off.

"Sometimes you have to run when the opportunity is there, so being Vice Mayor, name recognition, I'm quite proud of the record I have made over the last eight years, so I decided to make a run for it," Robinson said about giving up her council seat to run for mayor. "Eight years is a very respectful amount of time to serve on the city council, so whatever voters decide in the upcoming weeks, I'm okay with it."

Tornek said during his campaign, the main concern Pasadena residents have is the city's budget.

"I think, all across the city, the top issues that seem to surface, are issues having to do with the city's financial strength and programing its able to provide, services it's able to provide," He said. "There is a lot of interest in making sure that the public schools are first rate and that we continue to make progress with regard to the PUSD."

Tyron Hampton came close to winning the district 1 city council seat with 46.1 percent, taking in 879 votes. He will face former Fire Chief Calvin Wells

who took in 459 votes giving him 24.1 percent. Hampton is currently a Pasadena school board member.

"There is a grave concern about fiscal responsibility and stability going forward, particularly given the recent embezzlement issue that has come to light," Wells said adding that public safety is also on the minds of everyone. Wells served 35 years in the Pasadena Fire Department, three as the department's chief.

Hampton said he was honored that the community has shown him a high level of support, "It looks like our community has been waiting for some energetic representation that's going to bring positive change to Northwest Pasadena, and it looks like I happen to be that guy."

Councilmembers Steve Madison, Margaret McAustin and Gene Masuda all ran unopposed and were re-elected.

Of the drugs, marijuana was most prevalent, at 7.4 percent, slightly more than alcohol.

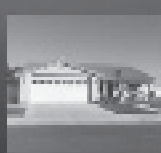

POP IS POPPING AND A CAB FOR THE AGES!!

Have you ever heard the term “oaky” or “buttery” to describe certain wines? Sure you have. Many years ago clay pots were used to store wine. As transportation developed it was discovered that closed wooden barrels were more solid and could be moved around like a wheel, so beer and wine were stored and transported in wooden barrels. The beer and wine makers realized that this storage benefited their product with extra flavors. It was also discovered that the barrels lose their flavor just after a few years, thus becoming neutral. Those barrels are still used today and are less expensive to use as the oxygen still helps soften the wine and adds no tannins. One wine that has benefited from this process is the 2011 Freemark Abbey Cabernet Sauvignon.

Started over 130 years ago and recently (2005) purchased by the Jackson Family Estates, I first came across Freemark Abbey Chardonnay while working my way through college at Jurgensen's Grocery Store. I have referred many times to that part of my life, and I am always happy to see wines that have lasted the test of time. Freemark Abbey Cabernet, like many cabs, has a ruby red color. The aroma and first taste are very generous with the fruit, and the finish has a hint of spice, cinnamon, and yes, oak flavor (glad you read my first paragraph now aren't you!). If this Napa gem winery has been off your radar, put it back. The 2011 cabernet is a full body wine, a touch sweet, and can be drunk now - or buy two, one for now, one for later. My food pairing recommendation would be roasted brussel sprouts, braised short ribs, and a scoop of Vanilla ice cream. Retail for about \$40 on sale for \$33 for smart shoppers at your local Vons or Pavilions

SAVOR THE FLAVOR TEA TALK

All tea comes from the same plant: Camellia sinensis. How the tea is processed determines what type it will become.

There are four major types of tea - green, oolong, black and black scented. This ignores, of course, the growing variety of herbal, floral and spice combination teas. In general, tea-growing estates and gardens employ a single style of processing which is largely dictated by geography, including altitude, moisture level and farming practices.

Tea grows fastest at about 6,500 feet above sea level in sandy or clay soil. The climate needs to be hot and moist--80 to 150 inches of rain annually with high humidity and fog. Tea also grows at higher elevations and in shaded areas, but at a much slower rate. This climactic change also produces a more intensely flavored tea.



Beyond the usual preparation of hot and cold beverages, tea's unique properties lend themselves to a broad array of applications: tea can be an infusion to thin down or flavor another liquid; it can substitute for oil or other liquids in cooking and baking; as a marinade or braising liquid; powdered as a flavoring for foods or as a coating or rub; whole leaves can be used for smoking other foods; tea can also be used as a coloring agent and fresh or dried leaves can serve as a decorative garnish. (Excerpt from The Tea Cookbook by Joanna Preuss and John Harney)

Here's a great recipe as an example: Tea Spiced Pecans

3/4 lb. Pecan halves
 1 tsp. Vegetable oil
 1 Egg white
 1/4 c. Sugar
 2 Tbsp. Hot Cinnamon Spice Tea, finely ground (available at Savor the Flavor)
 1/2 tsp. Salt

Preheat oven to 350 F. oil a large baking pan or cookie sheet
 Beat egg white in a deep bowl until frothy. In a separate bowl, combine sugar, tea and salt. Add the pecans to the egg white, turning slowly. Transfer sugar, tea and salt mixture and toss to cover evenly. Spread nuts evenly over baking pan and bake for 15 minutes. Remove and turn nuts with a spatula until cool. Store in an air tight container.

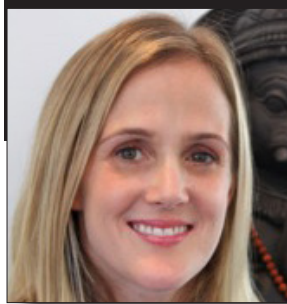

THE JOY OF YOGA WHAT'S AN ADVANCED PRACTICE?

I often hear yogis say they want an advanced practice. Some will say after class, "That was a great class, but it was too mellow for me." Another said, "Oh no, I won't take a beginning class, I practice at an advanced level." This brings a question to mind: What is an advanced practice?

In yoga, there are internal practices and external practices. The external practice is our lovely, strong and beautiful asana practice. Service to others, or karma yoga, would be an external practice. Internal practices include meditation, mantra, most pranayama and energetic techniques.

Believe it or not, it's the internal practices that are the most challenging! One of the most advanced practices is achieving the balance of Sukha & Sthira, or ease & steadiness (we've talked

about this before). Applying these principles in an asana practice, and later into life, can prove to be incredibly challenging. It's difficult for the hard-driving person to soften and conversely, the easy-going kind to become unwavering. Many advanced practices lie in our meditations. Through this internal work, we heal, grow and become empowered.

It's interesting to look at our yoga practice from this perspective. Devoting time and effort to the internal practices as well as the external motivates spiritual growth and deepens the experience. The answers and healing we need come from within and are no longer outside of us. Can you believe some of the most adept yogis and gurus never even did an asana practice?

I DO IT TWICE A DAY FOR HEALTH!



Dr. Tina is a traditional naturopath and nutritionist at Vibrant Living Wellness Center

Every day, my husband and I get up at 5:20 am and go for a walk. We do about 30 minutes in the morning and then again after work for about 15-20 minutes. We've done this long enough that this is now routine.

By design, humans were meant to walk. Unfortunately as we have advanced in some areas we have gone backwards in others. We have come up with

so many advances to move us places faster but we are actually moving less. One of the biggest problem I see in my practice is chronic sitting. Sitting can actually be akin to smoking because it raises your risk of an early death from poor health regardless of your fitness and other lifestyle habits. Frequent, prolonged sitting whether it is at work, commuting, or watching TV at night, significantly impacts your heart and circulation health as well as your metabolic function.

WE ALL JUST NEED TO MOVE MORE! Once in a while my husband or I sleep funny and when we wake, our back hurts. You may think this isn't a good time to walk... wrong. We've found that sticking with our normal walk helps the pain go away. It's

better to get out and MOVE!

I recommend to all my clients to limit sitting as much as possible. I know it can be difficult with some of the jobs people have but you can be creative and find ways to move. Most studies recommend sitting less than 3 hours a day. This means you have to make it a priority to walk more. I suggest aiming for 7,000 to 10,000 steps per day.

My husband has an office job and wears an activity tracker that vibrates when he doesn't move enough in an hour. He's found some easy ways to move more. He takes conference calls on a speaker phone and stands up and moves about the office. He'll take some calls on his cell phone while going for a walk outside. Sometimes, he just gets up and goes for a 10 minute walk outside. No one will miss you for 10 minutes... they may think you're just on a bathroom break!

Bear in mind that this walking is in addition to any regular fitness regimen you already have, not in place of it. My clients find that tracking their steps allows them to see how simple changes to their routine can add many steps to their day. It also holds them accountable, allowing them to see when they are falling short of their goal. Here are some examples of how you can add steps to your day:

- Stand or pace your office while on the phone at work
- Take the stairs instead of an elevator whenever possible
- Park your car in the space farthest away from the entrance of your destination
- Take a walk at lunch

Studies show that people who walk more reduce their risk of heart disease and diabetes. They sleep longer and have better restorative sleep. Walking is one of the easiest forms of exercise. No matter what your age or fitness level, walking more can improve your health.

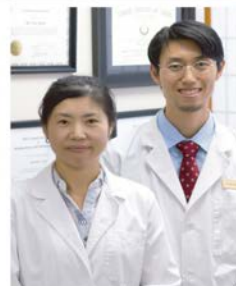

Handy Aids For Achy Hands

Dear Savvy Senior:

What products can you recommend for seniors with hand arthritis? I really struggle with anything that requires gripping and turning, which makes most activities difficult. Gripless Joan

Dear Joan:

There are literally hundreds of different arthritis aids and other products on the market today that can help people with arthritic hands and carpal tunnel syndrome.

To find out which devices can best benefit you, a good place to start is to ask your doctor for a referral to an occupational therapist, who can test the strength and functionality of your hands and recommend appropriate aids. With that said, here's a rundown of some helpful products for different needs.

Kitchen aids: Activities like gripping cooking utensils, cutting and chopping, opening jars and cans, and moving around heavy pots and pans can make preparing a meal much more difficult when you have hand arthritis.

Some products that can help are Oxo Good Grips, which makes dozens of soft, large-handle cooking, baking and cleaning utensils that are easier to grip. And for cutting and chopping the Dexter DuoGlide and Ergo Chef knives are excellent ergonomically designed options.

For opening jars, the wall-mounted or under-counter mounted Zim Jar Opener is a top manual opener. It has a V-shaped grip that holds the lid as you twist the jar with both hands. Some other good options are the Hamilton Beach Open Ease Automatic Jar Opener, and a nifty tool called the JarPop that pops the seal on jars so lids can be removed easier.

For opening cans, an electric can opener is the best option. West Bend and Hamilton Beach make some of the best.

And if you're interested in arthritis-friendly pots and pans, look for lightweight cookware that has two handles. These are much easier to lift and move around.

Household helpers: Turning doorknobs, key locks, twist-handles on kitchen or bathroom faucets, and twist-on lamp switches can also be difficult. To help, there are doorknob lever adapters, key turners,



lamp switch enlargers, and lever handles for faucets that provide leverage for easier turning.

Personal care: Squeezing a shampoo bottle or a tube of toothpaste, or gripping a bar of soap, a toothbrush handle or even a piece of dental floss can make grooming a challenge. Solutions include a wall-mounted soap, shampoo and toothpaste dispenser, which provides easy access to suds. And for brushing and flossing, there are wide-handled, electric toothbrushes and flossers that vibrate or spin to do the cleaning for you.

Easier dressing: Fastening buttons, pulling zippers and tying shoelaces can also present problems. To help with these chores there are buttonhooks and zipper pulls, and elastic shoelaces, which transform lace-ups into slip-ons.

Reading, writing and computing: Holding and turning the pages of a book, hand writing and using a computer mouse can also stress arthritic hands.

For readers, an eReader like a Kindle or Nook is recommended because they're lightweight and easier to hold than regular books. For writing, there's the soft rubber Pencil Grip that fits on pencils and pens, and ergonomic-shaped pens like the Pen Again that reduce hand fatigue. And for easier computing, the 3M Ergonomic Mouse and Contour Roller Mouse can eliminate hand and wrist stress.

Hobby helpers: There are dozens of arthritis aids for hobbies too. For example, there are automatic card shufflers and cardholders for card players. If you like to paint, knit or crochet, there are ergonomic paintbrushes, and oversized knitting needles and crochet hooks that are easier to hold. And for sewing, quilting or crafting, there are tools like Fiskars self-opening Easy Action Scissors that spring open for easier cutting.

As you probably guessed, organic foods aren't usually on sale along with the Velveeta "cheese" and Hamburger Helper for "just \$1.99!" Somewhere along

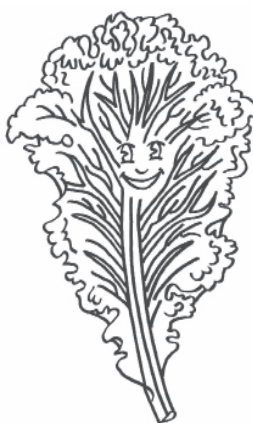

Learning from the Heart of a Horse

When I was a kid, I begged my parents to let me have a horse. We had domestic pets along with a back yard full of chickens and rabbits, and I often went to the local barn to ride my friend's horse, but my lifetime dream was to have a horse of my own. My parents were missionaries, so we weren't exactly in the financial position to become horse owners, but my hope sprang eternal!

When I think back on those days growing up as the "baby" in a family of seven with limited monetary resources, I find it interesting that I never noticed we were poor. I suppose it didn't matter because we had everything we needed, and most importantly we were rich in love. My mother sewed most of our clothes, my father did all the yard work and home improvements, and we kids were expected to do chores for our weekly allowances. Maybe that's why money never seemed important to me as a kid, and it still isn't important to me as an adult. My parents taught me to be content with what I have, and for that I am grateful.

When I turned thirteen, my father finally broke down and bought me a pony. Unbeknownst to me, he had been watching the classifieds in the local newspaper for quite some time, hoping to find a horse that we could afford. He finally came across a Welsh pony for sale at a nearby farm and surprised me with it on my birthday. He paid \$75 for "Coco", and even at that price, I know my dad was going out of his way to accommodate my burning desire to have my own horse.

Coco came with nothing more than a halter and lead rope, so I learned very quickly to ride bareback and handle him without the force of a bit and bridle. My sister, Vicki and I had so much fun doubling up on Coco and traipsing about the rural areas close to our neighborhood, riding on the local mountain trails and playing in the back woodlands surrounding our town. Those are some of the best memories of my life and I wouldn't trade them for anything.

When I realized how much responsibility went into owning a pony, it was a rude awakening for me. Every day after school, I had to go out and find Coco in the field, rope him and bring him back to the barn, groom him, clean out his stall, feed him, and let him rest a while before I could finally enjoy the fun of taking him out for a ride. Coco was a bit of

a curmudgeon, so it was a challenge to ride him at times. If he preferred to stay inside the fenced area that day, he often got his way at first. It took me a while to convince him that I was "in charge", and I'm not real sure if I ever was!

I later learned that Welsh ponies are known to be headstrong, so they require a lot of patience and loving discipline to help keep them in line. According to my memory, I suppose I did OK working with Coco, considering he was my first pony and I had little previous experience with horsemanship. I bonded with him immediately, which made it easier to be patient and understanding when he tried to buck or bolt. Little by little the two of us learned what to expect from each other and eventually we established a close relationship based on mutual respect.

Caring for Coco and learning about his way of thinking was such an important part of my teenage years. My folks used a good balance of encouragement and discipline in raising us kids, and I was lucky enough to have had an excellent education, but there is nothing like working with a horse to teach a person how to live gracefully. A few years later, after graduating from high school I bought a beautiful registered appaloosa named Charity and my education for living, taught from the heart of a horse, continued.

All these memories flooded back to me after watching a documentary entitled "BUCK", a biopic focused on the life of a gentleman named Buck Brannaman, who inspired the story behind the film, "Horse Whisperer". I remember seeing "Horse Whisperer" when it first came out and being very impressed and emotionally affected by the story, but until I watched the 'Buck' documentary, I had no idea "Horse Whisperer" was based on a real life character.

The film is about a man who has a unique ability to communicate with horses, and he uses that ability to train and handle them in a very calm and humane manner. Ultimately, the character in the film succeeds in bringing new life to not only his equine subjects, but to the humans involved as well. It was such a heart-warming story and it validated what I always believed to be true about the relationship we humans can have with animals. If we are willing to take the time to understand the mind and heart of other species, we are far more apt to succeed in living our lives with grace and dignity.

Many lessons in life are learned while sitting in a classroom with printed curriculum and constant correction, but some of the most important lessons can only be learned by spending time in a dusty field under an open sky with beautiful beasts who have ages of knowledge to share with those who show them due respect. If we have the desire to learn, and the patience to be silent and listen with an open mind, we are sure to benefit greatly from what horses have to teach us. I am on a constant quest to learn from the animals, and I will always appreciate the age-old knowledge I gained from my two equine friends, Coco and Charity. . . knowledge that can come only from the heart of a horse.

Andre would make a great companion who does not demand a lot of attention to keep him happy. A nice shady yard, a few easy walks, and a soft bed at night near his family would be a good life for him. Please consider giving this beautiful senior boy the loving

home he deserves for his retirement years.

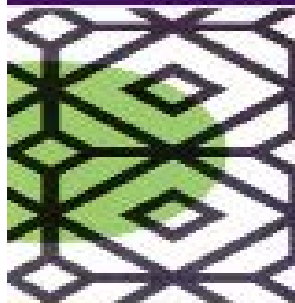

The Wistaria Vine

Celebrating Sierra Madre’s Most Well Known Landmark

The Vine

Sierra Madre’s121-Year Old Wistaria* Vine By Phyllis Chapman

In 1894, William and Alice Brugman purchased a home on what was then called Piedmont, which is now called W. Carter Ave. The house had been built one year before by builder Amos Trussell for his daughter Winona and son-in-law Edward B. Jones when they married. It was the first wedding celebrated in early Sierra Madre.

The Trussells and the Jones had a change of plans, sold to the Brugmans and moved away. To enhance her new home, Alice Brugman and her neighbor Mrs. W. B. Crisp, drove by horse and buggy to the R. H. Wilson Pioneer Nursery in Monrovia and for \$.75 purchased a gallon can of wistaria. It was the Chinese Wistaria variety (Wisteria sinensis). She planted it in a corner of her front porch remarking to her neighbor: “They say Wistaria grows fast.” And grow it did.

Mr. Brugman, a mining engineer, was in Mexico when the vine was planted. He died in 1899 and Mrs. Brugman sold the home in 1906. The property changed hands until it was purchased in 1913 by Henry T. and Estelle Fennel. Mr. Fennel, who was a bit of a horticulturist, loved the vine, and gave it devoted care, even building support trellises.

Although the Wistaria is a vigorous grower, the added support of the trellises may have contributed to this vine’s phenomenal growth. The arbors prevented the end tendrils from hanging down and causing the tender terminal buds to die from the added weight. Wistaria requires good drainage, certainly provided by this hilly, terraced location. There may also be an underground spring providing water to the tap root.

The vine eventually destroyed the original home, growing into the walls and fireplace and causing the roof to collapse. Mr. Fennel built a new home 200 feet to the north (the present upper home) and trained the vine to grow up to, but not covering the new residence. A portion of the foundation of that original home was saved to continue to provide support for the vine as its branches extended such a distance.

When the vine was in bloom, the Fennels would invite friends to come and enjoy the blossoming plant. Visitors also came from Pasadena’s main hotels: The Green, The Huntington, and The Raymond. In 1918, the Fennels opened the vine to the Sierra Madre Chapter of the American Red Cross, which sponsored a very successful fundraiser to help the war effort. 12,000 people attended the event. This was the beginning of many Wistaria festivals that took place year after year. Sierra Madre became known as the Wistaria City. Many local organizations, including the Board of Trade (now the Chamber of Commerce), the Woman’s Club, the Masons and Eastern Star, the Sierra Madre Volunteer Fire Dept., etc. were involved.

Many homemade items, fancy work, ceramics, artwork, gift books, and Wistaria fragrancd perfume, hand lotion and bath salts were sold at booths under the vine. Luncheons and teas were served, often with young Japanese women wearing their kimonos.

The hard work and money earned at the vine by the Woman’s Club paid off the mortgage of their first clubhouse. One year the Fire Dept. parked 30,000 cars on the parking lot that existed in Floral Canyon. (This is now Sierra Meadow Dr.). Easter sunrise services were among vine activities. People came from all over the world and extra street cars were added to handle the crowds. Among the famous were Fritz Kreisler, Janet Leigh, Mary Pickford, and Norman Rockwell. These two helped select the festival’s Wistaria Queen. Packard Automobile Co. used the vine as a backdrop to advertise its automobile.

On December 5, 1936, Carrie Ida Lawless purchases the vine property from Mrs. Fennel, who was now a widow, for \$17,000.00. December 5th was Mrs. Lawless’ birthday, and according to one account, she was making a present to herself of the world’s largest bouquet. Also a widow, her husband William J (Bill) Lawless was mayor of Sierra Madre during 1928-29. She, herself, was a successful businesswoman having founded the Weaver Jackson Beauty Co. in Los Angeles and was active in the community, serving as president of the Woman’s Club and the Garden Club.

Mrs. Lawless spent a small fortune (around \$100,000) enhancing the grounds of her new property and caring for the vine. When the festivals were held they often lasted for the weeks the vine was in bloom, not just for one day. Mrs. Lawless, a patron of the arts, also sponsored vine activities all year long.

She hosted art exhibits, musicales, and poetry readings. Nearby residents objected to the constant activity and took their complaints to the City Council. Nothing was done as Mrs. Lawless presented the argument that the vine existed before these neighbors purchased their properties.



In recognition for her contributions to the community, the Garden Club planted another Wistaria in the terraced garden on the west side of what is today the Solt’s garden. It blooms a bit later than the original vine and the plaque commemorating the occasion is gone.

When Mrs. Lawless died in 1942, she provided for the vine by leaving a legacy to her nephew and heir, Bruce McGill, to continue care of the property with a committee headed by the Garden Club President. In 1944, the property was purchased by Richard and Marian Thayer. Marian is the daughter of M. Penn Phillips, a well-known developer of desert property. In 1944 the vine was overgrown and in poor condition. Richard Thayer planned to chop it up and get rid of it. A protest was raised and an association was formed to protect the vine, with money provided to pay property taxes and provide year-round care for the vine.

In 1961, after Richard Thayer died, the lot was split. Marian married builder Ronald Cook who developed the west side of the property with homes and built the present Solt home for he and Marian in1962. The upper home was sold to Joseph and Marie Feeney who raised eight children there. In 1972, Ron and Marian sold the lower home to Bob and Nell Solt. In the late 1990s, Joe Feeney died and Maria sold the property. It was purchased in 2003 by the present owners, Dan and Dana Dorrance.

By the 1970’s Vine Festival activity had about ended. It started up again in the late 70’s when sponsored for one day each year by the Chamber of Commerce. The Sierra Madre Beautification Committee was the yearly sponsor in the 1980’s. Approximately 500-600 people attended the festival each year. In the spring of 1989, Huell Howser came to film the vine for his program Videolog, which aired on KCET. The next year, approximately 6,000 people came to view the vine. The festival organizers were unprepared for such a turnout; lines stretched for two blocks. Howser returned in 1992 to film again for his California Gold program. Sierra Madre and the Chamber of Commerce quickly organized and combined the annual Vine viewing with a downtown street fair. A shuttle bus is provided, and people procure tickets to see the vine at a pre-scheduled time.

The Guinness Book of World Records has named the Vine the World’s largest flowering plant. It is estimated that at the height of bloom it has 1.5 million blossoms with 40 blossoms per sq. ft., weighs 250 tons and has branches that extend 500 feet. Wistaria is a member of the pea family though its seeds resemble a flat bean. Seed pods burst open in the summer. The plant is deciduous, losing its leaves in the winter. Wistaria seeds were brought from China by Marco Polo in the 13th century.

Today, the vine covers approximately one acre. Over the years, it has shown distress and seemed to be dying. Experts have been brought in from Cal Tech, Occidental, and Cal Poly Pomona. Correct pruning, treatments with hormones, and vitamin B have helped the vine to recover and to flourish. To help maintain the Vine’s health, records of vine growth and care are now kept on a computer log. The Vine seems to produce its greatest flowering after a cold winter followed by a sudden hot spell.

What is the correct spelling for wisteria—wisteria or wistaria? In the Sunset Western Garden Book it is spelled wisteria. Sierra Madre has always spelled it wistaria. According to L. A. County Arboretum and Botanic Garden senior biologist Jim Bauml and Librarian Joan De Fato, the plant was named to honor Caspar Wistar (1761-1818), an American physician and teacher, who taught at the University of Pennsylvania. Among his accomplishments, he wrote the first text-book on anatomy. When the name of the genus Wisteria was put into the books, it was incorrectly spelled, says De Fato. So, one could say that all along, Sierra Madre has correctly spelled Wistaria!

Legends of the Wisteria Vine, Art, Literature, and Lore

“The languid and aromatic Wistaria, topping the garden trellis, bears a multitude of delicately hued flower, pale purple, light blue, mauve and white.” Its dappled sunlit walkways are a calm and peaceful place to reflect and think.”

Last Tuesday Watercolorist, I, sat with watercolorist, Pete Morris, under The Vine in Sierra Madre on Hermosa Street. In multihued shades from light to dark, the blooms and trailing whispers of blossoms and petals above and below, inspired us. We spoke of art, teaching, and the amazing the complexity this beautiful vine presented us.

Born in a pot just down the road, “Jack’s Beanstalk,” “Lavender Lady,” and “The Monster”, Sierra Madre’s glorious vine, weighed in at 250 tons when it entered the Guinness World Records in 1990. It is legendary. Businesses of every kind in town: open their doors, streets are filled, Avenues are lined with booths of other crafters, artisans, sellers. Visitors throng to The Vine during the Annual Festival and the city of Sierra Madre itself becomes an open house of festivities and displays of our town’s abundant offerings.

Among them, Friends of the Artists, FOA, a membership organization sponsors an Art Alley on Windsor Lane. Pat Ancona is President of this vigorous organization that teams with the Chamber of Commerce to create art events for its members and the community at large. During the Wistaria Festival, the Art Alley is open to all members of FOA as Windsor Lane is set aside for local artists of every ilk.

“FOA sponsors are an amazing support system and space to give local artists representation. Sierra Madre has always had a thriving art community and it’s important to keep that spirit alive and visual in the streets” Jennifer Lindstrom , artist, Sierra Madre, CA (Jennifer’s Bird Painting attached)

But there is more Art in the Festival in other parts of the Festival. On North Baldwin there is Creative Arts; in Kersting Court is the Mission Renaissance Art School. There is also Art on Display on East Montecito and at many of the vendor booths.

Digging into Wistaria culture, it is mentioned in literature and lore, with attributed magical, powers, mystical qualities, archetypal energies healing properties. Symbolic meanings include: Love Grace, Bliss, Honor, Memory, Patience, Endurance, Longevity, Exploration, Creative expansion, Release. The duality of love. Victory



over hardship. Aligning with its energies helps manifest, opportunities, awakens inspiration, and awakens the “poet’s ecstasy”. It stimulates the brain, aids in keeping thought organized, develops creativity, intellectual development. And the oil maybe used, or the flowers made into tea.

A century ago, Claude Monet painted Wistaria in his garden at Giverny (1917-19) Today artists of every medium draw inspiration from it. It’s various artistic expressions are hung in galleries, homes, street fairs and artists venues.

It’s many Literary references include: Sir Arthur Conan Doyle, The Adventure of Wistaria Lodge - Sherlock Holmes; William Faulkner, Absalom, Absalom - “It was a summer of Wistaria. SEAN'S SHAMELESS REVIEWS: GEOGRAPHER

Ghost Modern is the third album from San Francisco electro-pop act Geographer. The record marks Geographer's first new material since 2012's Myth. Geographer's mastermind, Michael Deni, blurs the lines between electronic and alternative in creating an ethereal pop resonance. With Ghost Modern, Deni mostly avoids much of the spastic electronic beats with tranquil, tender structures to enthrall listeners. In fact, the direction the band is seemingly heading down is different than preceding journeys. There's an incredible amount of elements that make Ghost Modern stand out as a deeper than expected type of release. Deni and company profoundly create a sonic palette that resemblances a dreamlike scenario. There are a wide assortment of instruments at work here too, including both live and drum machines, cello, violin, guitar, percussion, and piano. Nonetheless, Michael Deni's most dominant instrument is his placid vocal abilities that have been extremely distinguishable over the years. While Ghost Modern is an ephemeral endeavor at 37 minutes long, the dreamy arrangements and strong vocals evoking pure catharsis makes the listening experience irrefutably exceptional.

Their first single, "I'm Ready" is a warm tune that features honeyed melodies and airy vocals. The musing tune is a skillful demonstration of delicate arrangements paired with a heartbreaking cello. It opens up the record with much beauty and grace indicating this record sound much sweeter than previous records. "Need" has a slow build up before catching any momentum. Deni's vocals elevate high with this serene tune. "You Say You Love Me" includes synth-y undertones that add a certain spacey vibe to the track. The tempo is faster than the first two tracks, but it doesn't take away from the emotional aspect of the song. The strongest new song from Geographer is "Too Much." Deni's soft vocals paired with a completely layered musical structure of numerous instruments at work are striking to say the least. The way

Geographer crafts music effortlessly bestows the listeners with the purpose to paint their own picture from each individual song. With the combination of heartfelt, personal lyrics and piquant melodies, Ghost Modern establishes Geographer as a band delivering the highest form of commitment to artistry. The craftsmanship behind "Read Your Palm" is unquestionably beautiful. While just under two minutes, the harrowing quality heard is by far breathtaking. The aptly titled "Patience" soothes and relaxes the mind. It's an unrushed piece of art that combines the dual forces of piano

and violin to form a rhapsody that could melt hearts. It's one of the few songs off the record that reaches four minutes in duration, but the celestial tune isn't something you would want to ever end.

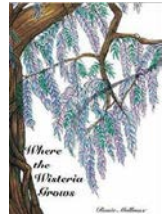
"Keep" starts with some mighty drumbeats before it unravels into the fastest tempo song off Ghost Modern. It's more in vein with previous records, however, remains suitable for this compilation. The summery attributes attached to "Keep" are perfect for the spring release. It completely serves as a dance-worthy addition to the record. Geographer wraps up the album with the appealing, "Falling Apart." This lovely closer is very reflective as it follows suit to the other echoes and noises Ghost Modern has demonstrated with prior tracks. The composition of smooth vocals and an airy structure lead to another strong offering for what may be deemed Geographer's most established work to date. The range of beauty on Ghost Modern is immeasurable. Those readily eyeing something to be stimulated by on an emotional and mental level need not to look any further than Geographer's latest and greatest contribution yet. *Grade: 9 out of 10*

DEAD WAKE: THE LAST CROSSING OF THE LUSITANIA

by Erik Larson

On May 1, 1915, with WWI entering its tenth month, a luxury ocean liner as richly appointed as an English country house sailed out of New York, bound for Liverpool, carrying a record number of children and infants. The passengers were surprisingly at ease, even though Germany had declared the seas around Britain to be a war zone. For months, German U-boats had brought terror to the North Atlantic. But the Lusitania was one of the era's great transatlantic "Greyhounds"—the fastest liner then in service—and her captain, William Thomas Turner, placed tremendous faith in the gentlemanly strictures of warfare that for a century had kept civilian ships safe from attack. Germany, however, was determined to change the rules of the game, and Walther Schwieger, the captain of Unterseeboot-20, was happy to oblige. Meanwhile, an ultra-secret British intelligence unit tracked Schwieger's U-boat, but told no one. As U-20 and the Lusitania made their way toward Liverpool, an array of forces both grand and achingly small—hubris, a chance fog, a closely guarded secret, and more—all converged to produce one of the great disasters of history. It is a story that many of us think we know but don't, and Erik Larson tells it thrillingly, switching between hunter and hunted while painting a larger portrait of America at the height of the Progressive Era. Full of glamour and suspense, Dead Wake brings to life a cast of evocative characters, from famed Boston bookseller Charles Lauriat to pioneering female architect Theodate Pope to President Woodrow Wilson, a man lost to grief, dreading the widening war

but also captivated by the prospect of new love. Gripping and important, Dead Wake captures the sheer drama and emotional power of a disaster whose intimate details and true meaning have long been obscured by history.

LESS MEDICINE, MORE HEALTH: 7 ASSUMPTIONS THAT DRIVE TOO MUCH MEDICAL CARE

by H. Gilbert Welch

The author describes seven widespread assumptions that encourage excessive, often ineffective, and sometimes harmful medical care. Dr. Welch is worried about too much medical care. It's not to deny that some people get too little medical care, rather that the conventional concern about "too little" needs to be balanced with a concern about "too much": too many people being made to worry about diseases they don't have—and are at only average risk to get; too many people being tested and exposed to the harmful effects of the testing process; too many people being subjected to treatments they don't need—or can't benefit from. The American public has been sold the idea that seeking medical care is one of the most important steps to maintain wellness. Surprisingly, medical care is not, in fact, well correlated with good health. So more medicine does not equal more health; in reality the opposite may be true. The general public harbors assumptions about medical care that encourage overuse, assumptions like it's always better to fix the problem, sooner (or newer) is always better, or it never hurts to get more information. Less Medicine, More Health pushes against established wisdom and suggests that medical care can be too aggressive. Drawing on his twenty-five years of medical practice and research, Dr. Welch notes that while economics and lawyers contribute to the excesses of American medicine, the problem is essentially created when the general public clings to these powerful assumptions about the value of tests and treatments—a number of which are just plain wrong. By telling fascinating (and occasionally amusing) stories backed by reliable data, Dr. Welch challenges patients and the health-care establishment to rethink some very fundamental practices. His provocative prescriptions hold the potential to save money and, more important, improve health outcomes for us all.

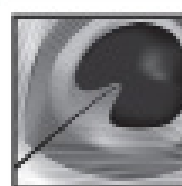

DAWN SPACECRAFT BECOMES 1ST TP ORBIT DWARF PLANET

NASA's Dawn spacecraft has become the first to achieve orbit around a dwarf planet. The spacecraft was approximately 38,000 miles from Ceres when it was captured by the dwarf planet's gravity at about 4:39 a.m. PST Friday, March 7.

Mission controllers at NASA's Jet Propulsion Laboratory (JPL) in Pasadena, California received a signal from the spacecraft March 7 that Dawn was healthy and thrusting with its ion engine, the indicator Dawn had entered orbit as planned.

"Since its discovery in 1801, Ceres was known as a planet, then an asteroid, and later a dwarf planet," said Marc Rayman, Dawn chief engineer and mission director at JPL. "Now, after a journey of 3.1 billion miles and 7.5 years, Dawn calls Ceres home."

In addition to being the first spacecraft to visit a dwarf planet, Dawn also has the distinction of being the first mission to orbit two extraterrestrial targets. From 2011 to 2012, the spacecraft explored the giant asteroid Vesta, delivering new insights and thousands of images from that distant world. Ceres and Vesta are the two most massive residents of our solar system's main asteroid belt between Mars and Jupiter.

The most recent images received from the spacecraft, taken on March 1, show Ceres as a crescent, mostly in shadow because the spacecraft's trajectory put it on a side of Ceres that faces away from the Sun until mid-April. When Dawn emerges from Ceres' dark side, it will deliver ever-sharper images as it spirals to lower orbits around the planet.

"We feel exhilarated," said Chris Russell, principal investigator of the Dawn mission at the University of California, Los Angeles (UCLA). "We have much to do over the next year and a half, but we are now on station with ample reserves and a robust plan to obtain our science objectives."

Ceres appears to be differentiated into a rocky core and icy mantle, and may harbor a remnant internal ocean of liquid water under the layer of ice. The surface is probably a mixture of water ice and various hydrated minerals such as carbonates and clay. In January 2014, emissions of water vapor were detected from several regions of Ceres. This was somewhat unexpected, because large bodies in the asteroid belt do not typically emit vapor, a hallmark of comets.

Italian Giuseppe Piazzi discovered Ceres on January 1, 1801 while he was searching for a star. He first believed that he had discovered a comet, but he was not confident in his belief. By the end of the year, with the help of other astronomers, he had collected enough evidence to call it a planet.

It takes approximately 4.6 Earth years for Ceres to make one revolution around the Sun. Ceres is located 415 million kilometers from the Sun and revolves around the Sun in an orbit between Mars and Jupiter. In 1802, additional objects were also found to be orbiting in the same area. Sir William Herschel labeled these objects as asteroids, so in 1802 Ceres became known as an asteroid, not a planet. Ceres was the largest known asteroid in the asteroid belt until 2006. In 2006, the International Astronomical Union formed a new class of solar system objects known as dwarf planets. By definition a dwarf planet is spherical and travels in an orbit around the Sun. Ceres fit the definition perfectly.

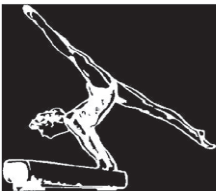

HOW LIVING WILLS BECAME A WAY OF LIFE IN ONE AMERICAN TOWN

With just over 50,000 residents, La Crosse, WI is a lot like most other small towns in America – but one thing makes La Crosse stand out: 96% of La Crosse residents who have died had an advance health care directive (also commonly called a living will) in place. Nationally, only about 30% of American adults have an advance health care directive in place.

Actually, there are two things that make La Crosse stand out: the town also has lower healthcare costs than any other place in the U.S. And these two things – a high percentage of residents with advance directives and lower healthcare costs -- are inextricably linked.

According to a recent NPR story, all this came about because of one man: Dr. Bud Hammes, Medical Humanities Director at Gundersen Hospital in La Crosse. Dr.Hammes often found himself sitting with families of terminally ill patients, trying to figure out what to do next. He said the conversations were excruciating: “Did mom ever say anything to you?” “Do you know what dad wants?” He felt the moral distress of those families and it was palpable.

Dr. Hammes knew these scenarios could easily be avoided, since most patients were usually sick for years. So he started training nurses to ask patients early on if they wanted to sign an advance directive, and over the years, planning for death has become a way of life in La Crosse.

And the lower healthcare costs? Dr. Hammes said the reduction in spending was a complete accident; simply a byproduct of letting people make their own choices. He said that when you let patients choose and direct their own care, they often make a much less expensive choice.

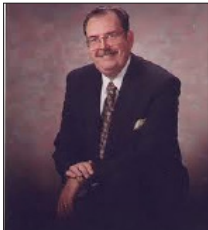

"Fellow marchers, so much has changed in fifty years . . . But what has not changed is the imperative of citizenship, that willingness of a 26 year-old deacon, or a Unitarian minister, or a young mother of five, to decide they loved this country so much that they'd risk everything to realize its promise."

President Barack Obama – Selma, Alabama - March 7, 2015

I watched some of the speech on TV, and then read the transcript. With the passage quoted above, when the president mentioned that "26 year-old deacon", "Unitarian minister" and "young mother of five", I got a feeling of them being real people – and wanted to know them more.

"The Americans who crossed this bridge were not physically imposing. But they gave courage to millions. They held no elected office. But they led a nation."

James Orange was a year out of high school when he became an organizer with the Southern Christian Leadership Conference. In February 1965 he was arrested and jailed for contributing to the delinquency of minors – enlisting youngsters to help with voter registration.

There was concern he might be lynched. 500 left the Zion United Methodist Church intending to march to the jail a half-block away, sing hymns, then return. They were met by police, sheriff's deputies and Alabama State Troopers. Suddenly the street lights went out, giving cover as the cops rushed and beat on the marchers.

Jimmie Lee Jackson ran to a café behind the church to escape, along with his mother and 82-year-old grandmother. Cops clubbed the grandmother to the floor. Her daughter came to help and was clubbed, too. When Jackson went to protect his mother, he was shoved against a vending machine and shot twice in the stomach, clubbed some more, and died a week later.

As rage spread, the Selma SCLC envisioned a march from Selma to Montgomery to channel anger while protesting for voting rights. Jimmie Lee Jackson was 26 and a deacon at his church.

"The American instinct that led these young men and women to pick up the torch and cross this bridge is the same instinct that moved patriots to choose revolution over tyranny. It's the same instinct that drew immigrants from across oceans and the Rio Grande; the same instinct that led women to reach for the ballot and workers to organize against an unjust status quo."

James Reeb grew up in Kansas and Wyoming. He got his theology degree and became involved in social causes, living with his wife and four kids in poor, black neighborhoods where he felt he could do the most good. He worked on desegregation and encouraged his congregation to get involved with civil rights.

Reeb, like most Americans was horrified by Bloody Sunday on the Edmund Pettis Bridge – and knew he had to be there to

join in the struggle. Two days later he was in Selma, leaving an integrated restaurant after dining with two other ministers when he was set upon by a group of men with clubs.

Reeb was 38 when he died two days later, his wife at his side, following brain surgery. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. eulogized, "James Reeb symbolizes the forces of good will in our nation. He demonstrated the conscience of the nation . . . He was a witness to the truth that men of different races and classes can live, eat and work together as brothers."

President Lyndon Johnson mentioned Reeb when he delivered a draft of the Voting Rights Act to Congress. Another president mentioned him fifty years later, speaking from the spot where, fifty years before, events happened that brought this Unitarian minister to Selma.

"It's the idea held by generations of citizens who believed that America is a constant work in progress; who believed that loving this country requires more than singing its praises or avoiding uncomfortable truths. It requires the occasional disruption, the willingness to speak out for what's right and shake up the status quo."

Viola Riuzzo was six when, in the depths of the Depression, the family moved to Tennessee. She didn't understand, and to her it didn't seem right, that although they were as dirt-poor as the black families in their community, they were for some reason treated with more deference and privilege. Settling in Detroit in the early 1940s, Riuzzo eloped as a teen, married a Teamsters agent and went back to school. She witnessed the racial violence and rioting in segregated Detroit, joined the NAACP and helped organize local protests.

She heard the call of Dr. King after Bloody Sunday for people of all faiths to come because it's "everybody's fight". Riuzzo hooked up with the SCLC, packed her car, said goodbye to family and headed for Selma.

Her job was meeting volunteers and ferrying them between airports, bus stations and train depots. After participating in the largely peaceful March 21-25 march from Selma to Montgomery she went back to work – assisted by black teenager Leroy Moton, taxiing participants to their hotels and bus stops.

On Route 80, a car tried to force them off the road. Down a back road returning to Selma, a car with four Klansmen overtook them and fired into the car, which crashed into a fence. Covered with blood, Moton froze as the Klansmen came to check on the passengers. As soon as they left, he flagged down help, but it was too late – Riuzzo had been killed by two shots to the head. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. and Roy Wilkins attended Viola Riuzzo's funeral five days later in Detroit.

With one of the Klansmen an FBI informant, J. Edgar Hoover started a smear campaign alleging Viola Riuzzo was a Communist and drug addict who abandoned her family to sleep around with black guys. She was 39, the young mother of five.

NO DEAL IS BETTER THAN A BAD DEAL



President Obama was so disdainful of Benjamin Netanyahu that he publicly commented he hadn't even bothered to watch the Prime Minister's address to Congress, and then obfuscated about its text not offering any "viable alternative". From that statement alone, we can deduce that the President really didn't even bother to read the text of the speech or Obama would have realized that Netanyahu actually articulated a much better alternative to the bad deal Obama seems willing to sign.

Interestingly, despite Obama's public slap at Netanyahu, the Prime Minister was gracious enough to offer Obama a face saving overture by praising Obama for "all he has done for Israel". Netanyahu is to be complimented for that gesture. He knew his speech would anger Obama, but he also knew he had to give the speech because the stakes are so high in this negotiation with Iran. Obama is committed to getting a deal – any deal – for the sake of his legacy, but the result of this approach is likely to be deadly for Israel, the U.S. and the west.

The Prime Minister didn't pull any punches in discrediting the details of what the Obama administration is about to accept. The very heart of Netanyahu's criticism is the nature of the Iranian regime. A deal is only as good as the deal's participants, and here is the critical flaw of Obama's approach. Netanyahu pointed out in painstaking specificity the evidence which shows Iran continues to be a sponsor of terrorism, fanatically committed to the "annihilation of Israel" and determined to dominate its neighbors. The historical record is not pretty, including internal repression and mass killings, continued military support of Assad's regime, destabilization of other countries' governments and the on-going arming of Hezbollah, Hamas, and Shiite militias.

The bottom line is that Iran cannot be allowed a nuclear bomb. In stark contrast to Obama's assertion that Iran would join as a responsible member the family of nations, Iran would actually conquer, dominate and intimidate other nations. The key evidence of Iran's intention in this regard is Iran's continued development of intercontinental ballistic missiles. Nobody develops ICBMs to deliver anything except nuclear warheads to countries far afield. ICBMs are designed to deliver these payloads to other continents – say Europe and America.

The critical issue is something called "breakout time" – the time it takes to go from a peaceful nuclear program to actually putting together a bomb. If you have all the components ready to go, just needing assembly, your breakout time is short. If you don't have those components – the primary one being enriched uranium – then your breakout time is long.

The Obama deal guarantees that Iran

will get a nuclear bomb either by keeping the deal or by violating the deal. The deal allows Iran to enrich as much uranium as it wants after 10 years, but the deal doesn't require the dismantling of any enrichment facilities. This means Iran could easily enrich uranium in secret. As Netanyahu pointed out, "inspectors document violations; they don't stop them". This was echoed by the International Atomic Energy Agency in its most recent report which expressed its concerns "about the possible existence in Iran of undisclosed development of nuclear payloads for missiles".

The only way to stop Iran is to force Iran to dismantle as many of its existing facilities as we can find. The only way to force the dismantling is to maintain existing economic sanctions and to impose even tougher ones if Iran does not agree to dismantling their facilities.

As Netanyahu pointed out, the economic sanctions are working. They're forcing Iran to the negotiating table. This isn't the time to reduce that pressure. This is also why Saudi Arabia continues to pump oil at capacity in the face of falling oil prices. Economically, Saudi Arabia should cut back in hopes of raising the price of oil. But Saudi Arabia knows that Iran is a threat and knows that Iran needs a \$136/barrel oil price to meet its cashflow demands. Iran, for all its bluster and all the trouble it causes in the Middle East, is still a weak country hurting economically. If we let them off the economic hook, they will only become more dangerous to their neighbors and the west.

Obama wants a deal for the deal's sake so that his legacy will be "peace in his time". Unfortunately, this leads him to accepting terms which will only guarantee that the next president's crisis will be nuclear proliferation. If Iran gets the bomb, Saudi Arabia, Egypt, and others will not be far behind.

Obama claims to be a man of peace. Well the best way to get peace and keep that peace is to make sure it is a just peace for all concerned. Iran must be shown, in no uncertain terms that its current actions must stop and its nuclear capabilities dismantled. The best way to do that is to reject the deal, increase sanctions and let it be known that the U.S. will not stand in the way of any other regional power taking steps to destroy Iran's nuclear facilities.

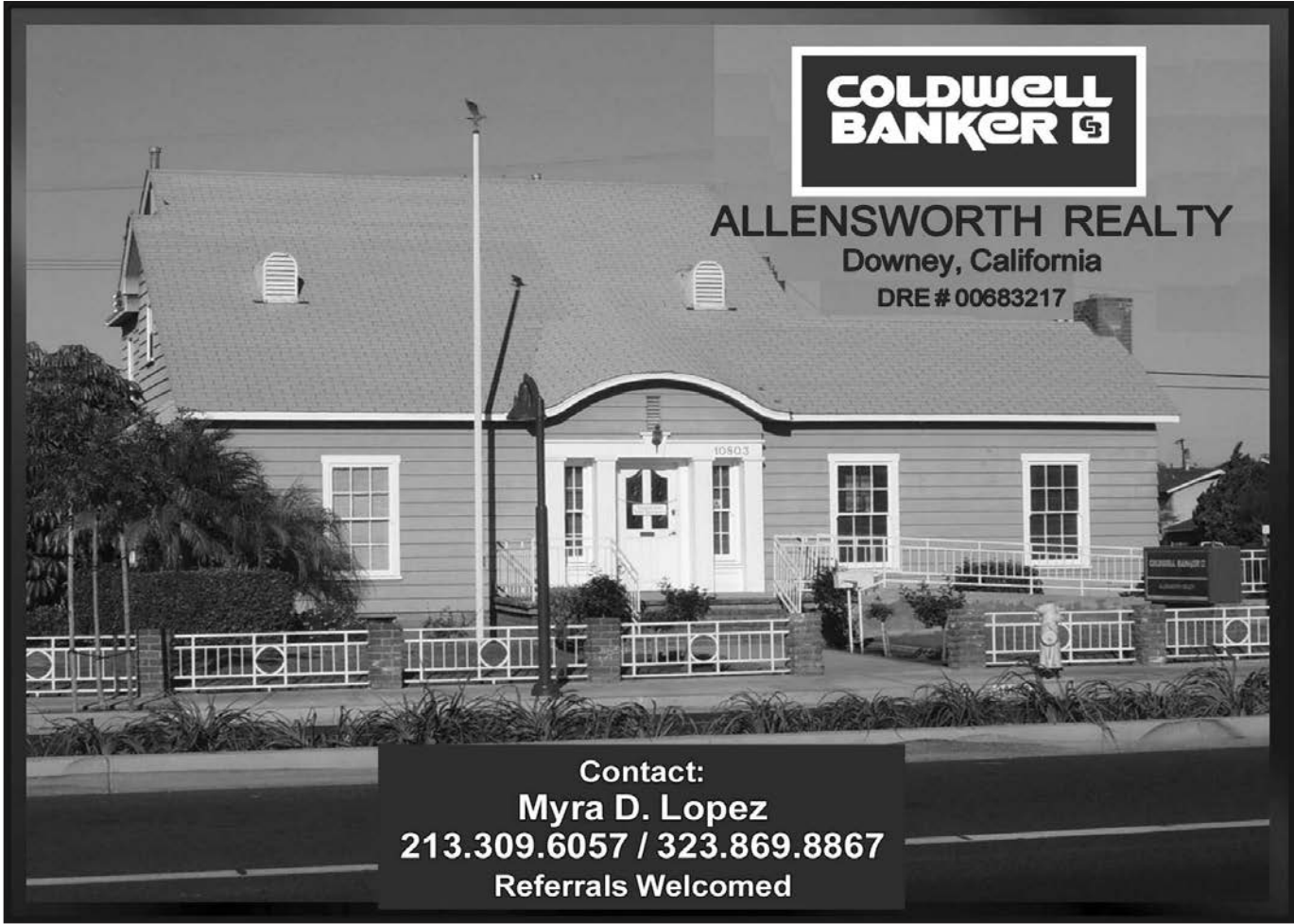
