CITY LOOKS TO CUT FIRE PERSONNEL IN EXCHANGE FOR RESPONSE AND SUPPRESSION SERVICES FROM ARCADIA

Sierra Madre is exploring the possibility of teaming up with the City of Arcadia in order to increase fire response and suppression services, but at the cost of eliminating fire department positions.

Members of the community, along with staff of the fire department, paramedics and police department turned out at Tuesday's City Council meeting to express concerns and show support for the proposed plan with the city's neighbor to the South.

The first step in the strategy will be the approval of a non-binding term sheet which lays out the conditions of the agreement with Arcadia. This would include fire suppression and related services to all areas of Sierra Madre to be provided by Arcadia, who will receive compensation not to exceed \$800,000 during year one of the agreement. Sierra Madre would continue to provide fire prevention services to residents such as fire inspections, brush inspections, Fire Marshall duties, in addition to Emergency Medical and Ambulance services.

The second step is causing the greatest concern among the community and emergency services personnel—the reorganization of the Sierra Madre Fire Department. This would involve the elimination of one Fire Chief position, three Fire Captain positions, three Fire Engineer positions, and all part-time Fire Engineer and Firefighter positions.

In 2018 (through December 1), Sierra Madre Fire Department received 945 total calls for services. Of those calls, 767 (81.16%) were for ambulance services. There were three calls for structure fires during the same time period. Under the current system, one fire engine would be deployed during such a call, along with one rescue ambulance. In a bigger fire scenario, Sierra Madre would depend on neighboring towns such as Arcadia, Monrovia and Pasadena to provide support, which they are not required.

According to Interim Fire Chief Kurt Norwood, the ideal situation would be for Sierra Madre to be included in the unified response Verdugo system (automatic aid). With the benefit of automatic aid, Sierra Madre would receive three fire engines, two fire trucks, one Battalion Chief, and one Rescue Ambulance to "working fire" calls. This would total 18 to 23 fire service personnel dispatched automatically.

The City is hoping by teaming up with Arcadia, who already participates as a member of the Verdugo System, getting access to automatic aid may become an attainable goal. Sierra Madre, as a result, will automatically receive a fire engine from Arcadia on all EMS calls. There will also be significant cost-saving for the city, though cutting fire

personnel and an engine from Sierra Madre is causing some alarm among residents and current fire, EMS and police staff.

"This plan is going to eliminate some of the resources we need," according to Sierra Madre firefighter Mark Doosan. "You need at least four to six people to run these calls—you are going to have two paramedics respond to a call in the city and wait for another resource to come and help on that rescue. We are adding 1,000 calls to that fire station [Arcadia]. We are taking a huge resource for the city and [throwing it] away for a monetary amount...I hate to see this community lose such a resource that has a strong history in this city," Doosan said.

Retired Sierra Madre Fire Captain Christine Lowe, had a different take on this issue. "The one reason I am supporting this proposal is that the response times that we're looking at if we respond with an automatic aid... will dispatch the closest engine company. That will save time and increases your personnel," Lowe notes.

Paramedic Alan Hodge also voiced concern over resources. "The city of Arcadia is also suffering from a budget deficit and is declaring a fiscal emergency. What is the plan if they take over our fire suppression services and they have to look at cutting services as well?" Hodge asked. "I never heard of a fire department that doesn't have a fire engine," he added.

Sierra Madre Police Officer Lara Leduc stated her unease with response time if cuts are made. "The police department responds on a lot of critical medical calls so having an engine that's further away you are taking away from police resources. If the paramedics are doing CPR on someone, and a hot call comes for the police department of a robbery in progress, we're probably not going to leave because we are helping the paramedics. If my mom was on the floor and needed CPR and couldn't be moved, I don't want to wait an extra two minutes for Pasadena or Arcadia... to get my mom to the hospital," Leduc said.

Some residents addressed the Council about not being fully informed about the cuts and the plan being pushed through "fast" without more meetings and discussion.

City Manager Gabriel Engeland emphasized the importance of automatic aid in the wake of the Mt. Wilson fire back in 2008 where the city didn't have the personnel to handle the fire. This prompted the city to fill more positions over the years.

In addition to losing positions, the City will create a new position of Fire and EMS Department Head and add a

Full-Time Medic, as well as retaining current Fire Medic positions. All off this, of course, depends on agreeing on a deal with Arcadia first.

City Council approved the term sheet

and approved the reorganization of the fire department and now will wait to see if they can finalize an agreement with Arcadia.

Sierra Madre for many years

prided itself on its all-volunteer fire department, but with the increase in fires in recent years, felt the need to bring in professional staff to ensure the safety of the community.

A PARALLEL APPROACH

Much of the public reaction to Tuesday's announcement of the 're-organization' of Sierra Madre's Fire Department has been on Social Media where emotions are running wild in opposition to the proposal. Displeasure with the lack of prior notice, the agenda report that suggests that a decision has already been made to move the department without the input of the public and most importantly, the outrage at even the suggestion that the SM Fire Department contract out fire services to another city has ignited a 'firestorm' of its own.

However, according to City Manager Gabe Engeland, the angst among residents is premature. In a lengthy interview with Engeland on Wednesday, Engeland reiterated several times that 'no decision has been made'.

Instead, he says his actions are just a "parallel course" to getting Sierra Madre the highly valued Automatic Aid.

Over the years, the issue of whether or not Sierra Madre was or would ever be eligible to participate in the Verdugo Communications Center* with neighboring cities has been discussed. The obstacle has been the fact that SMFD was a Volunteer Fire

Department without full time employees. Today, that is no longer the case as according to the city manager, the SMFD is now a fully paid department with an acting Fire Chief, 3 full time Captains, 1 full time Engineer, 6 full time Fire Medics, and 1 part time Medic. In addition, the city is in the process of hiring 2 additional full time engineers. All positions are fully funded. "Money is not the issue", says Engeland, "Safety is".

With the addition of the new employees, Sierra Madre will be eligible, according to the standards established for participating in the Verdugo Hills Communications group.

Engeland indicated that in the event the city is once again denied automatic aid/mutual aid status with Verdugo, the proposed contract with Arcadia would give the city the auto/mutual coverage.

[In emergency services, mutual aid is an agreement among emergency responders to lend assistance across jurisdictional boundaries. This may occur due to an emergency response that exceeds local resources, such as a disaster or a multiple-alarm fire. Mutual aid may be ad hoc, requested only when such an emergency occurs. It may also be a formal standing

agreement for cooperative emergency management on a continuing basis, such as ensuring that resources are dispatched from the nearest fire station, regardless of which side of the jurisdictional boundary the incident is on. Agreements that send closest resources are regularly referred to as "automatic aid agreements".] These designations have been a goal of the SMFD for years.

Engeland is not confident that Verdugo will grant Sierra Madre the classification requested, despite the changes that have been made in accordance with standards that are well established throughout the state. He asked the council to to authorize submission of the proposal to Arcadia to reorganize the SMFD. As indicated in the related story, the council approved the submission and also authorized the payment of \$20,000 to Arcadia to 'analyze' the request. Engeland said he prefers to continue staffing the department and preparing the request for Verdugo while also proceeding with the request to Arcadia to take over fire services from Sierra Madre. He called this his "Parallel Approach".

Engeland has been successful in many of his endeavors since being hired by the city. (cont. page 2)

Currently the city has a \$1.2 million dollar surplus in the general fund and the ability to continue to fund a fully staffed fire department in the future. And while Engeland feels that this approach is 'safest' for Sierra Madre, the lack of advance notice and complete information has angered many, especially since residents have approved the UUT to keep the Police, Fire and Paramedics in Sierra Madre.

Engeland says his approach is basically to cover all possible outcomes, yet the staff report is worded as though the decision has already been made.

Many members of the SMFD needless to say, are not happy. A rather lengthy Letter To Citizens of Sierra Madre can be found on page B3.

The City Manager assures those he speaks with that this is just the beginning of the process and that nothing has been finalized (true), yet there is a great deal of backlash from the actions taken so far.

In the meantime, the SMFD will continue staffing up and Arcadia will consider the dismantling of the department.

*According the the Verdugo website, The Verdugo Fire Communications Center (VFCC) was established on August 1, 1979 by the founding cities of Burbank, Glendale and Pasadena. The purpose of VFCC was to allow the three cities to make optimum use of fire service resources and increase the overall effectiveness of the fire defense system of the joint cities. The agreement also included a "no borders" clause - the closest fire engine responded to calls regardless of jurisdiction.

Today, VFCC continues to be jointly owned by the Tri-Cities and provides fire, EMS and rescue dispatch services on a contract basis to the Hollywood Burbank Airport as well as 10 other cities in the region including Alhambra, Arcadia, Monrovia, Montebello, Monterey Park, San Gabriel, San Marino, Sierra Madre, South Pasadena and Vernon. Although their website indicates Sierra Madre is included, their participation appears to be limited to the dispatching of calls to the city.

KATIE Tse.....This and That FAMOUS IMPOSTERS

I'm trying hard to stick to my New Year's resolution of not recycling old articles, but it's rough. Just when I finish a story I wake up to my next deadline. Special thanks to Susan Henderson, my editor, for tolerating my guilty habit of sending her stuff at the last minute!

This week I thought I'd write about an interesting piece I read some time ago about identify theft. However, this isn't identify theft as we know it today. This is identify theft, seventeenth century style.

Back in those days, identity theft was a big thing because, quite frankly, one didn't always know what rich or powerful people looked like. For example, let's say you were a wealthy nobleman and you went on an extended vacation. Who's to stop someone from knocking on your villagers' doors, claiming to be you? I mean, hey, the villagers have never seen you, you hang out in your walled estate all the time. None of the commoners have ever met you. They don't know what you look like. This was before technology and social media. No Instagram accounts to reference. The only way to capture their likeness in pictures was for the rich to sit for portraits, but even those might not be very accurate.

Bram Stoker, author of *Dracula*, wrote about just that in his book, *Famous Imposters*. Though he's an excellent writer, I could not get through the whole thing simply because it was hard to keep track of the names of all the players, but one chapter was particularly intriguing. It had to do with Queen Elizabeth I.

Elizabeth was an interesting person. Never married, shrewd negotiator, inspiring militarily leader, and a patron of the arts. There's a theory that she was, in fact, a man. Not that women can't possess all those qualities, but other details of her life warrant closer inspection.

The story Stoker tells is that King Henry had sent his daughter, Elizabeth, away to the countryside in hopes that the change of climate would invigorate her, she was a sickly child. He entrusted her to the care of a couple who served the royal family. During this time away from the palace, Elizabeth

fell sick and died. Horror stricken, the couple decided to take a local farm boy whom the princess had befriended, dress him as a girl, and pass him off as the dead princess. I'm not sure what their long term plan was, but we know from history that King Henry VIII wasn't the sort of person you'd want to tick off.

The body of the princess was placed in a stone coffin and buried in a garden near the home where she died. Apparently the plan had been to return later and properly dispose of the remains, because the bones of a young girl were discovered at the site years later. At the time of Stoker's writing there was still the appearance of an oblong coffin-shaped patch of land to be seen in the garden.

In our story, so far, who would have had the most reason to be scared? I'd say the boy who was playing Elizabeth and the couple who had thrust him into this awful situation in the first place. Sounds like just the recipe for a strong new alliance born out of necessity.

Stoker suggests just that. Throughout her life, Elizabeth never parted from the couple, even promoting the man to a high position in her royal court. She also never saw doctors, preferring to put any bodily troubles solely in the hands of God. She always traveled with a multitude of wigs (possibly to hide male pattern baldness?). And that stiff ruffled collar --was it simply fashionable or was it covering a prominent Adam's apple?

Someone who was spying on her for another country reported that, according to his informants, Elizabeth would never bear children. This was said of only 26. Shortly before she died, Elizabeth was quoted as saying something to the effect of, "When I'm gone, I don't want some charlatan taking over for me." An odd request to make on the way out, wouldn't you say?

Well, my little treatment of Stoker's work hardly does it justice. For the full story, check out his book for yourself. I, for one, found it fascinating, and I've never been able to look at a portrait of the Queen who reigned during England's Golden Age the same way since.

OK, we're a couple of weeks into the new year, but we don't need to stop celebrating it yet, do we? It may be a little late for this, but on the other hand, maybe not. Many people like to start their New Year's with a dish of black-eyed peas, a Southern tradition for good luck and prosperity. My grandmother, Louise Pitzer Sessions, a genuine Southern lady, was from Virginia and spent many of her formative years in Texas, which meant a childhood of black-eyed peas. My family, however, likes to kick off the New Year with Split Pea Soup. Easy to make, do it ahead of time, and if you've planned ahead, you can make enough to keep hungry teen-agers and/or football fans happy all day long. You can double and triple this recipe with great success, if your pot is big enough. Now with bigger, better crockpots, you can keep it warm all day. Super Bowl Sunday is coming and this would be the perfect thing for a crowd. The picture is of a barrel of split peas that lives at Sprouts. They're \$1.19/lb. and this looks so inviting!

Split Pea Soup

- 1 package split peas (these are found in the market aisle where rice, noodles, beans, etc. are located)
- 4 ham hocks (usually packaged 2 to a package in the meat section) or a ham shank, or the ham bone left over from Christmas.
- 3-4 medium-size onions – actually there's no such thing as too much onion!
- 6-7 good size carrots (or a package of baby carrots)
- 1 good size bunch of celery
- Salt, Pepper

Split pea soup is an opportunity to creatively express

yourself. There are few rules, just a few suggestions:

Get out your really large pot and put the ham hocks or the ham bone in the bottom. Throw the peas on top of that, followed by the onions, carrots and celery which you've washed and cut into big chunks. Cover all this with water, or a combination of water and chicken broth. Say about 8-12 cups of water. Season with salt and pepper and whatever else you like. If you're partial to thyme, put some in there. Or Mrs. Dash.

Cover your pot and put in the oven at about 300 degrees. Leave it in there for about four to six hours, or till the peas have become very tender. Take it out and let the mixture cool to where you can handle it without burning yourself. Remove the ham hocks or ham bone and set them (it) aside.

Assemble your blender and blend your lukewarm soup/veggie mixture into a smooth puree. Put this into a large container with a cover, like that crock pot we were talking about earlier. When all your soup is pureed, remove whatever meat is on your ham hocks or ham bone, tossing out all fat and other non-meaty parts and put the meat back into your soup. Refrigerate. Let it sit for a day or so to develop flavor, reheat it and stand back so the hungry guests don't run over you as they rush to grab a bowl of the best split pea soup anywhere. You could make some cornbread or corn muffins to go with your soup and everyone who has some will love you forever, getting your New Year off to a great start!

Christmas is over.... sort of. My neighbors' wonderful light displays are still up brightening the night and I haven't taken in my adorable lighted deer, so I figure I can tell you right below here, that you can still listen to Christmas music or give yourself a delightful Christmas story to let that glow linger on a little longer.

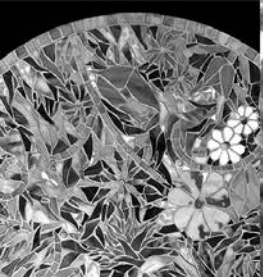

BARGER CALLS FOR E-SCOOTER PILOT PROGRAM

LOS ANGELES COUNTY – On Tuesday, the Board of Supervisors will consider a motion by Supervisor Kathryn Barger directing county agencies to develop a regulatory framework for the safe commercial operation of e-scooters in the communities of unincorporated Los Angeles County.

In November 2018, the arrival of e-scooters in unincorporated Altadena and East Pasadena created a serious concern about the potential public safety and nuisance issues that e-scooters have caused in other jurisdictions.

Supervisor Barger's motion directs the CEO, in collaboration with county departments and agencies, to develop a pilot program in 45 days with regulations allowing for the safe operation and storage of shared e-scooters and bikes on County roadways.

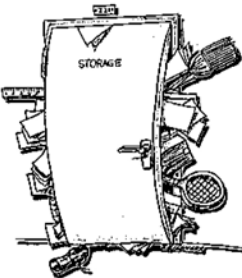
"We want a collaborative plan that allows operators to provide a viable transit option for our residents while minimizing the potential for public nuisances, safety issues, and lawsuits ultimately paid by taxpayers," Barger said.

The program will also include a consumer-focused website regarding safety and other information to set the stage for a safe, sustainable, and innovative approach to incorporating e-scooters and bicycles as a service to residents looking to bridge gaps in transit access.

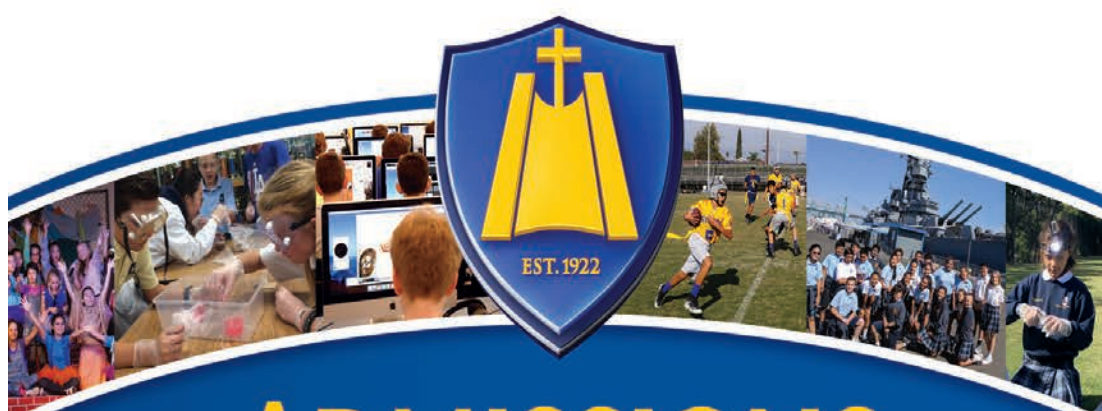

Wooten Gets 14 Years for Embezzlement



Former Pasadena Department of Public Works Employee Danny Wooten was sentenced yesterday to 14 years in prison. He was also ordered to pay back almost \$3.7 million in restitution —more than the \$3.5 million he was convicted, in November, of stealing.

Tyrone Collins, a co-defendant, was given seven years for his roll in the embezzlement.

Both men had been taken into custody immediately after being found guilty by a jury November 6.

Deputy District Attorney Bjorn Dodd said in November, “Jurors deliberated for about three days before finding Wooten guilty of 53 counts, including embezzlement, conflict of interest and misappropriation of public funds. Codefendant Tyrone Collins was convicted of 20 counts, including embezzlement and misappropriation of public funds.”

Wooten was a management analyst for the city.

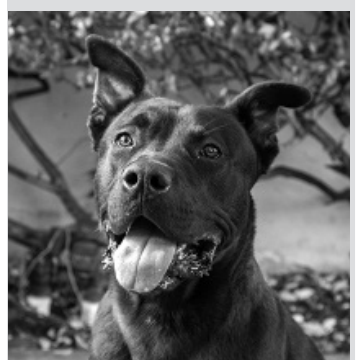
Between 2004 and March 2014, Wooten created false invoices for the underground utility program and stole roughly \$3.5 million.

He funneled some of the stolen money to Collins, who owns Collins Electric, the prosecutor said.

Wooten also created bank accounts purporting to represent two religious organizations. However, he was the only person on the account, the prosecutor said.

The scheme was discovered in 2014 when the city ordered an audit.

Centers to Replace Polling Places in 2020

During a jam-packed meeting Thursday, local residents were asked for input on new radical changes to the current voting system that does away with local polling places in 2020 in favor of county based regional vote centers and replaces ballot marking devices with “electronic polbooks” that use a combination of a touchscreen and a voter’s personal smartphone.

There will be far less vote centers compared to polling places, with some low population cities having none. Common Cause Public Outreach Coordinator Kiyana Asemanfar said there would be about 1,000 vote centers throughout Los Angeles County. According to the Los Angeles County Registrar-Recorder/County Clerk’s office there were around 4,000 polling places in 2018.

Asemanfar said ideal locations for the centers included,

“libraries, Starbucks and other chain restaurants, shopping malls, big box stores, local parks, schools and churches. She said the purpose of the meeting was to see where voters wanted vote centers. One attendee said “You better not put them in Walmart.”

Pasadena City Clerk Mark Jomsky said the city would also review the sites within Pasadena.

“The county is going to be administering the election so they will be choosing the sites,” He said. “We will as a city give input into it but there won’t be any council action on any of the vote center sites.”

Jomsky also said that because of changes from local Measures AA and BB, “this changes all city council and local PUSD board elections to even years, so all the races will be on the county ballot starting in 2020.”

Jomsky explained what is changing is where people vote. “They’re going to go from

smaller neighborhood sites to these bigger voting centers, there will be fewer but each one will still allow anyone from any part of LA County to go to a center to vote. So let’s say you live in Pasadena but work in downtown Los Angeles and a vote center is located near your work, you can cast your Pasadena ballot at the downtown location.”

He said the idea is to make voting more flexible, each center will be open 11 days, 10 before, and election day. Jomsky also said he will no longer be involved in counting ballots during elections, a long standing tradition among city clerks.

Asemanfar said every proposed center location will be reviewed for room size, parking, public transit, ADA accessibility, hours of operation and internet capacity among other things.

Los Angeles County Public Works will start the commencement of the New York Drive Roadway Improvement Project. Sully-Miller Contracting Company will begin Phase 1 construction along New York Drive between Altadena Drive and Allen Avenue on Monday. Phase 1 construction will last approximately five months starting with construction on the north side of New York Drive, progressing from Altadena Drive to Allen Avenue. When work on the north side is complete, construction will shift to the south side of the street and continue in a similar manner.

Work to be Completed: Construction and reconstruction of curbs, gutters, and sidewalks; replacement of guardrail, and reconstruction of the roadway. Where: New York Drive between Altadena Drive and Allen Avenue. Working Hours: Weekdays between 7 a.m. and 3:30 p.m.

New York Drive will be closed to non-local traffic. Local traffic and driveway access will be maintained. Detour signage has been installed to direct traffic. Parking may be restricted. Temporary “NO PARKING” signs may be posted along the construction route at least 1 day prior to the arrival of the work crew.

As we have been contemplating ways to improve and stabilize the GoMonrovia program, staff has also been assessing how we can better serve passengers with disabilities who are in need of an ADA accessible vehicle. Currently, ADA rides are provided through the City's dial-a-ride shuttles, however, we have observed that users with non-ADA needs are still utilizing that particular transportation option.

This has resulted in slower and less efficient services for those with ADA needs. In an effort to address that particular concern, staff has been working to develop a closed system dial-a-ride program that only serves those with ADA needs. To transition the program, the City will be requiring anyone looking to utilize the City's ADA services to pre-register before services will be provided. We understand the inconvenience associated with

instituting new processes, and apologize in advance for any impact this change may cause.

However, in order to better serve the ADA community, we have identified that a registration process will be needed in order to reach that particular goal. Staff is currently in the process of finalizing the registration program details, however, in February, those wishing to ride on the City's dial-a-ride shuttle vans will have to first complete a short, one-time application and waiver. As soon as we have additional details of the program worked out, will be certain to share that information with the community through all of our outreach mediums.

Additionally, we are currently planning a community meeting and registration drive to take place in January as we prepare for the revamped ADA-focused dial-a-ride program in February 2019.

WATER & SEWER RATE ADJUSTMENT WENT INTO EFFECT JANUARY 1, NEW RATES APPEARING ON FEBRUARY BILLS

Based on the currently approved schedule, rate adjustments were instituted on January 1, which included the following changes:

Sewer Rates

For the typical single-family residential sewer customer, the sewer rate will increase by \$0.24 / month, to \$9.29 / month (currently at \$9.05 / month)

Water Rates

For the typical single-family residential water customer, the water rate will increase by \$7.57 / month, to \$65.28 / month (currently at \$57.71 / month)

Please note – the water rate adjustment is being instituted to fund the regional Watermaster plan to purchase and import water into our aquifer.

Although the rate adjustments took place at the beginning of the year, residents will see the changes on their February 2019 utility bill. For more information visit us online.

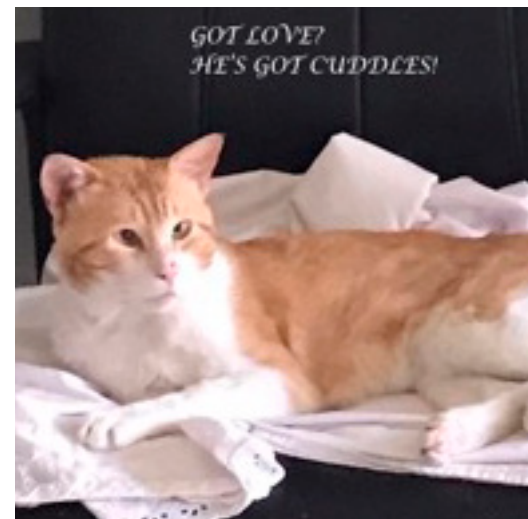

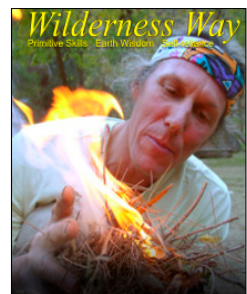

When a loved one dies, the close survivors often express regret that they didn't spend more time with the departed, or tell them that they loved them. Time flies, of course, and life always presents us with so many things to do. It's easy to put off what's important in life.

I also deeply love and value my pets, and have always considered them very much a part of the family. As a child, I remember when our family dog Pariah was old and sick. I could no longer walk him, but I would go into the back yard to pet him and feed him. Then one day when I came home from school, my father told me that he "took care of" Pariah. "What? Where is he?" I exclaimed. My father calmly told me that the local pet hospital "euthanized" Pariah. "What does that mean?" my teenage-self replied. "Does that mean he'll be home soon?"

"No," my mother chimed in with a somber tone. "The doctor put him to sleep. He was dying." My mother tried to hide her tears. I was shocked, and ran to my room.

I was stunned! How could they do that.

Later, after my father was asleep, my mother - who grew up on a farm - explained that she used to see animals die all the time. "We just tried to make them comfortable," she told me. "Animals know they are dying. They usually want to be around their people to feel safe, and not in a cold

hospital where they don't know anyone."

That was her way of telling me that she didn't agree with my father's decision. I was sad for a long time, and vowed that I would never again do that to any pet of mine - and I've kept that vow life-long, despite the inconveniences that come with assisting a person or pet in death. I've watched pets - cats, dogs, one pig - get old, stiff, and slow, and then they find a spot to go and die. I've learned to accept this as part of The Way.

I was saddened by what a friend recently told me. His father, who lives alone, has had a cat for over 10 years. The cat became sick and old and was on its deathbed. The father - in his 80s - now seemed indifferent to this animal that once was a close friend. He wanted the cat to be taken to a vet and "put to sleep." Fortunately, the cat died in peace on its bed in its home. But I was saddened that a person could be such a fair-weather friend because the dear pet was now dying.

All of life is precious, and we need not push the death process. It comes quick enough. Nor should we fear death.

I'm reminded of the time - precisely 10 years ago - when I was taking care of my wife of 22 years on her deathbed, 24/7. She died with me by her side, at home. I think the reason that so many people fear death, and want dying people out of sight-out of mind, is because they cannot get into the shoes of the dying person. The dying person usually wants to be around the people who they were close to in life and not in a sterile hospital. (Yes, I know all situations are different, and sometimes the family simply cannot deal with the demands and pressures of the dying person).

The fact that we have grown so far from this very basic tenet shows how far we have strayed from out most fundamental roots.

Steakhouses are sprouting up in our area like beads being given away at a Mardi Gras party. I think competition is good, especially for the consumer. You can go to Ruth's Chris for happy hour and get a great glass of wine and a steak sandwich for less than \$20. If that's too rich for your blood, then consider the new Paul Martins on South Lake - a glass of house wine and portion of pork ribs runs about \$18. I even discovered a burger for \$16 here at Paul Martin's Yes, that's a deal when you consider a pint of beer is included.

The perennial powerhouses like Taylor's and The Arroyo Chop House don't offer happy hour prices, but owner Gregg Smith contends that a favorable pour makes his customers happy. Taylor's Steak House in La Canada offers a wine-by-the-glass program that I think has very few rivals. In Eagle Rock, Colombo's fancies themselves as an Italian Streak House, with a \$26 porterhouse that is a great value, get a glass of Maddalena cab and you will pay like a pouper and eat like a king.

However, one place that I consider very close to fine dining for you real high rollers is the executive happy hour by Alexander's on North Los Robles. 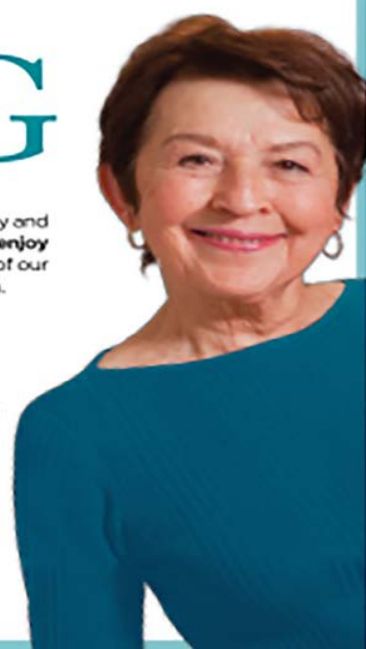

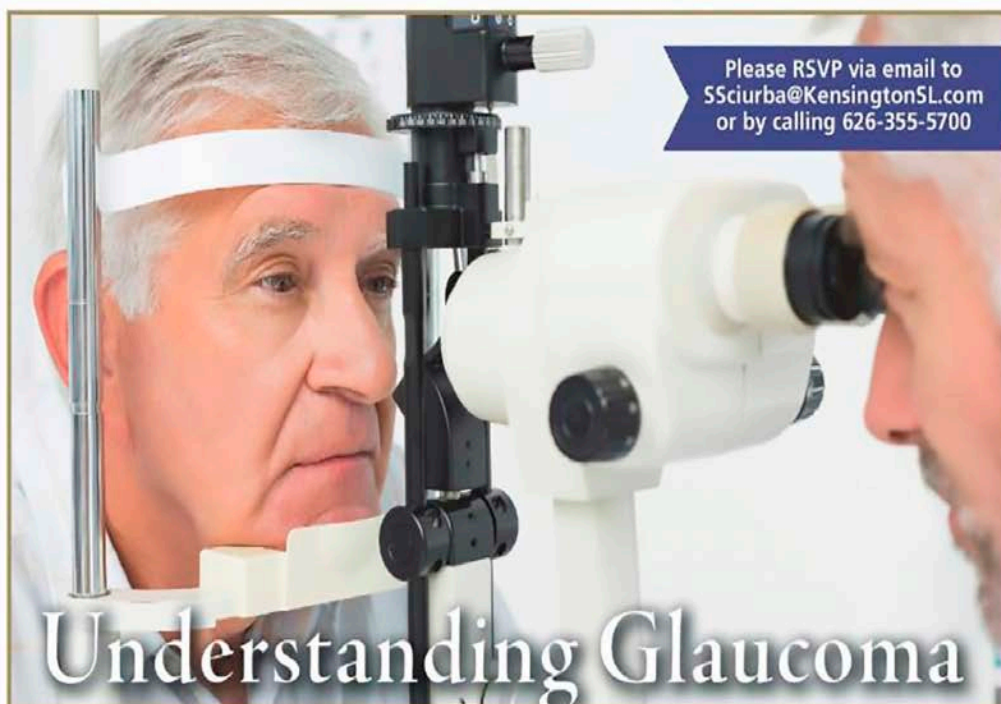

We're excited to offer a great mix of school choices to our community through 2019-2020 Open Enrollment/School Choice. Online applications for students who live within the district's attendance boundaries, as well as children of PUSD employees, will be accepted through February 1, at openenrollment.info. Selection is by random lottery and is not based on when an application is submitted.

In the early hours of the application period, which began today, our site had some technical issues that have now been resolved. Applications submitted January 10, 2019 between midnight and 9:30 a.m. were not recorded in the system. If you submitted an application during these hours and did not receive a confirmation number, you will have to re-submit your application at openenrollment.info before the Feb. 1, 2019 deadline. We apologize for

any inconvenience. Resubmitting does not affect placement, since selection is by random lottery.

While all students who live within PUSD boundaries are assured placement in their neighborhood school, the district's annual Open Enrollment-School Choice offers families an opportunity to apply to themed, magnet, or specialized schools and programs outside the boundaries of their school of residence.

SMART HOME DEVICES THAT CAN HELP SENIORS AGE-IN-PLACE

Dear Savvy Senior,
I recently read an article about how "smart home" devices can help seniors with aging-in-place. What types of smart home products can you recommend that can help with this?

Inquiring Senior

Dear Inquiring,
There are actually a wide variety of affordable smart home devices you can add to your home that can help make it safer and easier to live in as you age. Here's what you should know.

Smart Home Technologies
While most Americans today use technology and enjoy the conveniences they provide, there are millions of seniors who still don't have much use for it. But you don't have to like technology or be tech savvy to benefit from the many different smart home automation devices that can help seniors age-in-place.

Smart home devices can also give family members and caregivers the ability to electronically keep tabs on their elder loved one when they can't be there, which provides peace-of-mind.

If you're interested in adding some smart home products to your house, you need to know that these devices require home Wi-Fi, and for many of the products, you'll need either a smartphone, tablet or voice-enabled assistant to operate them. Here are some popular aging-in-place smart home products to help you get started.

Voice-enabled assistant: Popular products like the Amazon Echo (Amazon.com/echo), Google Assistant (Assistant.google.com) or Apple HomePod (Apple.com/homepod) will let you operate compatible smart home products with simple voice commands.

These devices can also play your favorite music, read audiobooks, make calls, set timers and alarms, provide reminders for medications, appointments and other things, check traffic and weather, ask questions, and much more – all done by voice commands.

Smart lights: Falls are common concerns among elderly seniors, which are often caused by fumbling around a dark room looking for a light switch. Smart light bulbs like the Philips Hue (MeetHue.com) can turn on and off the lights by voice command, smartphone or tablet. These bulbs can also dim the lights and you can



program them to turn on and off whenever you want.
There are also smart electric plugs like the Wemo Mini (Wemo.com) that offer remote control automation for lamps, fans, or other electrical devices.

Video doorbell: Safety is also a concern for seniors who live alone. Smart doorbells like the Ring video doorbell (Ring.com) would allow you to see, hear and speak to someone at her door (via smartphone, tablet, Google smart displays, Amazon Echo Show or Spot) without having to open it.

Stovetop shut-off: To help seniors prevent home cooking fires, stovetop shut-off devices like the iGuardStove (iGuardFire.com) uses motion sensors to turn off electric and gas stovetops when left unattended for a predetermined amount of time. It will also alert family members via text.

Medication management: Seniors on a complex medication schedule can benefit from a smart medication tracking system like the PillDrill (PillDrill.com) that reminds you when pills are due, tracks that you've taken them, and notifies loved ones.

Home monitoring: Family members can keep tabs on older loved ones from afar with smart home video cameras like Lighthouse AI (Light.house/elderly-care) or a smart home sensor system like TruSense (MyTruSense.com).

Other options: Some other helpful smart home products to consider include smart door locks like Kwikset Kevo (Kwikset.com), smart thermostats such as the Nest (Nest.com), and smart nightlights like Aladin (Domalys.com), which detects falls and alerts caregivers.

The costs for most smart home products range anywhere from a few dollars to several hundred dollars and can be found in many local home improvement stores as well as online.

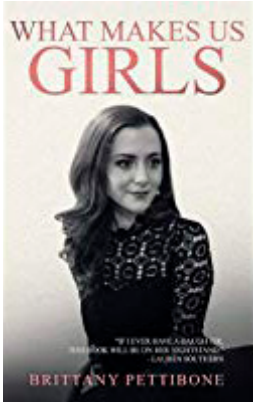
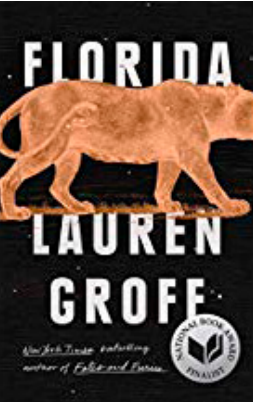
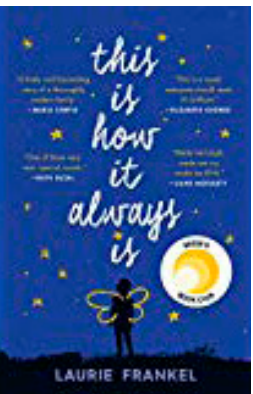

PET TRUSTS OFFER PROTECTION FOR YOUR FURRY FAMILY

If you're an animal lover and have a pet of your own, you likely consider your pet to be a member of the family. And since your furry friends can provide protection, emotional support, and unconditional love, such consideration is often well deserved.

In stark contrast, the law considers your pet nothing more than personal property. That means that without plans in place, your pet will be treated just like your couch or vacuum in the event of your death or incapacity.

For example, if you die without including any provisions for your pet's care in your estate plan and none of your family or friends volunteer to take your pet in, your faithful companion will likely end up in an animal shelter.

While you can leave money for the care of your pet in a will, there will be no continuing oversight to ensure your pet (and the money you leave for its care) will be cared for as you wish. Indeed, the person named as pet guardian in your will could drop the animal off at the shelter and use the money to buy a new TV—and face no penalties for doing so.

What's more, a will is required to go through a court process known as probate, which can last for years and leave your pet in limbo during that entire time. And a will only goes into effect upon your death, so if you're incapacitated by accident or illness, it will be useless for protecting your pet.

Pet trusts

Given these limitations, the best way to ensure your animal companions are properly taken care of in the event of your death or incapacity is to create a pet trust.

Pet trusts go into effect immediately and allow

you to lay out detailed, legally binding rules for how the funds in the trust can be used. Pet trusts can cover multiple pets, work in cases of incapacity as well as death, and they remain in effect until the last surviving animal dies.

Here are a few of the most important things to consider when setting up a pet trust:

Caregivers: The most important decision when creating a pet trust is naming the caretaker. The caretaker will have custody of your pet and is responsible for your pet's daily care for the remainder of your pet's life. As with naming a guardian for your children, make certain you choose someone you know will watch over and love your pet just as you would.

Consider the caretaker's physical ability—naming someone elderly to raise your Great Dane puppy might be asking too much. Also make certain your pet fits in with the caretaker's family members and other pets. In case your first-choice for caretaker is unable to take in your pet, name at least one or two alternates. If you don't know any suitable caregivers, there are a variety of charitable groups that can provide for your pet if you're no longer able to.

Trustees: Trustees are tasked with managing the trust's funds and ensuring your wishes for the animal's care are carried out in the manner the trust spells out. The caretaker and the trustee may be the same person or the roles can be divided between two different people.

Caretaking instructions: You may also want to include caretaking instructions such as your pet's basic requirements: dietary needs, exercise regimen, medications, and veterinary care. Be sure you think about all of your pet's future needs, including extra services like grooming, boarding, and walking.

Funding: When determining how much money to put aside for your pet's care, you should carefully consider the pet's age, health, and care needs. Remember, you're covering the cost of caring for the animal for the rest of its life, and even basic expenses can add up over time.

2 BILLION BIRDS MAKE GULF MIGRATION

A new study suggests that about 2.1 billion birds migrate through the Gulf Coast region each spring, heading from Central and South America to breeding grounds in the U.S. and Canada. The most important finding of the study may be the fact that about half of the annual migration occurs within an 18-day window between mid-April and the first week of May. That, suggest the scientists, could help limit the damage to bird populations caused by manmade threats, such as the turbines at wind farms. "Knowing where and when peak migration occurs means efforts can be made to turn off lights and wind turbines, which are known threats to migratory birds," suggest the scientists. The birds making the incredible trip across the Gulf of Mexico range from

tiny hummingbirds that weigh less than two pennies to large birds such as hawks and ducks. Seeing a migratory neo-tropical bird such as a prothonotary warbler in the wild, its feathers the brilliant yellow of a child's crayon, it is hard to imagine that such a tiny creature could be capable of flying 200 miles across the Gulf of Mexico. The birds navigate using stars and features on land. Decades of data show that many of the migrants will fly a roundtrip of a thousand miles or more and return to the exact spots where they were born for the breeding season. The exact mechanism that allows birds to navigate with such incredible precision will likely remain a mystery for all of time.

LIVING IN OPTIMISM

Do you remember the "like attracts like" principle? It illustrates the idea that the more energy and thought we put into something, the more it will grow. Also, the longer we are in that place or state of mind, the greater the tendency is to stay there. It becomes comfortable.

This applies to thought patterns and habits, or even optimism and negativity. Gandhi illustrates this point of view eloquently: "Your beliefs become your thoughts, your thoughts become your words, your words become your actions, your actions become your habits, your habits become your values, your values become your destiny." In other words, "like attracts like." So, how then do we change course and step off the flow of negativity?

First, the realization of the power of choice must come into awareness. No one, no circumstance, no external structure has power over our lives and inner peace. Higher values of love, compassion, tolerance, and universal connection with one another are the guiding

force by which we soothe fear. To take the fuse out of fear, truthfulness (honesty), or satya must be present.

Second, after becoming aware and acknowledging the feeling of fear or the train of thought of negativity, cultivate the opposite. Optimism and love are the antidotes to overcoming negativity. Even doing this begrudgingly will call upon those higher principles when we act in our higher selves.

DEAR CITIZENS AND RESIDENTS OF THE CITY OF SIERRA MADRE:



I am writing this letter to you as an individual, however, I am a full-time – paid Captain working for the Sierra Madre Fire Department. I am writing this letter to you to give you my perspective of what is currently being proposed to the Sierra Madre City Council regarding a possible reorganization of the fire department. I am deeply concerned about many aspects of this proposal, and I fear the city council may decide to move forward with something that has not been well thought out, nor, was it adequately vetted by the people of Sierra Madre.

The City Council was presented with an agenda report, and a staff recommendation on Tuesday January 8, 2019. The subject of the report was “Fire Department Reorganization and Non-Binding Term Sheet for provision of Fire Response Services from the City of Arcadia.” There is a recommendation from the city staff to the city council, for the termination of the current Sierra Madre Fire Department, to be replaced with an engine response from the City of Arcadia. Just for the record; the Sierra Madre Fire Department officers, firefighters, and paramedics, were not privy to any information about this proposal until a meeting just five days prior to the January 8th city council meeting. Shock and surprise are the two words I would use to explain the look on our collective faces when we were told of this news.

Before I go any further in my letter, I just want to ask all of you to think of the history of the Sierra Madre Fire Department from your own individual experiences. Ask yourself if you were ever helped by the fire department, or any member of the fire department. Ask yourself if you have ever known personally, a member of the Sierra Madre Fire Department (if you can't think of one, you must have just moved to the city, as we have had so very many members of this fire department reside within the city limits since the 1920's). The reason I ask you to do this as individuals, is I am sure you will find yourself saying, “The fire department personnel have been truly dedicated to the protection of life and property of its citizens.”

In addition to asking each of you to reflect on your personal experiences with the Sierra Madre Fire Department, I want to personally thank every individual who has ever worked for the fire department in any capacity. Whether they were actively participating in fire suppression and emergency medical services, or volunteering their time in an administrative role, or, the spouse or child of a member of the fire department. To each of you, I salute you and say thank you for your dedication, and time given to the department, and to the community. It is because of you, the citizens of this town have been safe since 1921, and you laid the foundation of where the fire department has evolved to – today. For this, I thank all of you.

I am going to return to the other focus of this letter, and that is to the proposed reorganization of the Sierra Madre Fire Department. As I stated earlier in this letter, this proposal was shown to the fire department personnel just days before it was released to the public. The proposal to the city council was prepared with no input whatsoever from the captains, firefighters, or paramedics currently employed by the fire department. This fact alone is deeply concerning to me. Also, as I read through the agenda report document, it looks as though there has been some real thought put into this by just a few people, so I am assuming this document has been sometime in the making. This is a real concern of mine, and I would think it would be a concern of many others, knowing a proposal to eliminate a city public safety department (the fire department) was authored without thoughts and input from current fire personnel. This is alarming.

During the January 8 city council meeting, I found it very interesting that the city council members made it quite clear their decision was not about funding, it was purely about safety. If this is truly the case, then I think a real easy solution would be to increase the current budget of the fire department so we can increase manpower, daily staffing levels, and pay a living wage comparable to other fire departments of the same size and staffing levels. Clearly this is not the case, and let me assure you, our fire department provides the exact same services as other fire departments do that are similar in size and organization. San Marino and South Pasadena Fire Departments are just two examples currently in the Verdugo Dispatch System.

The main focus of the discussion seemed to be the need for the fire department to participate in Unified Response, or “auto-aid.” The fire department, city staff, and city council has been aware of this fact for many years, and significant steps have been undertaken by the fire department, and the city council to make entry into unified response a reality. *The city council voted not*

long ago, to move the fire department towards full time, and increased the department budget in order to hire full-time engineers, and firefighter paramedics. The city also made very compelling arguments in favor of keeping the UUT at 10% in order to keep the fire department budget intact to ensure its continued and long-time existence.

The city council and the interim fire chief discussed the possibility of moving the fire department into the unified response – automatic aid system. During their discussions, one of the city council members asked the chief if we currently had any auto-aid agreements, or mutual aid agreements in place. The fire chief stated that he would have to look into that question further. *Currently the Sierra Madre Fire Department does in fact have in place two agreements.* One of the agreements is with the Los Angeles County Fire Department. This agreement provides auto-aid dispatch for any structure fire to send an immediate second in engine. Additionally, Los Angeles County would respond to any wildland fire incident within the city, and in turn our engine would respond in “auto-aid” into the Chantry Flats area which is in Los Angeles County Engine 44's / 244's response area. The other agreement is with the United States Forest Service. This agreement provides for response to wildland incidents north of Grandview. These are current agreements that are in place with our current fire department configuration of a combination department; composed of both full-time, and part-time personnel.

The concern from the Verdugo system fire departments regarding unified response seems to be the issue of some of our personnel being part-time. Again, the city, the city council, and the fire department addressed this concern, and made the significant step to convert the Sierra Madre Fire Department to a full-time – paid department. This transition is happening right now as I write this letter, and full-time status is just weeks away if we are allowed to continue with this transition. Currently, the department has been asking a “hypothetical” question of the other departments whether or not we can join the unified response, and the current answer is no because we are not entirely full-time with fire personnel. Again, if we are allowed to continue our transition, the question can be asked with legitimacy, and in my personnel opinion, we should be allowed to work within that system.

I have other concerns with this plan other than the fact the fire department was not allowed to participate in any of the discussions that led to a very concerning staff recommendation. Again, the main argument is unified response. We still have mutual aid, and I can assure you, we will always have mutual aid. *Cities will always help each other in times of crisis and emergency, and, you will most likely not be billed for services as I heard argued by a few people during the meeting.* Some of the concerns that were raised were to such extremes, that if mutual aid programs did disappear, all cities in California would be greatly affected, not just Sierra Madre.

The Woolsey Fire in Malibu was used as an example of how “we” the City of Sierra Madre was sending a bill for services rendered by sending our police department to help with evacuations. This example does not really tell you what is really going on behind the scenes. If this fire was controlled quickly, and was not declared a disaster, and the City of Malibu did not request an F-Mag (Fire Management Assistance Grant), any city that sent resources to that city for assistance would have done so as a mutual aid request, and therefore would receive no funds. If the grant is awarded, the City of Sierra Madre may be paid for services, but not if the grant is not awarded. Another easier example; if we had a brush fire, helicopters that are sent by the county are partially funded by property taxes paid by residents. The City of Sierra Madre would not receive a bill for services.

Let me go back to getting the Sierra Madre Fire Department into unified response, auto-aid. The main concern is our department is not providing like services because we are currently a combination department. The city and the fire department have remedied this, and we are currently in the final stages of completing the transition from combination to full-time. Additionally, *our fire department personnel train the exact same way as our surrounding departments, and we achieve the training hours recommended by the NFPA.* Our personnel are highly educated academically, and in fire suppression, and emergency medical services.

Many individuals on our department hold bachelor degrees and graduate degrees. *All of the current members of the fire department who work in fire suppression have State of California certifications in firefighting, emergency medicine, and other varied certificates specific to fire suppression and medicine.* All

of our Captains are qualified as State of California Fire Officers, and some have taken Chief Officer level course work. In addition to these achievements, all of our Paramedics are licensed by the State of California, and accredited by Los Angeles County. The Paramedics are also required to have certificates of training that exceed that of the requirements of Los Angeles County Department of Health Services for reaccreditation.

My personal belief is the Sierra Madre Fire Department has not made the proper request to the Verdugo system departments. I believe when the Fire Chief presents to the other departments the facts:

1. The Sierra Madre Fire Department has made the transfer to a fulltime department.
2. Our personnel meet, and most likely exceed any training requirements that would be required to work in this system.
3. Our paramedic staff is highly qualified, and is required to exceed any requirements made by the County of Los Angeles for accreditation and reaccreditation.
4. Our fire department has been successfully operating and providing quality fire suppression and EMS services to the City of Sierra Madre and to some areas of Los Angeles County since 1921.
5. The Sierra Madre Fire Department will enhance the overall capabilities of the entire system by adding an additional fire engine, and, at a minimum, 16 fulltime personnel that are subject to recall for any reason to aid in major incidents or disasters.

If our Fire Chief presents these facts to the Verdugo system Fire Chiefs, I believe these men and women will see the real asset they will be adding to their excellent portfolio.

I have discussed in detail our capabilities and my thoughts on our ability to get into the Verdugo unified response. I believe our department is more than qualified to meet the requirements once our transition is completed in the very near future. Now, that being said, I want to discuss some real potential issues of moving ahead with allowing another fire department take over fire services for our city.

My first concern is there will not be a city fire department anymore. If this proposal goes into effect, there will only be two paramedics at the station, and you will need to receive additional manpower and suppression services from another agency. The closest engine is Engine 107 in Arcadia, however, you absolutely cannot rely on that engine being in house all the time, waiting for the call from Sierra Madre. The discussion the other night focused so much on this fact it was borderline ridiculous. You will get whatever unit is closest at the time, and that unit maybe farther than you one might imagine.

In times of major incidents, or major disasters, such as a significant wind event, or let's say, a very large earthquake; Sierra Madre will most likely be alone, as the surrounding agencies, and most likely, E107 will be responding to their own incidents (and they should as their tax payers are paying for their response).

Let's examine just a few of the things that went on during the last major wind event a few years ago that devastated our town, Arcadia, and many others. The Verdugo dispatchers were being overwhelmed with calls for service. The Verdugo dispatch center asked us to start taking over our own calls, and to self-dispatch through our police department dispatch system. Our department was overwhelmed with calls for service, just as all other city departments were at the time, thus we handled the calls as they came in, and by ourselves. (The call volumes were in the extreme. Hundreds of calls were coming in for trees and wires down, small spot fires, etc.).

The Sierra Madre Fire Department handled this excess call volume as best we could, and we did this utilizing the entire fire department. Meaning: We recalled as many Sierra Madre Fire Department personnel that we could get to respond, and we put into service every emergency vehicle the fire department had to respond to these requests for service and emergency. The point I am trying to make here is that currently, if there were to be a major incident, and we needed to respond to alarms alone because other agencies are tied up, or need to operate in their own jurisdictions, the Sierra Madre Fire Department would be able to recall at a minimum, 16 personnel. (All of our engine personnel, and ambulance personnel) (With our part-timers, we could ask for even more personnel if they would respond). Now, this recall would give the citizens of Sierra Madre 16 personnel, and if we divided them into five, 3-man engines and ambulances, we would be able to respond to a minimum of 5 calls for service at a time. This would allow our department to at a minimum, initiate, and attempt to mitigate the various situations. If you have contracted out the engine

personnel, you would absolutely lose this benefit.

I hope the last example demonstrates the absolute importance to keep fire services in house. Another example of why I believe the city needs to continue with operating its own fire department has to do with fire inspections; especially brush and commercial fire inspections. Brush and commercial fire inspections are extremely important to keeping the citizens safe from potential danger. In addition to making the inspection, and making recommendations to help mitigate potential hazards, the inspections are completed for another extremely important reason.

The fire engine personnel who arrive to complete the inspections are not only there to look for and mitigate hazards. These personnel are getting a first-hand view of the layout of terrain in the case of brush inspections, and they are able to see first-hand, the interior layout of a commercial building. This is extremely important, as firefighters must make entry into buildings in sometimes very difficult circumstances. Power will be out, or smoke will fill rooms, leaving visibility to a minimum, or none at all. Also, there may be obstacles such as; large machinery, fuel storage areas, employee break rooms, etc., and so on. Having this detail before you arrive to an emergency incident is invaluable. Will the Arcadia Fire Department be conducting our fire inspections as well? Or, will that be done by the new inspector? Again, and in my opinion, this will reduce the overall safety to the city, not increase it.

I have discussed unified response, and I have discussed some aspects that may be significantly affected by giving up our fire department. *Now I would like to discuss a little about the emergency medical service program the city stated they intend to keep.* I am in total agreement the city needs to keep its paramedic program. To give up this program, the city would make a grave mistake. In some circumstances, giving up such a program would forever remove the city's ability to provide such services in the future under their own management. *However, keeping the program in place with no fire department personnel to immediately assist them will be very different indeed.*

1. There would most likely only be two personnel on duty each day, making it almost impossible to do any significant training.
2. Fire department crews work in teams.

The camaraderie built up between those who work together at a station is truly invaluable. You learn the strengths and weaknesses of each other, and you learn how to trust each other, and most importantly, you learn how everyone is going to operate on a call. This is absolutely a key aspect of how we train, so when you are under immediate and extreme pressure, you are able to work seamlessly with your fellow firefighters and paramedics. By having a crew constantly responding from various different stations, you will never quite have the same rapport with another department, than that of the crew you work with, and live with side by side, every day. You really become family, and it something every firefighter, police officer, and those who have served in the military, absolutely understand.

I would also like to address the current salary being paid to our new firefighter paramedics. In the discussion on January 8th, all of the arguments made it quite clear the removal of our fire engine personnel was not related to the budget. I think my arguments show we have a real strong chance to enter unified response once the transition is complete, however, let's say this proposal moves forward. *Is the city saying this is not a budget issue because of what they are currently paying the paramedics? Or, are they saying it is just not a real issue regarding the fire department budget in general?* I am making this point, because currently, the City of Sierra Madre is paying its paramedics just over \$15.00 per hour. This is far lower than most ambulance companies are paying their paramedic staff, and it is significantly lower than what similar fire departments are paying their staff. If this program is to move forward, will the city significantly increase the pay for these paramedics? Or, will the pay remain the same. If it is the later; there will be a constant turnover in these positions, and I believe, you will find in the future, the only paramedics who will apply, will be newly minted paramedics fresh out of school. I do not think this is what the residents of Sierra Madre are looking to achieve with this potentially new reorganization. Nor is it what they deserve as a community.

I have a few more thoughts, and then I will conclude my letter. I hope you are all still with me. *I have another real concern about the proposal in its current form because of some statements that were made by members of the city council on January 8th. Some of the members*

made statements to the audience, and they stated the City of Arcadia was possibly going to declare a fiscal state of emergency. I did some follow up with that statement, and I have been told that in fact that may be true, and the emergency could be so significant the city may consider laying off police personnel and reducing the number of fire engines, or stations by one. If this is the case, *I find it absolutely concerning our city would even consider putting our fire department in the hands of a city that is having its own real problems, especially with a budget.* What if we eliminate our fire department; give the responsibility to Arcadia Fire Department, and then this potential crisis becomes a real crisis. Do you think the citizens of Arcadia will stand by and allow their fire department to respond to calls for service in our town for \$800,000 per year, when they respond to calls for service in their own town for far more? This alone should bring this proposal back to the drawing board for serious discussion on the ramifications of just such a scenario.

The reorganization proposal in its current form; and in my personal opinion is the wrong way to proceed. I do not believe it was well thought out, and I believe many other options were never even considered, nor explored. I believe some of the fire departments current personnel have various ideas as to achieve all of the needs necessary for the City of Sierra Madre to maintain a high level of fire and emergency services. Just one option to reorganize the fire department without displacing any of the current personnel would be to change the current configuration on the department, and make the engine a full-time paramedic engine, and convert the ambulance operations to an “ambulance operator” program. This configuration could be implemented with a man engine, or, a four man engine depending on budget constraints.

Our ambulance would still be staffed by two paramedics, or, two EMT's, or, a combination of the two, and the fire engine would be staffed with a minimum of two paramedics on board, thus meeting all of the requirements of Los Angeles County Department of Health Services for a full paramedic engine as opposed to the modified “Assessment Paramedic Engine” it is now. The difference between the two is a Los Angeles County EMS Agency requirement of two paramedics on any unit to be designated as a “full paramedic engine.” A paramedic engine is allowed to perform all of the skills, and provide all of the medications allowed by the Los Angeles County EMS Agency.

This response configuration has been tested, and has been in use by the Glendale Fire Department for many years, and has been found to be very successful. This response configuration would not only meet all of the needs of what is required by the Verdugo cities to join unified response, it would also significantly reduce the overall budget requirements for the fire department. With this type of configuration, the Sierra Madre Fire Department would be able to reduce the fulltime personnel needs to 9 or 10, and continue to operate the ambulance as an ambulance operator program, utilizing part-time personnel. If the engine company were to be staffed by four personnel, it would increase our overall capabilities even further. This is just one example of how we can make a significant and positive change to the department, without giving up personnel, and autonomy, and at the same time, reducing the current authorized budget for a full-time fire department.

I have many more ideas, and I have many more concerns about what this proposal, if implemented, could mean for the Sierra Madre Fire Department. I maybe incorrect; and maybe this proposal will be in the best interest of the city. Or, I maybe correct, and you find the current proposal has flaws, and find the City of Sierra Madre needs to keep control over its fire department, and keep the safety net that has always been there for the citizens since 1921. Either way, I believe all of you need to ask more questions, and have conversations regarding other potential alternatives before moving forward so quickly on something so very important to the community.

I want to thank you for reading my letter, and considering the information. I am truly dedicated to the Sierra Madre Fire Department, and to the citizens of the City of Sierra Madre. I hope to continue to serve you as a member of the fire department for many years to come, and I will always be an advocate for our fire department, all of the current and past members of the fire department, and to seeing that all of the citizens of the city, and those who come to visit this wonderful city feel safe, and are provided with the highest quality emergency services anywhere.
