SIERRA MADRE CONSIDERS CREATINIG A CONSOLIDATED DOWNTOWN BUSINESS ASSESSMENT DISTRICT

With two Sierra Madre districts hurting for money, and the other two districts at a healthy surplus, City Council agreed to a study to see if combining the four districts to form one Downtown Business Assessment District will make sense for the city. The city will hire the outside firm, NBS, to conduct the study. NBS has close to two decades of experience and has administered 30 special financing districts throughout California. The study will cost the city around \$65,000, but will save the city money in the long run as, currently, two of the districts are depending on the General Fund to cover costs of general maintenance. Combining the current districts (which consist of two lighting districts, one landscaping and one parking district) would allow hurting districts to benefit from surplus funds from the other two districts. In addition, this may open up opportunities to make needed improvements and beautify the downtown area.

The new district would be either be based on property ownership, or assess businesses. If it is based on property ownership, NBS will also oversee Proposition 218, known as “The Right to Vote on Taxes Act.” This would mean property owners would receive ballots in the mail and a public hearing would take place. If more ballots are received in favor, then the districts will be

combined. If more ballots oppose, then the four districts in place currently will remain intact. Alternatively, if the new district will assess businesses, the NBS will oversee the notice and protest requirements under the Streets and Highways Code (section 54954.6). In this scenario, business owners will be mailed notices, there will be a public hearing and if business owners who would pay more than 50% of the new assessment file a written protest, the new district can’t be formed and the four districts will remain as is. NBS will make the recommendation on which of the two options will work better for the city.

The combinations of the four districts would eliminate deficiencies and surpluses among districts and the study assessment will be broken down into two phases. Phase one, set for December 2018, will include a logistics checklist, scoping meeting, and community/stakeholder outreach and participation. Phase 2 will include a downtown management plan, petition campaign/ballot process, and public hearing. Phase 2 is expected to wrap up in June 2019.

City Council agreed unanimously (Pro Tem John Harabedian was not present) to the deal with NBS at their regular scheduled meeting on Tuesday, November 27.

SO LONG MR. PRESIDENT



George Herbert Walker Bush, the 41st president of the United States, died Friday at age 94.

In declining health over the last few years, his death came just six month after the passing of his beloved wife Barbara Bush to whom he was married to for 73 years.

A statement from the former president’s office reads, in part, “George Herbert Walker Bush, World War II naval aviator, Texas oil pioneer, Vice President, US Ambassador, head of the CIA and 41st President of the United States of America has died. He is survived by his five children and their spouses, 17 grandchildren, eight great grandchil-dren, and two siblings.”

His son, former president George W. Bush issued a statement about his father’s passing through a family spokesperson.

“Jeb, Neil, Marvin, Doro, and I are saddened to announce that after 94 remarkable years, our dear Dad has died,” the statement said. “George H.W. Bush was a man of the highest character and the best dad a son or daughter could ask for.”

As President, Bush strived for, “...a kinder, gentler America”. Among the accomplishments of his term of office the Berlin Wall came down, he freed Kuwait from occupation via the Gulf War in just 6 weeks, and reached across the aisle to get the Americans with Disabilities Act and the Clean Air Act passed. After leaving office, he and his wife Barbara raised more than a billion dollars for charity.

President Trump and First Lady Melania Trump said Bush “always found a way to set the bar

higher.”

“Through his essential authenticity, disarming wit, and unwavering commitment to faith, family, and country, Presi-dent Bush inspired generations of his fellow Americans to public service—to be, in his words, ‘a thousand points of light’ illuminating the greatness, hope, and opportunity of America to the world,” said the Trumps in a statement.

The Office of Former President Barack and Michelle Obama said that “America has lost a patriot and humble servant in George Herbert Walker Bush. While our hearts are heavy today, they are also filled with gratitude. Not merely for the years he spent as our 41st President, but for the more than 70 years he spent in devoted service to the country he loved – from a decorated Naval aviator who nearly gave his life in World War II, to Commander-in-Chief of our Armed Forces, with plenty of posts along the way.”

The Obamas added “George H.W. Bush’s life is a testament to the notion that public service is a noble, joyous calling. And he did tremendous good along the journey. Expanding America’s promise to new immigrants and people with disabilities. Reducing the scourge of nuclear weapons and building a broad international coalition to expel a dictator from Kuwait. And when democratic revolutions bloomed across Eastern Europe, it was his steady, diplomatic hand that made possible an achievement once thought anything but – ending the Cold War without firing a shot.” S. CITY DELAYS ACTION ON CITIZEN-LED CODE ENFORCEMENT - FOR NOW

The Sierra Madre City Council, at the request of residents, weighed the pros and cons of having a volunteer, citizen-led code enforcement group to report on Municipal Code Violations and ease the workload of the one official code enforcement officer in the city. The issue was addressed during the regular meeting on Tuesday, November 27.

Mayor Denise Delmar and Council Member Rachele Arizmendi were contacted by resident, and Preserve Sierra Madre member, Anne Chesterman who requested the Council consider a citizen-led code enforcement group for the city. During the City Council meeting on November 13, 2018, staff was requested to provide Council with more information about the present situation with code enforcement.

Greg Silva is the current code enforcement officer for Sierra Madre. His duties include making sure there are no violations regarding development and construction projects and yard sale permits, to name a few. According to City Manager, Gabriel Engeland, Officer Silva was able to respond to 100% of complaints and requests for service with regards to construction, development and yard sales, but the bigger issue is that the city doesn't always enforce the codes. Officer Silva works Monday through Thursday and occasional Fridays. There is no coverage on the weekends, when most yard sales

take place.

"We don't want to be vigilantes, but we don't feel informed," says Chesterman "We'd like to have a little more hands-on involvement with what happens to our environment." Chesterman, who noted that she wasn't aware Sierra Madre had a code enforcement officer, hopes for more education on local codes. Judy Gold, another Preserve Sierra Madre member, Judy Gold pointed out that the Mills Act was one code put in place that is often not enforced. The Mills Act was established to ensure residents are keeping up on maintenance of historic properties. "If we can have an active group of volunteers that have a set job to help the city..." (The Mills Act) is another job for them. Maybe a couple of volunteers can drive by and look occasionally...see if their doing what they're supposed to do," Gold suggested.

Council Member Arizmendi recommended a meet-and-greet between Preserve Sierra Madre members, the City Manager, and Code Enforcement Officer Silva so issues can be discussed and questions can be asked. Chesterman agreed that would be a good start. Other cities have used citizen-led code enforcement commission, but they often handle minor issues such as lawn care. The two sides hope to meet next month and report on their progress during a future Council meeting.

Caltrans Releases Final 710 EIR

Tunnel Alternative Not Named Preferred Alternative

The California Department of Transportation (Caltrans) last week released the Final Environmental Impact Report/Environmental Impact Statement (EIR/EIS) for the SR 710 North Project. The final report identifies the Transportation System Management/Transportation Demand Management Alternative as the Preferred Alternative out of the four build options, including a freeway tunnel.

“The final EIR is a historic step in the right direction,” said Assemblymember Chris Holden. “I look forward to working with all my colleagues in the legislature to support local efforts to improve mobility, and pass policies to affirmatively remove the tunnel option from any future consideration.”

In April 2017, the Los Angeles Metro Board of Directors passed a motion recognizing the lack of funds needed to construct a single bore freeway tunnel, and instead recommended the Transportation System Management/Transportation Demand Management Alternative for the 710 North Study Area while allocating remaining measure R funds for new mobility improvement projects in the designated area.

Holden first pursued a state level solution early in 2017, and advocated that LA Metro move away from the tunnel option. Legislation previously introduced by Holden included provisions that would give greater local control to future developments, and specified that State Route 710 is only from Route 1 to Route 10.

City Council to Discuss Street Vending

The Pasadena city council will take up the issue of legalizing street vending, Monday night, ahead of a state law that will allow the sale of food or merchandise on public sidewalks, parks or other pedestrian pathway anywhere in California.

Senate Bill 946, signed into law by Governor Jerry Brown, prohibits local jurisdictions from banning or regulating sidewalk vending “unless restrictions are related to health, safety or welfare concerns.”

The bill is set to take effect January 1.

According to a city staff report, there is an “immediate need to amend the PMC [Pasadena Municipal Code]... to regulate sidewalk vending that may take place around the Rose Parade and Rose Bowl Game.

The council will also discuss setting up a new permit category that allows the display of goods within the public right-of-way, something currently not allowed. They will also look at

regulations that will prohibit vendors within the immediate areas of farmers' markets, swap meets, and temporary events in the city, including the Central Arroyo and the entire Rose Parade route.

The council will also look at the need to continue health permitting of food vendors but due away with a limit of operating for a maximum of four hours a day in city parks.

According to City Manager Steve Mermell the regulations are needed at events that “contribute to Pasadena's unique character within the larger southern California community and ensuring the vitality of these events is of overriding concern to the welfare of the city.”

City staff also said that city revenues could increase with an influx of new business licenses and permits although they might be offset by city costs related to enforcement and other city services related to vending.

Senate Bill 946 gives protection,

to low-income and immigrant communities, from challenges they might face as a result of a criminal record that could arise from illegal vending according to the city staff report.

The city council meets at 6:30 in the Council Chamber, Pasadena City Hall 100 North Garfield Avenue, room S249.

LOVE 'EM?
LEASH 'EM!

As a youngster growing up in the south, I was fortunate to have had many pets throughout my childhood years. I remember my parents letting our family dogs roam freely at will, knowing they would most likely wander through the woods in our back yard, head off to play with the neighbor's dogs for a bit, then eventually make their way home just in time for supper. That was such a privilege for us and our pets, and I imagine there are many locals here in Sierra Madre who have similar childhood memories of their own.

Those were the days, weren't they? With acres of undeveloped land, ample space between neighbors and way less traffic passing through our communities, the risks were minimal for a pet with a nose for wanderlust to venture out and explore the great outdoors. After all, it just seems natural for a dog, right?

Well, unfortunately the open acreage and broad land gaps that used to exist between the homes in our local area have shrunk dramatically over the years, and few & far-between are the moments of silence without a vehicle passing swiftly by on our neighborhood streets. Let's face it folks, for those of us who live in highly populated areas such as this LA suburb, the days of "free-range" pet ownership are far-and-away long-gone.

Not only is it extremely risky to allow a dog to wander free these days, it is also against the law. Pet owners in Sierra Madre and other parts of Los Angeles County should know better than to think it is okay to let their dogs roam off-leash outside the boundaries of home or fenced yard. I learned my lesson several years ago while living in Hermosa Beach with my dog, Lady.

Lady was a very friendly and social dog, so I was never concerned that she might hurt anyone - human or canine - and back then it never occurred to me that she, herself could be hurt. I lived two blocks from the beach and I loved letting Lady follow me on foot as I rode my bike down to the strand during the off-season months when there was minimal traffic and few tourists in town.

One day I was riding my bike with Lady following behind when a police officer stopped and cited me for having her off-leash. The leash laws were new to me, so I was taken very much by surprise and quite irritated when I had to take a day off work to appear in court and pay a fine. That was the last time I ever allowed my dog to roam free. I admit it seemed ridiculous at the time, but

I've since learned to respect the leash laws where I live and I suppose I've become somewhat of a compliance advocate, for the safety of the animals.

While we all like to think our dog is smarter than most others, certainly smart enough to stay out of the street and respond promptly to a re-call command, it is simply an unsafe assumption that amounts to nothing less than ignorance. Notwithstanding the fact that our pups have come to be more like family members than pets, a domestic dog is still a creature driven more by instinct than taught intelligence, regardless of how much training he's received.

With all due respect to those responsible owners who believe the time and effort to properly train their pets, there will inevitably come that time - when you least expect it - when the canine will default to his inner instincts and behave accordingly. And the instinctual behavior of a canine is most definitely not aligned with the safety rules standards that we human beings know enough to live by.

Think about it. Even a well-trained, very obedient dog harbors a tendency to chase a squirrel up a tree or a cat meandering by on the opposite side of the street, and when such playful prey makes it's way into a dog's field of vision, his instincts are likely to override the obedience training he may have had, prompting him to take chase after whatever it was that caught his attention.

I've heard it said that you can take the dog out of the wild, but you can't take the wild out of the dog, and I believe there is some truth in that saying. Protect your pets from the potential harm of fast-moving traffic. It only takes once being in the wrong place at the wrong time to end the life of a four-legged friend, so set your pet pride aside and take proper precautions. The risk is simply not worth it, and you'd have only yourself to blame if such a tragic accident should happen.

In closing, I also want to mention that there are some very serious risks inherent to off-leash hiking on the local trails as well. I'm sure the members of our search and rescue team have stories of being called out to assist in locating and rescuing a dog that slipped off the side of the trail into a canyon or wandered too far and went missing in the forest. Again, it seems so natural to let a dog hike alongside us without a leash, but the fact is our pets need us to protect them. Please do the right thing on their behalf. If you love them, you'll leash them.

THE WORLD AROUND US

THE "BIG DIG"

The Pasadena's Hahamongna Watershed Park is one of the local treasures where a vast acreage of river-bottom land grows wild north of the 210 freeway, and north of the Devil's Gate dam. In the wild acreage where children play and equestrians ride, the most common tree is the willow. Also found are stands of mulefat, as well as the occasional cottonwood and alder tree.

Historically, this land was one of the village sites of the indigenous native people who lived on the bluffs surrounding the wash. Their cemetery located just to the south at the site of today's Shelton Reservoir, at today's Arroyo Blvd. and Coniston Street. Eventually, after the Mission era, water was taken out of the Arroyo to feed the orange and fruit plantations to the south. The Arroyo continues to be an important source for Pasadena's water.

After the Station fire, sediment filled in the wash behind the dam, and no sediment has been removed by the County for some 20 years. In fact, the County has the on-going authority to remove up to 25,000 cubic yards of sediment on an annual basis, with no fuss or hearings. Though it has not been done, that is an option that can be enacted.

Now, as of last week, the first phase of a controversial sediment removal project is scheduled to begin. The project is controversial because of the larger-than-necessary scale planned by the County Flood Control District. Rather than pursuing a smaller footprint, and steadily removing soil with the least impact to the wild life, the plan is to remove 850 truckloads of sediment a day for the duration of the more or less four year project.

I had to laugh when I was at a public meeting and someone read the County's description of how 850 trucks traveling in and throughout the southern edge of Hahamongna would be done with no disruption to the local traffic (not to mention the noise, the dust, the fumes, the scaring away of wildlife). Anyone who lives nearby, or who travels through the area, knows that the project - involving about 90 trucks to and fro every day with loads of sediment - will be a nightmare of traffic, noise, and fumes. More on that later - go to the Arroyo Seco

Foundation's website [Arroyoseco.org] to learn more of this issue, arroyoseco.org.

The obvious question has been asked: Why are the County leaders pushing this through, despite opposition from most environmental leaders, when a smaller project would be just as viable, over a longer period of time? The main answer is "flood control," though the details of that are murky and speculative. For one, there is an underflow channel built a decade or so ago so that high waters will pass under Woodbury Road. Then the water flows down into the cement channel of the Arroyo Seco, ultimately to the L.A. River and the beach. Part of the "original sin" of all this is that the stream that once was the Arroyo Seco River is now a cement channel, designed to rush the water away to the ocean, with no chance for water to soak into the local water table. One argument is that if the water level flowing southward was ever too high, it could flood certain neighborhoods, such as the Busch Gardens area as the river passes through South Pasadena. Has anyone living today ever seen the water level rise even half way up the walls of the cement ditch? I've seen it up over half-way during one of the peak-rain years, for two days. Is downstream flooding really a reason for the "big dig"? Whether there is a big dig or a little sustained dig will probably have zero effect on whether or not the cement Arroyo Seco will ever overflow its walls.

There is also the argument made that the dam is important to Pasadena's water supply, but, in fact, the water supply is taken out of the Arroyo via a smaller dam and pipe about a mile upstream.

Another concern, of many, about this project is that the trees will simply and unceremoniously be chopped down and hauled away to the dump. Mostly willow, the wood is valuable to crafters, basket-makers, bowmakers, and herbal medicine crafters. Shouldn't such individuals be invited in to the designated area to remove wood for their higher use than a mere dumping? Shouldn't the County be thinking in terms of the highest use of resources? At the very least, we're speaking of tons of firewood and woodchips?

According to the man who followed in the footsteps of Charles Lummis, "The County Flood Control District's sediment and habitat removal program is going to be devastating to Hahamongna, the most precious environmental zone in our region," said Arroyo Seco Foundation Managing Director Tim Brick.

Next week we'll look at the willow tree, one of the most common trees that will be cut down en masse in the Hahamongna basin.

A PERFECT CHRISTMAS GIFT: FIRST STAR I SEE TONIGHT

By Bob Eklund

This book invites the scientist and poet to set aside their differences for a night—to come outside, stand very still as the sun sets, feel the earth turning eastward, be dazzled by a moonrise, catch a falling star, walk with constellations, ride a rocket to Jupiter space, and finally look back at the Home Planet with new eyes. In poetry, prose, and picture, author/poet Robert Eklund and illustrator Virginia Hoge have created a unique mix of astronomy and art that asks you to join them in the billion-year mission of “descrambling the wonder, outside and inside.”

FIRST STAR
The evening burns,
The dark earth turns,
The mountains loom against the sky;
One star looks down
To bless the town,
While sunset clouds sail grandly by.
And if the light
Of noon's delight
Moves on, and leaves us where we are,
The darkest night
But aids our sight—
The better to reveal the star.

Excerpt: Introduction

One starry night many years ago, while driving alone up the wild and rocky Big Sur coast of California, I pulled over and stopped mycar for a break. Stepping out into the starlight, I walked a few feet to the edge of the cliff and looked down. From somewhere farbelow came a growl of surf. As my eyes grew accustomed to the dark, I looked with awe at the brilliant Milky Way stretching overhead and down the sky to the southwest, out over the sea. Then I did a double-take—and thought I was going to fall off the cliff.

What I thought I was seeing was the Milky Way continuing down, down, below what must have been the horizon and deep into the sea itself. The dizzying impression was that I was standing on a flat earth and seeing stars beyond and below its edge. What I was really seeing was the Milky Way reflected on the ocean hundreds of feet below me—but I was not immediately aware of that, and so startling was the impression on my senses that I panicked. Feeling lost, disoriented and frightened under that vast sky, I turned and ran for my car! I only felt safe again when I had the engine running, lights on, and the car in motion.

As other recollections of that trip faded, that single moment of bedazzled stellar awe and panic remained with me as one of my

most cherished memories. Later, when I began to read Japanese haiku poetry, I realized that my Big Sur night was exactly the kind of experience that the best haiku poems are able to record and transmit to others. The great haiku-master Matsuo Basho perhaps summed it up best. His own experience on the cold, lonely coast of northern Japan, on a dark night in the 1600s, must have been much like mine. He wrote:


How wild the sea!
And, stretching over Sado's isle,
The Galaxy!

The poignant sense of space, of loneliness, felt in Basho's encounter with the night sky becomes all the more intense when you know that, in his time, Sado's isle was a penal colony.

A poem can intensify, compress, and store our experiences and emotions, just as a painting intensifies and preserves an artist's vision—or as a capacitor stores and holds an electric charge. This is a book of experiences under the sky, most often the sky of night. In recording such moments, I frequently have used the compact, 17-syllable haiku form of poetry, borrowed from the Japanese. This form seems especially suited to encapsulate and preserve meaningful encounters with nature, to “call forth in 17 syllables the limitless nuances of earth and sky,” as the classic haiku poet Masaoka Shiki put it.

When I was a child, it was my good fortune to grow up on the grounds of Yerkes Observatory, a major astronomical observatory in southern Wisconsin, where my grandfather was employed for many years as a photographer and lecturer. No doubt the seeds for these poems were sown in those early years when, as a six-year-old, I would sometimes be roused out of sleep by my mother at midnight to go outside and watch a display of the aurora borealis or a shower of meteors. Over the years, while pursuing other careers, I have learned a few things about astronomy, but always as an amateur—in the original meaning of that word: a lover. The naturalist John Burroughs said it so well: “To know is not all, it is only half. To love is the other half.”

A word about the organization of this book may be useful. I have endeavored to so blend science and art that readers may gain unexpected insights in the twin realms of the mind and the heart. The book is structured as an encounter with a starry night—from nightfall through moonlight and starlight and on to bedtime—with excursions, along the way, into both outer and inner space. You may find it helpful to refer to the “Endnotes” section (starting on page 205) while reading this book. The comments there, keyed to the book's page numbers, add perspective to the main text and provide



resources for further learning.

Basho wrote: “Before the light that things give off dies in the heart, it must be expressed.” My hope is that this book may inspire readers to go out, observe the “limitless nuances of earth and sky,” and then express, in their own words, “the light that things give off.”

I write for all who love the starry sky, the setting sun, the full moon rising, and even the stormy night full of raindrops and snowflakes. The beauty of these things is never far from us.



THE RETIREMENT BENEFITS OF A HEALTH SAVINGS ACCOUNT

Dear Savvy Senior,
What can you tell me about health savings accounts? I've been reading that they are a great investment that can help with growing health care costs when I retire.

Planning Ahead

Dear Planning,
It's true! A health savings account is a fantastic financial tool that can help you build up a tax-free stash of money for medical expenses now and after you retire – but there's a catch. To get one, you must have a high-deductible health insurance policy.

How They Work

Health savings accounts (or HSAs) have become increasingly popular over the past few years as health care costs continue to skyrocket, and because more and more Americans have gotten high-deductible health plans.

The benefit of a HSA is the triple tax advantage that it offers: Your HSA contributions can be deducted pretax from your paycheck, lowering your taxable income; the money in the account grows tax-free; and if you use the money for eligible medical expenses, withdrawals are tax-free.

And if you change jobs, the HSA moves with you.

To qualify, you must have a health insurance policy with a deductible of at least \$1,350 for an individual or \$2,700 for a family.

This year (2018), you can contribute up to \$3,450 if you have single health insurance coverage, or up to \$6,900 for family coverage. Next year (2019) you can contribute slightly more – up to \$3,500 for single coverage or up to \$7,000 for family coverage. And people age 55 and older can put away an extra \$1,000 each year. But you cannot make contributions after you sign up for Medicare.

The money can be used for out-of-pocket medical expenses, including deductibles, co-payments, Medicare premiums, prescription drugs, vision and dental care and other expenses (see [IRS.gov/pub/irs-pdf/p502.pdf](https://www.irs.gov/pub/irs-pdf/p502.pdf), page 5, for a complete list) either now or when you retire for yourself and your spouse as well as your tax dependents.

And unlike a flexible spending account, an HSA doesn't require you to use the money by the end of the year. Rather, HSA funds roll over year to year and continue to grow tax-free in your HSA account for later use. In fact, you'll get a bigger tax benefit if



you use other cash for current medical expenses and keep the HSA money growing for the long term. Be sure to hold on to your receipts for medical expenses after you open your HSA, even if you pay those bills with cash, so you can claim the expenses later. There's no time limit for withdrawing the money tax-free for eligible medical expenses you incurred anytime after you opened the account.

But be aware that if you do use your HSA funds for non-medical expenses, you'll be required to pay taxes on the withdrawal, plus a 20 percent penalty. The penalty, however, is waived for those 65 and older, but you'll still pay ordinary income tax on withdrawals not used for eligible expenses.

How to Open a HSA

You should first check with your employer to see if they offer a HSA, and if they will contribute to it. If not, you can open an HSA through many banks, brokerage firms and other financial institutions, as long as you have a qualified high-deductible health insurance policy.

If you plan to keep the money growing for the future, look for an HSA administrator that offers a portfolio of mutual funds for long-term investing and has low fees. HealthEquity, OptumBank, The HSA Authority and Bank of America are the top ranked HSA providers for long-term investing according to the investment research firm Morningstar. To search for providers, visit HSAsearch.com.

After setting up your HSA plan, adding money is pretty straightforward. Most plans let you do online transfers from your bank, send checks directly, or set up a payroll deduction if offered by your employer. And to access your HSA funds many plans provide a debit card, some offer a checkbook and most allow for reimbursement.



Supply & Demand



CALTRANS RELEASES FINAL 710 NORTH PROJECT ENVIRONMENTAL IMPACT REPORT, TUNNEL ALTERNATIVE NOT NAMED PREFERRED ALTERNATIVE

Pasadena (CA) – The California Department of Transportation (Caltrans) has released the Final Environmental Impact Report/Environmental Impact Statement (EIR/EIS) for the SR 710 North Project. The final report identifies the Transportation System Management/Trans-portion Demand Manag-ement Alternative as the Preferred Alternative out of the four build options, including a freeway tunnel.

“The final EIR is a historic step in the right direction,” said Assemblymember Holden. “I look forward to working with all my colleagues in the legislature to support local efforts to improve mobility, and pass policies to affirmatively remove the tunnel option from any future consideration.”

In April 2017, the Los Angeles Metro Board of Directors passed a motion recognizing the lack of funds needed to construct a single bore freeway tunnel, and instead recommended the Transportation System Management/Transportation Demand Management Alternative for the 710 North Study Area while allocating remaining measure R funds for new mobility improvement projects in the designated area.

Assemblymember Holden first pursued a state level solution early in 2017, and advocated that L.A Metro move away from the tunnel option. Legislation previously introduced by Assemblymember Holden included provisions that would give greater local control to future developments, and specified that State Route 710 is only from Route 1 to Route 10.





HOW TO INCLUDE YOUR DIGITAL ASSETS IN YOUR ESTATE PLAN

Today, estate planning encompasses not just tangible property like finances and real estate, but also digital assets like cryptocurrency, blogs, and social media. With so much of our lives now lived online, it’s vital you put the proper estate planning provisions in place to ensure your digital assets are effectively protected and passed on in the event of your incapacity or death.

Last week I discussed some of the most common types of digital assets and the legal landscape surrounding them. Here, I offer some practical tips to ensure all your digital property is effectively incorporated into your estate plan.

Best practices for including digital assets in your estate plan

If you’re like most people, you probably own numerous digital assets, some of which likely have significant monetary and/or sentimental value. Other types of online property may have no value for anyone other than yourself or be something you’d prefer your family and friends not access or inherit.

To ensure all your digital assets are accounted for, managed, and passed on in exactly the way you want, you should take the following steps:

1. Create an inventory: Start by creating a list of all your digital assets, including the related login information and passwords. Password management apps such as LastPass can help simplify this effort. From there, store the list in a secure location, and provide detailed instructions to your fiduciary about how to access it and get into the accounts. Just like money you’ve hidden in a safe, if no one knows where it is or how to unlock it, these assets will likely be lost forever.
2. Add your digital assets to your estate

plan: Include specific instructions in your will, trust, and/or other estate planning documents about the heir(s) you want to inherit each asset, along with how you’d like the accounts managed in the future, if that’s an option. Some assets might be of no value to your family or be something you don’t want them to access, so you should specify that those accounts and files be closed and/or deleted by your fiduciary. Do NOT provide the specific account info, logins, or passwords in your estate planning documents, which can be easily read by others. This is especially true for wills, which become public record upon your death. Keep this information stored in a secure place, and let your fiduciary know how to find and use it.

3. Limit access: In your plan, you should also include instructions for your fiduciary about what level of access you want him or her to have. For example, do you want your executor to be able to read all your emails and social media posts before deleting them or passing them on to your heirs? If there are any assets you want to limit access to, we can help you include the necessary terms in your plan to ensure your privacy is honored.

4. Check service providers’ access-authorization tools: Carefully review the terms and conditions for your online accounts. Some service providers like Google, Facebook, and Instagram have tools in place that allow you to easily designate access to others in the event of your death. If such a function is offered, use it to document who you want to have access to these accounts.

BUSH-APPOINTED JUDGE CREDITS ROBERTS FOR STANDING UP TO TRUMP

HARRISBURG, Pa. - John E. Jones III doesn't look or sound much like a rebel.

Like a lot of federal judges, he's given to sober suits, long pauses, and thoughtful and deliberative sentences.

But Jones, a judge of the Middle District of Pennsylvania, in the state capital of Harrisburg, is pretty much a legal apostate in our newly narrow judicial universe where all federal judges are "Obama judges," or "Bush judges," or "Clinton judges."

In 2005, in a case that became known as the "Dover Panda Trial," Jones ruled that a central Pennsylvania school district's attempt to teach intelligent design in science class violated the Constitution's Establishment Clause.

In 2014, Jones beat the U.S. Supreme Court to the punch by a full year, overturning Pennsylvania's gay marriage ban.

Still, if we're following the rules set down by President Donald Trump in his latest Jeremiad against judicial independence, then Jones, a President George W. Bush appointee, should not have ruled, as he did in Kitzmiller, that "the writings of leading [intelligent design] proponents reveal that the designer postulated by their argument is the God of Christianity."

And in the Trumpiverse, where judges are expected to rubber-stamp the White House's proposals, and not act as the co-equal branch of government, there's no way that a "Bush judge" would have offered an impassioned preamble in the same-sex marriage case about the rights of "all Pennsylvanians have the right to marry the person of their choice and consequently."

But Jones did just that.

And it wasn't because Jones was legislating from the bench. And it wasn't because Jones decided to shred the Constitution and cast it to the four winds. It was because he took a look at the facts, the Constitution, and precedent, and made a ruling that followed the law of the land.

Sometimes it's really that simple.

"It's not that we're going rogue, we're deciding cases according to the law," Jones said when I called him to ask him about Trump's judicial broadsides, the president's extraordinary war of words with U.S. Supreme Court Justice John Roberts, and Jones' own concerns about attacks on judicial independence.

Jones declined to comment directly on Trump, who recently groused loudly, and publicly, about a federal judge's ruling short-circuiting the White House's attempts to turn away a column of asylum-seekers who have now reached the southern border.

But he did credit Roberts, who rebuked Trump's attacks on the judiciary, sternly noting that "we do not have Obama judges or Trump judges, Bush judges or Clinton judges." Roberts also smartly observed that an "independent judiciary is something we should all be thankful for."

The chief justice's words were "a timely statement for him to make and truly a heartfelt statement," Jones observed.

"As the functional head of the federal judiciary, to see him stand up for his judges was just terrific," Jones said. "I think most of us [judges], if not all of us, feel that way."

Reflecting on the independence of the judiciary, Jones noted that "all we have, as is so often said, is our credibility," he said. "We don't have the purse and we don't have the sword - as Alexander Hamilton said. If that credibility is destroyed and people think they can disregard the rule of law in society, then we are going to a very dangerous and dark place."

"We have an appellate system that gives everyone the opportunity to have due process if they disagree," he continued. "Decisions themselves can be roundly criticized. It's a free country. But when those attacks devolve into something that is personal or when a judge's authority is questioned because we're a co-equal branch of government, it's problematic for all of us."


And that's why it's so important for people to respect the independence of the judiciary. There will be times when you don't agree with a judge or his or her jurisprudence (and I have plenty of disagreements with the current U.S. Supreme Court), but they're there for a reason: To make sure everyone gets a fair shake under the law.

And one of these days, it might be your turn. And you won't realize how much you miss that right to a fair shake until it's not there anymore.

"We need to dial back the inflammatory rhetoric that might not be designed to imperil judges but might have that effect," Jones said. "We should be very careful about that."

GIVE TRUMP CREDIT WHEN DUE

Stuck in a hotel room watching CNN the other day, I happened to catch live coverage of Donald Trump's short speech about the "First Step Act," concerning criminal justice reforms. I was bowled over. If I had been reading an unlabeled transcript I might have thought the speaker was Barack Obama.

Imbalances and outright abuses in our criminal justice system are a plague on society. And here was Trump, the law-and-order president, urging passage of legislation to limit mandatory sentences, especially for drug offenses, and advocating new funding for sweeping anti-recidivism programs.

Trump also said this: "Today's announcement shows that true bipartisanship is possible." Yes! He's correct - and that's big news.

I kept expecting Trump to put his foot in his mouth by shifting to "criminals" in the migrant caravan, or ranting about "crimes" he believes were committed in election recounts. He did not. He was entirely reasonable and on message - albeit with a prepared text - about a vitally important issue.

When it ended, however, I had a sinking feeling. What if mainstream media were to under play, or even ignore, this very positive news? After all, members of Trump's team, most notably Kellyanne Conway, have stated repeatedly that media dwell on Trump's problems and fail to give appropriate space to meaningful achievements.

In the hours that followed, CNN devoted almost all of its time to "chaos" in the White House—Trump's mood, Melania Trump's effort to get a national security deputy fired, and charges and countercharges about the election results. The First Step Act was barely mentioned.

I was able to check two broadcast networks. On NBC's "Nightly News," the story was covered reasonably well about eight minutes in. But the "CBS Evening News" never mentioned the story in its half-hour report. Never mentioned it!

The next morning, the story was practically invisible on the nation's front pages - with no page-one coverage in The Los Angeles Times, Washington Post, Wall Street Journal, Chicago Tribune or USA Today.

Only The New York Times, among papers I surveyed, stepped up, making the story its lead of the day, atop page one. In an editorial, The Times added, "In this early test, the president is signaling that he indeed wants to make progress on critical issues that enjoy broad support."

Meanwhile progressive commentator Van Jones told CNN's Don Lemon: "I say, the 99 times I don't agree with the president I'm going to give him hell. But on this one, I'll give him a salute and applause."

What followed was a Twitter backlash against Jones from liberals who were troubled by praise, any praise, for Trump. Jones replied via Twitter: "There are 200,000 people behind bars. They have no hope, no help. We haven't passed a bill to help them in almost two generations."

The president himself has noted that he could work with the new Democratic majority in the House on many issues, from drug prices, to repairing infrastructure and, yes, on criminal justice reform.

Trump's opponents along with media who cover the White House objectively must walk a fine line. They should criticize him when he deserves it and must hold him accountable for his many misstatements. But they can't succumb to temporary blindness when the news is positive.

As the second half of Trump's term begins, reforms are needed in criminal justice - and also in how politicians and media conduct themselves on the rare occasions when good news happens at the White House.
