MISSING HIKER FOUND ALIVE AND WELL AFTER 7 DAYS

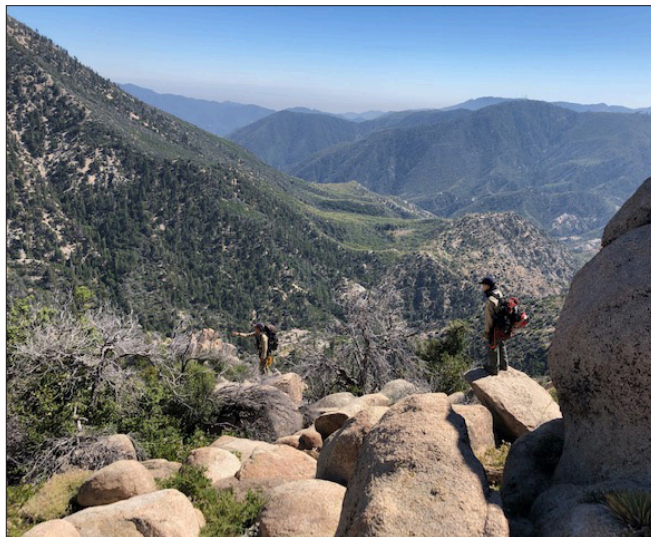

On Saturday June 22nd, 73 year old Eugene Jo went hiking out of the Three Points trailhead in the San Gabriel Mountains with 6 other hikers. Around 3:00 pm Jo became separated from the group. He was found 1 week later on Saturday June 29th after a massive search effort by search and rescue teams from across California.

The Montrose Search and Rescue Team received a report of a missing hiker around 7:00 pm on Saturday June 22nd. As they began their search, the Sierra Madre Search and Rescue Team and the Altadena Mountain Rescue Team were called to assist. Field teams searched the area through the night, watching the sunrise on their assignments.

On Sunday, fresh searchers from 7 of Los Angeles County's search and rescue teams deployed, and search assignments expanded. In the daylight they searched the trails in the Mt Waterman area, as well as off trail areas near where Jo's hiking group had lunch. On Monday June 24th teams throughout California were called to join the search.

In the end, 25 teams responded from 10 counties including teams as far away as Marin and San Diego counties. Approximately 3,200 acres were searched by 327 searchers alongside LA Search Dogs, Special Enforcement Bureau's Unmanned Aircraft System, LA Sheriff's Department and LA County Fire Department helicopters.

On Saturday June 29th over 75 searchers deployed into the field. That morning Jo was located deep in Devil's Canyon by a field team from the Altadena Mountain Rescue Team. Jo was extracted by Air Rescue 5 and taken to Huntington Memorial Hospital where he was released later the same day.

Jo's family said that he would not give up. They were correct. Jo drank stream water, ate plants and tried to signal helicopters with his red vest. He was deep in thick brush in a huge search area though so he wasn't located until a ground team got close to him and heard his response to their voices.

The Sierra Madre Search and Rescue Team (SMSR) fielded 23 team members who logged over 650 hours between time spent in the field and assisting the Montrose Search and Rescue Team with overhead management of the operation. In large scale searches Incident Management Teams play a critical role. Throughout the day, personnel in the command post manage radio communication with field teams, interview the friends and family, interact with the media, debrief search teams, and processes GPS track logs. Based on information from each day's search assignments and new information, the Planning Section works through the night to determine where teams will search the next day.

As for the reactions when Jo was located, one SMSR team member reported, "I was elated when the radio call came in," and another member shared that, "there were smiles, hugs, and tears of joy." For now team members have returned home to wash off the dirt, tend to their bruises, and catch up on some much needed sleep. For SMSR it was a week spent in the service of their motto, "Anywhere in the wilderness someone needs help. . ."

Since 1951, the all-volunteer Sierra Madre Search and Rescue Team has responded to calls for help in the local mountains and beyond. SMSR also provides a range of wilderness safety programs. The Team never charges for any of these services, and is funded entirely by charitable donations. ALL-STAR RE-SWEEP!

Sierra Madre Little League All Stars Repeat Sweep of District 17 Tournament

The Sierra Madre 11-12 year old All-Star team swept the District 17 tournament last week in un-precedented fashion, punching their ticket for the second year in a row to the California Section 2 All-Star tournament. This team, led by manager Brian Kriebs, is made up of mostly the same players that won the 10-11 year old district tournament last season in similar fashion.

The District 17 tournament was hosted by Pasadena Southwest Little League, and all games were played at Stan Gray Field in Allendale Park. The first game was against Arcadia American, and Sierra Madre came out on top, 7-3. The second match-up was against Central Altadena, and that 10-1 win put Madre squarely in the winners bracket.

The semifinal game, against a tough Santa Anita squad, was a bonafide pitcher's duel between some of the best pitchers in the district. Madre prevailed 5-1, setting the stage for a championship game against the winning team from the los-ers bracket. That game, played on Tuesday, July 9th, was a rematch against Santa Anita, and had all the drama of a championship game. The stands were packed, and the stage was set as Madre's ace Cash Carroll took the mound. Santa Anita jumped out to an early 1-0 lead, and Sierra Madre answered, scoring two runs in the third inning and one run in the fourth inning. Santa Anita added one run in the fifth inning, and the score was 3-2 heading into the sixth inning. That inning was the turning point: Madre's bats went to work, scoring seven additional runs to clinch the 10-2 win. Carroll pitched the entire game, throwing 75 pitches, allowing only five hits and two runs, with five strikeouts and zero walks, and the Madre offense had eight hits, led by Yahir Tre-to, who was 2 for 3. In their four tournament games, Sierra Madre allowed only seven runs while offensively overpowering the competition, scoring a total of 32 runs.

The team will head to the California Section 2 All-Star tournament in Northridge, which runs July 13th-17th.

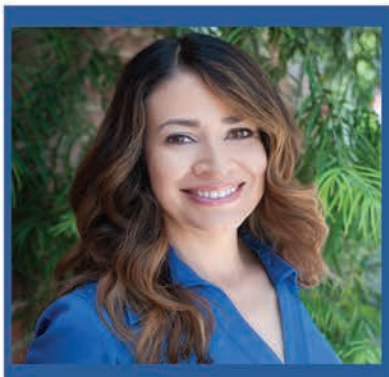

Well, not everybody, just 1500 people. 700 were saved. The point we were being shown was that we need to be sure we help everybody into the lifeboat and not turn away because we’re too busy or scared or whatever. A story was told about one of the lifeboats full of people; they came alongside a young man in the water; he cried to them to help him into the boat and was told, “Sorry, man, if we bring you in we’ll probably go under ourselves. Just can’t take anymore people on.” A woman in the boat cried out, “Stop, that’s my son! You have to save him!” They turned and pulled him in. At that point he was unconscious, the water temperature being about 28 degrees F, below freezing. Life expectancy at that temperature was about 20 minutes before hypothermia took charge of the body. Some hours later, he awoke to find himself on the Carpathia in a warm bed, covered with blankets. He had no idea at all what had happened to him. Moments later the woman who had saved his life came through the door to tell him how he had been rescued. Suffice to say, she was NOT his mother and they had never before met, but in the days, months and years to come, they became as close as a mother and son could be. He was her “one.” We were encouraged to think who our “one” might be, whose life we could impact.

Jessie and Emily, who are 11 and 8, saw “Frozen” and so far we’ve been unable to get anything out of them at all about what life message they got. I figure it’s pretty much the same as Toy Story 4: loyalty, selfless love, caring and how difficult change is.

Meanwhile, I’m waiting for HBO to show Titanic because now I’m dying to see it again! Did you know Kate Winslet took a lot of heat from stupid people who said she was too fat! I’d love to be that “too fat!” Speaking of HBO, they are showing “Bohemian Rhapsody” next Saturday night and, as I totally missed it in the theaters, I’m recording.

Other movie messages: “Rocketman” - don’t do drugs or try to live like Elton John in his early days. “Secret Life of Pets 2” – love, loyalty, courage in the face of danger and how difficult change is to deal with. Hmhmhmhmhm.... sensing a trend here.

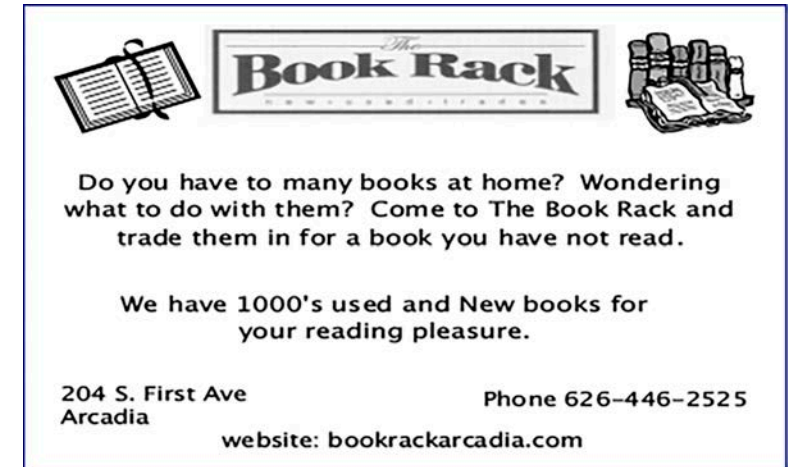

So I’m taking a creative writing class this summer, and it’s gotten me thinking more about word choice and language overall. I feel I’m becoming a bit more cognizant, more aware, you could say. That’s my hope, anyway!

Now let’s consider the implications of leaving “tall” out entirely. “Dark, built, and handsome” “Handsome, built, and delicious.” Or even, “Deliciously handsome and darkly built,” if that even makes sense... Mess around with the modifiers any way you please, but if you leave out “tall” altogether, I can guarantee the reader’s got a nagging suspicion you’re describing a midget.

It’s fair to assume that in real life, most normal-sized guys hook up with normal-sized girls and don’t have to worry about height discrepancies. These things tend to shake themselves out. Of course there are always exceptions, such as Tom Cruise and Nichole Kidman, back in the day. But it seems such departures from the norm are fairly rare.

Thus, we should be able to conceivably assume that even without “tall” being included in the narrative, the guy who’s being described is probably looking straight at, or down at, the girl in question. Course that isn’t always the case, but I’m speaking generally here.

In discussing this topic with my parents, my dad brought up the question of how attractive females are most typically described in novels. As in, is there a comparable formula to their “tall, dark, and handsome” male counterpart? I’m embarrassed to say I was a bit stumped trying to come up with an similar equation to answer his question.

“Uh, pretty, curved, and sassy?” “Beautiful, voluptuous, and engaging?” “Cute in a girl-next-door, baseball-and-apple-pie sort of way?” Shoot, I don’t know!

But I can tell you what my protagonist attractive female is like. She’s got a knockout figure, long dark hair, mahogany eyes, and cheeks that dimple when she laughs. But she doesn’t laugh like that for just anyone.

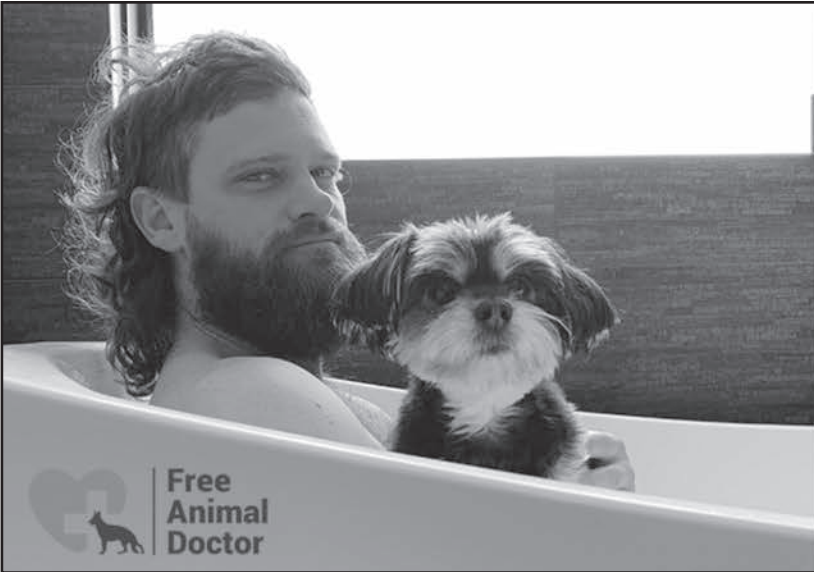

Tenant Protection Ordinance Takes Effect

Officials announced Thursday that the City of Pasadena Tenant Protection Ordinance (TPO) has been modified to provide greater tenant protections. The new protections take effect today.

The ordinance, which was adopted in 2004 and amended in 2017, requires landlords to provide relocation benefits to tenants who are displaced under specific circumstances. The recently modified TPO now covers situations in which a change in property ownership has occurred within 18 months prior to the tenant being issued a notice of eviction, tenancy termination, or rent increase which exceeds 5% plus the percentage annual change in the Consumer Price Index. Other circumstances which require landlords to pay relocation benefits to displaced tenants are: demolition, conversion to condominium, or permanent removal of the unit from the rental market; occupancy by the landlord or landlord's family member; government order to vacate; or the displacement of tenants from housing owned by educational institutions under certain situations. Multifamily rental properties with two or more units on a single parcel are subject to TPO. Single-family homes and condominium units are exempt from TPO.

To be eligible for TPO relocation benefits, tenants must be in good standing with incomes not exceeding 140% of the Los Angeles County area median income. The current annual gross income limit for a household of four persons is \$102,340. TPO benefits consist of a relocation allowance and a moving expense allowance. For a 2-bedroom unit, the current relocation allowance is \$4,478. The moving expense allowance is currently \$1,338 for adult households and \$4,033 for households with dependents, disabled or senior members. In addition, qualified tenants may be eligible for increased TPO benefits if they have maintained a continuous period of tenancy in their rental units for at least 10 years.

Local dignitaries and former teammates unveiled a Women's World Cup statue in front of the Rose Bowl Wednesday to commemorate the 20th anniversary of the World Cup win in 1999 by the United States women's national soccer team. The statue memorializes Brandi Chastain in bronz, tearing off her shirt on her knees in triumph after scoring the a final penalty kick to defeat China.

"The importance of the 1999 victory to sports and to women cannot be overstated," Pasadena Councilmember Margaret McAustin said. "Without the work done by the 1999 Women's World Cup team, victory in 2019 simply wouldn't have been possible."

The game played July 10, 1999, filled the Rose Bowl, over 90,000 people, to watch the United States play China. At the time, it was the largest crowd for a women's sporting event.

"This what you see behind us [Women's World Cup statue], this is not for one person," Chastain said. "Its for every little soccer player out there, and for that moment, I hope that every soccer player who puts on cleats, has a moment like that."

When explaining the story behind the iconic pose, Chastain said "You can't possibly understand what a childhood dream feels like until you actually live it, and the response you have are raw emotion."

In view of the recent high desert earthquake, this would be a good time to discuss what is perhaps the single most important part of earthquake readiness: Storing water. Keep in mind that approximately 75% of our water in Los Angeles County comes from 3 aqueducts, over 300 miles away. Yes, there is local water from springs, and underground water from the rivers flowing from the mountains' snow melt. But because of our large population, we rely on distant water sources for our daily water, and that "pipeline" could be broken and disrupted with a major earthquake.

Until supplies were restored, you'd want to have your needed water on-site at your own home.

Every home has a toilet tank and water heater, two sources which should provide you with water for Day One. There are also water pipes that could be drained, and ornamental fountains, and even swimming pools. Yes, you could use the swimming pool water in an emergency, but I'd cook it first.

Water dripping from an AC unit is generally safe to drink, and, assuming you have electricity, you could collect this water and maybe get more than a gallon a day. Water from the AC is water that is condensed out of the air, and so the only impurity would be stuff inside the copper tubes of the AC, and that's usu-

ally not a big deal unless the AC has been sitting unused for a period of time.

In a very serious emergency, you could obtain water from the soil via a solar still, and from a tree via a transpiration bag. To learn how to do those, you should come to one of my classes where we actually do that, or check out one of the many videos on Youtube that deals with survival topics.

HOW TO STORE WATER

YOU SHOULD STORE SOME WATER! How much? Realistically, you need about 11 gallons a day. Store as much as you can for a week or longer, for the size of your family.

You can store water by filling your used plastic or glass litre bottles. Clean them first, and store them in the shade. You could also buy blue "food grade" containers, as well as discarded white bakery buckets, once you've cleaned them.

Just fill them with tap water. "Bleach" is already in the tap water - it is added as a purification component. Rain can also be collected, but the first rain cleans all the dirt from your roof, so don't begin to collect for consumption until the first rains cleans your roof.

WATER PURIFICATION

Water can be purified by heat (meaning, fire), the sun, chemicals, and various filters.

BOILING IS THE UNIVERSAL WAY TO PURIFY WATER but it only deals with biological contaminants, and NOT

chemicals in the water. Distillation is perhaps the ultimate way to purify water, though generally requires some specialized equipment. According to hydrologist Talal Balaa, you should follow the WATER OBSERVATION RULE OF THREE: Does it look good? Does it smell good? Does it Taste good?

Balaa also suggests you follow the WATER PURIFICATION RULE OF THREEE:

IF you suspect the water is impure, you should 1. Filter the water through a cloth, and 2. Allow the sediment in the water to settle, and 3. Boil the water or use chemicals. If anything is left, your immune system should protect you, if it can.

This is just a quick overview of the necessity of water storage. If you live in Sierra Madre, I strongly recommend that you attend the monthly CERT meetings. You can learn more about Sierra Madre CERT group by checking them out on Facebook, or their web page at www.sierramadreamergency.org.

MEASLES EXPOSURE ADVISORY Additional Measles Case Confirmed

The Los Angeles County Department of Public Health (Public Health) is investigating an additional confirmed case of measles in a Los Angeles County resident. This is the twelfth measles case among Los Angeles County residents this year. Public Health is looking to identify others who may be at risk for measles and have been exposed to this individual. Public Health urges residents, especially those who travel internationally and those who have not been fully protected against measles, to get the measles immunization in order to better protect their individual health and to prevent the spread of measles to others.

Other people may have been exposed to measles since public locations were visited by a person with measles while

ously or received the measles immunization may not be immune and should talk with a health care provider about receiving measles, mumps and rubella (MMR) immunization.

•Contact and notify their health care provider as soon as possible about a potential exposure if they are pregnant, an infant, have a weakened immune system and/or are unimmunized.

•Monitor themselves for illness with fever and/or an unexplained rash from 7 days to 21 days after their exposure (the time period when symptoms may develop); if symptoms develop, stay at home and call a healthcare provider immediately.

Currently, there have been 12 measles cases among Los Angeles County residents in 2019, in addition to 8 non-resi-

infectious. Potential public exposure location and times were as follows: There is no known current risk related to measles that exists at this venue at this time. This case is not related to the previous measles exposure at UCLA. Anyone who may have been at this location on those dates may be at risk of developing measles for up to 21 days after being exposed. People who were in the location above around the same time should:

- Review their immunization and medical records to determine if they are protected against measles. People who have not had measles infection previ-

dent measles cases that traveled through Los Angeles County. Most of the cases were unvaccinated.

"For those who are not protected, measles is a highly contagious and potentially severe disease that initially causes fever, cough, red, watery eyes, and, finally, a rash," said Muntu Davis, MD, MPH, Los Angeles County Health Officer. "Measles is spread by air and by direct contact even before you know have it. The MMR immunization is a very effective measure to protect yourself and to prevent the unintentional spread of this potentially serious infection to others."

ARCADIA POLICE BLOTTER

Bill Expands Protections of the San Gabriel Mountains

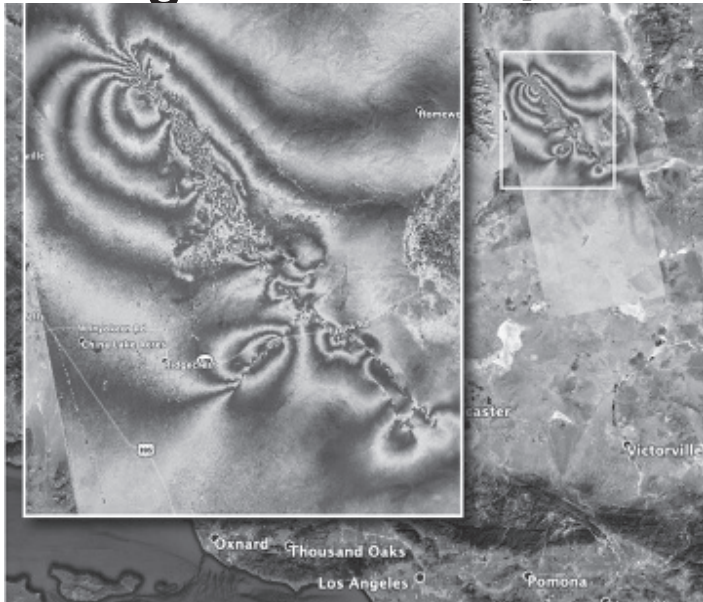
Rep. Judy Chu testified Thursday before the Natural Resources Subcommittee on National Parks, Forests and Public Lands in support of her bill, the San Gabriel Mountains Foothills and Rivers Protection Act (HR 2215). This bill would expand the borders of the San Gabriel Mountains National Monument to include the western Angeles National Forest. It also establishes a National Recreation Area to enhance conservation, increase access for all communities by connecting park poor areas to open space, and improve the management of the area through improved resources, education, and public engagement. The 15,878 acres of expanded wilderness and 15,191 acres of new wilderness areas will benefit from the highest form of protection of any federal wildland. These areas of untouched nature will remain open to hiking, camping, and other recreation activities encouraged in the San Gabriel Mountains National Monument, but commercial activities and motorized vehicles will be prohibited in order to prevent over-development, pollution, and habitat destruction. Private property and other existing rights and claims will be unchanged. In the Senate, Sen. Kamala Harris (D-CA) introduced a companion bill. Rep. Chu released the following statement:

“The San Gabriel Mountains provide 30 percent of Southern California's water, comprise 70 percent of Los Angeles County's open space, and are home to



historic habitats of species like the California Condor and Nelson Bighorn Sheep. That makes them the best, and one of the only, options for outdoor recreation for Los Angeles County, which averages just 3.3 acres of park space per 1,000 people. Already, President Obama's National Monument declaration has increased funding and resources for these mountains, allowing more visitors to appreciate these trails and rivers more safely. But there is still so much work to be done. That is why we need to expand the National Monument boundaries, protect more wilderness areas, and establish a new San Gabriel Mountains National Recreation Area to further connect urban and wild places, helping more communities improve access to the mountains and provide new recreation opportunities. I'm grateful for the opportunity to share the importance of these mountains and wilderness areas with the Committee and I'm eager to see this bill voted on soon so we can continue our work of preserving, protecting, and appreciating our environment.”

NASA Maps Surface Change in Recent Quakes



Damage from two strong earthquakes that rattled Southern California on July 4 and July 5 — a magnitude 6.4 and a magnitude 7.1, respectively — can be seen from space. The epicenter of the quakes was near the city of Ridgecrest, about 150 miles (241 kilometers) northeast of Los Angeles. According to the U.S. Geological Survey, the 7.1 quake was one of the largest to hit the region in some 40 years.

The Advanced Rapid Imaging and Analysis (ARIA) team at NASA's Jet Propulsion Laboratory in Pasadena, used synthetic aperture radar (SAR) data from the ALOS-2 satellite to produce a map showing surface displacement from the earthquakes. The post-quake imagery was acquired on July 8, 2019, and compared with April 8, 2018, data from the same region.

Each color cycle represents 4.8 inches (12 centimeters) of ground displacement either toward or away from the satellite. The linear features that cut the color fringes in the southeast indicate likely locations of surface rupture caused by the earthquakes, and the “noisy” areas in the northwest may indicate locations where the ground surface was disturbed by them.

The USGS reported over 1,000 aftershocks in the region following the July 5 earthquake. State and federal scientists, including those from the California Geological Survey and

USGS, are using this surface deformation map in the field for assessing the damages and mapping the faults that broke during the two major earthquakes as well as the thousands of aftershocks.

In the aftermath of the earthquakes, NASA's Earth Science Disasters Program is in communication with the California Earthquake Clearinghouse, which is coordinating response efforts with the California Air National Guard, the USGS and the Federal Emergency Management Agency. NASA analysts are using data from satellites to produce visualizations of land deformation and potential landslides, among other earthquake impacts, and are making them available to response agencies. NASA's Disasters Program promotes the use of satellite observations in predicting, preparing for, responding to and recovering from disasters around the world.

The Japanese Aerospace Exploration Agency (JAXA) provided the ALOS-2 data for the production of the map. The ARIA team's analysis was funded by NASA's Disasters Program.

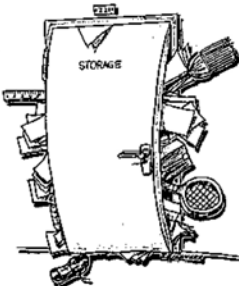

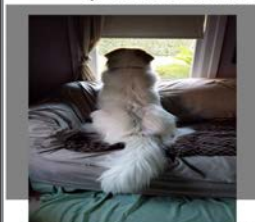

MEN GET OSTEOPOROSIS TOO



Dear Savvy Senior:

Can men get osteoporosis or is it primarily a problem for women? When I fell and broke my wrist last winter the doctor that treated me told me I might have osteoporosis, but I never got it checked. What can you tell me?
Bony Bill

Dear Bill:

Many people think osteoporosis is a woman's disease, but men can get it too, especially in their later years. Here's what you should know.

Osteoporosis in Men

Osteoporosis is a disease that causes the bones to become weak and brittle and more susceptible to fractures. Though women are four times more likely to acquire it, around 2 million American men have osteoporosis today, and another 12 million have "pre-osteoporosis," or osteopenia.

Unfortunately, men are much less likely than women to get the health of their bones checked even after they break a bone. That's because doctors are often unaware of the many factors that put men at risk of osteoporosis.

While menopause is a major component that accelerates bone loss in women, some of the key risk factors for men developing osteoporosis include: being over age 70; being thin or underweight; smoking; consuming more than three alcoholic drinks a day; having a parental history of osteoporosis; and having a previous fracture.

Certain health conditions – such as rheumatoid arthritis, celiac disease, testosterone deficiency, hyperthyroidism, COPD, kidney or liver disease, and mobility disorders like Parkinson's disease, multiple sclerosis or stroke – can also increase your risk. In addition, so can taking certain medications like anti-inflammatory steroids, prostate cancer drugs, proton pump inhibitors for GERDs, antidepressants, immunosuppressants, and anti-seizure drugs.

To help you determine your risk of osteoporosis, the International Osteoporosis Foundation has a quick, online quiz you can take at RiskCheck.IOFBoneHealth.org.

Prevention and Treatment

A good first step in preventing and treating osteoporosis is to get screened. All men over age 70 should have a bone density test, and those who've had a fracture or have other risk factors should be tested after age 50. Screening for osteoporosis is a simple, painless, bone density test, which takes about five minutes. Many health insurance companies will cover bone density tests, as does Medicare.

Here's what else you can do to protect your bones.

Boost your calcium: The best way to get bone-building calcium is through your diet. Dairy products (low-fat milk, cheeses and yogurt), dark green leafy vegetables (broccoli, kale, collards), sardines and salmon, cooked dried beans, soy foods, almonds and fortified cereals and juices are all good sources of calcium. Vitamin D is also important to help your body absorb calcium.

The National Osteoporosis Foundation recommends 1,000 mg of calcium daily for men under 70, and 1,200 mg for those over 71. They also recommend 800 to 1,000 international units (IU) of vitamin D if you're over 50. If you're not getting enough vitamin D through sunlight or food, consider taking a supplement. Most daily multivitamins contain at least 400 IU.

Exercise: Weight-bearing exercises like walking, and strength training with weights or resistant bands three or four times a week, can significantly improve your bone health and reduce the risk of a fall that could cause a fracture.

Control these vices: Avoid smoking, limit alcohol to no more than two or three drinks per day, and limit caffeine (coffee, tea or caffeinated soda) to three cups a day.

Consider medications: The same drugs to treat osteoporosis in women have also been approved for men. The most widely prescribed for osteoporosis are bisphosphonates, a class of drugs designed to slow or stop bone loss. Talk to your doctor about these and other medication options, as well as potential side effects.

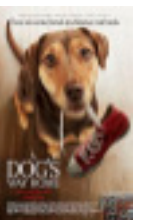

The sad thing about the whole situation was her car had been locked. She is very obsessive about locking her car at night. She always asks me, "Did you lock your car?"

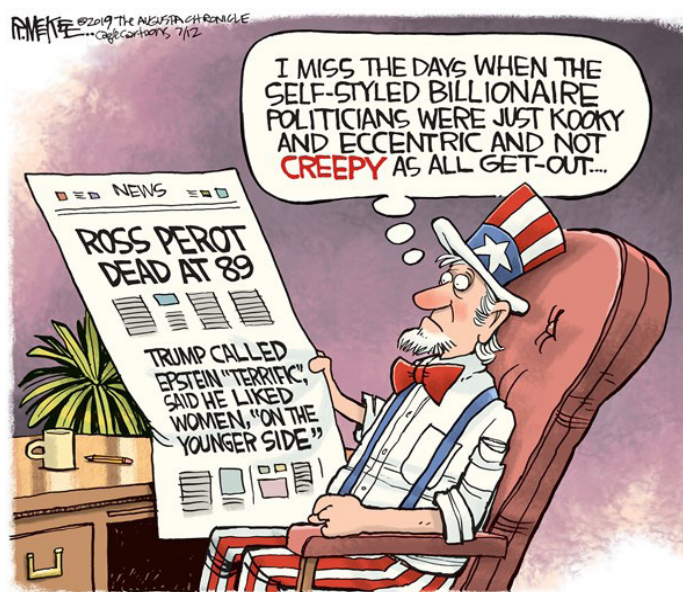
I wanted to say, but I know when to keep quiet, that her car had been locked and still the thieves broke into it. Some things are to be left unsaid which creates a platform of happiness.
