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THE POWER OF LETTING GO



Yoga is, in many ways, about becoming free of struggle. First, we gain awareness. We wake up to what's going on in our bodies and minds and discover how things are affecting us. Only then, can we determine what we need to let go. Sometimes, this 'need to let go' realization almost occurs after the fact. Finding even, smooth breaths changes our physiology and greatly affects the Sympathetic and Parasympathetic Nervous Systems. When we breathe in a deliberate way, the energy and the mind are soothed and refined. The road to freedom and letting go can be found this way.

With the breath as a catalyst, yoga allows us to find relaxation and cultivate a sense of ease. It's when we find the rhythm of relaxation that we are able to go deeper in yoga. Deep physical relaxation is found in savasana, the final resting pose. However, mentally, the mind is being soothed throughout practice. If the practice is approached by trying "too hard" or wanting to accomplish, then the profound sense of relaxation and letting go is not going to happen.

You've probably come upon this principle in other areas of life. Letting go allows abundance and exerting too much self-will is ultimately limiting. Relaxing into practice and agreeing to be fully present will break down resistance and create freedom on all levels. As you move along, restorative yoga is incredible and the practice of Yoga Nidra (yogi sleep) is profound and sublime.

KATIE TseThis and That MEMORIAL DAY TURKEY

I hope you had a wonderful Memorial Day this past weekend and that you enjoyed your traditional Memorial Day turkey! What? You didn't roast a turkey for the occasion? Shoot, then I guess my husband and I were the only ones who did a few years ago. Although we'd been married nearly six years at the time, we'd never roasted a turkey before. That is, until that Memorial Day weekend. But our turkey didn't start out as a Memorial Day turkey.

Like most turkeys, ours was originally intended for Thanksgiving. Every year, we came up with excuses as to why we couldn't, or shouldn't, do a turkey. I can't cook, and the kitchen in

our old apartment was small. We moved into our house last February, which took care of excuse number two. So back in November we were at Ralph's and the sight of all the frozen turkeys lined up in a bin inspired us to buy one. Even then we didn't plan to roast it for Thanksgiving, since we were having dinner with our families, we accepted the challenge all the same. My husband checked the expiration date and discovered it could last a whole year. It took up comfortable residence in our freezer.

It didn't take long for us to get tired of having a fourth of our freezer taken up by the turkey, but since both of us work and are fairly busy on the weekends, the turkey languished next to the ice cube tray for months. We decided that a nice, restful three-day weekend would be the perfect opportunity to finally roast our long term guest. We took him (or her) out a few days in advance to thaw in the fridge.

By Friday it seemed fairly soft to the touch--through the plastic anyway. My husband researched roasting methods and decided brining sounded good. We got the special Diamond Kosher salt and other infrequently used seasonings recommended by the "Food Network." However, my husband then noticed that our turkey was "Enhanced." "Enhanced, huh?" I asked. "Does that mean it wears a double D cup now?" He raised his eyebrows as if to say, "You're not serious, right?" "It means it's already marinated and we should just go ahead and bake it."

Turkeys go through a complex transformation on their way from slaughter to main entrée. It gets a pop-up timer implanted in its shoulder and its legs are bound together with a plastic implement resembling hand cuffs that are anchored deep inside its body cavity. Freeing this plastic leg brace was a challenge not made easier by the fact that, although the skin was soft and pliable, the inner flesh was still rock hard. Although we weren't supposed to rinse the turkey since the liquid it was hibernating in was the brining solution, we resorted to holding the turkey under running water in an attempt to melt away some of icebergs lurking inside. (Sorry! We tried to be water conscious!) Its cavity filled up with water and overflowed into the sink. I recalled those ads for antibacterial spray, the ones where they show all the swaths of bacteria on kitchen surfaces glowing like Christmas lights. After much work digging around the turkey's knees, my husband dislodged the last remaining chunks of turkey juice and freed the legs from their plastic handcuffs.

Then came the rub--seasoning rub, that is. My husband really is a good sport and managed to massage a mixture of herbs and spices into all the nooks and crannies of the unwieldy bird. Turkeys get their revenge by being particularly clumsy to handle, shifting their weight in their sagging skin as soon as you get a grasp on a leg or wing. In doing so we discovered a few extra feathers that somehow made it through the packing plant. "Door prizes!" I exclaimed.

We referred back to the instructions on the bag many times throughout the turkey's preparation. It told us to remove the neck, giblets, and a gravy bag from the body cavity. It was like a treasure chest! Try as we did, we couldn't find the giblets. It also didn't help that neither of us were totally sure what giblets were supposed to look like. "It's not that big in there," my husband said. "There aren't a lot of places for them to hide." We gave up and figured that if we came across them it would be like finding a toy in a box of Cracker Jacks, only these were poultry organs. One of the "Food Network" chefs had suggested putting an apple inside with some cinnamon sticks for aromatics. We didn't have cinnamon sticks, so I cut up an apple and sprinkled cinnamon on it before stuffing it inside. I think this was my only contribution to the turkey preparation!

When it was finally time to pop it in the oven we realized that with its legs free, the turkey overhung its baking dish. "Do we have anything bigger?" my husband asked. We searched for a larger container but found nothing. "Maybe I can put the ankle braces back on," he said, fishing the plastic leg cuffs out of the sink. After a short struggle he refastened the legs in their restraints and stuck the rest of the contraption back in the cavity. By now we were ready for a break while the bird baked.

For the next few hours we checked the turkey under the oven light and speculated on whether the drippings were burning, since "dry brined" birds supposedly don't produce much liquid. But at the eleventh hour (not really, but it seemed like it) the turkey exuded a lot of juice and that we were able to use with the gravy pack. When my husband first freed the legs from the ankle cuffs and peered inside the cavity he exclaimed, "Oh my gosh! I found the giblets; they exploded!" But it turned out to only be the apple slices, a bit puffy from the heat. At last the turkey was ready to eat, and for first timers, it turned out fairly good! Nearly a week later we were almost done eating it, and had found all sorts of uses for cold and hot turkey. I suppose most people don't have turkey for Memorial Day, but Benjamin Franklin originally wanted the turkey to be the national bird instead of the eagle, so it is patriotic in a way. When I first submitted this story, we still haven't come across the giblets, but we weren't quite done at that moment in time...

"The Mount Wilson Trail Race is the second oldest trail race in California; first held in 1908 when runners raced to Mt. Wilson, rested half an hour, then raced back down and only a very few intrepid runners attempted it. The race was held sporadically from 1908 until the late 1940's -- early 1950's when it was abandoned completely. Organized by a volunteer committee and sponsored by our fair city, Sierra Madre, the current race is 8.6 miles in length. The exact course has been changed by erosion, fires and earthquakes, but is lovingly maintained by some amazing guys who wield shovels, move boulders, avoid the occasional bear, and just generally keep the trail in good shape." That was mostly from the Mt. Wilson Trail Race web page, except for that last part about the guys who keep the trail in good shape.

Folks, it's a pretty steep run just from the start up to Alegria and a lot of these runners were already breathing heavy and most of the faces showed grim determination. However, one lovely woman smiled at me and said, "Good morning!" as she jogged past. The last couple of guys, a ways behind the pack, were smiling. One waved and I assured him he was going to have a beautiful morning. He let me know he was already having a beautiful morning. The very last guy said, "Say, have you seen a bunch of runners go by here!!" and I assured him he was the very first one. These guys were just out there doing it for the joy of doing it.

Deadly Hit-and-run Driver Arrested

Police arrested a 34-year-old Alhambra man after he walked away from a major car crash in Pasadena early last Sunday morning that killed the other driver.

According to police, at around 2 a.m. a white SUV crashed into a black Honda at the intersection of Sierra Madre and Colorado Boulevards. Police said the impact left the Honda hundreds of feet away on the other side of the center median.

Police later arrested Robert Michael Ybarra, around 1 p.m. at his home in Alhambra. He was taken to a nearby hospital with injuries before he booked into jail. Police believe Ybarra was under the influence at the time of the crash. He was also unaware the other diver had died officers said.

Dangerous Carjacking Ends in Burbank

A suspect driving a stolen vehicle led CHP officers on wild chase Wednesday from East Pasadena to Burbank that included a carjacking, several other attempted carjackings and attempting to steal a Metro Freeway Service Patrol vehicle.

Chalk Artists to Descend on Paseo Father's Day

The Paseo, will again be filled with Madonnari (Italian for street painter) laboring to create hundreds of murals as part of the 26th annual Pasadena Chalk Festival on Father's Day weekend, June 16th and 17th.

Organizers said the event celebrating the history and impact of the centuries-old artistry of street painting will feature the spectacular work of nearly 600 dedicated and talented chalk artists. After a discussion with Seamus Blackley, the co-creator of the XBOX, several weeks ago, students at Pasadena City College presented him with an award honoring the game designer widely known as the "Father of the Xbox."

At the April 24 event Seamus talked about everything he has done from early days of experimental aircraft design to his new startup in which he said "in the future everyone will be watching 3D Hologram TV." He was hired at Microsoft in the 90s at part of Entertainment graphics for Windows. Out of that came a dedicated PC for gaming based on the application programming interfaces DirectX.

"During a presentation, I said we need a simple box, a direct x box," he said about the name.

When asked what he would look for hiring interns, he said, "We want to see that they did okay in school but we want to see someone who is interested in doing 'stuff' because there might be a chance we are



interested in what you are doing? Almost everything we try and do... is stuff that hasn't been done before. That means there are no rules, nowhere to look, no YouTube videos, so you need to find a way to let everyone know that you're cool with that. You're going to get out there not go insane. You're going to know what to do. That's most important."

Blackley is currently the CEO of a venture-backed startup, Pacific Light & Hologram based in Pasadena. "This is the best place to build stuff," he said about Pasadena.

SHAUN HARPER TO SPEAK AT PCC COMMENCEMENT

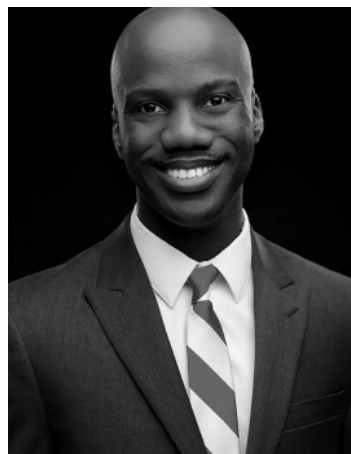
Students, families, and guests attending the 2018 Commencement Ceremony will hear a guest address from a leading expert on diversity and inclusion in America's education system.

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MONROVIANS BEING ASKED TO CONSIDER APPROVING MEASURE TT AT THE POLLS ON JUNE 5, 2018

On June 5th, California will be holding a Statewide Direct Primary Election. And in addition to all of the other candidates and issues that voters will be asked to consider on the ballot, here in Monrovia, we will be considering Measure TT.

So what exactly is Measure TT? If approved by the voters, Measure TT would increase the City's Transient Occupancy Tax rate from 10% to 12%. The City of Monrovia's existing Transient Occupancy Tax ("TOT" or "hotel bed tax") is set at a rate of 10% of the cost of rent charged by the operator. Like many cities across California, this tax is charged to travelers when they stay at a hotel, motel or other temporary lodging accommodations in Monrovia for a stay of 30 days or less.

The TOT helps ensure that those who visit Monrovia and take advantage of the services we offer – such as our roads, water, sewer, Police and Fire – help pay for the added demand of those services. And just to clarify, the "Transient" in Transient Occupancy Tax is referring to hotel guests, not homeless individuals, and this tax is unrelated to homelessness.

The TOT is one of the City's primary tax revenue streams, along with sales and property taxes, but it is the only tax that is charged only to visitors who stay temporarily at hotels in the City. Raising the TOT by 2%, from 10% to 12%, will help align Monrovia

to what many of our neighbors are charging, while keeping Monrovia hotels competitive in our region.

Currently, Monrovia is charging a lower TOT than other jurisdictions to the west of the City. For example, Pasadena, Burbank and Glendale all have effective TOT rates that are set at 12% or higher. Additionally, those communities charge a tourism tax on top of the TOT, so visitors there are paying between 15% - 16%.

To be approved, Measure TT will require voter approval by at least a majority vote. If Measure TT is not approved, Monrovia will continue to collect the tax at a lower rate and will likely have to find other sources of revenue to fund existing levels of service.

Election Day is on Tuesday, June 5, 2018. Polls open at 7 a.m. and close at 8 p.m. Voters may go to www.lavote.net to look up polling locations and find a copy of the sample ballot. Results are tentatively scheduled for certification by the Register-Recorder/County Clerk on June 29, 2018. Because Measure TT appears near the end of a very long ballot, please look for the Measure and be sure to vote on this proposed change to the City's TOT rate.

MONROVIA FIRE AND RESCUE PARAMEDICS OPERATE WITH PRECISION TO SAVE THE LIFE OF A PATIENT EXPERIENCING A HEART ATTACK

This past week, the prehospital care coordinator at Arcadia Methodist Hospital took the time to send along a thank-you note to our team at the Monrovia Fire Department for the excellent work our staff engaged in to save a life. The incident involved the deployment of new STEMI (or heart attack) protocols that our Fire Department has instituted in coordination with local area hospitals to provide better patient care.

When our paramedic team at the Fire Department was dispatched on this particular call for service, our team at Monrovia Fire & Rescue identified quickly that the patient was having a heart attack. Given the situation, our personnel activated the heart attack treatment protocol, which involves (among other practices) pre-notification of the incident with hospital personnel. The terrific work of our paramedic team meant

that the patient was able to get into the hospital laboratory within 56 minutes of the initial call for service (the goal is within 60 minutes), and that doctors were able to access the patient's artery within 74 minutes of the initial call for service (the goal is within 90 minutes). Given our efforts, coupled with the efforts of the hospital team at Arcadia Methodist, the heart attack patient was operated on, stabilized, and discharged 3 days after the initial incident occurred.

A copy of the thank-you note from Methodist Hospital has been included for your reference, which reads in part... "Please let the crew know of the phenomenal work!"

Phenomenal work indeed, and many thanks to all of our personnel in the Monrovia Fire Department for their efforts in keeping members of our community safe!

INSIGHT STEERS TOWARD MARS

NASA's InSight lander has made its first course correction toward Mars.

InSight, short for Interior Exploration using Seismic Investigations, Geodesy and Heat Transport, is the first mission dedicated to exploring the deep interior of Mars.

The lander is currently encapsulated in a protective aeroshell, which launched on top of an Atlas V 401 rocket on May 5 from Vandenberg Air Force Base in Central California. On May 22, the spacecraft fired its thrusters for the first time to change its flight path. This activity, called a trajectory correction maneuver, will happen a maximum of six times to guide the lander to Mars.

Every launch starts with a rocket. That's necessary to get a spacecraft out past Earth's gravity—but rockets don't complete the journey to other planets. Before launch, every piece of hardware headed to Mars is cleaned, limiting the number of Earth microbes that might travel on the spacecraft. However, the rocket and its upper stage, called a Centaur, don't get the same special treatment.

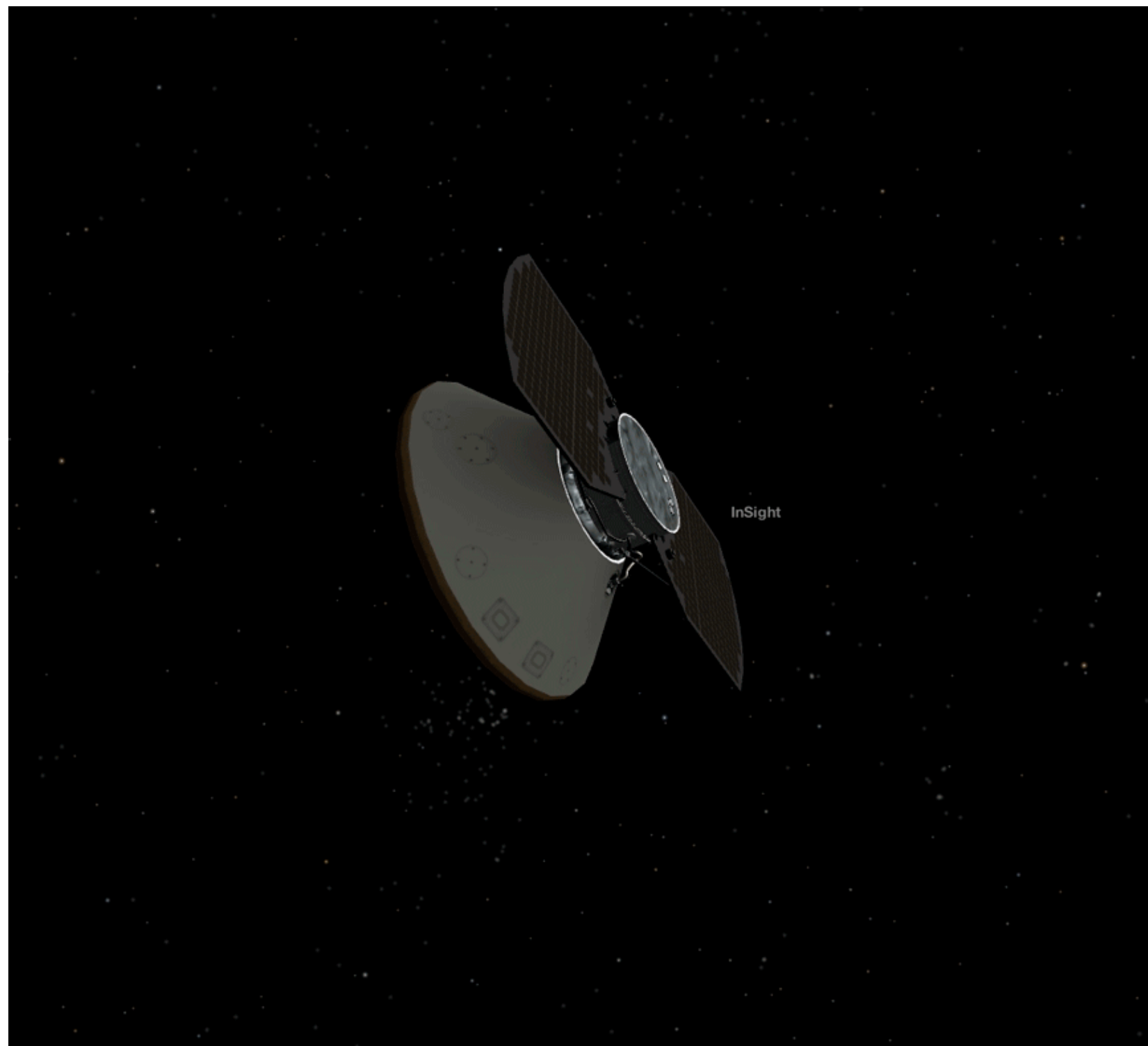
As a result, Mars launches involve aiming the rocket just off-target so that it flies off into space. Separately, the spacecraft performs a series of trajectory correction maneuvers guiding it to the Red Planet. This makes sure that only the clean spacecraft lands on the planet, while the upper stage does not come close.

Precise calculations are required for InSight to arrive at exactly the right spot in Mars' atmosphere at exactly the right time, resulting in a landing on Nov. 26. Every step of the way, a team of navigators estimates the position and velocity of the spacecraft. Then they design maneuvers to deliver it to an entry point at Mars.

"This first maneuver is the largest we'll conduct," said Fernando Abilleira of JPL, InSight's Deputy Mission Design and Navigation Manager. "The thrusters will fire for about 40 seconds to impart a velocity change of 8.5 mph to the spacecraft. That will put us in the right ballpark as we aim for Mars."

Especially at the beginning of that cruise, navigators rely on NASA's Deep Space Network (DSN) to track the spacecraft. The DSN is a system of antennas located at three sites around the Earth. As the planet rotates, each of these sites comes into range of NASA's spacecraft, ping-pong them with radio signals to track their positions. The antennas also send and receive data this way.

The DSN can give very accurate measurements about spacecraft position and velocity. But predicting where InSight will be after it fires its thrusters requires lots of modeling, Abilleira said. As the cruise to Mars progresses, navigators have more information about the forces acting on a spacecraft. That lets them further refine their models. Combined with DSN tracking measurements, these models allow them to



precisely drive the spacecraft to the desired entry point.

Yesterday's 40-second burn relies on four of eight thrusters on the spacecraft. A separate group of four is autonomously fired on a daily basis to keep the spacecraft's solar panels trained on the Sun and

its antennas pointed at Earth. While necessary to maintain orientation, these small, daily firings also introduce errors that navigators have to account for and counterbalance.

When the spacecraft is just a few hours from Mars, the planet's gravitational pull, or gravity well,

will begin to reel the spacecraft in. At that point, InSight's team will prepare for the next milestone after cruise: entering Mars' atmosphere, descending to the surface and sticking InSight's landing.

The entire show is dedicated to life threatening pursuit of catching Crabs off Alaska and the Russian Border, the Baltic Sea to be exact. Unlike the "Bachelor," here I don't have to wade through 10 episodes for the count or the discard, as nearly every episode they are pulling up Crabs in five-minute intervals. The traditional method is done with Dungeness lump crabmeat. Some places in our region are: Cameron's Restaurant, Smitty's, and Ruth Chris'. For this crab lover though, the very best Crab Cake by far is at Fleming's on Colorado located in Old Pasadena. There they use real lump crabmeat with a light breaded cover. 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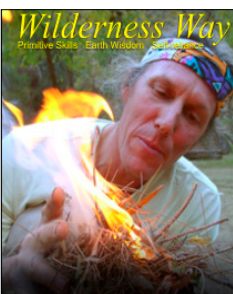

CHRISTOPHER Nyerges BUILDING A LEAN-TO

Should you build a primitive shelter if you get lost in the woods and you know you need to spend the night there? Perhaps. But if you were alert, you might be surprised how many ready-to-occupy shelters abound in the wilderness. Why build something if you can simply find some shelter for the night, whether man-made or natural? You know, hollow trees, caves, rock overhangs, old cabins, outhouses, utility shacks.

But if there is nothing around to protect you from the cold, the snow, the rain, then you must build something.

At one of our survival skills courses, we built a simple lean-to shelter and one of our students spent a few nights in it. Though the lean-to is only one of many possible emergency shelters, it is relatively easy to construct, assuming there are sufficient natural materials available.

Since the student, Christopher Reamer, spent a few nights in the shelter without blankets or a sleeping bag, I asked him if he had a comfortable night.

"I was plenty warm without blankets in my lean-to motel," says Reamer. "But that's only because I got underneath all the leaves and duff that was supposed to be the padding that I slept on top of. I was really sorry that we hadn't picked out all the sharp pointy twigs when we built the shelter."

Reamer pointed out that, when sleeping in such a shelter, it is always well-worth the time to spend as much time as possible to make the bedding comfortable. "It's a better use of your time to make the bedding as thick and soft as possible," he explains, "than to lie awake all night from the cold."

Reamer said that he had a fairly comfortable night in the lean-to, except "there were some sort of weird animals roaming around outside the shelter, which was kinda scary."

So let's say you've determined that we need to build a shelter. How do you begin?

Just like with real estate, the primary consideration is location. You need to build your shelter where there is the necessary abundance of natural materials. You want a location that provides some natural protection, if possible. But you don't want rocks or branches to fall on your shelter. You don't want to be too close to water for many reasons: mosquitoes, possibility of flooding, inability to hear people approaching. Etc.

You've found your ideal spot. A simple lean-to begins with a tripod so that one length is as long as your body. The simple tripod is the frame for your shelter.



And in an emergency survival situation, you don't start with a high tripod, like a tipi. You want a low ceiling in order to capture your heat. Then you simply lean branches onto your frame, keeping in mind where your entrance will be.

Once you've covered the frame with branches, you add little branches and leaves, and eventually cover the shelter with a thick layer of insulation.

You then add thick layers of grass or leaves into the floor of the lean-to for your bedding. I try to avoid using pine needles for insulation because it pokes into your body, and you get full of the bits of sap that seep out of it. But if there is nothing else, use it.

If possible, add a layer of large rocks to define your bedding area to keep all the leaves and grass from flattening out too much.

Reamer said that someday he wants to try sleeping in a shelter with massive loads of cattail fluff for bedding. Cattail down has been used in the past as a substitute for the goose down in sleeping bags.

Another way to begin a lean-to is to simply lean a solid ridge post onto a low branch of a standing tree. Then lean your smaller poles onto the ridge post, and continue from there.

Shelter is extremely important, whether you're in the extreme heat of the desert, or exposed to the winter snows. But the process of shelter-building need not be a daunting task. After all, children all build "forts" and "hideouts" in the woods.

Perhaps the best way for adults to make shelters is to become like a child again, not worry about getting dirty, and just go and learn by doing.

HOW TO FIND RETIREE TRAVEL PERKS

Dear Savvy Senior,

What types of travel discounts are available to older travelers? I just retired and am interested in learning about travel deals for people over 60.

Ready To Go

Dear Ready,
There are literally thousands of different travel-related discounts available to retirees that usually start anywhere between the ages 50 and 65. These discounts – typically ranging between 5 and 25 percent off – can add up to save you hundreds of dollars on your next trip. Here's how you can find them.

Ways to Save

The first thing to know is that most businesses don't advertise them, but many give senior discounts just for the asking, so don't be shy.

You also need to be aware that when it comes to senior travel bargains, the "senior discount," if available, may not always be the best deal. Hotels, resorts, airlines and cruise lines, for example, offer advanced bookings along with special deals and promotions from time to time that may be a lower rate than what the senior discount is. Before you book, always ask about the lowest possible rate and the best deal available.

Another way retirees with flexible schedules can save is to be flexible when you travel. Last minute travel deals can offer huge savings, as well as traveling during off-season or off-peak times, and avoiding holidays.

Club memberships can also garner you a wide variety of travel bargains. AARP, for example has dozens of travel discounts available on hotels, rental cars, cruises and vacation packages – see AARPadvantages.com. Annual AARP membership fees are \$16 or less if you join for multiple years.

Or, if you don't agree with AARP, there are alternative organizations you can join like the Seniors Coalition or the American Seniors Association that offer discounts on hotels and rental cars.

Types of Discounts

Here's an abbreviated rundown of some of the different travel discounts you can expect to find.

Transportation: For airline travel, Southwest has fully refundable senior fares to passengers 65 and older, and British Airways offers AARP members \$65 off economy travel and \$200 off business club travel.



American, United and Delta also offer senior fares in certain markets but are extremely limited.

For traveling by train, Amtrak provides a 10 percent discount to travelers 65-plus, and a 10 percent discount to passengers over age 60 on cross-border services operated jointly by Amtrak and VIA Rail Canada.

Greyhound bus lines also offers a 5 percent discount to passengers 62 and older. And most car rental companies offer 10 to 25 percent discounts to customers who belong to membership organizations like AARP or AAA.

Hotels: Many U.S. hotels offer senior discounts (at varying ages) usually ranging between 5 and 15 percent off. For example, Marriott offers a 15 percent discount to travelers 62 and older at over 4,000 locations worldwide. And Wyndham hotel group offers 60-plus guests best available rate discounts.

Restaurants: Some restaurant chains offer senior discounts, ranging from free drinks, to senior menus, to discounts off your total order. National chains that offer these deals include Burger King, Chili's, Chick-fil-A, Dunkin' Donuts, Golden Corral, IHOP and Wendy's. Offers can vary by location.

Cruises: Royal Caribbean and Carnival Cruise lines offer discount rates to cruisers 55 and over.

Entertainment and Attractions: Most movie theaters, museums, zoos, aquariums, public golf courses and even ski slopes provide reduced admission to seniors over 60 or 65. If you're 62-plus, you're also eligible for the "Senior Pass," which provides a lifetime entry to 2,000 national parks and recreation sites. You can obtain this pass in person at one of the federal recreation sites for \$80, or online for \$90 at Store.usgs.gov/senior-pass.

To look for other travel discounts on the go, download the Sciddy app at Sciddy.com. This app lets you search for senior discounts and can send you alerts when you're at an establishment that offers them.

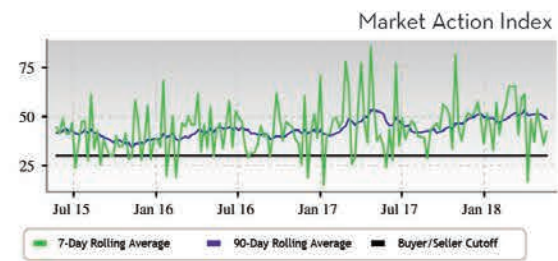

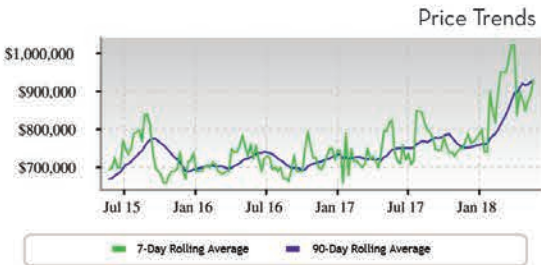

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MEMORIAL DAY 2018 AND REMEMBERING OUR VETERANS

Memorial Day is a very special day to remember Veterans and loved ones. It began as "Decoration Day" in the mid 1860's, and TWENTY-FOUR cities say it was first held in their city! In 1966, President Johnson declared Waterloo NY to be the "first city" to observe Declaration Day, May 1866. However, Boalsburg PA claims they had a celebration in 1884; women placed flowers on soldiers' graves, April 25, 1866 in Columbus MS; and General John Polk spoke at a city-wide celebration April 29, 1866-just to name a few! In 1967, President Johnson proclaimed "Memorial Day", a Federal Holiday, observed the last Monday of May.

In the San Gabriel Valley, we have many wonderful events honoring our Veterans. The Saturday prior to Veterans Day is the wonderful annual Veterans Fair at Arcadia County Park, begun by past Supervisor Antonovich and continued by Supervisor Barger. Senior Field Deputy Debby Mendelsohn did an

outstanding job planning this spectacular event.

Supervisor Barger acknowledged Channel 4 Meteorologist Fritz Coleman, Master of Ceremonies for many years. Coleman, a Viet Nam Vet, is well-known in SO CAL for his volunteerism and support of Veterans and many worthwhile causes. Supervisor Barger feels Viet Nam Veterans never received proper recognition. She now reads their names at the Board Meeting adjournment. She also has targeted funding for homeless Veterans' housing, weekly portable showers and county agencies' reps available for assistance.

There was wonderful patriotic music, a color guard, sky divers, and food vendors. The booths had so much information, and giveaways. My former students' dad, Mr. Solis, had his vehicle with Veterans' names and photos. Our pastor, Father Eugene Herbert was a medic in Viet Nam! An Eagle Scout played "Amazing Grace" on bagpipes, and Mendelsohn's son Doug performed "Taps." That evening was the "lighting" for the Viet Nam Monument at the Park. It blew everyone away- red, white and blue lights! (Thanks to my daughter Karen for awesome photos and Gene Glasco, Elks Lodge, Arcadia Women's Club, Boy Scouts and MANY OTHERS responsible for the beautiful monument, landscaping and now lighting! Gene's dedication was the catalyst, bringing this monument to fruition.

Monday, Live Oak Cemetery provided the venue for their annual Veterans' Memorial/Recognition. Highlights include the color guard, playing each service branch's theme song, and asking those members to rise for recognition, and a flyover. Assemblyman Chris Holden spoke as did Scott Sinclair and Janine Coyne explained the "13 folds" of the flag. Again, many local officials attended, and there was the awesome flyover. May we never forget our Veterans and their sacrifices so we can enjoy our many freedoms.

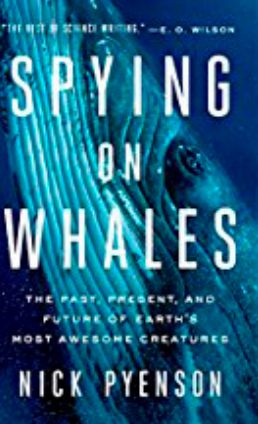
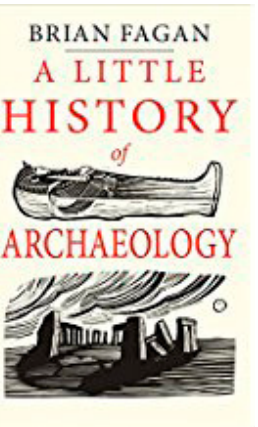

GENERATOR THAT CREATES ELECTRICITY FROM GRAVITY COULD REVOLUTIONIZE RENEWABLE ENERGY

A Dutch inventor has successfully created a contraption that generates electricity from gravity – and it could revolutionize the future of renewable energy. Janjaap Ruijsenaars of Gravity Energy Ltd. recently finished the prototype of his gravity energy generator. The generator works by unbalancing a weight so that gravitational energy becomes available as input to a piezo generator. This means that a gentle breeze is enough to generate the electricity. The generator could reach up to 93% energy efficiency. The Amsterdam-based company was purchased by angel investor Jeroen van den Hamer, who said: “The high efficiency in comparison to existing sustainable methods such as wind turbines and solar panels caught our attention. This could be a game changer.” Tesla's Giant Record-Breaking Battery Shows

STUNNING SUCCESS BY SAVING CONSUMERS MILLIONS

With homes in South Australia suffering from frequent and expensive power outages, that state's government began searching for a more cost-effective and environmentally friendly backup system for their electrical grid. Then, last July, Elon Musk, the C.E.O. of alternative energy company Tesla, offered to build the world's biggest lithium ion battery as the ultimate backup solution for the territory. According to new data the 129 megawatt battery has already resulted in stunning success. For starters, the battery has resulted in a 90% drop in maintenance costs. In addition to being a cheaper replacement to the fossil-fuel dependent system that was previously used by the energy market operator, the battery creates zero carbon emissions. It is also capable of responding to outages in a matter of seconds, which could not be achieved by previous backups. Within the first four months of operation, the battery has already saved consumers an estimated \$26 million (AU\$35 million) in maintenance costs to the grid, making South Australia the only region that has enjoyed a decline in the cost of frequency controlled ancillary services in recent months.

Without a signed durable power of attorney, your family and friends will have to go to court to get access to your finances, which not only takes time, but it could lead to mismanagement and even the loss of your assets should the court grant this authority to the wrong person.

Furthermore, the person you name doesn't have to be a lawyer or financial professional—it can be anybody you choose, including both family and friends. The most important aspect of your choice is selecting someone who's imminently trustworthy, since they will have nearly complete control over your estate.

LEFT BEHIND AT THE DRIVE-IN THEATER

I can't imagine such a thing happening today: In the early 1970s, when I was 9, my family left my sister Mary behind at the drive-in theater.

Allow me to explain, but you'll have to read my humorous memoir, "Misadventures of a 1970s Childhood" on Amazon.com, to get the full story.

As it went, the outing had started off well enough. My father spent several minutes searching for a spot (it took time to find a window speaker that worked). We got out of the car as he opened the tailgate and folded down the back seats, then got back in. We began devouring corn curls, potato chips, onion dip and pretzels, and washed them down with Regent soda pop.

The blue sky soon fell dark and the film projector began rattling. Black-and-white numbers -- "5, 4, 3, 2, 1..." -- flashed onto the screen. Yellowed footage advertised hot dogs, popcorn and other concession items we could never get our father to buy.

It didn't take long before we began squabbling over pillows, blankets and positioning. My sisters complained that my big noggin was blocking their view, and so I was banished to the back of the car.

As I recollect, we went to see "Paper Moon" that night -- a movie about a Depression-era con man and a young girl who travel around taking people's money -- but my sisters say it was "Herbie the Love Bug."

Whatever the case, I was so busy devouring snacks -- we didn't have them often, so I was taking advantage of my good fortune -- I didn't care about the movie. My stomach was soon so full, however, that I ended up lying on my back, groaning in agony.

It's important, at this point, to understand how everyone was situated.

My father sat in the front seat on the driver's side. My mother sat to his right holding my sister Jennifer. She "shooshed" us constantly to keep us from waking the baby. In the back, under the pile of blankets and pillows, were my sisters Kathy, 14; Krissy, 12; Lisa, 6; and Mary, 4.

Throughout the first and second movies, there was plenty of sleeping, waking, snoring, squabbling, shooshing, complaining ("Mommy, Tommy stinks!")

and trips to the restroom.

Unbeknownst to everyone, however, 4-year-old Mary -- she always had a touch of wanderlust -- had slipped out the back of the car to go to the restroom. Preoccupied with my aching belly -- I was groaning pretty loudly by then -- I didn't notice her slip by me.

About then the second movie was coming to a close. My father, always eager to beat the rush, hurriedly packed up the cooler and fired up the car. It never occurred to anyone that Mary might not be under the blankets. Off we drove as the final credits began to roll.

I don't recall how far we got before Lisa shouted, "Where's Mary?"

My mother, trying not to disturb the baby, instinctively began shooshing. It took five minutes or more before Lisa persuaded everyone that Mary was still at the drive-in.

Panic overcame us. My father made a hard U-turn and floored it. Our wood-paneled Plymouth station wagon roared down the road like the car in "Chitty Chitty Bang Bang."

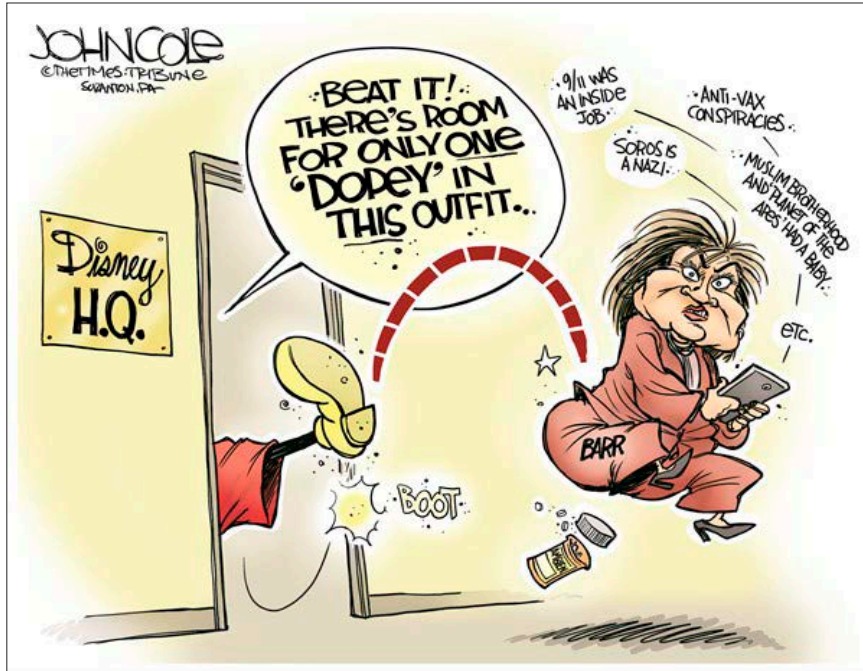
We fishtailed as we hit the gravel parking lot. The lot was empty but for the car that had been next to ours. Mary stood next to it holding the hand of somebody else's dad (who waited patiently for the dopey family that forgot one of its kids).

My sisters and I laugh every time someone brings up the incident -- in part because such a thing could never happen today. Today's obsessive parents, terrified by cable news, never let their kids out of their sight.

To my family's credit, however, Mary was the only child we ever lost. None of us was ever left at a highway rest stop, as one family we knew did. Another left their kid at a camp ground in Ohio after a family vacation.

In any event, everything turned out well in the end. Mary has four children of her own now. She hasn't lost any of them yet.

SADLY, ROSEANNE IS A VICTIM TO SOME

Words matter.

What we say to each other, how we treat each other matters. There are basic norms of civilized behavior, outside the realm of politics, beyond the reach of cable network news, that we should all be able to agree upon.

One of them is that, if you call an African-American woman an "ape," that you are the worst kind of vile racist. And you deserve whatever scorn, whatever vitriol, whatever criticism that comes your way as a result of your actions.

It shouldn't be hard to call racist remarks racist. It shouldn't be hard to decry a viciously personal and apparently unprovoked attack.

But because of the remove of social media, because the forces at the very top of the American power structure have normalized the worst kind offensive behavior, there's somehow a difference.

Because we live in the times that we do, those same disgusting words, uttered by the comedienne Roseanne Barr, about the former Obama administration adviser Valerie Jarrett, who is African-American, are being inevitably viewed through the filter of partisan politics. And that means, to some, they are, as shockingly, mystifyingly, horrifyingly as it seems, entirely acceptable.

And to them, Barr - not Jarrett - is a victim.

That sadly unsurprising sentiment came through loud and clear on Wednesday morning when a reader decided to share his views on my office voicemail.

"Yes, I would like to show my support for Roseanne Barr," he began. "The Muslim Brotherhood, The Planet of the Apes. Yeah, you have a perfect Valerie Jarrett. I studied this picture last night. What's wrong with saying something like that? Oh, all the butt-hurt liberal media. You know what? I hope they all drop dead because Roseanne is right. And that lady ... woman is a b***h anyway."

That's one of your neighbors. One of your colleagues. The guy in front of you in the supermarket checkout line. The person sitting next to you in church.

That's the hateful voice of racism here in central Pennsylvania. And if he were the only one, a lone whack-job crying out in the wilderness, that'd be one thing.

But he's not.

He's the torch-bearing, Nazi-flag waving white supremacist who marched in Charlottesville last year.

He's the extreme end of a spectrum that starts with the sort of ignorant prejudice that prompted Starbucks to close its shops on Tuesday to conduct sensitivity training for its employees.

But sometimes they don't march. Sometimes they wear suits. And they run for Congress.

"Much love @therealroseanne. We live in a country where people don't respect our constitution. One of most essential freedoms is freedom to express ourselves even if it makes others upset. It's beautiful to think different. Shame on the leftist media," Republican Omar Navarro, who's running against U.S. Rep. Maxine Waters, D-Calif., tweeted Wednesday. Republican. Democrat. Independent. It doesn't matter.

There is no universe, there is no moral plane where what Roseanne Barr said is even remotely acceptable.

It wasn't funny. It wasn't a joke.

And it wasn't the first time, either.

As Christine Emba of The Washington Post writes, Barr has "a history of making inflammatory statements and pushing right-wing conspiracy theories - whether it's lending credence to a bizarre theory that Democrats ran a pedophile ring; making wild insinuations about the death of Democratic National Committee employee Seth Rich; or accusing businessman and philanthropist George Soros of Nazism and attempts to undermine American democracy."

And because Barr has a platform, a voice, it emboldens others.

Some among you will say that Barr had a First Amendment right to say what she said. And you'd be right. But the First Amendment doesn't shield her from the consequences of her actions.

Her employer, Walt Disney Entertainment and ABC, which knew what it was getting from Barr when they hired her and green-lighted her show anyway, fired her, calling her tweeted words "abhorrent, repugnant and inconsistent with our values."

Barr has since blamed her racism on the sleep drug Ambien, prompting its manufacturer, Sanofi, in some serious Twitter shade, to release a statement asserting that racism is not among the medication's known side effects.

In the end, though, it's on the rest of us, Republican, Democrat, independent, Christian, Jew, Muslim, or nothing at all, to simply stand up and say enough, to forcefully assert, that racism has no place in our midst.

Whether that's on our TV screens or at the highest levels of power.
