4TH OF JULY GRAND MARSHAL STEVE HEYDORFF

The volunteers of the Sierra Madre 4th of July Committee are pleased and excited to announce that the 2018 Fourth of July Parade Grand Marshal will be Sierra Madre's very own Steve Heydorff. "The Grand Marshal is a person or persons whose efforts over a long period of time has been beneficial to the community of Sierra Madre. The title of Grand Marshal is intended to honor a person or persons' volume of work, dedication and overall enhancements to our community." Steve recently retired as Sierra Madre's Fire Chief after serving 37 years (mostly volunteer) on the Sierra Madre Fire Department. Steve really is our Hometown Hero making a difference in our lives every day.

Steve spent the last 39 years making Sierra Madre his home. He moved here in 1979 with his wife Lynette and eventually they raised two daughters, Farrell and Gillian. His first volunteer act was the building of a covered bridge in the Sierra Madre Canyon on Brookside Lane.

Chief Heydorff joined the then Volunteer Fire Department in 1981, became a volunteer Engineer in 1985, volunteer EMT in 1988, volunteer Captain in 1989, and in 2001 continuing his volunteer duties and began serving part-time in the City's Fire Prevention Bureau.

In 1993 serving on a State Strike Team Steve visited four major fires in a 56 hour period including Kineloa-Mesa, Anaheim Hills, Laguna and Malibu. In 2002, he was promoted to volunteer Battalion Chief and in 2003 spent



a month helping in Mississippi and Louisiana after Hurricane Katrina. In 2006 he was hired by the City as the Director of Fire Services and in 2007 was elected as the City's last and final Volunteer Fire Chief. The position was transitioned to a paid Chief by the City in 2008. Over the course of his service in Sierra Madre, he responded to over 9000 calls, was the leading force to bring paramedic service to the community and assisted the City with the transition from the last volunteer fire department in Los Angeles County to a combination model. He's final act was to create a children's education area next to the Station so youth tours could continue and kids could learn what

firefighters do while on the job.

In his free time, Steve and local firefighter Charlie Childs opened the Sierra Madre Brewing Company in 1997 at the Old Ice House on Montecito and he got his pilot license.

Steve proudly states that his biggest accomplishment is seeing all the career firefighters who began their careers volunteering right here in Sierra Madre, finding their passion and following their dreams.

Overall, as a true Hometown Hero, Steve is a dedicated husband, father and friend to many. He is funny, kind, generous, and a whole-heartedly devoted contributor to our town; a shining example of the sort of person who makes Sierra Madre such a magical place to live.

TOO MUCH TRAFFIC IN THE VILLAGE?

Is technology eroding the village nature of Sierra Madre

Despite the best efforts of the citizens of Sierra Madre, the world beyond its boundaries are slowly bringing about unwanted changes. In this instance the villain isn't some money grubbing capitalist, but rather the town has become another victim via the unintentional consequence of technology.

Last week this paper reported on an accident caused by an out of control vehicle. Earlier this week, the Mountain Views News was contacted by resident Scott Bernstein who was a few feet away from the scene and who narrowly escaped being struck by the SUV. Still audibly shaken, Bernstein who is blind, was in the yard with his service dog when it happened. While sharing the details of his harrowing experience, the conversation changed to the increased frequency of traffic and its impact on Sierra Madre.

While it is a fact that the population of Sierra Madre has not fluctuated much in the last few decades (10,000 – 11,000+ residents), it is also a fact that the amount of traffic that traverses the streets has increased dramatically.

So, if the demographics of the town is pretty stable, what has changed? According to Captain Donna Cayson the number of traffic incidents, including accidents and moving violations such as speeding and illegal turns is on a steady rise. Streets like Grandview, Sierra Madre Boulevard, Orange Grove, Mountain Trail, Highland, Lima and Sunnyside have been burdened with additional traffic without any regard for the the expected safety and tranquility of the town. Much of the increased traffic is believed to be the result of motorists' increased use of GPS systems such as WAZE which encourages users to go through city streets and avoid slow freeway traffic. The headline of a story that appeared in the *New York Times* last year perhaps said it best, "Navigation Apps Are Turning Quiet Neighborhoods Into Traffic Nightmares." Smartphone services like Google Maps, Waze and Apple Maps, send too much traffic through the heretofore quiet streets in town. Add to that the propensity of some residents to get everywhere in a hurry, signs like one posted on Sunnyside have started to appear. It says, "Drive like your child lives here"

So what can be done to suppress this unwanted traffic flow? Residents like Bernstein would like to see more speed bumps in town. Others would like to see more enforcement activities.

The city is very aware of the growing problem, as residents do express their traffic concerns to City Hall according to CM Gabe Engeland. The challenge however, is to find solutions that not only help curtail the Sierra Madre 210 Alternative traffic flow, but does not have a negative impact on the residents of Sierra Madre who want to keep the town with safe streets and traffic light free.

REMEMBRANCE JOHN ROBINSON

John W. Robinson, well-respected Southern California historian, hiker, and author, who's Sierra Madre's Old Mount Wilson Trail about our local hiking trail is a favorite in town, has died at the age of 88. John died in his sleep on April 25 after a short hospice stay. He had been residing in Colorado for several years in order to be closer to his family. His daughter Cathy reports that she visited with her father a few hours before he passed. The hospice had him on medication, so he was not in pain, and even though he was not "awake", she felt that he could hear her. She played his favorite big band and jazz music and read to him from many of the articles that John had written over the years. Cathy says he left this world in peace.



He was to be cremated on Friday, April 27, with the family sending his ashes to California for a memorial service to be announced.

John's most popular book, Trails of the Angeles: 100 Hikes in the San Gabriels was first published in May 1971 and has been continuously updated and in print since then. With the eighth edition (April 2005) John took on a co-author, Doug Christiansen, to help with some of the hiking updates that John could no longer physically take care of. The ninth edition was released in July of 2013. He has also written about the history of our local mountains in The San Gabriels, which continues to be considered the ultimate guide to this beautiful mountain range. In 2005, Robinson published Gateways to Southern California, a comprehensive work that tells the fascinating history of the mountain passes and trails used by the pioneers and settlers who built Southern California. John considered this book his "magnum opus" and the culmination of his lifetime of work. Additionally, he published many other books about Southern California mountain ranges, along with several booklets, and wrote numerous articles for a wide variety of publications.

John was a native of California, born in Long Beach, July 8, 1929. He graduated from the University of Southern California in 1951 with a B.A., and from California State University, Long Beach in 1966 with an M.A. He taught school for 35 years, with the last 32 of those years in the Newport-Mesa Unified School District in Orange County. John's love of the outdoors led him to hike the mountains of Southern California, where he gained a firsthand insight of the trails and unique history of the ranges. In his early years he was an avid backpacker and mountain climber in rugged locations ranging from Mexico to Alaska.

In 1992, John received the Donald H. Pflueger Award from the Historical Society of Southern California, for excellence in writing local history. He received the Westerners International's Coke award for best journal articles in 1990 and 1994. And in October 2005, Robinson was made a Fellow of the Historical Society of Southern California, honoring "exceptional lifetime achievements that have brought distinction to history."

On the local Sierra Madre front, Dr. Bill White, long time friend of John's and historian of local mountain lore, is planning a Sierra Madre celebration of John's life. The plans are still in the works, but a tentative date has been set for the Saturday after the Mt. Wilson Trail Race later this month. Details will be announced by Dr. White later in the month. John was an integral part of Dr. White's Hikes Into History that were held for many years and based out of Lizzie's Trail Inn, and many of our area residents will recall fondly hiking and exploring in our local San Gabriel mountains with John Robinson as he led the group and told stories about the mountains and the people who have inhabited them.

WALKING SIERRA MADRE... The Social Side By Deanne Davis

"Almost every successful person begins with two beliefs: the future can be better than the present and I have the power to make it so!"

Who I am today, dear friends and neighbors, is a person who can type "A" with impunity as my little finger now works like the other ones! My hand surgery was a complete and total success and I couldn't be more pleased. There was practically no pain and I was out planting some new lavender plants in just a day or two. Duypuytrens Contracture is no longer part of my life and as soon as I get the stitches out on May 14th and do my exercises - making a fist and then seeing if I can press my whole hand down flat - I will be typing with all ten fingers to my heart's desire. I appreciate all those of you who sent good thoughts and prayers my way; it helped!

There was an article a few days ago in the Star News, "Empty Bowls" event flips idea of a soup line," by Steve Scauzillo, regarding an opportunity by Family Promise of San Gabriel Valley to choose a ceramic soup bowl created by a local artisan and partake of some soup, some fellowship, some really nifty cookies and a chance to walk away with a tremendous prize at the silent auction. Sierra Madre Methodist Church hosted Family Promise last Sunday, April 29th from noon to three. Entry was \$30 in advance or \$35 day of event and all the proceeds go toward families who are struggling to regain homes. I walked away with a gorgeous hand-thrown footed bowl in variegated blues and greens, which was held for me while I took a few pictures, by Jackie Satti. Everyone there couldn't have been more friendly and welcoming and I was astonished to learn this was the nonprofit's seventh annual Empty Bowls event. Family Promise has a network of fifteen churches in the San Gabriel Valley where families can seek shelter, "helping homeless children by assisting their families to stay intact and regain stable housing and employment within a supportive, volunteer-driven community." The ultimate vision of Family Promise is to empower local communities to end homelessness in the San Gabriel Valley. Now that's a really worthy goal!

Here are a few of the folks who provided food: Green Street Restaurant, Heirloom Bakery, Margarita's Mexican Kitchen, North Woods Inn, our own Poppy Cake Baking Company, Souplantation, Subway, Urban Plates and a bunch of others. Soup choices included Beef Barley, Italian White Bean, Corn Chowder,

Minestrone, Chicken Posole, any of which you could have ladeled into your beautiful new ceramic bowl. There were at least a couple of hundred people gathered around round tables in the fellowship hall at Sierra Madre Methodist, laughing, chatting and mopping up their soup with the gorgeous bread which was on each table. Of course, there were occasional dashes toward the silent auction to up bids on the prizes...which were really super prizes!

Trader Joe's put up more than one basket; there was the Home Spa basket which included robes, vanilla shower gel, a shiatsu massage pillow and Ghirardelli mint chocolates. There was a 50" TV, a nice basket from Claim Jumper and many more.

Shirley Tatsuno, who has been part of Family Promise since 2011, showed me a mockup of what the churches involved with Family Promise provide for families who are in need. This included a nice mattress with sheets centered on a tarp, a lovely children's area with books and toys and, being inside a church facility meant safety and security as host congregations take turns housing families each week, offering meals and warm hospitality. Children go to school during the day and parents work or meet with case managers at the HOPE Center to find jobs and stable housing. The picture here is of the soup area and I wish I could show you the table where Jackie Satti was helping folks choose their beautiful, one-of-a-kind ceramic bowl. All I can say was this was just wonderful and I plan to go again next year. If you're interested, you can contact Family Promise at: www.familypromisegv.org. You already know that about 58,000 people are homeless in Los Angeles and more children and families are experiencing homelessness than ever before.

Plant something this week! I put in a new geranium, some dahlias, a pink petunia and a couple of lavender plants. They all look spectacular and my camellia is still blooming mightily, which makes me smile every time I walk out my front door! Sierra Madre is filled with flowers. We are so blessed!



Candidate in PCC President Search Drops Out

Candidate forums canceled

Pasadena City College officials said Friday that Dr. Cliff Davis, vice chancellor of the Ozark Technical Community College System in Springfield, Mo., and president of the Ozarks Technical College Table Rock campus, dropped out as the last candidate for PCC president, forcing the school to start the search over.

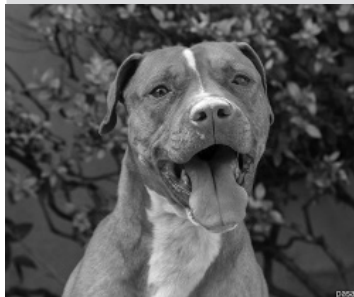
In a letter to students faculty and staff Friday the school said two forums scheduled Monday at noon and 5 p.m. have been canceled.

In a special meeting Friday morning the PCC Board of Trustees voted to negotiate a contract to keep current President Dr. Rajen Vurdien through June 2019.

A new president search time line was also approved starting June 13 with the board approving the selection of an executive search firm and job announcement; September 7 Application packages due to the college; October 17 Board of Trustees select candidates to interview; November 10 Candidates interviewed and top two or three selected; December 10-11 Finalists meet the students faculty and staff on campus and December 19 with the board selection of superintendent/president.

The board also approved the creation of a committee to review, suggest changes to, or update its bylaws governing the executive search process. The committee will consist of tree members each of the Board of Trustees, tenured faculty, managers and classified staff. Board members said they expect work by the committee to be completed before June 6.

Golf Course Could Become City Park

Pasadena City Manager Steve Mermell confirmed Friday that city officials were in talks with Los Angeles County over a possible takeover of Eaton Canyon Golf Course —if approved, they would close the nine hole course in East Pasadena to be used as park space.

"The county approached the city and said they were interested in transferring [Eaton Canyon Golf Course] —and if the city was interested in taking it over as a golf course?" Mermell said. "We are interested in it as a park only."

He said they were in the very

early stages of discussions, "nothing has been finalized, nothing has gone to the county board of supervisors. Its all conceptual at this point."

"There would have to be a covenant that says its for open space, we're not going to use it to build homes," Mermell said.

He said there still needed to be an environmental report as well as a series of community meeting. The issue would also need a vote from the city council to move forward.

"I'm hopeful that in less than a year, we will get to a decision point. If the city were to get the land we would

engage in a master plan process with the community in what they would want to see for the area," he said. "But a golf course is off the table."

Mermell said that the city would lose money keeping it as a golf course. He said the course had been losing money and that is why the county is looking to offload it.

"We will never again have the opportunity to acquire that much parkland. That would be a great get for the city," he said.

Neighbors in the area had rumored the idea of soccer fields something Mermell did not rule out.

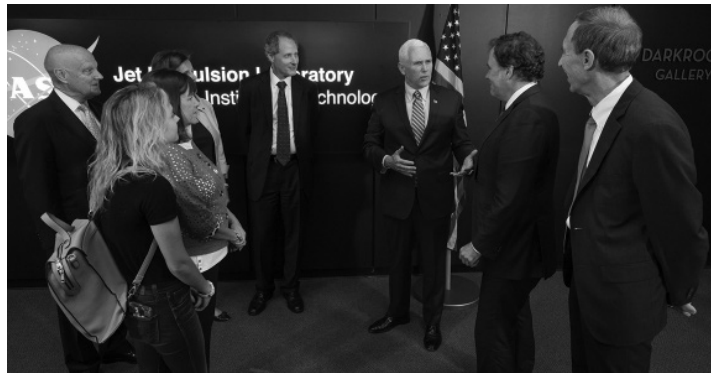

Convenient & Close to Bike Lanes – Stations should be as close as possible to key destinations and placed along streets with bike lanes or where riding is comfortable.

Vice President Mike Pence Visits JPL

Vice President Mike Pence toured the birthplace of numerous past, present and future space missions at the agency's Jet Propulsion Laboratory in Pasadena, California. Pence made the visit one week before today's scheduled launch of Mars InSight lander.

The afternoon visit by the Vice President, his wife, Karen, and daughter Charlotte, included a stop in JPL's Mission Control, where engineers will communicate with NASA's Interior Exploration using Seismic Investigations, Geodesy and Heat Transport (InSight). The Mars lander is scheduled to launch Saturday, May 5, from Vandenberg Air Force Base in California. InSight will be the first interplanetary mission ever to launch from the West Coast, and is the first-ever mission to study the interior of Mars.

The Mission Control building, a National Historic Landmark, has served as a hub for communications with countless spacecraft since 1964, including some of NASA's Apollo Moon missions, the twin Voyager spacecraft at the edge of our solar system, and the Cassini mission to Saturn. From here, Charlotte Pence had an opportunity to send commands giving the Mars Curiosity rover a day's worth of science activities. The signal took about seven minutes to travel the 80 million miles to reach Curiosity,

which has been roaming the Red Planet for almost six years.

"We were honored to show the Vice President, who has a strong commitment to space exploration, some of our special sites and space missions," said JPL Director Michael Watkins. "With JPL's rich history, which includes designing and building America's first satellite for launch in 1958, and with our cutting-edge scientific capabilities, we stand ready to advance exploration as we move forward into our revitalized space age."

The tour included a stop at the JPL Mars Yard, an outdoor test facility that simulates the Martian landscape. There, the Pence family tried their hands at maneuvering a test Mars rover. They also visited the Spacecraft Assembly Facility, where the Mars 2020 mission hardware is being assembled. Mars 2020 will search for signs of habitability in Mars' ancient past and signs of past microbial life.

The Vice President, who chairs the National Space Council, was accompanied on the tour by Watkins, JPL Deputy Director Larry James, Mars Exploration Program Director Fuk Li, Caltech President Thomas Rosenbaum, National Space Council Executive Secretary Scott Pace, and Jim Ellis, chair of the NASA Space Council Users Advisory Group. Caltech manages JPL for NASA.

MY PASTRAMI DREAMS

When my friend and superstar Personal Trainer Darrian Dalangini challenged me to find the best Pastrami in the area, I thought "easy enough, I'll check out a few places, post a few notes on my facebook site www.facebook.com/peterdills.com, and the answer will appear". I found out quickly don't argue sex, politics or who has the best pastrami sandwich in town. Before we start this argument, let's take a look at the origins of pastrami. Like **corned beef**, pastrami was originally created as a way to preserve meat before modern refrigeration. For pastrami, the raw meat is **brined**, partly dried, seasoned with various herbs and spices, then **smoked** and steamed. In the United States, although **beef plates** are the traditional cut of meat for making pastrami, it is now common to see pastrami made from **beef brisket**, **beef round**, and **turkey**.

The Romanian specialty was introduced to the United States in a wave of **Romanian Jewish** immigration from **Bessarabia** and **Romania** in the second half of the 19th century, via the **Yiddish**. Early references in English used the spelling "pastrama", closer to the Romanian original. The modified "pastrami" spelling likely was introduced to sound related to the Italian **salami**. Although New York's Sussman Volk is generally credited with producing the first pastrami sandwich in 1887, that claim is disputed by the founders of **Katz's Deli** in New York, which was founded in 1888. Volk, a kosher butcher, claimed he got the recipe from a Romanian friend in exchange for storing the friend's luggage while the friend returned to Romania. According to his descendant, Patricia Volk, Volk prepared pastrami according to the recipe and served it on sandwiches out of his butcher shop. The sandwich was so popular that Volk converted the butcher shop into a restaurant to sell pastrami sandwiches. Romanian Jews immigrated to New York as early as 1872. Among Jewish Romanians, **goose** breasts were commonly made into pastrami because they were inexpensive. Beef navels were cheaper than goose meat in America, so the Romanian Jews in America adapted their recipe and began to make the cheaper beef pastrami.

Making foods to sell out of **push carts** in the **Lower East Side** of New York was one of the most popular occupations for immigrant Jews in the latter half of the 19th century. Because sandwiches were a hugely popular foodstuff in New York, it is possible Romanian Jewish immigrants were making and selling pastrami sandwiches from push carts on the streets of New York at least a decade before Sussman Volk converted his butcher shop into a restaurant.

With a little help from my friends, here are the top three choices for a pastrami sandwich in the Pasadena/Los Angeles areas. In no particular order:

The Hat With a number of locations throughout the San Gabriel Valley, I visited the one on the corner of N. Lake and Villa in Pasadena. I ordered mine dry, and loaded up on the horseradish and spicy mustard

Johnnie Pastrami 4017 Sepulveda Blvd. Culver City. The names says it all. Although Johnnie recently passed on to the sandwich shop in the sky, visitors flock to this spot for pastrami on a buttery French roll, and ask for extra pickles.

Tied: Langers and Canters. These two veterans probably received the most passionate support with such postings as "no need to go anywhere else".

With summer just weeks away, teenagers and college students looking for seasonal employment will have to compete with the annual influx of international workers.

The State Department's Summer Work Travel Program (SWT) will once again, as it has for decades, provide an unlimited number of J-1 visas to young foreign nationals who will come to the U.S. to work at a variety of jobs. The State Department defends SWT as a valuable cultural exchange tool when in reality it's a cheap labor bonanza for employers.

The jobs include lifeguarding, waiting tables at resorts, guiding tourists through national parks, scooping ice cream and providing child care as au pairs. These are jobs that most American kids would eagerly do, given the opportunity.

But since the J-1 has no prevailing wage requirement, employers can pay the visa holders lower wages than those U.S. workers earn in similar occupations and in the same geographic region. Furthermore, employers are exempt from paying the Social Security, Medicare, federal and state unemployment taxes on J-1 visa holders who are often required to work overtime without extra compensation.

Because international students pay an average of about \$1,100 in fees to private organizations that sponsor their participation in the program, the program generates well over \$100 million in annual revenues for those organizations. Participants pay out millions more in visa fees to the State Department, and in travel expenses to and from the U.S. In the end, sponsors pay government dues to be part of the program; students pay the fees associated with the program and their own roundtrip travel expenses; employers pay nothing. Many unsuspecting SWTs return home disillusioned, often with little money saved.

The State Department's failure to oversee its own

program has led to multiple instances of exploitation like last year's Myrtle Beach case. Ten Dominican Republic college students were promised jobs at an Italian ice shop, plus adequate accommodations, but ended up keeping house and living in a bed bug-infested motel. Similar abuses have been documented in Virginia, Michigan, Pennsylvania and Mississippi.

Last year, The Wall Street Journal reported the Trump administration is considering reducing the number of visas issued under SWT. And as usual when employment-based visas are scrutinized with an eye toward cutting the total granted, businesses cry foul and falsely predict that without cheap foreign labor they'll go bankrupt.

Yet, despite well-deserved and documented criticism from labor experts who point to multiple SWT flaws, the program carries on year after year even though the unemployment rate among young Americans, and especially minorities, is high. Last summer, a survey showed that teens were about three times as likely to be unemployed as other Americans.

A few takeaways: serving gelato or waiting tables on the Boardwalk can't reasonably be considered cultural exchange. If employers offered decent wages and working conditions, they'd have little trouble attracting American kids. Moreover, shutting Americans out of the labor market has negative long-term consequences. Unemployed young adults don't learn how to interact with their peers or their often demanding bosses. They don't acquire essential work qualities like timeliness and accountability that will lead to a productive career.

The most obvious and important conclusion of all to draw from SWT is that the federal government cannot enact or efficiently monitor any type of immigration legislation that helps American workers.

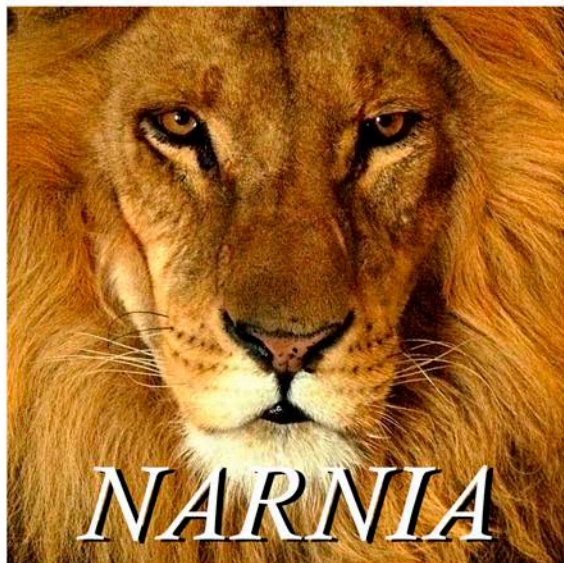

NEW SHINGLES VACCINE PROVIDES BETTER PROTECTION FOR SENIORS

Dear Savvy Senior,
A good friend of mine got a bad case of shingles last year and has been urging me to get vaccinated. Should I?
Suspicious Susan

Dear Susan,
Yes! If you're 50 or older, there's a new shingles vaccine on the market that's far superior to the older vaccine, so now is a great time to get inoculated. Here's what you should know.

Shingles, also known as herpes zoster, is a burning, blistering, often excruciating skin rash that affects around 1 million Americans each year. The same virus that causes chickenpox causes shingles. What happens is the chickenpox virus that most people get as kids never leaves the body. It hides in the nerve cells near the spinal cord and, for some people, emerges later in the form of shingles.

In the U.S., almost one out of every three people will develop shingles during their lifetime. While anyone who's had chickenpox can get shingles, it most commonly occurs in people over age 50, along with people who have weakened immune systems. But you can't catch shingles from someone else.

Early signs of the disease include pain, itching or tingling before a blistering rash appears several days later, and can last up to four weeks. The rash typically occurs on one side of the body, often as a band of blisters that extends from the middle of your back around to the breastbone. It can also appear above an eye or on the side of the face or neck.

In addition to the rash, about 20 to 25 percent of those who get shingles go on to develop severe nerve pain (postherpetic neuralgia, or PHN) that can last for months or even years. And in rare cases, shingles can also cause strokes, encephalitis, spinal cord damage and vision loss.

New Shingles Vaccine

The Food and Drug Administration recently approved a new vaccine for shingles called Shingrix (see Shingrix.com), which provides much better protection than the older vaccine, Zostavax.

Manufactured by GlaxoSmithKline, Shingrix is 97 percent effective in preventing shingles in



people 50 to 69 years old, and 91 percent effective in those 70 and older.

By comparison, Zostavax is 70 percent effective in your 50s; 64 percent effective in your 60s; 41 percent effective in your 70s; and 18 percent effective in your 80s.

Shingrix is also better than Zostavax in preventing nerve pain that continues after a shingles rash has cleared – about 90 percent effective versus 65 percent effective.

Because of this enhanced protection, the Center for Disease Control and Prevention recommends that everyone age 50 and older, receive the Shingrix vaccine, which is given in two doses, two to six months apart.

Even if you've already had shingles, you still need these vaccinations because reoccurring cases are possible. The CDC also recommends that anyone previously vaccinated with Zostavax be revaccinated with Shingrix.

You should also know that Shingrix can cause some adverse side effects for some people, including muscle pain, fatigue, headache, fever and upset stomach.

Shingrix – which costs around \$280 for both doses – is (or will soon be) covered by insurance including Medicare Part D prescription drug plans, but be aware that the shingles vaccines are not always well covered. So before getting vaccinated, call your plan to find out if it's covered, and if so, which pharmacies and doctors in your area you should use to insure the best coverage.

Or, if you don't have health insurance or you're experiencing medical or financial hardship, you might qualify for GlaxoSmithKline's Patient Assistance Program, which provides free vaccinations to those who are eligible. For details, go to GSKforyou.com.

This article originally appeared in the Mountain Views New years ago. But even after all this

time, I'm STILL so glad I didn't go to prom!

Youth is a wonderful thing. The young are

mostly healthy, beautiful, and, in middle and upper class America, blissfully unacquainted with the harsh realities of financial self-reliance and a diminished metabolism. Youth involves rites of passage. Kids learn to drive. Girls get training bras; boys' voices go through a crackling journey to manly tones. Everyone needs to use deodorant, contrary to the belief that "some people don't sweat." And usually somewhere in there is a "formal dance."

Stopped in traffic by the Arboretum one spring day, I noticed a fashion shoot taking place on a grassy knoll. Five women, in thigh-high halter-top dresses, posed as the photographer fired off rapid shots. After they were finished, the group headed toward some young men in suits and tuxedos. As the women awkwardly stepped into a stretch Hummer it dawned on me. That's not a fashion a shoot –that's someone's prom!

It goes without saying that proms have changed over the years. My mom enjoys telling how she fooled her date (a well-known prankster) by opening the front door in a very old fashioned, dumpy dark turquoise taffeta dress and her Stouffer's waitress shoes (think the Queen Mum). She and her dad got a big laugh after he snapped a picture of the boy's horrified face. She then changed in to her real dress. Yes, things are different these days...

I have a few regrets about my youth. I wish I had put more effort into my second language courses (although I doubt it would've helped), and I suppose it might've been good to attempt a sport. But one thing I've never regretted is not going to prom! I know that sounds bitter and antisocial, but even approaching 20 years later, I can still say I

didn't miss a thing!


In the same vein as class elections, proms seemed to be another means of social exclusion. Every detail of the night involved decisions about who was "in" and who was "out." Who's house do

we meet up at? Who's riding in the [ostentatious vehicle of choice]? Who's sitting at our table? There's only room for eight, so that eliminates [the least-liked classmate]." It gave me a nervous ulcer just listening to it. To drive home the point that prom was overrated, my boyfriend-less friends all complained about their dates' behavior the next day at school. Heck, even some of the girls who had boyfriends complained!

Of course, another reason I nixed the prom was because I'm cheap. I just couldn't rationalize the cost of the tickets, dress, etc. Even as an unemployed teenager, I had some concept of the value of money. On top of everything else, prom tends to bring out the worst in people –administrators as well as students. There's always a few headlines about some poor kid getting kicked out of prom for a dumb reason. Back when I first submitted this article, a boy in the Midwest asked his crush to the prom by

writing "Will you go to the prom with me?" on a large poster. And she said "Yes!" Aww! But there was trouble in paradise when the villainous principal banned the boy from the prom because his placement of the sign was against school rules. In response to the national outcry against her decision, the principal finally reneged and allowed the young lovers to attend the prom. It would be one thing if this were an isolated incident, but it seems that every year there's some news story about power-crazed administrators concocting frivolous reasons for excluding students from the prom. One girl was denied admission because she came without a date. It's bad enough if you can't get a date, let alone the school broadcasting it! Like Maurice Chevalier crooned, "I'm --STILL-- so glad I'm not young anymore!"

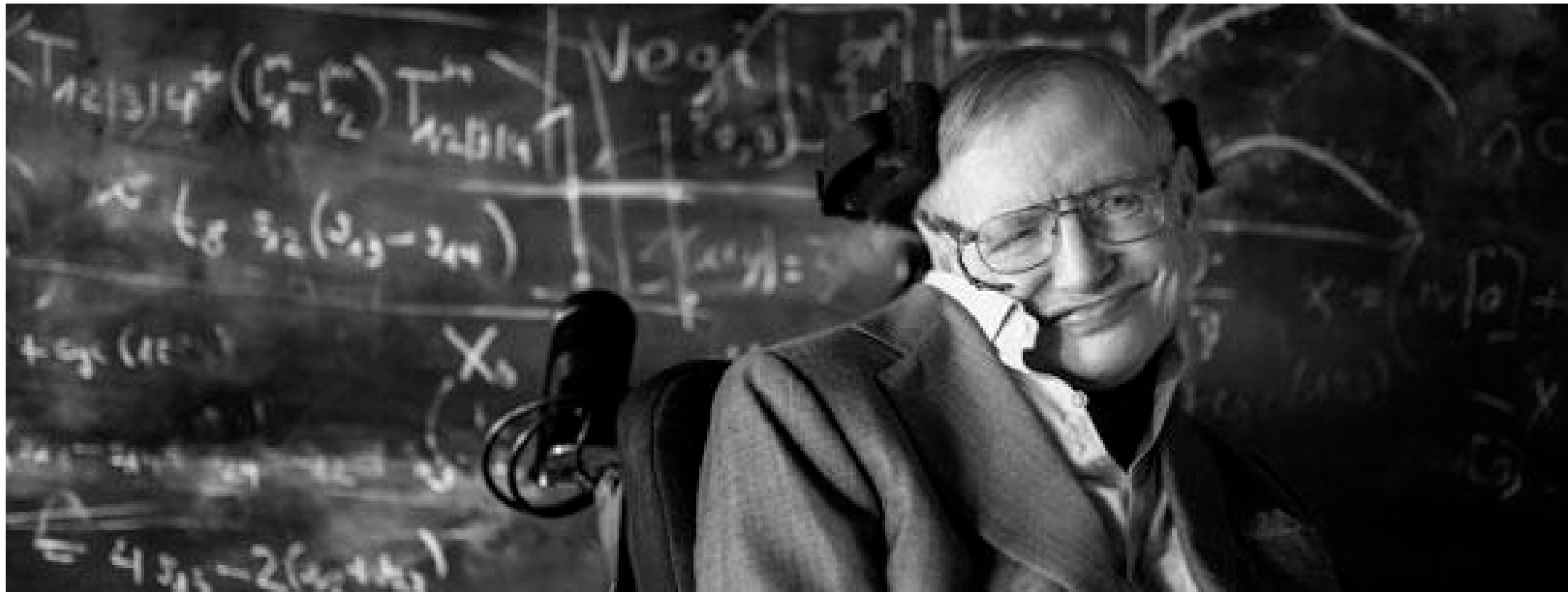

Looking Up
with Bob EklundTAMING THE MULTIVERSE: *Stephen Hawking's Final Theory About the Big Bang*

Professor Stephen Hawking's final theory on the origin of the universe, which he worked on in collaboration with Professor Thomas Hertog from KU Leuven, was published last week in the Journal of High Energy Physics.

The theory, which was submitted for publication before Hawking's death earlier this year, is based on string theory and predicts the universe is finite and far simpler than many current theories about the big bang say.

Professor Hertog, whose work has been supported by the European Research Council, first announced the new theory at a conference at the University of Cambridge in July of last year, organized on the occasion of Professor Hawking's 75th birthday.

Modern theories of the big bang predict that

our local universe came into existence with a brief burst of inflation—in other words, a tiny fraction of a second after the big bang itself, the universe expanded at an exponential rate. It is widely believed, however, that once inflation starts, there are regions where it never stops. It is thought that quantum effects can keep inflation going forever in some regions of the universe so that globally, inflation is eternal. The observable part of our universe would then be just a hospitable pocket universe, a region in which inflation has ended and stars and galaxies formed.

"The usual theory of eternal inflation predicts that globally our universe is like an infinite fractal, with a mosaic of different pocket universes, separated by an inflating ocean," said Hawking in an interview last autumn. "The local laws of physics

and chemistry can differ from one pocket universe to another, which together would form a multiverse. But I have never been a fan of the multiverse. If the scale of different universes in the multiverse is large or infinite the theory can't be tested".

"We predict that our universe, on the largest scales, is reasonably smooth and globally finite. So it is not a fractal structure," said Hawking.

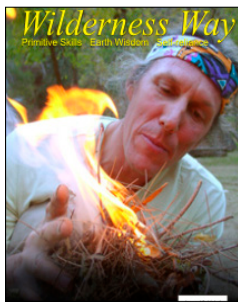
The theory of eternal inflation that Hawking and Hertog put forward is based on string theory: a branch of theoretical physics that attempts to reconcile gravity and general relativity with quantum physics, in part by describing the fundamental constituents of the universe as tiny vibrating strings. Their approach uses the string theory concept of holography, which postulates that the universe is a large and complex hologram:

physical reality in certain 3D spaces can be mathematically reduced to 2D projections on a surface.

Hawking and Hertog developed a variation of this concept of holography to project out the time dimension in eternal inflation. This enabled them to describe eternal inflation without having to rely on Einstein's theory. In the new theory, eternal inflation is reduced to a timeless state defined on a spatial surface at the beginning of time.

"When we trace the evolution of our universe backwards in time, at some point we arrive at the threshold of eternal inflation, where our familiar notion of time ceases to have any meaning," said Hertog.

TREES THAT ARE IDEAL FOR URBAN PLANTINGS

In the natural forest, trees sprout up from the humus of the forest floor, and grow upwards to the light. Other older trees succumb to old age, or fire or lightning strikes, and eventually fall back to earth to become the fertilizer for other trees and vegetation. Life and death is the cycle of the forest.

And in our urban areas, the life cycle of trees continues unabated, though the cycle is strongly controlled by the hand of man. Trees are continually cut down for developments and roads, and new trees are continually planted, sometimes for the mere appearance that the tree might provide.

Are there any guidelines that we might follow for the ideal tree selection? Should we be thinking about much more than convenience and appearance when planting trees?

Certainly all of us have read gardening and landscaping magazines which extoll the beauty of this or that "new" tree. But there are always many problems down the road by simply choosing a tree based on appearances. I prefer the long term path of sustainability, following the principles of permaculture where nature can take care of itself if we let it.

When I first moved into a new home in Highland Park, some of my neighbors were surprised that I cut down a few trees that didn't fit into my picture of productivity and sustainability. So let's begin with what not to plant.

EUCALYPTUS

Though Eucalyptus has numerous medical and aesthetic values, it's best left in its Australian homeland. I've researched extensively on the pros and cons of eucalyptus, and there are many reasons to never plant more eucalyptus trees in your Southern California yards. Eucalyptus trees suck up inordinate amounts of water, inhibit the growth of other vegetation under the trees, and actually cause the nearby soil to be less able to absorb water. However, if you must cut one down, the hard wood is good for building projects (like fences), and firewood.

NATIVES

Natives of any given area should be among your top choices. Here in Southern California, there are plenty of natives which also produce beauty and food. Native cherries are evergreen and they produce delicious fruits. Toyon is another native evergreen tree whose little red fruits can be eaten,

if you take the time to learn how to prepare them.

Elder tree is a deciduous tree that requires a bit more maintenance, but does produce edible and medicinal flowers and fruits.

If you live in a dry and hot enough area, you should consider trees such as palo verde, mesquite, and jojoba as yard trees which also produce something edible.

EVERGREEN VS. DECIDUOUS

Landscapers are often the ones who have promoted particular trees for their beauty or convenience. They are the ones who've given us so many of the poisonous oleanders throughout Southern California. To be fair, the evergreen oleander requires so little maintenance that it is no wonder you see it along so many freeways. But if you have limited space and you want a productive yard, you'd not choose an oleander.

For you non-gardeners, evergreens are those trees and bushes which never go bare, and always have some leaves, year-round. Deciduous means that they drop their leaves in the winter, and go bare. In some situations, a deciduous tree is a good choice in front of a south-facing window, so that it's shady in summer, but sun is allowed into the home in winter when desired.

Although a deciduous tree means that you might have to "clean-up" the fallen leaves, you should also consider the possibility of just letting the leaves lay there. After all, in the forest, the dropped and decaying leaves are what provides "food" for the trees, season after season.

FRUITING OR NOT

Yard spaces vary, and everyone's needs vary as well. After I've selected natives for my yard, the next consideration is whether or not I want to grow some of my own food in my own yard. There are quite a few good choices for Southern California, and you should begin by making a list of those foods you enjoy eating. Then, cross off all that don't grow well here in Southern California. My short list for this area includes avocados (each variety has different fruiting patterns), apples (Anna and Beverly Hills do well here), Santa Rosa plum, all citrus, figs, loquats, etc.

LOCAL CONSIDERATIONS

Regardless of where you live, there are local weather patterns and wind patterns that can affect the trees that you grow in your property. Before purchasing and planting new trees, you should consider the lay of your land, wind patterns, sun exposure, soil type, and perhaps dominant trees in the area. If you're like me, you'll want to plant for the long term, to create a mini-environment which creates a pleasant living condition, is easy to care for, and produces food and fragrance for everyone living there.

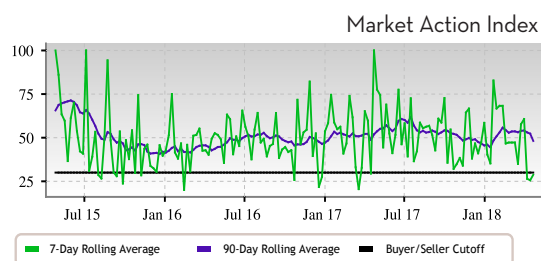

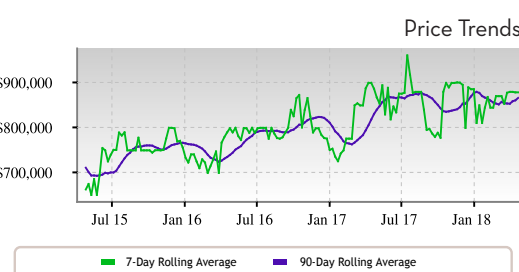

THE LATEST FASHIONS & RELATIONSHIP MARKETING

What do the latest fashion crazes have in common with popular business jargon? As I watch reruns of television shows that were popular during my childhood, I'm amazed at how many of the hairstyles and clothing have been repeatedly introduced as one of the new looks in a plethora of magazines and blogs specializing in fashion. Loosely referred to as retro or vintage fashion, it is nothing more than a return to a look from the past that has been revamped and reintroduced as the latest and greatest thing to wear. After all, there are only so many ways to reconstruct trousers, tops, hats, dresses and undergarments.

Sometimes the remake is actually an improvement due to advances in technology, for example when fabrics that retained their colors after being washed were introduced, or when an entirely new branch of fabrics was launched with the introduction of polyester in 1951. The latter was indeed a revolution, providing clothing designers with the ability to create water-resistant raincoats and wrinkle-free fashions never before possible.

In similar fashion (pun intended), the world of business is filled with the introduction of new terms and concepts in research reports, news articles and online. Just like fashion, most of the fanfare surrounding the introduction of the latest trend serves as a distraction to the fact that the "new" item is nothing more than a remake of something that was in use more than fifty years ago.

"Relationship marketing" is a term that has received attention in business periodicals and articles since the late 1990's, and it is has now made a comeback as the new kid on the block to many readers. The term was initially defined as a type of marketing created from direct response campaigns that emphasized retaining and satisfying customers as opposed to a primary focus on generating sales transactions. A new and improved meaning has expanded beyond the original definition

to encompass the adoption of a strategy that facilitates customer loyalty, interaction and long-term engagement. These definitions are nothing more than a superfluous reference to excellent customer service, before, during and after a transaction. Good old-fashioned business etiquette is the framework within which relationship marketing operates. It begins with good manners and the development of a personal connection with each customer, including those online. Relationship marketing must move beyond the adoption of key words in a company's mission statement and become the reality of a company's practice.

An article in the January-February 1998 issue of the Harvard Business Review noted, "Relationship marketing is powerful in theory but troubled in practice." Consider the pervasive use of special introductory discounts that credit card companies or cable television companies offer to first-time customers, which completely ignoring customers who have spent thousands of dollars with them over many years. What does that type of business practice say about how those companies value relationships with its existing customers?

A Forbes magazine article by Steve Olenski about business-to-business marketing (B2B) referenced a quote by a chief marketing officer who was speaking about the upcoming year, "We will see the beginning of what I refer to as 'the relationship' whereby marketers will move away from an acquisition first mentality to a relationship first one. Marketers will focus more on the entire consumer experience to build and foster a long term relationship with a consumer as opposed to just that initial purchase phase."

News alert! We've seen these characteristics on the runway before, and we're elated that the experts are touting them as the latest fashions. We can only hope that relationship marketing will take hold as more than a passing fad.

ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION IN THE AGE OF TRUMP

The National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) has been called the Magna Carta of our nation's environmental laws. Passed in 1969, Congress designed NEPA to provide for environmentally informed decision-making and public outreach on the part of federal agencies. NEPA requires that all the consequences and potential environmental problems of an agency's actions must be carefully considered before an agency acts.

Though signed into law by President Richard Nixon, a Republican, the championing of environmental causes is more likely to be heard now on the Democratic side of the aisle. For instance, at the end of 2016, Democrats on the House Committee on Natural Resources accused Republicans of waging a "campaign to attack NEPA." The Democrats of the committee stated:

"NEPA has proven to be a remarkably effective tool for ensuring that people have a say in federal government decisions that could impact the places they live. Because of NEPA, the public has the ability to know in advance about major federal actions and the right to provide input and have their voices heard. Before NEPA, a disproportionate share of heavily polluting projects ended up being sited in poor and minority communities that lacked political connections."

President Donald J. Trump picked Scott Pruitt to head the EPA, a person who doesn't believe CO2 emissions are a primary contributor to climate change and who has been accused of working to "cripple the agency." With the election of President Trump, perhaps the world's most famous real estate developer, many in the environmental movement fear more than ever that environmental regulations will be on the chopping block.

When President Trump signed Executive Order 13766 and 13807, which called for shortening the environmental review process under NEPA for infrastructure projects, it seems the president sees environmental regulation only as unnecessary and burdensome "red tape" to be cut away. Many environmentalists expressed dismay that this "hacking" away at regulations is not helping the environment.

But does there exist a reason why Trump would embrace NEPA? I would argue there not only exists a reason why he'd embrace it but become its greatest proponent!

The effects of population growth on the environment are undeniable. When NEPA was first passed, only a modest portion of U.S. population growth was attributable to immigration. Today things are very different. Mass immigration drives American population growth almost entirely.

There was a time when environmental hardliners correctly connected the dots between population growth and its harmful impact on the environment. Sadly, those folks along with their views were pushed to the side decades ago. Moreover, environmental organizations have retreated from the topic, knowing that their own big donors and Democratic politicians want unrestrained immigration policies.

The connection among immigration, population growth and the environment may be conservationists' best chance of preserving our nation's bedrock environmental law. NEPA has never been applied to immigration policy, although the law contains no waiver for immigration. On the contrary, DHS implements mass immigration programs leading to the importation of tens of millions of foreign nationals without any environmental review whatsoever.

There is no justification under the law for this neglect!

If the administration were to be the first to apply NEPA to the nation's immigration programs, it would only further Trump's agenda. The public has only a poor understanding of the connection between the environment and immigration. The use of NEPA would allow those "poor and minority communities lacking political connections" to finally weigh in on how mass immigration affects the quality of their daily lives and their environment – the expressed concern of open border proponents who claim to want to protect the public against environmental degradation. Indeed, the public should have been allowed to do so before the nation's immigration agencies implemented their programs. Until this is done, the Trump Administration should pause these programs.

Our current system is mass immigration on autopilot with no analysis of the environmental consequences. NEPA does not allow this. Neither should President Trump.

THE GROWING ART OF AMERICAN CURSING

Get this: the average American can't get through the day without cursing.

So is the finding of a recent 9Round Kickbox Fitness survey, as reported in the New York Post.

Why are Americans cursing so much? One reason is stress.

Fifty six percent of survey respondents say financial worries are their biggest source of stress. A lack of sleep (36 percent), health concerns (35 percent), work (30 percent), the environment (9 percent) and our \$20 trillion deficit (4 percent) are other sources of stress.

The survey didn't explore politics, but the names "Trump" and "Pelosi" are generating an explosion of salty-tongued originality across our great land.

Whatever the source of our stress, cursing DOES relieve it.

A 2011 Keele University study, reports Forbes, found that yelling out curse words increases pain and stress tolerance.

Volunteers were asked to hold their hands in freezing-cold water twice. The first time, they shouted curse words. The second time they used inoffensive phrases. Each volunteer was able to keep his or her hands in the cold water longer while cursing.

"The researchers found that the enraged yelling raised the heart rate, which, they hypothesize, means that the yelling triggered a fight-or-flight response, 'downplaying feebleness in favor of a more pain-tolerant machismo.'"

That's one reason why, concluded the researchers, that "swearing has been around for centuries and is an almost universal human linguistic phenomenon."

Cursing has certainly improved my capacity to deal with stress. I studied cussing under the tutelage of my father, now 85, a maestro in the art form. He perfected his skills while attempting plumbing repairs in our home.

Over the years, cursing has helped me ease the pain of financial setbacks, a broken heart and unpleasant co-workers. On a daily basis, it helps me cope with people who write checks in front of me at the grocery store and moronic drivers who drive too slowly in the passing lane.

But the question is, why are so many Americans cursing these days?

Some argue that it reflects a breakdown in manners and civility and a growing coarseness in our culture. San Diego State University psychologist Jean M. Twenge offers a more intriguing theory.

According to the National Post, Twenge conducted a 2017 study that explored how the use of the "seven dirty words" featured in comedian George Carlin's 1972 monologue, "Seven Words You Can Never Say on Television," changed in literature between 1950 and 2008.

Twenge found that the rise in profanity was dramatic — she measured a 28-fold increase between 2005 and 2008. She said the increase can be blamed on growing individualism, which is "a cultural system that emphasizes the self more and social rules less."

Twenge says that "as social rules fell by the wayside, and people were told to express themselves, swearing became more common."

That makes perfect sense to me.

Whereas younger generations are being taught to freely express their innermost feelings and frustrations using words that were once considered taboo, prior generations were taught the opposite.

When I was a kid in the 70s, we knew we were pushing the line if we used words such as "son of a gun," "gadzooks" and "h-e-double-hockey-sticks."

If we got caught using real curse words, we'd be enjoying a bar of Dove soap for supper.

In any event, now that cursing is no longer considered taboo, I see one big problem.

As more people cuss freely, curse words will lose their shock value and their capacity to relieve our stress.

The h-e-double-hockey-sticks with that!

STATE DEPARTMENT SHUTS OUT KIDS FROM SUMMER JOBS



With summer just weeks away, teenagers and college students looking for seasonal employment will have to compete with the annual influx of international workers.

The State Department's Summer Work Travel Program (SWT) will once again, as it has for decades, provide an unlimited number of J-1 visas to young foreign nationals who will come to the U.S. to work at a variety of jobs. The State Department defends SWT as a valuable cultural exchange tool when in reality it's a cheap labor bonanza for employers.

The jobs include lifeguarding, waiting tables at resorts, guiding tourists through national parks, scooping ice cream and providing child care as au pairs. These are jobs that most American kids would eagerly do, given the opportunity.

But since the J-1 has no prevailing wage requirement, employers can pay the visa holders lower wages than those U.S. workers earn in similar occupations and in the same geographic region. Furthermore, employers are exempt from paying the Social Security, Medicare, federal and state unemployment taxes on J-1 visa holders who are often required to work overtime without extra compensation.

Because international students pay an average of about \$1,100 in fees to private organizations that sponsor their participation in the program, the program generates well over \$100 million in annual revenues for those organizations. Participants pay out millions more in visa fees to the State Department, and in travel expenses to and from the U.S. In the end, sponsors pay government dues to be part of the program; students pay the fees associated with the program and their own roundtrip travel expenses; employers pay nothing. Many unsuspecting SWTs return home disillusioned, often with little money saved.

The State Department's failure to oversee its own program has led to multiple instances of exploitation like last year's Myrtle Beach case. Ten Dominican Republic college students were promised jobs at an Italian ice shop, plus adequate accommodations, but ended up keeping house and living in a bed bug-infested motel. Similar abuses have been documented in Virginia, Michigan, Pennsylvania and Mississippi.

Last year, The Wall Street Journal reported the Trump administration is considering reducing the number of visas issued under SWT. And as usual when employment-based visas are scrutinized with an eye toward cutting the total granted, businesses cry foul and falsely predict that without cheap foreign labor they'll go bankrupt.

Yet, despite well-deserved and documented criticism from labor experts who point to multiple SWT flaws, the program carries on year after year even though the unemployment rate among young Americans, and especially minorities, is high. Last summer, a survey showed that teens were about three times as likely to be unemployed as other Americans.

A few takeaways: serving gelato or waiting tables on the Boardwalk can't reasonably be considered cultural exchange. If employers offered decent wages and working conditions, they'd have little trouble attracting American kids. Moreover, shutting Americans out of the labor market has negative long-term consequences. Unemployed young adults don't learn how to interact with their peers or their often demanding bosses. They don't acquire essential work qualities like timeliness and accountability that will lead to a productive career.

The most obvious and important conclusion of all to draw from SWT is that the federal government cannot enact or efficiently monitor any type of immigration legislation that helps American workers.
