Woman Attacked with a Machete

Altadena Deputies responded to the 1500 block of East Altadena Drive, in Altadena Wednesday regarding a family disturbance. They contacted the victim who advised them the suspect who also resides at the location, had assaulted her utilizing a machete. The suspect then immediately fled the location in an unknown direction driving a sedan-type vehicle.

The victim was bleeding profusely and was transported to a local hospital, where she was treated for a laceration to the head. The victim's injuries appear to be non-life threatening.

Metro Board Approves Security Enhancements



The contract award of nearly \$82 million to RMI International, Inc. will be effective October 1 through September 30, 2017.

The Los Angeles County Metropolitan Transportation Authority (Metro) Board of Directors, last week, approved a contract to nearly double the amount of contract security officers to deter crime and disorder on the bus and rail system including the Gold Line in Pasadena.

Officials said the move is part of a strategy on enhancing security and rider experience on the transit system.

Metro's security staffing plan is multi-layered and comprised of Metro security officers, private sector security officers and state certified law enforcement professionals.

"In the last 26 years, Metro has added 105 miles of rail, more than 100 rail stations and numerous transit centers," said Metro Board Chair John Fasana. "This is action to enhance security is a critical step in ensuring our passengers have a safe and secure experience."

"Safety and security of our customers and our employees

is Metro's number one priority," said Metro CEO Phillip A. Washington. "This is part of our overall strategic plan to maximize our visibility and resources across our system."

Under the proposal approved, additional staff will be assigned to key hubs, rail stations and parking facilities in addition to safeguarding critical infrastructure. The high-visibility presence augments video surveillance and, in some cases, will patrol 24 hours, seven days a week.

"Our security officers serve as the eyes and ears for law enforcement, patrol key areas, and notify law enforcement when required," said Metro Chief Systems, Security and Law Enforcement Officer Alex Wiggins. "Security officers complement the vital role of law enforcement, but do not replace it and this action follows through with the CEO's directive to enhance security through new enforcement presence system wide."

Wiggins reported that additional security is necessary to support ridership growth, improve rider retention, improve perception of safety by riders and employees, and provide additional resources to first responders.

City Backpedals on Internet Services Tax

In a memo to the city council last week, as part of the City Manager's Weekly newsletter, Finance Director Matthew Hawkes wrote that a ballot measure, approved by voters in 2008, to raise the Utility User Tax (UUT) could now be used to also tax internet services such as Netflix, Hulu, HBO Go and other services like online video gaming and Sling TV.

Since the memo surfaced, both Pasadena Public Information Officer William Boyer and City Manager Steve Mermell have said the information was sent out prematurely and that the city was reviewing the matter.

Mermell told the city council Monday night that he would return to them with a detailed explanation.

Mermell made the comments after some of the council member said they unaware of the situation.

According to Hawkes' memo, the UUT ordinance was amended to allow for the Tax Administrator to issue "administrative rulings" to collect taxes without needing the council or voter approval.

If the city were to move forward, streaming services would be taxed 9.4 percent starting Jan. 1. At press time it

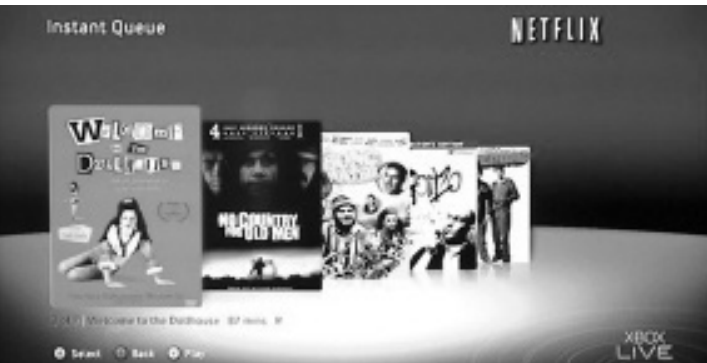
was unclear how city officials would determine who is using the services within Pasadena, either by the billing address or through the Uniform Resource Locator (an individual internet address).

"When the city sought voter approval of an updated UUT ordinance in 2008, the ballot measure specifically indicated that new definitions of taxable services would be technology-neutral so that users of such utility services would be treated the same, regardless of technology," the memo states.

The memo also makes note of audio streaming services, (Pandora, Spotify, Apple Music etc.).

Other cities in California, with similar UUT ordinances such as Glendale and San Bernardino, are also looking to collect the tax, according to city staff.

On Dec. 3, 2007, the city council approved unanimously an amendment to the UUT, "confirming the legislative intent that the tax on charges for telephone communications not apply to charges for internet access." The council, at the time, took up the issue after numerous residents complained of an internet tax, and the city's fear that Measure D, might have failed.



Metro Expands Student Fare Program

Now in its second year, The Universal College Student Fare Program allows students to sign up for heavily discounted Metro passes at the same time they register for classes. Those who sign up for a pass receive a sticker with an electronic chip that allows students to use their student ID as a TAP card to board buses and trains.

"We all know how expensive college can be and with this program we hope to provide students who are strapped for cash a reduced transit option

to get them where they need to go on Metro's growing transportation system," said Metro CEO Phillip A. Washington. "This program clearly improves the quality of life for thousands of college students."

In order to expand the program to more students, the number of units required to participate has been reduced from 12 units to eight per quarter or semester, allowing part-time students to buy a U-Pass for the first time.

The Los Angeles Community College District (LACCD), California State Universities (CSU), University of California (UC), private universities and vocational colleges are eligible for the program including the CalTech and Pasadena City College.

MONROVIA RENEWAL STREET CONSTRUCTION WORK SCHEDULED TO BEGIN IN MID-OCTOBER 2016, CITY STAFF WORKING TO SCHEDULE A PUBLIC OUTREACH MEETING TENTATIVELY SCHEDULED TO TAKE PLACE ON OCTOBER 19, 2016

The City's Monrovia Renewal project – which is a multi-year initiative that will make priority repairs to the all of the City's water & sewer pipelines, water facilities, streets, sidewalks, curbs, and gutters – is well underway in the Southwest and Southeast portions of town, which includes the areas bordered to the north by Colorado Boulevard, to the south by the 210 Freeway, and east and west to the City boundaries. The most impactful construction work that will occur in the Southwest and Southeast project areas are the planned street improvements. We wanted to share with everyone that this past week, City personnel met with our street contractor to begin coordinating the scheduling and execution of the planned improvements, which is scheduled to begin construction work on October 10, 2016. For the first several

weeks, the contractor will be working on making identified concrete repairs, before we get to the more impactful street enhancements.

In an effort to provide additional information regarding the planned street improvements and their associated impacts, a public outreach meeting is currently being planned and has tentatively been set to take place on Wednesday, October 19, 2016. This meeting will provide additional details related to anticipated impacts and project schedule, and additional information regarding the meeting will be distributed in the coming weeks. PROPOSED MARRIOTT TOWNEPLACE SUITES HOTEL PROJECT MOVING FORWARD, CURRENTLY IN ENTITLEMENT PHASE WITH SCOPING MEETING SCHEDULED FOR OCTOBER 13, 2016

Just a quick note to let everyone know that staff met via conference call this past week with the Tharaldson Hospitality Group (THG) development team regarding the proposed Marriott Towneplace Suites Hotel for the southwest corner of Myrtle Avenue and Huntington Drive. The THG development team has made good progress these past few weeks in developing the details needed to entitle the proposed project. As part of the work that has been engaged to date, staff has been working with THGs environmental compliance team to perform

the reviews necessary for the proposed hotel project.

An important element associated with the environmental review is to hold a scoping meeting with the community to outline details related to the proposed project and to receive feedback regarding potential issues of concern. Based on our discussions to date, the scoping meeting for the hotel project is tentatively scheduled to be held on October 13, 2016. We will be sure to share additional details related to the meeting as soon as we have them available!

MONROVIA RENEWAL CONSTRUCTION WORK IN THE SOUTHWEST & SOUTHEAST PROJECT SECTIONS WELL UNDERWAY, \$9.5 MILLION IN CONSTRUCTION CONTRACTS HAVE BEEN AWARDED AND THE PROJECT IS ON TIME AND ON BUDGET

Over the past several weeks, the Monrovia Renewal project has been advancing and the City has made significant progress in constructing the improvements identified in the Southwest and Southeast sections of town (which includes the areas bordered to the north by Colorado Boulevard, to the south by the 210 Freeway, and east and west to the City boundaries).

To date, the City Council has awarded construction contracts for all the work identified in the Southwest and Southeast sections of the Monrovia Renewal project, which total more than \$9.5 million in improvements. And significantly, we are happy to be able to share that the current phase of the overall project is currently projected to be completed on time and on budget!

An overview of the progress we have made to date includes the following overview:

Sewer Improvements Are Substantially Complete

Sewer segment improvements on Shamrock Avenue and Monterey Avenue have been completed. This past week the project contractor completed the necessary paving to repair the roadways, and we expect to close this project out in the next week.

Water Line Improvements Project Underway

The City's contractor has begun replacing old and damaged water lines on Primrose Avenue from Huntington Drive to Central Avenue. Work on Primrose Avenue is expected to complete around October 10, 2016, and at that point in time, contractors will transition their work to Cypress Avenue from Shamrock Avenue to Sherman Avenue. The streets will be closed to through traffic during the construction work, however, residents will be allowed access at all times. In addition, street parking will be restricted between the hours of 7:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m. where

construction is being performed. We would ask that everyone please abide by the 'No Parking' signs, which will be posted 48 hours in advance of when the construction work will occur. Additionally, all impacted streets will be re-opened for traffic at the end of each work day.

Water Service Lines Replacement Project

The City's contractor continues to make excellent progress on water service line replacements throughout the Southwest and Southeast project areas. This initiative includes the replacement of more than 100 galvanized steel water service lines with new copper water pipes. It is anticipated that this portion of the project will be completed by October 10, 2016.

Sidewalk Repairs By Precision Concrete Cutting

Precision Concrete Cutting continues to repair sidewalks by removing trip hazards and replace chipped sidewalk areas. The contractor started work in the Southwest segment of the Monrovia Renewal project and they are working their way east. When they are complete with the two initial sections, they will have made over 7,000 sidewalk repairs! This work is expected to take approximately six months, and will conclude in February 2017.

Street Improvements Project Set To Begin On October 10, 2016

The construction work that will be most impactful for residents is related to the street improvements that will occur in the Southwest and Southeast project areas. This past week, City personnel met with our street contractor to coordinate the scheduling and execution of the planned work, which is scheduled to begin the week of October 10, 2016.

HAPPY HOUR PASADENA STYLE

A friend in the wine business says that selling wine to restaurants and supermarkets is like “hand-to-hand combat”. I guess what he means is there is a lot of competition. Wines lists have certainly evolved in the past twenty years. The happy hour scene in the San Gabriel Valley has really heated up. It used to be that McCormick and Schmick’s was the only game in town for upscale surroundings and low prices. Although the time of the \$1.99 burgers and \$3 beer is long gone, there are four restaurants in a one-mile radius that are fighting for your last dollar with some pretty impressive wine/beer selections.

First, how did the happy hour first come into our lives? It was an old Navy term - the sailors would get a break from their daily activities and drink beer and fight on the ship. Drinking on the ship was soon outlawed and the “happy” part went away. During Prohibition, adults would meet in speakeasies or friends’ homes before going out to dinner. Since it was illegal, alcohol could not be served in restaurants, so friends would say, “let’s meet for happy hour”. It took some forty years for restaurants and bars to catch on with drinks and food specials, though some states, to this day have banned the term “happy hour”.

Sip and share at Del Frisco’s from 4 PM to 6:30 PM. Their menu has what is called “food to fight over”, including deviled eggs, pork nachos and waygu corn dogs, a nice selection of wines (including a Josh Cellars Cab that will go well any other appetizers). What I like is that they have all of their tap beers for \$5, and all sip and share items are reasonably priced at \$6. Get the White Sangria, a perfect drink for summer, plus it comes with a popsicle! I wish they had a bit more food to fight over, but the price is right. 55 S. Lake Ave Pasadena. Various locations

Paul Martins’, also on South Lake, starts at 3 PM and has \$5 beers and wines from \$5 to \$9. If you get the burger for \$15, they throw in the beer gratis.

The educated Guess Cabernet (\$13) is a stand-out. 455 S. Lake Pasadena. Various locations

As far the food, Ruths Chris gets the nod over the others. Their Swizzle and Stir menu is \$9 and includes a steak sandwich that is the bargain of all bargains. Happy hour includes selected mixed

VEGAN PUMPKIN SAGE PASTA

INGREDIENTS

For the pasta
6 to 8 oz Rotini or Fusilli pasta
1 tsp extra virgin oil
8 sage leaves, chopped
1 to 1.5 tsp fresh thyme leaves or ½ tsp dried thyme
2 cloves of garlic, minced
1 to 2 Tbsp tomato paste
¾ cup pumpkin puree or use sweet potato puree
¾ cup non dairy milk like coconut or almond
½ tsp salt
black pepper to taste
For the topping
1 tsp extra virgin olive oil
6 fresh sage leaves, julienned
2 to 3 Tbsp breadcrumbs or coarsely ground cashews or pumpkin seeds
a generous pinch of salt and pepper

INSTRUCTIONS

Cook the pasta according to instructions. Drain and keep aside.

In a large skillet, heat oil at medium low heat. Add Sage, thyme and garlic and cook until garlic and herbs change color slightly. Stir frequently to avoid burning. At this point you can add in veggies or mushrooms and cook until golden.

Add tomato paste and pumpkin and mix in. Add milk, salt and pepper and mix in. Bring to a boil. Taste and adjust salt.

Add cooked pasta, toss well. Cover and take off heat. Let sit for a few minutes.

Make the topping

In a small skillet, add oil and heat at medium. Add sage and cook for half a minute. Add breadcrumbs or coarsely chopped nuts and cook until golden and toasted. Add salt and pepper and mix in. Use to garnish the pasta generously. You can also sprinkle some pepita parm or other nut based parm.

HOW AND WHEN TO APPLY FOR SOCIAL SECURITY RETIREMENT BENEFITS

Dear Savvy Senior,

What is the easiest way to apply for my Social Security retirement benefits, and how far in advance do I need to apply before I start collecting?

Approaching 62

Dear Approaching,

The Social Security Administration offers three different ways you can apply for your retirement and/or spouses benefits, depending on your preference and how much help you need. Here's a rundown of the options, along with a list of information you'll need to apply, and when to fill out the application.

How To Apply?

The easiest and most convenient way to apply for your Social Security benefits is to do it yourself online at SocialSecurity.gov. It takes less than 15 minutes to complete the application, as long as you've gathered all of the required information and documentation (more on that at the bottom of the column).

If, however, you'd rather have a Social Security employee assist with the process, you can also apply by phone at 800-772-1213, or at your local Social Security office. If you apply in person, be sure to call ahead and schedule an appointment to cut your office wait time.

Whichever method you feel most comfortable using, your application will be reviewed and processed as soon as all necessary documentation and information is received. And, the Social Security Administration will notify you if it turns out you could qualify for higher benefits on your spouse's record, or if other family members can receive benefits on your work record.

When To Apply?

While full retirement age is currently 66 (for those born between 1943 and 1954) you can start receiving your Social Security retirement benefits as early as age 62 or as late as age 70, but the longer you wait the larger your monthly check. See ssa.gov/retire/estimator.html to estimate your benefits.

Social Security recommends that you apply for retirement benefits three months before you want your payments to start. So if you want your benefits to begin as soon as you turn 62, you should apply at



61 years and nine months old.

It's also worth noting that if you start receiving your Social Security retirement benefits before age 65, you will automatically be enrolled in Medicare Part A and Part B, and you'll receive your Medicare card about three months before your 65th birthday. It will include instructions to return it if you have work coverage that qualifies you for late enrollment.

But if you decide to delay your retirement benefits, you'll need to sign up just for Medicare at age 65, which you can also do at SocialSecurity.gov, over the phone at 800-772-1213 or through your local Social Security office.

If you do not sign up, in some circumstances your Medicare coverage may be delayed and cost more.

Need Information

In order to apply for Social Security benefits, you'll need to be able to document some information about your identity and work history. So before applying, have the following information handy:

- Your Social Security number.
- Your birth certificate (original or certified).
- Proof of U.S. citizenship or lawful alien status if you were not born in the United States.
- A copy of your U.S. military service papers if you had military service before 1968.
- A copy of your W-2 forms and/or self-employment tax return for last year.
- Your bank information (including your account number and the bank routing number) you want your benefits direct deposited to.

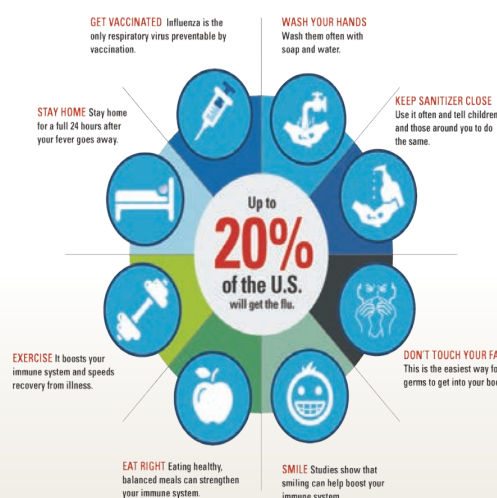

HUBBLE TELESCOPE SPOTS POSSIBLE WATER PLUMES ERUPTING ON JUPITER'S MOON EUROPA

Astronomers using NASA's Hubble Space Telescope have imaged what may be water vapor plumes erupting off the surface of Jupiter's moon Europa. This finding bolsters other Hubble observations suggesting the icy moon erupts with high-altitude water vapor plumes.

The observation increases the possibility that future missions to Europa may be able to sample Europa's ocean without having to drill through miles of ice.

"Europa's ocean is considered to be one of the most promising places that could potentially harbor life in the solar system," said Geoff Yoder, acting associate administrator for NASA's Science Mission Directorate in Washington, D.C. "These plumes, if they do indeed exist, may provide another way to sample Europa's subsurface."

The plumes are estimated to rise about 125 miles before, presumably, raining material back down onto Europa's surface. Europa has a huge global ocean containing twice as much water as Earth's oceans, but it is protected by a layer of extremely cold and hard ice of unknown thickness. The plumes provide a tantalizing opportunity to gather samples originating from under the surface without having to land or drill through the ice.

The team, led by William Sparks of the Space Telescope Science Institute (STScI) in Baltimore, Maryland, observed these finger-like projections while viewing Europa's edge as it passed in front of Jupiter.

The original goal of the team's observing proposal was to determine whether Europa has a thin, extended atmosphere, or exosphere. Using the same observing method that detects atmospheres around planets orbiting other stars, the team also realized if there was water vapor venting from Europa's surface, this observation would be an excellent way to see it.

"The atmosphere of an extrasolar planet blocks some of the starlight that is behind it," Sparks explained. "If there is a thin atmosphere around Europa, it has the potential to block some of the light of Jupiter, and we could see it as a silhouette. And so we were looking for absorption features around the limb of Europa as it transited the smooth face of Jupiter."

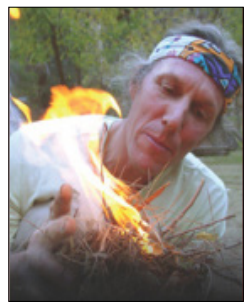
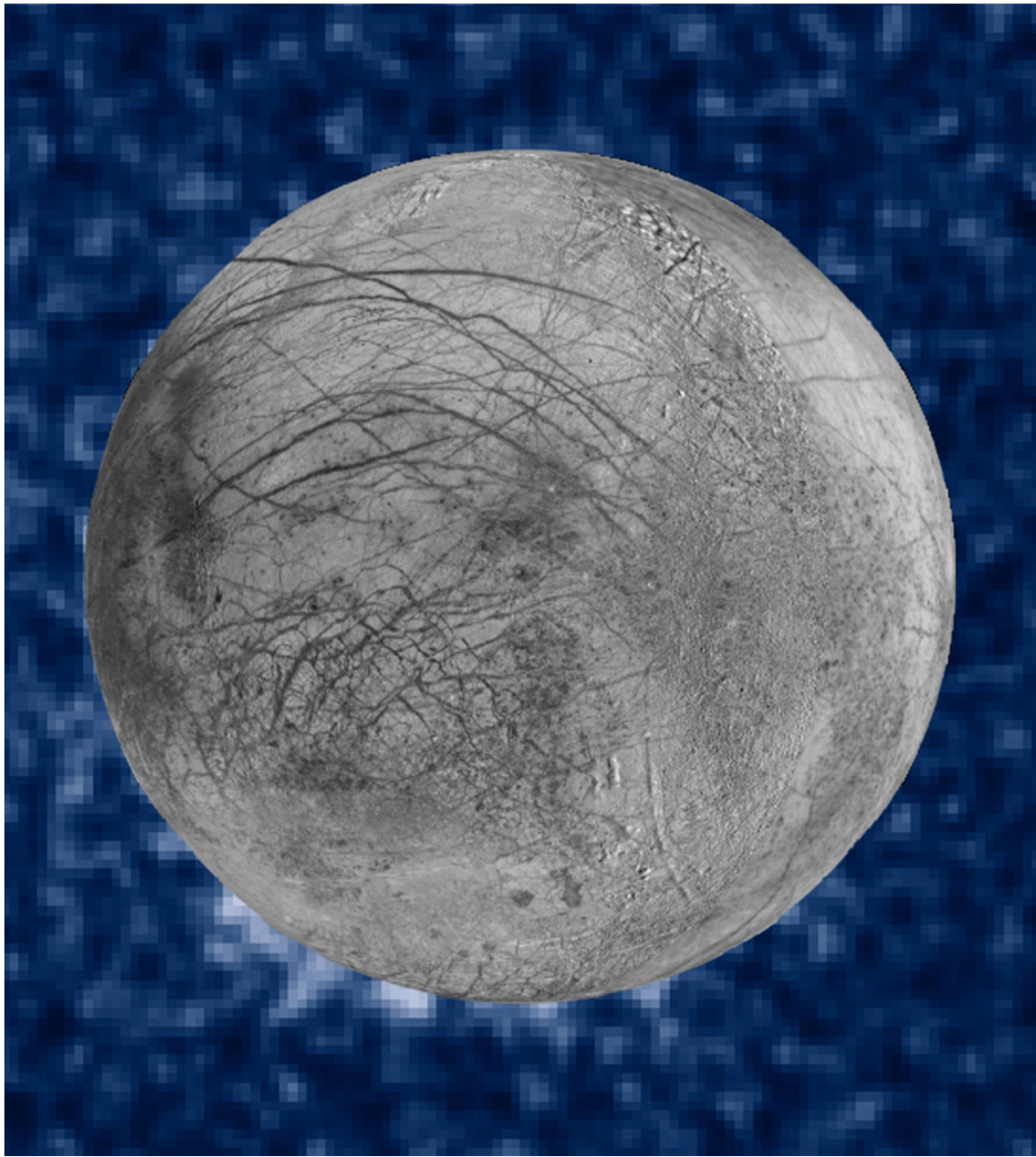
In 10 separate occurrences spanning 15 months, the team observed Europa passing in front of Jupiter. They saw what could be plumes erupting on three of these occasions.

This work provides supporting evidence for water plumes on Europa. In 2012, a team led by Lorenz Roth of Southwest Research Institute in San Antonio, Texas, detected evidence of water vapor erupting from the frigid south polar region of Europa and reaching more than 100 miles into space. Although both teams used Hubble's Space Telescope Imaging Spectrograph (STIS) instrument, each used a totally independent method to arrive at the same conclusion.

"When we calculate in a completely different way the amount of material that would be needed to create these absorption features, it's pretty similar to what Roth and his team found," Sparks said. "The estimates for the mass are similar, the estimates for the height of the plumes are similar. The latitude of two of the plume candidates we see corresponds to their earlier work."

If confirmed, Europa would be the second moon in the solar system known to have water vapor plumes. In 2005, NASA's Cassini orbiter detected jets of water vapor and dust spewing off the surface of Saturn's moon Enceladus.

LIVING WITH DROUGHT AND DESERT CONDITIONS [PART ONE]

If you live in a desert or semi-desert region, you've probably looked into some of the methods for gardening with less water. If you live in a city, nearly everything comes from afar, and too few of us have considered how to provide for our own food, water, medicine etc. When you learn how to provide some of your needs, wherever you're living, you build strength into your family and community.

Look at a map of North America and you'll see that there are many areas where the average rainfall is low – mostly the western and southern states, as well as many other parts of the world. Erratic weather seems to be the rule, and learning how to survive in an area with limited water is a good long-term skill to develop.

So how do you continue to grow and produce food as the ground and heavens seem ever drier?

Let's look at the various aspects of drought-resistant gardening.

WATER

Water is the key to life. According to health authorities, only 20% of the world's population has access to potable tap water.

And consider: Of the 333 million cubic miles of water estimated to be on the planet, 97% of that is in the oceans. Two percent is locked in ice. About 0.01% of the water is in lakes and rivers, and the remaining water is more than a mile underground, beyond the reach of conventional well drilling.

One of the biggest uses of water is agriculture, and fortunately, most farmers rely on rain water for about 85% of their water needs. The rest is supplied by wells, dams, aqueducts, etc.

And yes, rain is important, but consider that at any given moment, the amount of rain falling on the earth amounts to about 0.001% of the world's water.

If you're fortunate to live in an area where water is sufficient or abundant, it would still behoove you to learn some methods for doing more with less. Why? Periods of drought are not rare upon the earth, and long periods of severe drought have affected vast swaths of land throughout recorded history. Those who learned to adjust and live with the change, survived. Those who did not, or could not, moved on or died out.

So how do you get more use out of limited water? There are only a few ways to do this:

1) Use your water more than once, and 2) collect rain.

USE YOUR WATER MORE THAN ONCE

When water is limited, you must find ways to do more with less. Here are some examples.

When you wash your dishes, simply carry the dishpan outside and water plants with it.

In nearly every place I have lived in the past 40 years, I found ways to disconnect the bathtub drain and the kitchen drain and the drain from the washing machine, and I directed that water out into the yard. If your yard is hilly, this is easier, especially if the house is on the upper part of the lot.

On large properties, you can direct a hose from the drain of a washing machine, for example, and move the hose around to irrigate various trees or garden areas. Obviously, this necessitates carefully choosing detergents that are not harmful to the soil.

Don't underestimate the amount of water that can be re-used from the average household. Even with a low-flow toilet (or a composting toilet), there is a lot of water used to wash clothes, take showers and baths, and in the kitchen. An average household in the U.S. uses about 80 gallons daily, give or take some gallons. That's a lot!

If you have a slightly larger area than a suburban lot, you should consider the possibility of terracing your yard so that rainwater does not immediately wash away, and so that there is the possibility of rainwater settling in basins, called "swales" in today's jargon.

Some of the ancient natives of the Southwest, and of South America, made dams and canals to bring water great distances to their desert homes. We still do this today. Los Angeles County is a classic example of a desert empire that would not exist were it not for the great cement aqueduct that brings water from the north hundreds of miles to the Los Angeles basin. Water is also diverted from the Colorado River to feed the growing demand for water in the Los Angeles basin.

I do not think Job had this in mind when he wrote, "The spirit of God hath made me, and the breath of the Almighty hath given me life" (Job 33:4).

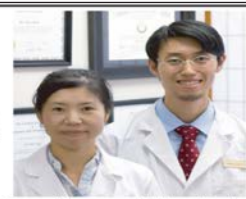
God's breath is not bad, but it is good to the point of giving me his life to live.

WILDLIFE WEBCAMS A VOYEUR'S VIRTUAL PARADISE

I have never considered myself to be much of a voyeur, mainly because I have never felt the urge to spy on people in the privacy of their own space or anywhere else for that matter. However, I must admit that I will allow myself the privilege of nosing in on the interesting intimate activities of wild animals, when given the opportunity.

Being a virtual wildlife voyeur is a relatively recent development for me. It all started a few of years ago, when I found out I could tune in to a variety of live webcam internet broadcasts that show real time streamed footage of birds and other wild animals carrying on with their daily lives, and I have been an avid voyeur ever since.

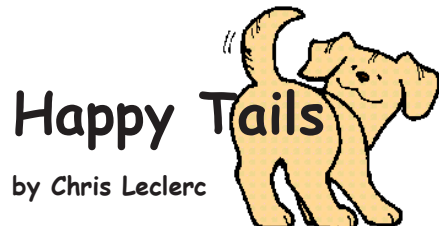
My first experience with spying on wildlife via the internet was when I visited a website (sportsmansparadiseonline.com) that someone had posted as a link to my Facebook timeline. The live video was streaming from an hidden camera affixed to the outside of an owl box that a guy in Oceanside had erected in his back yard.

The stars of this particular "feature film" were a couple of adult barn owls named Sydney and Mel. It showed the two huge love birds nesting and mating at first, then Sydney laying her eggs, the eggs eventually hatching, the hatchlings growing strong enough to fly and ultimately fledging out of the nest, and it all happened right before my very eyes!

It was so amazing to witness those baby owls hatch and grow, then fly away. It was all up close and in person as if I were right there in the nest with them. To me, this is technology at its very best. I learned so much about barn owls from watching that webcam video, and I decided to bookmark the website for easy access in the future. Now I find myself checking in on various wildlife webcams at least once a day to see what's happening with my new feathered and furry four-legged friends.

Another remarkable webcam broadcast that I frequently enjoy viewing is that of an eagle nest located on Santa Catalina Island. There are actually two eagles' nests on the island that a virtual voyeur can tune in to, and both of them show the enormous, gorgeous adult birds come and go as they do throughout the day, while the baby eagles sit waiting for the treats mom and dad bring home after a hard day of hunting.

Because it is so rare that I ever get to see eagles in the wild, I find this particular webcam to



be one of the most fascinating. I try to tune in when I think it might be feeding time, which is typically in the early morning hours before sunrise, or just after the sun goes down. The "treats" those eaglets wait so patiently for are nothing like the kind we humans care to eat, as you might imagine, so viewing at feeding time might not be everyone's cup of tea.

I had hoped to see the little eaglets fledge this year, but unfortunately I missed out because I was too busy to log on. Hopefully I will have the privilege of witnessing the big day with next season's hatchlings. There are several other eagle nest webcams located in various places throughout the world linked to the website as well.

Other live webcams that are posted on Sportsman's Paradise Online include a pristine wild Kestrel nest in Washington state, showing an adult Kestrel laying on an egg soon to become a baby bird, a natural den in Minnesota where you'll see "Lily" the bear coming and going at various times throughout the day, and "Woody" the wood duck nesting in a man-made box waiting patiently for her hatchlings to arrive. The list goes on and on, and I can't seem to get enough of watching those beautiful animals do their thing in the wild.

If you haven't already had the experience of linking to a wildlife webcam on-line, I highly recommend it. Although, do be warned that you will probably get hooked like I did. It sure beats watching the news and getting depressed or wasting time gaming or chatting it up with a distant friend, or some stranger on a social network website, and by all means it is far more educational.

I don't feel guilty about being the virtual voyeur I have apparently become, rather I feel more connected to the part of this wild world that I may otherwise never be privy to, and I am grateful to modern technology for bringing the beautiful beasts from the great outdoors where they live, into my own personal living space.

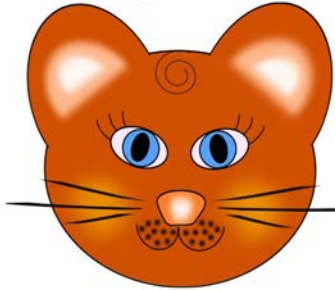

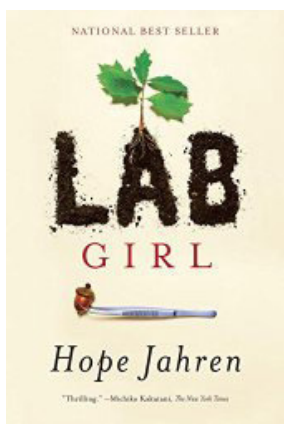
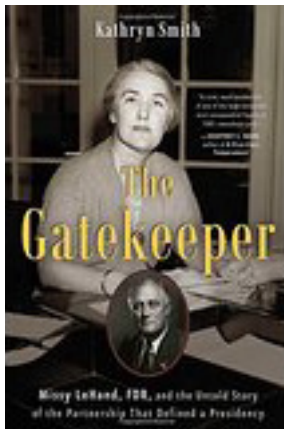

HILARY CLINTON'S WELLESLEY COLLEGE YEARS.

In 1965, Hilary enrolled at Wellesley College, where she majored in political science. During her freshman year, she served as president of the Wellesley Young Republicans;she supported the elections of Mayor John Lindsay and of Senator Edward Brooke.She later stepped down from this position, as her views changed regarding the American Civil Rights Movement and the Vietnam War.In a letter to her youth minister at this time, she described herself as “a mind conservative and a heart liberal”. In contrast to the 1960s current that advocated radical actions against the political system, she sought to work for change within it.In her junior year, Rodham became a supporter of the antiwar Democrat Eugene McCarthy.In 1968, she was elected president of the Wellesley College Government Association and served through early 1969. After the assassination of Martin Luther King, Jr., Hilary organized a two-day student strike and worked with Wellesley's black students to recruit more black students and faculty.In her student government role, she played a role in keeping Wellesley from being embroiled in the student disruptions common to other colleges.A number of her fellow students thought she might some day become the first female President of the United States. To help her better understand her changing political views, Professor Alan Schechter assigned Hilary to

intern at the House Republican Conference, and she attended the “Wellesley in Washington” summer program. Rodham was invited by New York Representative Charles Goodell to help Governor Nelson Rockefeller's late-entry campaign for the Republican nomination. Hilary attended the 1968 Republican National Convention. However, she was upset by the way Richard Nixon's campaign portrayed Rockefeller and by what she perceived as the convention's “veiled” racist messages, and left the Republican Party for good.In 1969, she graduated with departmental honors in political science. She became the first student in Wellesley College history to deliver its commencement address. Her speech received a standing ovation lasting seven minutes. She was featured in an article published in Life magazine, due to the response to a part of her speech that criticized Senator Brooke, who had spoken before her at the commencement. She also appeared on Irv Kupcinet's nationally syndicated television talk show as well as in Illinois and New England newspapers. That summer, she worked her way across Alaska, washing dishes in Mount McKinley National Park and sliming salmon in a fish processing cannery in Valdez (which fired her and shut down overnight when she complained about unhealthful conditions).The above from Wikipedia.
