

2016 MOUNT WILSON TRAIL RACE – PERFECT WEATHER FOR A RACE UP THE MOUNTAIN TRAIL

Sierra Madre - It was another successful year for the Mount Wilson Trail Race thanks to optimal trail conditions and hardworking teams of volunteers. All 304 participants safely completed the difficult 8.6 mile course—an impressive feat worth a lifetime of bragging rights. Hundreds of spectators stood along the sidelines as the official race starter, Nigel Rini, fired the start gun. At a time of 1:01:35, Adrian Diaz from Duarte, CA finished first in the race. This was the 18 year old's first victory at the Trail Race. First female, Mireya Vargas returned to the podium and ran an outstanding race to win with a time of 1:17:50. Mireya won back to back in 2013 and 2014 Mount Wilson Trail Races.

Families enjoyed the annual Pasta Feed Dinner in Kersting Court the night before the race. Mount Wilson Committee members catered the dinner which included pasta, salad, breadsticks (donated by StoneFire Grill) and delicious Rice Crispies treats (provided by Sierra Madre Civic Club). Attendees there to load up on carbohydrates also had the opportunity to participate in a raffle, purchase souvenirs and check in to the Trail Race and Kids' Fun Run. Partial proceeds from the night benefited Sierra Madre Search and Rescue which provides race day safety support.

Fun was had by all on the day of the race. A high performance road bicycle, donated by CENTRIC Bicycles of Sierra Madre was raffled off on race day. Those not racing enjoyed themselves either by cheering on the sidelines, visiting vendor booths and socializing in the Beer Garden. The annual Kids' Fun Run, sponsored by Sierra Madre Community Foundation, was once again a success with over 200 young participants. Each child participating in the free Kid's Fun run received a Mount Wilson Kids' Fun Run t-shirt and participation ribbon.

**CITY COUNCIL TO CONSIDER AMENDMENT TO THE R-3 (MULTIPLE FAMILY RESIDENTIAL ZONE)**

City Council will be holding a public hearing to consider amendments to the R-3 (Multiple Family Residential Zone) Ordinance, Chapter 17.28 of the Sierra Madre Municipal Code. The purpose of the Municipal Code amendment is to allow densities of approximately thirteen (13) units per acre and establish maximum floor areas based on lot size.

The City Council meeting will be held on June 14, 2016 at 6:30pm in City Hall Council Chambers (232 West Sierra Madre Blvd). This meeting is open to the public and there will be opportunities to make comments. Information regarding the draft amendments is available at City Hall, the City library and on the City's website.

**INTERESTED IN BECOMING MORE INVOLVED IN YOUR LOCAL GOVERNMENT?**

The City of Sierra Madre is now accepting applications to fill five citizen advisory positions opening at the end of June. The City's commissions and boards meet once to two times a month and provide a valuable community voice on some of the City's top issues. In addition to giving direct input to the departments they serve, commissions and boards may be called upon to provide formal recommendations to City Council. The City has a number of vacancies available:

- Community Services Commission – One regular vacancy and one youth (ages 13-17) vacancy
- Library Board of Trustees – One vacancy
- Planning Commission – One vacancy
- Senior Community Commission – Two vacancies

The Commission is responsible for overseeing the City's recreation and community services programs. Meets the 3rd Monday of every month at 6:30pm.

The Board serves to ensure efficient and effective services are provided at the library. Meets the 4th Wednesday of every month at 7:00pm.

Responsible for regulating the type, scale and land use that may be established at a given location. Meets the 1st and 3rd Thursday of every month at 7:00pm.

Applications for these commissions/boards are available at City Hall and on the City's website. Completed applications should be submitted to the City Manager's Office. Review of applicants will continue until a sufficient number of applications has been received. Residents are encouraged to submit materials as soon as possible to ensure proper consideration.

### WATER PENALTIES SET TO INCREASE

This year's El Niño rains have had a limited impact on our part of the state. Water conservation remains as critical as ever as California enters into its fifth year of drought. Sierra Madre City Council approved a measure in May that would increase the penalty rate assessed on excess water use.

The City of Sierra Madre would like to thank its water-wise customers for doing their part to make every drop count. The latest water billing numbers for May show 75% of Sierra Madre customers met, or outperformed, their water conservation targets. The remaining 25% of customers are of increasing concern for the City, as many of the customers who exceeded their water use target in the month have a repeat history of doing so.

The City of Sierra Madre will introduce a new water penalty rate beginning on July 1, 2016. The rate will apply to each billing unit used in excess of a customer's conservation target. The current penalty rate is \$5.04/unit. The new rate will increase to \$10.72, or two times the Tier 4 rate.







## Local Man Arrested for Attempted Murder

Pasadena Police arrested a man for attempted murder after he robbed a North West Pasadena market Wednesday and then shot at the store clerk and three witnesses.

According to police Justin Bryson, a 21-years old, Pasadena resident, entered Chan's Market in the 1200 block of Lincoln Avenue at about 12:49 p.m. with a bandana covering his face and armed with a handgun. Bryson approached the store clerk and demanded cash from the register. The clerk then walked away from the register and began throwing items at the suspect. Bryson fired a single shot from his handgun in the direction of the clerk. As Bryson exited the store, he pointed his handgun at a 47-year old woman from El Cajon. Bryson then fled on foot northbound on Lincoln Avenue. The woman got into her car and followed Bryson. Two other women, both from Pasadena, also pursued Bryson in their vehicle behind the first lady. During the victims' pursuit of the suspect in their vehicles, the Bryson turned around at one point, and possibly fired at least one gunshot at the victims. Bryson escaped in the vicinity of MacDonald Street between Mentone Avenue and Glen Avenue.

Officers said that a containment area was established. Patrol officers, officers from the special enforcement section, and the police helicopter responded to search for the suspect. Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department Bloodhound Units were also deployed during the search. Bryson was located in the 200 block of MacDonald Street where he voluntarily surrendered to officers. Detectives executed a search warrant at the location and evidence was recovered. The suspect was arrested for attempted murder and booked at the city jail.

Neither the clerk nor the witnesses were injured doing the incident.

Bryson is being held without bail police said.

## GOLD LINE CRASHES 6 PEOPLE HURT



An elderly man and five other people were injured Wednesday afternoon after an SUV collided with a Gold Line train at the Glenarm Street crossing.

Pasadena Fire Department spokeswoman Lisa Derderian said the crash happened at around 12:30 p.m. at the intersection of Raymond Avenue and Glenarm Street. The driver of a Mercedes SUV, a man in his 70s, had serious injuries. Five other adult passengers on the train were also injured. All six were taken to a nearby hospital.

Derderian said by the look

of the vehicle, the situation could have been a lot worse. According to Metro officials, there were about 80 to 100 people on the train at the time.

According to reports, the Mercedes was traveling eastbound on Glenarm Street and the train was southbound going to Union Station in Los Angeles. The cause of the crash is still under investigation. The intersection does have crossing arms and flashing lights.

Both sides of the tracks were closed and buses were

used to shuttle passengers between Fillmore Station and South Pasadena. Metro Officials said there was about a 15 minute delay in travel times.

Full service was restored around 3 p.m. after repair crews fixed a damaged signaling switch.

A Mero passenger said it was a bad day for the Gold Line. Earlier that morning around 9 a.m., a southbound train had mechanical issues, at the Memorial Park station, causing delays.

*El Niño Winter and California Water: What did we see from space?*



Starting on June 16, Arcadia Transit will introduce an expanded fixed-route, fixed-schedule shuttle service for use by all riders. With three shuttle lines in operation, Red, Green and Blue, Arcadia Transit is able to connect riders with some of Arcadia's most popular destinations such as the Arcadia Gold Line Station, shopping and dining areas, entertainment venues, schools, and hospital and medical facilities. Serving the community since 1975, Arcadia Transit has traditionally operated as a dial-a-ride service. However, to better meet the needs of residents, visitors, and businesses, Arcadia Transit has been enhanced by adding a fixed-route, fixed-schedule shuttle service for the general public while still maintaining a dial-a-ride service strictly for seniors and those with disabilities. This change in service provides more equitable access to transportation options throughout the City.

The addition of the shuttle service allows the general public to access Arcadia Transit, with fixed stops along the three shuttle lines at a cost of 50 cents per ride with one free transfer. Seniors and those with disabilities will be able to benefit from

(MONROVIA, CA -) In 1943, Julius Parker was a senior attending Monrovia-Arcadia-Duarte High School, and World War II was in full swing. Rather than complete high school, Mr. Parker enlisted in the army to serve his nation, and in so doing, sacrificed many teenage rites of passage. Perhaps the most important of these was graduating from high school. Board President Rob Hammond said, "On June 7, 2016, 74 years later, the Monrovia Unified School District Board of Education is honored to award Mr. Parker his high school diploma."

"I am so thankful to receive my high school diploma after all these years," said Mr. Parker who was unable to join in the commencement exercises. He noted, "These days, I don't get out that often." The 91-year-old graduate received his diploma at his home in Monrovia where MUSD Board President,

Rob Hammond; Vice President, Bryan Wong; Board Clerk, Terrence Williams; Board Member, Ed Gililand; Superintendent, Dr. Katherine Thorossian; and Principal, Kirk McGinnis gathered for a special ceremony.

## DIRECTLY ELECTED MAYOR VS. ROTATIONAL MAYOR – PUBLIC OUTREACH SCHEDULE ESTABLISHED

Recently, the Monrovia City Council unanimously requested that staff look into the City's established process for selecting the Mayor. Currently, the City utilizes a directly elected Mayor governance structure where the Mayor is elected once every two years in odd-numbered years. However, the vast majority of cities similar to Monrovia rotate the position of Mayor amongst the members of the elected City Council.

In fact, a survey that was recently completed illustrates that 78% of cities in the San Gabriel Valley with a population of under 100,000 people utilize a governance structure whereby the position of Mayor is rotated between all members of the City Council.

As part of the review process, the City created a Directly Elected Mayor Advisory Review Committee (Committee) to assist with the assessment of our current system of selecting the Mayor. The Committee is made up of individuals from a wide cross-section of Monrovia and includes a former city manager, two current elected officials, the executive director of a chamber of commerce, and a member of a City commission. As these outreach meetings occur, it is important to note... the decision regarding whether or not we will change the way that we select the Mayor is not a decision that can be made by the City. Ultimately, the voters of Monrovia will have to decide if it makes sense to transition our governance structure from a directly elected Mayor to one where the position of Mayor rotates between the elected members of the City Council.

## ALISON KALMUS THEATER (AKT) ACADEMY SUMMER WORKSHOPS BEGIN JULY 11

For the first time in eight years, Alison Kalmus Theater (AKT) Academy will be conducting summer workshops for young actors at Sierra Madre Playhouse. Her workshops had previously been conducted at the Playhouse from 2000 to 2008.

This year, sessions will take place from July 11- July 22; July 25- August 5; and August 8- August 19.

Morning workshops will be for children in elementary school grades. The workshop is called Mr. Shakespeare's Poetry Garden and runs from 9 a.m. to Noon. What? Shakespeare for young children? Ms. Kalmus explains: "Think about it. Shakespeare's language is beautiful and quite musical. And young children respond to it with enthusiasm. They like the meter, and rhyme. And they love learning new words. At last count, Mr. Shakespeare was credited with inventing over 2,000 new words for the English Language. Any six or seven year old child who can recite a sonnet or a soliloquy from Shakespeare and understand it while reciting is better prepared to excel in the language arts of reading and writing."

Activities include making Shakespeare FUN through rehearsal, performance, crafts and study of Shakespeare's world. The workshop culminates in a Friends And Family presentation.

Afternoon workshops, for older youngsters and teens, will focus on The Magic of Musical Theatre. This one runs from 1 p.m. to 5 p.m. Why musicals? Ms. Kalmus responds, "Musical theater is where the theater thrives today. It's usually a child's first theater attendance experience - what they know and share with each other, family and school, and it's what many of them want to try .... It's especially important for young singers to develop sound and safe vocal techniques. There is a real danger that children listening favorite recording artists will attempt to sing along, mimicking the adult singer without realizing they could damage their voices permanently. I have sadly witnessed the carelessness and ignorance with which young voices are dangerously pushed."

This workshop includes scene, song and movement study through interpretation of lyric, character analysis.

## Julie's Favorite Family Recipes

### PASTA WITH FARM STAND VEGETABLES

- 1 pkg. (16oz) campanelle or corkscrew pasta
- 2 Tablespoons olive oil
- 2 garlic cloves, crushed with garlic press
- 1 teaspoon ground cumin
- pinch ground cinnamon
- 3 cups fresh corn kernels (5-6 ears)
- ½ teaspoon ground black pepper
- 1 zucchini
- 1 pint cherry tomatoes, each cut in half

Cook pasta as label directs. Meanwhile in nonstick 12 inch skillet, heat oil over medium-high heat until hot. Add garlic, cumin, and cinnamon, and cook 30 seconds or until fragrant, stirring. Add corn and cook 4 minutes, stirring occasionally. Add zucchini, pepper, and 1-½ teaspoons salt and cook 6 minutes, stirring occasionally. Add tomatoes and cook about 2 minutes longer or until tomatoes are heated through and zucchini is tender. When pasta is cooked to desired doneness, remove ¼ cup pasta cooking water and reserve. Drain pasta. In large serving bowl, toss pasta, corn mixture, and reserved cooking water until combined.



## THE NEW MIND DIET MAY HELP PREVENT ALZHEIMER'S

*Dear Savvy Senior,*  
I've heard that there's a new diet that can help prevent Alzheimer's disease. What can you tell me about this? My 80-year-old mother has Alzheimer's and I want to do everything I can to protect myself.  
Concerned Daughter

Dear Concerned,  
It's true! Research has found that a new diet plan – called the MIND diet – can have a profound impact on your brain health as you age, and can even lower your odds of getting Alzheimer's disease.

The MIND diet takes two proven diets – the heart-healthy Mediterranean diet and the blood-pressure lowering DASH diet – and zeroes in on the foods in each that specifically affect brain health.

The MIND diet, which stands for “Mediterranean-DASH Intervention for Neurodegenerative Delay,” was developed by Martha Clare Morris, a nutritional epidemiologist at Rush University Medical Center, through a study funded by the National Institute on Aging.

The study followed the diets of nearly 1,000 elderly adults, who filled out food questionnaires and underwent repeated neurological testing for an average of 4.5 years.

It found participants whose diets most closely followed the MIND recommendations had brains that functioned as if they were 7.5 years younger, and it lowered their risk of developing Alzheimer's disease by as much as 53 percent. And even those who didn't stick to the diet perfectly but followed it moderately well reduced their risk of Alzheimer's by 35 percent.

### The MIND Menu

The MIND diet has 15 dietary components. The emphasis is on eating from 10 brain-healthy food groups, and limiting foods from five unhealthy groups. Here's a rundown of the healthy foods you should work into your diet:

- Green leafy vegetables (like spinach and salad greens): Eat at least one serving per day.
- Other vegetables: At least one other vegetable a day.
- Whole grains: Three or more servings a day.



- Nuts: Five one-ounce servings a week.
- Beans: At least three servings a week.
- Berries: Two or more servings a week.
- Fish: Once a week.
- Poultry (not fried): Two times a week.
- Olive oil: Use it as your primary cooking oil.
- Wine: One glass a day.

And the five unhealthy food groups you should limit include:

- Red meat: Eat fewer than four servings a week.
- Butter and margarine: Less than a tablespoon daily.
- Cheese: Less than one serving a week.
- Pastries and sweets: Less than five servings a week.
- Fried or fast food: Less than one serving a week.

### Other Benefits

One of the best things about the MIND diet is that it's easier to follow than most other diets and you don't have to stick to it perfectly to gain the benefits, which makes it more likely you'll follow it for a long time. And the longer you eat the MIND way, the lower the risk of getting Alzheimer's disease.

Another advantage is that the MIND diet can help you lose some weight too, if you keep your portions in check and are careful about how the food is prepared.

It's also important to understand that even though diet plays a big role, it's only one aspect of Alzheimer's disease. So get regular exercise, if you smoke, quit, and learn how manage your stress to lower your risk even more.



The official voter guide starts out with information about voter's rights, and propositions that are on the ballot. It's all somewhat dry until you get to the Senate candidate statements. These are meant to be fairly straightforward. Each candidate has the option to include a photo, statement, contact information, and website. Some candidates have professional pictures and polished (coherent, grammatically correct) statements that include political experience and other relevant credentials. Those are the boring ones. But interspersed among them are little gems that, if you take the time to read them, are often quite funny!

First, there's the pictures. I was surprised that many candidates didn't submit a photo, but more surprised by the photos that the candidates actually did submit! Several of them appeared to be taken in front of a cinder block wall (like a booking photo), others looked like unsmiling mug shots from the smoking gun website. Honestly, I know we're not all photogenic, but if you want people to pick you as a political leader, you should at least put your best face forward.

Next, there's the statements. Some are so brief that I wondered if they realized they were allotted a whole half page in which to express themselves. Although a number of statements were very short, they still managed to fit in grammatical errors or just plain incoherence such as (e.g., “Challenge 10 giant chaos in economy and economy-related sectors.” Another reads, “My education & expertise merits this prolific occupation in order to represent California as United Senator.”). Either they are opposed to using their spelling and grammar check, or their campaign team is sleeping on the job. Another interesting thing was the amount of information given following each statement. The most professional looking ones had a P.O. box, telephone number, email address, and website. Then there were some with just a P.O. box (one of the candidates with a picture like a mug shot did this). But some went so far as to list their home address and cell phone! And it was one from this last category who was, by far, my favorite – at least in terms of entertainment.

I'm not going to name names because the candidate in question sounds a bit unstable, and I don't want to wind up murdered in the bushes somewhere. Her picture is actually



very nice and looks professionally done. It gets weird, however, when you start reading her statement. Here's a snippet from her sprawling narrative (she's not one of the brief ones, not by a long shot!). It reads, “International bankers, multinational corporate leaders, militaries and police must all 100% obey, comply with the Constitution of the US/UN in the Spirit of Truth, Serving All in Peace. Transforming from the Industrial Technology Age to the new ‘Energy Technology Era’ will saturate US job markets for the next 500 years.”

So far it sounds like it could be the manifesto of a cult or the script from a B movie, but it gets better! “Through my national and international research and political activism, I identified ‘mind control slavery’ by satellite energy technology weapons and social engineering programs that have been in continual development for the past 50 years and facilitated their ‘declassification.’ As a result, I came under heavy sanctions that are ongoing.” Wow! I had no idea Senate statements read like science fiction novels! I must say, though, at least she's more grammatical than some of them.

What's more shocking than the things people write is that they may become our leaders if we're not careful! So if you want to vote conscientiously, stay informed. And if you want a good laugh, dig out the voter guide from the recycling bin and read those candidate statements you skipped over before. And watch out for the mind control slavery!

## FIFTY YEARS OF MOON DUST: SURVEYOR 1 WAS A PATHFINDER FOR APOLLO

Before humans could take their first steps on the Moon, that mysterious and forbidding surface had to be reconnoitered by robots. In 1961, When President John Kennedy set a goal of landing astronauts on the lunar surface, little was known of that world, beyond what could be gleaned from observations by telescopes.

Was the surface solid enough to support the 33,500-pound Apollo lunar lander? Or was it so deeply covered in dust from billions of years of meteorite impacts, as some theorized, that the lunar module would simply sink out of sight, dooming the astronauts?

A series of U.S. mapping spacecraft called Lunar Orbiters photographed the Moon from orbit in 1966 and 1967. But it would be the Surveyors that would scout that rugged surface for Apollo, and 50 years ago this month, the first of that series of landers touched down successfully. Surveyor 1 landed on the Moon on June 2, 1966.

As JPL's Justin Rennilson, co-principal investigator on the Surveyor television experiment, recalls, "Planning for Apollo required getting really high-resolution images showing the details of the lunar surface.. Even something two feet in size could topple a spacecraft."

"We figured the probability of success at around 10 to 15 percent," Rennilson said.

Surveyor had been sent on a direct trajectory—it would not enter lunar orbit before landing, but would hurtle directly towards the surface at 6,000 mph. The thrusters had to fire at precisely the right moment and maintain perfect orientation to communicate with Earth, all the way down.

"I remember sitting there watching the oscilloscope as the spacecraft was coming down," said Rennilson, "all the way to the lunar surface. 'God, the signal is still there and it is still working!' I thought. We were successful and it was just astounding."

The first views of the lunar surface were striking, but not easily acquired. Photography from space was still in its infancy. The camera was advanced for its time, a slow-scan television imager with a zoom lens—the first time such an arrangement had been used in space.

The first sets of panoramic images were created using a then-new technique of taking instant-photography images from a small TV screen and then assembling the photographs into a larger image. Rennilson remembers the process vividly: "We had a

Polaroid camera attached to a 5-inch-diameter CRT so that you could capture images on Polaroid film.

By the end of Surveyor 1's mission six months after it landed on the Moon, 11,240 images had been returned, allowing for the creation of dozens of wide panoramas and allowing the examination of details as small as 0.04 inch (1 millimeter) in diameter. Images

of the three footpads demonstrated that not only was landing on the Moon possible, but that the lander had not sunk into deep Moon dust—as was feared by some scientists—but had landed on a firm, supportive surface.

By the time Surveyor 7 completed operations on the Moon in February 1968—just 10 months before

Apollo 8 orbited the Moon—the pathway to the first crewed lunar landing of Apollo 11 on July 20, 1969, was open. The Surveyor program had been critical to that accomplishment.

Water conservation is good all the time, especially for anyone living here in Los Angeles County. After all, there are far too many of us living here in this

wonderful climate which is a coastal desert plain. That's right – we live in a desert! That's why most of our water is imported from hundreds of miles away.

Water conservation makes sense. It's the way we should be living all the time, not just when we're forced to by circumstances.

But the suggestion to just stop watering trees and shrubs and plants and let them die off is not a viable suggestion.

Consider the great mystery of trees and the wonderful things they do. They draw water up to the surface with their deep roots. They constantly transpire, sending water vapour into the surrounding environment. This means it is always cooler around trees and other plants. Due to this effect of transpiration, trees also create little microclimates – they create weather – and even localized wind can be created by the updraft of water vapour from trees. We do NOT want to just let our trees die off for the short-sighted goal of "saving water." That would more rapidly create our environment into a barren wasteland.

Through water conservation and water-saving efforts, the land so worked can be cooler and be more fruitful from an ecological point of view, even when it is hotter and drier elsewhere.

For example, all household water (minus the toilet) can be easily recycled back into the yard to water the garden, the trees, and even the drought-tolerant plants.

Assuming the lay of your land is somewhat downhill, you can disconnect the washing machine drain pipe, connect a long hose and let the water drain to your yard or garden. (Buy biodegradable soaps). One load of wash and rinse can use 30 plus gallons, depending on your system. All that water can wash your clothes, and feed your yard.

I have always disconnected bath tub lines and let the water drain into the yard. This is simple plumbing which most folks should be able to do in a few hours. Building and Safety takes a dim view of these practices since they don't want people breeding mosquitoes for the entire neighborhood, so give careful thought to how you do this, and make sure your system doesn't become a problem.

Oh, I just remembered: all the officials constantly declare that we should take showers since "showers use less water." Really? Have you ever actually measured the amount of water you use in a shower? How long do you stay in there? If you're disciplined, you could take a water-efficient shower, and let that water flow into the yard. I have actually taken solar showers in the back yard, and the water all went to the grapefruit tree.

But typically, I take baths. I don't fill up the entire tub and then get in. Rather, I turn on the hot water, get in, and add a few small clothes items that I always wash by hand, thus relieving the load on the washing machine. Plus, it is much healthier to sit in the tub a bit and to scrub, rather than to race through the process. When I am done with the bath, I save some water in one-gallon jugs and recycle it by using it to flush the toilet. I let the remaining water drain out into my garden. I am using that water and getting much more out of it, and keeping my landscape alive and thriving and producing water-vapor-filled oxygen.

For dishwater, you can simply take the dish basin out into your yard and empty it on trees, roses, garden, etc. All the little food scraps will actually be a sort of fertilizer for the plants.

Be a part of the solution. Recycle all your water and keep your oxygen-producing plants alive.

I do agree with DWP that a lawn is pointless. Plant succulents, cactus, fruit trees – things that are useful and don't require excessive water. Some good and useful drought-tolerant plants include Peruvian mint, wandering Jew, New Zealand spinach, jade, aloes, prickly pear cactus, and many, many others.

We can live here in this desert and we can live here well. We just need to adapt to the desert, rather than arrogantly thinking that the desert should adapt to us.

## CANINES BRING COMFORT TO THE COURTROOM

In all of my 53 years, I have never fallen victim to a violent crime, nor have I been subpoenaed to testify as a witness in a court of law on a case involving a violent crime. Considering the statistics in America today, I must say I consider myself very fortunate to have escaped being among those who have. It has got to be the most difficult task a person will ever be forced to undertake, to be put on the stand and asked to answer questions posed by perfect strangers in front of a judge and jury, not to mention the perpetrator, while trying to cope with the loss of a loved one.

Few things would come as a true comfort to me, should I ever become the victim of a violent crime. However, one thing that does come to mind is to have a beloved, furry four-footed friend by my side to help me get through the awful ordeal.

I am not the only one who recognizes the value of having the unconditional love of a kind and comforting canine to assist victims of violent crimes. Indeed, one particular lady played a major part in initiating the availability of comfort dogs to act as "animal advocates" on victims' behalf and the trend has since gained momentum and spread to many states throughout the US.

In an article written by Rebecca Wallick, a journalist for Bark Magazine, she relates the history of how the canine became a courtroom comforter in the state of Washington back in 2003. It all started when Ellen O'Neill-Stephens, a prosecuting attorney in Seattle had an adult son who was seriously disabled with cerebral palsy. She went to Canine Companions for Independence (CCI) of Santa Rosa, CA to find a service dog for her son.

At CCI, Stephens found a big yellow Golden Retriever/Lab mix named Jeeter, and a match was made almost immediately with her son. It was then that her son's life changed tremendously for the better. Jeeter made it possible for Sean to open up to people when they'd approach to greet the sweet dog. This facilitated Sean's ability to "give back" to others with Jeeter acting as his social advocate.

During Stephens' time in training with Jeeter and her son at CCI, she saw other participants getting "facility" dogs (dogs trained to assist caregivers in various institutions), including autistic and otherwise seriously disabled children. Somehow this inspired her to consider the possibility of using facility dogs in legal settings, and because she was the Drug Court prosecutor she thought the dogs would be of great value to kids

in recovery.

As it turned out, Stephens' insight proved to have a positive impact on numerous recovering kids. Jeeter became a mascot to many who came through her court. Then one day, a sexually abused boy was waiting in her lobby and immediately bonded with Jeeter who was also happened to be sitting in the lobby at the time. The boy had been asked by the prosecutor to testify against his offender but he was afraid to do so.

Stephens thought perhaps Jeeter could help facilitate the boy's testimony if the dog would be allowed to accompany him to the stand. The judge allowed the dog to come to court and Stephens requested that everyone sit on the floor during the hearing so the boy could sit and hug Jeeter. Defense counsel, prosecutor, cop - everyone sat on the floor, and it worked. The boy told them everything that happened.

After the success Jeeter had with the abused boy, Stephens decided the King County prosecutor's office needed to have a facility dog on staff to work with victims, and went about doing what it took to make it happen. King County has been using courtroom canines to comfort victims ever since!

Subsequent to the establishment of King County's innovative approach, prosecutors in several other states followed Stephens' lead by adding a canine comfort unit to their courtroom staff, with amazingly successful results.

It never ceases to amaze me, what a dog can do for a human, if we are open to their help. From guiding a blind person down a busy sidewalk, to rescuing people trapped after a disaster, to relieving stress for the victim of a crime, or simply sitting by his master's side within the four walls of what might otherwise be a very lonely home, the list goes on and on.

We are blessed to have the unconditional love and affection of our four-legged friends. Be sure to tell your precious pups how much you love and appreciate them. Show them how important they are to you by giving them the quality care and love they deserve. Love and let live!



## PET OF THE WEEK BUGSY: ANIMAL ID #A4952322



## WHEN IS THE PURCHASE OF LONG-TERM CARE INSURANCE WORTH IT?

Elder Care is emerging as a significant issue for many people as life spans continue to increase. It is nice to know that because of health care advances, we can expect to live longer, but there are no included guarantees on the quality of life in the later years.

Many people eventually face a period in life when they can no longer do for themselves. Daily living tasks such as walking, bathing, cooking, and managing household affairs are beyond their physical and perhaps even mental capabilities. Frequently, that period has not been planned for by the individual or their family members. And sometimes, this period in life comes suddenly, such as when a debilitating fall takes place.

This type of insurance provides coverage for the expense of daily living assistance. It can cover in-home assistance as well as assisted living or nursing home costs. Often, an elderly person will suffer intermediate health issues before needing permanent assisted daily living. Health insurance and Medicare cover costs of treatment for injuries and illness and typically pay for some daily living assistance as the person recovers or levels off at a permanent degree of recovery. When that recovery occurs, though, those services no longer pay, and the person is on their own.

A long-term care insurance policy will pick up the ball at this point and, depending on its terms, pay for

daily living assistance for a period of time or for the life of the policyholder.

This type of insurance can be costly, depending on when it is purchased. The farther away you are from needing its coverage, the more affordable it is. Depending on the person's age and health, companies may not be willing to sell a policy, or the premiums will be high, reflecting the amount of risk it is assuming.

The decision of whether to buy this insurance is a mix of one's personal financial picture, health, family support network, and family history. For example, a healthy person whose parents lived long into life should be thinking about how he will be cared for in old age. Similarly, a person with no close family to rely on would want a safety net in place. In both of these situations, a proactive person might buy the insurance if she can afford it.

If the cost of the insurance seems beyond a person's budget, a couple of things can be considered. One is to divert money being saved for retirement to finance the premiums. In a way, the goal is the same—money for retirement years. This approach would require balance between having enough money to fund healthy retirement years and enough to avoid being placed in a nursing home when you need healthcare support.

Another consideration is money being spent on life insurance. Some people carry life insurance early in life to provide for dependents who will survive them, then keep carrying it after that need has passed. The premiums being paid for life insurance could be applied to long-term care insurance, recognizing that the need for insurance still exists, just for a different purpose. A life policy that carries a cash value could be cashed in to pay a lump sum premium for a long-term care policy.

If one buys a long-term policy, caution should be exercised to make sure the coverage pays for what you anticipate needing. Bathing, for example, is one of the first personal activities that an aging person cannot perform; cooking is another. Also, if purchased a number of years before the anticipated need, be sure the policy provides for inflation in the cost of services. And watch out for a waiting period between disability and payments.

Original plays, musicals, and standup comedians appearing in tiny theaters off Santa Monica and various other locations in and around Hollywood, but the show you won't want to miss is A Useful Life In C Major featuring pianist and dry, wry standup guy, David Wheatley. **A Self-Made Man: The Political Life of Abraham Lincoln Vol. I, 1809 - 1849** by Sidney Blumenthal

The first of a multi-volume history of Lincoln as a political genius—from his obscure beginnings to his presidency, assassination, and the overthrow of his post-Civil War dreams of Reconstruction. This first volume traces Lincoln from his painful youth, describing himself as "a slave," to his emergence as the man we recognize as Abraham Lincoln. From his youth as a "newsboy," a voracious newspaper reader, Lincoln became a free thinker, reading Tom Paine, as well as Shakespeare and the Bible, and studying Euclid to sharpen his arguments as a lawyer. Lincoln's anti-slavery thinking began in his childhood amidst the Primitive Baptist antislavery dissidents in backwoods Kentucky and Indiana, the roots of his repudiation of Southern Christian pro-slavery theology. Intensely ambitious, he held political aspirations from his earliest years. Obsessed with Stephen Douglas, his political rival, he battled him for decades. Successful as a circuit lawyer, Lincoln built his team of loyalists. Blumenthal reveals how Douglas and Jefferson Davis acting together made possible Lincoln's rise. Blumenthal describes a socially awkward suitor who had a nervous breakdown over his inability to deal with the opposite sex. His marriage to the upper class Mary Todd was crucial to his social aspirations and his political career. Blumenthal portrays Mary as an asset to her husband, a rare woman of her day with strong political opinions. Blumenthal's robust portrayal is based on prodigious research of Lincoln's record and of the period and its main players. It reflects both Lincoln's time and the struggle that consumes our own political debate.



**Hubris: The Tragedy of War in the Twentieth Century** by Alistair Horne

Sir Alistair Horne has been a close observer of war and history for more than fifty years and in this wise and masterly work, he revisits six battles of the past century and examines the strategies, leadership, preparation, and geopolitical goals of aggressors and defenders to reveal the one trait that links them all: hubris. In Greek tragedy, hubris is excessive human pride that challenges the gods and ultimately leads to total destruction of the offender. From the 1905 Battle of Tsushima in the Russo-Japanese War, to Hitler's 1941 bid to capture Moscow, to MacArthur's disastrous advance in Korea, to the French downfall at Dien Bien Phu, Horne shows how each of these battles was won or lost due to excessive hubris on one side or the other. In a sweeping narrative written with his trademark erudition and wit, Horne provides a meticulously detailed analysis of the ground maneuvers employed by the opposing armies in each battle. He also explores the strategic and psychological mindset of the military leaders involved to demonstrate how devastating combinations of human ambition and arrogance led to overreach. Making clear the danger of hubris in warfare, his insights hold resonant lessons for civilian and military leaders navigating today's complex global landscape. A dramatic, colorful, stylishly-written history, Hubris is a much-needed reflection on war from a master of his field.



**The Summer Before the War: A Novel** by Helen Simonson

**AFTER A LONG A LONG DAY OF PHOTOSYNTHESIZING, DO TREES FALL ASLEEP?**

It depends on how you define "sleep," but trees do relax their branches at night, which might be a sign of snoozing, scientists said.

In the only reported study to look at tree siestas, researchers set up lasers that measured the movements of two silver birch trees (Betula pendula) at night. One tree was in Finland and the other in Austria, and both were monitored from dusk until morning on dry, windless nights in September. This was close to the solar equinox, when daylight and nighttime are about equal.

The laser scanners used infrared light to illuminate different parts of the tree, each for fractions of a second. This provided enough detail to map each tree within minutes, the researchers said.

The silver birches' branches and leaves sagged at night; they reached their lowest position a few hours before sunrise, and then perked up again during the wee hours of the morning, the researchers found.

"Our results show that the whole tree droops during night, which can be seen as position change in leaves and branches," study lead author Eetu Puttonen, a researcher at the Finnish Geospatial Research Institute, said in a statement "The changes are not too large, only up to 10 centimeters [4 inches] for trees with a height of about 5 meters [16 feet]."

It's unclear if the sun "woke up" the trees or if they relied on their own internal circadian rhythm, the researchers said. But "the fact that some branches started returning to their daytime position already before sunrise would suggest this internal circadian clock hypothesis is right," the researchers wrote in the study published online on Feb. 29, 2016.

The famed botanist Carl Linnaeus (1707-1778) found that flowers confined to a dark cellar still opened and closed, and naturalist Charles Darwin (1809-1882) noted that the nocturnal movement of leaves and stalks on plants looked like sleep.

The tree study didn't address why the branches and leaves drooped at night, but it's likely related to the turgidity, or the internal water pressure within the tree, the researchers said.

"Plant movement is always closely connected with the water balance of individual cells, which is affected by the availability of light through photosynthesis," said study co-author András Zlinszky, a researcher at the Centre for Ecological Research at the Hungarian Academy of Sciences.

**Still Parade - "Concrete Vision"**

Niklas Kramer is a Berlin-based artist who performs under the moniker, Still Parade. He is set to release his ten-song debut collection known as Concrete Vision. He first hit the scene a few years back with debut single "Actor" and the Fields EP. Both releases were recorded in well-equipped professional studios with seasoned producers. Then, in 2014, his father bought him a tape machine and he began experimenting with particular sounds and recording techniques in his Berlin apartment. He soon discovered he favored what he could accomplish in his small bedroom. How does this translate for his debut? The results speak volumes as Kramer has crafted a dreamy, lax, and gleaming sound with all his beaming synths and drum beats that are linked up to fine exquisite pop melodies. The stunning record is chillwave heaven as it stirs up summer vibes and nostalgia. There's a burst of beauty at every corner as you navigate through the record. Concrete Vision walks a fine line between being an essential poolside album as well as an ethereal bedroom-pop endeavor.

Still Parade starts things off with the spacey, two-minute track "Seasons." The lyrics fall off around one minute as we are left a swirling, trance-like gem. The single, "Walk in the Park," explodes beautifully as the follow-up song. With Kramer's whispery vocals and lovely melodies, the atmosphere is a reverie. It's a wondrous, peaceful effort that has the ability to carry you home from wherever you may be. Kramer delicately recites the lines, "Why don't we take a walk in the park/ There's nothing like a walk in the park." It's directed to a love one in the attempts to find solace amidst chaotic times because the concept of a simple stroll through the park is rather divine. The title track, "Concrete Vision," is rich with vibrant synths and well-layered drumbeats. Keeping in form with the previous track, "Concrete Vision" displays dream guitars with a warm melody. "Let Go" is a sonorous endeavor with heavenly arrangements. More often than not, listeners will be reflecting upon their own situations and circumstances. Still Parade's debut is cohesive and inventive. The word that comes to mind to describe it is pretty. The soundscapes explored on "7:41" range from shimmering synths to delicate melodies. The track is another perky, sugary-psych effort that is abundantly charming. There really isn't a road Still Parade goes down that isn't worth exploring.

"Morning Light" is a lo-fi, dream-funk, psych-pop exertion that resembles the likes of Unknown Mortal Orchestra. However, Still Parade is creative enough to go beyond carbon copies of other contemporary artists. The work here is serene, relaxed, and wistful. It's definitely one of the stronger tracks despite every track here being particularly great. "True Love" is a lush, painfully gorgeous arranged effort. Clocking in at over 5 minutes, it has the longest running time of the ten tunes. However, there is something undeniably enchanting here. Arguably so, "True Love" easily could be deemed as Still Parade's masterpiece. The closing song here is "Reason." It reminds me of the band Wild Nothing, which of course is a great thing to be reminded of. It's teeming with dream-like beats, gleaming guitars, and Kramer's delicate lilt. In the end, Concrete Vision is immaculate, breathtaking, and elegant. It's consistent and tight, but isn't too constrained. There are some songs that go slightly off the beaten path and others that stay on course, but this isn't a repeat of something else you've heard before. While some sounds are a familiar, nevertheless, the end result has high marks. Concrete Vision is an otherworldly debut record worth getting immersed into because what you get out of it just may surprise you.

2016!




## HILLARY CLINTON MAKES HISTORY WHILE TRUMP MOPS HIS MESS

If you want an accurate reading on the 2016 presidential campaign — who's up and who's down, who's ascendant and who's a clown — look no further than Tuesday

night's speeches. Because it's all about the optics.

Hillary Clinton spent her time making history. Donald Trump spent his time doing damage control.

And Bernie Sanders — history's roadkill, crushed in California and New Jersey — did his best impression of Hiroo Onoda, a Japanese soldier who hunkered in the jungle for decades, refusing to accept the reality that World War II had ended.

There's no denying Clinton's achievement as the first female presidential nominee. Hopefully we're not so jaded or cynical or hateful or just plain weary that we can't open ourselves to the witnessing of history.

A sizeable share of women won't vote for Clinton, but the historic nature of her candidacy should not be underestimated. Every campaign needs a narrative, and Clinton's has a built-in emotional component. As she remarked Tuesday night, "I really wish my mother could be here... I wish she could see her daughter become the Democratic party's nominee."

By contrast, Trump's optics were... how shall I say this charitably... wretched.

For 10 long days, the Republican nominee had splashed in the sewer, damning a federal judge for his Mexican heritage and insisting the judge is unfit to handle a massive case in which Trump is being sued for fraud. The backlash from his own party reached a crescendo Tuesday when Paul Ryan said Trump's attacks were the "textbook definition" of racism.

Temporarily chastised, Trump surfaced in presidential mode, or at least some facsimile thereof. After ridiculing Clinton for using a Teleprompter, Trump duly read from one (except for the moment when he ad-libbed a toilet joke). The aim was to demonstrate that he's capable of talking for 30 straight minutes without saying anything racist, sexist, or faintly fascist, and, yes, he cleared that low hurdle. ("I

understand the responsibility of carrying the mantle.") But it was like lashing a wild beast to a stake in the hope that he won't break free.

Most of his lines were old stump chunks ("We are only going to have great trade deals, OK?" and "We will make our country strong again, we will make America great again") - and how noteworthy it was that he said nothing about the burgeoning Hispanic electorate (Hispanics are likely to cost him at least four states - Colorado, Nevada, Virginia, Florida). His sole remark about blacks dripped with paternalistic condescension: "We are going to take care of our African Americans."

Indeed, Clinton in her own speech assailed Trump's treatment of minorities: "Make America great again" is code for 'Let's take America backwards.' Back to a time when opportunity and dignity was reserved for some, not all."

Anyone who thinks that Trump's Teleprompter speech signals a "new Trump" should bone up on human nature. A narcissistic demagogue who knows nothing about policy is simply who he is. Lots of Republicans and conservatives realize that. Which is why Bill Kristol calls Trump "a roaring jackass" and conservative radio host Hugh Hewitt dismissed Trump's speech by saying, "The plane is still heading toward the mountain."

Or, as nonpartisan analyst Larry Sabato said, "This year's GOP is living with both its feet planted on banana peels."

The next opportunity for slippage may come early next week, when Trump is promising to deliver a speech about the Clintons - in his words, "all of the things that have taken place with the Clintons." Will he limit himself to legitimate questions about, say, the work of the Clinton Foundation, or will he steer the plane into the mountain, ranting on the intercom about Vince Foster and other 1990s nothingburgers?

Mitch McConnell said, "We're all anxious to hear what he may say next." I bet he is. Because each spasm of Republican anxiety could bring Clinton closer to her ultimate historic achievement.

"I'm home," I said.

"No you're not," they said.

"We paid your bills while you were in college, but you dropped out. Now it's your turn. You need to find a place to live. Get a job. The gravy train is over."

I moved in with some friends and got a job on a loading dock, thanks to my sister Maureen.

I worked at Asbury Transportation Co. from 5 at night to 1:30 in the morning loading oil well freight onto trucks that went to the fields in Bakersfield.

That's exactly where I was the night my father won the election for Governor of California in 1966.

My parents taught me if you want to go anywhere in life, you're going to need a strong work ethic to get you there.

My father was tough, but my mother Jane made him look like Mister Rogers.

When I started my radio talk-show career in the early 1990s, I was driving 262 miles a day roundtrip from L.A. to San Diego.

I was not getting paid because we were trying to start a national show. I had two kids and a wife and not enough money.

I called my mother and whined, "Can you help me out?"

"I have a suggestion for you," she said before she hung up on me.

"Shut up and keep driving. Nobody died and said you didn't have to pay your dues. You have to pay them like everyone else. That way when you're a success you'll appreciate it. If it's given to you for free, you'll never learn to appreciate it. So shut up and keep driving."

I shut up and kept driving. I finally got the lesson about hard work and that show lasted from 1992 to 2009, when I walked away from talk radio.

It's too bad the kids in college today — Bernie's kids — don't have parents as tough — and smart — as I did.

The City of Sierra Madre gives notice, pursuant to State of California law, that the City Council will conduct a public hearing to consider recommending adoption of Ordinance No. 1377, amending Chapter 17.28 ("R-3 Multiple Family Residential Zone") including Section 17.28.060 ("Density"). The purpose of Municipal Code Text Amendment (MCTA-16-02) is to allow densities of approximately thirteen (13) units per acre and establish a maximum allowable floor area. The proposed ordinance is amended to read as follows:

- Floor Area Ratio (gross dwelling/lot area).
- On lots with a gross lot area of less than 10,000 square feet or street frontage of less than 50 feet, the floor area of all above-ground buildings and structures (including garages and other non-habitable areas, but excluding basements and other fully subterranean areas) shall be limited to 55% of the gross lot area;
  - On lots with a gross lot area of 10,000 square feet or greater and with a street frontage of 50 feet or greater, the floor area of all above-ground building and structures (including garages and other non-habitable areas, but excluding basements and other fully subterranean areas) shall be 5,500 square feet plus 70 percent of gross lot area in excess of 10,000 square feet.

At the meeting on June 2, 2016, the Planning Commission conducted a public hearing and recommended to the City Council adoption of MCTA 16-02 and Ordinance No. 1377.
