CITY HOLDS 'SAFE' MATER DOLOROSA RETREAT CENTER DEVELOPMENT PROJECT COMMUNITY **WORKSHOPS**



Keeping with its pledge of transparency on development issues, he City of Si-erra Madre successfully held a series of public workshops on the current status of the Mater Dolorosa Retreat Project (Monastery Development) on the city's Tennis Courts on August 4th. There were 3 workshops with a maximum attendance of 20 people each. Attendees were required to make reservations in advance, wear masks and remain socially distanced.

The following day, the City repeated the workshop using the virtual platform Zoom for those who were unable to attend the in-person gatherings. The estimate of participation at the online event is around 70.

Presenters at both included Mayor John Capoccia, City Manager Gabe Engeland, Sierra Madre Development and Preservation Services Director Victor Gonzales, Mater Dolorosa

Representative Cameron Thornton and Lisa Brownfield from MIG as the facilitator.

At this point the proprosed project consists of 42 single family homes ranging in square footage from 2600 - 3800 square feet.

At each of the workshops, community concerns were basically the same. What will be the impact of the surrounding homes, the sizes of the homes, the impact on the environment, and concerns over increased traffic and noise.

Engeland reassured the audiences that this was the very beginning stages of the projects development and changes were certain to address many of the expressed concerns.

He also indicated that there would be additional community forums all along the way.

HOW IS SIERRA MADRE RESPONDING TO THE 2020 CENSUS?

Yes, in the midst of a Pandemic, the U.S. Census must be taken. It says so right in the Constitution. Why? Because your government needs to know how many people it has to serve.

The census has nothing to do with politics, despite the fact that the results are used as a basis to gaurantee fair representation in Congress. The census does not seek any information that is not readily available these days on the internet.

What the census does do is gaurantee that when your money, i.e., federal funds are distributed, for roads, transportation, disaster, etc., it is done in a fair and equitable manner for your city, county and state. Under counts in the census can really cause a community to be shortchanged.

For those who were in Sierra Madre during the last natural disaster, the 2011 Windstorm, you may remember how, due to the reported population of the town, not the amount of damage done, federal assistance was allocated. Sierra Madre was a small town and every dollar of both state and federal funding was allocated based upon the stated population.

Therefore, it is in everyone's best interest to participate in the 2020 Census, especially in small towns like Sierra Madre. Given the current circumstances, i.e., CO-VID-19, it is a very good idea to complete the census either online or via telephne in order to avoid a Census Taker knocking on your door.

DRINKING AT HOME 101

The Suffering Bastard is a cocktail developed by a legendary barkeep Joe Scialom—best known for his time as head bartender at Shepheard's Long Bar in Cairo, Egypt—as a hangover cure for those particularly bad mornings the day after. The drink was made famous by its (potentially apocryphal) role in the Second Battle of El Alamein during World War Two.

As the story is told, the morning of the battle, the Hussar soldiers in Cairo were caught off guard by Rommel's forces after a night of particularly heavy drinking and debauchery. The army sent a cable to Scialom requesting an urgent delivery of several gallons of his famous hangover cure, the Suffering Bastard. He delivered, the soldiers recovered, and the Germans were kept at bay. The Second Battle of El Alamein was a turning point in the North



African campaign. It ended the long fight for the Western Desert and was the only great land battle won by the British and Commonwealth forces without direct American participation. Go USA! Three cheers for American General Paton who took over from here.

Ingredients

- 1 ounce gin 1 ounce cognac
- 4 ounce ginger beer, chilled
- 1/2 ounce Rose's lime juice 2 dashes Angostura bitters
- Garnish: Orange slice and mint sprig Old-Fashioned Glass

Directions

- 1. Add the gin, cognac, Rose's lime juice and bitters to a cocktail shaker with ice and shake until well mixed and chilled.
- 2. Stir the ginger beer into shaker.
- 3. Pour into a double Old-Fashioned glass—Do not strain.
- 4. Garnish with an orange slice and sprig of clapped mint.



WALKING SIERRA MADRE - The Social Side



Thank you for your patience as we continue to work together in service of our community.



Local Area News Briefs

South Pas Police De-escalate Volatile Situation

South Pasadena Officers responded last week to Diamond Ave and Monterey Rd. in response to numerous 911 calls reporting a man was acting erratic and violent, screaming and jumping in and out of traffic. At one point, a caller reported the subject chased a child down the street with something in his hand. Officers quickly arrived, contacted a 46-year old, unhoused resident armed with a screwdriver in his back pocket and contained the scene.

The man was swinging a license plate at officers, possessed numerous hypodermic needles, all while taunting officers to engage him in a fight. A mental health clinician was requested to assist at the location, while officers spent approximately 30 minutes utilizing de-escalation and crisis communication the subject. Prior to the clinician arriving at the scene, circumstances scene, circumstances developed, and officers were forced to take action and were able to safely detain the subject. No one was hurt and the subject was eventually transported to Huntington Memorial Hospital for a mental health evaluation.

No School **Re-Opening Waivers Per State Guidance**

The City of Pasadena Department of Public Health announced that they will adhere to new guidance from the California Department of Public Health, which recommends that counties with case rates of COVID-19 at or above 200 cases per 100,000 residents do not extend waivers for the re-opening of classroom instruction for students in grades TK- 6.

California health officials barred school campuses from reopening this fall in counties that are on the state's coronavirus monitoring list due to high case counts or other metrics reflecting the transmission the virus in the county

ATHENS SERVICES TRANSITIONING BACK TO NORMAL OPERATIONS IN **MONROVIA**

As the public is aware, service delivery methods were impacted due to COVID-19 in most sectors imaginable and solid waste was no different. In response to COVID-19, Athens Services implemented changes to how their customers waste was collected and sorted. Beginning in April, Athens was utilizing a single pass collection system where all customer bins were collected in a single truck. At the materials recovery facilities (MRFs) the sorting was transitioned away from hand sorting and was only done mechanically. These measures were implemented to maximize the safety of their staff and the public.

As of August 1, Athens has returned to the separate collection of all customer bins and the MRFs are back to nearly 85% of capacity in terms of hand sorting. Barring any changes to CDC recommendations or other regulatory orders in light of COVID-19, Athens will continue forward in resuming normal operations.

continues to monitor the changing conditions at the state and local level, and in consultation with the appropriate officials, update its planned start dates for selected operations in selected states.

The information the Census Bureau receives daily from FEMA and state and local authorities guides Census Bureau decisions on timing. As a result, selected field operations will resume on a phased schedule on a geographic basis.

Under the adjusted 2020 Census operational plan, the Census Bureau is conducting a series of preparatory activities so we are fully ready to resume field activities as we continue to advance the mission of the 2020 Census to ensure a complete and accurate count. In-person activities, including enumeration, office work, and processing activities, will always incorporate the most current guidance from authorities to ensure the health and safety of the public and Census Bureau employees

Plastic Bag Ban Still in Effect in South Pasadena

Friendly reminder to all - the plastic bag ban is still in effect! As a cautionary measure to protect frontline workers, Governor Newsom signed an executive order in April 2020 to put a 60-day pause on California's single-use plastic bag ban. Although the suspension did not apply to municipalities with



their own local bag ban like South Pasadena, many South Pasadena stores followed state procedures and halted the use of reusable bags and started using single-use plastic bags instead. This suspension has since expired and the plastic bag ban is in full force. Here's what you can do to protect yourself from the virus and protect the planet from the avalanche of plastic being used:

Ask for paper bags instead of plastic. Covid-19 has been

found to last longer on plastic than paper.

Bring your own reusable bag, but be prepared to bag your own groceries. Make sure to be courteous of the people around you and bag your groceries quickly, outside of the line, or leave your groceries in your cart and bag them by



'George Floyd' Law Passes First Policy Committee

Assemblymember Chris Holden's (right) legislation, 1022, passed in the Senate Public Safety Committee today with a 5-1 vote. The bill establishes clear guidelines for police responsibility accountability when witnessing excessive force by another member law of enforcement.



California law requires police officers to intercede Failure to intercede by when present and observing a police officer would another officer using force that is beyond that which is necessary, but there are no universal measures used to determine that an officer has in fact interceded. In the case of George Floyd, a lawyer for one of the accused junior officers argued that there was intervention because the junior officer asked the supervising officer if they should turn Floyd on his

"We were outraged when we watched the killing of George Floyd by a Minneapolis police officer



said Assemblymember Chris Holden. "Equally disturbing, was the lack of intervention from the police officers who witnessed a clear use of excessive force." AB 1022 provides a selection

of techniques to establish that an officer has in fact attempted to intercede. The bill also expands on current law to disqualify a person from being a police officer if they used excessive force that resulted in great bodily injury or death or to have failed to intercede in that incident.

If the bill becomes law, police officers would be required to intercede when witnessing excessive force under the updated guidelines and report the incident in real time to dispatch or the watch commander. make them an accessory to any crime committed by an offending officer. Retaliation against officers that report violations of law or regulation of another officer to a supervisor would be prohibited.

From Rodney King in 1991 to Stephon Clark in 2018, California has a bad a history with excessive use of force by police officers," continued Holden. "With protection from the law, this legislation compels police officers to do the right thing."

Public Health anticipates a continued reporting of a backlog of cases as the State electronic laboratory system (ELR) reporting delay is addressed. Data sources that track other key indicators, including hospitalizations and deaths, are not affected by this reporting issue.

Ninety-two percent of the people who died from COVID-19 had underlying health conditions. Of those who died, information about race and ethnicity is available for 4,610 people (99 percent of the cases reported by Public Health); 49% of deaths occurred among Latino/Latinx residents, 24% among White residents, 15% among Asian residents, 10% among African American/Black residents, less than 1% among Native Hawaiian/Pacific Islander residents and 1% among residents identifying with other races. Upon further investigation, 55 cases and four deaths reported earlier were not LA County residents.

"So many families are experiencing the pain and sadness of losing a loved one to CO-VID-19. We extend our deepest sympathies to all of you," said Barbara Ferrer, PhD, MPH, MEd, Director of Public Health. "We remain guided by science and data that can be used appropriately to move us forward along the road to recovery in a measured way. The lower number of daily hospitalizations we are seeing is an indicator that we are making some progress. However, we need to see lower rates and our future success depends on commitments we each make every day about doing our part, working together and sustaining efforts that get us to the other side of this pandemic. Our collective goals of slowing the spread of this virus and reopening and keeping open vital community and economic sectors means we must put off the parties, gatherings, and trips to crowded places in order to get to low community transmission rates so we can re-open our schools and get more people back to work."

Businesses must make sure they are doing their part to slow the spread of COVID-19. Current Health Officer Orders require business owners to take immediate action to implement strategies that protect workers and customers. They must also report COVID-19 outbreaks to Public Health in a timely fashion. Health Officer Orders require businesses with three or more known cases of COVID-19 within the workplace over the span of 14 days, to report the outbreak to Public Health.

Residents must also make sure they are doing their part. Residents should not gather with anyone they don't live with. They should wear a face covering securely over their nose and mouth and keep six feet apart from others not in their household when out in public and wash hands frequently. All events and gatherings, unless specifically allowed by Health Officer Orders remain prohibited.

This State ELR issue has undercounted the County's positive cases and affects the number of COVID-19 cases reported each day and our contact tracing efforts. Given the current ELR delays, the department urges any person with a positive lab result to call 1-833-540-0473 to connect with a public health specialist who can provide information about services and support. Residents who do not have COVID-19 should continue to call 211 for resources or more information.







LOS ANGELES COUNTY WILL NOT CONSIDER SCHOOL **RE-OPENING WAIVERS, PER STATE GUIDANCE**

The Los Angeles County Department of Public Health will adhere to new guidance from the California Department of Public Health, which recommends that Counties with case rates at or above 200 cases per 100,000 residents do not extend waivers for the re-opening of classroom instruction for students in grades TK- 6.

Los Angeles County's case rate currently is 355 per 100,000 and we will not be considering waiver applications, at this point in time.

We know that to many families, this is a disappointing announcement, but it's based on the existing science and data that is guiding all of our decision-making. We need to ensure the health and safety of our children, school teachers and staff and all of their families.

This decision will be reconsidered once the case rate falls to the levels recommended by the

The Department of Public Health will continue to work with all of our partners across the County to implement the infection control strategies we know effectively reduce community transmission and case rates so that schools can re-open for in-person instruction as soon as the data and science tell us it's safe to do so.


While all schools, public and private, across the County are closed for in-person instruction of students, teachers, staff and administrators are allowed to return to school buildings provided adults adhere to existing protocols that require physical distancing and infection control measures, including wearing face coverings.

COVID-19 CHILDCARE FUNDING

The Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors allocated \$15 million in CARES Act funding for childcare vouchers to serve essential workers and low-income families in the County. The Office for the Advancement of Early Care and Education is contracting with the Child Care Alliance, a network of LA County Resource and Referral /Alternative Payment agencies, to distribute vouchers.

Families seeking early care and education services may call 888-92-CHILD (888-922-4453). Eligibility for these vouchers is set by the state.

At this time, Child Care Alliance are still in the process of implementing the program in partnership with LA County. Interested families are encouraged to call Child Care Alliance and provide contact information and zip code. The zip code will help them search their database for a Resource and Referral agency, which is where they will forward the family's information. Once the program is implemented, a local Resource and Referral agency will reach out to the families to provide further details.

For a moment, I forgot. Karla and I were out at an outdoor restaurant on a summer evening, surrounded by tables of chattering families and relaxed couples. In the waning yellow sunlight, we sipped wine, enjoyed our halibut, and soaked up the life around us. Giddy liberation was in the air. The entire main street of this small suburban town north of New York City had been closed to cars, so that restaurants, a pizza place, and an ice cream joint could set up distance tables outside. People wore masks on sidewalks and while making their way to their tables, taking them off when they were seated.

Similar successful adaptations to the pandemic can be found throughout the Northeast, where the test-positivity rate has fallen to about 1% and deaths and hospitalizations have plunged. The coronavirus is a formidable foe, but we now know how to minimize person to person spread.

How many people get sick and die between now and a vaccine is largely under our control. "We can virtually eliminate the virus anytime we decide to," says Andy Slavitt, a former head of the Center For Medicare and Medicaid Services. Several other countries in Asia and Europe have

To undo the damage of premature re-opening in the South and West, Slavitt says, these states would need a second lockdown, closing all bars, indoor restaurants, churches, and public transit for about 50 days period. Masks should be mandated and interstate travel shut down. These policies, Slavitt calculates, would drive the reproduction rate of covid-19 down to 0.5. Then exponential pandemic math would take over and the communities with 60,000 active cases would, 50 days later, have just 58 cases.

At that point, testing and contact tracing become fast and effective. Life could safely resume, with some prudent restrictions. The alternative is now on display in ICU's in Florida, Arizona,



My latest book, released without fanfare due to the focus upon the pandemic, is called "Guide to Getting Around with or without a Compass." I believe readers will find it both interesting to read, and useful in developing a sense

of natural navigation.

The book is fully-illustrated with color photos, and begins with how ancient people observed their environment and learned to read the landscape for directional and other clues.

Ancient people did not have any of our modern technology, and so they developed an acute awareness of their environments, including the movement of the sun, the moon, and the stars. They knew where they were in relation to other things, and they developed unique tools for maintaining this sense of awareness.

Modern people rarely think

about north vs. south, the divisions of time, or how these things are figured, adjusted, or corrected. Why? We've let our technological tools do this work for us, and as an unintended consequence, we've grown increasingly unaware and ignorant of our surroundings.

In this book, my hope is to awaken in you that excitement that comes with learning how to determine north from the stars, how to determine east from the sun, and how to use your natural sense of awareness to guide you.

In fact, there is no single natural observation that will tell you directions. You need to be observant of many features and understand what they mean. You need to use your common sense and you need to be able to "think on your feet." Then, with practice, you stand a good chance of determining compass points and knowing how to get around without modern devices.

The best way to understand the landscape you're in is to get to a high spot where you can observe as much of the local terrain as possible. Get up to a rocky peak, or some high area with an unimpeded view of the terrain. Once, when there was no such high spot, I actually climbed a tree in order to get a look at the lay of the land.



Parker Davis looks at woodpecker holes? Are woodpecker holes a good sign of direction? Supposedly, they are found on the east side of trees, but these were found on the west side of an old pine.

Moss on Trees

We have long heard that moss grows on the north side of trees. We have all heard this so often, in so many formats, that you'd think it was some sort of absolute dogma. I still recall in my high school years when I was taking backpacking and survival classes from Abbey Keith of the Sierra Madre Search and Rescue Team. Keith liked to ask us a lot of questions.

On one Saturday morning, he asked all of us, "Does moss grow on the north sides of trees?" The room was somewhat silent. Everyone was leaning towards a strong "yes," but no one answered. "Yes," said Keith loudly with a broad grin. "It does! But it also grows on the east side, the south side, and the west side of trees, especially in a dense forest where there is little light." Everyone laughed.

Though there is logic to this idea, and though in a clearing the moss

is predominantly on the northern half of the tree (there's less light and more moisture there), it is not a precise, nor reliable, method of direction-finding. Keith would later tell us that if it's a pine tree, and if you're in California, and if the tree is in a clearing, then the moss is probably on the north half of the tree. Somewhat useful, but not very good for precision direction-finding.

This new book deals with how to make a shadow compass with a stick in the ground, how to recognize key constellations for direction-finding, and dozens of ways to tell directions by observing nature. Of course, I also describe how to use maps, and how to use a compass, and a few unique ways to get around with only a compass.

And, if you have a Medicare Part D prescription drug plan, certain smoking-cessation medications are covered too. Here are some other tips that can help you kick the habit.

According to the Center of Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) 12.5 percent of Medicare beneficiaries smoke. Many older smokers, like yourself, indicate that they would like to quit, but because of the nicotine, which is extremely addictive, it's very difficult to do.

Tobacco use is the leading cause of preventable illness, responsible for an estimated one-fifth of deaths in the United States each year.

But research shows that quitting, even after age 65, greatly reduces your risk of heart disease, stroke, cancer, osteoporosis and many other diseases including COVID-19. It also helps you breathe easier, smell and taste food better, not to mention saves you quite a bit of money. A \$6 pack-a-day smoker, for example, saves about \$180 after one month without cigarettes, and nearly \$2,200 after one year.

The first step you need to take is to set a "quit date," but give yourself a few weeks to get ready. During that time, you may want to start by reducing the number or the strength of cigarettes you smoke to begin weaning yourself.

Also check out over-the-counter nicotine replacement products - patches, gum and lozenges - to help curb your cravings (these are not covered by Medicare). And just prior to your quit day get rid of all cigarettes and ashtrays in your home, car, and place of work, and try to clean up and even spray air freshener. The smell of smoke can be a powerful trigger.

Studies have shown that you have a much better chance of quitting if you have help. So, tell your friends, family, and coworkers of your plan to quit. Others knowing can be a helpful reminder and

Then get some counseling. Don't go it alone. Start by contacting your doctor about smoking cessation counseling covered by Medicare and find out about the prescription antismoking drugs that can help reduce your nicotine craving.

You can also get free one-on-one telephone counseling and referrals to local smoking cessation programs through your state quit line at 800-QUIT-NOW or call the National Cancer Institute free smoking quit line at 877-44Û-QUIT.

It's also important to identify and write down the times and situations you're most likely to smoke and make a list of things you can do to replace it or distract yourself. Some helpful suggestions when the smoking urge arises are to call a friend or one of the free quit lines, keep your mouth occupied with some sugar-free gum, sunflower seeds, carrots, fruit or hard candy, go for a walk, read a magazine, listen to music or take a hot bath.

The intense urge to smoke lasts about three to five minutes, so do what you can to wait it out. It's also wise to avoid drinking alcohol and steer clear of other smokers while you're trying to quit. Both can trigger powerful urges to smoke.

Revocable living trust created by you: By setting up a revocable living trust and funding it with your separate assets before getting married, those assets would likely be considered non-marital property and not subject to division by the court upon divorceas long as you never commingle any of those assets with your spouse after your marriage. To ensure your separate property assets stay separate, it's vital that you create and fund the trust with your assets before the marriage and never add any assets acquired or created during the marriage.

If you commingle assets acquired during the marriage in a trust containing your separate non-marital assets, a court could declare all of those assets as marital property subject to claim as part of a divorce settlement. To this end, a revocable trust only protects your separate assets from divorce if they remain separate from marital property throughout the whole length of your marriage.

You can also use a revocable living trust to provide for your surviving spouse and children from a previous marriage in the event of your death or incapacity. Unlike a will, assets held by a trust are not subject to the court process known as probate, so those assets would be immediately available to your spouse and kids, sparing your family the time, expense, and potential conflict of probate.

Note that since a revocable trust is "revocable" by definition, there is no asset protection for assets in vour revocable trust, meaning that a revocable living trust will not protect your assets from creditors during your lifetime. If you want to achieve protection from both a future divorce and future creditors, you may want to consider one of the irrevocable trusts below.

Irrevocable trust created by your family: You can protectyourassetsfromdivorcebyhavingyourparents (or another loved one) establish an irrevocable trust for you before your marriage. Then, the Investment Trustee of the irrevocable trust (who could be you) could purchase all of your existing assets in an arms-length transaction and manage those assets inside of the trust, where they are totally protected from a future divorce and any future creditors. Note that this strategy does require special

> Your parents or grandparents could also leave any future inheritance you are to receive to this irrevocable trust, ensuring that your inheritance would also be protected. If this irrevocable trust is properly established and the terms are well-drafted, all assets the trust owns—and any assets left to you in the future—will be fully protected from a future divorce, future creditors, and even from estate taxes and probate upon your death. Yes, I like these trusts

> Irrevocable trust created by you: It's also possible for you to establish an irrevocable trust for yourself and gift your assets into the trust to keep them safe from divorce. However, this strategy is not as airtight as having a parent or grandparents establish the trust for you.

> When you gift assets to an irrevocable trust, there's a risk that a spouse or future creditor can claim fraudulent conveyance, depending on how soon you gift those assets after creating the trust. That said, if you are looking for asset protection and an alternative to a prenuptial agreement, and do not have a parent or grandparent available, a self-settled irrevocable trust can be a great second-best alternative.

Start your marriage off right

If you are getting ready to tie the knot and would like to ensure that assets you bring into the marriage don't end up being lost in a future divorce settlement or are protected for your kids from a prior marriage, it is important to take action now. Once you are married, many planning options are off the table.

And regardless of your concerns about divorce, you definitely need to create or update your estate plan to protect and provide for your soon-to-be-spouse and any children you have in the event of your death or incapacity.

My words don't mean anything unless it is backed up by what I do. I think I need to confess my cookie snatching to my wife.



WHAT'S TO DEBATE ABOUT NEED-**ING MORE DEBATES?**



In a presidential campaign that has twisted at every turn, it's no surprise that the latest issue up for debate concerns

Surprisingly, the Trump campaign now favors more debates, while some liberal pundits are suggesting that there should be fewer – maybe none. Seems clear to me: In a pandemictorn campaign, voters will benefit from as many presidential face-offs as possible.

Writing to the Commission on Presidential Debates, Trump lawyer Rudy Giuliani argued that a fourth debate should be added to the current schedule of three, with the first moved up before early voting gets underway.

Giuliani noted that by the time of the first debate on Sept. 29, "as many as eight million Americans in 24 states will have already started voting." Even more ballots will have been cast by the second and third debates, Oct. 15 and 22.

The CPD said it would not move the planned debates earlier. However, the group indicated that if both Trump and Biden want a fourth debate it would consider the request.

Both campaigns should act immediately to arrange a fourth event, in the interest of filling the gaps in this most unusual presidential campaign. Both candidates have been off the trail, with rallies and virtually all public appearances canceled. Democrats announced that Biden will not be going to the convention in Milwaukee to accept his nomination, opting to speak by video connection. Republicans will hold a modified convention in Charlotte but Trump, too, will appear via video.

At this point, nationally televised debates are all that remains of a conventional campaign.

"For a nation already deprived of a traditional campaign schedule because of the COVID-19 global pandemic," Giuliani wrote, "it makes no sense to also deprive so many Americans of the opportunity to see and hear the two competing visions for our country's future before millions of votes have been cast."

Meanwhile, a mystifying op-ed by columnist Elizabeth Drew in The New York Times declared: "Let's Scrap the Presidential Debates." What a strange suggestion in an election year that has already been forced to scrap just about everything else.

The chorus of liberal pundits urging Biden to skip the debates entirely is alarming. Joe Lockhart, Bill Clinton's former press secretary, advises Biden: "Whatever you do, don't debate Trump." According to Lockhart's analysis for CNN, "It's a fool's errand to enter the ring with someone who can't follow the rules or the

If Lockhart believes Biden can't think fast enough to counter Trump's lies, he's wrong. Moreover, if the former vice president can't handle a ruthless debate opponent then he probably can't handle the presidency.

It wasn't long ago that some of us believed Trump might duck the debates altogether, with so much of his disastrous past year ripe for interrogation. But as polls show him trailing Biden (the Real Clear Politics average gives Biden a 7 point lead), Trump's strategy is shifting.

Four presidential debates of two and a half hours each is probably all that can be squeezed in. Perhaps one could be devoted to domestic issues and one to foreign affairs. To further probe the differences between the two campaigns, a second debate for the vice presidential candidates should be added to the one planned for Oct. 7.


Before selecting Joe Biden as their nominee, Democrats had 12 official debates. The events were strained at times because there were so many candidates – but not because debating itself wasn't vitally important. Now, with Election Day drawing near, why should voters have to settle for misleading campaign ads, brief news clips and Twitter bombs to make their decision?


The CPD has opened the door for a fourth presidential debate – and presumably a second vice presidential debate - if requested by both campaigns. Trump and Biden should act quickly to make it happen.

In Pew research following the 2016 election, 63 percent of voters said the presidential debates were "very" or "somewhat" helpful in deciding which candidate to vote for. Certainly in the pandemic election of 2020 voters deserve all the help they can get.

POWERFUL ORGANI-ZATION LEARNS LITTLE PEOPLE CAN FIGHT **BACK**



From day one the Trump HR operation has been the Chernobyl of Human Resources. Instead of hiring some of the 63 million people who voted for Trump, the administration made a point of hiring people for whom the Trump administration was a bit beneath their dignity. entity supposed to help U.S. citizens. The new CEO, Jeff Lyash, evidently decided he was tired of creating jobs in Tennessee and wanted to start growing careers in Thiruvananthapuram.

The Chattanooga Times Free Press found Lyash intended to import tech workers from India, using the H1-B visa program, to replace 200 US citizens already doing the job.

This is callous, corporate arrogance at its most corrupt. An organization created by Congress to aid Americans has no more business importing foreign serfs to replace citizens than the USPS has hiring drug mules to deliver the mail.

The H1-B visa scam is a popular in corporate suites because this government-spon-

sored wage-reduction program that's an ideal solution for tech executives who don't like to travel. Instead of shipping jobs overseas, cynical U.S. corporations violate U.S. law to bring

the workers here. Problem solved. The boss doesn't have to worry about drinking the water and the U.S. wage scale is now identical to that of Bombay. The part of the law that says visas are only to be used for jobs the company can't fill domestically is winked at by everyone, except the 200 Americans doing the work previously at TSA who get fired. THE ROAD FROM 1966 MISSISSIPPI TO 2020 SIERRA MADRE

Part 2 Of 3 by Stuart Tolchin

As I hope some of you recall my article of last week described my flight from Los Angeles to Memphis, Tennessee from where I would be taken to Mississippi. I was a part of the "Bruin Grenada Project" invited to join the local struggle for equal rights and equal schooling in the knowledge that injustice to one group of Americans was an injustice to all." These are the words of the UCLA Professor heading the project who wrote "the eyes of America and the world are on Grenada. Wherever men believe in freedom they support you and their hearts are with you".

Eventually, accompanied by our grandiose expectations we arrived at the Bellflower Baptist Church. Central Headquarters for the project. Once inside the first person I saw was another young white college type looking at a Playboy Magazine open to the page of the Little Annie Fanny comic. Somehow that was a complete surprise and it brought me back down to Earth. Next I met a whole group of Male High School aged young men who spent great efforts attempting to teach me complicated hand-shakes. We all gathered in the main room of the Church to hear a talk by Hosea Williams, a close associate of Martin Luther King. The talk very inspiringly spoke of the importance of non-violence and described the city as being composed of paved streets and unpaved streets. Keep off the paved streets never walk alone. This was my first day in Grenada and already it felt special, scary, and wonderful. There was unity, a sense of importance and freedom songs.


That night I was taken to the home of a Black family where I would be staying. In the morning, as I awakened and went out to the kitchen there were freshly made biscuits from scratch and grits ready for me to share with the rest of the family. I explained that I had never eaten grits or biscuits actually made from scratch. The family thought that hilarious and finally, the mom said "didn't you have a mother?!" We all laughed together and I shared my belief that if their son was supported in his educational efforts that he would do well. Thinking that his parents doubted his ability would not help. It never does!

Eventually I participated in my first mass march in which my beard received a lot of attention. So many flash pictures were taken of me that I almost wandered off the sidewalk which would have given the police marching next to us in the street a reason to place me under arrest. A policeman appeared in front of me on the sidewalk and I was about to walk around him when a young man who looked to be about 12 urged me to keep going forward thus saving me from arrest. As the march continued I saw Southern women lining the streets. As I looked at them they spat at me and someone else threw a brick that barely missed. This impression remains with me.

The Grenada newspaper reported, "The sight of the white students in the line resulted in claims that "outside agitators and beatniks" had been recruited to incite disturbances. (Remember I was the only one with a beard.) I listened to the concerns of parents and let them know I understood and admitted I did not know what I would do if I was in their place, but emphasized that there was movement towards equality of opportunity and their children were a part of that movement. It is now 54 years later and continual effort to insure equality of opportunity is still needed.

In my article, I will describe how this experience still affects me.



On July 22, 2020, the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services <u>announced</u> that, "CMS will begin requiring, rather than recommending, that all nursing homes in states with a 5% positivity rate or greater test all nursing home staff each week." If implemented today, **11,640 nursing homes** would be required to conduct such weekly testing.



"Governors and state health agencies in these 33 states need to take immediate action to protect nursing homes by ensuring facilities have adequate supplies of PPE (including N95 masks), putting pressure on lab companies in their states to expedite test results for our residents and caregivers, and mandating all residents of their state wear masks in public to help reduce the spread of COVID in the surrounding communities."

In March, when we reached out to you for help we expected that by May at the very least the Emergency would be over. We could not have imagined in our wildest dreams that in August the crisis would still be with us. As indicated in the beginning, the Mountain Views News has survived primarily on the paper's ability to publish legal notices and the support of our advertisers many of whom are also impacted by the COVID19 virus. However, that has all changed. We were informed mid-March that the County of Los Angeles closed all public access to buildings that process legal notices. Such action, while absolutely necessary means that the income generated from the publication of the Fictitious Business notices came to an abrupt halt and that has not changed. Without the ability to publish those legal notices, continued publication of the Mountain Views News remains in jeopardy.






