An Easter Message
From Bethany Christian
Church:

DOUBTING THOMAS NO MORE (John 20:24-29)

This Sunday, we celebrate the resurrection of Jesus! Our hearts sing for joy! We rejoice because Jesus has defeated all the enemies threatening our peace: sickness, sin, doubt, failure-you name it. We celebrate because the grave is empty, our debt has been paid in full and our life stories have been rewritten!

Jesus has a scandalous love affair with broken people and this Sunday, as we celebrate, we will see how one man's life story was changed from doubt to shout! Thomas is known to most of us as doubting Thomas. He was that disciple of Jesus who when presented with the news of Jesus' resurrection shot back: "Unless I see in his hands the marks of the nails and place my finger in the mark of the nails and place my hands into his side, I will never believe!" We like to pile on Thomas but he is much like us. We all have doubts; I certainly have had my share of doubts. But Jesus, in his love for us never let's us escape-he goes after us like the hound of heaven! Eight days after, (John 20:24-29) Thomas is finally with the other disciples, locked up behind closed doors. Jesus shows up before them and directly addressed Thomas. I love this about Jesus. He goes right to him: here it is Thomas, what you've asked for! "Reach here and touch the scares!" (V.26)

Thomas loses it! "My Lord and my God!" He shouts, as he falls to his knees! Thomas had his doubts settled that day. He saw alive, a man whose lifeless body was taken down from a cross and buried just a few days earlier. His life story was changed. That's what Jesus does; he changes us, transforms us and then releases us into abundant life! There is no question Jesus cannot answer. If you have questions bring them, Jesus takes it from there.

Thomas shows us that doubt can serve to confirm our faith, if we go to Jesus with them. Remember that Jesus is God for Broken People. He sees past our brokenness to our need. Let's trust him to meet our need this Easter!

Will you join us this Sunday as we revel in a risen Lord, who knows us and loves us and keeps after us until we see like Thomas saw that Jesus never quits believing in us?

JAY WHITCRAFT IS SIERRA MADRE'S OLDER AMERICAN OF THE YEAR

The Sierra Madre Senior Community Commission announced this week that Sierra Madre resident Jay Whitcraft has been chosen as the city's 2017 Older American. His selection was based on his years of dedicated volunteerism not only to the City of Sierra Madre, but throughout LA County.

Jay has a true passion for volunteering and living life to the fullest. Chances are you have seen him around town working on his many projects. You might also see Jay in his cycling attire tooling through town. You may also have seen him at Beantown working on a Oral History Project, or at a Sierra Madre Historical Preservation Society meeting or at a Library Trustees meeting. Wherever you saw him you would soon realize that the title of Jay Whitcraft - Supernova Volunteer, bestowed upon him in the Mountain Views News Spotlight on Volunteers article in 2009, is an understatement. Whitcraft could be called "the man for all seasons." His giving in some form fills every day of his life and shines upon the world much like a very bright star.

The 40-year resident came to live in Sierra Madre after taking a bus tour, led by Phyllis Chapman, covering Sierra Madre historical sights. He decided to move here, and have been enthusiastic residents since.

"On the bus tour I saw the Richardson House and Lizzie's Trail Inn, and I decided I wanted to work there." He was curator of the Museum for 5 years, a docent for 20 years and a Life Member of the Sierra Madre Historical and Preservation Society.

Seventeen years ago he became a trustee at the Sierra

Madre Library and served for 9 years, (2 as Chair). Jay's dream when he was chairman of the Board of Trustees is to have a coffee cart in the library garden where people will discuss ideas gleaned from the books they've read. He calls it "a lifelong learning quest." He also works the used book sales every two months.

Over 18 years ago Jay was one of the community leaders to investigate starting a community foundation, and they formed Sierra Madre Community Foundation under the umbrella of the California Community Foundation. Jay was the second chairman, following Eph Konigsberg's first term.

Born and raised in Wynnewood, Pa. he graduated with a Bachelor of Mechanical Engineering from the University of Pennsylvania. He served in the Army Air Corps during World War II and came to California 40 years ago to work for IBM.

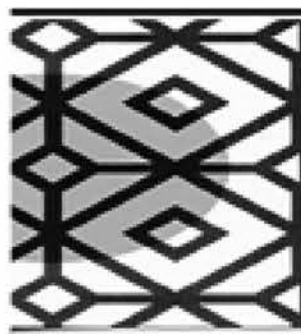

Community Meetings on Legalized Marijuana

The city of Pasadena is holding two more meeting this week on whether any activities related to medicinal, and nonmedicinal, marijuana should be allowed within the city of Pasadena.

The next meeting will be Tuesday night from 6 p.m. to 8 p.m. at the Pasadena City Hall Basement – S018 Training Room 100 N. Garfield.

Another meeting will be held Thursday night from 6 p.m. to 8 p.m. at AGBU Vatche and Tamar Manoukian High School Auditorium 2495 East Mountain Street.

All meetings are an “open-house” style format. City staff answered questions and talked one-on-one to collect input at the first meeting held last Tuesday at the Pasadena Senior Center. The content of all meetings will be the same city staff said.

They said the meetings were needed after the voters of the State of California passed Proposition 64, in November, the Adult Use of Marijuana Act (AUMA) which established a comprehensive system to legalize nonmedicinal (recreational) marijuana products for use by adults 21 years and older, and to tax the growth and retail sale of marijuana for nonmedicinal use. The cultivation, processing, manufacturing, distribution and sale of both medicinal and nonmedicinal marijuana are currently prohibited citywide.

After gathering information, staff will prepare draft regulations pertaining to the retail sales, manufacturing, processing, cultivation and distribution of marijuana, then be presented to the Planning Commission and the City Council at separately-noticed public hearings.

Hudson Ave. Room 229, Pasadena. Information, meeting dates, and meeting agendas are posted here.

State law requires that prior to the sale, lease, or rental of more than 30 days of any excess real property, a governing board of a school district must appoint an Advisory Committee to advise in the development of District-wide policies and procedures about the use or disposition of school buildings or space in school buildings that is not needed

for school purposes. PUSD's 7-11 Committee, which was established in early February 2017, will deliver a final report of its findings to the District's Board of Education. The Board will then decide what to do with the property.

As part of its property assessment process, the Committee meets several times in public sessions to determine whether the district should declare the former Burbank Elementary School site as surplus. Burbank Elementary School closed in 2012 as a result of declining student enrollment. The site is currently used to house the district's Early Education and Mental Health Services programs, and a private school.

The priorities for uses of the Burbank property are:

Lease the Burbank property pursuant to state law

Status Quo: take no action and maintain current use of the Burbank property

Sell the Burbank property pursuant to state law

Exchange the Burbank property pursuant to state law

STATE OF CALIFORNIA APPROVES \$5.2 BILLION IN NEW TAXES AND FEES TO FUND TRANSPORTATION IMPROVEMENTS AND ROAD REPAIRS, MONROVIA EXPECTED TO GET AROUND \$800,000 PER YEAR IN ADDITIONAL ROAD MAINTENANCE FUNDS

Last Thursday, April 6, 2017, after an extremely quick process that did not allow a lot of time for public review and input, the State of California approved \$5.2 billion in new taxes and fees to fund transportation and road improvements. The new taxes and fees, which are set to go into effect on November 1, 2017, include the following:

A 12-cent increase to the current State gas tax, to 30 cents / gallon total. Also, the tax amount will be adjusted annually to account for inflation.

A 20-cent increase to the current State diesel gas tax, to 36 cents / gallon total. Also, the tax amount will be adjusted annually to account for inflation.

A 2.25% total increase to the State diesel sales tax, to 4% / gallon. Also, the tax amount will be adjusted annually to account for inflation.

A new transportation improvement fee that will be collected with the annual payment of vehicle registration fees, based on the value of the vehicle in question. The fee amounts will be adjusted annually to account for inflation, and will initially be charged pursuant to the following schedule:

Car Value	Amount Paid
Under \$5,000	\$25
\$5,000-\$24,999	\$50
\$25,000-\$34,999	\$100
\$35,000-\$59,999	\$150

Over \$60,000

\$175

All zero-emission vehicles will be required to pay an additional \$100 / year vehicle registration fee, to make-up for the fact that owners of zero-emission vehicles do not pay any gas tax. Also, the tax amount will be adjusted annually to account for inflation.

The framework for this overall transportation tax increase was first announced by the State on Wednesday, March 29, 2017. Over the course of the ensuing six days, the plan was discussed and eventually approved by the State on April 6, 2017. City staff has conducted a preliminary review of the measure, and on an annualized basis, the funding formulas contained in SB 1 seems to indicate that the City will receive around \$800,000 / year in new funding for transportation and road maintenance money.

Of particular note, the legislation does detail that if a city's pavement condition index meets or exceeds 80, we can use the funding for other unspecified road / transportation purposes. After completion of our Monrovia Renewal project, the pavement condition index for all City streets here in Monrovia is expected to be, at worst, rated at 83. We will of course be analyzing this provision of the legislation in greater detail in the coming weeks.

THE HEAVENLY, HARMONIOUS HUMMER

During a recent walk with one of my canine clients, I heard what I thought was a bumble bee buzzing nearby, behind me. It was quite loud and sounded really close, startling me enough to turn and look to see what was making that noise.

When I turned around, I found myself eye-to-eye with a tiny hummingbird suspended in the air, right where a ray of sun was shining through the tree canopies. Its brilliant iridescent wings were winding and working vigorously to keep it hanging there at eye-level for what seemed to me like an eternity. Then it suddenly dove down slightly and flew up-and-away as quickly as it had come.

I see hummingbirds in our area all the time, but for some reason that close encounter with such an amazing little creature levitating just a couple of feet from my face left me feeling blessed by nature, as if it was a meeting meant to be, just for me. I couldn't help thinking, "Imagine being able to fly and flit about in the air and up over the treetops, like that tiny little bird?". God's creations never cease to amaze me and hummingbirds have got to be among the most remarkable creatures on earth.

The hummingbird's brain is larger in comparison to its body size than any other bird species. They are extremely smart and have a terrific memory, allowing them to keep tabs on the whereabouts of their favorite feeders and flowers. They even remember when each type of their preferred flowers will have refilled and be ready for them to revisit. Amazing? Yes, and good for them, but hummers are not strictly self-serving birds.

They play a very important and harmonious role in nature's 'big picture', making them excellent team players alongside all the other creatures with whom they cohabitate, including us humans. Hummingbirds are prolific pollinators, willing to work fervently for hours moving pollen from one location to another, as long as they have access to a sufficient amount of nectar to replenish their little systems.

The three most common hummingbirds found in California are Anna's (Calypte anna), Black-chinned (Archilochus alexandri), and Allen's (Selasphorus sasin), with the largest population being that of Anna's. As if playing a major role in nature wasn't enough to make the heavenly, harmonious hummer a valuable asset to earth, it also adds bountiful beauty and uniquely subtle music to the backdrop of our daily lives.

The adult male Anna's hummingbird boasts the most gorgeous plume of feathers, with a combination of colors that is sure to make other "aviarions" in our area envious. Their brilliant iridescent glow of metallic green,

rose-red and silvery-grey come to life in the sunlight, bringing a sense of awe to the on-looker.

During mating season, the male Anna's begins his rowdy routine of fluffing his feathers and flitting his wings in a dance designed to catch the attention of his female counterparts. I have seen this puffed-up plumage dance performed numerous times, and I always find myself completely captivated by the ordeal.

Hummingbirds are not much for socializing, the way most birds are. They do not migrate together in flocks, nor do they maintain familial relationships. In fact, the only times you are apt to see hummers together is during mating season and on those occasions when they are forced to share a common feeder for a quick snack before buzzing off to yet another isolated destination.

Hummers are very independent little beings, each staying individually focused on what they plan to do next. They tend to work alone, but because they each stay busy performing their personal duties as pollinators, the overall mission is successfully accomplished.

They are like team players, each carrying out the tasks assigned to their particular position on the team. I can relate to this aspect of the hummingbird's behavior somewhat. I like being part of the team, but I prefer being left alone to perform the duties expected of me.

In this way, the hummer and I may have a little something in common, but I still wish I could fly and flit about in the sky the way they do. I really don't foresee that happening to me, so I'll continue to watch them from ground level and appreciate their instinctual intelligence and beauty, the subtle song they sing and the comfort they bring, reminding me each day that nature is taking its course in a healthy, balanced way.

I encourage my fellow humans to pause and ponder the wonders of nature. Take a few moments each day to observe and appreciate nature and all it's beauty. The human's world is so full of seemingly meaningless activity, and it's easy to get caught up in it all. I find that when I take the time to look around at God's amazing creations and consider the wonderful way it all works together, I'm able to accept the constant chaos with much more ease. Love and let live.

I remember Adam saying, "when you don't know what to do, go to the end of the horizon when you get there you be able to see further."

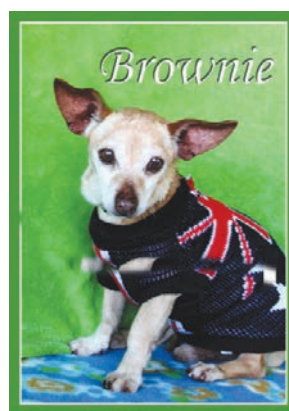

KABOBS AND MORE

I am asked daily what is my favorite restaurant in Pasadena, the answer might surprise you. But first.... Ask a friend about the nomadic history of the kabob and you are sure to come face-to-face with a puzzling expression but ask this same friend about their favorite kabob house and they will joyously support you with an answer.

The history of the kebab (spelled correctly) is teeming with adventure. This skewer of meat is commonly traced back to Persia or Pre-Ottoman Turkey and as this culinary invention spread across the globe it began to marry with the cultures it encountered. The Greeks added vegetables to the kebab, Pakistan and the countries of Southeastern Asian modified the kebab in the spicy flavors that versed their other meals. Indonesians decided to make satay as their national dish, which is nothing more than a kebab by another name. When Americans encountered this globetrotting delicacy they adored it so much they increased the size of the meat on each skewer.

The kebab is the dish of the common man and the king. The history of the kabob probably goes back to the time of Adam and Eve. In the same way we discover music in every culture, whether that civilization is of the primitive past or professed as advanced. But I find it more difficult to believe that we call ourselves developed we are the ones who enthusiastically devour hotdogs on a stick and those so-called primitively ancient cultures were feasting on fresh killed animal meat. I'm persuaded to feel that this method of cooking was almost spiritually in the way it burst to life around the world.

If all this history is making you hungry I have an answer for that as well.

Sahara Restaurant in Central Pasadena is one of my favorite spots for sit-down and takeout. I probably eat Sahara at three times a month and that is more than I cook at home. The dining room is simple and the walls hang with pictures of Lebanon. A loving shrine to Garo's father and the country he still loves. Sahara is named after his father's restaurant in Lebanon and Garo's promised his son Sebastian that if they were ever made it to America their restaurant would be have the same name in his honor. Sahara opened its doors in 1993, exploring Old Town Pasadena before settling in Central Pasadena. As far as the recipes for the restaurant they are all reside in Garo's head and like his father before him, Garo's will one day entrust the secrets to his son, Sebastian, but not yet.

The kitchen is open and this allows you to savor your meal before you take a single bite. The menu includes a list of kebabs and one of my favorites is the Lulu, ground-seasoned lamb with beef (\$11.25). If it's your first go at this oasis order the Combination (\$14.75) as it offers a little of everything. For the vegetarians in the group the falafel (\$8.25) sandwich is available. All the dishes arrive with feta cheese, pita bread, cucumber, and hummus, though I always ask nicely for a substitution of babaghanouj (eggplant) it's the real deal, and your choice of lentil soup or my favorite the cabbage salad. Often I'll save the cabbage salad for a later snack, it's that good.

Two enthusiastic thumbs up for Sahara! The food is fresh so when they are out of an item they are out until the following day.

Julie's Favorite Family Recipes

STICKY DATE PUDDING WITH CARAMEL SAUCE

INGREDIENTS

Melted butter, to grease
(7/8 cup) dried pitted dates, coarsely chopped
(1 cup) water
1 teaspoon bicarbonate of soda
(1/2 cup) butter
(3/4 cup) Superfine sugar
2 eggs
1 teaspoon vanilla essence
(1 1/2 cups) self-raising flour
Double cream or ice-cream, to serve
Fresh strawberries, to serve
CARAMEL SAUCE
(1 cup, firmly packed) brown sugar
(1/2 cup) pouring cream
(1/2 cup) butter
1 teaspoon vanilla essence

METHOD

Step 1
Preheat oven to 180°C. Brush a round 8 inches (base measurement) cake pan with melted butter to grease. Line the base with non-stick baking paper.
Step 2
Place dates and water in a medium saucepan over high heat. Bring to the boil. Stir in the bicarbonate of soda. Set aside for 10 minutes to cool slightly.
Step 3
Use an electric beater to beat the butter and sugar in a bowl until pale and creamy. Add the eggs, 1 at a time, beating well after each addition. Beat in the vanilla. Fold in the date mixture and flour until well combined.
Step 4
Spoon the mixture into the prepared pan and smooth the surface. Bake for 40-45 minutes or until the top springs back when lightly pressed.
Step 5
Meanwhile, to make the caramel sauce, stir the sugar, cream, butter and vanilla in a medium saucepan over medium heat for 5 minutes or until smooth.
Step 6
Cut pudding into wedges and pour over the caramel sauce. Serve with cream or ice-cream and strawberries.

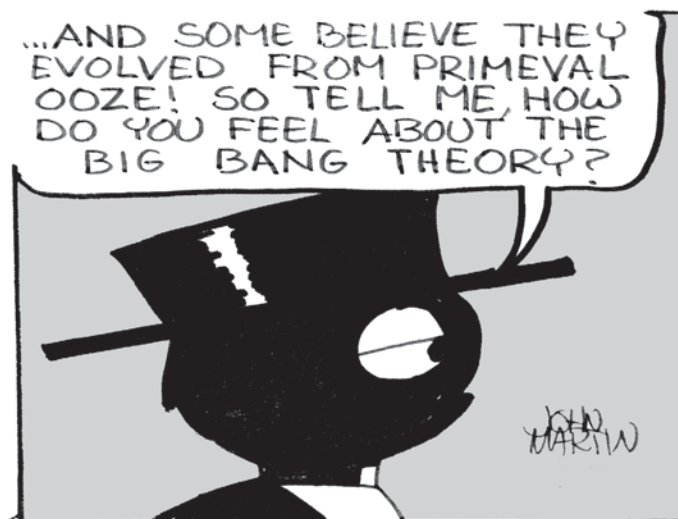

COPING WITH RINGING IN YOUR EARS

Dear Savvy Senior,
Are there any new treatments you know of that can help with constant ear ringing syndrome known as tinnitus? I've had it for years but it's gotten worse the older I get.
Ringing Louder at 62

Dear Ringing,
Tinnitus is a common condition that affects around 45 million Americans, but is usually more prevalent in the 60-and-older age group. Here's what you should know along with some tips and treatments that may help.

What is Tinnitus?

Tinnitus (pronounced tin-NIGHT-us or TIN-a-tus) is the sensation of hearing a ringing, buzzing, roaring, hissing or whistling sound in one or both ears when no external sound is present. The sounds, which can vary in pitch and loudness, are usually worse when background noise is low, so you may be more aware of it at night when you're trying to fall asleep in a quiet room. For most people tinnitus is merely annoying, but for many others it can be extremely disturbing.

Tinnitus itself is not a disease, but rather a symptom of some other underlying health condition. The best way to find out what's causing your tinnitus is to see an audiologist, or an otolaryngologist – a doctor who specializes in ear, nose and throat diseases (commonly called and ENT). The various things that can cause tinnitus are:

Age-related and noise-induced hearing loss – this is most common cause.

Middle ear obstructions, which are usually caused by a build-up of earwax deep in the ear canal.

The side effects of many different prescription and nonprescription medicines like aspirin, ibuprofen, certain blood pressure medicines and diuretics, some antidepressants, cancer medicines and antibiotics.

Various medical conditions such as high blood pressure, vascular disease, diabetes, allergies, thyroid problems, ear or sinus infections, Meniere's disease, Lyme disease, fibromyalgia, otosclerosis, temporomandibular joint (TMJ) disorder, a tumor, an injury to the head or neck, traumatic brain injury, depression, stress and more.

Treating the Causes

While there's currently no cure for tinnitus there are some ways to treat it depending on the cause. For example, if your tinnitus is caused by a wax build-up in your ears or a



medical condition (high blood pressure, thyroid problem, etc.), treating the problem may reduce or eliminate the noise. Or, if you think a medication you're taking may be causing the problem, switching to a different drug, or lowering the dosage may provide some relief.

Other Treatments

Another treatment option for tinnitus that can help suppress or mask the sound so its less bothersome are "sound therapies." These can be as simple as a fan or a white noise machine, or something more sophisticated like a modified-sound or notched-music device like Neuromonics (neuromonics.com) or the Levo System (otoharmonics.com) that actually trains your brain not to hear the tinnitus.

Or, if you have hearing loss, hearing aids can help mask your tinnitus by improving your ability to hear actual sounds. There are even hearing aids today that come with integrated sound generation technology that delivers white noise or customized sounds to the patient on an ongoing basis. Your audiologist or ENT can help you with these options.

There are also certain medications that may help. While currently there's no FDA approved drugs specifically designed to treat tinnitus, some anti-anxiety drugs and antidepressants have been effective in relieving symptoms. Behavioral therapies, counseling and support groups can also be helpful.

Other things you can do to help quiet the noise is to avoid things that can aggravate the problem like salt, artificial sweeteners, sugar, alcohol, tonic water, tobacco and caffeine. And protect yourself from loud noises by wearing earplugs.

THE SUBSTANCE OF THINGS HOPED FOR**

Tomorrow is Easter, and every year I try to share the Gospel in a meaningful way. Recently I heard a pastor on the radio describe "The Four Spiritual Laws" as an approach to evangelism.

They are: 1) God loves you and offers a wonderful plan for your life. 2) Man is sinful and separated from God. 3) Jesus Christ is God's only provision for man's sin. 4) We must individually receive Jesus Christ as Savior and Lord; then we can know and experience God's love and plan for our lives.

These sounded good to me, but the difficulty I have with most of the nonbelievers I know is that they don't care whether or not God loves them or has a plan for their lives. Most of them are happy, successful, seemingly fulfilled individuals with loving families, cute pets, and a nice 401-K. They see God as an unnecessary addition in their life. Jesus encountered this same reaction when He came to earth the first time. His message of salvation resonated with the sinners and down trodden of society because they knew they were messed up. The religious authorities who were respected in the community and appeared to have it all put together didn't feel they needed Him in order to have a right standing before God.

I've heard of a different set of four points that explain the Gospel: 1) "For all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God," 2) "The wages of sin is death, but the gift of God is eternal life in Christ Jesus our Lord," 3) "But God demonstrates His own love toward us, in that while we were still sinners, Christ died for us," 4) "If you confess with your mouth, 'Jesus is Lord' and believe in your heart that God raised Him from the dead you will be saved" (Romans 3:23, 6:23, 5:2, 10:9). Obviously, both series of points are saying the same thing, but it seems to me that ultimately we need to come to an understanding that we need to be saved. God's love doesn't mean much if you don't know what He sent His Son to save you from. Unfortunately in our post-modern society we've gotten so far away from this concept that it is quite foreign to us.

In a nutshell, we are not "good people." Of course many of us are moral, kind, and even selflessly compassionate, but we are not good compared to God, and that is the difference that matters. I heard this same pastor describe our sinful nature in the following way, a bird does not become a bird when it starts to fly, nor does a fish become a fish when it starts to swim. A bird flies because it is a bird and a fish swims because it is a fish. That is its nature. We sin because we are sinners. We do not become sinners when we sin, it was already hard wired into us. That is a reality many in our society do not accept.

The Bible teaches that we are doomed to judgment due to our sin, since any sin, no matter how small, separates us from God who is sinless and perfect. God could have just left us to our fate, but in His love He got His hands messy for us.

Christianity is fundamentally different from all other world religions. In Christianity, you bring absolutely nothing to the table. You can't earn your salvation or add to it in any way. Jesus paid it all, which leaves no room for boasting on anyone's part. Second, in Christianity, God reaches out to humans to initiate the relationship. Every other religion teaches that man strains toward the divine, but Christianity is the only one that teaches that God longs for relationship with us.

I especially like the way one of my favorite Christian authors, Nabeel Qureshi, put it when he was explaining God's coming into the world to a nonbeliever. He asked her to imagine that her daughter had fallen into a pit of mud and was choking and about to die. He then asked what she would do in this situation. She said that of course she would jump in the mud and save her. He then proposed that she was on her way to a wedding and was dressed in her finest clothes, would she still jump in and get dirty? Yes, of course! What if she could send someone else into the mud so she wouldn't have to go? No, she would treat her daughter better than anyone else would, she would go herself.

And that is what God did for us. God in the person of Jesus Christ left heaven to come down and "get messy" in our world because we were dying and unable to save ourselves. The gods in all other world religions are removed from the complications of life on earth, but the God of the Bible takes an active, personal role in the lives of His children. He did not wait until we got ourselves straightened out, until we reached enlightenment. Even while we were still fighting against Him, God sent Jesus to die in our place. Knowing, too, that many would not accept His offer of salvation, He still paid the price for their souls.

That is the message of Easter. God has accomplished for us what we could never do on our own. The Bible describes faith as "the substance of things hoped for, the evidence of things not seen." Our faith in Jesus is not a light, airy feeling or hypothesis. It is solid because it is based upon His word, which will never pass away. This life on earth is not all there is. We will all face death and after that it will be too late to change your destiny. The most important decision of your life is what you will do with Jesus. There is no neutrality. To not make a decision is still a decision not to accept the only lifeline God has provided for you. I hope and pray that you will seriously consider God's offer of salvation in Jesus. Do not put it off. This moment is a gift and there is no guarantee that you will get another chance. Today is the day of salvation!

If you choose to accept Jesus as your Savior you can pray this prayer and He will come into your heart and give you peace with God --today and forever!

"Dear Lord Jesus, I know that I am a sinner, and I ask for Your forgiveness. I believe You died for my sins and rose from the dead. I turn from my sins and invite You to come into my heart and life. I want to trust and follow You as my Lord and Savior. In Jesus' Name. Amen."

NEW HORIZONS IS HALFWAY FROM PLUTO TO NEXT FLYBY TARGET

How time and our spacecraft fly—especially when you’re making history at 32,000 miles per hour!

Continuing on its path through the outer regions of the solar system, NASA’s New Horizons spacecraft has now traveled half the distance from Pluto—its storied first target—to 2014 MU69, the Kuiper Belt object (KBO) it will fly past on Jan. 1, 2019. The spacecraft reached that milestone on April 3, when it was 486.19 million miles beyond Pluto and the same distance from MU69.

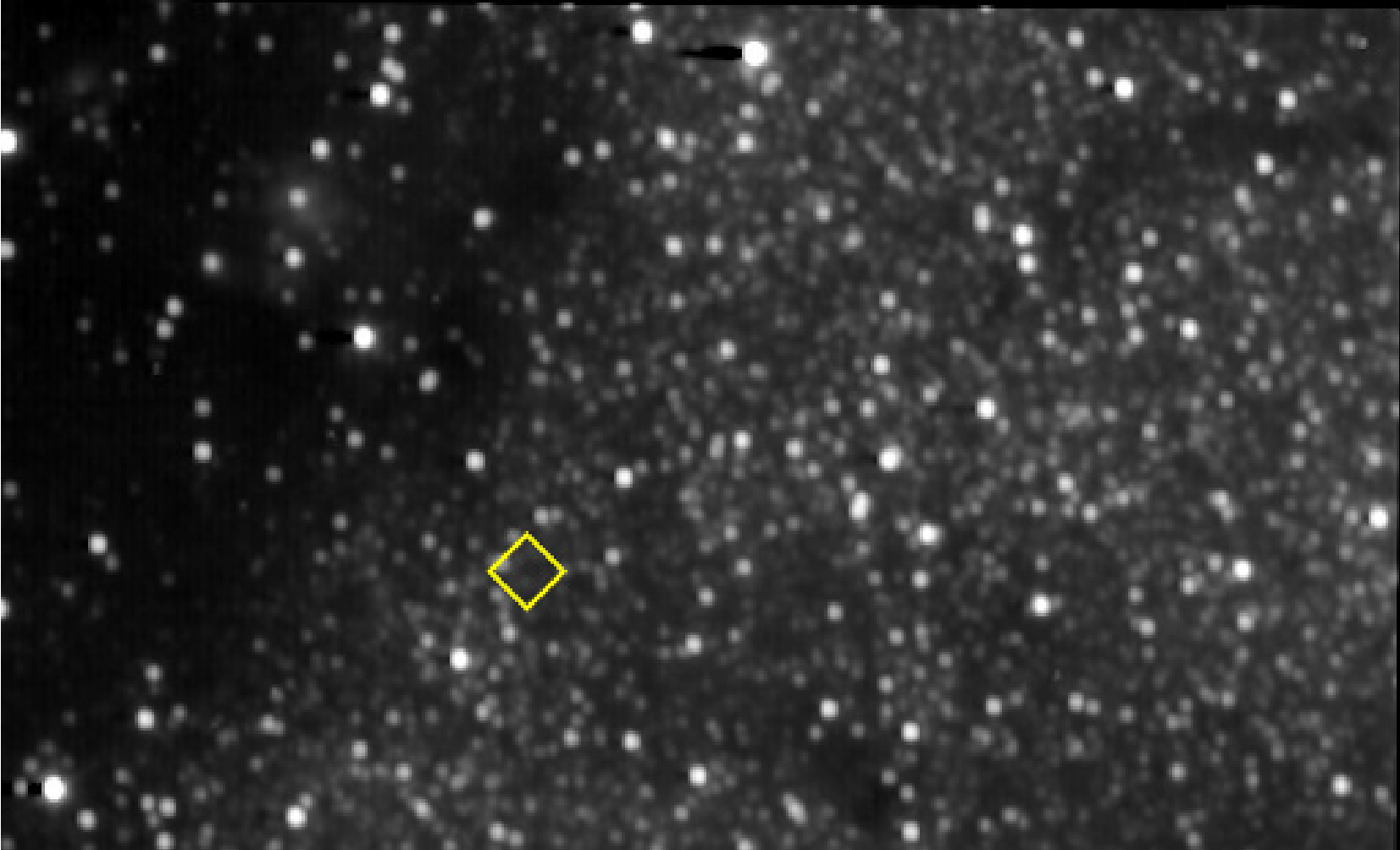
“It’s fantastic to have completed half the journey to our next flyby; that flyby will set the record for the most distant world ever explored in the history of civilization,” said Alan Stern, New Horizons principal investigator from the Southwest Research Institute in Boulder, Colorado.

On April 7, New Horizons also reached the halfway point in time between closest approaches to Pluto, which occurred at on July 14, 2015, and MU69, predicted for New Year’s Day 2019. The nearly five-day difference between the halfway markers of distance and time is due to the gravitational tug of the Sun.

Just two hours before the midpoint in time April 7, the spacecraft was put into a hibernation mode. Mission controllers at the Johns Hopkins University Applied Physics Laboratory (APL) in Laurel, Maryland, verified that New Horizons—acting on commands uplinked to its main computer the week before—entered hibernation at 3:32 p.m. EDT. With the spacecraft now about 3.5 billion miles from Earth, the radio signals carrying that word from New Horizons needed just over five hours—traveling at the speed of light—to reach the APL mission operations center through NASA’s Deep Space Network.

Before April 7, New Horizons had been “awake” for almost two and a half years, since Dec. 6, 2014, when the team began final preparations for Pluto approach and encounter operations. The 852 days since the end of its last hibernation period is the longest period that New Horizons has remained in active operations since it was launched in January 2006.

This hibernation period will last 157 days, ending on Sept. 11, but mission activity won’t necessarily



stop. The science and mission operations teams will be developing detailed command loads for the MU69 encounter, shaping the science observations for much of nine-day flyby. Their plans currently accommodate two potential flyby altitudes for the encounter; the team will narrow its choice to the final altitude as it learns more about the properties and orbit of MU69 (which was discovered less than three years ago).

During hibernation mode, much of the New

Horizons spacecraft is unpowered. The onboard flight computer monitors system health and broadcasts a weekly beacon-status tone back to Earth, and about once a month sends home data on spacecraft health and safety. Onboard sequences sent in advance by mission controllers will eventually wake New Horizons to check out critical systems, gather new Kuiper Belt science data, and perform course corrections (if necessary).

“The January 2019 MU69 flyby is the next big

event for us, but New Horizons is truly a mission to more broadly explore the Kuiper Belt,” said Hal Weaver, New Horizons project scientist from APL, in Laurel, Maryland. “In addition to MU69, we plan to study more than two-dozen other KBOs in the distance and measure the charged particle and dust environment all the way across the Kuiper Belt.”

WHAT IT MEANS

It is a time that millions of people the world over look forward to – the first Sunday after the first full moon after the spring equinox. What day is that, you ask? Easter, the day (and season) that Christians worldwide commemorate the trial, death, and resurrection from the dead of Jesus.

I grew up in a Catholic family, going to a Catholic school, and know well the Easter motif, beginning with the “giving something up” for Lent, Palm Sunday when Jesus entered Jerusalem on a donkey (in fulfillment of scriptures), and then turned over the tables of the vendors. He was still invited to speak in the Temple, but the Temple authorities considered him an upstart, someone who seemed to know “the Truth” in a way that they had forgotten, a man who didn’t have the Temple training and no formal training to become a Rabbi, and yet, there he was, attracting crowds, purporting to heal, innocent, seeming to know the answers to life’s deepest questions.

His trial and death were almost predictable, as most societies do not like the rabble-rousers among them.

Every Easter I have enjoyed the inspiring messages that movie-makers have given us in their efforts to interpret the practical meaning of the Jesus message. I have particularly liked the over six hour presentation of “Jesus of Nazareth” produced by Franco Zeffirelli, starring Robert Powell as Jesus. It is a rare presentation that brings the story alive, and takes it out of the pages of dry church reading. You cannot help but cry, and laugh, often when viewing this unique presentation. I have kept a Bible (Lamsa translation) handy when viewing this, to see how well Zeffirelli brought alive these ancient writings. You will likely agree that he did a great job. Actor Robert Powell said once in an interview that this role “changed my life.” Indeed.

Though too many of us have gotten lost in the pre-Christian “Easter” symbolism of eggs, bunnies, chocolate, etc., it is still worth fighting to realize that there is still a real story here, about someone who worked hard, was ridiculed, laughed at, even killed, in order to help us to save ourselves.

I have chosen to see the Easter story as a pattern that each of us should find and follow in our own lives. And are there other stories out there which show this pattern in the so-called secular world?

Movie-makers have given us many such stories, but we don’t always see them for what they are. If we consider the themes of the Easter story – humble birth, hard work, trying to rise above mundanity, showing The Way to others, some sort of “death,” and rising up again – then there are some excellent movies that give us this tale.

For example, you can’t go wrong with the classic “Whale Rider”. If you’ve not seen it, get it immediately. The grandfather of the traditional village is hoping for a grandson to carry on the ways. A girl is born, and grandpa figures he’ll have to wait some more. But the girl is “the one.” She persists in her path of learning the traditional ways. And when a test is given to the boys to see which one will become the new spiritual leader, the girl nearly dies, but passes the test. She is the one. You have to see it, and feel it, and experience that Savioriness can occur at any time, anywhere. Of course, there are certain requirements, but the chief among them is the willingness and desire to do the work required, and then doing that work.

“Powder” is another good movie that somewhat depicts the elements of the Easter theme, though not precisely. It’s still worth watching to see how most of us treat our fellow man.

Yes, some of you who will read your Encyclopedia today will learn about the pre-Christian roots of Easter. There is no denying that the Holy Day, as practiced generally today, has so-called pagan roots. So what? You can still observe this day and find the way to use the major themes for your personal upliftment, and for the upliftment of those around you.

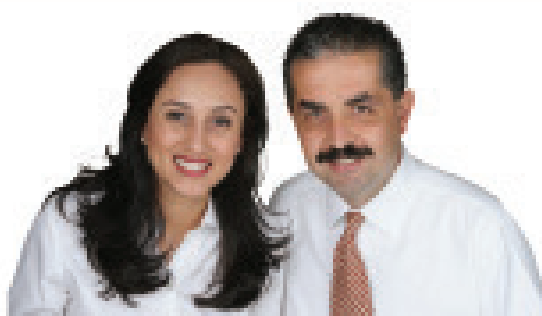

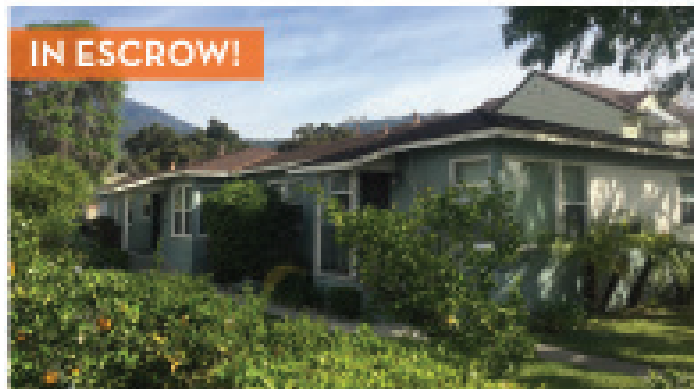

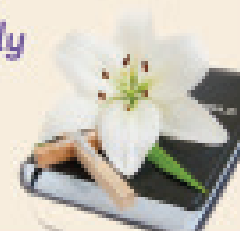

COUNTY ACTIONS RISK FEDERAL FUNDING CURTAILMENT AND FORCE ILLEGAL IMMIGRANTS FURTHER INTO THE SHADOWS

LOS ANGELES COUNTY – On a 4-1 vote, the Board of Supervisors voted today to call on the county's lawyers to develop a "sensitive location" policy and report back in 45 days. Supervisor Kathryn Barger voted no based on strong concerns about possible fiscal consequences of non-cooperation by the county with federal law enforcement authorities. Supervisor Barger also voted against another motion to formally establish a task force to develop a countywide "immigrant protection and advancement strategy" by the end of this year.

"Creating a task force and hiding illegal immigrants from federal enforcement only institutionalizes their illegal status and forces them further into the shadows," Supervisor Barger said. "These actions are reactionary and counterproductive in the effort to help individuals seek a path to citizenship or apply for legal status to be in the United States."

"Rather than moving toward becoming a 'sanctuary' state and county in violation of federal law, both the state and the county should be leading the effort to initiate congressional action to enact comprehensive immigration reform," she added.

Could that be our Dave Flores, first Special Assignment Deputy to the Monrovia-Arcadia-Duarte Unincorporated Area? Yes he was, and Council Members Dave Hall and Yvonne Bullock, since its inception were also elated.

I spoke to Captain Flores early in the week, and introduced him to my husband Bob at Assistant Sheriff Richard Barrantes' Retirement Party. Then on Friday, Captain Flores and Sergeant Mario Avola came for an interview.

Back in the 90's, Captain Flores and I spoke to the Community Development Commission for the unpaved Camino Real to be paved. He was very conscientious when assigned to our area. Years later I would meet him again when he was with the Asian Task Force. Sergeant Avola and I go back many years when he was the VIDA Deputy and worked the Program with at-risk youths.

Captain Flores joined the Sheriff's Department in June, 1987. Since that time, he has worked at various assignments and gained much knowledge and experience. He worked at Men's Central Jail for three years. Then he was assigned to Temple Sheriff's Station from 1990-1999. Besides being the MAD Special Assignment Deputy, he was a Training Officer, and worked on Gang Suppression and Crime Prevention. In 1999, he went to the Asian Task Force for three years. While there he

was on the Suppression Team and promoted to Detective. Then he was transferred to San Dimas Station from 2003-2006, where he did Patrol and was a Special Assignment Deputy. In 2006, after promoting to Sergeant, he was at Men's Central Jail for one year and from 2007-2008, spent one year at the Cerritos Station. In 2008, he went to the Internal Affairs Bureau which is a review board and does investigations. Then he became Chief Roberta Abner's Aide at the Professional Standards and Training Division. He assisted in the Department's Reorganization. The next assignment was Aide to Chief Jim Lopez, East Patrol. In 2013, he promoted to Lieutenant and was assigned to Men's Central Jail, but pulled to do projects at the Internal Affairs Bureau. In late 2016, he was appointed Executive Aide to Sheriff Jim McDonnell.

Captain Flores main goal is to strengthen the LASD's partnership with local communities. He wants to "bring in a spirit of cooperation, not hostility...the communities to trust us...a mutual trust and to improve the quality of life in the community."

I asked him about his new position-being Commander of Temple Station is really being Chief of Police to FIVE cities-Rosemead, Temple City, South El Monte, Duarte, and Bradbury, but he is so humble. DO IT NOW: NAME A GUARDIAN FOR YOUR MINOR CHILD(REN)

I know it's hard. Thinking about someone else raising our children stops us all in our tracks. But we must. If we don't, and something happens to us, a stranger will determine who raises our children – and your child's guardian could be a relative you despise or even a stranger you've never met. It happens.

No one will ever be you or parent exactly like you, but you can't let that stop you from naming a guardian. In fact the guardian of your children would easily become the most important person in their lives and could be the difference between them surviving the tragedy of losing you and going on to be happy, healthy, and successful or not. And while the likelihood of your guardian actually having to take over is slim, the consequences of having a stranger make that incredibly important decision could be dire.

If you have not named a guardian and something happens to you - a stranger who does not know you, your child, or your relatives and friends - will determine who will raise your child. Anyone can ask to be considered, and the judge will have the authority to decide. Keep in mind, too, families tend to fight over children, especially if there's money involved. And fights can lead judges to order the child into foster care until the matter is resolved. On the other hand, if you name a guardian, all of that can be avoided.

SEAN'S SHAMELESS REVIEWS:

FUTURE ISLANDS TRAVEL VASTLY THROUGH "THE FAR FIELD"



Without any sheer doubt in anyone's mind, Future Islands broke through to the masses in the later part of 2014. The band's exhilaratingly wild performance of "Seasons (Waiting On You)" on The Late Night with David Letterman went viral in that summer as well. It turned the Baltimore synth-pop trio into an over night sensation. They formed in 2006 and had been touring incessantly. From playing small gigs in front of a few hundred people to selling out venues holding thousands and having their name near the top of the list at major music festivals' posters across the world, it was without question these were the hardest and most deserving musicians of all of indie rock. Singles was the band's fourth full-length record when released in 2014 via 4AD. Like all the band's albums beforehand, it was well received. Up until that release, they garnered a small, but devoted legion of supporters. That album showcased a transformed sense of enthusiasm coated upon their trademark heavy dark-synth sound. Singer/songwriter Samuel Herring had sung affectively about the future that lies ahead. Their previous albums embraced themes about looking back and reflecting on those particular times in one's own existence. Such with earlier songs, questions were raised, but answers are seldom found, for both past and future situations. Now three years later, we have the follow-up to Singles entitled The Far Field. The major difference now is that many people are anticipating the record and are fully aware of what this band is capable of creating. Rest assure, Future Islands build upon Singles in many ways yet remain fairly faithful to that record's core sound.

The new tracks are constructed around Gerrit Welmers' swelling synths and William Cashion's sweeping bass lines. Herring is still unwavering in cultivating all of his raw emotions into delicate, beautifully composed lyrics. "Aladdin," the opaque opening track doesn't feel instant like when you first put on Singles. However, there's something innately understated here. With bizarre lyrics such as "We were the candles that lit up the snow on dusty roads / We were the animals breathing life into June just to see faith / Blessed by the cannibal moon and the spoon dipping deep to your nose / Stressed by the distance of shoes & the bridges too far to be named," one may have to scratch their head at what it all means. Yet the mystified significance draws you in ever so deeper with each careful listen. "Time On Her Side" features the trio's cavernous trademark synths along with the quivers commonly found from Herring. The arrangements dazzle and flourish throughout yet are distinctively familiar for Future Islands. There is comfort knowing what you are in store for on the musical front,

but the lyrics, per usual, are gripping, transcendent, and enlightening.

"Ran," the band's first single astonishes with absolute elegance and fluency. It is as majestic and instantly gratifying as the band's immense single several years ago, "Seasons." My favorite track is "Beauty Of The Road." It flows with grace and a deep contemplation of moments in one's (former) life. I love Herring's conviction here as he carries his tone with true passion and sensitivity. This time around the crooning and harsh vocals are light as Herring sings in much a sleeker delivery. Here we have lyrics such as, "Cuz in a darkened space, we watched our souls replace / And said our goodbyes / But we didn't know the shape" and my favorite lines off the record, "You spend your whole life searching and find the thing you're looking is what you lost so long ago." The song may put things in perspective for the listener with much to deliberate deep within one's self.

Future Islands delivers true artistry on "Through The Roses". Let it seep inside and you'll find the inner strength just like Herring does. A darker tale is originated within the lyrics yet the truth is there, hidden in plain sight. Once again, Herring speaks truth and cuts deep with every line. "Through The Roses" like many of the band's songs is pure poetry disguised in a synth-pop song. The lyrics and the way they are conveyed are never hammy or pretentious but poured out with the most undeniable amount of emotions. "Shadows," another highlight features the duet vocals of Debbie Harry from Blondie. The dichotomy of vocals from these two lead singers works exceedingly well and is a welcoming addition to the 12-track record. The endeavor clocks in at forty-six minutes and like any voyage, there are sights and sounds you'll forever remember.

The conclusion is brought to you by the way of "Black Rose." It resembles much of what you heard leading up to the finale. In that case, you'll favor it just as much as the ones before it. The consumption of The Far Field for the listener will feel like a spiritual emergence. It's a remarkably satisfying expedition that will move you in many ways. If you have your sights set on a road trip, this is your go-to record this year. If you are getting over loss or dealing with dissolved love or just starting all over in life, this is the record for you. The album carries its heart on its sleeve and this heart is open, empathetic, and most of all generous. The conquest of life and love bleed through the veins of "The Far Field," but there's much to be said and discovered about everything in between. Future Islands show that mind, body, and soul are all connected and to feel complete, they must work work in concord to each other.

The confluence of Easter and Passover at mid-month will find many people, stressed more than usual by the state of world affairs and the chaos of domestic politics, seeking answers from their faith.

It's hard to imagine anyone on the world stage more gifted at articulating a course for humanity than Pope Francis. Beyond his responsibilities as leader of the Catholic Church, the Pope, at age 80, has become a beacon of common sense, most emphatically in his devotion to the economically

disenfranchised.

"The world tells us to seek success, power and money," he observes. "God tells us to seek humility, service and love."

His words are powerful, even for those like myself who are not Catholic.

During the four years of his Papacy he has boldly directed many of his remarks at governments and world leaders in addressing the needs of a troubled planet.

Here are my favorite statements by Pope Francis:

- "The measure of the greatness of a society is found in the way it treats those most in need, those who have nothing apart from their poverty."

- "Responsibility for the poor and the marginalized must be an essential element of any political decision, whether on the national or the international level."

- "Working for a just distribution of the fruits of the earth and human labor is not mere philanthropy. It is a moral obligation."

- "Everything is connected. Concern for the environment thus needs to be joined to a sincere love for our fellow human beings and an unwavering commitment to resolving the problems of society."

- "Climate change is a global problem with grave implications: environmental, social, economic, political and for the distribution of goods. It represents one of the principal challenges facing humanity in our day."

- "A person who thinks only about building walls, wherever they may be, and not building bridges, is not Christian."

- "The problem of intolerance should be dealt with as a whole. Every time a minority is persecuted and marginalized, the good of the whole society is in danger."

- "Migrants and refugees are not pawns on the chessboard of humanity."

- "To change the world we must be good to those who cannot repay us."

A few weeks ago, the Pope spoke about encountering beggars on the street. "There are many excuses" to justify not giving them money, he noted. Perhaps it will be spent on alcohol or drugs.

But giving something to someone in need "is always right," he explained. And looking them in the eyes and touching their hands must be the way one reaches out to a person asking for help.

Study people's faces as you go along the street, the Pope has advised. Too many are worried, closed in, a smile is missing, tenderness is missing. In an era of social media, true social friendship is missing.

And here is my favorite quote from Pope Francis. Perhaps you, too, will consider it as food for thought at your holiday table.

- "You pray for the hungry. Then you feed them. That's how prayer works."

The Science Behind Your Mind

Dr. Harrington joined HMRI and established the Molecular Neurology Program in 1998. He studies how the cerebrospinal fluid composition explains the intermittent disorder of migraine and the progressive neurodegeneration of Alzheimer's disease. He also studies molecules that are transported to/from the brain in blood (including changes after mild traumatic brain injury), and those excreted in urine. Mike enjoys collaborating with other clinical and scientific colleagues that apply complementary measures of brain function so as to gain as much information from the same study participants. This approach is important to understand what is causing brain disorder, develop tests that identify disease, and direct treatment to the underlying mechanism.

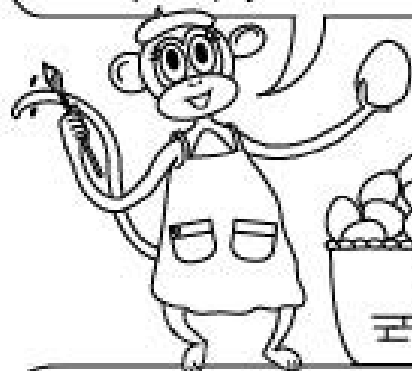

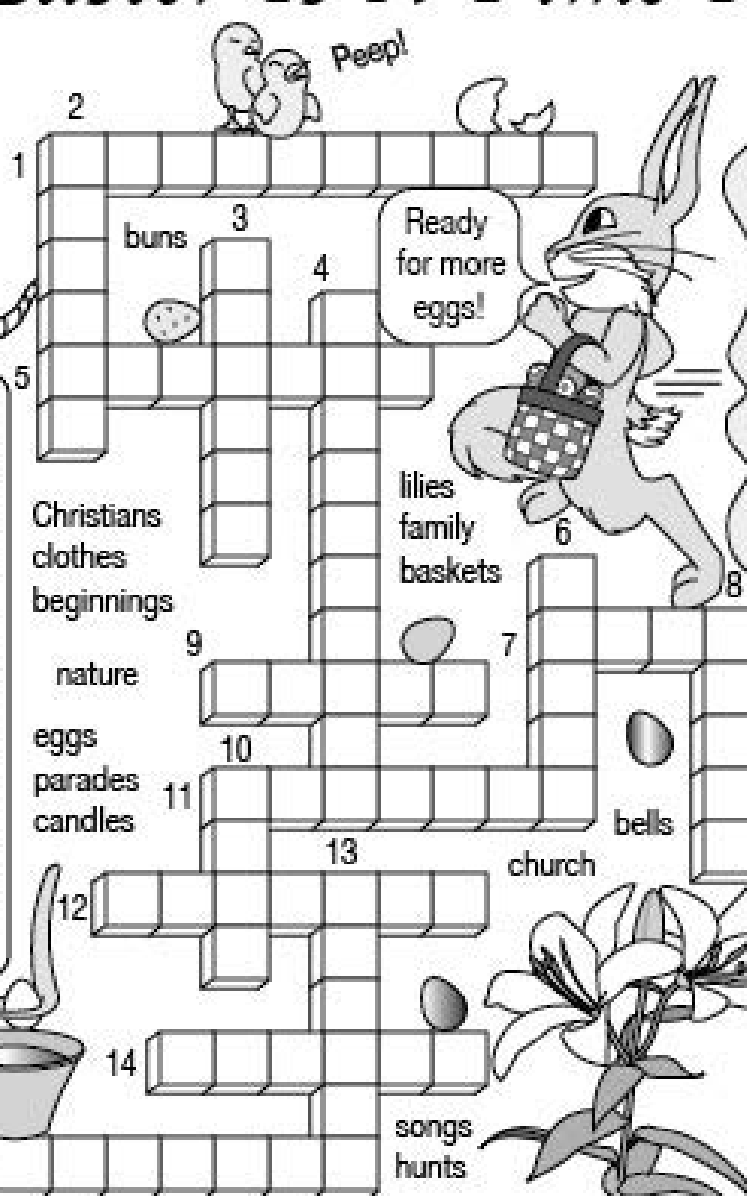
