SIERRA MADRE SEARCH AND RESCUE TEAM HELPS TRACK DOWN MISSING HIKERS

On the evening of Saturday, April 6th search and rescue crews were dispatched to the San Gabriel mountains near Mount Baldy, to search for two overdue hikers, Eric Desplinter and Gabrielle Wallace. On Wednesday, April 10th a crew from the Sierra Madre Search and Rescue Team found the footprints that turned the "search" operation into a "rescue."

ing slope free of snow and ice, it's rough terrain. Rescuers described an "ocean of rock" with crumbling footing, and uneven, unstable terrain.

Late in the afternoon the crew found a clear boot-print. Since they were far from any trails, this was significant. Soon they found a second set of fresh tracks heading down canyon, which they followed



Sierra Madre had been assisting the San Bernardino County West Valley Search and Rescue Team since Monday, sending searchers each day to comb the Cucamonga Peak area. Search crews also responded from San Bernardino, Riverside, Los Angeles, Orange, San Diego, and Kern Counties.

Throughout the search, high winds prevented helicopters from inserting search teams. As a result, teams had to hike several miles uphill to start their search assignments each day. Because of the time spent hiking to and from the search area, it was decided on Tuesday to request crews that could spend the night in the field. On Wednesday, one

for over a mile. They reported this information to the command post, and a helicopter was launched to fly the canyon to look for the missing couple.

The rescuers described listening anxiously to the radio traffic from the helicopter. At first the helicopter crew reported spotting a campfire and two people, but it wasn't until they confirmed they were alive that the rescuers celebrated. One rescuer recounts, "If the water in the river weren't so loud, I'm sure they would've heard our screams of celebration down in the command post."

After Eric and Gabrielle were hoisted out of the canyon and flown back to the command post, both overnight search crews were also extracted



crew from Sierra Madre and another crew with members from China Lake Mountain Rescue and West Valley Search and Rescue took overnight assignments.

The Sierra Madre crew was prepared to work through the night, traverse snow and ice, negotiate waterfalls and navigate long rappels through a canyon. Along with their standard equipment they carried ice axes, crampons, sleeping bags, bivy sacks, food, 400 feet of rope and wetsuits. They were heavy packs. One rescuer said, "I think 'slog' was the word of the day."

Their assignment was to search Cucamonga Canyon. One rescuer said when they stood at the top of the canyon, "It looked inviting. You can see the city in front of you, but you can't see the 85 foot waterfall between you and the exit at the bottom." Although Cucamonga Canyon is on a south fac-

by helicopter.

As a long standing Sierra Madre Search and Rescue Team member explained, "Search and rescue calls can often be pretty routine, but every few years you get a call that tests the limits. These are the calls where all the training pays off. ALL of the teams and personnel involved in this search made this happen."

While it is always incredibly rewarding to be on the crew that finds the missing hikers, Sierra Madre would like to recognize all the other search and rescue volunteers who helped bring this search to a happy ending. It is always great to work with neighboring teams and pitch in to the collective effort to bring the lost people home!

TAX ME PLEASE



"Please Tax Me" --said no one ever. But if I'm going to be taxed, I want to maximize the amount that stays right here in the Village of the Foothills: Our quaint City of Sierra Madre. When you compare the taxes of California to other states, it should come as no surprise that California ranks amongst one of

The way I see it, we need to establish our own District/City Sales Tax to 1) keep our dollars local; and 2) block the ability of other entities' to collect revenues through sales tax. We have three ways to accomplish that: Firstly and ideally, we gather signature from voters that support a City Sales Tax of 0.75%. Of the 8149 registered voters in Sierra Madre, if at least 15% of those sign the initiative- the City Council has the authority to adopt this Citizen's Initiative.

- Not as attractive, but achievable, is the second option of gathering 10% of registered voters signatures and call for a special election in November 2019. Assuming there are surrounding cities that would participate in a special election- it may cost approximately \$200,000 from our general fund.

- Thirdly, we wait until November 2020 to put a Sierra Madre Sales Tax on the Ballot where it is likely that competing tax measures will pass. If this happens, we may have to share any voter approved tax measures but can't exceed the 0.75% cap (unless the entity is exempted by the State). The need for action is evident- we need to keep Sierra Madre Dollars IN Sierra Madre to maintain our quality of life. The window of opportunity is small and we only have until the end of May to gather enough signatures if we're serious about keeping our sales tax revenue local.

I know I'll be signing the petition to establish a local sales tax. Will you?

The most notable concern for us is the District Tax. It is supposed to cap at 2.0% but because 1% is exempted by the State, there is still a remaining 0.75% that can be taxed under the limit. There are multiple entities fighting for that 0.75% and it's only a matter of time. If the past decade has demonstrated a trend, in LA County alone we have seen 7 of 9 different taxes pass. We expect more tax proposals on the upcoming November 2020 General Election ballot.

If that happens, and other tax measures pass, Sierra Madre may only be left with the 1% sales tax the State automatically allocates. Doing nothing and waiting for others to take our money is not an option.

Couples sharing a quick kiss as they're heading off to work, jumping into separate cars with a cup of coffee; friends giving a goodbye smooch after class in front of Sierra Fit Pilates as they scatter to start their day; a kiss on top of the head for a dog who has sat patiently in front of Starbucks waiting for his/her owner to return; and best of all, parents kissing

their little ones goodbye before they race off to school. The daily morning scramble is a very hectic time, an hour packed with trying to get little people dressed, teeth brushed, something nutritious in their tummies, organizing the backpack, getting the hair combed, finding the permission slip and the lunch, and not losing the parental temper because we ones have a tendency to move at snail speed in the morning. I shudder to think how many times I did not kiss my little ones goodbye before they left for school. I think parents are doing it better these days. Spending all their kisses in the picture are daughter, Crissy, and granddaughter, Jessie, who was about three at the time.

Recently I came across one of my favorite books, autographed by the author and given to me by my Aunt Helen, who was the jewelry and gift buyer for I. The phrase and the concept stuck with him, and, apparently, with his wife, Denny, too, and a couple of years later on Christmas morning Jack found she had "laid out 18 pieces of wooden type - each piece ¾ of an inch thick and one inch tall, backwards, of course, the words being in reverse order and each letter backwards, in the way of moveable type. The type face still bore the stain of the ink used to print out the message on a long piece of coarse linen, which was also laid out on the couch - Spend All Your Kisses." He was beyond delighted.

Jack Smith went on to conjecture about the fact that "there is no point in taking any of one's wealth into the next world. Why keep a kiss, a gesture, a word that might give a moment's pleasure or reassurance to someone else." Unlicensed Lawyer Found Guilty

A Pasadena man who falsely claimed to be a licensed attorney was remanded into custody last week after a federal jury found him guilty of fraud charges related to his representation of “clients” in federal and state courts.

Kenneth Paul Ferreyro was also convicted of tax offenses for seeking well over \$100,000 in refunds on federal tax returns that falsely claimed substantial payroll taxes had been withheld and remitted to the Internal Revenue Service.

Following a four-day trial in United States District Court, the jury deliberated for about two hours before convicting Ferreyro of four counts of wire fraud and four counts of making false claims on his tax returns.

The evidence presented at trial showed that, from at least 2010 to 2017, Ferreyro told people that he could represent them in United States Bankruptcy Court and other courts and that he could perform work related to real estate refinancing and tax liens. While Ferreyro did graduate from a law school, he never received a license to practice law.

Ferreyro is scheduled to be sentenced by United States District Judge John F. Walter on June 24. Ferreyro faces a statutory maximum sentence of 100 years in federal prison.

NASA satellite and airborne instruments picture Earth every day to increase our knowledge of our home and improve lives. These images, shared with scientists and the public worldwide, may use visible light, like a photographer’s camera, or peer into infrared, microwave and radio wavelengths that are invisible to human eyes.

Scientists use data from all of our instruments, and from Earth-observing spacecraft from other nations, to build a picture of the planet that grows more and more complete over time. On April 26, our next addition to our Earth-observing fleet, the Orbiting Carbon Observatory 3, is set to launch to the International Space Station. The new knowledge made possible by this fleet helps create solutions to important global issues such as changing freshwater availability, food security and human health.

Residents Decry Space Bank Cleanup

The Pasadena city council agreed Monday night to send a letter to the California Dept. of Toxic Substances Control asking for more time after a deadline passed that night allowing the city to review site testing and cleanup of a former military site they approved to be developed into apartments.

According to Councilmember Gene Masuda they asked for more time to study over 500 pages of the technical reports, the removal action work plan and California quality act findings to address toxic waste in the soil. The city was given until April 8 and then extended 22 days Masuda said.

“Just as a reminder to the council, our council has the responsibility for the safety to the residents and to make sure that the residents concerns are addressed, its not happening,” he said.

Council member Victor Gordo said the council did not anticipate that the project site might not be safe for those

living there.

“DTSC is telling us that they’re limiting not just the comment period but they’re limiting the scope of the investigation,” Gordo said. “They’re doing spot testing as opposed to full testing of the entire site, that too is unacceptable.”

Gordo suggested they force the state to do the right thing, full testing and test for all harmful chemicals, “Not just some of them” he said.

The council said they were asking for at least three more months.

Most of the 20 or so residents that spoke at the meeting agreed with the councils decision and proposed request.

According to a change.org petition, in July, the Pasadena City Council gave permission for Trammell Crow Company, a developer, to build 550 apartments for hundreds of children and families (as pictured above) on top of the toxic waste.

“DTSC issued a finding that, after only partial site testing and

a quick cleanup of 12 hot spots, the development would have no significant harmful health impacts. Full cleanup would cost the developer only \$1-2 million more,” it reads.

Over 500 people have signed the petition.

710 Legislation Passes First Committee

The Senate Transportation Committee Tuesday passed SB 7, the State Highway Route 710 bill, authored by Senator Anthony Portantino. The bill would allow the surplus of the non-profit properties to be purchased at their current use value. In addition, SB 7 would prohibit Caltrans from implementing a tunnel surface freeway or expressway for Route 710 between Route 10 and Route 210 and it lays the foundation for the state to return surplus freeway stubs back to local cities in the freeway corridor.

The California Department of Transportation (Caltrans) currently owns 460 properties in the State Route 710 (SR 710) corridor, including 330 homes and 103 multi-family housing units. Originally, the properties purchased in the corridor with the intent to remove the structures for the extension of the SR 710 freeway. The purpose was to close a 4.5 mile unconstructed gap between the City of Alhambra and the City of Pasadena. Last year, Los Angeles County Metropolitan Transportation Authority withdrew its support and funding for a proposed project, it was determined that the freeway project will never be built. With the certification the final EIR of the 710 corridor, there is no longer a threat of the freeway.

SB 7 will forever prohibit the implementation of a freeway tunnel or surface freeway in the gap between Alhambra and Pasadena. The six community nonprofits who provide a public good by serving the most vulnerable in our state need to be able to continue their good work, but will not be able to do so if the price of the property is out of their reach.

The City of South Pasadena, the City of Pasadena, the Cottage Co-Op, Pasadena Ronald McDonald House, LA County Supervisor Kathryn Barger and the Board of Supervisors all formally support SB 7.

New Pasadena Director of Public Health Appointed

City Manager Steve Mermell has appointed Dr. Ying-Ying Goh to lead the Pasadena Public Health Department (PPHD). Mermell made the announcement Tuesday.

Dr. Goh is a board-certified pediatrician and has been serving as the City’s Health Officer since 2015. In this new role, Dr. Goh will continue to serve as the City’s Health Officer.

Prior to her appointment as PPHD’s Director of Public Health, Dr. Goh served as Medical Director for Programs and Research for the Department, securing grant funding and managing programs related to diabetes care management and childhood obesity prevention. Her professional experience includes clinical pediatric practice; management of a California Endowment task force to improve healthcare access and quality in Los Angeles County; design and implementation of a case management program for seniors with chronic conditions; and research to improve nutrition and physical activity for youth.

Dr. Goh earned a bachelor’s degree from Stanford University, a medical degree from the Stanford University School of Medicine and a master’s



degree in Health Services from the UCLA Fielding School of Public Health, and she completed pediatric residency programs at Boston Children’s Hospital and Boston Medical Center.

“Dr. Goh brings valuable insight in the areas of public policy, research and medicine. She has worked on a wide range of special projects to bring healthcare access, community-based programs and grant funding to our city, improving the quality of life for so many. Her educational background and years of experience provide a beneficial perspective and strengthen an already outstanding group of dedicated employees,” said Mermell.

Michael Johnson has been the City’s Director of Public Health since 2015 and will retire at the end of April, at which time Dr. Goh will transition into the role.

Holdens Statement on Wildfire Task Force Report

Governor Newsom released Friday his Strike Force Report Wildfires and Climate change: California’s Energy Future. Assemblymember Chris Holden released the following statement:

“The Governor has outlined the significant issues and we all recognize the magnitude of the problem. What’s clear is that we need all hands on deck. That means coordinated concrete action at all levels of government to make sure we have a safe, green, and reliable electric grid and to prevent catastrophic wildfires.

All stakeholders will have to sideline their agendas and step



up as Californians to fix this problem, and I’m ready to roll up my sleeves and do the hard work necessary. At the end of the day, we need stability in our utilities to keep the lights on.”

Legislation to Protect San Gabriel Mountains

Rep. Judy Chu introduced the San Gabriel Mountains Foothills and Rivers Protection Act Wednesday to expand the San Gabriel Mountains National Monument, establish a National Recreation Area (NRA) along the foothills and San Gabriel River corridor, and designate over 30,000 acres of protected wilderness and 45.5 miles of protected rivers in Southern California. This bill would expand the borders of the San Gabriel Mountains National Monument to include the western Angeles National Forest. It also establishes an NRA to enhance conservation, increase access for all communities by connecting park poor areas to open space, and improve the management of the area through improved resources, education, and public engagement. The 15,878 acres of expanded wilderness and 15,191 acres of new wilderness areas will benefit from the highest form of protection of any federal wildland. These areas of untouched nature will remain open to hiking, camping, and other recreation activities encouraged in the San Gabriel Mountains National Monument, but commercial activities and motorized vehicles will be prohibited in order to prevent over-development, pollution,

and habitat destruction. Private property and other existing rights and claims will be unchanged. In the Senate, Sen. Kamala Harris (D-CA) introduced a companion bill. Rep. Chu released the following statement:

“The Los Angeles area is one of the most park poor areas of the country, despite the presence of the gorgeous rivers, forests, and mountains of the San Gabriels just to the north. President Obama’s National Monument designation increased access to and opportunities for learning and exploring in the mountains, but so much land remains to be preserved so that more people can experience our area’s unique gifts of nature. That is why I am proud to work with Senator Harris to advance the San Gabriel Mountains Foothills and Rivers Protection Act. This legislation represents the next step in protecting and connecting the San Gabriel Mountains, and will preserve thousands of acres of land and water for future generations.”

JPL Curiosity Tastes Sample in ‘Clay-Bearing Unit’

Scientists working with NASA’s Curiosity Mars rover have been excited to explore a region called “the clay-bearing unit” since before the spacecraft launched. Now, the rover has finally tasted its first sample from this part of Mount Sharp. Curiosity drilled a piece of bedrock nicknamed “Aberlady” on Saturday, April 6 (the 2,370th Martian day, or sol, of the mission), and delivered the sample to its internal mineralogy lab on Wednesday, April 10 (Sol 2374).

The rover’s drill chewed easily through the rock, unlike some of the tougher targets it faced nearby on Vera Rubin Ridge. It was so soft, in fact, that the drill didn’t need to use its percussive technique, which is helpful for snagging samples from harder rock. This was the mission’s first sample obtained using only rotation of the drill bit.

“Curiosity has been on the road for nearly seven years,” said Curiosity Project Manager Jim Erickson of NASA’s Jet Propulsion Laboratory in Pasadena, California. “Finally drilling at the clay-bearing unit is a major milestone in our journey up Mount Sharp.”

Scientists are eager to analyze the sample for traces of clay minerals because they usually form in water. NASA’s Mars Reconnaissance Orbiter (MRO) spied a strong clay “signal” here long before Curiosity landed in 2012. Pinpointing the source of that signal could help the science team understand if a wetter Martian era shaped this layer of Mount Sharp, the 3-mile-tall (5-kilometer-tall) mountain Curiosity has been climbing.

Curiosity has discovered clay minerals in mudstones all along its journey. These mudstones formed as river sediment settled within ancient lakes nearly 3.5 billion years ago. As with water elsewhere on Mars, the lakes eventually dried up.

The clay beacon seen from space brought the rover here, but the region clearly has several other stories to tell. Now that Curiosity is searching this area, scientists can peer around as geological tourists, finding a landscape both ancient and new. There are several kinds of bedrock and sand, including active sand ripples that have shifted in the past year. Pebbles are scattered everywhere — are they eroding from the local bedrock? Several eye-catching landmarks, such as “Knockfarril Hill,” stick out as well.

“Each layer of this mountain is a puzzle piece,” said Curiosity Project Scientist Ashwin Vasavada of JPL. “They each hold clues to a different era in Martian history. We’re excited to see what this first sample tells us about the ancient environment, especially about water.”

The Aberlady sample will give the team a starting point for thinking about the clay-bearing unit. They plan to drill several more times over the course of the next year. That will help them understand what makes this region different from the ridge behind it and an area with a sulfate signal up higher on the mountain.

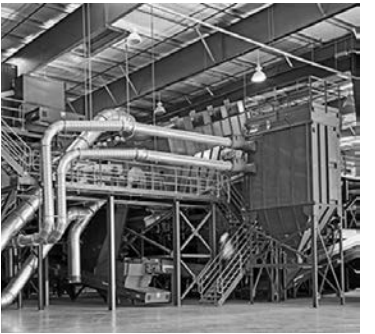

ARCADIA JOINS LAWSUIT SEEKING TO STOP CANNABIS DELIVERY

4 local agencies in a lawsuit against the California Bureau of Cannabis Control (BCC) after a recent decision that allows commercial delivery of cannabis in California, including in cities that have regulated or banned commercial marijuana.

The lawsuit, filed by attorneys at Churchwell White LLP, seeks to invalidate recent regulations by the BCC that violate the will of voters and the law by purporting to allow delivery of commercial cannabis to any physical address in the state. The lawsuit contends that the regulations conflict with state law, which allows the commercial delivery of marijuana only when it complies with local law.

California voters passed Proposition 64 in 2016, which decriminalized marijuana possession for recreational use. The law, however, gave cities the ability to regulate or ban marijuana sales in their jurisdictions. The Arcadia City Council did just that, banning all commercial and industrial marijuana uses, including the prohibition of deliveries and mobile vending. While Proposition 64 specifically allowed cities to enact such bans, recent BCC regulations allow state-licensed marijuana businesses to deliver anywhere in California regardless of local preference.

"The BCC regulation eliminates the ability of cities to regulate commercial cannabis deliveries within their communities," said Mayor Sho Tay. "We want to make sure that the promises made to voters under Proposition 64 are kept, and ensure the state does not take away local control."

The lawsuit, filed in Fresno Superior Court, aims to overturn the state regulation so that cities and counties can block or restrict marijuana deliveries in their borders.

ARCADIA ADOPTS HISTORIC PRESERVATION ORDINANCE

On April 2, 2019, the Arcadia City Council adopted a Historic Preservation Ordinance, a first for the City of Arcadia and marking an important step in the identification and preservation of historic buildings throughout the City.

The Ordinance represented the culmination of several years of community engagement and involvement. The project began in 2015 with an effort to determine what historic resources exist in the City, and to identify the various patterns of development throughout the City's history. The City contracted with well-respected Pasadena historians Architectural Resources Group, Inc., to develop a Historic Resources Survey and Context Statement, as well as to draft the Historic Preservation Ordinance.

The Survey identified a number of important structures, some of which rise to the State and National levels for historic significance. Arcadia's rich history includes not only obviously important structures such as the Santa Anita Park Grandstand and Queen Anne cottage at the Los Angeles County Arboretum and Botanic Gardens, but also iconic structures related to City-founder Lucky Baldwin and the Baldwin family, homes designed by famed architects Wallace Neff and Richard Neutra, and commercial structures such as the Harold Bissner designed Denny's building with its famous windmill.

"Like any important new regulation, the Ordinance was truly a community effort, with numerous well-attended public meetings and discussions. In the end, the final Ordinance represents a balance between private property rights and the ability to protect and preserve important buildings," said Assistant City Manager/Development Services Director Jason Kruckeberg.

The main tenets of the Ordinance are the facts that it is voluntary, and property owners can come forward to designate their own properties. "The Historic Preservation Ordinance is a thoughtful, important step in the preservation of not only buildings but of Arcadia's heritage," said Mayor Sho Tay. "We listened to our residents and developed an Ordinance that fits our City."

Now that the Ordinance is in effect, the City will be working with local organizations such as the Arcadia Historical Society and Los Angeles Conservancy in assisting residents and property owners in designating their buildings as historic if they so choose. MONROVIA MAJOR PIPELINE CONSTRUCTION SET TO CONTINUE ON CANYON BOULEVARD AS PART OF MONROVIA RENEWAL NORTH SECTION EFFORTS!

Work is scheduled to continue this next week on construction of a 16" water pipeline as a part of the Monrovia Renewal North Section Infrastructure Improvements Project. This water improvement – which is designed to improve water flows, pressure, and reliability in the area – includes major construction efforts to install a 16" pipeline from the intersection of Laurel Lane / Canyon Crest Drive, over to Canyon Boulevard, and then north on Canyon Boulevard up to the Oakglade Reservoir. The map above highlights the section of Canyon Boulevard where the work will be taking place.

During construction, parking will be restricted during working hours along Canyon Boulevard, from Canyon Crest Drive to Oakglade Drive. This will be necessary given that traffic will be reduced to one lane, with proper traffic control and flaggers in place to safely direct vehicle traffic.

The City will maintain vehicle access to Canyon Park, and furthermore, pedestrian access along the sidewalk will also be maintained.

Given the extent of these improvements, we are asking that all motorists and pedestrians traveling in the area be cautious and aware of the activity occurring, and to expect delays when traveling through the identified construction area. Of note, we expect this particular bit of construction activity to be completed by Friday, April 25.

CITRUS COLLEGE CONTINUES TO MEET WORKFORCE NEEDS THROUGH CAREER TECHNICAL EDUCATION

This spring, representatives from school districts throughout the region will visit Citrus College for the annual K-14 Education Forum. During the event, local board of education members, superintendents and school administrators will join the college's administrators, deans and faculty for an informative morning of collaboration and discussion. The focus of this year's forum will be the career technical education (CTE) programs offered at Citrus College.

The forum's theme is relevant and timely. With employers struggling to find skilled workers to fill job openings, responding to labor market demands has become a state priority. In 2016, the California Community Colleges Chancellor's Office introduced its Strong Workforce program, which addresses the workforce crisis by providing funding for community colleges to improve and expand their career education programs. As a Strong Workforce partner, Citrus College has committed to supporting the program's objective of lifting low-wage workers into living-wage jobs.

Of course, preparing students to enter the workforce has long been the goal of Citrus College's CTE programs. Citrus College offers 18 CTE associate degrees, four CTE transfer degrees, and is currently awaiting the approval of an additional CTE transfer degree that has been sent to the Chancellor's Office. It also offers 38 certificates of achievement and more than 10 skill awards. The wide range of CTE programs includes automotive technology, biotechnology, nursing, water technology and more.

Each of these programs is designed to provide students with the education and skills needed to succeed in the workplace. Before a new program is introduced or curriculum is established, faculty and staff research industry demands and study the regional economy. Among other things, they determine which occupations are predicted to have growth, which have a shortage of workers and which pay a livable wage. Working closely with business and industry professionals, they identify the knowledge needed to secure and sustain employment.

This detailed and thoughtful approach led to the creation of Citrus College's newest CTE associate degree program, construction management. Debuting during the 2019-2020 academic year, this program will prepare students to hold entry-level construction management positions, work with public agencies or private construction firms or become employed with construction contractors. Program graduates will understand the fundamental systems and processes employed in building and heavy construction. They will also be prepared with specialized skills and certificates in construction inspection and quality control.

Another new CTE option is stationary power generation service, diagnosis and repair. This program, which will be the only one of its kind in Southern California, will allow students to complete courses in the maintenance of diesel-powered stationary power generators and associated equipment. After earning their technical certificate, graduates will be prepared to pursue careers as electrical and electronics repairers, power distributors and dispatchers, stationary engineers, and mobile heavy equipment mechanics.

I am confident that these new programs will be beneficial to the region. According to the Centers of Excellence for Labor Market Research, available data has determined that the programs will fulfill unmet workforce needs. In addition, the entry-level earnings of program graduates will exceed a living wage.

As the Duarte area's representative on the Citrus Community College District Board of Trustees, I am proud that the college equips students with highly marketable, specialized skills, and I am certain that it will continue to play a critical role in addressing labor market demands for years to come.

Automotive technology is one of the many career technical education programs offered at Citrus College.

CONSIDERING EASTER AND WHAT IT MEANS

It is a time that millions of people the world over look forward to – the first Sunday after the first full moon after the spring equinox. What day is that, you ask? Easter, the day (and season) that Christians worldwide commemorate the trial, death, and resurrection from the dead of Jesus.

I grew up in a Catholic family, going to a Catholic school, and know well the Easter motif, beginning with the "giving something up" for Lent, and then Palm Sunday when Jesus entered Jerusalem on a donkey (in fulfillment of scriptures). When Jesus turned over the tables of the vendors, he sealed his fate because he attacked the god of most eras, money. Though Jesus had been welcome to speak in the Temple, he was still regarded by those priests as an upstart, someone who seemed to know "the Truth" in a way that they had forgotten, a man who didn't have the Temple training and no formal training to become a Rabbi. Yet, there he was, in all his innocence, attracting crowds, purporting to heal, seeming to organically know the answers to life's deepest questions. His trial and death were almost predictable, as most societies do not like the rabble-rousers among them.

Every Easter I have enjoyed the inspiring messages that movie-makers have given us in their efforts to interpret the practical meaning of the Jesus message. I have particularly liked the six hour-plus presentation of "Jesus of Nazareth" produced by Franco Zeffirelli, starring Robert Powell as Jesus. It is a rare presentation that brings the story alive, and takes it out of the pages of dry church reading. You cannot help but cry, and laugh, when viewing this unique presentation. I have kept a Bible (Lamsa translation) handy when viewing this to see how well Zeffirelli brought alive these ancient writings. You will likely agree that he did a great job. Actor Robert Powell said once in an interview that this role "changed my life." Indeed.

Though too many of us have gotten lost in the pre-Christian "Easter" symbolisms of eggs, bunnies, chocolate, pastel spring clothing, etc., it is still worth fighting to realize that there is still a real story here, about someone who worked hard, was ridiculed, laughed at, even killed, in order to help us to save ourselves. I have chosen to see the Easter story as a pattern that each of us should find and follow in our own lives.

And are there other stories out there which show this pattern in the so-called secular world? Movie-makers have given us many such stories, but we don't always see them for what they are. If we consider the themes of the Easter story – humble birth, hard work, trying to rise above mundanity, showing The Way to others, some sort of "death," and rising up again – then there are some excellent movies that give us this tale.

For example, you can't go wrong with the classic "Whale Rider". If you've not seen it, get it immediately. The grandfather of the traditional village is hoping for a grandson to carry on the ways. A girl is born, and grandpa figures he'll have to wait some more. But the girl is "the one." She persists in her path of learning the traditional ways. And when a test is given to the boys to see which one will become the new spiritual leader, the girl nearly dies, but passes the test. She is the one. You have to see it, and feel it, and experience that Saviorhood can occur at any time, anywhere. Of course, there are certain requirements, but chief among them is the willingness and desire to do the work required, and then doing that work.

"Powder" is another excellent movie that somewhat depicts the elements of the Easter theme, though not precisely. It has been described as a secular story of a Savior, and his departure. It's also worth watching to see how most of us treat our fellow man.

Yes, some of you will read your Encyclopedia and learn about the pre-Christian roots of Easter. There is no denying that the Holy Day, as practiced generally today, has so-called "pagan" roots, because the Catholic Church chose to overlay their new traditions over older prevailing pagan traditions. This may bother you, or it may not. Either way, you can still observe this day and find the way to use the major themes for your personal upliftment and for the upliftment of those around you.

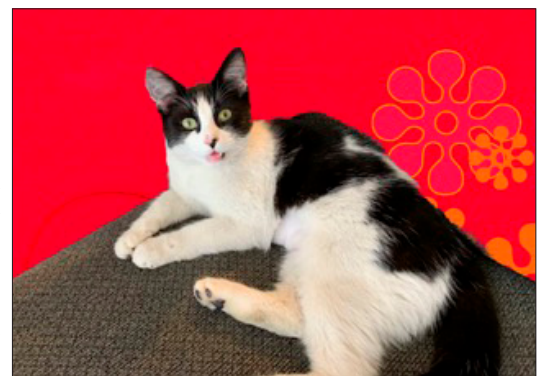

SAFE WAYS TO GET RID OF EXPIRED, UNUSED MEDICINE

Dear Savvy Senior:

What's the best, environmentally safe way to dispose of old and unused medications? My mother has a medicine cabinet chocked-full of pills, some of which haven't been touched in 25 years, and I'd like to clean it out for her. Protective Daughter

Dear Protective:

Cleaning out the medicine cabinet is a chore that most people don't think about, but it's an important task that can help prevent medication problems, and protect children who may have access to these old, unused drugs. Here's how you can clean out your mother's medicine cabinet so it's safe and useful.

Return Them

Your local pharmacy, as well as hospitals, clinics, long-term-care facilities, and narcotic treatment programs, might accept your mom's unused medications, often as part of programs that collect and destroy unused drugs. Search for an authorized facility near you at DisposeMyMeds.org.

You can also drop off her unused meds at designated police departments, fire stations, and other sites on National Prescription Take Back Day, Saturday, April 27. To find a collection site near you, visit TakeBackDay.dea.gov.

Use a Disposal Kiosk

Many Walgreens and CVS stores have free, anonymous, and secure kiosks where you can dispose of any medication. Remove your personal information from the packaging and drop unwanted medication, including opioids, in the slot.

Mail Them

Costco, Rite Aid and CVS pharmacies sell postage-paid envelopes for customers to mail any prescription, including opioids and over-the-counter medications, to a disposal facility.

Throw Them Out

If mailing them in or getting to one of the drop-off sites is not an option, you can dispose of them yourself, but do so carefully. The Food and Drug Administration recommends taking the medications out of their original bottles and putting them in a sealable plastic bag with an undesirable substance like coffee grounds, dirt or kitty litter. Then seal the plastic bag and throw it in the trash. This will make the medication less appealing to children, pets or other people who may fish through your trash.

But don't do this with dangerous drugs, such as opioids, which can be abused. For these, the FDA says flushing them down the toilet is OK. But trace amounts of drugs can end up in the water supply so this should be done only as a last resort. To see the FDA list of medications that should be flushed when they are no longer needed, go to FDA.gov and type "flush list" into the search box.

Or, another option is to purchase some medication disposal bags like the Medsaway Medication Disposal System. These are carbon pouches that are designed to neutralize all medication including narcotics, liquid medication, transdermal patches and controlled substances so you can just add water, and toss them in the trash. You can find medication disposal bags at some local pharmacies or online at Amazon.com for around \$15.

You'll also want to make sure to scratch out all your mom's personal information on the empty medicine bottles or other packaging before throwing it away to protect her identity and privacy.

If you have other questions about proper drug disposal, talk to your pharmacist.

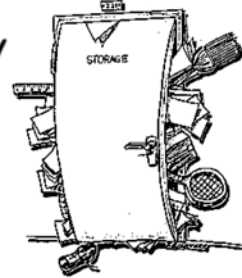

is the dining on the Sunset Deck, where else can you sip a bloody mary or an endless Mimosa while in the backdrop is the Queen Mary? How about Sunday Calypso music, it really is my go to spot in Long Beach Chef Pete Lehmar has been with Gladstones since they opened in 2004, and prides him self on the the ability to adapt. Sure, he has award wining clam chowder and has won best Readers choice as the best seafood restaurant in Long Beach, but ask him for a burger, He'll say "I can make that too" !

Café Jardin

If you are in the mood for mimosas they are endless at \$14. A la Votre

Brigatine (Del Mar)

Bing Crosby and his friends decided on Del Mar for their Thoroughbred Club in 1936, a prime destination of horse racing fans for years. The Brigatine hasn't been around that long (last I heard was 45 years), and has turned itself into a mini chain. In the Del Mar/San Diego area I don't have to tell you that it's all about the fish tacos! Though the Sunday Brunch is a pleasing excuse to have a Bloody Mary before the 2 PM post time at Del Mar, you should enjoy Puerto Nuevo style lobsters (you know, the ones with no claws). For me the Crab Cake Benedict style is the real winner; they use lump Crab and come with a side of breakfast potatoes.

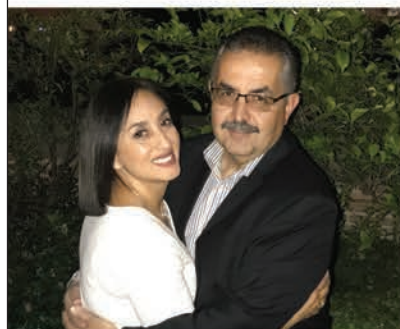

BARGER MOTION OFFERS COUNTY SUPPORT FOR ENDING HORSE FATALITIES AT SANTA ANITA

LOS ANGELES COUNTY – The Board of Supervisors has unanimously approved a motion by Supervisor Kathryn Barger to send a five-signature letter to the California Horse Racing Board supporting further efforts to investigate and advocate for solutions to end the spate of horse fatalities at Santa Anita Park.

Since December 26 of last year, there have been 23 horse deaths at the racetrack, and the reasons for this significant increase remain unclear. Some have speculated that the winter rains caused the soil to become too soft. Others with the Stronach Group, which owns Santa Anita Park, argue that standards for veterinary treatment need to be updated.

Barger’s motion directs the Chief Executive Officer to work with the Department of Animal Care and Control to offer cooperation with those responsible for horse fatalities at Santa Anita Park, including support for updated standards, if appropriate.

“The extent of loss of these beautiful animals is truly heartbreaking, yet despite all the analysis, concern, and care shown by a multitude of experts, advocates, and concerned citizens, the number of injuries and fatalities continues to grow,” said Supervisor Barger. “My motion expresses the county’s concern over the matter and offers the full support of county agencies and departments who wish to partner with state agencies and Santa Anita Park to solve this problem and protect these animals.”

Despite the most recent fatality, Santa Anita Park will remain open to host the Santa Anita Derby, a significant race for those hoping to make it to the Kentucky Derby on May 2, 2019.

COUNTY ALSO APPROVES MOTION TO EXPAND YOUTH ACCESS TO MENTAL HEALTH TREATMENT

LOS ANGELES COUNTY – In an effort to improve the county’s ability to effectively identify and address trauma and emotional distress affecting youth, the Board of Supervisors has unanimously approved a motion by Supervisor Kathryn Barger to launch the Community Schools Initiative in 15 high-need school districts.

The motion directs the Department of Mental Health, in coordination with the Los Angeles County Office of Education, to identify nearly \$4.3 million to hire 45 positions and deploy 10 regional mental health teams to serve the 80 school districts countywide.

A recent study by the Journal of Abnormal Psychology reveals that rates of major depressive episodes among adolescents ages 12-17 increased 52% between 2005 and 2017. The study found a similar increase in rates of major depressive episodes among young adults ages 18-25, which increased 63% between 2009 and 2017.

“These statistics are alarming and clearly demonstrate the immediate need for expanded access to mental health and well-being services for our youth,” said Barger. “This initiative will integrate evidence-based practices on school campuses and improve the connectivity of students and their families to service providers and holistic programs. By eliminating socio-emotional barriers, we will see improved learning outcomes and overall wellness for our students.”

The initiative will achieve these goals through dedicated school-based mental health social workers and regional mental health teams that will provide an array of school-based services, including but not limited to community outreach, peer support, crisis response, screening, triage, and linkage for students and families in need. Additionally, the initiative will provide education and training to school staff and administrators on the impacts of trauma and how to improve student achievement by creating a trauma-informed learning environment.

The Department of Mental Health has conducted broad stakeholder outreach to develop a community-driven plan to action. The proposed initiatives were presented to over 100 stakeholders including students, parents, teachers, psychiatric social workers, providers, and other community members to get feedback and input on the development of a comprehensive initiative.

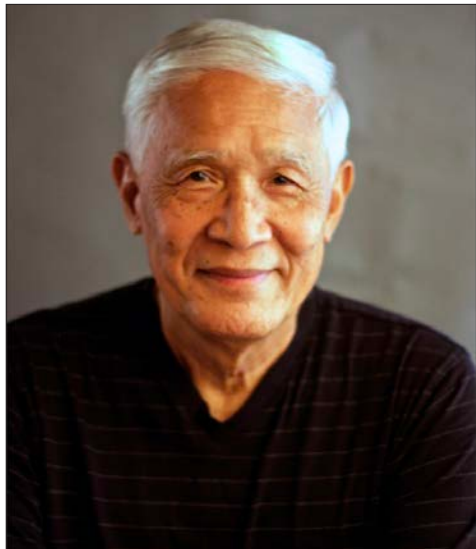
Barger’s motion directs county agencies to begin implementing this initiative and report back in 60 days with additional pilot schools, as well as framework for a Mental Health First Aid program which will educate students on how to support a friend or loved one who is experiencing mental health challenges.

In the mid 2000’s, and after doing business in Hawaii for a number of years, Warren slowly absorbed the local cultures and sensed the potential of the art of floral presentation by creating contemporary containers. He also felt the need to set up his own studio in California where he lives for its design development and quality.

The blending of cultures on the islands gave him the incentive to further develop this floral presentation concept for the mainland lifestyle. This harmonious fusion for modern day living is the foundation of his work. His medium is simple wooden pieces, and his focus is utilizing simplicity to bring out the natural beauty of flowers while allowing the containers to be both a complimenting and stand-alone art form.

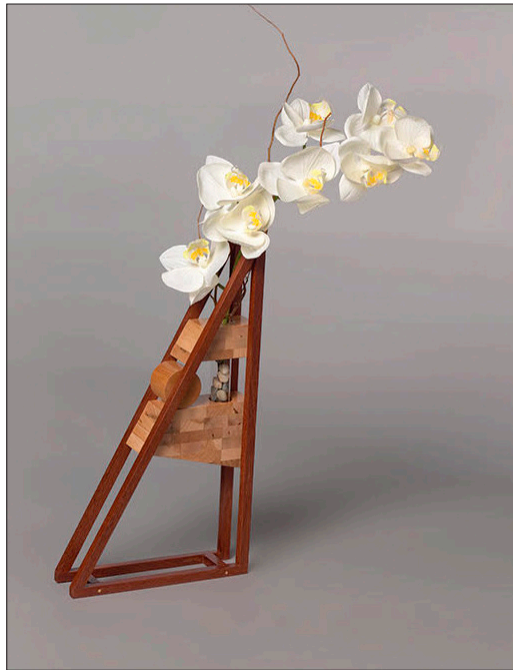


He is now semi-retired and enjoys doing his wood work and art shows with help from his wife Janet.

Warren describes his featured art piece, ‘Giraffe’, as: “I chose a laminated block made from small pieces of Maple wood as the body for the vase. The block was cut to show the end grains of the wood which gave me a texture in various tones. The vase was designed for directional and single-stem floral arrangement in the Asian fashion. It was also meant to be sculptural by itself. The glass liner was purposely exposed for contrast with wood. For the frame, I used a very hard wood from Indonesia called Balau which allowed me to cut it into narrow pieces for a sense of slenderness.”

This year’s Art Fair is being held in Memorial Park on Saturday, May 4, from 9:30 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., and Sunday, May 5, from 9:30 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Be sure to stop by Warren’s booth (#53) to admire and purchase his inspiring creations.

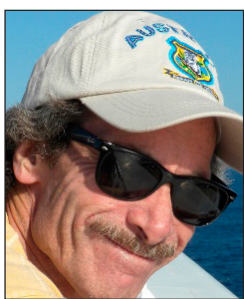

EXPLAINING WHAT WE DO NOT BUT SHOULD KNOW

So after spending 22 months investigating, On March 22, Special Counsel Robert Mueller submitted his report to Attorney General William Barr. The investigation garnered 199 criminal charges, 37 indictments or guilty pleas, and 5 prison sentences, and cost to the American taxpayer about \$25 million—A bargain compared to the \$25 million spent in 1974 dollars on the Watergate investigation. Mueller's report has not yet been made public.

Two days later, On March 24, Barr sent a four-page summary to Congress detailing the what he called the "principal conclusions" of special counsel's findings to key members of congress. Barr wrote in his summary "that the report is divided into two parts: the results of the investigation into Russia's interference into the 2016 presidential election, and an examination of whether the president obstructed justice."

Barr said that the special counsel "did not find that the Trump campaign or anyone associated with it conspired or coordinated with Russia in its efforts to influence the 2016 U.S. presidential election, and an examination of whether the president obstructed justice. He quoted directly from the report:"The investigation did not establish that members of the Trump Campaign conspired or coordinated with the Russian government in its election interference activities."

Barr said that Mueller's team did not determine whether Trump illegally obstructed justice either: "while this report does not conclude that the president committed a crime, it also does not exonerate him." In his summary, Barr wrote that he and Deputy Attorney General Rod Rosenstein "determined that the special counsel's investigator's did not have enough evidence to prove Trump had obstructed justice."

There seems to be some confusion over what the standard of proof Mueller should have been using. Grand juries, unlike petit criminal trial courts, where beyond a reasonable doubt is the standard. Grand juries use this, not the higher standard. They are generally impaneled with 16 to 24 jurors for extended periods time to investigate serious, more complicated crimes.

For a quorum to vote 2/3rds of the grand jurors have to be present, or 8 to 16 respectively, the same number needed to indict or charge a person with a crime. Not meeting this threshold of proof was the reason why the president and other administration officials were not held accountable—not that President Trump and his cronies have been exonerated!

AG Barr reported by Politico indicated: "...he's prepared to share a redacted copy of special counsel Robert Mueller's report with lawmakers and the public by mid-April 'if not sooner' and indicated he's prepared to testify to Congress by early May."

Yet why the need for any redactions at all? The committees members can use the un-redacted copies in closed, non-public sessions. My understanding is that all members of the House and Senate committees holding hearing on the Mueller investigation have sufficiently high security clearances to read the un-redacted version of the report.

The Politico article also noted that "Barr's initial summary of Mueller's conclusions also omitted central swaths of the areas Mueller investigated, including whether he reached counterintelligence findings that might show whether any Americans were compromised by Russians even if they committed no crimes."

Donald Rumsfeld, Former Secretary of Defense under President George W. Bush, once said, "Reports that say that something hasn't happened are always interesting to me, because, as we know, there are known knowns; there are things we know that we know. There are known unknowns. That is to say, there are things that we know we don't want to know, and there are things governments do not want you to know." This is what I call Rumsfeld's General Theory of Relative Unknowns.

Exotic dancers have deducted breast augmentation surgery. Hey, it's a legitimate business expense.

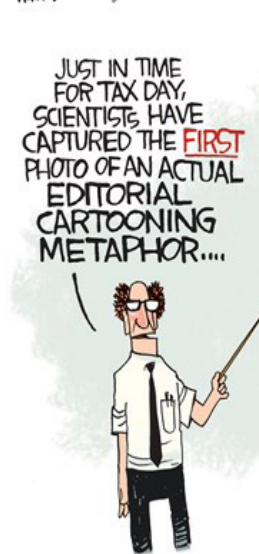

But whaling is illegal (unless you're Native American), I don't own a cat or a junkyard, and I'm not willing to endure a protracted period of bad B flats.

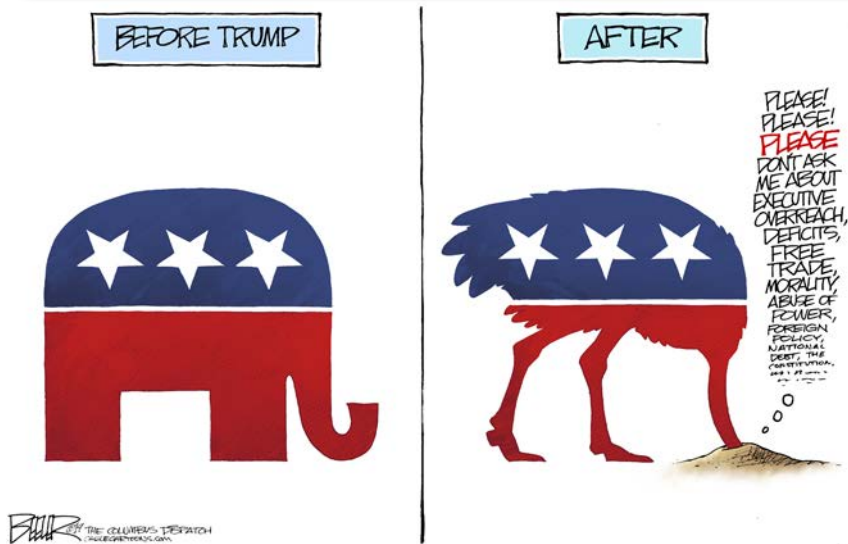
I'll just write my check and hope Caesar appreciates it.

JOHN L. MICEK STREAMING 'GAME OF THRONES?' YOU SHOULD CARE ABOUT NET NEUTRALITY BILL



If you're like me, you're probably going to sit down on Sunday night, popcorn and adult beverage in hand, to watch the start of the final season of "Game of Thrones."

And if, like me, you're one of the roughly 33 million other Americans last year who were expected to cut the cord with their cable companies, then you're probably watching "Game of Thrones" on your laptop or streaming device.

So, Mother of Dragons, you're going to need to pay attention to some recent developments in Washington.

This week, the majority-Democrat U.S. House voted to reinstate Obama-era "net neutrality" rules that prevent internet service providers from meddling with web traffic.

The "Save the Internet Act," sponsored by Rep. Mike Doyle, D-Pa., passed on a 232-190 vote, largely along party lines. One Republican, Rep. Bill Posey, of Florida, broke ranks with the GOP to side with Democrats.

President Trump's Federal Communications Commission reversed the rules in 2017 - a major win for big telecom like Comcast and Verizon, who were effectively freed to charge super-users more for their data consumption and cut off the competition at the knees.

But the bill is in for a bumpy ride in the Republican-controlled Senate, where, according to Slate, Majority Leader Mitch McConnell has pronounced it "dead on arrival."

As an added bonus, Slate reports, aides to President Trump have recommended a veto. Which is a shame, because if there's anyone who needs access to streaming high-quality historical documentaries about the basics of American history, it's Trump.

Last year, the Senate approved a resolution to undo the administration's rule reversal, with the support of Republican Sens. Susan Collins of Maine, John Kennedy of Louisiana, and Lisa Murkowski of Alaska. Every Democratic senator backed the resolution. Even still, it failed to get the votes for passage in the Republican-controlled House, Slate noted.

According to Doyle, it's likely that lawmakers will face some significant pressure from the folks back home to approve the legislation, something that's backed up by polling data.

As ZDNet reports, 80 percent of respondents to a recent Comparitech Poll said they supported net neutrality. The support, according to ZDNet, cuts across party lines: 87 percent of Democrats and 77 percent of Republican respondents said they supported net neutrality.

We're now at a point where there's a nexus between the content-creators and the content-providers. And anything that further cements that relationship - and chokes off choice - is a bad thing.

"In other words, major ISPs will be able to promote the media companies they own ... while punishing competitors' offerings," Paul Blumenthal wrote for HuffPost in 2017. "That will force consumers, who often have no choice in internet service providers, into walled gardens of content that the ISPs create."

The other issue is that while many Americans have access to broadband internet, there are many thousands more - particularly in rural areas - who do not.

As ZDNet also reports, research by Microsoft found that 162.8 million people (that's half the nation, by the way) don't have access to broadband-speed access.

The digital divide is one of the starker reminders of the gap between the haves- and the have-nots in Donald Trump's America.

It's nearly impossible to do anything these days - from registering to vote and paying your electric bill to shopping or obtaining access to basic information - without an internet hook-up. And there is nothing less patriotic than balkanizing Americans and cutting them off from a civic debate that occurs largely online, simply because of an accident of geography.

In the early 1990s, when the first blush of this thing called the internet was upon us, it was viewed as a liberating force, one that would level the playing field by democratizing the flow of information and opening channels of communication to everyone.

It has been successful - and failed - beyond our wildest expectations. For every social media campaign that's resulted in policy change, there's been the revelation of foreign meddling and the unsettling, but inevitable, reality that the concept of "online privacy" is now an oxymoron.

While the early days of the internet are long gone, the restoration of net neutrality rules would at least restore some fairness and preserve consumer freedoms.

And that doesn't seem like a whole lot to ask.

Call your Senator and let them know winter will be coming if they don't vote to support the House bill.
