## VIDEO RELEASED OF SUSPECT IN CHEESECAKE FACTORY EXPLOSION

Pasadena Police Detectives and the Federal Bureau of Investigation released video, Friday morning, of the man investigators say committed the Cheesecake Factory explosion in February.

The video and photos, shown at the press conference, depict the suspect wearing a white shirt, carrying black or dark clothing, which he discards in a trash can at Ralphs Grocery Store in the 300 block of West Colorado Blvd. The video was taken the same day as the explosion.



Pasadena Police and the FBI are asking for the public's help in identifying the suspect. "The FBI is offering a reward up to \$20,000," said Deirdre Fike, assistant director for the FBI. "For any information that leads to tips, information that identifies the individual or groups involved in this act."

According to Police Chief Phillip Sanchez, on Thursday, February 2, at about 6:08 p.m., Pasadena Police Officers and Fire Department personnel responded to a call of an explosion at a Cheesecake Factory restaurant at 2 West Colorado Blvd. Police Officers immediately entered the restaurant

and evacuated customers and employees and located a detonated homemade pyrotechnic device.

Sanchez said they were keeping information about how the device was made secret.

He did say, "we know the device was homemade, it was incendiary, we know he detonated it, the evidence was recovered and then look at for forensics evidence."

No customers or employees were seriously injured during the incident.

A tip line has been established to receive calls 24 hours, 7 days a week. The tip line number is 1-800-CALL FBI (1-800-225-5324).

Police and FBI remind the public not to detain or contact the suspect. This person should be considered dangerous. If seen, please contact local law enforcement promptly. Persons may also contact the Pasadena Police at (626) 744-4241.

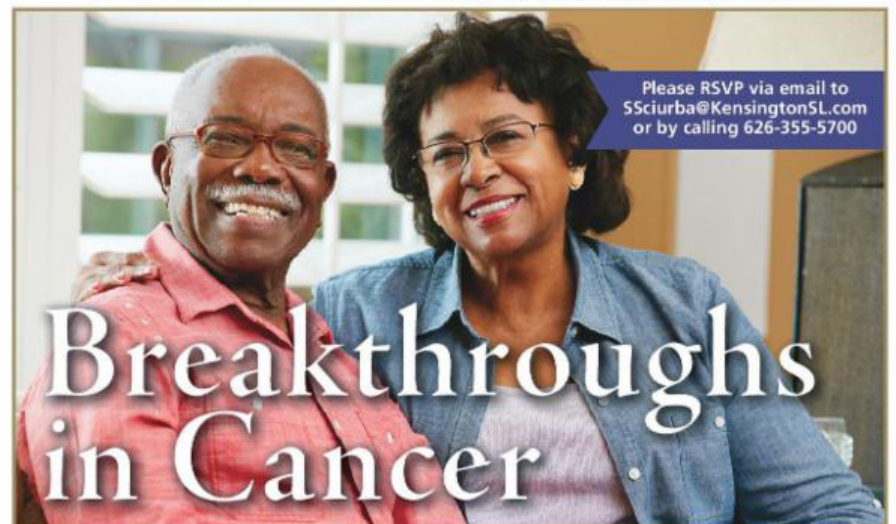

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## Walking Sierra Madre...The Social Side

Friends and neighbors, good news! We are going to have a new craft brewery here in Sierra Madre by late summer...just when we're going to need it most. Think of horrendously hot days, when you think you might melt, but relief is in sight. At the end of those days, you can stop in at 38 E. Montecito and enjoy a glass or two of RT Rogers beer. Oh, and what beer it is going to be! Ryan Rogers, the brewmaster of RT Rogers beer, has been brewing beer, working on his blends, tweaking, perfecting, tasting, sampling, tweaking again since he was 16 years old, fermenting grains in his closet and experimenting in the kitchen.

Meeting Ryan, his mom, Joanna and dad, Kelly, along with lifelong family friend Dave Bergman was splendid. Ryan and Dave were waist-deep in a trench there in Units 1 & 2 of the Montecito property, getting ready to install pipes for the new restrooms, which will be ADA compliant (yep, handicap friendly and big enough to turn around in) and, in short, gearing up for the arrival of the cement trucks to lay the new floors in what will be their tap room and brew area. RT Rogers is going to be the place to go as they are planning so many great things to do, in addition to producing amazing beer. There will be a walled garden with partial shade, pleasing the sun lovers and the shade seekers, right outside the glass doors of the main tap room where one can sit and enjoy a moment of peace or a game of Quoits – the traditional game which involves the throwing of metal, rope or rubber rings over a set distance to try to land over or near a spike – in case you didn't know. Inside there will be two standard dart boards and, for all the bicycle enthusiasts who make Sierra Madre their destination, a hanging bike rack on the outside wall. The Rogers family has thought of everything to make their guests feel at home.

Pasadena residents, the Rogers have been searching for the perfect place to realize son, Ryan's, dream of a craft brewery. Son, Jesse, who is the family artist-webmaster-social media guy, discovered Mother Moo's and brought his mom and dad up to check out the best ice cream anywhere, right here in town. They fell in love with Sierra Madre, which is only natural, and started thinking maybe this could be the place. Sierra Madre realtor, Bill Derrick, brought them to the vacant units on Montecito and the new home of RT Rogers Brewing Co. was established.

Kelly and Joanna are both retired from the Los Angeles Unified School District where he started as

a maintenance engineer and worked his way up to Complex Projects Manager, while Joanna was that woman no school can do without who ran the book store, got all the text books ordered and, in general, made it work for the teachers. Jesse, the Mother Moo fan, is an art teacher in the LAUSD and his wife, Deanna, is a speech pathologist. And Ryan is a brewing genius!

The Rogers family has become fast friends with another of the Sierra Madre treasures, Ramon Navarro, our local coffee roaster up in the canyon – Java Madre. They met at last year's Wistaria Festival.

I learned a lot about beer chatting with Kelly and Joanna and I'll pass a few facts along. Brewing is complicated! Ryan is planning to start with a 15 barrel system producing stouts and IPAs. Starting with an on-line course in brewing, Ryan has read everything there is to read on grains, hops and yeast. For instance, California IPAs are very heavily hopped, creating a brew which is higher in alcohol, not sweet, leaning toward a bitter taste. Hops lend aroma, a fruity or bitter taste and the amount of roasting the grains undergo create the tastes of chocolate or coffee. Let me go back to that brewing is complicated thing! There is no facet of brewing upon which Ryan is not a consummate expert. In short, best craft beer any of us has ever experienced is coming our way!

RT Rogers Brewing Company plans to open their doors at 4:00 on weekdays and earlier on weekends. Our public parking lot is right across the street. They won't be serving food as they are not licensed as a restaurant, but there will be peanuts and guests can bring in goodies or order in and there is talk about a future connection with a food truck. You can check out their website at [rtrbrew.com](http://rtrbrew.com) or come by and say hello. This will be such a nice addition to our town as we haven't had our own craft brewery for years since Sierra Madre Brewing left us and all the Rogers family are anxious to become involved in the community.

I'm close to the end of Rise of the Rocket Girls: The Women Who Propelled Us, From Missiles to the Moon to Mars, which is the One Book One City selection, and finding myself overwhelmed with awe for these young women, the computers at JPL who transformed rocket design. So many failures to achieve success. And, in case you haven't noticed, wistaria is blooming all over town now and looking just fantastic! We live in a beautiful place, don't we!

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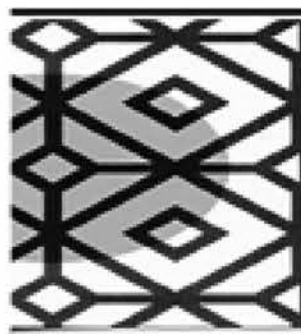

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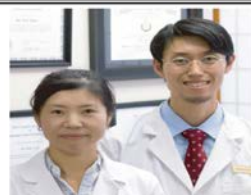

## COUNCIL OKAYS CITY ORDINANCE ON DRONE USE

The city council voted Monday night in favor of an ordinance that would regulate the operation of drones, above or near critical infrastructure, and over permitted special events.

“There is a concern that people are flying drones, that’s become obviously a popular thing, we have a lot of events in the city... we have our power stations and water reservoirs and we are concerned about people frying them recklessly, said Pasadena City Manager Steve Mermell,

The council directed City Attorney Michele Beal Bagneris to prepare the new ordinance and return it within 60 days.

Staff is recommending that the council consider limiting drone flights over permitted special events only to events where the

property owner and the event organizer have granted permission, and the event organizer has demonstrated compliance with FAA regulations and committed to collaborate its drone activities with the Police Department’s Air Operations Section.

Given the disruption drones have caused in other cities by crashing into power lines, a ban of drones in the airspace above or near critical infrastructure to protect public safety and general welfare. The list would include the Glenarm Power Plant, police and fire stations, City Hall, City Yards, water storage and electric transmission facilities, transit operations facility, and over light rail.

“We had an event in front of city hall and someone was flying [a drone] and they lost control,” Mermell said. “It hit the ground, pieces flew, and hit a child, so that’s not okay?”

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## Police Release Sketch of Double Homicide Suspect

*Witnesses provide further details on double homicide*

Pasadena Police issued an updated News Release Thursday, the includes a composite sketch of one suspects regarding the January 6, double homicide that occurred in the 100 Block of W. Claremont Street in Pasadena.

Police said witnesses have come forward since Monday and provided further information, resulting in the composite sketch (pictured right).

According to police, On January 6 at about 11:51 p.m., Pasadena Police Officers responded to a call of a shooting in the 100 Block of W. Claremont St. Officers arrived at the scene of a shooting and located an African-American male victim, age 24 lifeless, who was later identified as Pasadena resident Antione Sutphen. A second victim, who died from a gunshot wound, was later identified as Ormoni Duncan, an African-American male, age 24 and also a Pasadena resident. The suspects (described below) who shot and killed Victim Sutphen and Victim Duncan were seen driving off westbound on W. Claremont St. towards Sunset Ave. and out of view.

Since the initial investigation Pasadena Police detectives have been working diligently, following up on information provided by witnesses. Although the motive remains unconfirmed, all information and investigative leads suggests a feud between a local Pasadena gang and a



gang from the Duarte area which erupted a few months prior to the murders.

The murder suspects have been described as:

A Male Black, dark complexion, approximately 20 to 25 years old, 6’0” to 6’2” tall, and 210 to 220 lbs.

A Male Black, dark complexion, approximately 25 to 30 years old, 5’10” to 6’0” tall, and 240 to 250 lbs.

A Male Black, medium complexion, approximately 25 to 30 years old, 5’9” to 5’11” tall, and 210 to 220 lbs.

A Male Black, light complexion, approximately 25 to 30 years old, 5’11” to 6’01” tall, and 180 to 190 lbs.

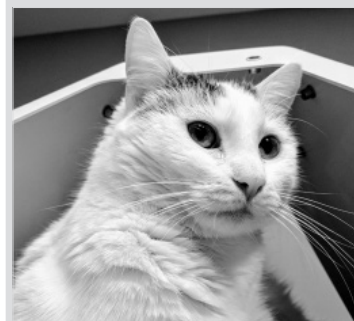

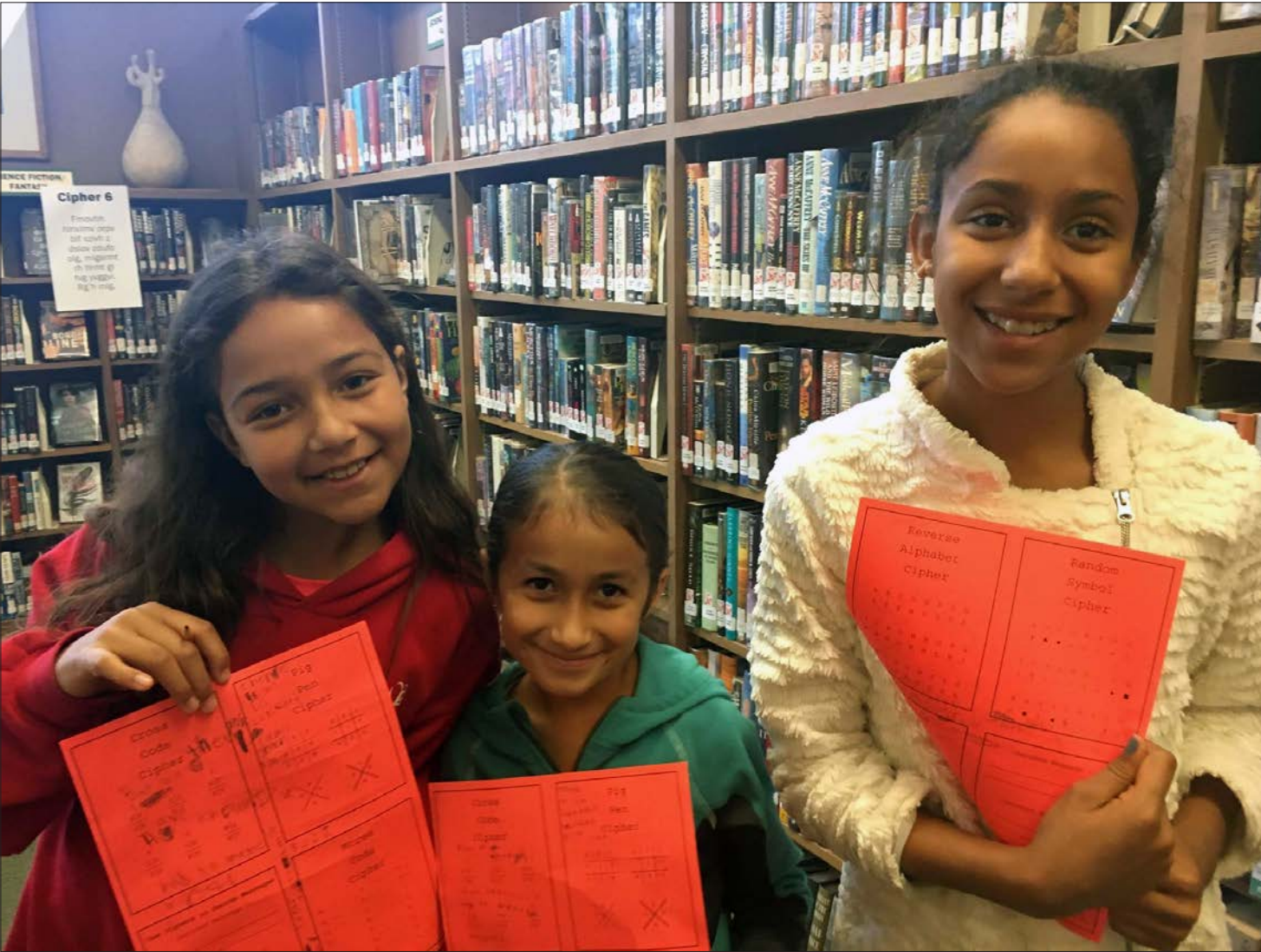

This week I decided to focus on the good things humans have done to help protect animals and enhance their quality of life. So many positive changes have come about through compassionate legislation, volunteerism, philanthropy and individual self-sacrifice - all on the part of the human and all on behalf of the animals. There is much more to be done to ensure that all animals, both wild and domestic are given a fair shake in life, but we've come a long way so let's celebrate our success!

Here are a few examples of the positive changes that have come about for the animals over the past several decades. It's a short list, but it shows our country is taking a more positive approach to our relationship with animals.

In 1966, The Animal Welfare Act was signed into law, making it the first in the United States that regulates the treatment of animals in research, exhibition, transport, and by dealers. Other laws, policies and guidelines before or after may include additional species coverage or specifications for animal care, but today all refer back to the Animal Welfare Act as the minimum acceptable standard.

In May of 2006, Ohlone Dog Park in Berkeley, CA became the first known of it's kind in the world. Since then, dog parks have been popping up by the hundreds in numerous cities within the US, and throughout the globe. This proves that all those millions of dog owners care enough about their pets to want the very best for them. Off-leash play in a social setting (for well-socialized dogs) is a kind way to show you love your canine. If you haven't visited our own dog park here in Sierra Madre, you should. It's located behind the pool, next to the tennis courts in Recreation Park. There are also a few other dog parks in neighboring towns with fenced areas designated for small and large dogs to play off leash. Use common sense and go by the rules to ensure a positive experience.

In February, 2012 LA County agreed to allow dogs to accompany their humans for dinner on restaurant patios. Now your four-legged friend can really be a part of the family, by joining you for an evening outing rather than waiting at home anxiously until you arrive. With LA county being the forerunner and followed example, this law carried over to several other counties in California as well. It was amended later to prevent restaurant owners from being cited by the Health Dept., opening even more doors to four-footers.

In October of 2012, The LA City Council voted 12-2 in favor of a law that would require pet stores to sell only rescued animals. In addition to

reducing euthanizations, the law seeks to put an end to puppy and kitten mills that breed animals in poor conditions and ship them to pet stores for profit.

Pet ownership in the United States, Great Britain and Australia is on the rise! According to a recent census, the number of dog owners in these three countries has grown by several millions from the 1990's to the 2000's and the number of dogs per household has increased as well. We humans are obviously becoming much more willing to forego another toy or trinket, in order to love and care for someone besides ourselves! Pets are great teachers.

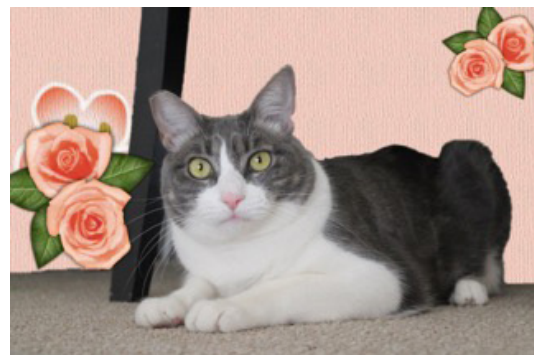
Countless animal rescue organizations have formed over the past few decades. The Humane Society is a prime example of kind humans helping animals in need. Their efforts have reduced the number of euthanized pets to a proportionate fraction of what it used to be and numerous other organizations have followed their lead by placing rescued animals and advocating spay and neuter practices to all pet owners.

Which brings me to another positive praise for the human's love toward animals. Many licensed veterinarians in the US now offer affordable spay and neuter services to those who are financially strapped. Several non-profits network with veterinarians who share their desire to stop excessive breeding, and are willing to provide such services at their own cost. Do the research to find the right vet for your pet, and discuss your financial status frankly & honestly. You may be surprised at how helpful your vet will be when you tell them your desire is to prevent unintentional pet pregnancy.

Last but certainly not least, there is a growing trend in our society to adopt and not shop. This not-so-new concept got started by avid animal rights advocates, and has been made more popular in recent years by celebrities who promote the philosophy. Now it seems just about every animal lover is on the band wagon. Now adopting is not only a win-win for the animal and its owner, it is also a cool trend that has caught on like wildfire.

Again, this list is limited to only a few of the many great things that are happening in our society, on behalf of the animals. More than ever before, we humans are realizing how precious our beloved pets are. They are genuinely grateful for the care they receive.

Pets love unconditionally, and for some people a pet may be the only source of unconditional love they have in their life. Kudos those who recognize the value of animals and selflessly help pave the way to a better life for them. May we all try to focus more on the good things happening to make a change for the better. ## PASADENA AREA WOMEN'S SCHOLARSHIP AVAILABLE

## THE PERFECT TAILGATING WINE

My search for California Cabernet wines in the \$10 range continues. It seems like a reasonable request, considering that there are hundreds of wineries in California. They say that life is a cabaret; I'd like to add cabernet to the mix. The 2012 Toasted Head is from the Yolo region(great area for Tomatoes), which covers Mendocino to Sonoma and Napa, and this is where R.H. Philips Vineyards calls home. The area has a relatively mild climate with predictable heating and cooling. The 2012 season in Mendocino County turn out to be a very good year - so good that Toasted Head didn't have to source too many of its grapes. I found the taste to be soft, even pleasant, with likeable tannins and hint of spice, and appreciated the cedary notes from the oak aging. The rich fruit and the bear on the label might detour some, but for \$10 it's a winner, and if you're a fan of old world reds, you'll like this red. Feel free to put it in a brown paper bag when going to a tasting party - I promise that your friends will enjoy it. No matter the cost of wine if you like it, enjoy it and share with friends. This cab is ready to drink now. It's a perfect BBQ wine. Roast up some sweet peppers or BBQ shrimp, or take it to a drive in movie. Yum !!!

When someone uses the term "old world" with regard to wine, they are referring to wines made in countries that are considered the birthplaces of wine, basically Europe and the Middle East. It's usually a bit lower in alcohol content, in this case at 13.5%

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## ESCORT SERVICES THAT CAN HELP SENIORS WITH THE RIGORS OF TRAVEL

*Dear Savvy Senior,*  
Do you know of any services that help seniors with the rigors of traveling? My youngest daughter is getting married in a few months and would love to have my 82-year old mother attend, but she needs help flying across the country.

Searching Daughter

Dear Searching,

Traveling can be daunting under the best circumstances but for elderly seniors, those with disabilities, or those recovering or rehabilitating from an illness or injury, it can seem particularly overwhelming or unmanageable.

Fortunately, there are a number of companies that provides traveling companion/escort services to help older adults with the rigors of travel.

Whether it's seniors going on vacation or grandparents wanting to join their far-off families for weddings and graduations, travel companions help clients who need help moving through airports, managing luggage, navigating busy terminals and hotel lobbies and much more.

Some companion services even provide personal care like medication reminders, dressing, bathing and feeding. And for those with specific medical needs, traveling nurse services are available too.

But be aware that these services aren't cheap. You will pay for the travel companion's tickets, the companion's hotel room if necessary, meals, incidentals and fees for the service. The price to accompany a client on a plane trip within the United States – including the companion fees and travel costs for all parties – can range anywhere from \$1,500 to \$5,000 or more for coach airfare. Business or first class would cost more.

To locate a travel companion service in your area, search online for "senior travel companion" or "senior travel escort," followed by your mom's city or state. Or use an experienced national service like Flying Companions (FlyingCompanions.com) or FirstLight Home Care (FirstLightHomeCare.com), which has a national network of franchises that provides in-home care for seniors, and offers travel companion programs in about one-third of its 130



franchises.

Or, for medical travel companions do a search for "traveling nurse escort" or "medical travel companion," or checkout Travel Care & Logistics (YourFlightNurse.com), which provides registered nurses as escorts.

If, however, your mom doesn't require a lot of assistance, or if you can't afford a travel escort, consider asking a trusted family member or friend that has some air travel experience.

Questions to Ask

If you're interested in hiring a travel companion service to help your mom, there are a number of things you need to check into to ensure you get the right escort.

First, if your mom requires personal or medical care while traveling, find out if the escort is trained to manage her healthcare needs. What sort of medical certifications do they have? (Nursing credentials? C.P.R. training? etc.)

Also, find out how many trips the companion has taken with clients. Have they completed trips with travelers like your mom? How long has the travel service company been in business? What is the company's safety record? And what sort of insurance does it carry, and what and who does it cover?

Also, get a quote breaking down exactly what you'll be required to pay, in addition to the companion's fees. And, get a list of two or three clients/references who has used their service and call them.

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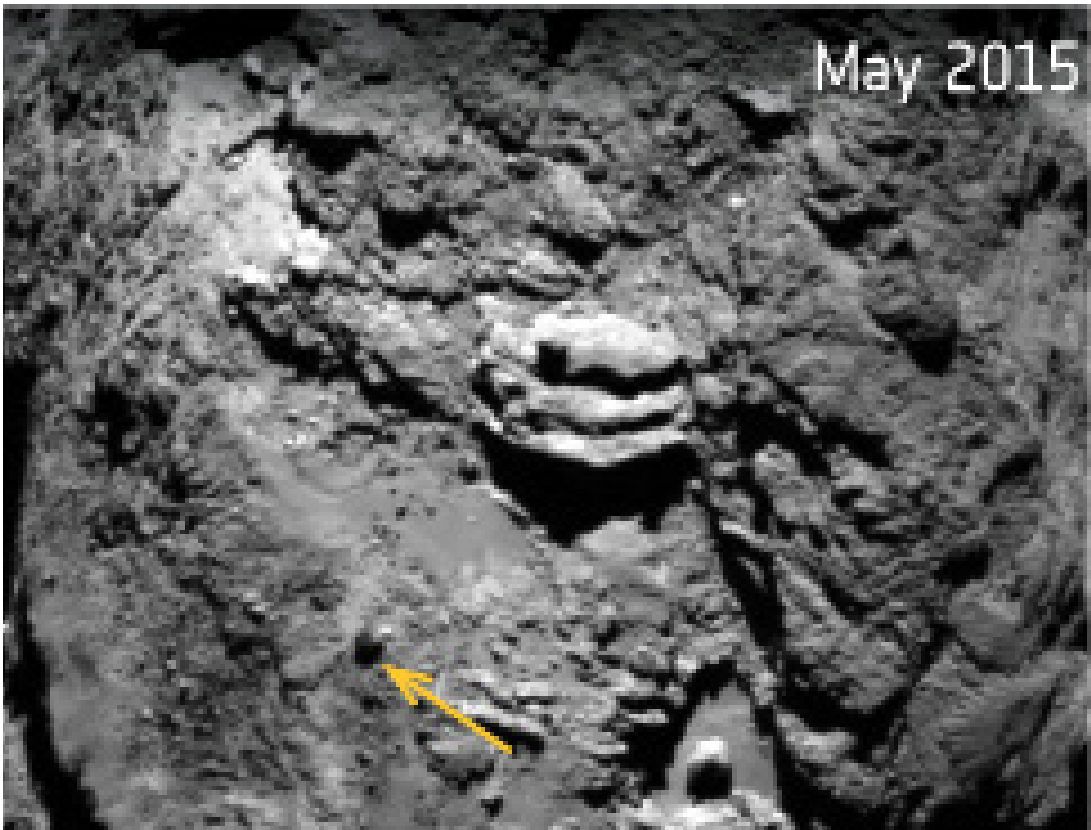
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THE MANY FACES OF ROSETTA'S COMET 67P



Images returned from the European Space Agency's Rosetta mission indicate that during its most recent trip through the inner solar system, the surface of comet 67P/Churyumov-Gerasimenko was a very active place—full of growing fractures, collapsing cliffs and massive rolling boulders. Moving material buried some features on the comet's surface while exhuming others.

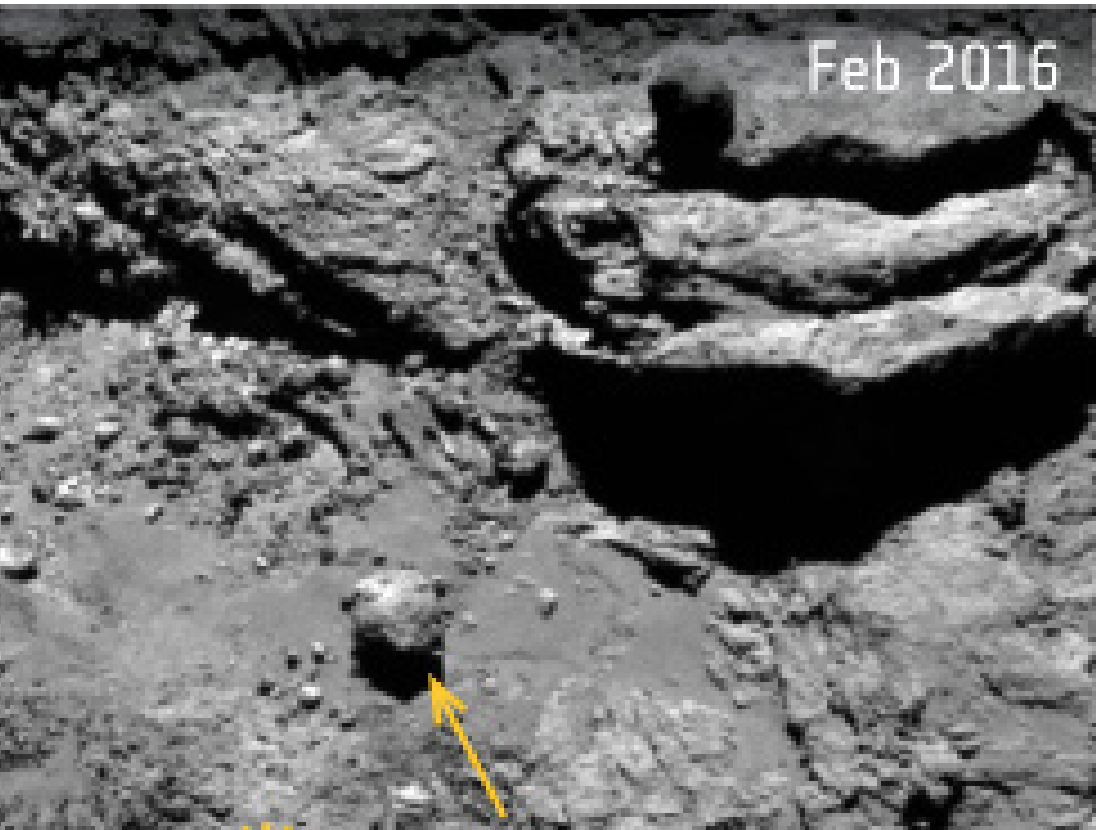
"As comets approach the Sun, they go into overdrive and exhibit spectacular changes on their surface," said Ramy El-Maarry, study leader and a member of the U.S. Rosetta science team from the University of Colorado, Boulder. "This is something we were not able to really appreciate before the Rosetta mission, which gave us the chance to look at a comet in ultra-high resolution for more than two years."

Most comets orbit our Sun in highly elliptical orbits that cause them to spend most of their time in

the extremely cold outer solar system. When a comet approaches the inner solar system, the Sun begins to warm the ice on and near the comet's surface. When the ice warms enough it can rapidly sublime (turn directly from the solid to the vapor state). This sublimation process can occur with variable degrees of intensity and time-scales and cause the surface to change rapidly. Between August 2014 and September 2016, Rosetta orbited comet 67P during the comet's swing through the inner-solar system.

"We saw a massive cliff collapse and a large crack in the neck of the comet get bigger and bigger," said El-Maarry. "And we discovered that boulders the size of a large truck could be moved across the comet's surface a distance as long as one-and-a-half football fields."

In the case of the boulder, Rosetta's cameras observed a 282-million-pound, 100-foot-wide space



rock to have moved 150 yards from its original position on the comet's nucleus. The massive space rock probably moved as a result of several outburst events that were detected close to its original position.

The warming of 67P also caused the comet's rotation rate to speed up. The comet's increasing spin rate in the lead-up to perihelion is thought to be responsible for a 1,600-foot-long fracture spotted in August 2014 that runs through the comet's neck. The fracture, which originally extended a bit longer than the Empire State Building is high, was found to have increased in width by about 100 feet by December 2014. Furthermore, in images taken in June 2016, a new 500- to 1,000-foot-long fracture was identified parallel to the original fracture.

"The large crack was in the 'neck' of the comet—a small central part that connects the two lobes," said El-Maarry. "The crack was extending—indicating

that the comet may split up one day."

"Understanding how comets change and evolve with time gives us important insights into the types and abundance of ices in comets, and how long comets can stay in the inner solar system before losing all their ice and becoming balls of dust," said El-Maarry. "This helps us better understand the conditions of the early solar system, and possibly even how life started."

Comets are time capsules containing primitive material left over from the epoch when the Sun and its planets formed. Rosetta was the first spacecraft to witness at close proximity how a comet changes as it is subjected to the increasing intensity of the Sun's radiation.

FINDING SANITY IN AN INSANE WORLD

This morning I ran up to the mountain with energetic vitality. Through city streets I ran, garbed in only my running shorts and shoes, intent on reaching the mountain. It was still early when I arrived at the base of the mountain. I walked into the large field of dry grass that filled the gap between the canyon to the east and the eroding ridgeline to the west. The mountains were calm; large clouds like wads of cotton rolled lazily over the mountain, merging with the gray foggy bleakness of the morning.

The smell of pine and sage was strong as I filled my pulsating chest with the sweet aroma. I was still trying now to "catch" my breath after my last sprint to the top. Insects buzzed about, attracted to my sweat. I heard and saw small animals scurrying about, either pursuing or being pursued. A few occasional birds graced the morning with their short but attractive poetic song.

I looked to get the feel of the mountain, the field, the day. I stretched my arms in front of me and opened my palms to the mountain. I recalled something I read in a book called Thinking and Destiny: Speaking of a past age on this earth, the author wrote, "At the height of the fire age, the foremost among the fire people needed only their bodies to accomplish what they wished. Four fingers were used: the index finger for fire, the middle finger for air, the third finger for water, and the little finger for earth. With the fingers of the left hand they sensed; and with those of the right hand they directed a stream of the units of the elements....The thumbs were used either to feel, or to direct, unify, or accentuate the streams." I was less ambitious; I just wanted to feel, to communicate without words. I let the energy flow through my arms and out my palms and into the essence of my surroundings. That's how you talk to a mountain -- unspoken communication through strong feeling.

I sat under a tree and the mushrooms who lived there demanded that I say "hello." I sat there for a moment thinking, exploring, and resting before I would run back into the city. People passed by on the trail, some examining plants, and others more taken up by inner examinations. I wondered: why the great exodus from our centers of civilization to a mountain, a lake, an ocean, a river? I followed this thought. Many are prisoners of their own thinking and live their lives in silent desperation, floating like a leaf in the wind of society's praise, denial, approval, and scorn. But the steps you must take to be educated, to earn a living, to improve yourself, and to strengthen yourself need not necessarily be the steps of others that you blindly and unquestionably follow. And all too often society's "leaders" have no idea themselves where they are "taking us." Sometimes you must follow your own voice, albeit the path is harder and you are a pioneer upon it.

I continued to sit, considering this thought, and its ramifications. The early morning breeze rustled the pine and a few needles danced upon my head.

A ray of light shone through the clouds, and a lone gliding bird disappeared in distant trees. I thought of my work, my battle with the counterfeit so I don't become another corpse along the roadside. I was up, and I ran back down to the city. Pain is the next frontier.

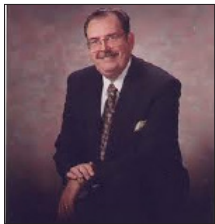
Later in the day, I went grocery shopping. I strapped my panniers onto my bicycle and rode in a logical direction. First, I filled an ice cream bag with edible fairy ring mushrooms (Marasmius oreades) that I gathered from several of the local lawns. One lady assured me that I could have all the "toadstools" and dandelions from her yard that I wanted. She reminisced about many years ago when she was visiting a friend in Europe. They picked wild fresh mushrooms every night for supper, and she remembered how delicious they had been. She stood over me as I carefully picked the best mushrooms in the circles on her lawn, apparently amused by my activity. Then I pulled out my digging tool and I filled another bag with dandelion roots that I later cleaned, dried, roasted, and ground for dandelion coffee.

As the sun was getting low, I visited a friend in Altadena who let me pick prickly pears and saguaro cactus fruit from his yard. This was the first time I'd eaten the saguaro fruit with its whitish flesh and seedy insides. They were excellent! My packs were now bulging.

Riding back to my abode now, I observed many natal plum bushes with most of their fruit rotting on the bush. I passed many carob trees whose unused fruit was being raked into the gutter by a disgruntled resident. I could only shake my head, though I had no words to utter. Memories flooded my mind as I rode my bicycle into the red setting sun. I recalled the many times I obtained boxes of slightly inferior but perfectly edible produce from the bins behind the markets. I recalled the time my friend Drew and I ate lunch out of a local school's trash bin. It was full of throw-away lunches -- peanut butter sandwiches, tuna and baloney sandwiches, oranges, tangerines, bananas, potato chips and apples. Drew and I had just finished conducting a wild food outing in the hills above Monrovia, and then we found ourselves city-foraging as well. It seems that some trash cans around town are goldmines.

I swerved to avoid a turning driver who didn't see me. It was getting dark now. As I entered home stretch, I wondered why the incredible, fantastic wealth of this country continues to be wasted and taken for granted. Why must it be flushed down the toilet, tossed in the trash, or carelessly abandoned?

The solutions to ALL the Earth's problems are extant today, but we foolishly believe that we can do nothing, that we must wait for a leader, a bureaucrat, a savior. Individually, we must do all we can to awaken our nervous systems from our own slumber, and to discipline our minds to see the biggest possible picture. We must bravely take our personal individual action. I recall the words of Robert Rodale: "If enough people start living sanely, they may gain the courage and the desire to try to create a world that is itself sane." Good advice!

A SUSPICIOUS MIND IS A TERRIBLE THING TO WASTE

I have discovered over the years several types of minds. The "open mind" which catches everything except the truth. The "analytical mind" which organizes everything to the point of sterility. The "closed mind" which you can bounce ideas and they never stick.

### FINANCIAL TRANSPARENCY & ACCOUNTABILITY BILL PASSES FIRST LEGISLATIVE HURDLE

Sacramento, CA – Today, Senator Anthony J. Portantino (D – La Cañada Flintridge) presented SB 24 to the Senate Elections Committee. The Bill amends the Economic Interest Disclosures in the Political Reform Act of 1974. SB 24 passed the Senate Elections and Constitutional Amendments Committee with a unanimous vote.

The bill amends economic interest disclosures by adjusting the dollar amounts for investments, interests in real property, and income. Public officials are required to disclose this information when filing their yearly Statement of Economic Interest (SEI). Specifically, the bill expands the reporting thresholds elected officials need to disclose.

“Due to inflation and economic changes, the current dollar thresholds are not adequately serving the purpose for which the Political Reform Act of 1974 was established. It is imperative that

elected officials provide the public with the proper financial transparency and accountability they deserve,” stated Portantino.

SB 24 is scheduled to be heard next in the Senate Appropriations Committee. It is supported by good government watchdogs including Common Cause and the California Newspaper Publishers Association.

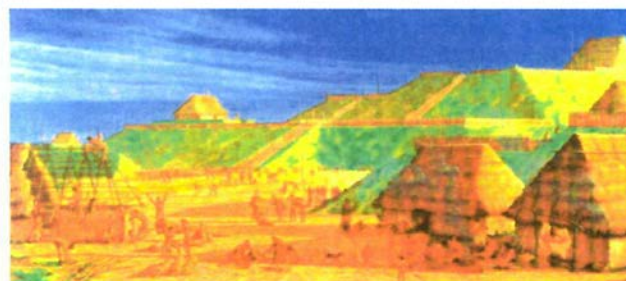

### Medieval America

### THE MARCH TOWN COUNCIL MEETING AT PAMELA PARK: CERTS PRESENTATION, LASD, CHP UPDATES AND MUCH MORE

At the meeting, LA County Sheriff's Captain Jacob announced she will be promoted to Commander and leaving Temple Station. She had praise for the Town Council and their continued work with the community and LASD to improve quality of life in their areas. She revealed Dave Flores will be promoted to Captain and be assigned as Commander of Temple Station. Lt. Flores had been assigned to Temple Station twice before and was one of our original area deputies who worked hard to improve the area.

This is a really fun show about four women in a singing girl-group – we meet them first in 1958 at their high school graduation and then again ten years later at their reunion. The show is filled with more than 30 of the biggest hits of those years – from “Secret Love,” “You Don’t Own Me,” and “Wedding Bell Blues” to “Stupid Cupid,” “Hold Me, Thrill Me,” and “Rescue Me.” This should be a great summertime show. We are bringing back the team who created such a hit with “Always...Patsy Cline” – director/choreographer Robert Marra and music director Sean Paxton.

I do hope you will see both shows. Bring kids with you to see “Wrinkle” they will love it and so will you. And “Belle” is a treat for those of you who love Emily Dickinson, poetry, or bravura acting.

EMBRACE THE SPRING SEASON WITH THESE HIDDEN GEMS

The Districts – “Ordinary Day” – Philadelphia indie rock quartet, The Districts, develop a profounder approach on their latest single, “Ordinary Day.” With a soft open before throwing out a few jabs of its own, the track showcases a different tactic for the critically acclaimed rock act. In 2015 they released their second record, “A Flourish And A Spoil” to strong reviews. With Ordinary Day, the band demonstrates piercing guitars and sharp vocals. Even with laconic lyrics, the hazy induced track is a daydream with its entrancing melody. The band is gearing up to release their third LP sometime this year and this single is a strong indication to what could be the band’s most celebrated outing to date.

Future Islands – Ran – Future Islands could very well be the best indie rock act in today’s music. With their successful fourth studio album, “Singles” in 2014, it provided the band with a way of breaking out of being relatively unknowns to headliners and becoming the highlight at music festivals all over the world. The new single is the stimulating, “Ran.” It’s the first glimpse into the band’s forthcoming record, “The Far Field” due out April 8th. With the mixture of deep, contemplative lyrics and dark synth tones, the single will take a strong hold on you. Lead singer Samuel Herring’s vocals have always been the band’s greatest instrument and it’s still in tact with this one. Future Islands have consistently marched down their own path and because of that, have found much breakthrough success. You can call them seasoned veterans, but this feels like the start of something new yet beautifully familiar from the Baltimore, Maryland synth-rock-pop act.

The Drums – Blood Under My Belt – The Drums are back in their true form with “Blood Under My Belt.” It’s the first taste of “Abyssal Thoughts”, due out June 16 as the Drums’ first record for Anti-. The jangly guitars, Jonny Pierce’s 80s style vocals, and brisk synths are all here and it’s a good feeling. Hopefully, The Drums can rebound off their dismal third LP, “Encyclopedia” which took them to darker places that didn’t work for them as they abandoned their beachy/surf rock roots. In fact, after that album, one part of the duo, guitarist Jacob Graham departed from the band. From the looks of it, it’s a one-man show now for Pierce. Maybe, just maybe, he can start making the music he was always meant to create. “Blood Under My Belt” is a terrific start to say the very least.

Beach Fossils – “This Year” – Here’s another band making a return after an absence of nearly four years. Beach Fossils have two records under their belt, 2010’s self-titled lo-fi, breezy, minimalistic indie debut and 2013’s more aggressive-punk rock inspired, “Clash The Truth.” Now that they’re older (and assuming wiser), their new single, “This Year” is a dreamy, pop endeavor of yesteryear. It’s more mellow and heartfelt than the band has ever crafted before. Frontman Dustin Payseur’s, the only original member of the band, has shown a greater maturity on this latest single that expands the band’s sonic palette in many improved ways. Payseur says “it’s about facing mistakes you’ve made, aiming to work on it and better yourself, but ending up making the same mistakes again. It’s kind of an endless loop. People always aim to make New Year’s resolutions, get a fresh start, but ultimately fall back into these old bad habits.” Whatever the case may be, “This Year” is ultimately Beach Fossils at their finest and 2017 just got a little better with their forthcoming record, “Summersault” due out in June.

## SHARPENING HEALTH CARE? CONSIDER THE PENCIL

To understand the primary problem with the American health-care system - cost and massive inefficiency are two major causes - it's helpful to revisit a 1958 essay, "I, Pencil," by Leonard Read. A pencil appears to be a very simple, inexpensive tool. Read, however, explains that its production is incredibly complex. The standard pencil begins when a cedar tree is cut down. Ropes and gear tug it onto the bed of a truck or a rail car.

But lots of people and skills are needed to mine ore and refine steel to produce the saws, axes and motors that fell that cedar tree.

Lots of people are needed to grow hemp, then transform it, through various stages, into the strong rope that pulls the tree onto a truck.

The logs are shipped to a mill and cut into slats. The slats are kiln-dried, tinted, waxed, then kiln-dried again.

How many skills were needed to produce the tint and the kilns, Read wondered. What about the electric power? What about the belts, motors and other parts at the mill?

The cedar slats are shipped to a factory. A complex machine cuts a groove into each. A second lays the lead into every other slat's groove. Glue is applied. Two slats are sealed together as one, then cut into lengths that form pencils.

The lead alone is incredibly complex. To produce it, graphite is mined in Ceylon. The graphite is packed and shipped, then mixed with clay from Mississippi. It is treated with a wetting agent - such as sulfonated tallow, which is formed when animal fats chemically react with sulfuric acid.

The pencil receives six coats of lacquer. Lacquer has numerous ingredients, including castor oil. Think of all the chemists needed to create the lacquer - and all the castor-bean growers needed to produce the oil that's refined and shipped.

The brass end that holds the eraser in place is a marvel. Miners need to first extract zinc and copper from the Earth. Experts transform those materials into sheet brass, which is then cut, stamped and affixed to the pencil.

The eraser is made from "factice," writes Read, a rubber-like product that is produced when rapeseed oil from the Dutch East Indies reacts with sulfur chloride.

An awe-inspiring amount of work goes into producing a pencil. Millions of people collaborate to produce it - millions ply their unique trades and skills - yet they have no idea they are collaborating.

The pencil, explains Read, is a triumph of human freedom - a triumph of creative human energies spontaneously responding to human necessity and desire.

Its efficient production is the polar opposite of the American health-care system.

Now that the government plays such a heavy role in health care - ObamaCare requires that each insurance policy cover 10 essential health benefits - it dictates what private insurers can and cannot do. Massive rules and regulations inhibit competition, which is the mother's milk of efficiency and cost savings.

Our health-care system's third-party payment system - private insurers or the government fund almost all health-care activities - detach consumers from the cost of the care they consume. Since consumers do not pay directly for most health-care services, few know or care what those services cost.

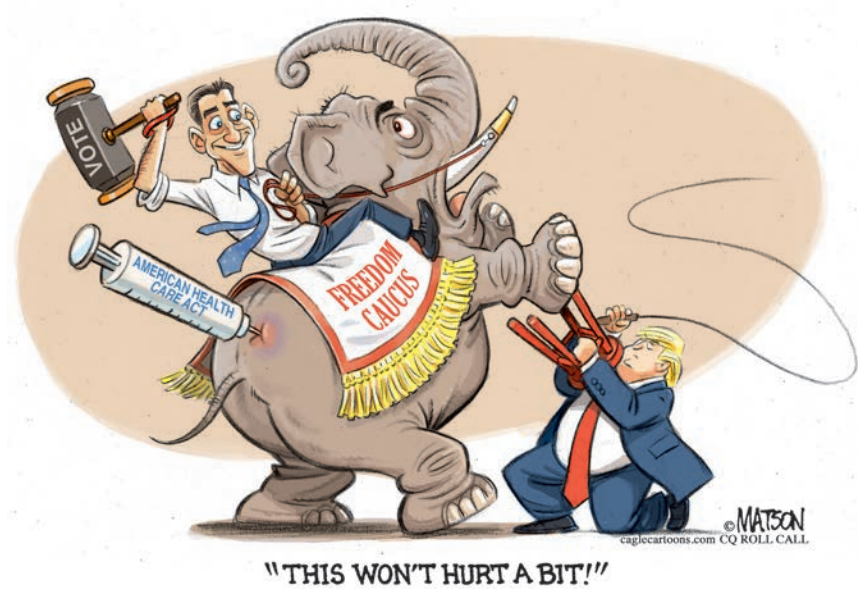
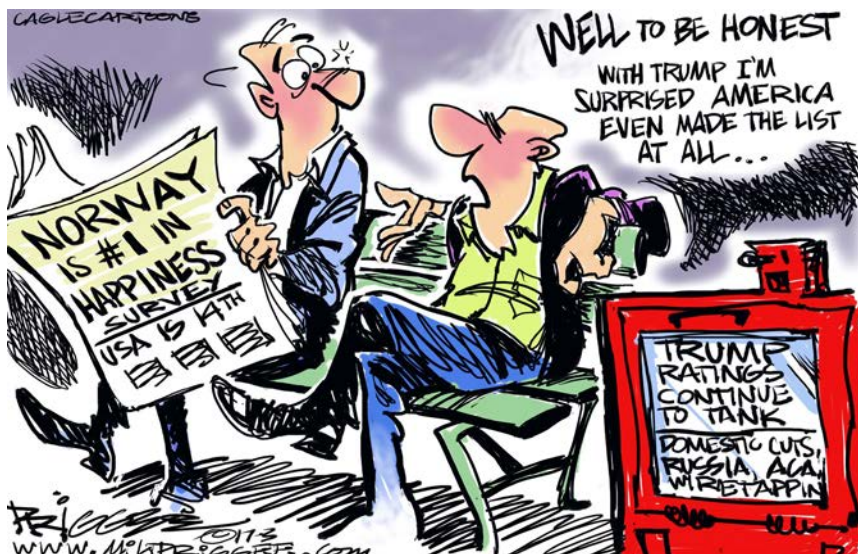
Read concludes his essay with this advice: The best thing our government can do is leave our "creative energies uninhibited" - remove the obstacles that prevent human creativity and innovation from flowing freely.

By removing such obstacles from our health-care system - by infusing free-market reforms - we could dramatically impact the cost and inefficiency problems and free up funds to provide care for the needy.

But any attempt to introduce free-market principles is met with cries that politicians are trying to hurt the sick and the poor. Thus, solving the health-care mess is not going to be easy.

I'm just thankful that our government hasn't mandated "free" pencils for all. Pencils would cost a fortune.

## TRUMP'S TEAM MASKS THE ISSUES

The word of the day for Republicans is "unmask."

You heard it incessantly at the House Intelligence Committee hearings on Monday, and later on cable news. That single word is the Trump supporters' answer to explosive news

from FBI Director James Comey that the agency has been investigating possible collusion between Russia and Trump's presidential campaign.

Yet, among Republicans and Democrats questioning Comey, you would have thought you were hearing two separate hearings. Democrats focused on the epic charges of alleged election tampering, while Republicans spoke almost exclusively of unmasking.

The unmasker in this case is Michael Flynn, who briefly held the post of National Security Advisor under Trump until he was fired for lying about having conversations with the Russian ambassador. Flynn's activities were uncovered by FBI surveillance and then made public in leaks to news media.

By Monday night, Trump aide Kellyanne Conway summarized the day's hearings this way on Fox News: "The unmasking of an American citizen through intelligence leaks should concern everyone. We learned about that today."

Period. No mention by Conway of collusion with the Russians. And no mention of the day's other headline: that there is no information to support Trump's wild accusation that Trump Tower was wiretapped by President Obama.

Over on CNN, left-leaning pundits insisted there was so much "smoke" in Trump's dealings with Russia that there must be "fire." But the Trump apologists on the panel only wanted to talk about the horrors of unmasking.

Trump has crafted a parallel universe for his followers. When bad news comes along—as it seems to with increasing frequency - Trump fires off wild tweets. Accusations in the tweets, no matter how farfetched, must, of course, be investigated. The investigation, naturally, is given equal weight with more serious matters - at least in the minds of Trump supporters.

And then, through artful marketing, a single word is invoked to grab the public's attention. Unmasking!

Ironically, whoever leaked Flynn's name is arguably a national hero. The Trump administration took no action to fire him, despite the president's full awareness of his activities, until leaks made it impossible for Flynn to stay.

But on Capitol Hill we were reminded repeatedly by Republicans, led by Rep. Trey Gowdy, that such leaking is "a felony, punishable by up to 10 years in prison."

Meanwhile, Trump himself has already employed his favorite words, "fake news," to dismiss the FBI's investigation into his ties with Russia, even before the probe is completed.

Trump and his staff have yet to prove they know much about governing. But they are forces to be reckoned with in the increasingly important war of words.

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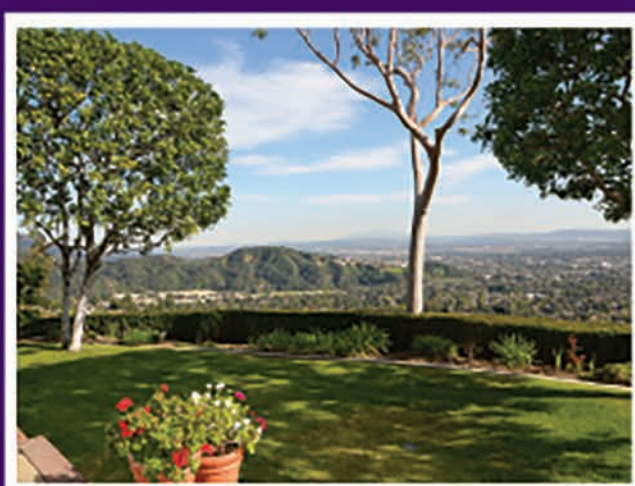
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
