

FORMER CITY TREASURER GEORGE ENYEDI PASSES AWAY



Sierra Madre has lost another treasure. Smart, charming, energetic, handsome and strong....just a few adjectives that described Sierra Madre’s former City Treasurer, George Enyedi. He was a wealth of knowledge on finances, volunteerism, loving life, and living well. He never met a challenge that he couldn’t handle. What made him so amazing is that until he was well into his 80’s, it was hard to keep up with him! George passed away quietly at his home on Tuesday at the age of 91. He was truly an amazing man that will be missed.

Volunteerism and working to improve the quality of life in Sierra Madre were always a big part of Enyedi’s life. He was an active member of the Sierra Madre Cemetery Association, The Sierra Madre Playhouse, The Sierra Madre Mountain Conservancy, SMEAC, and the Sierra Madre Kiwanis Club, just to name a few.

Recipient of numerous civic honors, George was the Sierra Madre Citizen of the Year, and was bestowed with the city’s George Maurer Lifetime Achievement Award to name a few.

By profession, George was a Certified Public Accountant and senior partner in the firm of Enyedi, Marshall and Montanez in downtown Los Angeles. It was this experience that made him the choice of

Sierra Madreans when he ran for Treasurer in 2011. It was also his financial experience that kept both the Sierra Madre Cemetery and the Sierra Madre Playhouse from closing several years ago.

Enyedi and his wife, Gerda came to the United States in 1952 from Cluj, Transylvania, a province of Romania, settling in Pasadena, California. They moved to Sierra Madre in 1961. George was looking for a house “on top of a hill” and found the perfect place in Sierra Madre. His home has magnificent views of the San Gabriel Valley and is a stone’s throw away from the natural habitat of bears, deer, coyotes and mountain lions. The Enyedi’s reared 3 sons, Klaus, Hans and Kurt in Sierra Madre and the family has expanded to include 3 daughters-in-law. In a conversation with him several years ago, he had 6 grandchildren and 2 great granddaughters, all living in Southern California. Gerda, his beloved wife of 60 years, passed away in April of 2006 something he really never recovered from.

George Enyedi, through all the ups and downs that life brought his way, epitomized strength, conviction and compassion. When one speaks of the glue that holds this town together, his name is right there at the top of the list. George Enyedi truly was a first class gentleman with the heart of a lion.

CITY COUNCIL SEALS THE DEAL

Gabriel "Gabe" Engeland Will Become City Manager on March 13th



On Tuesday, the Sierra Madre City Council confirmed the hiring of Sierra Madre’s next City Manager, approving a five year contract which was reported in the Mountain Views News last week. (<http://mtnviewsnews.com/v11/htm/n03/p01.htm>).

A press release issued by the city on Monday stated, " Mr. Engeland (“Gabe”) is an experienced City Manager with outstanding qualifications and references from all past employers. Gabe has been on a City Manager “track” in his professional career for the past six years, and most recently has been serving the City of Trinidad, Colorado as its City Manager since 2015, where he oversaw a staff of 178 employees and a budget of \$38.9 million dollars."

Trinidad is a full service city, including police, fire/paramedic, electric utility, water utility, waste water, gas, library, golf course and landfill, in addition to the general fund services of public works, human resources, finance and budget, development and economic services; Trinidad has a population of 10,000 and a service area of approximately 15,000."

The release goes on to quote Engeland as saying, "Gabe intends to fully engage with the community and make Sierra Made home with his wife and new baby daughter. “I am excited to be part of team Sierra Madre and my wife and I are looking forward to our move to this wonderful community.”

The position in Sierra Madre will yield a substantial increase in salary for Engeland. According to the City of Trinidad’s 2016 Budget, the new city manager will receive approximately \$79,000 more a year. In Trinidad where Engeland was City Manager for just about two years, he was paid \$103,000 a year. In Sierra Madre his contract calls for a base salary of \$182,000.

Engeland, pictured above, will be missed by the town of Trinidad according to an article in their local paper, The Chronicle-News,

Trinidad Mayor Phil Rico lauded Engeland and his contributions to the city during his tenure here. Rico credited Engeland for turning around Trinidad’s finances and balancing the budget for the first time in years.

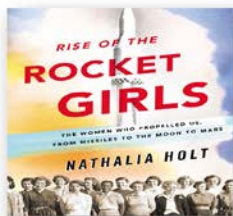

SCHOLARSHIP OPPORTUNITY

Each year Edison International, parent company of Southern California Edison (SCE), gives \$1.2 million in scholarships to high school seniors in the SCE service territory. This year, Edison International will provide a \$40,000 scholarship to 30 students interested in science, technology, engineering and mathematics (STEM). 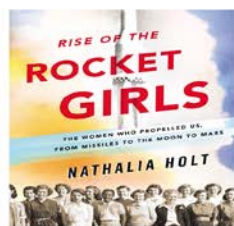

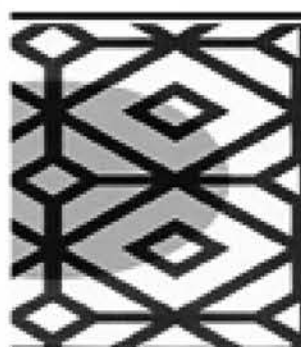

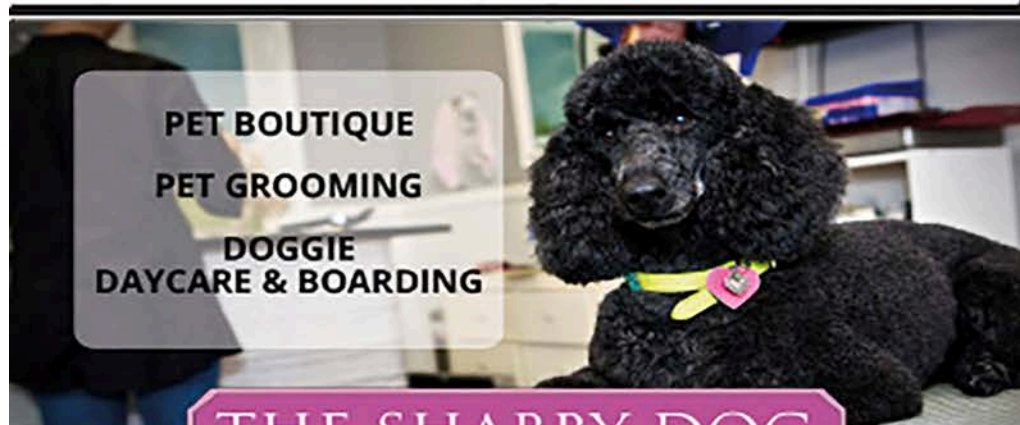

City Holds Two Special Committee Meetings in the Last Week

City officials held two Special Committee Meetings this week the first, Tuesday night, when the Legislative Policy Committee took up immigration and sanctuary cities and a second meeting Thursday night, with the Public Safety Committee looking at a recent rash of gang related shootings.

Council member Steve Madison, who sits on both Public Safety Committee and Legislative Policy Committee, said of Tuesday's meeting that they reviewed the city's current policy on immigration.

"Which is not to dedicate city resources to enforcing federal law," he said. "We agreed that we should urge the new administration to extend the [Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals] DOCA program.

Madison said the program allows those children, even though they are undocumented, to stay in the U.S. as long as they have not committed any felonies, or crimes of violence, he said.

He also said they looked at the pending BRIDGE Act bill which would also allow undocumented workers an opportunity to stay in the U.S. under certain circumstances.

He said their efforts would be done through letter writing to the Presidential administration.

City staff has been reluctant to declare Pasadena a "Sanctuary City," Madison said in fear of losing \$34.6 million in federal funding to the city.

"It's kind of ironic because the very next day [Wednesday] the administration and the President signed some kind

of document that punishes sanctuary cities... by cutting off their funding."

Madison, a federal lawyer, said he thinks there are a lot of legal impediments to cutting federal funds.

He said that the issue of declaring Pasadena a "Sanctuary City" would be taken up by the full city council at a future date set by Mayor Terry Tornek.

Thursday's Public Safety Committee was also an informational report with Police Chief Phillip Sanchez giving an update on violence in the community including a number of gang related shooting that started in late December into early January. Since then he said his department has taken a number of actions.

"Pasadena police officers have arrested a total of 9 gang members and recovered 10 firearms," he said of a raid after two people were killed Jan. 6. "Officers have made additional arrests and recovered additional firearms."

He said since Jan. 15 they made 36 "field contacts," 12 probation and parole compliance checks and issued 130 traffic citations. "The vast majority of these people have gang ties or affiliated with a gang," he said.

Committee Chair John Kennedy said he called for the special meeting to hear from residents and the public. Comments ranged from getting guns off the street to city youth programs to police conduct.

"In the Northwest, this use of police force, stop and arrest, racial profiling has undermined the trust in our police, and I think we need to address that if we want to reduce crime," one resident said.

The meeting started late with the three committee members at odds with each other, Councilmember Tyron Hampton was stuck in traffic in Long Beach and Vice Mayor Gene Masuda did not show up at all. Hampton suggested Masuda be dismissed from the Committee. Kennedy had previously complained that

committee meetings in October had been canceled because of issues related to the members.

Council to Hear Efforts to Enhance the Arroyo

The city council is set Monday to hear a range of issues dealing with the Arroyo Seco, including the long-term future of the golf courses, "to craft a broad, unifying vision, which would include capital projects and programming opportunities, some immediate and some longer-term, as well as to identify funding opportunities consistent with community desires" according to the city staff report.

Mayor Terry Tornek talked about the Arroyo as part of his State of the City Address last week outlining plans by the National Park Service to add the Arroyo to the Santa Monica Mountains National Recreation Area. He said there is a potential habitat restoration project by the Army Corps of Engineers that could, among other things, remove the concrete channel running through the Arroyo and replace it with are-naturalized streambed. The council will discuss the effect of the County Department of Public Works' sediment removal project behind the Devil Gate Dam and the potential expansions of the Rose Bowl Aquatic Center and Kidspace museum.

Tornek said removal of the concrete channel would take decades.

ALVERNO HEIGHTS ACADEMY HONORS PHYSICS CLASS ENCOURAGED TO “DARE MIGHTY THINGS” AT JPL

The class enjoyed a field trip to learn more about the 50th anniversary of planetary exploration

Sierra Madre, CA – On Monday, January 23 the Alverno Heights Academy Honors Physics class had the opportunity to visit Pasadena's own Jet Propulsion Laboratory (JPL) on an exciting field trip. During their trip, the class was encouraged to “Dare Mighty Things.” “Dare Mighty Things” is a current exhibit and program at JPL that celebrates the 50th anniversary of planetary exploration.

While on the field trip, the class particularly enjoyed hearing about JPL's plans for ARM (Asteroid Redirect Mission), a mission to capture and move an asteroid to a stable orbit around the moon. The mission, planned for around 2020 also will demonstrate planetary defense techniques to deflect dangerous asteroids from crashing into Earth, as well as providing resupply and operational support for manned missions to Mars.

The girls also learned more about the Juno Mission, which entered orbit around Jupiter on the 4th of July, 2016. For the first time, this project will allow scientists to see below the dense cloud cover to answer questions about the gas giant and the origins of our solar system. Alverno's own Ad Astra Astronomy Club plans to build a radio telescope to monitor radio emissions from Jupiter, so it was very exciting to see a model of the spacecraft and learn more details of the mission.

Finally, the students were introduced to the Voyager Missions, which they found exceptionally interesting. The Voyager Missions feature 12-inch golden records with sounds and music of Earth, destined to perhaps be heard by intelligent spacefaring civilizations in interstellar space. The Voyagers have now moved beyond our solar system and are still transmitting information from outer space to “the center of the universe” at Mission Control of the Deep Space Network at JPL.

The visit was awe-inspiring for the young scientists and engineers of a spacefaring civilization from a small planet.

“Over the past few years, Alverno Heights Academy's STEM program has grown exponentially and has provided so many of our alumnae and current students with exceptional opportunities like this one,” said Julia V. Fanara, Head of School, of the field trip. “We are incredibly grateful to JPL and Caltech for working with Alverno and our students to instill in our young women that they can be who they imagine themselves to be whether that's biologists, astronauts, engineers, or astrophysicists. We look forward to seeing the work that these young women will accomplish in these important fields and the future impact they will have at these institutions.”

For example, First Check home drug tests detect up to 12 of the most commonly abused drugs in five minutes with over 99 percent accuracy. 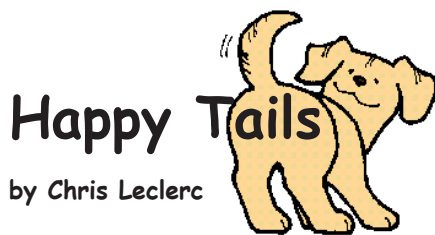

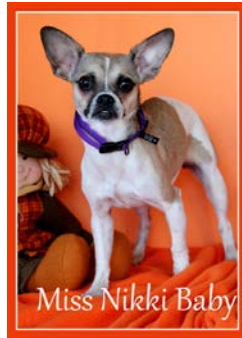


LOOKING FOR A BEST FRIEND

New or not new, don't make it complicated. As Yogarupa Rod Stryker says, 10 minutes a day is better than 1 hour once a week. It's the consistency that's going to pay off and help us in our daily life each day.

Always make sure to find a comfortable seat for meditation. There's nothing like having your leg fall asleep or having an uncomfortable hip bothering you while you're trying to be still. The seated position should

allow the spine to be tall with the natural curve in the lower back. If seated on the floor is uncomfortable, sit in a chair or against a wall. Set aside enough time to sit for meditation and make sure you have a space where you won't fear interruption or distraction. Meditation is usually best in the morning just after waking up. If you can avoid looking at your phone or other electronic device, please do. It's best to have all of your focus and awareness moving toward an internal point of view. Once there, begin to breathe and relax the body. If you use a guided meditation to begin, that's ok for a while. Eventually, you'll want to move into just sitting while maintaining breath, internal awareness and visualization.

Happy Meditating! Again, don't make it complex, even if your head is busy, you are still meditating. Learning to focus is part of the process.

This one might be tough to explain, but in my quest to keep you, my loyal reader, educated we will discuss organic and natural wines. Last Thursday Night I visited the Urban Plates Restaurant on South Lake Avenue in Pasadena.

Much like Chipotle or your work cafeteria, you wait in line, but the comparisons end there. My task was to try the food, but also see what kind of wines matched up with their "protein-focused" menu. I sampled their free-range chicken, California line-caught albacore, and a turkey meatloaf that my grandmother would have been proud of. Other entrees on my list for my next visit are sautéed brussels sprouts and organic potatoes. Organic potatoes? I can't tell the difference between organic, natural, or farm-to-table, but we live in a new generation of "foodies" and reading the labels in the grocery store seems to be the norm, not the exception.

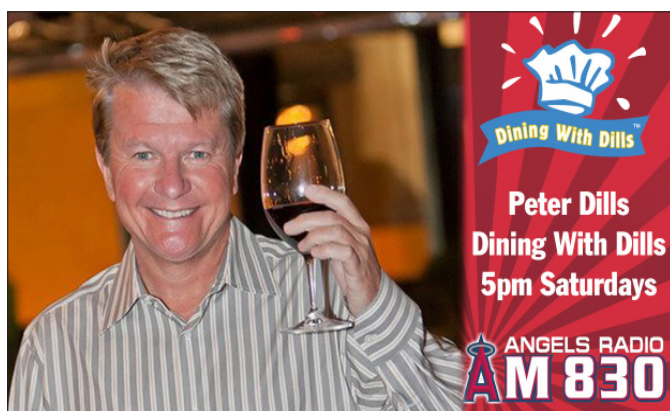
While menu boasts many healthy choices like beet salad with goat cheese, you can live it up with an order of pork ribs and macaroni and cheese. Both of these go great with their selection of local beers. All entrees are in the \$10 to \$16 range and come with char grilled focaccia bread. The wine list, though small, offers a wine-by-the-glass program that I really appreciate. I counted 11 wines by the glass and have been told once management gets requests for additional wines they will expand. All and all they have great food and a nice wine list!

So what exactly is "organic wine"? Urban Plates carries a few that are and a few that are not. I love the fact that you can get a great glass of wine with your lunch or dinner for \$7 and up. Here is my best explanation: the term "organic" has the same meaning as when applied to other products of our everyday consumption such as organic poultry or produce, and conveys the concept of natural growing practices. Organic winemakers use only natural fertilizers and never use pesticides. It is simply a pure and natural method of wine growing and wine making! Simple, right? I find there is no taste difference. It might cost you a few more pennies, but give it a shot!! All winemakers are farmers and their intent is to keep all of their wines/farms goods as close to natural as possible.

Side note: Each morning I stop at my local grocery store for a bottle of Kombucha - Urban Plates has it on tap!

TIMES ARE A CHANGING: Robert Simon tells me that the A/K/A Bistro is now the A L M A de la Rosa, featuring Cal-Latin influenced cuisine. I'll give it a shot in a few weeks!

SWEET AND SOUR PORK

Happy Chinese New Year

INGREDIENTS

2 pounds pork boneless top loin
Vegetable oil
1/2 cup all-purpose flour
1/4 cup cornstarch
1/2 cup cold water
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 egg
1 can (20 ounces) pineapple chunks in syrup, drained and syrup reserved
1/2 cup packed brown sugar
1/2 cup white vinegar
1/2 teaspoon salt
2 teaspoons soy sauce
2 medium carrots, cut into thin diagonal slices
1 garlic clove, finely chopped
2 tablespoons cornstarch
2 tablespoons cold water
1 medium green bell pepper, cut into 3/4-inch pieces
8 cups hot cooked rice

DIRECTIONS

Trim excess fat from pork. Cut pork into 3/4-inch pieces.
Heat 1 inch oil deep fryer or Dutch oven 360°F.
Beat flour, 1/4 cup cornstarch, 1/2 cup cold water, 1/2 teaspoon salt and the egg in large bowl with hand beater until smooth. Stir pork into batter until well coated.
Add pork pieces, one at a time, to oil. Fry about 20 pieces at a time about 5 minutes, turning 2 or 3 times, until golden brown. Drain on paper towels; keep warm.
Add enough water to reserved pineapple syrup to measure 1 cup. Heat syrup mixture, brown sugar, vinegar, 1/2 teaspoon salt, the soy sauce, carrots and garlic to boiling in Dutch oven; reduce heat to low.
Cover and simmer about 6 minutes or until carrots are crisp-tender. Mix 2 tablespoons cornstarch and 2 tablespoons cold water; stir into sauce.
Add pork, pineapple and bell pepper. Heat to boiling, stir constantly. Boil and stir 1 minute. Serve with rice.

HOW TO GUARD AGAINST MEDICARE FRAUD

Dear Savvy Senior,
What are the steps seniors need to take if they suspect Medicare fraud?

Suspicious Sandy

Dear Sandy,
Medicare fraud costs taxpayers more than \$60 billion every year, making it one of the most profitable crimes in America. Here's what you should know, along with some tips for preventing, detecting and reporting it, if it happens to you.

What is Medicare fraud?

In a nutshell, Medicare fraud happens when Medicare is purposely billed for services or supplies that were never provided or received. Here are a few examples of some different types Medicare fraud that's out there:
- A healthcare provider bills Medicare for services you never received.
- A supplier bills Medicare for equipment you never got.
- Someone uses your Medicare card to get medical care, supplies, or equipment.
- A company offers a Medicare drug plan that has not been approved by Medicare.
- A company uses false information to mislead you into joining a Medicare plan.

What You Can Do

The best way for you to spot Medicare fraud is to review your quarterly Medicare Summary Notices (MSN) or your Explanation of Benefits (EOB). Be on the lookout for things like charges for medical services, medications or equipment you didn't get, dates of services and charges that look unfamiliar, or if you were billed for the same thing twice. You can also check your Medicare claims early online at MyMedicare.gov (you'll need to create an account first), or by calling Medicare at 800-633-4227.

If you do spot any unusual or questionable charges, your first step is to contact your doctor or health care provider. The charge may just be a simple billing error. If, however, you can't resolve the problem with the provider, your next step is to report the questionable charges to Medicare at 800-633-4227, or to the



Department of Health and Human Services Office of Inspector General Fraud hotline at 800-447-8477.

When you call in, have the MSN or EOB with the questionable charges handy because you'll need to provide them with the following information: your Medicare card number; the physician, supplier, and/or facility name where the service was supposedly provided; the date the service was rendered; the payment amount approved and paid by Medicare; as well as the reason you think Medicare shouldn't have paid. As an incentive, if the suspicious activity you report turns out to be fraud, you may be eligible for a reward of up to \$1,000.

If you need help identifying or reporting Medicare fraud or resolving your Medicare billing errors, contact your state Senior Medicare Patrol program, which provides free assistance. Go to snmpresource.org or call 877-808-2468 for contact information.

Protect Yourself

To help you protect yourself from becoming a victim of Medicare fraud, you need to guard your Medicare card like you would your credit cards, and don't ever give your Medicare or Social Security number to strangers. Also, don't ever give out your personal information to someone who calls or comes to your home uninvited to get you to join a Medicare plan. Medicare will never call or visit your home to sell you anything.

It's also a smart idea to keep records of your doctor visits, tests, and procedures so you can compare them with any suspicious charges on your MSN or EOB.

LOWELL OBSERVATORY TO RENOVATE PLUTO DISCOVERY TELESCOPE

The instrument at Lowell Observatory in Flagstaff, Arizona, used by Clyde Tombaugh to discover Pluto is about to undergo renovation. The year-long project, which began on January 12, will include restoration of both the historic telescope and the wooden dome that houses it. While the telescope will be removed from the dome during this work, the dome will be open from time to time for public tours as work allows.

The Pluto Telescope and its dome date back to the late 1920s, when Lowell Observatory recommenced the search for founder Percival Lowell's theoretical "Planet X". In the nine decades since, some areas of the dome have rotted, a few of the telescope parts have worn out, and the others need to be cleaned or stripped and repainted. The renovation will address these issues, as Lowell's technical staff plans to replace part of the dome wood and then weatherproof the entire facility.

The Pluto Telescope is technically known as an astrograph, a telescope specifically designed for taking photographs of objects in space. In addition to Tombaugh's 1930 discovery of Pluto, the instrument was also used by Lowell astronomers to study comets and asteroids, as well as stars with measurable proper motion (apparent angular movement). But it is the Pluto discovery that continues to generate public interest in the facility, resulting in ever-increasing visitation from guests around the world. In 2016 alone, Lowell welcomed a record 100,000 visitors.

The renovation comes two years after a similar effort on Lowell's historic 24-inch telescope and will be carried out by the same team of Lowell technicians. Like that instrument, the lens of the Pluto Telescope, measuring 13-inches in diameter, was crafted by the Alvan Clark and Sons telescope making firm of Cambridge, Massachusetts.

Lowell Director Jeff Hall said, "Like the Alvan Clark refractor across campus, the Pluto Discovery Telescope is a national treasure. People come to Lowell from all over the world to see these historic telescopes, and I'm so pleased to see them restored and preserved for decades to come."

The Pluto Telescope and dome renovation will cost \$155,000, all of which Lowell's development team has raised through crowdsourcing, private donations, and a grant from Crystal Trust. Hall said, "We can't undertake major projects like this without external support, and we're grateful to everyone who has donated to make this happen."

While a young researcher working for the Lowell Observatory in Flagstaff, Arizona, Tombaugh was given the job to perform a systematic search for a trans-Neptunian planet (also called Planet X), which had been predicted by Percival Lowell and William Pickering.

Tombaugh used the observatory's 13-inch astrograph to take photographs of the same section of sky several nights apart. He then used a blink comparator to compare the different images. When he shifted between the two images, a moving object, such as a planet, would appear to jump from one position to another, while the more distant objects such as stars would appear stationary. Tombaugh noticed such a moving object in his search, near the place predicted by Lowell, and subsequent observations showed it to have an orbit beyond that of Neptune. This ruled out classification as an asteroid, and they decided this was the ninth planet that Lowell had predicted. The discovery was made on February 18, 1930.

RUNNING IN THE MUD

Way back in 1976, a friend who ran a non-profit group shared with me a way to commemorate one's birthday. Run a lap for every year, and mentally review that year as you run. Relive your life. There are many other details, but this is the essence of it. Take the time to run through your life, and look over how you got to where you are today.

This is essentially what I have done every year since then. My birthday this year in January of 2017 was no different. Though the leaders of the non-profit have encouraged their members to do this run as a group-activity, I felt the need for solitude this year. I wanted to review my past years, without having to talk it aloud to whomever might have come along to run with me.

Before noon, I found a somewhat isolated place to run down in the Arroyo Seco. It had rained previously, so everything was wet and muddy. It was sunny, yet it was still cold and breezy. Birds flew about overhead looking for possible meals in the new pools of water that head developed around the willows. I located one of the catchment basins that had been built to hold rain and river water, so it soaks into the water table. I liked the length of its perimeter berm, and began my run.

I run one lap for each year, trying to remember all the significant events for that year. I tried to remember all my significant events, and how I was feeling about them way back when. Successes, failures, fears, challenges, obstacles, rejections, learning new skills, realizing that people don't become more skilled and competent just become they grow older.

In the first few years, very few memories were present. I ran in a large circle, trying to not pay much attention to my physical surroundings, trying to get back into the mindset of a newly born child. I saw my parents and I saw my teachers.

I recall the phrase being asked to me so often, in the very early years, and especially as I grew older: "What do you want to be when you grow up?" It was an odd question, I always thought, because the person asking really meant "what sort of a job do you think you will do for the majority of your life so you can earn money to pay your bills?" But I only heard "what do you want to be" and "when you grow up." I had lots of interests, for sure, and I recall admiring other friends or associates who seemed to be so wholly engrossed in one task that they clearly had "become" that activity, whether sports, proficiency with a musical instrument, gardening, whatever. I had so many interests. Did I really have to decide on just one? And "growing up." Will I know when I have "grown

up"? I just naturally assumed that once I grew – that once anyone grew up – they would ipso facto become a stable member of society, an actively contributing member to a family and community, and someone who maturely made all the best decisions for now and the future. But I never saw those adults. I recall feeling disappointed as I "grew up," seeing what I perceived to be vast incompetence, lack of willpower, and general confusion about what to do in life. I reasoned that if I enjoyed walking in the woods and studying plants and Native American history, what could be wrong with that?

As I ran in early January, I felt that I had wasted so much time in school, constantly resisting the teacher, constantly thinking that my time would be so much better spent being somewhere else. But where? My problem and blindness, which I did not see back in my grammar school years, was that no teacher was ever really going to teach me anything, as if they were to serve me something on a silver platter. The real purpose of teachers and schools, I now realize, was to teach me how to teach myself, how to prime my thinking so that I learn what facts are useful in my life, and which facts are necessary to find out all the other things that were necessary to know.

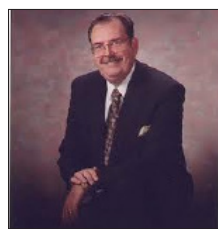
Round and round I went, in the mud, in the diminishing light of the cloudy day, reviewing school, and job, and relationships, and breakup of relationships, and moving from here to there, and traveling, and writing about things, and feeling the pain of the death of so many people around me.

During that time, I had just finished reading the remarkable book, "House of Rain" by Childs, about the possible fate of the Anasazi the American Southwest, and I could not help but think about people with an incredible low-tech technology, who built great houses and roads and canals, made pots and fabrics, and grew food when there was sufficient rain. Then something happened, and people were dispersed, or killed. As I ran, I thought of the fate of all of us, how we take so much for granted, how water is the most essential key to life, wherever we happen to be.

Now, at 62, I was not so concerned about "what I will do when I grow up." I was more concerned about the refinement of what I have been already doing. How do I make the world a better place for my having been here? Is any "revolution" more important than a personal revolution of my very thinking and going about my daily life?

As I ran my final laps, it was so obvious that life is about people and our relationships, not about the stuff that we acquire. What we do is what we do, here and now. Live your life, and do it the best you can. Accumulating money, and buying a house, and degrees, and all that, are all OK, but we don't want to get all caught up by the material things.

I stood in the stiffening breeze with the setting sun to the west, and it was so clear that life is to be lived in the now, and how you go about that doing, is everything.

FOOTHILL GOLD LINE UPDATE: GLENDORA TO MONTCLAIR UPDATE

Ahead of the upcoming October groundbreaking, crews are out this week conducting geologic tests at key locations along the Glendora to Montclair extension to evaluate soil conditions. This work is part of the on-going effort underway to prepare the \$1.3 billion project for construction, including finalizing the advanced conceptual engineering with our partner cities and other key stakeholders. The photos below show the crew collecting soil data with 100-foot deep borings in Glendora, near the Grand Avenue/Foothill Boulevard intersection (left) and Lone Hill Avenue (right). These are two of the two dozen locations along the future project where structures will likely be built or renovated.

At their meeting last night, the Construction Authority board of directors reviewed and approved an updated schedule and workplan for the Glendora to Montclair project. The updated schedule is based on the extensive planning done to date, and a more complete understanding that the next segment is really

two major construction projects in one – with the freight and Metrolink relocations occurring first, and then the light rail system construction. The updated schedule forecasts substantial completion in late-2025/early-2026, two years later than the preliminary schedule (developed and approved earlier in the planning process) and also includes the Construction Authority spending the first year of work relocating utilities and conducting other pre-construction activities. As part of the review last night, the board also approved an updated project estimate, which confirmed the construction costs in the 2015 estimate remain accurate. The updated estimate includes an increase of \$118 million, attributable to the costs associated with two more years of work, escalation and new prevailing and minimum wage laws. The overall scope remains consistent.

We anticipate hiring the Alignment design-build contractor in late 2018. At that time, the schedule and estimate will once again be reviewed in response to the final bid and workplan.

Shen Yun Performing Arts was founded with the mission to restore 5000 years of divinely inspired Chinese culture, which has been mostly destroyed under Communist rule. In fact, you couldn't find a show like Shen Yun in China today! I cannot even imagine what this experience would be to anyone of Chinese background-to have your culture so shared and appreciated on such a grand scale. It's also worth noting that Shen Yun Performing Arts Inc. is a nonprofit organization under Section 501(c) (3). (Please visit their website www.shenyunperformingarts.org/support.)

To understand the show's purpose, translate "Shen Yun". The Chinese character "Shen" is a general term for "divine" or "divine being". Chinese Classic Dance has its own training in basic skills, physical expression, postures, leaps, flips, spins and difficult tumbling techniques.

WILL THE MEN IN THE WHITE COATS DRAG TRUMP AWAY?

Check out the 25th Constitutional Amendment. A vice president, working with a “majority of either the principle officers of the executive departments, or of such body as Congress may by law provide,” can remove the president for being “unable to discharge the powers and duties of his office.”

Even the craven enabling Republicans would do well to read that provision, because the day may come when they're finally compelled to acknowledge — in the national interest — that Trump is dangerously off his rocker. We're only six days into this farce, and it's obvious already. As conservative commentator Andrew Ferguson rightly points out, “the candidate who campaigned as a sociopath shows signs he may yet govern as one.”

The latest reminder is Trump's alternative fact about the election. At the tail end of November, he said he was robbed of a popular vote victory because millions of people had “voted illegally” for Hillary. It was just another baldfaced lie. He had zero evidence of massive voter fraud, just as he'd had zero evidence that Obama was foreign-born. We figured — foolish us — that Trump, with his attention deficit disorder, would simply forget the lie and find a new one. Which he did.

But now he's obsessing about it again, marinating anew in his delusion. We should not be surprised. Sick and twisted people do stuff like this.

On Monday night, during a bipartisan meeting with congressional leaders, he stated that he lost the popular vote because three to five million people voted illegally. He offered no evidence of mass fraud, because there isn't any. Then during a press briefing, propaganda minister Sean Spicer recited Trump's alternative fact, and said it was “based on studies and evidence that people have presented to him.” The press asked: What studies? What evidence? Spicer replied: “Studies and information he has.”

What studies? What information? Trump is apparently still fixated on a November story that was posted on Infowars, a tinfoil-hat website, which declared in a headline: “3 million votes in presidential election cast by illegal aliens.” Problem is, the story had no evidence. Plus, the guy who runs Infowars has stated on the record that the Sandy Hook elementary school massacre never happened.

But Trump still won't let it go, taking to Twitter to announce, “I will be asking for a major investigation into VOTER FRAUD.”

Someone in the Justice Department should tell him that illegal voting on a massive scale is impossible to pull off without everyone noticing it on day one. Someone in Justice should remind him that when Jill Stein sought recounts shortly after the election, his own lawyers wrote: “All available evidence suggests that the 2016 general election was not tainted by fraud or mistake.” But he wouldn't listen, because he doesn't do irony.

A few Republicans have roused themselves to protest Trump's idiocy. Mike Huckabee, a big supporter, told Fox News Business Network, “I have no evidence whatsoever, and I don't know that anyone does, that there are that many illegal people who voted ... I'm not sure why he brought it up.”

Sen. Lindsey Graham had the most substantive rebuke. “I would urge the president to knock this off ... To continue to insist that the 2016 election was conducted in a fashion that millions of people voted illegally undermines faith in our democracy,” Graham said. “People are going to start doubting you as a person.”

But, all too predictably, most Republicans reacted as if jelly had replaced their spines. In their lust to enact their long-stymied agenda (throwing people off Obamacare, gutting the EPA, etc.), they're apparently prepared to indulge Trump's serial lies and delusions.

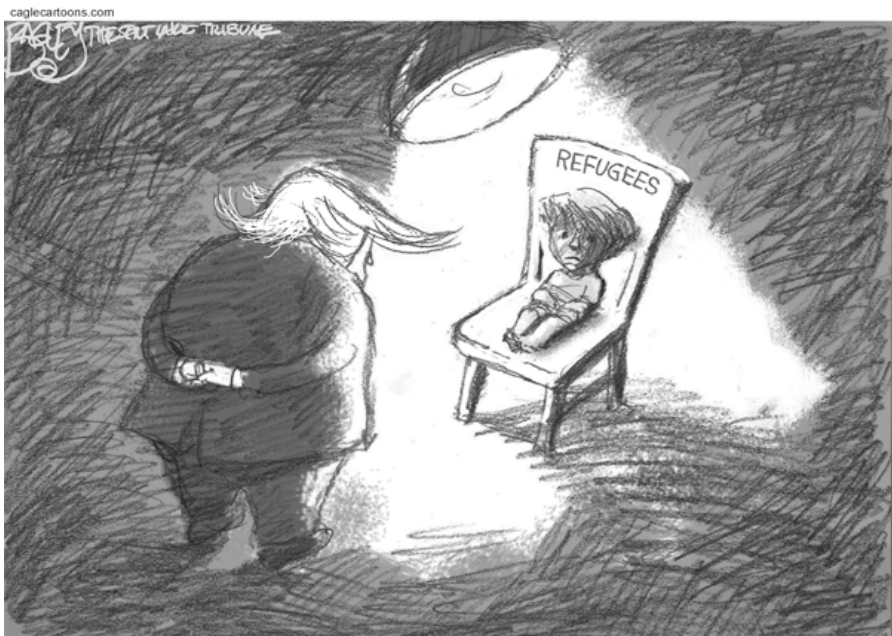
His temperament is already a burgeoning issue. The anecdotes are piling up. But what's most remarkable about a recent Washington Post story about Trump's first week in office is the ninth paragraph: “This account of Trump's tumultuous first days in office comes from interviews with nearly a dozen senior White House officials and other Trump advisers and confidants, some of whom spoke on the condition of anonymity to describe private conversations and moments.” In other words, Trump aides are already leaking like a sieve — to the free and independent press that Trump hates.

So the question is: How long will Republicans indulge him before they man up to do their duty? Will they sit silent until he rants us to the brink of a needless war that could get a lot of people killed? This week's “voter fraud” delusion is merely a toxic appetizer.

CLIMATE ALARMISTS WILL MISS CALIFORNIA'S DROUGHT

California's drought which the New York Times characterized as “unending” ended. This is good news for everyone other than Al Gore and his depressing band of climate Cassandras.

Well the rains came after all to California and it was the answer to prayer for many citizens. For others the rain was a splash in the face, so to speak. California's seven-year drought came in very handy for climate conspirators.
