

PROPOSED LIBRARY CHANGES AWAKEN COMMUNITY

Library and Community Services Director Ryan Baker presented a plan that will allow for expansion of library services and a new facility without additional taxes or financial burden on residents but reaction to the proposal

It wasn't the council's decision on Marijuana that has the community in an uproar. The council unanimously approved an ordinance that would limit the number of plants grown indoors to 6 and prohibit growth of marijuana outdoors. They also agreed to review the ordinance in January when the state presents its guidelines. Nor was it the council's decision to overturn the Planning Commission's denial of the continued remodeling of the Henry A. Darling House. That decision distressed many, but it took a back seat to the one agenda item that seems to have opened up a controversy that may rival the ill fated 'downtown specific plan' of year's past.

The proposal to move the Library and sell the existing property brought more than a dozen citizens to the podium. City Manager Gabe Engeland noted that the issue of how to address the problems currently facing the library was presented to him at his first council meeting in March. As a follow up, a special joint meeting of the Library Board of Trustees and the Community Services Commission on June 28th, 2017. The results of that meeting were presented by Director Baker to the council and public in a very enthusiastic manner.

The challenges with the library are numerous. As noted by Baker and members of the public brought up, the issues include:

The facility is too small.
The building is 62 years old and has a multitude of physical problems including deferred maintenance the spans decades, 141 ADA issues, a leaking roof, plumbing and electrical and asbestos issues, etc. Baker informed the council that to put another 'band aid' on the problems would cost about \$1.3 million but to bring 'meaningful improvement' to the city's library services the cost would be approximately \$3 million.

The Plan

Baker, the Library Trustees and Community services commission all support the notion of creating The Sierra Madre Library and Cultural Center by moving the Library to the site of the existing Recreation Center and adding to that facility. The staff reports says, "The most viable solution identified would be to repurpose the existing Recreation Center in Sierra Vista Park as a new Library and Cultural Center. The existing Library property and adjacent City-owned property would be sold with monies received to fund the major portion of the project. A single-story addition would be constructed on the north side of the existing Recreation Center on what is now a concrete courtyard. This addition would bring the total size of the building to 16,000 to 18,000 sq feet depending on funds received. Library services would be moved from the current library into the first floor of the new Library and Cultural Center, with the second story left as 3,700 sq feet of flexible open space and classrooms for community events, classes, workshops, meeting rooms, youth programs, and community rentals. Both Library and Community Services staff would be housed in the same building to further the ability to share resources, supplement activities, reduce overhead costs and create new community programs."



So where will the money come from?

The majority of the funding for the proposed improvement of the Library would come from the sale of the property that the Library currently sits on. Baker noted that the sale of the property would yield approximately \$2.6 million dollars and community organizations such as the Library Trustees would raise the balance. Selling the property would create another set of problems as noted by several residents who spoke at Public Comment. The most common concern was the type of development that would be allowed if the existing library site was sold. It was also brought to the attention of the council that the building was also designed by the same architect that designed the Los Angeles City Hall and is as a result, an historic structure. Around town the question of why funds from the city's Utility Users Tax aren't adequate to cover the costs of repairing the existing building. In April 2016, the residents did

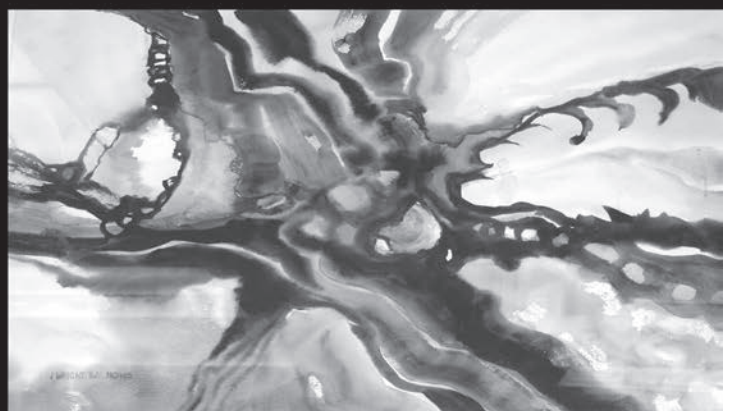

You may not have noticed, but there's been the cutest little old car sitting out in front of Ascension Episcopal Church on No. Baldwin for some weeks now. Every time I've driven past it I've thought, "I need to take a picture of that car and find out something about it." Of course, my imagination being what it is, I imbued that little Ford with a back-story to rival Bonnie & Clyde. I had it running bootleg hooch down from Canada and careening around corners with Treasury agents in hot pursuit. Or maybe it was owned by a flapper with bobbed hair and rouged knees and she drove it all over the Hamptons from house party to house party, occasionally finding herself out of gas on a country road and having to be towed back to town by a good-natured farmer with a horse. Or maybe a preacher who drove it from tent revival to tent revival saving the lost and showing folks the way to salvation. "Doctor Love's traveling salvation show!" to quote Neil Diamond.

Needless to say, I could go on that way for days but I finally called Ascension and had a nice chat with Mike Beach, the Verger at Ascension. The car is a 1926 Ford Coupe and is in the Model T group. Mike had wanted to own a 1926 Ford Coupe for years and years and finally came across this one. Where? In Boston! So he had it shipped out and has been working on putting it together for the last 15 years. Car restoration is never a speedy pastime as it's usually expensive, parts are hard to find, and getting to work on 'The Car falls low on the priorities list most of the time. Mike said the car arrived sporting a Chevy engine, which was frozen, and a 4" steel frame, which was way too heavy for this Ford's little body. First thing he did was throw all that stuff away and then get it dipped in a corrosive to get the rust off.

As of now, it's got a Nissan V6 engine and Mike's been driving it back and forth from his home in Monrovia to the church for several weeks now. We compared notes about growing up local - Mike in Alhambra, me in So. Pasadena, and if you haven't met Mike or seen his 1926 Ford Coupe, go on by Ascension and take a look. Henry Ford said you could have the Model T in any color you wanted...as long as it was black. Wonder if that's what Mike has in mind!

Have you been noticing the crepe myrtle trees all over the place that are in glorious bloom? The jacarandas are about finished with their purple blossoms and now crepe myrtles in every shade of pink, purple or white are gracing our area. Cactus are blooming, too, and the bees are just loving those flowers. We have tomatoes!! Lots of them and, my oh my, are they delicious. If you haven't grown your own tomatoes, you have to start. What you buy in the supermarket bears no resemblance at all to home grown tomatoes! As singer-songwriter, Guy Clark, said, "There's only two things that money can't buy and that's true love and home grown tomatoes!" It's not too late to get yourself a tomato plant or two and you'll find yourself with home grown beauties in about a month or so.

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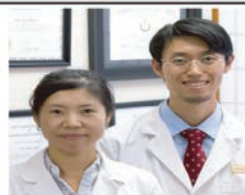
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Local Area News Briefs

Suspect Arrested in Shooting

Pasadena Police Department patrol personnel responded last week to the 100 block of West Peoria Street after a report of a female gunshot victim.

Officers arrived last Saturday morning at about 1:45 a.m. and found a Black female in her 40s, a victim of a shooting. Pasadena Fire Department paramedics arrived and transported the victim to a local hospital where she later died.

Follow-up investigation led Detectives to a suspect, Teretha Howard (Black female, 58 years old, Pasadena resident), who was arrested and booked for murder. Due to a preexisting medical condition, she was transported to a local hospital. Howard's bail was set at \$2 million.

The investigation is on-going. The identity of the victim is being withheld pending release from the Los Angeles County Coroner's Office.

Metro Bike Share Rolls Out in Pasadena

Pasadena became the newest city Friday to add Metropolitan Transportation Authority's (Metro) bike sharing system as officials from the city, Metro, and Bicycle Transit Systems, Inc unveiled hundreds of bikes, in front of city hall, set to fill 30 bike share stations throughout the city

"We recognize in Pasadena streets are for more than just moving cars," Pasadena Mayor Terry Tornek said. "And this is a tremendous leap in that direction. Make no mistakes this is an experimental program and we have no guarantee of success here, inevitably there will be complaints because that's the Pasadena way."

Tornek said he is optimistic that the program would be a success and that starts with people educating each other about how system works.

"If you are someone who is a regular bicycle advocate, take the time and explain to people staring at these things, how it works," Tornek said. "And help them to understand... so we can make this program a huge success beyond the two year experimental period."

The bikes, with bold Metro

branding across them, can be ridden 30 minutes at a time. The bikes can be unlocked from the stations using Metro TAP cards and credit cards. Officials said there are monthly passes and yearly pass options along with "walk-ups."

There has been discussion as to why Pasadena did not create its own bike sharing system similar to Long Beach or Breeze in Santa Monica.

"We should leverage Metro, who is doing this county wide, City Manager Steven Mermell said. "They have a good partner in their vender. For us to go off and try and do this on our own, would cost us more, take us longer and require additional staff. It makes all kinds of sense of us to partner with Metro." He also said that for the first two years, there is no cost to the city. "We will see in two years if it's sustainable or not?" he said. Metro officials also made the choice not to have Global Positioning System GPS in the bikes or individual locks on the bikes as a way to keep cost down.

President of B-Cycle Rob Burns said theft in bike sharing programs is low. "Local police know what these bikes are and where they belong."

Suicide Barriers Placed along Colorado Bridge

Individuals taking a stroll over the popular Colorado Street Bridge to view Arroyo Seco Canyon will have no place to rest or sit as the city started, this week, putting 10 foot metal poles —fencing off all 20 alcoves along the bridge as a temporary solution to suicides.

The issue is set to be discussed at an upcoming Public Safety Committee meeting Wednesday night.

"We are installing some chain link fencing over the alcoves because, this year to date, we have already had six people jump off the bridge," City Manager Steven Mermell said. "They won't be able to sit in the alcoves for a while, this is a temporary thing."

According to a staff report the alcoves provide "steps" to an elevation where jumpers can go over the railing. There are also concerns over gaps in the railing, at the pilasters, that allow for easier access.

Mermell also said there is now

more awareness to the problem after houses were built near the bottom of the bridge, "the houses are far enough away, but there is more attention because people will be living there."

He said they were also aware of preservationists, including Pasadena Heritage, concerns over the aesthetics. "Throughout the years, back in the 30s, when a lot of people were jumping off, there was chain link there."

Non-structural interventions such as phones/intercoms Bridge patrols pedestrian exclusion, along with structural solutions like, wire strand installation, mesh barriers, netting and picket extensions will be discussed Wednesday night. The Public Safety Committee meets at 6:00 p.m. Pasadena City Hall, 100 N. Garfield Avenue, in the Council Chamber.

MONROVIA FIREFIGHTERS RESPOND AS PART OF A STRIKE TEAM TO ASSIST WITH THE SANTA MARIA BRUSH FIRE

This past weekend, Monrovia firefighters were dispatched with other local fire response professionals to assist with addressing a fast-moving brush fire in Santa Maria. The fire, which has been dubbed the Alamo Fire, has grown to around 24,000 acres as of this evening, and Cal Fire reports that the fire is 15% contained. One structure has already been destroyed, and 133 other structures are threatened. From Monrovia, Captain Morton, Engineer Buccola, and Firefighter/Paramedics Jansen and Edgely were dispatched. Our four staff members are joining over 1,660 other firefighters working together to battle the blaze. As information about this situation develops, we will also be sure to keep everyone updated, and given the size and travel distance of the blaze, our team from Monrovia will likely be gone for around a week or more.

This past week, Monrovia firefighters played host to three members of the Nigerian Fire Service. The group traveled to Monrovia to witness live demonstrations of our two propane (LPG) burn rooms in the Fire Training Tower. It appears that Nigeria is trying to improve fire service training and is looking to install facilities similar to the one we have in Monrovia at their fire academies. In addition, Director of Academics Callistus Kanny, and fire training facility contractor Kenny Oguntoybi, were also part of the delegation. 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LANDMARK SCHOOL START TIME BILL PASSES STATE ASSEMBLY EDUCATION COMMITTEE

Sacramento, CA – Today, Senator Anthony J. Portantino (D – La Cañada Flintridge) presented SB 328 to the Assembly Education Committee. The Bill requires middle schools and high schools to start the school day no earlier than 8:30 a.m. SB 328 is based on recommendations of the American Academy of Pediatrics for the optimal time to start school for improved public health of teenage students. After passing the State Senate earlier in the year, the bill built upon this momentum passing the Assembly Education Committee with bi-partisan support.

“This makes a big statement to children, parents, and the education community that more and more legislators are using sound and definitive research to put the best interests of our students first. School districts around the country that have moved teenage school start times later have seen measurable, positive results for student achievement and student public health. I am very grateful to the Assembly Education Committee for making its decision on this indisputable data,” expressed Portantino.

“On behalf of California’s students, we appreciate the committee’s support of this critical bill, which prioritizes student well-being by ensuring healthy start times, said Lisa Lewis, co-chair, Start School Later California, which co-sponsored the bill. Dr. Irena Keller, who also co-chairs the organization, added: “These start times are backed by decades of research and will benefit our students, our communities, and our state.”

The California State PTA Legislative Advocate, Carol Kocivar, explained, “The research is clear: Later school start times improve the health, safety, and academic success of students.”

“Too many of our schools have started at times we know to be detrimental to our kids’ health,” said Joy Wake, coordinator of the High School Parent Engagement

Group in the San Juan Unified School District. “We are grateful for the progress on SB 328, which recognizes that school start times are a statewide public health issue.”

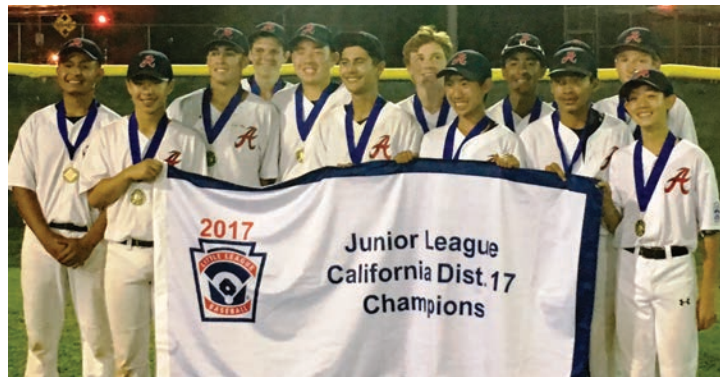

Chardonnay is the most popular grape grown in California, with over 100,000 acres, it is the wine type variety with the most acreage planted in California. Cabernet Sauvignon was the second most planted wine grape in California with 76,800 total acres. Thus, Chardonnay is the most used grape for bottles wines and sparkling wines. There's your history lesson!

We visit the North Coast just north of Napa Valley for an above average Chardonnay "Custard" by Don Sebastiani & Sons. This is a 100% chardonnay grapes blend. Many of you prefer the oaky taste of Chardonnay while others tend to like the buttery taste of Chardonnay. This Custard Chardonnay offers a toasty buttery flavor. Once blended, the wine is aged for six months in new French Oak, which imparts warm toasty almond and vanilla notes, winemaker Don Sebastiani tells me that is reminds him of his childhood comfort food glazed doughnuts with a creamy custard filling. The grapes are sourced from a variety of local North Coast Vineyards. My suggestion is not to chill this bottle too much but instead pour it at just below room temperature. Through personal experience, pouring just below room temperature really brought out a great taste, especially with the jumbo shrimp that I paired it with. Though I will

say that a pairing of food is not a must, it's fine to just open and drink right away. Remember: buy it to drink, not to save.

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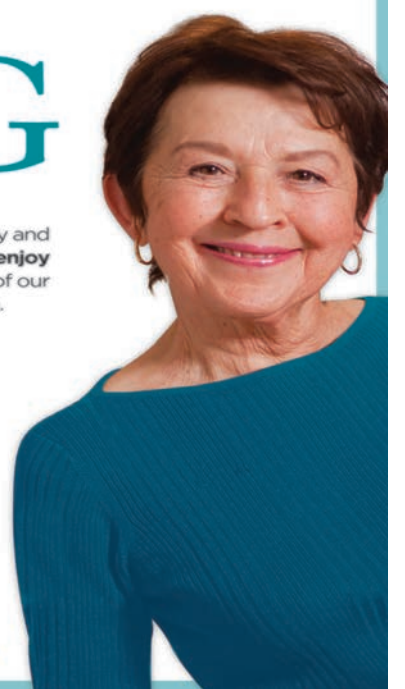
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Inquiring Spouse

Dear Inquiring,
Almost everyone experiences heartburn or acid indigestion from time to time, but frequent episodes can signal a much more serious problem. Here's what you should know, along with some tips and treatments to help relieve your husband's symptoms.

It's estimated that more than 60 million Americans experience heartburn at least once a month, with around 15 million people who suffer from it daily. If your husband is plagued by heartburn two or more times a week, and it's not responding well to over-the-counter antacids, he needs to see a doctor. Frequent bouts may mean he has gastroesophageal reflux disease (GERD), which can severely irritate and damage the lining of his esophagus, putting him at risk of Barrett's esophagus and esophageal cancer if it's not treated.

Lifestyle Adjustments

Depending on the frequency and severity of his heartburn, there are a number of lifestyle adjustments he can make that can help provide relief and avoid a more serious problem down the road. Consider these tips:

- Avoid problem foods: Certain foods can trigger heartburn symptoms like citrus fruits, tomatoes, fatty foods, chocolate, garlic, onions, spicy foods, mints, alcohol, coffee and sodas. Your husband should keep a food diary to track which foods cause him the most problems and avoid them.
- Eat smaller, slower and earlier: Smaller portions at mealtime and eating slower can help reduce heartburn symptoms. He should also wait at least three hours after eating before lying down or going to bed.
- Lose weight: Having excess weight around the midsection puts pressure on the abdomen, pushing up the stomach and causing acid to back up into the esophagus.
- Quit smoking: Smoking can increase stomach acid and weaken the valve that prevents acid from entering the esophagus. If your husband smokes, the National Cancer Institute offers a number of smoking cessation resources at



SmokeFree.gov or call 1-800-QUIT-NOW.

- Sleep elevated: To help keep the acid down while sleeping, get your husband a wedge-shaped pillow to prop him up a few inches. If that's not enough, try elevating the head of his bed six to eight inches by placing blocks under the bedposts or insert a wedge between his mattress and box spring. Wedges are available at drugstores and medical supply stores. Sleeping on his left side may also help keep the acid down.

Treatment Options

If the lifestyle adjustments don't solve the problem, or if antacids (Tums, Rolaids, Maalox, Mylanta or Alka-Seltzer) aren't doing the trick there are a variety of over-the-counter and prescription medications that can help, along with surgery. His doctor can help him determine which one is best for him. Treatment options include:

H-2 Blockers: Available as both over-the-counter and prescription strength, these drugs (Pepcid, Tagamet, Axid and Zantac) reduce how much acid your stomach makes but may not be strong enough for serious symptoms.

Proton-Pump Inhibitors (PPI): If you have frequent and severe heartburn symptoms, PPIs are long-acting prescription medications that block acid production and allow time for damaged esophageal tissue to heal. They include Nexium, Prevacid, Prilosec, Zegerid, Protonix, Aciphex and Dexilant. Prevacid 24 HR, Prilosec and Zegerid OTC are also available over-the-counter. But be aware that long-term use of PPIs can increase your risk for osteoporosis and chronic kidney disease.

Surgery: If the medications don't do the trick, there are also surgical procedures that can tighten or strengthen the lower esophageal sphincter so gastric fluids can't wash back up into the esophagus.

MYSTERIES SURROUND NEW HORIZONS' NEXT FLYBY TARGET

NASA's New Horizons spacecraft doesn't zoom past its next science target until New Year's Day 2019, but the Kuiper Belt object, known as 2014 MU69, is already revealing surprises.

Scientists have been sifting through data gathered from observing the object's quick pass in front of a star—an astronomical event known as an occultation—on June 3. More than 50 mission team members and collaborators set up telescopes across South Africa and Argentina, along a predicted track of the narrow shadow of MU69 that the occultation would create on Earth's surface, aiming to catch a two-second glimpse of the object's shadow as it raced across the Earth. Accomplishing the observations of that occultation was made possible with the help of NASA's Hubble Space Telescope and Gaia, a space observatory of the European Space Agency (ESA).

Combined, the pre-positioned mobile telescopes captured more than 100,000 images of the occultation star that can be used to assess the environment around this Kuiper Belt object (KBO). While MU69 itself eluded direct detection, the June 3 data provided valuable and unexpected insights that have already helped New Horizons.

"These data show that MU69 might not be as dark or as large as some expected," said occultation team leader Marc Buie, a New Horizons science team member from Southwest Research Institute (SwRI) in Boulder, Colorado.

Initial estimates of MU69's diameter, based primarily on data taken by the Hubble Space Telescope since the KBO's discovery in 2014, fall in the 12-25-mile range—though data from this summer's ground-based occultation observations might imply it's at or even below the smallest sizes expected before the June 3 occultation.

Besides MU69's size, the readings offer details on other aspects of the Kuiper Belt object.

"These results are telling us something really interesting," said New Horizons Principal Investigator Alan Stern, of SwRI. "The fact that we accomplished the occultation observations from every planned observing site but didn't detect the object itself likely means that either MU69 is highly reflective and smaller than some expected, or it may be a binary or even a swarm of smaller bodies left from the time when the planets in our solar system formed."



More data are on the way, with additional occultations of MU69 occurring on July 10 and July 17. On July 10, NASA's airborne Stratospheric Observatory for Infrared Astronomy (SOFIA) will use its powerful 100-inch (2.5-meter) telescope to probe the space around MU69 for debris that might present a hazard to New Horizons as it flies by in 18 months.

On July 17, the Hubble Space Telescope also will check for debris around MU69, while team

members set up another ground-based "fence line" of small mobile telescopes along the predicted ground track of the occultation shadow in southern Argentina to try to better constrain, or even determine, the size of MU69.

The New Horizons spacecraft was launched from Earth in 2006. After a nine-year journey, on July 14, 2015, it passed 7,800 miles above the surface of Pluto, making it the first spacecraft to explore the dwarf planet. It took until October

25, 2016, for the last of the recorded data from the Pluto flyby, New Horizons was maneuvered for its next destination—a flyby of MU69, expected to take place on January 1, 2019, when it will be approximately 4 billion miles away from planet Earth.

We're all more-or-less aware of certain realities that surround us and define our day-to-day reality. We live here in Southern California, in the Sierra Madre area, with hills to the north, and various waterways to our east and west in this coastal desert plain. Approximately 80% of the water that we need for daily life comes from afar. We know there are way too many people living here for the local ecology to support, so not only does our water come from afar, but so does our food, our power, and nearly all of the goods that fill the supermarket and hardware store shelves. The streets and apartments get steadily more crowded.

If you live here, you're aware of these physical realities. You're no doubt doing your best every day to get to work and the store and school and to support your family so your life situation can improve. Most of us are aware of the larger physical reality of living here, but the necessities of our life keep that reality as a subtle background awareness. It isn't something we tend to think about a lot.

That is, we don't think about this unless there is an immediate, or impending, crisis.

The recent several-years drought forced most of us, including city and state leaders, to begin the slow process of re-thinking how we do things, especially as it relates to water. This is because the lifestyle that we have all somewhat automatically chosen to live is not sustainable. We've created a world in the sprawling Los Angeles basin that is powered by the auto, where houses are packed into every imaginable piece of ground, where developers seek to maximize the economic utility of every bit of real estate, and local politicians are all too happy to support this unsustainable mindset.

Our chosen lifestyle is stressful on the landscape, and stressful on our nerves. It requires bringing in water from afar, with electricity generated far away, a world kept alive by countless services from within and without.

One of the great ironies of this dream world is that, though we must bring in water from afar to support our population, we then divert the water that we do get here quickly out to the ocean in the network of channelized rivers that have been created over the past century. We know why this is done, of course, because natural rivers want to go this way and that when the heavy rains are falling. So we channel our valuable water out to ocean as quickly as possible to protect our valuable real estate that was built too close to the river in the first place.

Solutions abound, of course. Many pioneers have been taking bold steps to move us away from the disasters that will be the consequence of our choices. Let's explore just a few of those solutions.

The trend towards drought tolerant lawns is a step in the right direction. Since about 80% of our water comes from afar, we don't need green lawns just for

the sake of aesthetics.

With the water that we do use, everything but the toilet water can and should go into yards, where it is feasible to do so, to water landscaping plants, fruit trees, and gardens. This naturally requires the use of safe detergents, such as the Seventh Generation brand, or the Ed Begley Jr. brand. Plus, the building and safety department of each city needs to seriously review its view of gray water recycling. Gray water recycling is something that can be done very easily, economically, and safely, but the city's stringent requirements are costly and more of an impediment than any sort of encouragement to go this route.

Composting toilets are another idea whose time has come. Yes, they must be maintained properly, and they are not as care-free as flush toilets. Yet, consider the vast swath of human history where the toilet contents because a fertilizer for certain crops, with no need to waste vast volumes of water. As we think to a sustainable future, the compost toilets can be improved so they can be a staple in most households.

The Southland's water issues will only get worse as time goes on, as a function of increasing population. It is instructive to review records of our area from 100+ years ago, when the water table was higher and when the landscape looked green, not like a desert. One of the solutions looking to the future is to quit planting inappropriate landscaping plants, some of which are incredibly water-thirsty. The eucalyptus tree, for example, is one of the highest water-users and wells have been known to dry up after they are planted. They also "poison" the soil so that other more useful plants will not thrive. Far better is to follow the lead of such groups as Tree People and other tree-planting groups plant appropriate native trees.

These are just a few ways in which we can go back to the future. I envision a plan that will look 200 years into the future, allowing us to voluntarily move into a culture that is sustainable for this area. I call this Initiative-2217, a long-term vision which will be a unifying project of numerous groups working towards viable solutions. I will be sharing more of these details as the months proceed.

LOS ANGELES COUNTY ADDS TWO SIKORSKY S70I FIREHAWK HELICOPTERS TO FIRE-FIGHTING ARSENAL

LOS ANGELES COUNTY — To enhance the Fire Department's fleet of fire-fighting aircraft, the Board of Supervisors authorized the acquisition of two Sikorsky S70i Firehawk helicopters for the Department's Air Operations Section, announced Supervisor Kathryn Bargar.

"This acquisition supplements our county's potent aerial fire-fighting arsenal and our ability to

knock down wildfires to protect life and property," Bargar said.

At a cost of nearly \$29.45 million, the two aircraft will be customized to include a 1,000-gallon water tank, custom landing gear, rescue hoist, and other specialized systems. Scheduled for delivery in December 2017, both helicopters are anticipated to be operational by the 2018 fire season.

LOS ANGELES COUNTY RAISES DOG LIMIT FROM 3 TO 4 PER HOUSEHOLD

LOS ANGELES COUNTY — On a motion by Supervisors Kathryn Bargar and Hilda Solis, the Board of Supervisors unanimously approved an amendment to the existing municipal code to allow up to four dogs per household in unincorporated areas.

"By increasing the number of dogs allowed per household from 3 to 4, we are hoping to encourage

responsible pet owners to consider adopting an additional dog from one of our county shelters," said Supervisor Bargar.

Other counties in the state also provide a similar four-dog ordinance including San Diego and San Bernardino. In order to have more than four dogs, one must be licensed as an animal facility, most commonly used for groomers, kennels or pet shops.

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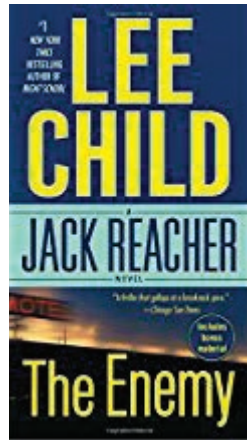
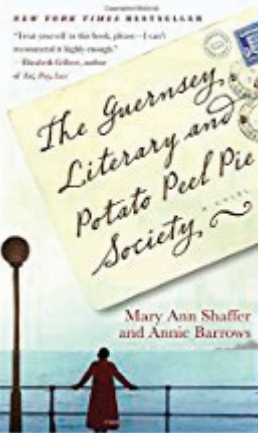

Sting-Ray Afternoons: A Memoir by Steve Rushin

A wild and bittersweet memoir of a classic '70s childhood. It's a story of the 1970s. Of a road trip in a wood-paneled station wagon, with the kids in the way-back, singing along to the Steve Miller Band. Brothers waking up early on Saturday mornings for five consecutive hours of cartoons and advertising jingles that they'll be humming all day. A father-one of 3M's greatest and last eight-track-salesman fathers-traveling across the country on the brand-new Boeing 747, providing for his family but wanting nothing more than to get home. It's Steve Rushin's story: of growing up within a '70s landscape populated with Bic pens, Mr. Clean and Scrubbing Bubbles, lightsabers and those oh-so-coveted Schwinn Sting-Ray bikes. Sting-Ray Afternoons paints an utterly fond, psychedelically vibrant, laugh-out-loud-funny portrait of an exuberant decade. The Guernsey Literary and Potato Peel Pie Society by Annie Barrows & Mary Ann Shaffer

"I wonder how the book got to Guernsey? Perhaps there is some sort of secret homing instinct in books that brings them to their perfect readers." January 1946: London is emerging from the shadow of the Second World War, and writer Juliet Ashton is looking for her next book subject. Who could imagine that she would find it in a letter from a man she's never met, a native of the island of Guernsey, who has come across her name written inside a book by Charles Lamb....As Juliet and her new correspondent exchange letters, Juliet is drawn into the world of this man and his friends—and what a



wonderfully eccentric world it is. The Guernsey Literary and Potato Peel Pie Society—born as a spur-of-the-moment alibi when its members were discovered breaking curfew by the Germans occupying their island—boasts a charming, funny, deeply human cast of characters, from pig farmers to phrenologists, literature lovers all. The Enemy (Jack Reacher) by Lee Child

WHAT IS PORTABILITY AND HOW CAN IT BENEFIT YOU AND YOUR FAMILY?

The legal concept of “portability” is still relatively new in estate planning, having become available only after 2011. Since then, it's been both a blessing (for its tax saving benefit) and a curse (because of rules that seem to be constantly shifting). Fortunately, the IRS has recently clarified some important details about portability.

So how can a portability election benefit you and your family? It could help save hundreds of thousands of dollars of estate and gift taxes for your family if you lost your husband or wife within the last few years. Although the exact mechanics of the tax remain complicated, portability makes it much easier for estate planners and tax professionals to save taxes for you and your family. But be aware, portability is not automatic (even under the new regulations), so you must take action to claim it.

Why should I care?

Portability allows a surviving spouse to inherit and use the estate tax exemption from a deceased spouse. If you're planning isn't as good as it could have otherwise been,

portability can save hundreds of thousands of dollars of estate and gift taxes. And for those who are proactively planning, it also makes crafting your trust or will much more flexible so we can tailor the plan more towards you and your family's needs, and less to the needs of the IRS.

What's new with portability?

Under a new IRS revenue procedure, you now have additional time to take advantage of portability. In the past, you had only 15 months after the death of a loved one to file for portability. Now, you now have two years after the passing of a spouse to file for portability, making this option much easier to use than before.

The IRS is also allowing a unique opportunity to file a late portability estate tax return, as long as you meet certain requirements and have it submitted by January 2, 2018.

On the other hand, if you have a substantial estate (over \$5.49 million) or are not a US citizen or resident alien then the traditional 15-month rule will continue to apply to you. Also, like any legal or tax issue, it's always a good idea to obtain qualified assistance as early as possible so you can have the widest possible set of options and the best likely outcome.

What do I need to do now?

If you lost your spouse after 2011 and haven't yet spoken with an estate planning attorney about your options, now is the time. As the stock market and housing markets have recovered in the last few years, it might be worth a second look to see if a portability election is right for you and your family, even if you previously decided against one. But whatever you decide to do, do it sooner rather than later. January 2, 2018, will be here before you know it.

THE ART OF WAR: A GUIDEBOOK FOR BUSINESS SUCCESS

Initial apologies are in order to those who take offense to the use of war as a teaching tool for entrepreneurs, but the lessons found in the study of military strategy are too numerous and too valuable to bypass. On a positive note we can glean important lessons to apply to business from any situation, including The Art of War, an ancient military treatise that has influenced war strategy for more than 2,000 years.

Attributed to Sun Tzu (pronounced “Sun Wu” or “Sunzi”), a high-ranking general, strategist and tactician, The Art of War is composed of 13 chapters, each devoted to a specific aspect of warfare. Sun Tzu is thought to have lived at some time between 771-476 B.C., the time period recognized by some historians as China's Spring and Autumn Period. Some historians have questioned Sun Tzu's authenticity, wondering if he was a real person or simply a created legendary persona, but some facts are unquestionable.

The year 1772 marked the beginning of the book's importance on an international scale when it was translated into French. The first completed English version was published in 1905. Although intended as a guidebook for the most debased of mankind's activities of destruction, The Art of War continues to have a profound impact on planning, strategy and tactics for military, business and legal applications. We can approach a study of this document with the goal of identifying the silver linings that can be applied for productive enterprise toward economic stimulus and job creation.

The following list includes the area of focus detailed in each of the 13 chapters in The Art of War. The Chinese-to-English translation may have varying nuances regarding the meaning of specific words, but the principles are ready-made to apply to business.

Assessment – take a look at everything and layout your plans

Economize – proceed in a manner that won't exhaust

all of your efforts and resources in one single engagement

Maximize – work smarter, not harder by outsmarting and outwitting your opponent

Formidability – establish yourself in the best position possible, then be flexible as to when you need to attack (proceed aggressively) and when you need to defend (protect your turf)

Intangibility – fight head-on when needed and indirectly when it is to your advantage

Imperceptibility – operate under the illusion of what you want your enemy (competitor) to know about you, while being tactical with the implementation of your real plan

Out-Maneuver – be clever and perhaps fire the first shot (be the first to do something new, but do it with excellence), even if silently; don't put yourself into a position that will force you to be reactive

Strategy – use your knowledge of your opponents, allies and terrain to your advantage in every situation

Vigilance – keep moving and maneuvering your team toward your ultimate goal

Situational Positioning – pick the best strategy and use the tactics most appropriate to the terrain on which you operate

The Nine Terrains* – become a master at knowing the nine types of environments in which you will operate so that you will appropriately apply the principle above (*dispersive, facile, contentious, open, in midst of intersecting highways, serious, difficult, hemmed-in and desperate)

Use Fire – attack with fervor and passion; move fast like the wind, but apply the passion only to the areas that will result in strategic advantage

Intelligence – the use of spies; knowledge of enemy's dispositions

The relevance of these principles today indicates that some things never change. It also shows that there are important lessons to be learned from the past

A YEAR-ROUND SOLUTION TO THE RISING COST OF HEALTH INSURANCE

In contrast to the routine use of pharmaceutical medication that can result in drug dependence for conditions that may be addressed through changes to food choices, physical activity and other factors. WHAT FREEDOM OF SPEECH REALLY MEANS

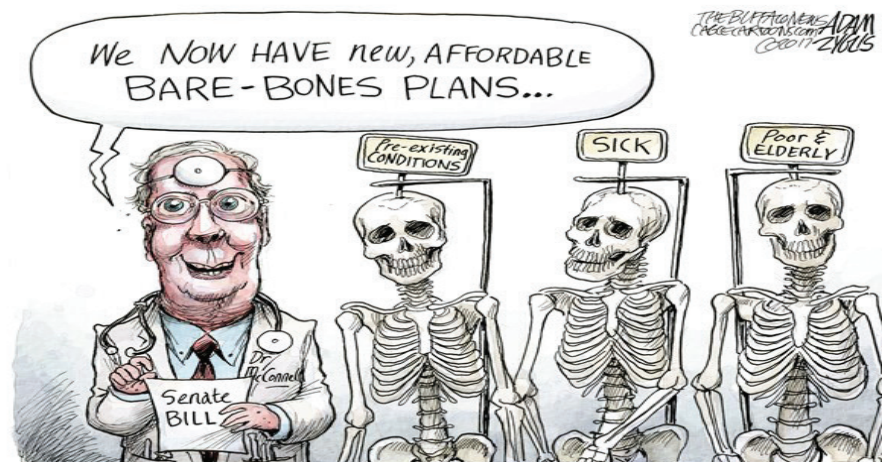

THINGS ARE VERY, VERY BAD FOR DONALD TRUMP

President Donald Trump took to Twitter on Tuesday to call his son, Don Jr., now surely the Fredo Trumpleone of America's ruling clan, a "great person who loves his country."

That may well be true. I don't pretend to have any insight into what is in Trump the Younger's Heart. There should be a baseline assumption that all Americans are, to some extent or another, patriotic.

But it is also equally true that he is shockingly naive, at least, colossally stupid at worst, or merely disgustingly cynical, for actively seeking information in June 2016 from an apparent agent of hostile power intended to undermine his father's political opponent.

In a Tweets that Kathleen Parker of The Washington Post accurately describes as "collusion-y," Trump Jr. confirmed that he, White House consigliere Jared Kushner and former Trump campaign chairman Paul Manafort, sat down with Kremlin-connected lawyer Natalia Veselnitskaya.

The meeting was set up by music impresario Rob Goldstone, who told Trump that a Russian contact (Veselnitskaya) had information that "would incriminate Hillary [Clinton] and her dealings with Russia and would be very useful to your father. This is obviously very high level and sensitive information but is part of Russia and its government's support for Mr. Trump."

Trump Jr. stunningly, responded, "If it's what you say, I love it especially later in the summer." What?

Veselnitskaya has issued the expected denial that she never possessed "damaging or sensitive information about Hillary Clinton. It was never my intention to have that."

Asked by NBC News how the Trumpies could have arrived at such a conclusion, Veselnitskaya said that "it is quite possible that maybe they were longing for such an information. They wanted it so badly that they could only hear the thought that they wanted."

It is also quite possible to imagine Veselnitskaya laughing inwardly to herself, in a very Russian way, at Trump Jr. being caught in such a snare.

In the wake of his son's appearance on administration PR agent/Fox News host Sean Hannity's program on Tuesday, Trump tweeted that DJTR was now the subject of the "greatest witch hunt in political history."

Let's be clear: Campaigns seek out, and compile, damaging information about their rivals all the time.

So, on one level, Trump Jr. was correct that he's not the first person to take a meeting to learn about such stuff.

But there is a bright-line distinction between run-of-the mill opposition research, such as compiling a dossier on a candidate's past, conflicting statements, financial dealings, or voting records, and meeting with an apparent agent of a hostile foreign power set on tilting the election to the then-presumptive Republican nominee.

Any campaign operative with a grain of sense would tell you that they would have not taken such a meeting. And they would have gone to authorities -- as Al Gore's campaign did in 2000, when it received a debate briefing book stolen from rival George W. Bush.

"Every other campaign would have called the FBI," tweeted Norman Eisen, a former Obama official and the chairman of Citizens for Responsibility and Ethics.

But they didn't. And that matters. A quick historical note: We've been down this road before.

In 1996, the Democratic National Committee was forced to return \$2.8 million in campaign contributions that originated from questionable or illegal sources -- likely China.

Then, as now, allegations built to a fever-pitch. A Democratic fund-raiser, John Huang, pleaded guilty to two, minor offenses. But major allegations against the DNC, and the Clinton White House itself, evaporated.

The difference now, however, is that Trump Jr., has very publicly admitted to taking that meeting with Veselnitskaya. And it's a sure bet that Special Counsel Robert Mueller is looking at it very closely. Still, that's a long way from charges, conviction, or impeachment, or any of the other daydreams Democrats have of toppling a White House that is its own worst enemy on its very best days.

But any claim that the Trump campaign did not have dealings with Russia has now been soundly blown out of the water. It was a lie to begin with. And now it's been backed up by Trump the Younger's own emails.

As the man himself would say, "Very bad."

WHAT WILL IT TAKE FOR REPUBLICANS TO SAY ENOUGH IS ENOUGH?



Kudos to Reed Galen - a lifelong Republican, veteran of three presidential campaigns, son of former Republican operative Rich Galen - for articulating the obvious truths that his cowardly party brethren loath to admit.

After hearing the bombshell news that dim princeling Donald Trump Jr. gleefully emailed "I love it" at the prospect of getting Russian intel about Hillary, and took the meeting with Jared Kushner and campaign manager Paul Manafort, Galen cut loose.

"The Republican Party I was born into and worked in for two decades is nearly gone...Far from (advocating) a strong national defense, far too many members of the GOP appear ready and willing to die on the hill for a president who certainly would not do the same for them," Galen wrote. "How long will Republican leaders on Capitol Hill continue to defend the president, his family, and the strange actions related to one of our foremost foreign opponents?...How much longer will they man the ramparts for him?"

How much longer indeed. Because even now, even after top Trumpsters have finally been caught copying to collusion with the enemy, elected Republican leaders are still refusing to speak out. What's their definition of a smoking gun - a video of Trump sleeping with Putin's hackers?

What we got from senators of the party that once prided itself for being tough on Russia was denialism and silence. Orrin Hatch said the emails are not "relevant to the administration." John Cornyn, the Republican whip, said, "I don't really have a reaction." Tom Cotton took refuge behind a closed door. Charles Grassley tried to praise Jr. for releasing the emails, somehow forgetting that he released the emails only because The New York Times was poised to do it first, and that Junior's coerced transparency came after two days of lies about his meeting with the Kremlin-connected lawyer.

Basically, they're still fine with Russia penetrating our sovereignty, and with Russia's chumps running the White House into the ground, as long as they can cling to their wet dream of getting Trump's signature on a bill that slashes taxes for the wealthy and zaps health coverage for 20 million people.

Politically, Republicans do have a dilemma. If they stood tall and denounced Trump, and called for the impeachment proceedings that are so richly warranted, the Trumpkins back home would go bat-crazy. They'd stay home in the 2018 congressional midterms, convinced that Trump was being railroaded by "the Republican establishment." If I were to give Republican leaders the benefit of the doubt, I'd guess that they're waiting for a sufficient share of Trumpkins to wake up to reality - something that could conceivably happen when the revelations become too explosive to dismiss.

As Reed Galen acknowledges, "Only when the questions shift from, 'How can you take away my healthcare?' to 'How can you support a president in league with the Russians?' will we start to see any movement. Only when their home town newspapers, television and radio stations and local grandees start calling them out for their defense of indefensible behavior will Republican members stand up."

It would be nicer, of course, if Republican leaders behaved like leaders instead of followers. And there are plenty of people in the conservative commentariat to help stiffen their spines. On Fox News, right-wing pundit Charles Krauthammer remarked on Donald Junior's emails: "To say 'I love it' contradicts six months of stories (denying any links to Russia). I defended them because, up until today, there was no there there. Now there is a there."

Do Republicans on the Hill not think it's significant that Trump's eldest son took the meeting, and brought two other insiders to the meeting, without having checked out and vetted the Russian with whom they were meeting? In Junior's own words, he "was not told the name of the person I would be meeting with beforehand." That's worse than amateur hour; that's a security risk. What a disgrace that no Republican yesterday saw fit to condemn it.

And who's filling their moral vacuum? Trump. He tweeted madly this morning, most notably this gem: "Remember, when you hear the words 'sources say' from the Fake Media, often times those sources are made up and do not exist." Alas, his tiresome agitprop has been trumped by the words of his high-quality son.

All told, says Reed Galen, "Every new angry tweetstorm pushes us further down the road to instability. President Trump is facing a crisis likely of his own making and certainly of his own behavior. Republicans need to be Americans first and tell him enough is enough: Put the country first; or let someone govern who will."

"Country first." At the end of the day, how is that not a no-brainer?

Schumer will do what Harry Reid did when he was boss -- make sure no House bill ever comes up for a vote in the Senate.

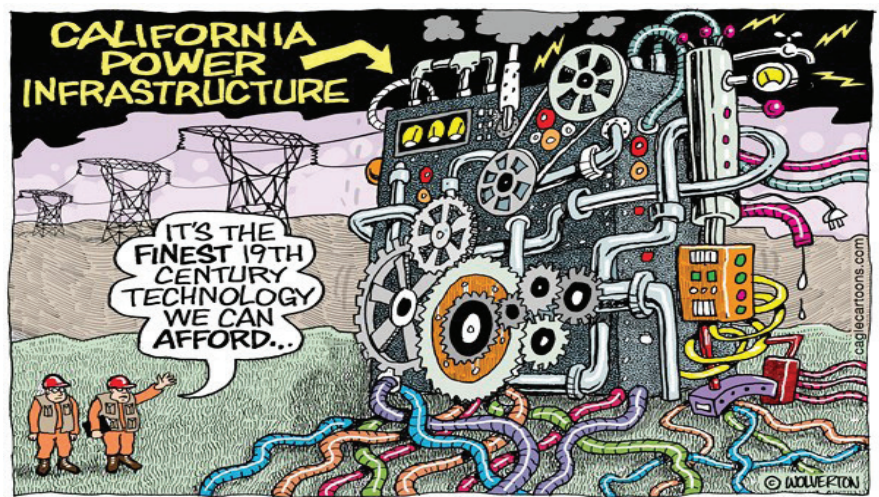
At least this week the Senate took President Trump's hint and put off their summer vacations for two weeks.

On July 11, 2017 the City Council of the City of Sierra Madre introduced for second reading Ordinance No. 1389 recommending adoption of Municipal Code Text Amendment 17-04. This summary is published pursuant to Government Code Section 36933(c)(1) and a full and complete certified copy of the text of Ordinance 1379 is available at the Sierra Madre City Manager's Office located at City of Sierra Madre City Hall, 232 W. Sierra Madre Blvd., Sierra Madre, CA. Ordinance 1389 becomes effective on August 11, 2017. For further information on this subject, please contact the Planning and Community Preservation Department at (626) 355-7138.

The purpose of the R-3 Zone amendment is to revise the standards applicable to residential-medium/high density residential development and to provide consistency with other zoning requirements that affect multiple chapters of the Zoning Code. The amendments include the following revisions:

- Chapter 17.08 Definitions – Amend the definition of height for the purpose of simplifying the reference point on the roof of a structure used to measure its height; and change the title of a minor conditional use permit to administrative design review permit.
- Chapter 17.20 R-1 Zone – Incorporate new design review and administrative design review permit requirements for certain projects that currently require a minor variance, minor conditional use permit or conditional use permit.
- Chapter 17.28 R-3 Zone – Amendments include a revision to the title of the ordinance to "R-3 Medium/High Density Residential Zone"; a title change to 17.28.070 to "Design review permit required;" Omitting Section 17.28.130 Signs; incorporates new graphics to illustrate the calculation of building height, angle-plane measurement for yards abutting an R-1 Zone, and articulation of exterior walls. Further amendments include revisions to 'Legal non-conforming R-3 sites,' 'Rezoned, newly created or reconfigured lots,' 'Permitted uses' and 'Conditionally permitted uses,' 'Other uses and construction activities,' and 'Standards for development.' Section 17.28.130 omits the multi-family building sign standards and incorporates them in Chapter 17.72 Signs.
- Chapter 17.30 R-C Zone amendments incorporates new design review and administrative design review permit requirements for certain projects that require a minor conditional use permit or conditional use permit.
- The purpose of the amendment to Chapter 17.60 is to revise the title of the chapter to "Variances and Discretionary Permit", and revise Sections 17.60.040 and 17.60.041 to incorporate the purpose, reviewing authority, review procedure and findings for administrative design review permits and design review permits. The amendment also includes the addition of Section 17.60.058 to include a procedure to address projects with multiple discretionary applications, and eliminates the requirement for approval of a conditional use permit for all development in the R-3 Zone.
- The purpose of the amendment to Chapter 17.72 Signs is to revise the existing sign requirements for the R-3 Zone under Section 17.72.050, include regulation that all signs be non-illuminated and a requirement that all signs are mounted flat to the wall.
- Chapter 17.76 Condominium and Apartment Projects – The proposed amendment is to delete the Chapter in its entirety. Justification for removal is that the Chapter is obsolete in that the definitions within the Section are not cross referenced anywhere else in the Zoning Code and are already defined in Chapter 17.08 Definitions; The R-3 Ordinance already provides development procedures for multi-family projects; and Title 16 of the Sierra Madre Municipal Code provides regulations regarding Subdivisions.

APPEAL: If in the future anyone wishes to challenge the decision of the City Council in court, one may be limited to raising the issues that were raised or presented in written correspondence delivered to the City Council at, or before, the scheduled public hearing.
