CELEBRATING 125 YEARS OF THE VINE!



On Sunday, March 17, 2019, literally thousands of visitors visited Sierra Madre to participate in the Wistaria Festival and to view the 125 year old Wistaria Vine. The Vine, which holds the Guinness Book of World Records for being the largest blooming vine in the world, managed to start blooming after a rainy, cold winter.

Thanks to the hospitality of homeowners Robert and Nell Solt and Tony and Claire Held, more than 3,000 people either took a shuttle or walked to see the magnificent sight.

In addition, visitors to Sierra Madre had the opportunity to shop and dine with local businesses, visit 100 crafters and food vendors that participated in the festival and view 100 Custom Automobiles in the Sierra Madre Car Show which was coordinated by Ted Sariff. 'The Best In Show' was awarded to a black 1933 Packard and a Blue 1966 Chevy Nova owned by Steve Reider was the runner-up. 'The Chief's Award' was given to a red and white 1955 Chevy Wagon owned by George Dixon.

This year, in celebration of St. Patrick's Day, there was also a Beer Garden (38 Degrees) and a concert in the park featuring Gem City Jazz Cats.

JUROR SURVIVAL PACK

Jury summons. It's enough to strike fear in our hearts. For those of us who are employed, married, dating, or have any kind of obligations, the idea of being shackled to the court system for an unspecified period of time is frightening.

Recently my dad got called in. He's retired, so he wasn't as opposed to the idea as when he was working. Also, he likes interesting things. To me, novels are interesting. Nature is interesting. UFC fights are interesting. The judicial system, not so much. But he has a better attitude than I do.

Therefore, when he got summoned, he dutifully went downtown and sat in the assembly room for a few hours before being placed in a jury pool. My mom and I both coached him on everything to say to get excused. One time my mom got called in for some case having to do with illicit drugs. Per protocol, the judge asked all the prospective jurors if they'd be able to be impartial on the topic.

My mom's a retired school teacher, so she played the "We just finished 'Say No to Drugs' week!" I simply couldn't ignore everything I just taught my third graders!" card.

The judge asked her again if she was sure she couldn't put that perspective aside, just for this case?

"Nope, sorry."

APD OFFICERS WILL FOCUS TRAFFIC ENFORCEMENT/EDUCATION ON CHILD SAFETY RESTRAINT LAWS NEXT WEEK.

Arcadia Police Officers will be joining in a Special Enforcement Week with other Los Angeles County police agencies and Safety Belt Safe USA focusing on child safety restraint laws. Safety Belt Safe USA is a non-profit solely de-voted to child passenger safety.

Based on data from the California Highway Patrol, more than 80% of the chil-dren under four years of age killed in traffic collisions since 1990 died in sur-vivable crashes. In other words, had these children been properly buckled up they would have survived.

Although we take these laws seriously year round, we will be focusing on child safety restraint laws next week. Beginning on Monday, March 25, 2019 through Saturday, March 30, 2019, Arcadia Police Officers will be looking for violations and making enforcement stops. In addition to child safety restraint laws, we will be enforcing adult safety restraint laws as well.

Current California Law:

- Children under 2 years of age shall ride in a rear-facing car seat unless the child weighs 40 or more pounds OR is 40 or more inches tall. The child shall be secured in a manner that complies with the height and weight limits specified by the manufacturer of the car seat. (California Vehicle Code Section 27360.)
- Children under the age of 8 must be secured in a car seat or booster seat in the back seat.
- Children who are 8 years of age or have reached 4’9” in height may be secured by a booster seat, but at a minimum must be secured by a safety belt. (California Vehicle Code Section 27363.)
- Passengers who are 16 years of age and over are subject to California’s Mandatory Seat Belt law.

NEW STATE REGULATIONS HAVE FURTHER ERODED LOCAL CONTROL OVER HOUSING DECISIONS

As the City prepares to consider several large-scale development projects, one housing note that we wanted to share with everyone relates to the impact that recent State legislation has had on our local land use controls as it relates to housing development. As you may recall, in 2017 and in 2018, the State ap-proved a series of legislative amendments to the Housing Accountability Act (HAA), which combined has reduced local government authority to deny or reduce the density of proposed housing development projects.

To highlight how those pieces of legislation impact a municipality’s ability to regulate development, a full memo on the matter can be found online. In particular, I wanted to highlight some of the key changes that staff is currently grappling with:

- The new regulations adopted by the State stipulate that if a project conforms to a City’s applicable development standards (i.e., no variances or exceptions are sought), it will be extremely difficult for the City to legally deny any housing project.

- Furthermore, while a City can still institute a design and neighborhood compatibility review process, the City essentially now cannot deny a housing development project, or impose conditions that the project be developed at a lower density, unless strict findings can be identified which indicate that a project would have a specific, adverse impact on public health or safety.

Again, a memo outlining all of the new State mandated housing development regulations that we are con-tending with can be found online.

FOOTHILL TRANSIT LAUNCHES NEW ELECTRIC BUS SERVICE IN DUARTE, APRIL 1, 2019

Foothill Transit, the local transportation leader in zero-emissions public transit service, has partnered with the City of Duarte to operate the city’s two local bus lines and convert their fleet to zero-emission, all electric 35’ buses.

Foothill Transit and the City of Duarte will launch the new service, named duartEbus, on April 1, 2019. The newly-liveried, three-bus fleet will be charged, operated, and maintained out of Foothill Transit’s Arcadia Operations Yard, running nearly identical routes and schedules as the well-loved city system.

Changes made focused on accessibility and safety, prompting the closure of five stops on both the Line 860 Blue and Line 861 Green, and eliminating age restrictions to open transit access to all customers. The previously free transit system will also incorporate Foothill Transit’s fare structure. With a TAP card, the one way fare will be \$1.25 (\$0.50 for seniors and people with disabilities*). The fare will be \$1.50 (\$0.75*) if the customer is paying cash.

Foothill Transit’s leadership in electric bus integration began in 2010 when it became the first public transit agency in the nation to deploy three Proterra fast-charge, all electric buses on the 16.1-mile Line 291 between the cities of Pomona and La Verne. Line 291 then became the first all-electric fast charge bus line in the nation in 2014 and to date, Foothill Transit’s electric fleet had logged over one and a half million miles of service in Southern California.

The deployment of this new electric bus fleet will make the City of Duarte the first all-electric city system in Southern California. The State of California has mandated that all public transit vehicles be 100 percent zero-emissions electric by 2040. Foothill Transit has already committed to going all electric by 2030.

“This partnership is transformative for both Duarte and for Foothill Transit,” said Doran Barnes, Executive Director of Foothill Transit. “Building a more sustainable community re-quires more sustainable transportation options. Our anticipation and expectation is high, and we look forward to serving our Duarte neighbors.”

“Model aviation is a fun activity for all ages,” says club president Cliff Ashpaugh. “It is recreational and educational, and easier than ever to get started in. This event will also benefit our local charities. We especially like to see families, and anyone with an interest in aviation”.

The club was started in 1976 to promote model aviation in the San Gabriel valley. Members range from 8 years old to 91, with many professions and occupations involved. Ortiz described his law enforcement approach as "contemporary, community-based policing." His leadership style, he said, one of inclusion and relationship building with internal and external stakeholders to define and

achieve common goals, citing the coalition building that led to broad support of the Sierra Madre Police Department's strategic plan.

"I look forward to engaging with the South Pasadena community, police officers and staff, and the City leadership teams," Ortiz said. "My predecessors have created a very strong department, and I'm excited to be able to build on that success with a collaborative approach."

Ortiz succeeds former South Pasadena Chief Art Miller, who left the City in August. Captain Brian Solinsky has served as acting chief since that time.

Ortiz is a resident of Claremont, married, with two adult sons, one of whom has followed in his law enforcement footsteps.

Caltech: New Assessment of Earthquake Hazard

Geophysicists at Caltech have created a new method for determining earthquake hazards by measuring how fast energy is building up on faults in a specific region, and then comparing that to how much is being released through fault creep and earthquakes.

They applied the new method to the faults underneath central Los Angeles, and found that on the long-term average, the strongest earthquake that is likely to occur along those faults is between magnitude 6.8 and 7.1, and that a magnitude 6.8—about 50 percent stronger than the 1994 Northridge earthquake—could occur roughly every 300 years on average.

That is not to say that a larger earthquake beneath central L.A. is impossible, the researchers say; rather, they find that the crust beneath Los Angeles does not seem to be being squeezed from south to north fast enough to make such an earthquake quite as likely.

The method also allows for an assessment of the likelihood of smaller earthquakes. If one excludes aftershocks, the probability that a magnitude 6.0 or greater earthquake will occur in central LA over any given 10-year period is about 9 percent, while the chance of a magnitude 6.5 or greater earthquake is about 2 percent.

A paper describing these findings was published by Geophysical Research Letters on February 27.

These levels of seismic hazard are somewhat lower but do not differ significantly from what has already been predicted by the Working Group on California Earthquake Probabilities. But that is actually the point, the Caltech scientists say.

Current state-of-the-art methods for assessing the seismic hazard of an area involve generating a detailed assessment of the kinds of earthquake ruptures that can be expected along each fault, a complicated process that relies on supercomputers to generate a final model. By contrast, the new method—developed by Caltech graduate student Chris Rollins and Jean-Philippe Avouac, Earle C. Anthony Professor of Geology and Mechanical and Civil Engineering—is much simpler, relying on the strain budget and the overall earthquake statistics in a region.

"We basically ask, 'Given that central L.A. is being squeezed from north to south at a few millimeters per year, what can we say about how often earthquakes of various magnitudes might occur in the

area, and how large earthquakes might get?'" Rollins says.

When one tectonic plate pushes against another, elastic strain is built up along the boundary between the two plates. The strain increases until one plate either creeps slowly past the other, or it jerks violently. The violent jerks are felt as earthquakes.

Fortunately, the gradual bending of the crust between earthquakes can be measured at the surface by studying how the earth's surface deforms. In a previous study (done in collaboration with Caltech research software engineer Walter Landry; Don Argus of the Jet Propulsion Laboratory, which is managed by Caltech for NASA; and Sylvain Barbot of USC), Avouac and Rollins measured ground displacement using permanent global positioning system (GPS) stations that are part of the Plate Boundary Observatory network, supported by the National Science Foundation (NSF) and NASA. The GPS measurements revealed how fast the land beneath L.A. is being bent. From that, the researchers calculated how much strain was being released by creep and how much was being stored as elastic strain available to drive earthquakes.

The new study assesses whether that earthquake strain is most likely to be released by frequent small earthquakes or by one very large one, or something in between. Avouac and Rollins examined the historical record of earthquakes in Los Angeles from 1932 to 2017, as recorded by the Southern California Seismic Network, and selected the scenario that best fit the region's observed behavior.

"Estimating the magnitude and frequency of the most extreme events, which can't be assumed to be known from history or instrumental observations, is very hard. Our method provides a framework to solve that problem and calculate earthquake probabilities," says Avouac.

This new method of estimating earthquake likelihood can be easily applied to other areas, offering a way to assess seismic hazards based on physical principles. "We are now refining the method to take into account the time distribution of past earthquakes, to make the forecasts more accurate, and we are adapting the framework so that it can apply to induced seismicity," Avouac says.

The study is titled "A geodesy- and seismicity-based local earthquake likelihood model for central Los Angeles." This research was supported by a NASA Earth and Space Science Fellowship.

Applicants for Space Accelerator

NASA's first aerospace accelerator program, co-sponsored by the Jet Propulsion Laboratory in Pasadena, California, will select 10 startup companies to take part in a three-month pilot program to develop new technologies for space. Applications will be accepted through April 7. Organized by Techstars with support from Starburst Aerospace, the pilot program will enable the selected companies to collaborate with engineers and subject matter experts from JPL and from co-sponsors Lockheed Martin, the U.S. Air Force, Maxar Technologies, SAIC and Israel Aerospace Industries North

America.

The accelerator will focus on technologies that can be applied to space — including geospatial analytics, digital design coupled to advanced manufacturing, autonomous systems, applied AI and machine learning. A main goal of the pilot program is to help both applicants and JPL swiftly develop technology that could be used for future space missions while also promoting collaboration between industry and NASA.

Ian Carson, 10th grader at Pasadena High School said, "I chose to attend Airport Academy because I've been seriously interested in flight ever since third grade when I started making model airplanes. About three years ago I started flying remote controlled airplanes."

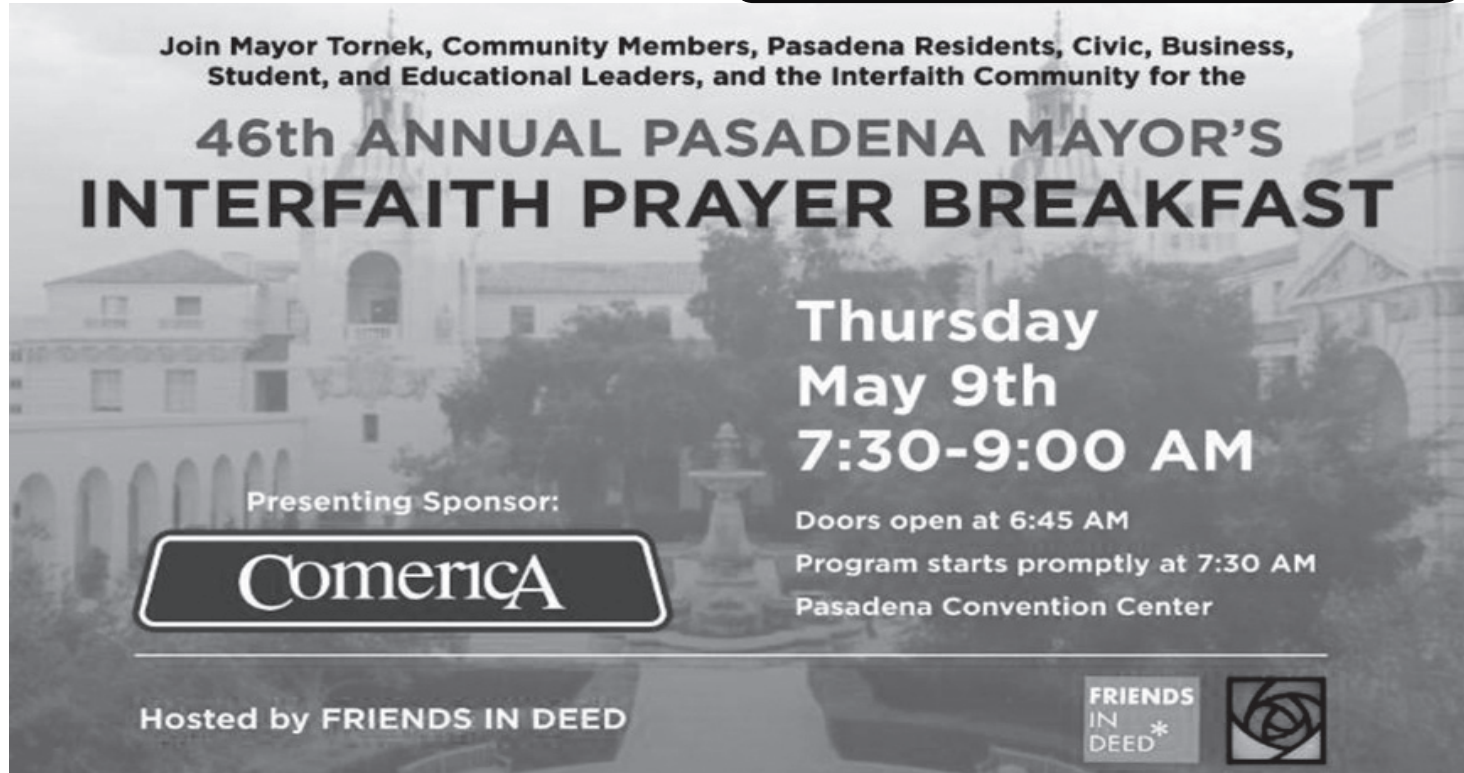

DAYLIGHT SAVINGS TIME:

Why should we continue this useless relic from the past?

Let's return to Standard Time All Year!

Our lawmakers, in their infinite wisdom, continue to tinker with time. Manipulate the clocks and we can trick the people into saving energy. And twice a year, Sierra Madre residents are all subject to the changes and inconveniences that occur as a result of the springing forward or falling back. We have to quickly adjust. It is part of our annual ritual, our relic from the past, where we go back to standard time from daylight savings time. And now we are expected to extend this "better" time a few more weeks.

But are there real and tangible benefits from doing this? Must we continue to do so?

Daylight savings time is a manipulation of the basic solar time within each time zone's standard. It was said to be an idea of Benjamin Franklin, and was begun in the United States during world wars one and two, and eventually became "official" in all but two states. That right! At least two states have said "No, thanks, we'll stick to standard time."

Indeed, daylight savings time is like a quaint tradition of a bygone era that refuses to die. It is a pointless habit with little recognizable merit. Michael Downing, author of "Spring Forward: The Annual Madness of Daylight Savings Time," demonstrates that the clock-change saves energy in theory only, but not in practice.

David Letterman once asked the question to his audience during his monologue: "Why do we practice daylight savings time? It's so the farmers have more light," he laughed, answering his own question. "But how does that give the plants more light?" That's a Letterman joke for you, but there is a truth hidden under his humor. Most people queried on the street don't know why we have daylight savings time, and fewer still experience any tangible benefits from it.

There are two often-cited reasons for the use of daylight savings time. One is so that the children can have more light going to school in the morning. But consider: the children have an hour more of morning light in late October, when the clock is set back ("fall back") to standard time. That is, it is the very use of daylight savings time which creates a darker morning as the days get shorter and shorter. The "falling back" an hour merely puts us back in sync with the local time zone. It is the use of daylight savings time that created the problem of less light in the morning, and only in that sense can you say that the "falling back" to regular time gives children that extra hour of light. In other words, this is a problem caused by daylight savings time. This is not a bonafide benefit from daylight savings time.

My grandfather, and all my uncles on my mother's side were farmers. I have some knowledge of the schedule of farmers. There is not one that I know who does not arise at the crack of dawn, if not sooner. There is no other way to function as a farmer. You then proceed to work as long as needed, and as long as you are able, daylight savings time or standard time. The manipulation of clocks in no way affected how much work they got done, or not done.

I have talked to many people about daylight savings time. Some like it, some do not. Some are annoyed by it, some find the long afternoons of summer very enjoyable. Everyone has arrived late (or early) on the first Sunday (even Monday in some cases) after the changing of the clocks. Daylight savings time thus gives millions of people a quasi-valid excuse for lateness at least once a year.

Let's end daylight savings time entirely and adopt a year-round standard time.

Those who wish to start school or go to work earlier can do so! Such voluntary time alterations are fine if those individuals and businesses choose to do so. It may even make the freeways less crowded at rush hours. But keep the standard time year-round.

Yes, this is a small thing in the context of a world at war, with hate and suspicion in all political camps, and endless economic hardships all over the world. In that big-picture sense, this is just a little issue. But this is still an issue that should be resolved, and dealt with.

Since daylight savings time is a state-by-state decision, we can begin with California. Write to Governor Brown and ask him to implement year-round standard time. You can write to Brown at Office of the Governor, State Capitol, Sacramento, CA 95814, or phone at (916) 445-2841, or on-line at www.govmail.ca.gov. (if you live in another state, write to your governor if you agree).

Take a poll of your friends and acquaintances before you write to the Governor. See if you can find anyone who derives tangible benefits from daylight savings time. Secondly, there is always the initiative process where a Proposition can be put on the ballot to be voted on by the people. This is a process that would take an organized effort and cost at least a million dollars, and probably more.

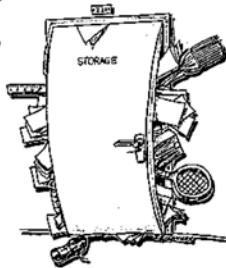

TIPPING ANOTHER VIEW

Just this past week I went to the wonderful Chop House in Pasadena, the subject of tipping came up and was asked about tipping at lunch, seems my guest is was under the impression that lunch time was no tip time, she was sure that it was 10% for lunch and %15 for dinner, if this makes sense to you please read on. My dearly departed pappy Elmer Dills would tell me, don't argue sex, politics and or religion, I must add tipping to the list. I have used this topic many times on my radio show, Dining with Dills on Go Country 105 Radio to get the phones buzzing.

There is a new law on the books, actually an old law that is now be enforced. Starting January 1, the IRS will classify automatic gratuities as service charges that are taxable as regular wages and subject to payroll tax withholding. That might sound like a bunch of arcane tax law mumbo jumbo, but what it means is that restaurants have to treat those tips like regular wages.

Typically, the IRS left it up to the waiter or tipped employees to declare that money. But with this new change the waiter won't see those "tips" until payday—instead of the end of the shift. And restaurants will have to withhold federal income, Social Security and Medicare taxes on that money, too.

What it means for the diner is that those automatic 18% gratuity charges on tables of 6 or more may well be a thing of the past. The addition has been added onto large parties to ensure that servers are paid for catering to a large group.

That doesn't mean you should use this an excuse to start stiffing people. Remember, the minimum wage laws here in the States for tipped workers is still at a shocking \$7.25 an hour. (California thankfully pays all of it's workers, tipped or untapped, a minimum of \$13/hour.) The new rule actually went into effect in June of 2012, however the IRS postponed enforcement until frequently to give restaurateurs enough time to adjust and properly comply. While it might seem great to have some freedom as a customer, the service industry isn't so excited about the idea. Tips... To insure proper service. Here is my rundown and no it hasn't changed in twenty years of reviewing restaurants. Anyone in any country that provides a service should be rewarded.

10% buffet plus \$2 directly to busboy that brought you water and had to clean up after the kids through Jell-O on the ground.

- \$1 for each drink at the bar
- \$2 for a to go order, as long as they got it right
- 12% fair service, means they brought you the food and came back with your check
- 15% Good service brought you your food and drinks and refilled drinks and asked how was it
- 18% Very Good service all of the above plus asked you if your meal was prepared to your liking
- 20-25% All of the above, brought items in proper order, waited for you to ask for check, asked if there is a validation needed and please ask for me next time.

One more note... I subtract 5% when the server blames the kitchen for a mistake, got it !!

FINDING HEALTH INSURANCE BEFORE MEDICARE KICKS IN



Dear Savvy Senior:

I will be retiring in a few months and need to get some health insurance for my wife and me until we can enroll in Medicare. What are my options? About to Retire

Dear About:

There are several places early retirees can find health insurance coverage before Medicare kicks in, but the best option for you and your wife will depend on your income level and your health care needs. Here's where to look.

Government Marketplace

If your yearly income falls below the 400 percent poverty level after you retire, the Affordable Care Act (ACA aka Obamacare) marketplace is probably your best option for getting health coverage because of the premium subsidies they offer, which will reduce the amount you'll have to pay for a policy.

ACA health insurance is major medical insurance that covers essential health benefits with no annual or lifetime coverage maximums. And they can't charge you more or deny you coverage because of a pre-existing health condition.

To qualify for the subsidies, your household's modified adjusted gross income for 2019 must be under \$48,560 for an individual, or \$65,840 for a couple.

If your income is just above these thresholds, you should talk to a tax advisor about perhaps making a larger IRA contribution or strategically timing retirement account withdrawals to help you qualify. To see how various levels of income might affect your premiums and subsidies, see the subsidy calculator on the Kaiser Family Foundation website at KFF.org/interactive/subsidy-calculator.

To shop for marketplace plans in your state, visit HealthCare.gov or call their toll-free helpline at 800-318-2596.

If you find that you are not eligible for the subsidies and the premiums seem unaffordable, look into ACA-compliant plans that you can purchase off the marketplace directly from the insurance carrier or through a broker. In some states, you might find plans with lower premiums, especially on silver plans.

To find off the marketplace policies, see health insurance shopping websites like eHealthInsurance.com, or contact a broker or agent to assist you. See LocalHelp.HealthCare.gov to locate someone in your area.

Short-Term Health Insurance

If you can't find an affordable ACA plan, you may want to consider short-term health insurance, which is much cheaper. These plans, which are not available in every state, are bare-bones health plans that provide coverage for three, six or 12 months – depending on state/federal rules. But be aware that short-term plans don't comply with the ACA so they can deny sick people coverage, they don't cover preexisting conditions and they can exclude coverage essentials like prescription drugs.

To shop for short-term health insurance, visit eHealthInsurance.com or contact a local broker or agent via LocalHelp.HealthCare.gov.

COBRA

If you need health insurance coverage for less than 18 months, another option you may want to consider is COBRA, which allows you to remain on your former employer's group health plan, but not every employer plan is COBRA eligible. Contact your employer benefits administrator to find out if yours is.

In most cases COBRA is expensive, requiring you to pay the full monthly premium yourself. But, if you've already met or nearly met your employer plan's deductible and/or out-of-pocket maximum for the year, and don't want to start over with a new plan; or if you find your employer's health plan to be better or more affordable than the other options, it makes sense to keep your current coverage under COBRA.

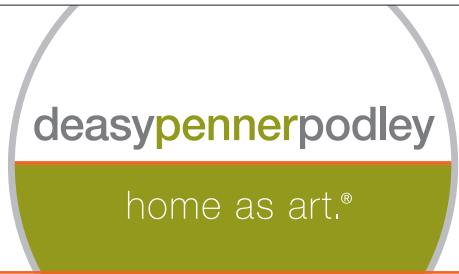

NEWS BRIEFS

CHAIRMAN SCHIFF STATEMENT ON MUELLER INVESTIGATION

Washington, DC – Today, Rep. Adam Schiff (D-CA), the Chairman of the House Intelligence Committee, released the following statement:

“Today, the Attorney General has informed Congress and the public that the Special Counsel has concluded his investigation and submitted a report of his findings. That report needs to be released to the public.

“Pursuant to the Special Counsel regulations, Mueller’s report is likely to focus on his prosecutorial decisions and may not shed necessary light on counterintelligence findings of profound significance to our committee and the nation — whether the President or others around him have been compromised by a foreign power.

“The Mueller investigation, like our own probe, began as a counterintelligence inquiry into whether individuals associated with the Trump campaign were compromised by a hostile foreign nation. By law, the evidence he has uncovered on all counterintelligence matters must now be shared with the House Intelligence Committee, whether it resulted in indictment or not.

“We will insist that the Justice Department meet its statutory obligations and be transparent with our Committee and the public. Anything less would be negligent in the service of our national security.”

COUNTY APPROVES HERBICIDE BAN WHILE STUDY IS CONDUCTED AND VIABLE ALTERNATIVES ARE EXPLORED

LOS ANGELES COUNTY – The Board of Supervisors approved a motion by Supervisors Kathryn Barger and Sheila Kuehl that directs county departments to stop the use of the herbicide glyphosate while a full investigation is conducted to examine whether the chemical is appropriate for use by the county based on potential environmental and health impacts.

“I am asking county departments to stop the use of herbicide until public health and environmental professionals can determine if it’s safe for further use in L.A. County and explore alternative methods for vegetation management,” Barger said.

The use of glyphosate, a main ingredient in the herbicide brand called “Roundup,” is a well-known and effective weed abatement method

used by many public and private entities. The Agricultural Commissioner, who has established protocols for its use in full compliance with all Federal and State regulations, also uses herbicide. Despite these controls, however, there is a growing body of scientific study around the safety of using herbicides and the potential for negative impacts on human, animal, and environmental health.

“In a 2015 study led by 17 experts from 11 countries, the World Health Agency’s International Agency for Research on Cancer concluded that glyphosate should be classified as ‘probably carcinogenic to humans,’” Supervisor Sheila Kuehlsaid. “That conclusion makes it imperative that we question any long-term use of this controversial herbicide, and that’s exactly what this motion calls for.”

The Department of Public Works, in conjunction with Public Health, Parks and Recreation, Beaches and Harbors, and the Agricultural Commission, will study the issue and report back to the Board with findings and alternatives within 30 days.

WINTER RESCUES IN OUR LOCAL MOUNTAINS



While the Sierra Madre Search and Rescue Team (SMSR) typically has a smaller call volume in the winter than in the summer, the stakes on these calls are often higher. This winter, the Team has responded to 5 calls in snow and ice conditions, requiring specialized winter clothing, emergency shelters, ice axes, crampons, snowshoes, avalanche beacons, and more.

One such call came on the afternoon of February 17th when a group of trail runners came to an icy section of the Kenyon Devore trail on Mt. Wilson about a mile from the nearest trailhead. While navigating the icy section one member of the party slipped and fell over 200 feet down steep terrain.

The initial responding agency, Montrose Search and Rescue, used ropes to access the patient and render medical aid. Sierra Madre Search and Rescue Team and Altadena Mountain Rescue Team then responded to assist in the rescue of the trail runner. Heavy snow and cloudy weather blocked helicopters from accessing the scene. Sadly, the fallen runner succumbed to their injuries in the field. The Sierra Madre Search and Rescue Team sends its deepest condolences to the friends and family of the trail runner.

The following Sunday two female hikers also encountered icy trail conditions while hiking from Chantry Flats to Mount Wilson. When they came to the icy section near the summit, they made the smart decision to turn around. However, they were not prepared for the long hike out after dark that the detour caused. Sierra Madre Search and Rescue Team again worked with Montrose Search and Rescue to locate the hikers. The hikers were found at Sturtevant Camp and evacuated by L.A. County Fire Dept. Air Copter 15 to Chantry Flats.

In order to work safely in these conditions, the Team trains annually for these types of rescues. On Saturday February 16th, team members spent a 15 hour day training in the snow at Mt. Pinos on skills such as snow anchors, avalanche burials, and patient packaging finishing with a comprehensive mock scenario.



As a member of the national Mountain Rescue Association, SMSR is accredited in snow and ice rescue. On Saturday March 2nd, SMSR traveled to Lake Tahoe with the other California Region MRA teams for the annual reaccreditation exercise. This year’s scenario involved searching the Sierra Nevada mountains on snowshoes to locate a distressed hiker. As snow fell, the scenario required the team to demonstrate their ability to navigate, provide medical aide, respond to an avalanche burial, provide emergency shelter, and use rope systems to transport a patient over steep terrain. Exercises like this are a vital part of what keeps SMSR ready to fulfill their motto, “Anywhere in the wilderness that someone needs help . . .”

For over 65 years, the all-volunteer Sierra Madre Search and Rescue Team has been responding to calls for help in the local mountains and beyond. The Team is funded entirely by charitable donations, and SMSR provides a range of public programs on wilderness safety in addition to its search and rescue activities. 
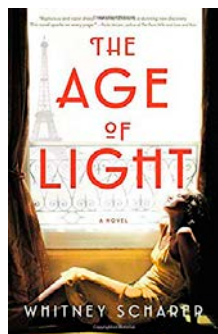

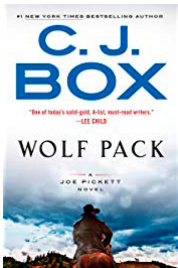
THE AGE OF LIGHT: A NOVEL by Whitney Scharer

FAMILY MATTERS

LUKE PERRY'S DEATH DEMONSTRATES THE IMPORTANCE OF PLANNING FOR INCAPACITY



In late February, Luke Perry, who became famous starring in the 1990s TV series *Beverly Hills 90210*, suffered a massive stroke at age 52. He was hospitalized under heavy sedation, and five days later, when it became clear he wouldn't recover, his family decided to remove life support. Perry died on March 4th, 2019 surrounded by his children, fiancé, ex-wife, mother, siblings, and others.

Whether or not you were a Luke Perry fan, it's hard not to be saddened when someone so young and seemingly healthy passes away suddenly. In these moments, the fragile impermanence of life becomes obvious. It's life's way of reminding us that incapacity and death can strike at any time, no matter who we are.

Reminders of the fleeting nature of life can motivate us to savor life now AND act to protect the ones we love through proper estate planning. And while we don't yet know exactly what levels of planning Perry had in place, it appears he was thoughtful and responsible enough to have at least covered the basics.

Planning for incapacity and death Perry was reportedly inspired to create his own estate plan following a health scare. In 2015, after discovering he had precancerous growths during a colonoscopy, Perry created a will, leaving everything to his two children. But since Perry was worth an estimated \$10 million, divorced with kids from the first marriage, and about to be married again, creating a will was a start but not nearly enough.

Wills only apply to the distribution of assets following death, and even then, your will must go through the court process known as probate for your assets to be distributed. Because a will only comes into play upon your death, if you're ever incapacitated by accident or illness as Perry was, it offers neither you nor your family any protections.

The power over medical decisions During the time he was incapacitated, someone was called upon to make crucial medical decisions for Perry's welfare, while his family was summoned to his side. To this end, it's likely Perry designated someone to serve as his medical decision-maker by granting them medical power of attorney. He may have also created a living will, which would provide specific instructions to this individual regarding how to make these medical decisions.

Granting medical powers of attorney gives the person you name the authority to make healthcare decisions on your behalf in the event of your incapacity. The document that does this is known as an advance healthcare directive, and it's an absolute must-have for every adult over age 18.

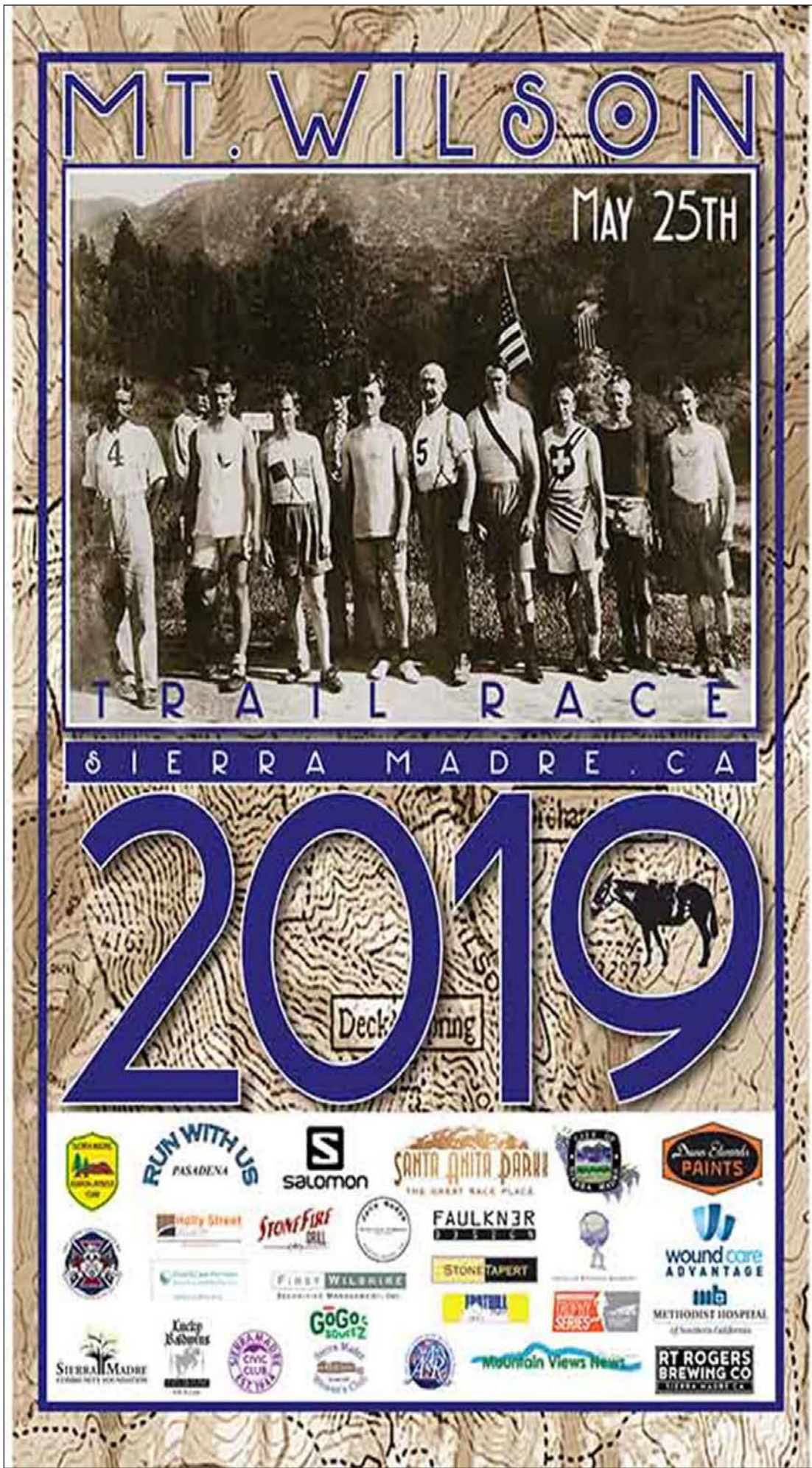
Without medical powers of attorney, if any of Perry's family were in disagreement over how his medical care should be handled, the family may have needed a court order to terminate life support. This could have needlessly prolonged the family's suffering and made his death even more public, costly, and traumatic for those he left behind.

Learn from Perry's example
Whether you already have a basic plan in place or nothing at all, you owe it to your loved ones to get educated about the specifics necessary to keep your family out of court and out conflict if something happens to you.

the case, Trump's reaction is a variation on a theme: "I will take him at his word"; "I really believe that when he tells me that, he means it."

When asked last fall whether Saudi Crown

Prince Mohammed bin Salman had a hand in the execution of columnist Jamal Khashoggi of The Washington Post, the president said the prince told him he didn't. Of the Saudis, Trump added, "I want to believe them. I really want to believe them." What the president really believes is that if he repeats the same refrain over and over, his dreams will come true. Some psychologists call this "magical thinking." Others call it delusional.

There is nothing magical about cold-blooded murder. There is something pathetic, however, about a president who is quick to accept the assurances of world-class criminals. Not so the family of Warmbier. When their son returned home shortly before his death last June, they expressed gratitude to President Trump's administration for the "quiet diplomacy" that led to their son's release. Gratitude, however, has its limits. In response to the president's assertion that the North Korean dictator was telling the truth when he said he had nothing to do with Warmbier's murder, the young man's family issued a statement that read, "Kim and his evil regime are responsible for the death of our son. No excuses or lavish praise can change that."

This president obsessively fixates on the media, branding them purveyors of "fake news" even when what's reported is credibly sourced and documented. He ignores the findings of his hand-picked team of intelligence professionals. He bends truth and reality to suit his will. Yet, when it comes to leaders of enemy states and authoritarian regimes, he readily accepts and embraces outright lies and disinformation, allowing them to play him for a fool. Trump does so not just at his peril, but ours as well.

That is not only inexcusable. It's dangerous.

If there's a sucker born every minute, our commander-in-chief is clearly the man of the hour.

What's fascinating about this president is how an expert con man (as he is) can so easily be conned.

In nearly every foray abroad, President Trump has exhibited either gullibility, complicity or a deliberate willingness to accept at face value the word of foreign dictators and autocrats. Of course, he does this while choosing to ignore the intelligence and counsel provided by his own expert advisers.

Trump has proven, once again, that he is a world-class chump.

After making a 14,000-mile trip to Vietnam and back for his much-heralded second round of "Deal or No Deal" with North Korean strongman Kim Jong-un, the president returned empty-handed. Save one thing: Kim's assurances that he had absolutely nothing to do with the death of 22-year-old Otto Warmbier, the Ohio college student taken hostage and murdered by the Kim regime. While Kim may not have actively participated in the torture that led to Warmbier's neurological injuries, subsequent coma and eventual death, nothing of any magnitude takes place in North Korea without his express knowledge or approval.

The 2016 arrest and incarceration of a foreign national - especially one holding American citizenship - would have certainly been brought to Kim's attention. Warmbier was a bargaining chip for Kim then and remains so even after he has been laid to rest.

When questioned by a reporter as to whether he'd discussed Warmbier's treatment during his meetings with Kim, the president said the dictator told him that "he didn't know about it and I will take him at his word."

On yet another of Gullible's Travels to Vietnam (for the 2017 APEC summit), Trump was asked whether he and Vladimir Putin had discussed Russian meddling in the U.S. presidential election. Trump told reporters, "[Putin said] I didn't do that. I really believe that when he tells me that, he means it." Maybe it's something in the air in Vietnam or, perhaps, just jet lag that makes the president so susceptible to digesting disinformation when it's being spoon-fed to him by foreign strongmen. PRESIDENTIAL HOPEFUL PETE BUTTIGIEG (WHO?!) ELEVATES OUR DISCOURSE

Pete Buttigieg isn't likely to be the next Democratic presidential nominee. Most people have no clue who he is, don't know how to pronounce his name and will be loath to believe that the mayor of a small city has the requisite credentials to run the whole country. Especially at the age of 37.

But "Mayor Pete" from South Bend, Indiana - whose surname is pronounced BUTT-edge-edge - is a welcome addition to the swelling Democratic roster.

As an openly gay millennial who served in Afghanistan, he certainly breaks the mold. But it's what he has said and done during the last few weeks that has truly caught my attention.

Consider his response to the mass murder of Muslim worshippers in New Zealand, an act allegedly committed by a guy who called Donald Trump "a symbol of renewed white identity." In contrast to Trump - who shrugged off any link between his white nationalist rhetoric and the New Zealand shootings - Buttigieg wrote a touching letter to the Muslim citizens of South Bend.

"I want you to know that this entire City has its arms around you, in love and peace, and that we support you as you practice your faith," Buttigieg wrote. "We will do everything we can to ensure your safety...The diversity of our community is its strength, and the members of the Islamic community have greatly enriched this City."

Granted, Trump sets the presidential bar at mud level. Your pet dog could hurdle it. But Buttigieg, as a chief executive tasked with setting the proper moral tone in a time of crisis, has instantly demonstrated that he's more fit to lead than Individual-1. The citizens of South Bend, in red Indiana, have already vetted his fitness as a leader; in 2015 he came out as gay while running for a second term - and won more than 80 percent of the vote.

But what struck me first was something he said not long ago, during a meet-and-greet in New Hampshire. He was lamenting that Democrats have allowed the GOP to monopolize the word freedom.

"Freedom means a lot to conservatives, but they have such a narrow sense of what it means. They think a lot about freedom from - freedom from government, freedom from regulation - and precious little about freedom to," Buttigieg said. "Freedom to is absolutely something that has to be safeguarded by good government, just as it could be impaired by bad government."

Buttigieg cited the freedom to leave a job and start another with portable health coverage, the freedom to make family planning choices "without a male politician or boss imposing their interpretation of their religion" and the freedom to marry a loved one, regardless of sexual orientation.

During an appearance on Fox News Sunday, he cited the freedom to attend school without gun violence, and the freedom to live a quality life without climate change. Speaking for millennials, he told Chris Wallace, "We're the generation that's going to be on the business end of the consequences of climate change. We're also the generation that's going to be on track to be the first in American history to make less than our parents if nothing is done to change the trajectory of our economy."

The answer is to "cut carbon emissions before they lead to changes that really destroy our economy and any prospect for people of my generation to do well" - and if that requires radical action to make us as carbon free as possible, such as retrofitting every possible building (creating lots of new jobs for the building trades), then so be it.

"This timetable isn't being set by Congress. It's being set by reality," Buttigieg said.

Perhaps Buttigieg will prove to be a blip on the radar. But for now, it's refreshing to hear from someone with a totally different set of Democrat credentials, someone who can elevate the tone, articulate common sense, and potentially reverse the debasement of American values. He knows that is the ultimate challenge. As he recently told a journalist, "This (election) cycle is going to test which of the rules are broken forever, and which are going to snap back into place."

Perhaps he can help with the latter.

WE DESERVE THE MUELLER REPORT



On Wednesday, President Trump surprised the gaggle of White House reporters waiting to see him depart for Ohio. When asked if Special Counsel Mueller's report should be released to the American people, the president said, "I don't mind. I mean frankly, I told the House, if you want, let them see it."

The statement, which spread throughout the media like wildfire, was correct - and strange to hear from the president, given his repeated attacks on the investigation in general and Mueller specifically. But Trump quickly saddled the admission with asterisks.

First, he launched into a diatribe against the investigation, insisting that his electoral college victory somehow rendered it unnecessary and that former Attorney General Jeff Sessions never should have let it begin in the first place. The president complained that he and his voters "don't get" why the report is even being written. But the rationale for the investigation has been clear from the start: Our intelligence agencies publicly and unanimously determined that Putin's Russia interfered in our election to help candidate Trump best Hillary Clinton, and we need to know how that happened.

Second, Trump also indulged one of his classic moves: he passed the buck to someone else. In the middle of his answer, the president said that the report's release is "up to the attorney general." That is, to William Barr - who deliberately and repeatedly refused to commit to releasing said report during his confirmation hearing. President Trump may not be a chessmaster, but appointing a new attorney general to stop the results of an investigation your old attorney general failed to stop in the first place seems like a deliberate strategy.

And of course, there is the asterisk that is the president himself. He lies, continuously - about his own words and actions, about the words and actions of others, and about the effects of his proposals and the realities on the ground. Him saying one thing today is hardly a guarantee that he'll hold the same position (or even admit he ever did) tomorrow.

All of this is immaterial to the fact that the special counsel's report should be released. Deliberately and without fanfare, Mueller has been uncovering instances of wrongdoing and assembling a greater picture of how now-indicted Russian operatives worked to influence our election.

Along the way, he has also cracked down on foreign lobbying and financial crimes - both of which weaken our democracy and dilute the voices of the American people as we do the work of self governance. The investigation isn't about proving the president guilty or innocent: It's about the basic rule of law, and ensuring that only the people of the United States choose our elected leaders.

Those who suspect the president of wrongdoing should want it released for obvious reasons, but those inclined to believe him should too simply for the sake of clearing his name. The House recently passed, by a whopping 420-0 vote, a measure urging transparency around the investigation; a similar bipartisan measure could pass the Senate, if not for the obstruction of presidential lapdogs Mitch McConnell and Lindsey Graham.

At the end of the day, it's in everyone's interest for the special counsel's investigation into Russian interference in our election to conclude. Russia has already shown a willingness to continue interfering in our democracy during the 2018 midterm elections, and there will be more to come in 2020 until we understand what happened, hold all involved accountable, and take steps to secure our democracy.

We the people deserve to read Mueller's report, so let's hope that remains the president's position, even after he finds out what's in it.

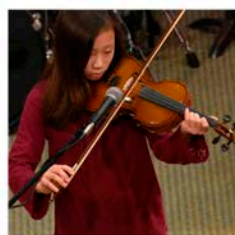
