ADVISORY: CALTRANS TO WORK ON 210 FREEWAY THIS WEEKEND IN PASADENA. EXPECT DELAYS AND DETOURS!

PASADENA, Calif.—All lanes of the eastbound I-210 between Mountain Street and Lake Avenue in Pasadena will be closed twice in August, for 34 hours each time, by Caltrans for pavement rehabilitation work. The eastbound I-210 connector lanes to the westbound SR-134 freeway also will be closed, along with the eastbound I-210 on-ramps for Lincoln Avenue and Mountain Street.

Although the I-210 might be closed, remember that Pasadena is open for business! Our shops, restaurants, movie theaters, art museums and galleries, parks and fun community activities like the Rose Bowl Flea Market, held this Sunday, Aug. 14, welcomes you!

The 34-hour weekend closures will occur:

- 7 p.m., Saturday, August 13, 2016 until 5 a.m., Monday, August 15
- 7 p.m., Saturday, August 27, 2016 until 5 a.m., Monday, August 29

Caltrans officials emphasized that all lanes of eastbound I-210 will be closed in the construction area. Motorists who want to get through on the eastbound I-210 will have to use detours. There will be a number of detours posted with the main one being the eastbound I-210 to the southbound SR-2 to the eastbound SR-134.

Motorists are urged to use caution and to “Be Work Zone Alert” should expect delays and are strongly advised to plan ahead, use alternate routes, avoid the area or use public transit. Additionally, motorists can check traffic conditions before they leave by calling 511 or visiting the Caltrans Quickmap at <http://quickmap.dot.ca.gov/>.

The I-210 is a major thoroughfare, serving commuters between Los Angeles and San Bernardino counties. As a result of heavy use, the road has experienced extensive wear. The closures are part of a \$148.5 million pavement rehabilitation project of the I-210 passing through the cities of Glendale, La Cañada-Flintridge and Pasadena.

MARIAN SJOSTROM (PEDERSEN), APRIL 22, 1935- AUGUST 8, 2016

Longtime former Sierra Madre resident Marian Sjostrom (Pedersen), died peacefully surrounded by family on Monday, August 8, 2016 in Chatsworth, CA, due to congestive heart failure. She is survived by her daughters, Marialyce Pedersen of Altadena, CA and Sarah (Pedersen) Day of Simi Valley, CA, and a son, Christian Pedersen of Muldrow, OK. She is also survived by a sister Barbara Sjostrom Porter; a brother, Geoffrey Sjostrom; and three grandchildren, Kate and James Day and Soren Muniz Pedersen. A Celebration of Life has tentatively been planned for Sept. 17th 2016 at the Center for Positive Living in Sedona, AZ. Please contact family members for details.

Marian was born in East Orange, NJ, then moved to the seashore in Asbury Park, NJ, attended the Ann May School of Nursing and moved to Evanston, IL as a young woman, where she met her former husband, Thomas Pedersen. The two drove west and settled in Sierra Madre in 1961. She quickly made new friends by joining the Newcomers Club (for recent transplants from the east coast and Midwest), and an Arcadia bowling league, and later became an active parishioner at St. Rita Church and School in the 1970s and 1980s, serving on the board of the school's first Parent Teacher



Organization (PTO). She also served as a board member for Camp Fire Girls in Pasadena. In 1974, Marian began working as a secretary at a Northwestern Mutual Life Insurance office in Arcadia and then went on to a career in office administration with James M. Montgomery Engineers (JMM) of Pasadena, CA. She moved to the South Bay to be part of the JMM team that designed and built the massive upgrades to the Hyperion Wastewater Treatment Plant in El Segundo, CA in the mid-late 1980s. Marian remarried Tom McCready in 1992 (who died in 2004), and together they relocated to Sedona, AZ, where she was active in Toastmasters International, the National Association for Women Business Owners, the Sedona Referral Club and the Center for Positive Living. She enjoyed singing and was a past member of St. Rita's choir, and performing chorale groups in Sedona and Torrance, CA. She was a sales representative for Juice Plus for more than 20 years and was a strong advocate of healthy eating and living all her life. She was also a film buff since childhood, loved TMC and public television, and enjoyed volunteering at the annual Sedona International Film Festival.

HOUSEHOLD HAZARDOUS WASTE AND E-WASTE ROUNDUP - SATURDAY, AUGUST 13, 2016



Many common household products contain an assortment of potentially hazardous ingredients. When not disposed of properly, the chemicals found in these products can pollute the environment and pose a risk to human health. Residents can reduce hazardous waste in their home for

free at the upcoming Household Hazardous Waste and E-Waste Roundup taking place from 9:00am - 3:00pm on Saturday, August 13, 2016.

Leftover household products that contain corrosive, toxic, ignitable or reactive ingredients are considered to be household hazardous waste (HHW). The average home can accumulate as much as 100 pounds of HHW in the

basement, garage and storage closets. Disposing of HHW by pouring them down the drain, on the ground, into storm drains, and in some cases putting them out with the regular trash is illegal. The Household Hazardous Waste and E-Waste Roundup is designed to help residents dispose of potentially dangerous materials the right way.

Acceptable materials:

Brake fluid, paint, paint thinner, cleaners with acid or lye, pesticides or herbicides, household batteries and car batteries, pool chemicals, motor oil, oil filters, expired pharmaceuticals, anti-freeze and fluorescent light bulbs.

Household electronic waste such as computer monitors, televisions, computer CPUs, keyboards, printers, cell phones, etc.

Unacceptable materials:

Hazardous waste and electronic waste from businesses.

Explosives, ammunition and radioactive materials.

Trash and tires.

White goods such as refrigerators, stoves, washing machines, etc.

Controlled substances.

The Household Hazardous Waste and E-Waste Roundup event is open to all Los Angeles County residents. The collection is free and will take place in the Mariposa Avenue parking lot (just west of Baldwin Avenue) in Sierra Madre from 9:00am - 3:00pm on Saturday, August 13, 2016.

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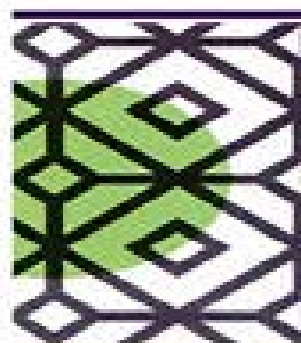
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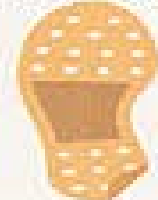


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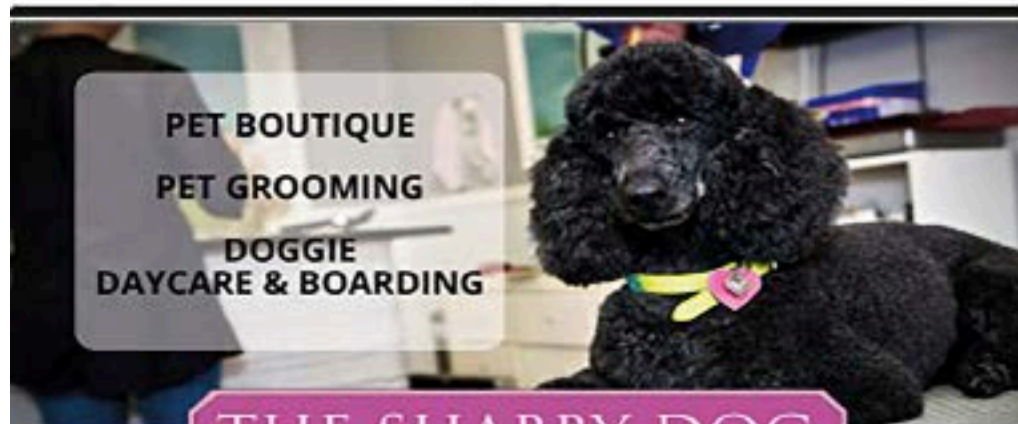


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Altadena Sheriffs Release Information on Shootings

Authorities are asking for the public's help in finding suspects after a rash of shootings, over the last few weeks, in the Altadena area.

Investigators said they are looking into the possibility that the shootings may be gang related. They are asking all of the Altadena community to work with Law Enforcement and share information to help solve and stop these incidents from occurring.

According to investigators the recent shootings include:

Monday, July 25, at 11:00 pm, an adult male and female were in a car in the 600 block of East Pine St. The male victim sustained a wound to his left palm and right wrist. The victim was transported to a local hospital where he was listed in stable condition.

Tuesday, July 26, at 1:30 am, a shooting occurred on Lake Avenue and Woodbury Rd., in Altadena. The male victim was in a vehicle when he was fired upon and sustained wounds to his left hand and left knee.

Tuesday, July 26, at 2:30 am, a shooting occurred in the 200 block of West Calaveras St., in Altadena. Seven people were inside a residence when it was fired upon, thankfully no one was injured.

Saturday, July 30, at 9:00 pm, an adult male was walking in the 2200 block of North Lincoln Ave., in Altadena when he was fired upon. The victim sustained a wound to his left leg.

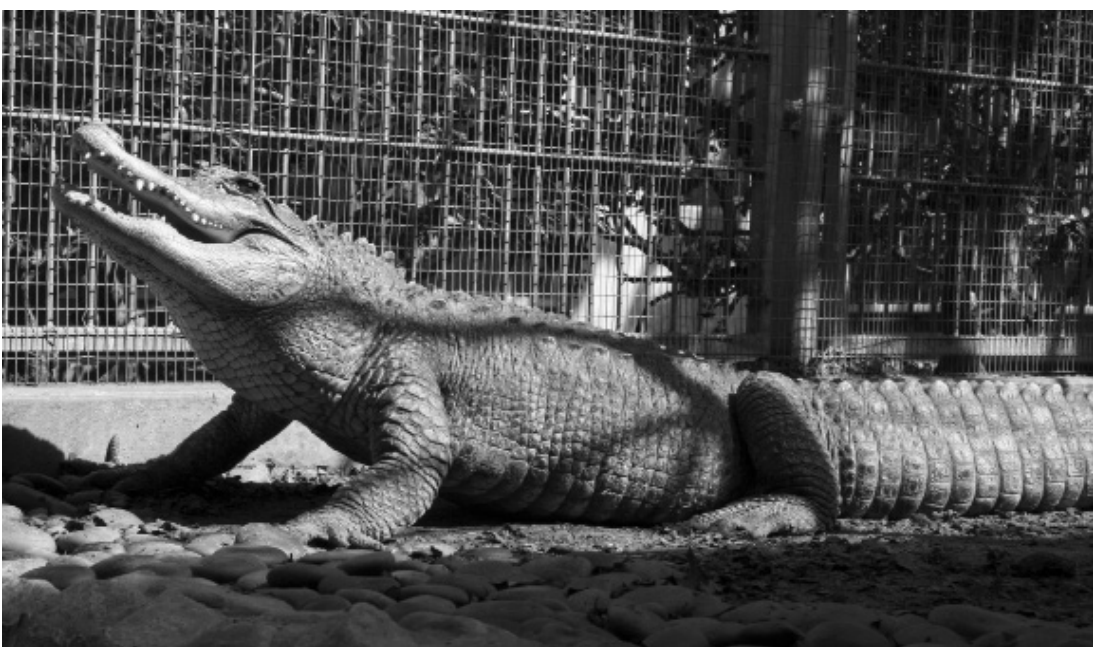

Later, Gator: Tina Moves to the LA Zoo

Authorities announced that after 18 years at the Pasadena Humane Society & SPCA, Tina the Alligator has been moved to the LA Zoo Thursday— she will now share an enclosure with famed Reggie the Alligator.

Tina, a 7-foot, 100 pound American Alligator, was one of many wild and exotic animals that came to Humane Society in 1998 after a traveling wildlife education program closed due to permitting issues.

Pasadena Humane Society Vice President of Community Outreach Ricky Whitman said Tina had lived in an enclosed pond area with a waterfall in the PHS dog kennels for the better part of two decades. Tina's stay at PHS was supposed to be temporary, but safe placement outside of the shelter was difficult to obtain. Whitman said Tina likes to swim, her meals and get back brushes with a broom.

She said Tina left the shelter Thursday and was transported to the LA Zoo where she will have a larger habitat and companionship with Reggie.

Authorities said that while Tina was never up for adoption, she was a beloved local icon. Always the star of student tours at the Humane Society, Tina was considered part of the family for the staff, volunteers and visitors.

Reggie made headlines in May 2007 after being captured and taken out of Machado Lake at Harbor City. Reggie eluded capture for two years after first spotted in the lake in 2005.

Reggie again made the news a year later when he escaped his habitat, he was later found near a loading dock in the zoo.

Authorities at the zoo said putting the two Alligators together is not intended as a breeding effort. The two will share the enclosure as pals.

UPDATE ON FORMER ALBERTSON'S SHOPPING CENTER REDEVELOPMENT PLANS

Last week, we had an opportunity to connect with representatives from Warner Pacific Properties, the firm that purchased the former Albertson's shopping center. As you may recall, we have had discussions with the new development firm regarding their intentions for the site, and staff has been told on multiple occasions that Warner Pacific intendeds to subdivide the available +/- 91,000 square feet of building space for three different users. Subsequent to those discussions, staff has had a few discussions with an architect representing the developer regarding their proposed project. However, we have found it difficult to obtain concrete information regarding

Warner Pacific's plans moving forward.

This past week, our contact at Jones Lang LaSalle (JLL) was able to connect with the broker representing Warner Pacific. That interface shed some additional light on the disposition of the former Albertson's site. It appears that the new owners have been holding off on finalizing and submitting any plans to the City for plan check purposes until they are able to finalize and execute leases with at least two operators. Staff will continue to monitor this situation closely, and we will be certain to share additional details related to this matter as soon as additional progress has been made.

PUBLIC INVITED TO ATTEND POST FIRE DISASTER PREPAREDNESS COMMUNITY MEETING, SEPTEMBER 6TH

Duarte, CA, August 8, 2016 - Residents are encouraged to attend an upcoming community meeting "Post Fire Disaster Preparedness" on Tuesday, September 6th at 7 pm at Valley View Elementary School Cafeteria, 237 Melcanyon Road. The City is conducting the meeting for both residents and property owners that are at risk of being impacted from the Fish Fire mud and debris flow from upcoming storms. With the recent damage to Duarte's hillsides, the City must prepare for severe flooding and debris flow problems on public roadways that can arise during and after each rain possibly for the next five years. The US Geological Services in collaboration with the Angeles National Forest and Los Angeles County Water Resources Division are currently assessing the area burned and generating mud and debris flow modeling. The U.S. Geological Survey has created an interactive map of the San Gabriel Complex Fire. The map displays estimates of the likelihood of debris flow, potential volume of debris flow, and combined relative debris flow hazard and is available online at http://landslides.usgs.gov/hazards/postfire_debrisflow/2016/20160620sangabriel/.

With the assistance of Debris Flow maps generated by Los Angeles County Flood Control District, properties with the highest risk of being impacted by flooding/debris flows from rainfall due to the loss of vegetation in the foothills have been identified. The debris flow areas are above the Westvale Road, Crestview Court, Cedarwood Avenue, Las Lomas Road, Greenbank Avenue, Valley View Neighborhood, and Brookridge Road.

Residents in the areas of Westvale Court and Sunnysdale Avenue will be impacted by Los Angeles County Public Works storing debris in the nearby basins. Representatives from the following agencies will be present and provide valuable preparedness information to community members: Los Angeles County Fire, Los Angeles County Public Works, Los Angeles County Sheriff, and Duarte Public Safety. These collaborating agencies will provide expert information about the steps individuals and families need to take in order to prepare for the rainy season in light of the recent Fish Fire.

Additionally, City staff will also present emergency steps the City will implement including its impact on various neighborhoods; especially those near fire areas. The cooperation of all persons working or living within the designated Fish Fire is critical to the City's primary goal of protecting life and property.

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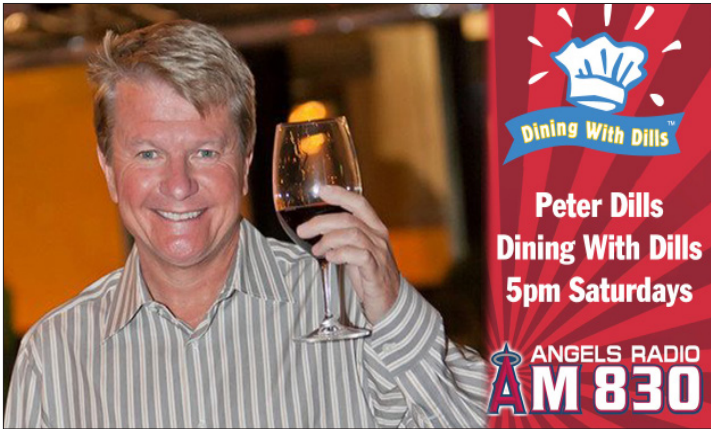
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VERTICAL WINE BAR

Many restaurants have built their reputation on their wine lists. Of course, Valentino's in Santa Monica comes to mind. A little closer to home Bistro 45 and A/K/A Bistro have good ones. I can't really put my finger on any restaurant that I could say has an exotic wine list but the Vertical Wine Bistro has a truly eclectic feel to it with their bar and dining room and, for you with late night energy, a weekend DJ. The wine list itself is impressive. If you remember a few years ago Vertical offered many flights of wine - basically a flight could be any liquors since they're just samples. I remember trying a flight of Greek wines here, and I quickly opted for French. Just because I was born in Greece doesn't mean I can endorse their wines. If you feel adventurous they offer a bottle of the 2008 Genilini Robola for \$55.

My intention this evening was to start at the bar and make my way to the dining area, but since it was happy hour I never made it that far. I have to say that the wine list is limitless and while Vertical's reputation for fantastic wines is warranted, the prices scared this civil servant off a bit. If I had an expense account, however, the 1996 Taittinger "Blanc de Blanc" at \$257 would be in my cart. Wines tend to be subjective, but great food usually finds a unanimous verdict, so let's stick with the "happy time" menu. Their Crispy Calamari (\$9) was exceptional, as were the Truffle Shoe String fries (\$8). My guest and I really enjoyed the Lobster Roll with Tarragon Dressing (\$15), but we didn't get to the burger sliders since I just had sliders last week at Cheesecake Factory!!! At first glance, the prices on their dinner entrees looked reasonable. Many of their wines by the glass seemed a bit pricey, but that may just mean I should stick to buying my wines at the local supermarket.

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MEDICARE COVERAGE FOR NON-WORKING SPOUSES

*Dear Savvy Senior,
Does Medicare cover spouses who have not worked? I have worked all my life, but my spouse worked only for a few years when we first got married but then quit to take care of our children fulltime. Will she be eligible for Medicare?*

Inquiring Husband

Dear Inquiring,
There are plenty of couples in your situation when it comes to applying for Medicare. The answer generally is yes, your spouse can qualify for Medicare on your work record. Here's how it works.

Eligibility Rules

Medicare, the government health insurance program for older adults, covers more than 55 million Americans age 65 and older, as well as those younger that have a qualifying disability or have End-Stage Renal Disease.

To be eligible, you must have worked and paid Medicare taxes for at least 10 years to qualify for premium-free Medicare Part A hospital coverage when you turn 65. If you qualify, then your non-working spouse will qualify too, based on your work record when she turns 65.

Divorced spouses are also eligible if they were married at least 10 years and are single, as are surviving spouses who are single and who were married for at least nine months before their spouse died.

In addition to Part A, both you and your spouse would also qualify for Medicare Part B, which covers doctor's visits and other outpatient services, but requires a monthly premium, not a work history. The premium for most Part B beneficiaries in 2016 is \$104.90 per month, while new beneficiaries pay \$121.80/month and higher earning couples – those with incomes over \$170,000 per year – pay even more.

There are also a number of other caveats you should know about depending on your wife's age.

Older Spouse

If your wife is older than you, she can qualify for Medicare on your work record at age 65, even if you're not getting Medicare yourself, but you must be at least 62 years old. You also must have been married for at least one year for your wife to apply for Medicare on your work record.

If you are still working and your wife is covered by your employer's health insurance, she may



want to enroll only in the premium-free Medicare Part A until you retire or your employer coverage ends. Part B – along with its premium – can be added later without penalty as long as your employer's group health plan is your "primary coverage." Check with your employers' human resources department to find out about this.

If your wife is more than three years older than you and has no health coverage, you can buy her Medicare Part A until you turn 62 and the premium-free benefit kicks in. The Part A monthly premium is \$411 in 2016.

Younger Spouse

If your wife is younger than you, she will need health insurance until she turns 65 and becomes eligible for Medicare. This may be through your employer if you are still working, through COBRA (see dol.gov/ebsa/publications/cobraemployee.html), or through the Health Insurance Marketplace (see healthcare.gov) or outside the marketplace through a private insurance company.

Other Medicare Options

In addition to Medicare Part A and B, when you and your wife become Medicare eligible, each of you will also need to enroll in a Part D prescription drug plan if you don't have credible drug coverage from your employer or union. And, you may want to purchase a Medicare supplemental (Medigap) policy too, to help pay for things that aren't covered by Medicare like copayments, coinsurance and deductibles. Or, you may want to consider an all-in-one Medicare Advantage plan.

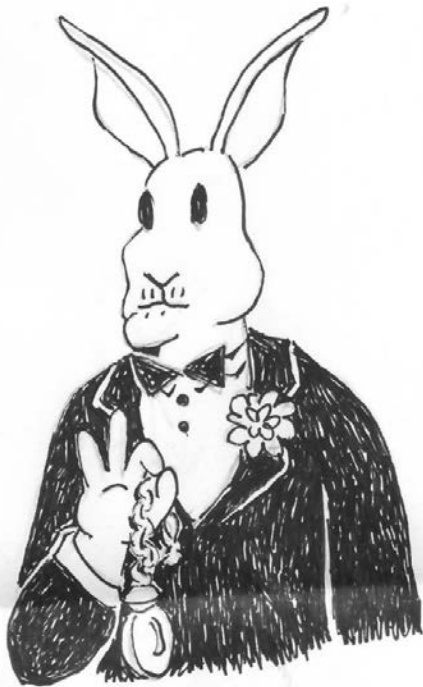

CURIOSITY ROVER CELEBRATES FOUR YEARS ON MARS

As NASA's Mars Science Laboratory (MSL) celebrates four years on the Red Planet, University of Leicester planetary scientist Professor John Bridges recounts the mission's success and explains what is next for the one-ton nuclear-powered science robot.

The Curiosity rover (with MSL aboard) hit the dusty Martian surface on August 6, 2012, and began its mission of finding evidence about whether ancient Mars offered environmental conditions conducive to microbial life.

By March 2013, NASA reported that MSL had achieved its primary objective after scientists found evidence of oxygen, nitrogen, hydrogen, sulfur, phosphorous and carbon—all essential chemical elements for supporting living organisms.

Now the mission, which was scheduled to end this year, has recently been given a two-year extension.

Bridges said, "It's been a great four years—from the excitement of landing we have now had 1,421 Martian days of operations and driven 13.6 km. We have learned an enormous amount about Mars."

"The old idea of Mars as a simple basaltic planet that experienced a few catastrophic floods has been disproved. We have encountered ancient lakes and a silica-rich crust.

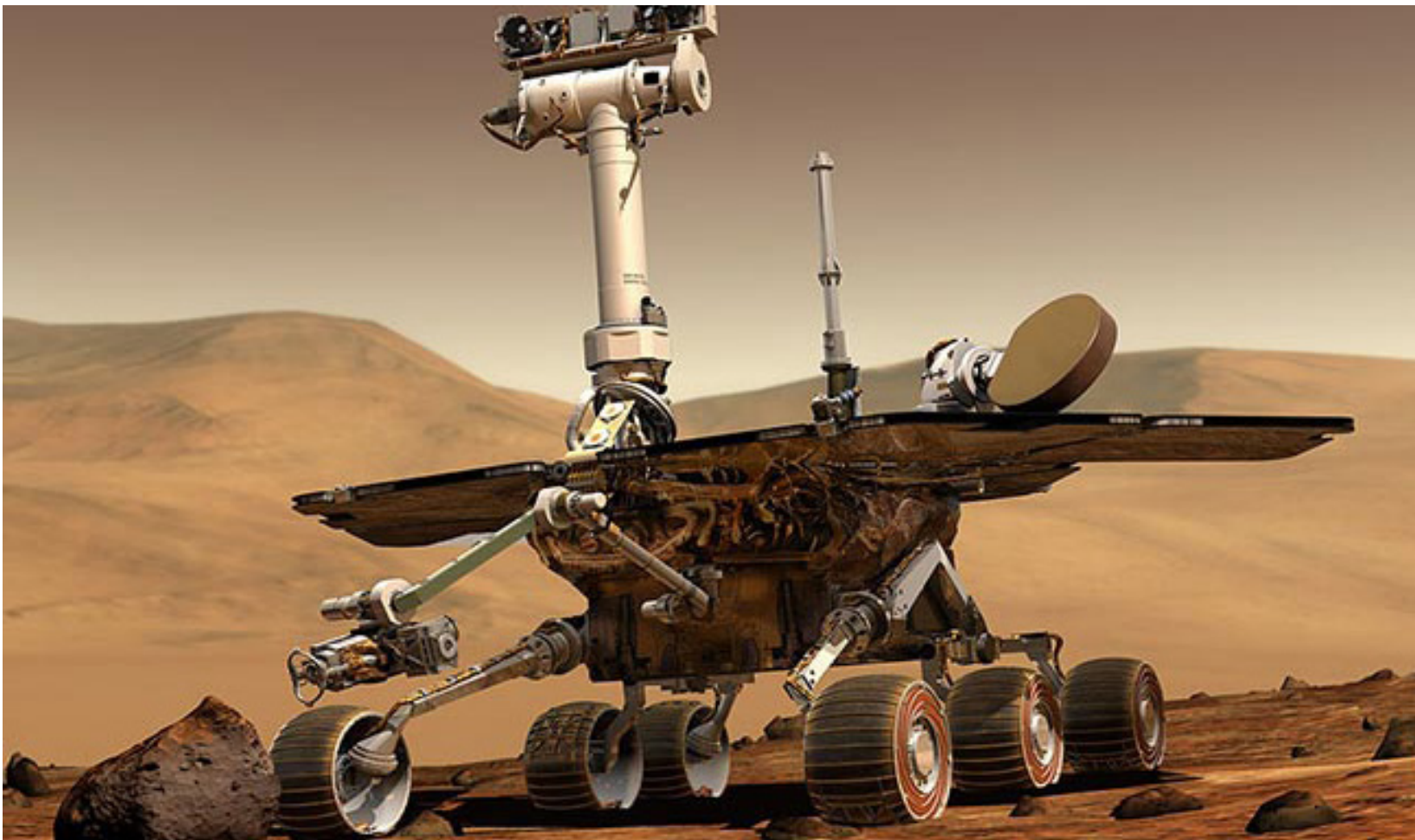
"Our laser—ChemCam—has made over 350,000 shots on Mars and we are busily interpreting the data."

Bridges added that the Mars Science Lab's plutonium power source can keep it going for years to come. "For the next few years," he says, we will gradually climb further up Mount Sharp; at the moment we are in foothills called Murray Buttes."

As part of the fourth-year celebration, NASA has released a smartphone game, which lets users control their own MSL across the rugged terrain of Mars searching for water.

On their mobile devices, players drive a rover through rough Martian terrain, challenging themselves to navigate and balance the rover while earning points along the way. The game also illustrates how NASA's next Mars rover, in development for launch in 2020, will use radar to search for underground water.

"We're excited about a new way for people on the go to engage with Curiosity's current adventures on Mars and future exploration by NASA's Mars 2020



rover too," says Michelle Viotti, manager of Mars public engagement initiatives at JPL. "Using social networks, the user can share the fun with friends. The interest that is shared through gameplay also helps us open a door to deeper literacy in science, technology, engineering and mathematics." JPL collaborated with GAMEE, a network for game-players, for development of the game, called Mars Rover.

Meanwhile, on Mars, the real rover has driven to position for drilling into a rock target called "Marimba," to acquire rock powder for onboard laboratory analysis. The rover has begun a multi-month ascent of a mudstone geological unit as it heads toward higher and progressively younger geological evidence on Mount Sharp.

During the rover's first Earth year on Mars, the mission accomplished its main goal when it found and examined an ancient habitable environment. No signs of life have yet been found, but researchers determined that a freshwater lake at the Yellowknife

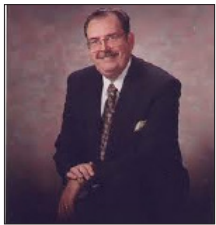
Bay site billions of years ago offered the chemical ingredients and energy favorable for supporting microbial life. Stay tuned!

Here at home, we have good views of Mars in our southern sky, along with four other bright planets. Venus, now appearing as the "evening star," is just above the southwest horizon after sunset. To the upper left of Venus, look for Mercury, Jupiter, orange Mars, and golden Saturn (in that order).

PINCHING PENNIES IN A NICKEL ECONOMY

An incident happened this past week that created for me a certain pause to think about things.

I do not often think about too many things. After all, with only one little gray cell, it is hard to think about things in the plural. "One-thought-at-a-time," is my life motto. Experience has taught me that too many thoughts at any given time, usually leads to trouble with the Gracious Mistress of the Parsonage.

I was going to pick up a few items at Publix when it happened. I parked in the parking lot as normal, got out of the car and started towards the store. Halfway to the store is when it happened.

Even now as I think about it, I'm a little excited. Believe me; it takes quite a bit to get me excited these days.

Walking towards the entrance to the store, I saw on the ground a penny, which caused me to stop in my tracks.

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BIRD BRAIN BRILLIANCE

I remember as a kid, hearing the term “bird brain” often used in a derogatory manner, directed at someone who’d just done something really stupid or absent-minded. To me, it seemed like a rude thing to call someone, but unlike many other words that we kids may have used to convey the same sentiment, birdbrain was one we knew we could get away with in front of the adults.

The teasingly taunting term, “bird brain” is assumed to have been derived from a similarly insulting moniker, “bird-witted”, which dates back to the early 1600’s. The original term was used to describe a person with, what we might call today, ‘attention deficit disorder’, presumably applicable because a bird appears to lack focus when flying to and fro in rapid motion, with no apparent direction. Ironically however, in reality this notion could not be further from the truth.

The presumptuous premise behind the use of the ill-mannered idiom, “bird brain” is based on the human’s erroneous perspective that birds have proportionately small brains, and appear to lack intelligence. In applying that thoughtless theory to calling someone a bird brain indicates that a person who acts foolishly must have a small brain like a bird, and therefore he must be stupid.

The remarkable irony lies in the fact that birds are far-and-way more focused than the average human believes or perceives them to be. As a matter of fact, some species of birds are even considered to be among the most intelligent wild creatures in the animal kingdom, and certain species of birds possess some amazing brain capabilities that God apparently did not see fit to instill in the human being. I’m not talking about instinctual behaviors, I’m referring to scientifically proven facts about the biological properties of a bird’s brain that equate to higher intelligence, as we humans define it.

The most blatantly obvious example of bird brain brilliance was proven through an experiment conducted by animal psychologist, Irene Pepperberg at Harvard University. Doctor Pepperberg purchased an ordinary pet-store parrot that she named “Alex” (a cute, catchy acronym for Aviary Language EXperiment), and went right to work, teaching and observing him.

By the end of the experiment, Pepperberg wrote in her book, Alex & Me that Alex could identify 50 different objects and recognize quantities up to 6; that he could distinguish 7 colors and 5 shapes, and understand the concepts of

“bigger”, “smaller”, “same”, and “different”, and that he was learning the concepts of “over” and “under” when he passed away on September 6, 2007. It is true that a parrot will sometimes mimic sounds and words with no knowledge of what they mean, but they are also capable of learning a wide range of terms and concepts with a complete understanding of their meanings and appropriate responses.

In case the intellect of a parrot does not convince the average human that a bird’s brain is indeed small yet brilliant, a particularly remarkable trait possessed by the pigeon is enough to turn any human green with intelligence envy. What might that be, you ask? The pigeon has an internal GPS (global positioning system) inside his tiny little bird brain. And the pigeon gets to keep his privacy because his GPS is non-track able!

The results of a recent study conducted by Drs. Le-Qing Wu and J. David Dickman was published in Science, the world’s leading journal of original scientific research (April 26, 2012), describing the fact that “neural responses in a pigeon’s brain stem show how single cells encode magnetic field direction, intensity and polarity - qualities that are necessary to derive an internal model representing directional heading and geo-surface location.” To put it in a nut shell (pun intended), the pigeon possesses a unique neural substrate for a vertebrate magnetic sense.

In other words, a “bird brained” pigeon is capable of finding any location he wishes to find on the earth’s surface without having to strap on a Tom-Tom! Now run and tell that, Getting, Parkinson and Easton! Oh, and by the way, that thoughtless theory about birds lacking focus and direction definitely goes right out the window when it comes to the common park pigeon.

So, the next time you are tempted to call someone a bird brain when they’ve done something stupid, think again. In fact, our seemingly flighty feathered friends have apparently got it going on when it comes to brain brilliance!

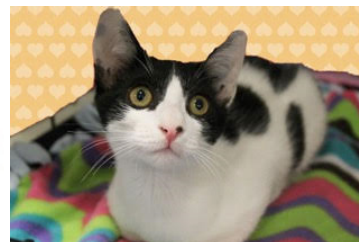

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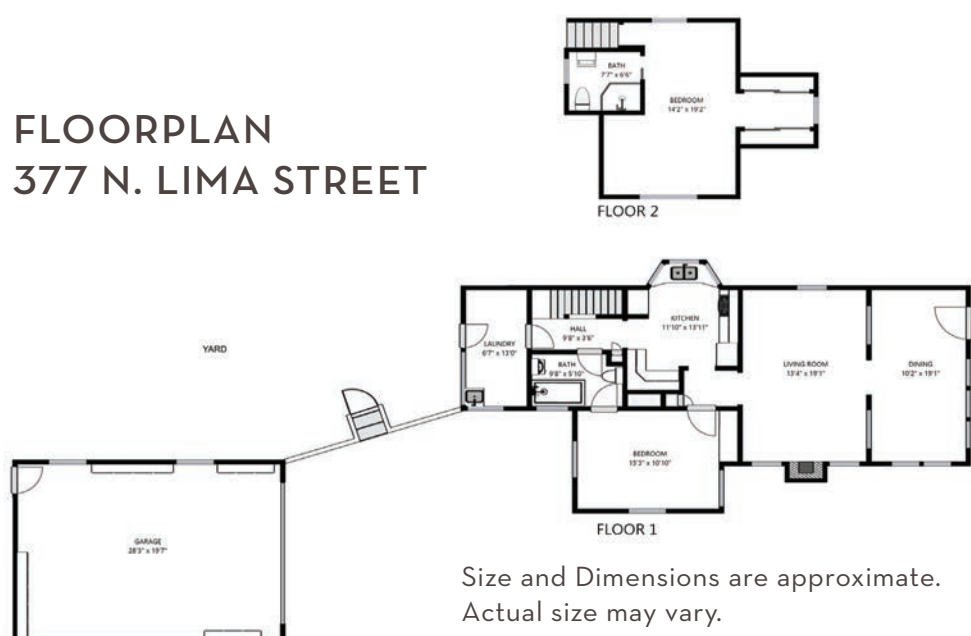

Always Working to Serve Others

This past May I lost a dear friend, Jan Wight, wrote of her passing and what a remarkable woman she was. She made an impact both in Monrovia and Duarte. Prior to Jan's passing, in February, I reported about her husband Bob Wight's Retirement from Foothill Unity Center and his role in its establishment.

Their story begins with the Jaycees, where they met and became friends. After a while they fell in love and truly were soul mates: their purpose in lives was to improve their community and serve others. Bob told me that after their marriage in 1960, they relocated to his home in Duarte with Jan, "Screaming and Kicking". After all, she lived most of her life in Monrovia. He said they'd have to drive up and down Myrtle Ave. every week so she could get her "Monrovia fix".

After their move to Monrovia, Jan became involved in various fields. First she served on the Duarte School Board. She'd do her "JAN" and encouraged people like Steve Hernandez who questioned education in Duarte to "Get involved and make changes"- which he did. Current Board Member Ken Bell revealed that JAN told him to run for School Board and make a difference.

Jan became Executive of the Duarte Chamber of Commerce. She was involved with the Route 66 Parade and it was she who began the wonderful awards given by the Duarte Chamber at the Mayor's Breakfast. Jan was instrumental in involving youths in the DC TV recording.

When Jan retired from the Chamber, she said she could not have done all she did without Bob's support. The same is true for her time with the Friends of the Duarte Library. He helped her behind the scenes with so many projects.

When Bob retired from the Foothill Unity Center which serves several cities, I learned of its beginning in a closet at Immaculate Conception Church as a food pantry. Bob became Executive Director and through his leadership, it became the great organization it is today. Annually 10,000 individuals are served with food supplies, case management/crisis help, health care resources and the Back to School Event, which provides health screening, haircuts, uniforms and school supplies. At Bob, retirement, there were many accolades for him, but also Jan was mentioned.



(Sadly she was too ill to attend.)

When I spoke to Bob, mention of their cancer several years ago came up. He told me how they both had it, and each would support the other when needed. It reminded me of part of our wedding vows: in sickness and in health. I think of Jan STILL doing so much for the Friends of the Duarte Library, although ill and with a walker or cane. Bob was her chauffeur, and helped her set up for various functions and assisted at those functions.

Bob told me there were ups and downs over the years for each of them at various times. But the other one would be there for assistance and support. Bob and Jan Wight truly were soul mates devoted to each other and the community in which they lived.

EWMP JOINT POWERS AUTHORITY PLANS FOR MANAGING STORMWATER REQUIREMENTS TAKING SHAPE

During the past several months, staff has been engaged in discussions with a variety of different interests and agencies regarding our stormwater requirements mandated by the MS4 Permit. As you may recall, pursuant to the permit, our watershed group was required to develop an Enhanced Watershed Management Plan (EWMP), which includes an estimated \$1.4 billion in stormwater clean-up project costs.

Given the financial realities of facing our EWMP group, we have been working to identify alternative methods of stormwater compliance that would be implementable and financially feasible. A major part of the solution that has been identified includes the creation of a sub-regional Joint Powers Authority to manage stormwater clean-up projects and initiatives for our EWMP group, which includes Arcadia, Sierra Madre, Bradbury, Duarte, Azusa, and LA County, in addition to Monrovia.

We recently received word that the Arcadia

City Council at their meeting last week signed on to pursuing the EWMP JPA plan. In addition, we have received confirmation that the matter is scheduled for consideration by all of the remaining city jurisdictions in our EWMP group according to the following schedule:

The City of Azusa will consider the matter at their August 15, 2016 meeting

The City of Bradbury will consider the matter at their August 16, 2016 meeting

The City of Duarte will consider the matter at their August 23, 2016 meeting

The City of Sierra Madre will consider the matter at their September 13, 2016 meeting (they are dark all of August)

In addition, staff has been communicating with LA County representatives, who have already indicated their support for the plan. We are actively managing and monitoring this overall issue and will be certain to share additional updates as more information becomes available.

POKÉMON IS NO GO FOR SEX OFFENDERS IN CALIFORNIA

Assemblywoman Chang Announces Legislation to Prohibit Sex Offenders from "luring" Kids

SACRAMENTO – Assemblywoman Ling Ling Chang (R-Diamond Bar) today announced she is pushing legislation to prohibit sex offenders from using games like Pokemon GO to lure minors to their location. Recent reports have demonstrated how easy it can be for sex offenders to use new geolocation games like Pokémon GO to abuse children.

"I am Pokémon GO's biggest fan – that's no secret," said Assemblywoman Chang. "But as someone who uses the game, you can see how easy it is for criminals and predators to attract people to certain locations -- and many of those players are minors."

Pokémon players have fallen victim to criminals in a number of ways in the one month the game has been released in the US. For example, armed

robbers have been known bait to victims using the game's features that allow players to lure others hoping to "catch" more Pokémon characters. Meanwhile law enforcement has expressed concerns that sexual predators could use the game in a similar way. Reporters in California have found that the game can bring players within feet of the residences of sex offenders.

"Before new games are released and they grow even more popular, it's critical we establish protections for kids," said Chang.

AB 2682 – once amended – will clarify that using interactive video games like Pokémon GO in an effort to prey on children is prohibited by law. The Legislature has until August 31 to send the bill to the governor for consideration.

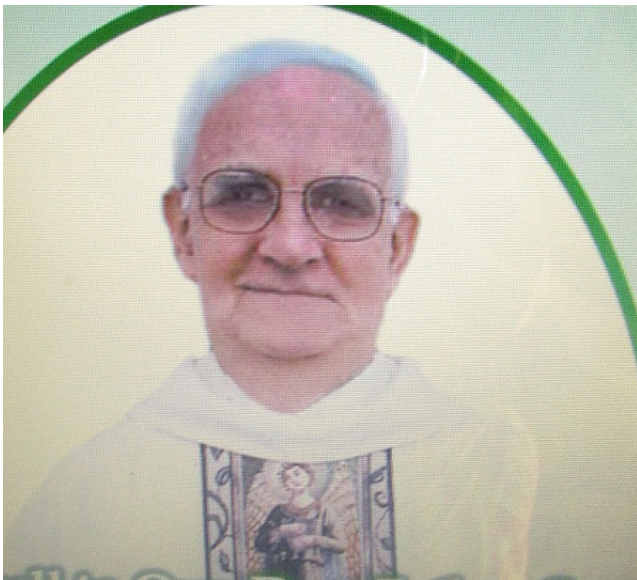

Regular readers will remember that I was here last year and wrote about the “machine” that this place is producing eleven shows in repertory. I worked here many years ago as an actor and my memories of being here are sweet. I did one of the three best plays I've ever been involved with when I was in Shakespeare's Henry V here.

This trip I saw two plays: a very funny adaptation of Gilbert & Sullivan's The Yeoman of the Guard. It was reset in the Wild West and was played fast and loose in and amongst the audience – making them part of the show. It was filled with wonderful singer/actors who were cheeky in their dealings with the audience gathered around them. The set featured two adult-sized hobby horses that patrons could sit on during the show and a bar from which we could get drinks and treats while the action was underway. My son was delighted and so was I.

The night before we saw The Wiz – the adaptation of The Wizard of Oz which was originally produced in 1978. It was a disappointment. The show itself is not really very good – I think it relies too much on the audiences familiarity with the story. That familiarity allows the audience to fill in the holes in the story. The director did not solve the problems of the show and I was not very engaged. There were some particularly wonderful actors in the show – working their hearts out, but all in all, I was surprised that the Festival would have allowed this mess to go forward.



Notwithstanding the quality of the show, the Elizabethan Theater (the outdoor space in which The Wiz was playing) holds 1,143 seats. So in one night The Wiz played to more people than many of our shows do in their entire run. It got me thinking of our current production of Putnam County Spelling Bee which has not found its audience despite great reviews and happy audiences. I was so disheartened to think about the great work we are doing at SMP that is going unseen while the very mediocre show that I saw in Ashland was selling out. There is no justice.

Spelling Bee closes on August 21. I do hope you will plan to see it before it closes. Then we'll bring back John Carney for Carney Magic for four shows August 25-28. His two show run sold-out in the Spring and these are bound to, as well. On Monday, August 22, we also have our free reading series play – this time Alison's House by Susan Glaspell which won the Pulitzer in 1931. I've always wanted to hear this play out loud. It is rarely done.

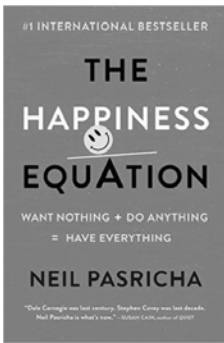
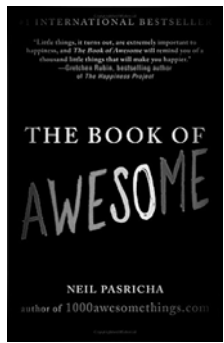

DO BOOK LOVERS LIVE LONGER? CAN A CHAPTER A DAY KEEP THE DOCTOR AWAY?


Maybe, according to a new study that has found that book readers aren't only smarter, nicer, and more empathetic – they may even live longer. The study, sponsored by the National Institute on Aging, looked at 3,635 subjects over 50 who were divided into three groups: those who didn't read books, those who read up to 3.5 hours a week and those who read more than 3.5 hours a week. Even after accounting for variables like health status, education, and income, the study found that those who read more than 3.5 hours per week were 23 percent less likely to die during a 12-year follow-up period. Those who read up to 3.5 hours per week, about 30 minutes per day, were 17 percent less likely to die. Book readers experienced a 20 percent reduction in risk of mortality over the 12 years of follow-up compared to non-book readers. In other words, just like a healthy diet and exercise, books appear to promote a significant survival advantage. The research on this is new and it's important to point out that so far it only shows an association between reading and longevity, not necessarily causality. And the study specified that the longevity benefit lies only with reading books, not newspapers or magazines. “We found


that reading books provided a greater benefit than reading newspapers or magazines. We uncovered that this effect is likely because books engage the reader's mind more – providing more cognitive benefit, and therefore increasing the lifespan,” Yale researcher Avni Bavishi wrote in the study. Finally, while the book genre being read was never surveyed, the researchers have said they believe most test subjects were reading fiction. Other research has connected a host of benefits to reading, including improved brain connectivity and empathy. Researchers have concluded two specific reasons why reading books boost longevity. First, deep reading promotes a kind of “slow, immersive process” that leads to cognitive engagement, which helps a reader “draw connections to other parts of the material, find applications to the outside world, and ask questions about the content presented.” “Cognitive engagement may explain why vocabulary, reasoning, concentration, and critical thinking skills are improved by exposure to books,” Second, books “can promote empathy, social perception, and emotional intelligence, which are cognitive processes that can lead to greater survival,” they say.



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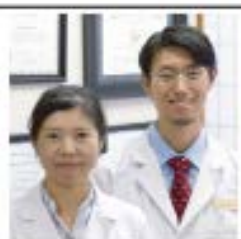

THE PRESIDENTIAL PLATFORM I'D LIKE TO HEAR

Maybe, as my former students reach the voting age, they will bring about a change in what comprises a successful platform...I would love to share in their discussions and hear what talking points would make their list.
