FORMER MOUNTAIN VIEWS NEWS COLUMNIST, PAT BIRDSALL DIES



The Mountain Views News and Sierra Madre community lost a great friend on Monday when Pat Birdsall passed away on March 20, 2016 at the age of 72, after a long battle with complications from COPD.

Born Patricia Sharon McGill in Brooklyn New York October 4, 1943 she was the only child of Robert and Madline McGill. Pat moved to Southern California with her family in 1952 where they resided in Altadena California. A graduate of Muir High School class of 1961, she first moved to Sierra Madre in the late 60's and in 1971 moved into the home on Mountain Trail where she lived for the next 45 years. She worked in banking for many years before retiring early in the late eighties.

Pat was very passionate when it came to the environment and wildlife. She was also very passionate about issues in Sierra Madre. She loved Sierra Madre and being part of the community. She was a member of the Kiwanas of Sierra Madre and President of the Senior Club. She was also a Senior Community Commissioner.

Many may not have always seen eye to eye with Pat, but friend or foe she had the respect of this community for being herself!

Known as a 'fighter' for the Senior Center getting a make over ("The Cinderella Project" as she called it); a fighter against the development at 1 Carter; an advocate for getting property fences that were "wildlife friendly" and much more. She was a constant at city consul meetings.

Pat wrote several columns for the Mountain Views News including "Senor Moments" and "Birdseye View".

Pat is survived by her Son Christopher McGill, Daughter in law Annette Pizzo-McGill and Grandson Tully McGill. She will be cremated and a viewing/celebration will be held on Wednesday March 30, 2016 from 4pm - 8pm at Douglass & Zook, 600 E. Foothill Blvd., Monrovia, CA. 91016. SUSPICIOUS VEHICLE - POSSIBLE ATTEMPTED ABDUCTION

On Tuesday, March 22, 2016, at approximately 3:15pm, a 14-year old student was walking home westbound on Grandview Ave from St. Rita's School. The student said a white van, (unknown model) drove up next to her while she was on the sidewalk. The student said a male (perhaps White or Hispanic) opened the passenger side door of the van and pointed his finger behind her, towards a nearby house, asking the student "Is that your jacket on the roof" or "is that a jacket on the roof". This suspicious behavior by the man frightened the student, who took off running from the location. When the student looked back, she saw the white van make a U- turn (east bound on Grandview) and then proceed north on Baldwin Ave. Once the student was home, the student called her mother who notified St. Rita's School, who in turn called the Sierra Madre Police Department.

ARCADIA VEHICLE PURSUIT - RESIDENTIAL BURGLARY ARREST

On Friday, March 25, 2016, at approximately 8:55 P.M., Arcadia Police Officers were dispatched to the 200 block of Monte Place in regards to a suspicious vehicle parked on the driveway of a residence, with a male black subject standing by it. The vehicle then left the location and was last seen southbound on Highland Oaks Drive. Responding Arcadia Police Officers located the suspicious vehicle, occupied by a male black subject, getting onto the 210 Freeway eastbound on ramp and attempted to stop it. The vehicle failed to yield and a pursuit ensued on the freeway. California Highway Patrol ultimately took over the pursuit and apprehended the driver in the city of Westmont. Arcadia Police Officers then took custody of the suspect.

The investigation revealed a residential burglary had occurred in the 200 block of Monte Place. A police scanner and stolen property from the residence were located inside of the suspect vehicle. Suspect Steve Gainer, age 32, of Paramount, was arrested for Penal Code 459-Residential Burglary and California Vehicle Code 2800.2-Felony Evading. He is being held in custody at the Arcadia City Jail on \$125,000 bail.



A WONDERFUL LIFE AT EASTER

Each Easter, my mind wanders back to the place of a lonely hill where a wooden cross was raised some 2,000 years ago. I believe it to be the most horrific thought I should ever encounter, and if not for the triumph of the resurrection and the testimony of that empty tomb, my every tear would contain the idea of how Jesus was destroyed.

This Easter, I would like to write about a man who gave the world kindness, and when he came upon the impenetrable places of the heart, his words flourished in such strength they rolled the rocks away.

I must admit that I am out of step with the seasons as the man I ponder carries the considerations of Christmas.

In the Christmas classic, "It's a Wonderful Life," the beloved hero of the story, George Bailey, steals our heart in so many eloquent ways. I see a number of shared traits in George Bailey and Dr. Philip Martin Carlson, otherwise known as "Phil," who passed away from cancer on December 28, 2015.

Before becoming a doctor, Phil was a full time minister in Sierra Madre, but he wasn't the type of man who could passively watch suffering and his disdain, for passive inaction compelled Pastor Carlson to meditate on what else he could do to help those who were in pain.

After years of standing alongside grieving families in the responsibility of a minister, Pastor Carlson decided to apply to USC Medical School where he was accepted.

Even after his move into the medical field, Phil was not fully dismissed from the life of a minister, as he remained a popular substitute for the local preachers of his community. His sermons were emotionally stirring and characterized by the manner in which he analyzed, and then explained in his own actions. The strict standard of behavior he so desperately sought for in his own life, was modified by mercy when he began to describe others. His belief in self-assessment developed an extraordinary diagnosis of his own condition, and a heightened sense of grace in his sermons. Phil was not the manner of man to squander a single moment of sympathy on himself. He saved the elegance of those ideas for us. He had a habit of hesitating in those thoughtful moments of reflection as he spoke from the pulpit, and then he would paint pictures of gratitude in the careful color of his words.

The last sermon I heard Dr. Carlson deliver was about our duties to charity, and our obligations of supporting others. He punctuated this powerful sermon with an extraordinary example from his own life.

A young woman with whom Dr. Carlson frequently spoke, asked him if she could speak with him privately. She began by telling Dr. Carlson that she was pregnant, and then went on to say that after much consideration, she had decided to abort her child. In a candid revelation of sadness, she communicated to Dr. Carlson that she knew not one person of decency in her family, and being incapable of caring for the child, the most sensible solution to her problem was to end her pregnancy. The experience of her life had conditioned her to believe that a nobler deed was achieved by ending this child's life than to allow her child to set foot in a world of sorrow.

In a decided sense of concern, Dr. Carlson delicately spoke to the girl:

"I am going to ask you to do something courageous here and have this child, and if you cannot find a suitable family to adopt the child, my family will welcome your baby."

The girl could not believe what she was hearing, and she became so emotionally affected by Dr. Carlson's commitment to her, that the all of those obstructions that haunted her mind were melted in the miracle of that moment.

Phil moved to the center of the pulpit and jokingly said: "Now all I had to do was to go home and inform my wife about the potential addition to our family," which (cont. on page 3)



heralded a vast volume of laughter from the congregants. As the laughter slowly abated from the room, Phil smiled in his next utterance of speech, "But knowing the character of my wife, I was certain we would be in agreement."

As Dr. Carlson addressed his family that evening, his daughter added to the magic of the moment by bestowing this final thought on her father:
"If only for this act alone, your hours of medical school were worth it."

I have to wonder how many young ladies of the world know a man like Dr. Carlson. How many have the opportunity to confide in such a beautiful pillar of character, and share the secrets of their hearts, when the weight of the world and that formidable mountain of decision stands squarely before them? In that perilous moment of crisis, I should hope that my mother, sister or daughter would know such a heavenly hope as Dr. Philip Carlson.

As I settle upon my seat this Easter Sunday, I shall be thinking about that great rock that was rolled away from a young lady's heart, and I shall give thanks for the life of a child who is alive today and happily gathering Easter eggs somewhere out there in the world -- all because, one marvelous man portrayed such wonderful character that a desperate young girl considered him worthy of trust.

You just don't come across many George Baileys in the world, and from my experience, the Phil Carlsons are equally as scarce. Any philosophy worthy of obedience should teach its followers that if they do not exert an effort to support and recognize good people, then the world will develop less of them.

That is one of the glorious lessons that Frank Capra conveys in the story of "It's a Wonderful Life." The great people of integrity, and those George Baileys of the world, are the ones who sacrifice themselves for the interests of others. If we dare to believe that we are noble and decent, then we best not forget them in their hour of need.

Rep. Schiff Commends Decision to End Orca Breeding

“Current Generation of Captive Orcas Will Be the Last” Schiff said.

Representative Adam Schiff, author of the ORCA Act which would phase out the captivity of orcas by prohibiting the breeding, the wild capture, and the import or export of orcas for the purposes of public display, commended the efforts of SeaWorld after an announcement last week, by them, to end the practice.

“SeaWorld’s decision to end captive breeding and make no additional wild captures in the future, means that the current generation of captive Orcas in their parks will be the last. The partnership they are making with the Humane Society, with its focus on rescue, rehabilitation, and advocacy on important marine issues not only represents a change in their business model, but an exciting new direction for the company. These changes are something that advocates have been urging for years, and I think SeaWorld

Rose Bowl Aquatic Center Honors Mike Antonovich

Supervisor Mike Antonovich was awarded the “Water Drop Award,” earlier this month, for helping to fund the Rose Bowl Aquatics Center (RBAC), a world-class aquatics facility offering year-round aquatic and fitness programming to children, youth, families, people with special needs, and seniors. The center helps nearly 350,000 annual patrons achieve the benefits of healthy living habits, regular exercise, and sports training.

Supervisor Antonovich’s office provided vital funding for the RBAC and its vital projects including the Therapy Pool -- the only one of its kind providing healing warm water exercise for the special needs population. In addition, the funding helped provide a community room and the Wellness Center that will

will find that visitors will reward their actions with a renewed interest in the parks.

“Last year, I introduced the ORCA Act to end the breeding and wild capture of Orcas and with these changes today, SeaWorld is making this change a reality.”

In 2015, Rep. Schiff introduced the Orca Responsibility and Care Advancement (ORCA) Act. The legislation would phase out the captivity of orcas so that their display ends with this generation. Specifically, it would prohibit the breeding, the taking (wild capture), and the import or export of orcas for the purposes of public display. This legislation would also allow for the orderly phasing out of the display of this species, giving orca-holding

facilities time to transition to a more humane future.

According to Schiff, the current global population of captive orcas has two sources – wild capture and captive breeding programs. Under current federal law, the federal government can issue permits for the capture or import of orcas for the purposes of public display. This is how, in the past, U.S. display facilities legally acquired orcas from the wild. Permits can still be issued legally. All other captive orcas have been bred in captivity. These practices would be prohibited under the ORCA Act.

Hotline Targets Fraudulent Social Service

The 24/7 fraud hotline, which continues to successfully target and eliminate fraudulent use of public welfare benefits, was continued unanimously by the Board of Supervisors.

The program provides trained multilingual operators experienced in questioning callers to elicit sufficient details of reported instances of suspected welfare fraud crimes to the Department of Public Social Services (DPSS), and receives approximately 1,700 referrals each year.

The hotline is operational 24 hours a day and suspected fraud can be reported anonymously. The toll-free number is 1-800-87-FRAUD or reports can be taken at www.lacountyfraud.org.

DUARTE AND BRADBURY ADD AN ADDITIONAL SHERIFF PATROL UNIT IN RESPONSE TO RISING PROPERTY CRIME RATES

DUARTE, CA, March 23, 2016 – In a proactive response to growing resident and business concerns over increased property crimes, the Duarte City Council voted at its March 22nd meeting to increase its law enforcement contract with the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department by an additional patrol unit starting April 1st. The addition of this unit increases the City's daytime patrol by 50%.

The initial cost to add the additional unit is \$169,172 annually increasing to approximately \$280,000 after 18 months. The City of Bradbury has agreed to fund \$25,000 towards the additional unit through June 30th, and contribute \$75,000 in the following budget year.

The City of Duarte, like the majority of California cities, is experiencing an increase in Part 1 crimes last year. Specifically, the City has experienced an 8.5 % increase in overall Part 1 crimes from 2014 to 2015. This trend is in contrast to the balance of the Country where violent crime rates continue to drop. Public safety professionals are concerned voter approved Proposition 47 combined with AB 109 prisoner realignment is causing the uptick. Especially in the case of Proposition 47, which allows non-violent offenders and drug users to

participate in early release programs without mandatory treatment or supervision.

"The Cities of Duarte and Bradbury continue to be proactive in our approaches to preventing and suppressing crime in our communities," said City Manager Darrell George. The City of Duarte has the ability to amend its Sheriff Contract at any time.



SANTA BARBARA ROAD TRIP



There is a popular adage “if it was easy, everyone would be doing it”, so my visit to Lucky’s a white table cloth restaurant in Montecito seemed a simple enough task. Lucky’s is clear in their mission: steaks, chops, and seafood. Located on Coast Village Road in Montecito, the space has seen its fair share of businesses since it was built in 1926. Not all were restaurants - this writer wasn’t present for the Pink Squirrel in the 50’s (and is still not convinced that the owner actually had a pink squirrel, but that is for another day), Irelands in the 60’s, and a few others after that. By the late 90’s the building had seen better days and area residents thought the location had just plain run out of luck. As luck would have it, however, a few Montecito residents gave the building a makeover, and Lucky’s was born as Montecito’s clubhouse - a home away from home complete with a patio, bar and dining area. I have often thought that fine dining is a dying breed, but Lucky’s has restored my faith.

The menu lists wonderful aged prime steaks featuring a 24-ounce porterhouse steak and 18 oz bone-in rib chop - for me, the meat closest to the bone is my favorite. A closer look at the nightly specials reveals comfort food that you will appreciate as much I do, like Thursday’s Market Street Meatloaf, created and introduced to Lucky’s by GM and Chef Leonard Schwartz. Mr. Schwartz has been at Lucky’s for eight years, with 22 years in the restaurant business prior to that, and has brilliantly brought some of his favorite dishes to Montecito. Besides the meatloaf, consider the chili with just the right amount of beans for texture (I suggest having the cheese and onions on the side).

On my last visit, I sat at the bar, and had the calamari appetizer with a burger. I don’t eat burgers that often, but when I do I want something special, and Lucky’s offers an eight-ounce burger made with meats from the kitchen, and the fries are all house-made (if you follow my column, you know I’m a stickler for fresh French fries!). Of course, there are many popular salads on the menu including the house favorite “Lucky’s Salad”, and an iceberg wedge that is almost a meal in itself. The wine list has many California offerings, including wines from Santa Barbara, Paso Robles and Napa - with more than 25 wines by the glass, there’s something for every taste. With so many items on the menu, my suggestion is to come with a friend and share. Lucky’s 1279 Coast Village Rd. Montecito (805)565-7540.

Julie’s Favorite Family Recipes

MRS. FIELDS SWEETIE PIES

INGREDIENTS

- 2 oz.unsweetened chocolate
- 3/4 cups(4 oz)semisweet chocolate chips
- 1/2 cup unsalted butter,softened
- 3/4 cup white sugar
- 2 large eggs.
- 2 tsp.pure vanilla extract
- 1&1/2 cups all purpose flour
- 1 cup(6 oz) semisweet chocolate chips
- 1/2 cup (3 oz) white chocolate chips
- 1/4 cup (1.5 oz)milk chocolate chips.

DIRECTIONS: - yield 2 1/2 dozen

Preheat oven to 375.

Line cookie sheets with waxed paper.In a double boiler or microwave melt the unsweetened chocolate and the 3/4 cup of chocolate chips. Stir frequently with wooden spoon or wire whisk until creamy and smooth.

Pour melted chocolate into a large bowl.Add butter and beat with electric mixer at a medium speed until completely combined.Add sugar,eggs and vanilla. Beat on medium speed until well blended. Scrape down sides of bowl.Add the flour and all the chocolate chips.Chips should be distributed equally into the dough.Roll a heaping tablespoon of dough into a ball.,about 1 & 1/2 inches in diameter.Place dough into paper lined panes 2 inches apart.With the palm of your hand, flatten each ball to 1/2 inch thickness.Bake 10-12 minutes.Transfer cookies with a spatula to a cool flat surface.

A DIFFERENT APPROACH TO TMJ TREATMENT

TMJ or temporomandibular joint disease is a common problem with a complex treatment. The usual symptoms are: numbness of the jaw and temporal area, and dull and/or sharp pain of previously mentioned areas (temporal headache). Some of the causes of TMJ include stress (grinding the teeth), direct trauma, or bad diet habits.

The majority of these patients use dental appliances or pain medication: 800 milligrams of ibuprofen (Motrin) three times a day or 500 milligrams of naproxen two times a day, with no avail.

Examination of the affected areas (temporalis muscle and the mandibular joint) begins with light to moderate digital palpation of the TW and GB meridians around the ear. A series of trigger points will be discovered that, when palpated, will produce local and/or referred pain (referred pain/ numbness toward DU20 or the jaw). Other trigger areas involved coincide with acupuncture points, primarily SI18 and 19; GB2; TW2; and tae yang (extra point), and secondarily TW16 and 17 and GB12 and 31.

Treatment duration: The treatment frequency is once a week for 4-6 weeks. Within 6-8 treatments, the patient should be able to feel some

improvement: pain and/or burning is reduced, the range of motion of the jaw is increased, and pain medication is reduced or discontinued.

As with almost all muscles disorders, the indication of the appropriate stretching exercises for the muscles involved will assist in a speedy recovery. A course of daily stretching exercises is recommended as part of the protocol to reduce stress of the temporomandibular joint. The stretching exercises are done three times a day, five times each session, maintaining the stretch for five seconds. It is convenient to apply heat for 15 to 20 minutes before the stretching exercises are done to increase the elasticity of the muscles, and ice (five minutes, if needed) afterward to reduce the inflammation produced by the stretching exercises. A bland diet is another way to reduce the stress to the joint.

Other treatments: Local taping (stretching tape) is used to reduce the tension of the muscles involved (myofascial release). Some patients respond to a single cortisone injection (administered locally to reduce the inflammation and edema of the muscle/joint). Surgery is another approach that may be needed in some patients.

THE CONSEQUENCES OF DYING WITHOUT A WILL

Dear Savvy Senior,
What will happen to my money and possessions if I die without a will?

Getting Old

Dear Getting,
If you die without a will, what happens to your assets will be determined by the state you reside in. Every state has intestacy laws in place that parcel out property and assets to a deceased person's closest relatives when there's no will or trust. But these laws vary from state-to-state.
A good resource to help you find out how your state works is About.com's Wills and Estate Planning site, which provides a state-by-state breakdown of how your estate would be distributed if you die without a will. See StateIntestacyLaws.com for a direct link to this page.
In the meantime, here is a general (not state specific) breakdown of what can happen to a person's assets, depending on whom they leave behind.
Married with children: When a married person with children dies without a will, all property, investments and financial accounts that are "jointly owned" automatically goes to the surviving co-owner (typically the spouse or child), without going through probate, which is the legal process that distributes a deceased person's assets.
But for all other separately owned property or individual financial accounts, the laws of most states award one-third to one-half to the surviving spouse, while the rest goes to the children.
Married with no children or grandchildren: Some states award the entire estate to the surviving spouse, or everything up to a certain amount (for example the first \$100,000). But many other states award only one-third to one-half of the decedent's separately owned assets to the surviving spouse, with the remainder generally going to the deceased person's parents, or if the parents are dead, to brothers and sisters.
Jointly owned property, investments, financial accounts, or community property automatically goes to the surviving co-owner.
Single with children: All state laws provide that the entire estate goes to the children, in equal shares. If an adult child of the decedent has died, then that child's children (the decedent's grandchildren) split their parent's share.
Single with no children or grandchildren: In this situation, most state laws favor the deceased person's



parents. If both parents are deceased, many states divide the property among the brothers and sisters, or if they are not living, their children (your nieces and nephews). If there are none of them, it goes to the next of kin, and if there is no living family, the state takes it.

Make a Will
To ensure your assets go to those you want to receive them, you need to create a will. If you have a simple estate and an uncomplicated family situation, there are several good do-it-yourself resources that can help you for very little money.
One of the best is the Quicken WillMaker Plus 2016 software (available at nolo.com) that costs \$55, works with Windows personal computers and is valid in every state except Louisiana. If you use a Mac, they offer an online will maker for \$35.
If, however, you want or need assistance or if you have a complicated financial situation, blended family or have considerable assets, you should hire an attorney. An experienced attorney can make sure you cover all your bases, which can help avoid family confusion and squabbles after you're gone.
Costs will vary depending on where you reside, but you can expect to pay anywhere between \$200 and \$1,000 for a will.
The National Academy of Elder Law Attorneys (naela.org) and the National Association of Estate Planners and Councils (naepc.org) are good resources that have online directories to help you find someone in your area.
If money is tight, check with your state's bar association (see findlegalhelp.org) to find low-cost legal help in your area. Or call the Eldercare Locator at 800-677-1116 for a referral.



EVERYONE IS WAITING FOR MESSIAH

NEW ROOMS DISCOVERED IN KING TUT'S TOMB COULD HOLD 'DISCOVERY OF THE CENTURY'

CAIRO (AP) — Radar scans of King Tutankhamun's burial chamber have revealed two hidden rooms, a tantalizing discovery that could resolve a mystery as old as the pyramids: What was the fate of Egypt's beautiful Queen Nefertiti? But he said the unexplored chambers could hold some kind of organic or metal objects. Most experts say that while the scans might reveal another tomb behind the false walls, it's unlikely to be crammed with solid gold and a royal mummy like Nefertiti, whose 3,300-year-old bust on display in Berlin is one of the most famous symbols of ancient Egypt and classical beauty. "Quite often, people have done these sorts of scans, and when actually investigated, things have turned out to be nothing like predicted," said Aidan Dodson, an archaeologist at the University of Bristol in England. "If they are chambers, most likely they'd be filled with more funeral objects of Tutankhamun, possibly including some gilded statuettes of gods, or perhaps even the mummy of a young child who predeceased Tut. Still, the discovery has ignited massive interest, and el-Damaty cast the discovery as potentially huge. He said the radar scans of the chamber, taken last year and analyzed in Japan, will be repeated at the end of the month. The contents of the newly found rooms could shine a light on one of ancient Egypt's most turbulent times, and one prominent researcher has theorized that the remains of Nefertiti could be inside. British Egyptologist Nicholas Reeves speculates that Tutankhamun, who died at age 19,

may have been rushed into an outer chamber of what was originally Nefertiti's tomb. The queen was one of the wives of Tutankhamun's father, the Pharaoh Akhenaten. El-Damaty said it was too early to tell what the metal and organic matter could be, saying only that he thinks the chambers could contain the tomb of a member of Tutankhamun's family, possibly a woman.

Luxor, in southern Egypt, served as the Pharaonic capital and is home to sprawling temples and several highly decorated ancient tombs in the Valley of the Kings. Reeves reached his theory after high-resolution images discovered what he said were straight lines in Tut's tomb. These lines, previously hidden by the color and texture of the stones, indicate the presence of a sealed chamber, he said. The images were broadcast live on national television in September. At the Cairo news conference, el-Damaty showed the results of radar scans that revealed anomalies in the walls of the tomb, indicating a possible hidden door and rooms behind false walls that were covered up and painted over with hieroglyphics. El-Damaty believes that if anyone is buried in the new antechambers it is likely Kia, believed by some to be the mother of Tutankhamun. Tut, Nefertiti and Akhenaten's family ruled Egypt during one of its most turbulent times, which ended with a military takeover by Egypt's top general, Horemheb. The family's names were later erased from official records.

CAUGHT FOR THE FIRST TIME: THE EARLY FLASH OF AN EXPLODING STAR

The brilliant flash of an exploding star’s shockwave—what astronomers call the “shock breakout”—has been captured for the first time in the optical wavelength or visible light by NASA’s planet-hunter, the Kepler space telescope.

An international science team led by Peter Garnavich, an astrophysics professor at the University of Notre Dame in Indiana, analyzed light captured by Kepler every 30 minutes over a three-year period from 500 distant galaxies, searching some 50 trillion stars. They were hunting for signs of massive stellar death explosions known as supernovae.

In 2011, two of these massive stars, called red supergiants, exploded while in Kepler’s view. The first behemoth, KSN 2011a, is nearly 300 times the size of our Sun and a mere 700 million light-years from Earth. The second, KSN 2011d, is roughly 500 times the size of our Sun and around 1.2 billion light-years away.


“To put their size into perspective, Earth’s orbit about our Sun would fit comfortably within these colossal stars,” said Garnavich.

Whether it’s a plane crash, car wreck or supernova, capturing images of sudden, catastrophic events is extremely difficult but tremendously helpful in understanding root cause. Just as widespread deployment of mobile cameras has made forensic videos more common, the steady gaze of Kepler allowed astronomers to see, at last, a supernova shockwave as it reached the surface of a star. The shock breakout itself lasts only about 20 minutes, so catching the flash of energy is an investigative milestone for astronomers.

“In order to see something that happens on timescales of minutes, like a shock breakout, you want to have a camera continuously monitoring the sky,” said Garnavich. “You don’t know when a supernova is going to go off, and Kepler’s vigilance allowed us to be a witness as the explosion began.”

Supernovae like these—known as Type II—begin when the internal furnace of a star runs out of nuclear fuel causing its core to collapse as gravity takes over.

The two supernovae matched up well with mathematical models of Type II explosions reinforcing existing theories. But they also revealed what could turn out to be an unexpected variety in the individual details of these cataclysmic stellar events.



While both explosions delivered a similar energetic punch, no shock breakout was seen in the smaller of the supergiants. Scientists think that is likely due to the smaller star being surrounded by gas, perhaps enough to mask the shockwave when it reached the star’s surface.

“That is the puzzle of these results,” said Garnavich. “You look at two supernovae and see

two different things. That’s maximum diversity.”

Understanding the physics of these violent events allows scientists to better understand how the seeds of chemical complexity and life itself have been scattered in space and time in our Milky Way galaxy

“All heavy elements in the universe come from supernova explosions. For example, all the silver,

nickel, and copper in the Earth and even in our bodies came from the explosive death throes of stars,” said Steve Howell, project scientist for NASA’s Kepler and K2 missions at NASA’s Ames Research Center in California’s Silicon Valley. “Life exists because of supernovae.”

There are other guidelines as well, coming from all corners of the globe.



ANIMAL MOON MADNESS
- TRUTH OR URBAN TALE?

One evening this past week, I was sitting on the back porch with my dog “Molly” when we heard a sudden outburst of coyotes yelping and howling nearby. It just so happened that the moon was hanging brilliantly in the sky above us, and I thought how appropriately the sound of the coyotes fit the scenario of the near-full moon lighting up the sky. Of course it goes without saying that my Molly felt the need to join in with the pack, adding her own low baritone grumble to the “looney tune” being sung by our local wildlife.

Most of us have heard the word “lunatic” often used to describe one who acts in an eccentric, reckless or insane manner. The term itself was first recorded as part of the vernacular in the 13th century AD, defined: “affected with periodic insanity, dependant on the changes of the moon.” Do the phases of the moon really have an affect on our behavior, or is this nothing more than just a myth made up to explain otherwise unexplainable occasional abnormal behavior?

Many people do believe that animals (and humans) are indeed affected by the position of the moon, but other more skeptical thinkers would beg to differ. Me? Well, I tend to go by apparent changes I have experienced within myself and those I have observed in my pets, and based on my own experiences and observations, I believe we are affected by the various lunar positions that occur throughout the calendar year.

If you ask Astrologer Dana Haynes about her opinion on the subject, she'll tell you that lunar phases most definitely affect the way we and our pets feel and behave, without a doubt. Haynes has studied animal behavior as it is impacted by the moon's positions for many years, and she came up with a very specific list of the ways each lunar phase affects animals both domestic and wild, as well as how they affect humans. I find it very interesting, and I hope you do to.

FULL MOON - The Full Moon influences the psyche of animals with noticeable intensity. It has been said to increase chaos and even cause the Earth to shake. Veterinary staff and Animal Control keep very busy during this phase. When an animal is upset during the full moon, they tend to be restless. Dogs and wolves are known to howl during the Full Moon phase, while birds become agitated and disoriented. Cats hide. The Full Moon tends to rattle both humans' and our pets' emotions.

NEW MOON - For a sensitive animal, the New Moon, not unlike the Full Moon, supports intention and



therefore it is a time to change old habits which block awareness. It is a time to tune into nature's vibrations-which many cats, dogs, other domestic animals and wild animals may do. Animals seem to naturally tune into the New Moon phase, understanding it is a time to chill even though this can be a challenge. The animal's senses are heightened and sensitivity will be seen in each New Moon phase.

SUPER MOON - Unlike a Full Moon or New Moon, this phase is when an alignment of the Sun, Moon and the Earth called perigee-sizing occurs when the Moon is at it's closest to Earth (perigree). Animals tend to be ultra sensitive during this time of a very big full moon. Like humans, the power of the electromagnetic fields during a Full Moon phase interacts with our own magnetic field increasing the ability to sense of feel the stress around us. Animals tend to notice the interaction quicker, as it is part of their survival instincts to stay away from danger or snuggle with a caregiver.

BLUE MOON - The Blue Moon occurs when there are two Full Moons in one months. In other words, the lunar phase is much like the Full Moon and repeats its patterns. The difference between the two Full Moons comes from the astrological sign the moon is passing through, therefore the intensity of one Full Moon would affect an animal's psyche in one area of life and the second one in another area of life. It is like our companion animals and wild animals get a double dose of the Full Moon and its intense vibrations on Earth. But note, emotions are no more on edge than at any other Full Moon.

“10 CLOVERFIELD LANE” – A REALLY
GOOD FILM UNTIL IT'S NOT

“10 Cloverfield Lane” could be deemed a pseudo spin-off/part of the same universe as 2008 hit film, “Cloverfield.” However, it's never been publicly stated that it is despite sharing the title in its own name. This film, which was directed by the fresh new talent, Dan Trachtenberg, is about a young woman that gets into a horrific car accident and awakens in a shelter with two men, one of which claims the outside world is affected by a widespread chemical attack. Think of last year's “Room” with more thriller/mystery elements. Now the original spec script that sold was called “The Cellar” and it had a very different ending (the last 10-15 minutes). J.J. Abrams bought the script and hired Damien Chazelle (“Whiplash”) to rewrite the ending in more of a J.J. Abrams type of film. For better or worse, the ending has seemed to have people become indecisive about it. Personally, I thought the film was really strong until they altered the ending. Instead the audience is left with the same old tired, common ending we've seen hundreds of times before. Does it work? Sure. Is it great? Not even close.

We are first introduced to Mary Elizabeth Winstead's character Michelle as she abandons her new home and leaves behind her engagement ring behind. She is on the road unsure to where she is headed. No dialogue has been used until her fiancé Ben calls pleading with her to come back. After she hangs up on him, he calls again. Reluctant to answer the phone, she is sideswiped, tumbling violently off the side of the road. She awakens chained to a wall inside a small windowless bunker. Confused and terrified, she soon meets Howard (John Goodman). At first, he seems like someone that saved her life, but he isn't willingly to let her leave. His reason is because there was an attack, an airborne attack of some sort. It might not be safe to go outside for a year or two. With no one knowing where she is and her cellphone having no service, Michelle is stuck at the mercy of Howard. Soon later, it is revealed another man is inside this underground backhouse. We are introduced to a local named Emmett (John Gallagher Jr.) that Howard took in as well. Emmett believes Howard's theory about what is going on outside yet Michelle is very skeptical as

she tries to escape a few hours later. It's interesting that Howard would want another man inside the shelter just in case he proves to be a threat. At the same token, it leads you to believe maybe Howard is right about what is going outside as he wants no one to leave or entering his fortress of sorts.

When Michelle fails to escape and realizes something is certainly awry outside, she ends up making the best of her time with Howard and Emmett despite the dire circumstances. She even strikes up a friendship with the two, especially with Emmett and that seems to cause some hostility with Howard. When we find out more about Howard, the audience can sympathize with him, but still be a bit weary of his intentions. With that being said, there's a menacing side to him as well when he's under the impression something is not right. The best surprises of the film come with the unpredictable behavior of Howard. John Goodman is terrific here. He's absolutely a true highpoint of this small time, contained thriller. Like I mentioned before, three-fourths of the film will truly hold your interest and many people will still like the ending—fanboys of the genre and supernatural enthusiasts come to mind. 

GOP GAPES AT ITS EXISTENTIAL CRISIS

It's thigh-slappingly funny to recall that RNC chairman Reince Priebus said on the eve of this national race that "Republicans will choose from a deep bench of presidential material."

After the latest round of contests and the latest winnowing of the field, here's what the GOP is left with: A celebrity hate-peddler whose agenda is built on bluster, a far-right government-crashing ideologue who would lose 40 states, and a governor whose primary season record is 1-28.

Yes, folks, the GOP's long-gestating existential crisis has finally arrived. What does it stand for as a party? Three years after vowing, in an official report, to adopt a more tolerant tone and nurture relations with an increasingly diverse electorate, is it now willing to let itself be trampled by Donald Trump? How hard is it prepared to fight (if at all) to regain its self-respect and retain its claim to being "the party of Lincoln?"

The delegate math makes these questions ever more urgent. After winning in Florida, Illinois, North Carolina, and (apparently) Missouri, Trump is well-poised to reach the Cleveland convention with a solid plurality of delegates. His loss in Ohio, courtesy of home-boy Gov. John Kasich, is a stone in his shoe that slows his march, but he can still clinch a delegate majority if he wins 60 percent of those not yet chosen. That's arguably a tall order. But his chief rival is Ted Cruz, who's widely hated in the party, and who's surely toxic in late-voting delegate-rich states like California, New York and New Jersey.

Within the party, there's still great unease about Trump. According to the Ohio exit polls, 43 percent of those who voted in the Republican primary said they would "seriously consider voting for a third-party candidate" if Trump wins the nomination. That's significant, because no Republican has ever won the White House without winning Ohio.

And similar sentiment was expressed elsewhere. In North Carolina, a state that went blue eight years ago, 39 percent of voting Republicans said

they'd seriously look at a third-party candidate if Trump gets the nod. In Missouri, a state that has tilted red in the last four elections, that share was 43 percent. In swing-state Florida, it was 29 percent.

So is the GOP prepared to blow up its own convention in order to thwart Trump? Under the current rules, only those candidates who have won the majority of delegates in eight states can be formally placed in nomination. Right now, only Trump meets that criterion. Cruz might hit that mark, but Kasich probably won't. But if the GOP is serious about stopping Trump, it could vote to dump that rule — thus boosting Kasich, or perhaps paving the way for a late entrant who didn't run in the primaries at all.

The hope — among saner, civil Republicans — is that Trump comes up short on the first ballot, so that enough delegates would be freed up for subsequent ballots. The hope is they would then rationally assess the race by looking at electability. And the fact is, Hillary Clinton has been beating Trump in virtually every poll.

But if the GOP heeds the electability factor and somehow manages to come to its senses, what would happen then? Trump might well announce that the party isn't treating him nice and bolt, taking his fans with him. Which would leave the party just as fractured.

Still, maybe a Trump exodus is the best outcome — because otherwise, this autumn, all the down-ballot swing-state Republicans will be compelled to say whether they agree with their nominee's denigration of women, stoking of violence, endorsement of torture, exploitation of bigotry, and whatever acts of repugnance that have yet to be committed.

It's their soul at stake. Will they try to save it?

HOWARD Hays As I See It



"This is yet another attempt by the establishment elites and dark money . . . to maintain control of our broken and corrupt system." (attribution follows)

Less than a year ago, April 2015, a CNN poll showed Jeb Bush leading the race for the GOP presidential nomination at 17% support - followed by Wisconsin Gov. Scott Walker at 12% with Sens. Rand Paul (KY) and Marco Rubio (FL) at 11% each. This was two months before Donald Trump entered the race and ten months before votes were cast at the Iowa caucuses (where Texas Sen. Ted Cruz came out on top). Now we have former establishment favorite Bush endorsing Cruz not because he likes the candidate (it seems nobody does), but because he regards Cruz as the establishment's best hope for denying the nomination to current frontrunner Trump.

Another former establishment candidate, Sen. Lindsey Graham (R-SC), says although he prefers Ohio Gov. John Kasich, he's instead supporting Cruz, who he thoroughly dislikes, because 1) he has a better chance than Kasich and 2) he's not Trump.

Democrats have their own "establishment". One candidate, after a youthful foray as a Goldwater Girl, has been a solid establishment Democrat ever since. The other, while running for the Democratic nomination, continues holding his Senate seat as an Independent. But the results will still depend on which candidate goes into the convention with the most delegates. With the Republicans, it's instead shaping up as a matter of the establishment determining the outcome, regardless of who acquires how many delegates before the convention.

The term "establishment" used to be reserved for party henchmen. The big three Democratic candidates in 1968 were President Lyndon Johnson, Sen. Eugene McCarthy (MN) and Robert F. Kennedy. LBJ pulled out March 31 and his VP Hubert Humphrey entered the race - after missing the primary season. RFK was assassinated June 5; his delegates then up for grabs. There were protests at the convention accusing the party establishment of having seen to Humphrey's nomination, despite the anti-LBJ "peace" candidates, RFK and McCarthy, having together gotten more primary votes than LBJ did.

(I shook hands with HHH at a rally in Seattle that year, and noticed the contrast between Nixon's offering slogans - "silent majority", "law and order" - and Humphrey's offering pamphlets of detailed policy positions. In his one on foreign policy, he predicted that although attention was then focused on Viet Nam and the Soviet Union, in the decades to come the real threats to world peace would come from the Middle East. Nobody then seemed to know what he was talking about.)

Especially after the Citizens United decision, the "establishment" now is not so much party bigwigs as it is whoever's putting up the money. The Koch brothers' Americans for Prosperity helps determine not only presidential outcomes but local races and down-ballot

measures all over the country.

A local referendum on the ballot in Plainfield, Illinois a couple weeks ago was one the Koch brothers had to get involved with, committing sufficient funds to ensure its defeat. The referendum, the product of years of "focus groups, surveys and public town meetings", called for a 20-year bond paid for by a slight increase in property taxes. This measure the Koch brothers had to kill was for a new downtown library; "new technology, public meeting spaces, classrooms", etc. Now, the folks of Plainfield will instead see a 20% cut in services just so their current library can stay afloat.

This corporate establishment, though, is more concerned with the bottom line than any party line. Disney has joined Atlanta-based companies Coca-Cola, Home Depot and UPS in warning the state of Georgia against enacting a measure allowing "religion" to be used as cover for anti-gay discrimination. Regardless of how popular it might be with the state's Republican governor and legislature, this corporate establishment is letting them know that bigotry is bad for business - and states that condone it aren't suitable to open shop or shoot a movie in.

This week's opening quote isn't from Bernie Sanders or MoveOn but from Hope Hicks, spokesperson for Donald Trump. She was reacting to a campaign by billionaires and the Wall Street establishment to see that Trump doesn't become their party's nominee. They had their own fundraising challenges, as members had already sunk \$100 million backing Jeb Bush. They came through, though, maybe not so much because of how a Trump presidency would ruin economy but because of how a Trump nomination would all but guarantee the election of Hillary Clinton, "loss" of the Senate and now, it appears, maybe even a Democratic House.

As to how the establishment got in this mess, you could go back to their embrace of the Karl Rove-engineered gerrymandering of districts following the 2010 census. Then, especially since the Supreme Court's gutting of the Voting Rights Act three years ago, there's been establishment support of voter suppression efforts to limit participation of constituencies thought to lean Democratic: poor folks, students, the elderly, etc.; along with the strategy of "firing up the base" by appealing to fear, bigotry, xenophobia and religious zealotry.

The result has been contests not between Democrat and Republican or right and left, but between the far right and the farther right and the outright fruitcakes. The real races are in the primaries, where reliable "establishment" conservatives are ousted for the merest suspicion of heresies like "bipartisanship" and "compromise".

Last week marked the 51st anniversary of the Selma to Montgomery march for voting rights, when Dr. King told us to "march on the ballot boxes until brotherhood becomes more than a meaningless word in an opening prayer, but the order of the day on every legislative agenda."

That might be some time coming. For now, the establishment is wondering who to blame for a situation in which the likes of a Donald Trump threatens the very survival of their party. In assigning this blame, they could start by looking in a mirror.

If we proceed past what the Bible describes as "righteous anger" -- when we cross the line from "hating the sin but loving the sinner" to hating the sinner -- we've journeyed to the dark side, whether we like it or not. That's why some believe it's okay to riot in order to silence free speech, or others have no problem punching the lights out of those with whom they disagree.

As Americans are angry. In 2008, we watched Barack Obama rise to power on a wave of anger over war weariness and an economic crisis that spread over the United States like a tsunami. People blindly followed their proverbial knight in shining armor bearing glad tidings of hope and change, defending him at any cost, despite warnings from very concerned columnists like me.

Today, we're witnessing a


similar scenario multiplied exponentially, now that the anger level's been raised to fever pitch. Formerly "just angry" people are outraged -- while those on the other side of the aisle are equally stirred at GOP politicians and their failed promises to stop the wrecking ball set in motion by the left's faux agent of hope.

How does this end? On one side we have an extremely divisive president who once told supporters to "take guns to knife fights," and defines political opponents as "enemies." 
