

PHYLLIS CHAPMAN HONORED BY CITY OF SIERRA MADRE WALK THROUGH MEMORIAL SERVICE TO BE HELD OCTOBER 18, 2020

City Council has proclaimed Sunday, September 13, 2020 as "Phyllis Chapman Day" and designated the charitable, spirited citizen and long-time resident as "Sierra Madre Historian in Emeritus."

Chapman, who died on May 18, 2020 at age 97, served Sierra Madre selflessly for decades as a volunteer, event planner, fundraiser, campaigner, and community advocate. She had a great love for the town and often shared her stories and historical insight with friends, new acquaintances, and to readers across town through the local newspapers. To many who knew and loved Phyllis, she was considered the unofficial historian of

Sierra Madre. She was the official Wisteria Vine historian for 30 years.

"She was a very impressive individual...she was so dedicated to Sierra Madre," Mayor John Capoccia said after reading the proclamation. Council Member Gene Goss referred to Chapman as "truly an amazing person who made incalculable contributions over the course of her life."

"It was always a real treat to be in her presence especially when she was singing, MCing, and doing all the things she was good at," Council Member John Harabedian added. "What she's done for our city says so much...this is well-deserved," Mayor Pro Tem Rachelle Arzmendi said.

Chapman was designated as one of Sierra Madre's Treasures in 2011, named Citizen of the Year in 1980, has a brick at City Hall and was given an Honorary Life Membership at the L.A. County Arboretum.

She frequently volunteered and was a docent for school and historical tours, the Wistaria Festival and Mt. Wilson Trail Race. She also helped initiate the Sierra Madre Library's Children's Room and was a member of the Civic Club, Women's Club, Historical Preservation Society, The Garden Club, and The Priscilla's (partial listing). She contributed to Michelle Zack's 2009 book, *A Southern California Story*: Seeking A Better Life in Sierra Madre, for which she received an acknowledgement.

Many area clubs, organizations and this publication pushed for this recognition of Phyllis. The hope is that others will be inspired by her story and serve in the community with the same spirit and dedication.

A safely distanced, 'walk through' Memorial/Showcase was originally planned for this Sunday, September 13, 2020, however due to the poor air quality from the Bobcat Fire, that event has been rescheduled to October 18, 2020 at the Sierra Madre Women's Club from 1-4 pm.

One of the best things about him, he donates ten percent of his winnings to City of Hope to support pediatric cancer research. Not sure if Victor still lives in Sierra Madre, but I did

MY FRIDAY NIGHT COVID APPEITIZER

Pork tenderloin is one of my favorite weeknight proteins. It takes on flavor with ease, cooks quickly, and stays tender and juicy no matter how you cook it. There are dozens of ways to cook it, but a few essential methods will teach you everything you need to know about cooking this Friday night hero.


These two techniques for cooking pork tenderloin — grilling and cooking in the oven. This all you need to know about cooking a juicy, flavorful piece of pork.

What Is Pork Tenderloin?

Pork tenderloin is a lean yet tender cut of meat from along the backbone of the animal. A single tenderloin cut is usually about 1 pound total. But it's common to find pork tenderloin sold in supermarkets in packages of two, for a total of 2 to 2 1/2 pounds of meat.

How to Brine & Flavor Pork Tenderloin

While it's common to find these packages of tenderloin pre-seasoned and marinated, we suggest you skip the preseasoned tenderloins and use just a few simple ingredients



For grilling pork tenderloin, we are going to use a grill technique sometimes referred to as zone cooking. One area of the grill will be turned to high, while the other will be low or unlit. The high-heat area will be used for direct cooking (i.e., getting a crisp crust and char); the low-heat area will cook the pork tenderloin to the correct internal temperature over indirect heat.

Know the Difference Between Direct and Indirect Heat

Direct heat will get you great grill marks over a fast flame, while indirect will cook your meat evenly without burning. Direct heat means to cook the food directly over the heat source (whether charcoal, gas, or wood), while indirect cooking refers to cooking adjacent to the heat

If you're cooking with a gas grill, light one side to high or medium-high heat and leave the other side unlit. For a charcoal grill, pile the coals on one side of the grill and leave the other side empty.

- 1 pork tenderloin (1 to 1 1/2 pounds) 1/4 cup lightly packed dark brown sugar
 - 1 teaspoon kosher salt 4 oz Of Apple cider vinegar 4 oz 100 % ČŔANBERRY JŬICE 1/2 teaspoon onion powder
 - 1/2 teaspoongarlic powder

The cooking time should be about 30 minutes total, you can cheat a little bit by placing in the oven for about ten minutes, but otherwise just follow the directions of the non-direct cooking method and you should be good!!





Pasadena Police Name Officer in OIS



Pasadena police officials released the name of an officer who shot a 32-yearold African American man twice in the torso in August in Northwest Pasadena, leaving many in the community demanding answers.

According to Pasadena Police Chief John Perez, the officer involved in the incident August 15 is Officer Edwin Dumaguindin. He has been a Police Officer with the Pasadena Police Department for the past two years.

There has been much speculation and numerous negative comments both in the local media as well as postings on social media which caused significant concern for the involved officer's safety," said Pasadena Police Chief John Perez. "These posts and comments were initially directed at an incorrectly identified officer and included a post that brazenly stated the officer 'needs to die."

Officials said, all employers are expected to protect their employees from any threats of violence and is the reason the department worked to protect the officer's identity. This incident is undoubtedly a tragic situation both for the McClain family and the officers involved.

According to a written police statement, the officer involved shooting occurred on Raymond Avenue and Grandview Street, around 8 p.m. Two officers stopped the car for a vehicle code violation, not having a front license plate. During the stop, "the passenger in the vehicle elected to run away. While running, the passenger removed a handgun from his waistband..." The driver cooperated with officers, they said.

Perez and the Pasadena Police Department are asking for the community's cooperation to allow a thorough and complete investigations into this incident. "We intend to provide all information to the public that is legally allowed, and will do so in a timely manner."

The incident is also being investigated by the Los Angeles County District Attorney's Office

Council to **Discuss Arts** & Culture **Relief Grants**

With Pasadena's arts and culture community devastated by the impact of Covid-19, the city council is set to discuss Monday appropriating \$500,000 through a modified Annual Grants Program to help non-profit arts and culture organizations with an awarded one-time grant.

The Arts & Culture Relief Grant Program is intended to vet applicants though a modified Annual Grants Program review process overseen by the Cultural Affairs division that includes a simplified application, a review by a panel comprised of individuals with subject matter expertise, and a simplified scoring and award allocation process.

The maximum request amount per applicant would be \$20,000. Award amounts would be made on a sliding scale based on the requested amount of aid, demonstrated need and consideration of assets. Awards would be presented to the Arts & Culture Commission and to City Council. Statement from Freedom of the Press Caucus Co-Chairs Schiff and Chabot Condemning Press Restrictions in Belarus Amid Post-Election Protests information must not be

and Steve Chabot (R-OH), Co-Chairs of the Congressional Freedom of the Press Caucus, released the following statement Wednesday:

"We are deeply concerned the recent decision of Belarusian authorities to strip the accreditations of journalists covering widespread protests in Belarus in response to disputed election results.

"Press credentials are necessary for journalists to provide accurate, impartial information

against press freedom by a regime that has, in recent weeks, shut down internet and harassed, arrested, and deported journalists. These bald-faced efforts to stifle ignored. We call on Belarusian authorities to allow journalists

Representatives Adam Schiff to resume their reporting without delay."

Journalists whose credentials were cancelled are employees of Radio Free Europe/Radio Liberty (RFE/RL), a private news organization supported by the U.S. Congress, the BBC, the Associated Press, Reuters, Agence France-Presse, Germany's ARD television, Deutsche Welle, and Radio France. Two Russian citizens working for the Associated Press were also deported. Last week, authorities detained to the public. Halting the flow approximately fifty members of of information to the people the press, including members of of Belarus is yet another blow Belarusian press outlets.

San Marino: September is **Pedestrian Safety Month**

September is Pedestrian Safety Month and the San Marino Police Department is joining law enforcement agencies across the state to educate the public on how to be safe when walking or driving.

During the month of September, the San Marino Police Department will be specifically looking for violations committed by drivers and pedestrians that make the roads unsafe in our community.

These violations include speeding, illegal turns, failure to yield, not stopping for signs or signals, and pedestrians who do not cross in marked crosswalks or designated crossing areas. During the month of August, there were 12 traffic collisions, three of which were hit and run collisions. Fortunately, we had no pedestrian collisions; however, there were three injury and six non-injury bicycle collisions.

The San Marino Police Department offers several steps that drivers and pedestrians can take to be safe:

- Be mindful of distractions. Keep your eyes up and phones down, especially when crossing the street. You can see vehicles easier than

they can see you. - Always use marked crosswalks, when available, preferably at stop

signs or signals. Don't cross until it is safe to do so. - Make eye contact and nod or wave at drivers before crossing in front of them. A quick nod or wave is an easy way to let a driver know you see them, and they see you. Don't assume the driver sees you just because you are in a crosswalk.

- Be extra careful crossing streets or entering crosswalks at night when it is harder to see. Get in the habit of walking with a flashlight or wearing a reflective vest so it is easier for drivers to spot you. Wear bright colored clothing when possible.

- If you need to briefly walk into the street to maintain social distancing on sidewalks, remember to look both ways for cars and bicycle traffic.

- Walk against traffic, on the sidewalk when available, so you can see when vehicles are approaching.

SOUTH COAST AQMD CONTINUES SMOKE ADVISORY DUE TO BOBCAT FIRE AND EL DORADO FIRE

Valid: Friday, September 11, 2020 through Saturday, September 12, 2020

This advisory is in effect through Saturday afternoon. South Coast AQMD will issue an update if additional information becomes available.

Two major local wildfires as well as wildfires in Northern and Central California are affecting air quality in the region. A wildfire named the Bobcat Fire is burning north of Azusa and Monrovia in the Angeles National Forest. As of 6:00 a.m. on Friday, the burn area was approximately 26,368 acres with 6% containment. Current information on the Bobcat Fire can be found on the Incident Information System (InciWeb) at https://inciweb. nwcg.gov/incident/7152.

A wildfire named the El Dorado Fire is burning in the San Bernardino Mountains near Yucaipa in San Bernardino County. As of 8:00 a.m. on Friday, the burn area was reported at 13,715 acres with 31% containment. Current information on the El Dorado Fire can be found on the Incident Information System at: https://inciweb. nwcg.gov/incident/7148/.

Smoke from fires in Northern and Central California is also being transported south and may impact the South Coast Air Basin and Coachella Valley.

Past and Current Smoke and Ash Impacts

The Bobcat Fire is producing substantial amounts of smoke on Friday morning based on satellite and webcam imagery. The El Dorado Fire is also still producing smoke that is visible on satellite and webcam imagery. Falling ash has been reported downwind of the Bobcat Fire throughout the South Coast Air Basin. Smoke from fires in Northern and Central California is still present in upper levels of the atmosphere this morning.

South Coast AQMD's temporary monitors deployed in Azusa near the Bobcat fire and Redlands near the El Dorado Fire, as well as South Coast AQMD's monitor in Glendora have measured hourly values in the Unhealthy to Hazardous AQI categories since yesterday evening. The fire is also producing ash particles that are small enough to be detected by South Coast AQMD's PM10 monitors in addition to the smoke detected by the PM2.5 monitors. South Coast AQMD's monitors at Central Los Angeles and Upland have measured hourly values in the Unhealthy for Sensitive Groups to Unhealthy AQI categories, while Banning, Mira Loma, the 60 Near-Road monitors were in the Unhealthy for Sensitive Groups AQI category. Low-cost sensors in East Los Angeles, the San Gabriel Valley, the Santa Monica Mountains, and portions of the Inland Empire have been in the Unhealthy to Hazardous AQI categories. All other portions of the South Coast Air Basin and Coachella Valley have been in the Good to Moderate AQI categories. Visit https://www.aqmd.gov/aqdata to view current air quality conditions.

In any area impacted by smoke: If you smell smoke or see ash due to a wildfire, limit your exposure by remaining indoors with windows and doors closed or seeking alternate shelter, and avoiding vigorous physical activity. Forecasted Smoke and Ash Impacts

Most of the South Coast AQMD jurisdiction will experience smoke impacts with the highest AQI values occurring in direct proximity to the Bobcat and El Dorado Fires. Smoke transported from fires in Central and Northern California may also contribute to widespread elevated particulate matter (PM2.5 and PM10) concentrations. Smoke and ash impacts will be highly variable in both timing and location through Saturday.

Friday afternoon through Friday evening: Smoke from the Bobcat and El Dorado fires will impact areas along the Los Angeles and Orange Counties in the early afternoon before moving to the east and northeast into Riverside and San Bernardino Counties during the late afternoon through the evening. Smoke will persist in the San Gabriel Mountains in Los Angeles County throughout this period.

Overnight Friday through Saturday morning: Areas south of the Bobcat fire along the I-10 corridor from Pasadena to Rancho Cucamonga will likely see the highest particulate matter levels as smoke is likely to remain closer to the ground overnight. Smoke impacts from the El Dorado Fire are predicted for western Riverside County and the Coachella Valley, with the highest particulate matter levels likely between Redlands and Banning. Coastal areas could see moderate smoke impacts on Saturday morning.

Saturday afternoon: Onshore winds will start around noon and move smoke to the north and northeast into the mountains of Los Angeles, Riverside, and San Bernardino Counties and out of the South Coast Air Basin. Moderate smoke impacts will persist throughout the rest of the South Coast Air Basin and Coachella Valley due to smoke from the Northern and Central California fires.

Overall, meteorological conditions will bring smoke and ash into portions of Los Angeles, Orange, Riverside, and San Bernardino Counties. Unhealthy or higher AQI levels due to PM2.5 and PM10 concentrations are possible in areas of direct smoke impacts. Impacts will be highly variable throughout the day, impacting different parts of the region at different times.

PUBLIC HEALTH RECOMMENDS TESTING FOR INDIVIDUALS POSSIBLY EXPOSED TO COVID-19 AND CLOSELY MONITORS DATA AFTER LABOR DAY WEEKEND -

The Los Angeles County Department of Public Health (Public Health) has confirmed 61 new deaths and 671 new cases of confirmed COVID-19. The high number of new deaths are from a backlog of reports received from over the weekend, and the low number of new cases reflect reduced testing due to the excessive heat.

Public Health is carefully monitoring data over the next couple of weeks to see the impact of the holiday weekend on the transmission of the virus across County communities and recommends testing for individuals possibly exposed to COVID-19.

If you were potentially exposed to COVID-19 over the holiday weekend, you are encouraged to get tested. For example, if you were in a crowded area this weekend and people were not wearing cloth face coverings, you should get tested. If you were around someone who was feeling sick, you should get tested. And if you were with someone who has tested positive for the virus, even if they never felt sick, you should get tested. Testing sites are open and appointments are available.

Just over two weeks after Independence Day, the County experienced increases in cases, hospitalizations and deaths. For example, the 7-day average of daily reported COVID-19 cases around July 4 was about 2,200 cases per day, but two weeks later the number of new cases increased to over 3,100.

In July, the County saw the steepest increases in hospitalizations, where the average was over 2100 hospitalizations per day; the most significant peaks were two to three weeks after the July 4 holiday. This past month however, daily hospitalizations have dropped back to an average of under 1000 hospitalizations a day, similar to the numbers in early April. Currently, there are 936 people who are confirmed cases currently hospitalized and 33% of these people are in the ICU.

The 7-day average of daily deaths before July 4 was around 30 deaths per day, and tragically, 22 days after the July 4 holiday, the number of deaths climbed up to 44 deaths per

To date, Public Health has identified 249,859 positive cases of COVID-19 across all areas of L.A. County, and a total of 6,090 deaths. Testing results are available for nearly 2,393,000 individuals with 10% of all people testing positive.

'Our hearts go out to everyone who has lost a friend or a loved one to COVID-19. We wish you healing and peace," said Barbara Ferrer, PhD, MPH, MEd, Director of Public Health. "We have made tremendous progress as a County since mid-July in bringing down our community transmission rates and preventing a catastrophic level of demand on our health care system. We have been successful, in large part, because people have been following what we know are the best public health practices we have. We have avoided gatherings and moved many services outdoors. Unfortunately, what we've learned from the past several months is that we cannot return to normal at this time; we need to maintain our vigilance so that we can continue to suppress the spread of the virus and get to a place when we can safely reopen additional sectors, especially schools.'

Last week the County announced a plan to allow for reopening K-12 schools for inperson special services for high need students. This includes students with individualized education plans and English-language learners, as well as other students who may need assessments and support that cannot be provided through virtual learning. In order to reopen for special services, Public Health ask schools to send a notification form to the department. The form is available on our website as a fillable PDF and asks for basic information – the name of the school, the anticipated number of students and staff expected by grade, and a point of contact at the school. The form also requires the school to attest to having adequate PPE in compliance with County and State guidance, a plan or protocol in place for testing and outbreak management, and that they will adhere to the school protocols.

As fall and winter approaches, Public Health asks everyone to begin to think ahead about how you will navigate the fall and winter carefully. This includes the upcoming Halloween holiday. For this year, it is simply not safe to celebrate in the usual ways. Gatherings, events, parties, carnivals, festivals, haunted house attractions, are already prohibited under the Health Officer Order. Public Health recommends trick or treating not happen this year and offers other ways to celebrate that are safe for children and families, including hosting an online party and decorating homes and yards. There are also some Halloweenrelated activities that are safer, including car parades and drive-in movie nights. Detailed guidance can be found online at: www.publichealth.lacounty.gov.

Data continues to show African American/Black, Latino/Latinx, Native Hawaiian and Pacific Islander residents and those in low-income communities continue to have disproportionate health outcomes. Although these numbers for highly-impacted groups are decreasing, as is the case overall in LA County, Latino/Latinx residents are three times as likely to die from COVID-19 and African American/Black residents are twice as likely to die from COVID-19 when compared to White residents. Communities with high levels of poverty are four times as likely to die of CO-VID-19 when compared to residents with the highest income. Native Hawaiian and Pacific Islanders have a rate of hospitalization that is almost five times that of White residents. Racism and inequitable access to resources have played a significant role in the pandemic, as it does in other areas of health. This is why a wide range of actions is needed to address the inequities we continue to witness. These include ensuring protections for workers, especially low-wage workers, offering services and support to those needing to isolate and quarantine, making sure testing is widely-available in under-resourced areas, partnering with trusted community organizations for advocacy and information sharing, and addressing discrimination and racism that limits opportunities and resources available for optimal health and well-being.



COFFEE: HEALTHFUL OR DETRIMENTAL?

"But isn't coffee bad for my health?"

Much has been said and written about the benefits vs. the detrimental effects of coffee. But what is the "bottom line"? Are there beneficial qualities? Does it harm me? Should it be abstained from? Is it OK to

These and similar questions are not easily answered because, in the tests and statistical data, researchers and doctors do not use -- or attempt to define -- a consistent standard for what is meant by "coffee." Coffee has also been accused of causing, or con-tributing to, cancer, heart diseases, hypertension, hepatitis, and cirrhosis of the liver. Dr. John Timson of the University of Manchester in England, while admitting that coffee is mildly addictive, states that, at present, there is no hard scientific evidence that links the

use of coffee to any of the above-mentioned diseases. Unfortunately, in virtually all studies done on the health effects of coffee, researchers indis-criminately lump all "coffees" together. But no two cups of coffee are alike. And it is not likely that any standard will ever be established for coffee research. Why? Because brewed coffee contains not only caffeine, but various acids, oils, and alcohols, the qualities of which vary depending on the way the coffee beans are handled from farm to cup. It is rare that any two cups of coffee are chemically identical!

The FDA (Food and Drug Administration) has placed caffeine on their Generally-Recognized-As-Safe list. Caffeine acts as a stimulant to the central nervous system. If used in excess, it contributes to nervous¬ness, irritability, sleeplessness, anxiety, and heart palpitations.

FACTORS AFFECTING THE QUALITY OF "COF¬FEE" According to Timothy Hall, a teacher with the L.A. Unified School District who has given numerous lectures on coffee, there are at least 30 factors which affect the beverage called "a cup of coffee," all of which must be taken into account if one is to draw a useful con¬clusion about coffee's "good" or "bad" effects. According to Timothy Hall, one cannot answer "Is coffee good for me?" until one has ex¬plored the following questions. In some cases, definitive answers to the following may be hard to come by, if not next to impossible. Some factors, however, are completely within our control.

What is the type or variety of coffee plant? Of the two primary types of coffee -- arabica and robusta arabica is considered the better of the two. Where and how was it grown? How was it ferti-lized?

What was the method of roasting?

The depth of darkness of the brown in coffee color is due to the proportion of cresylic acid (cresol) present after the beans have been roasted. The darker the roast, the greater the tar content.

What was the grinding procedure? How hot did the beans get during the grinding pro¬cess? Though not everyone will notice the difference, any grinder which grinds at a high temperature can result in the loss of aromatic oils. One solution is to grind with a hand mill. Another solution (when using an electric mill) is to only grind enough for a few cups at a time, since prolonged grinding may result in excessive heat. How much time elapsed between grinding and brew¬ing?

TEMPERATURE

What was the temperature of the coffee grounds, and the temperature of the water, when you began brew? What were the temperatures when you finished brewing?

Fusel oil, released into the water whenever coffee grounds are boiled, causes bitterness; however, fusel oil is NOT released into water at less than boiling temperatures.

PREPARATION

What type of coffee maker was used (vacuum, drip, per¬colator)? (Space doesn't permit us to review every coffee-maker on the market however, so let the buyer beware.)

Did I brew the grounds using the percolation, infusion, or decoction method? Infusion refers to adding

the grounds to the water and letting them steep. A camper might do this. Decoction refers to actually cooking the grounds -- even boiling -- to make a strong brew. Though this might be acceptable in a prison camp when one is trying to extend the available grounds as far as possible, it is the least desirable choice. Percolation -- pouring the hot water through the grounds -- is the best option.

There are many other factors too. Of the factors under our control, the quality of our thinking (as we brew the coffee) has a direct effect on the finished product. Also, the way in which we drink the beverage has an effect (i.e., slow thought¬ful sips vs. hurried gulps).

Hall asserts that in his tests, the quality of one's thinking has proven to be the most important factor. States Hall, "If you brew your coffee with precise intent, you can alchemically transmute those com¬mon grounds into a veritable elixir." MORE ON THIS NEXT WEEK.

TIPS TO KEEP PETS SAFE DURING WILDFIRES

Dr. Jennifer Freeman, DVM, PetSmart resident veterinarian and pet care

- 1. Ensure your pets are safely contained. Consider getting a pet carrier if you don't already have one and practicing crate training in advance to avoid extra stress in the face of an emergency. For fish or turtles, it's a good idea to have buckets or plastic bins with a lid on hand in the event you need to evacuate them. This is a safer alternative to transporting these pets in glass bowls or aquariums.
- 2. Make sure your pet has identification. Countless pets go missing after storms, wildfires and other natural disasters. Proper ID on your pet is the best assurance that you and your pet are reunited in the event you are separated. "Consider microchip identification for your pets, as this is a permanent way to identify them and is used universally by animal shelters and veterinarians," Freeman said.
- 3. Look for pet-friendly housing options for your pet should you need to evacuate your home. Ensure your pet is up to date on vaccinations, which are often needed for boarding, and that you have a supply of your pet's medication.
- Ask friends, relatives and others outside of your immediate area whether they could shelter your animals.
- Prepare a list of animal shelters, boarding facilities and veterinarian offices that could shelter
- animals during an emergency and include 24-hour phone numbers. If you plan to take your pet with you, seek out pet-friendly hotels that are along possible evacuation routes in advance so that you are not caught without a place to stay for the night.
- 4. Assemble a pet emergency supply kit. Pet emergency kits do not need to be big but should include the following, in an easy-to-carry waterproof container that can be taken in the event of an
- Portable food and water bowls, along with a one-week supply of food and fresh water
- Vaccination records An extra supply of medication including heartworm and flea/tick prevention (if refrigeration

Pet First-Aid items such as antiseptic spray, antibacterial ointment, and bandage material. These are easy solutions that can deliver quick first-aid care in the event of a pet injury.

A list of regional pet-friendly hotels

A bed, carrier and leash and harness for each animal

is necessary, have easy access to a small, insulated bag or cooler)

Pet waste bags

Cat litter, litter box and scoop

Current photos of your pets, in case they get lost

5. Provide comfort. Severe weather or leaving home can be frightening to pets. Provide your dog or cat with a familiar toy or blanket or try aids like calming sprays, collars, chews, supplements, anti-anxiety medications, or a ThunderShirt™ to help ease anxiety.



IS THERE AN AGE LIMIT FOR ORGAN DONATION?

Dear Savvy Senior: I never thought about becoming an organ donor until my brother died of kidney failure last year. But at age 78, I would like to know if I'm too old to be a donor, or if they would even use my organs if I were to die from CÓVID-19. What can you tell me?



Potential Donor

There's no cutoff age for being an organ donor. Anyone, regardless of age or medical history, can sign up. In fact, there are many people well up into their 80's that donate. The decision to use your organs is based on health of the organ, not age. So, don't disqualify yourself prematurely. Let the doctors decide at your time of death whether your organs and tissues are suitable for transplantation.

Regarding the COVID-19 part of your question, as of right now, the Organ Procurement and Transplantation Network (OPTN) does not recommend transplantation of organs from donors known to have the virus. So, if you were to contract the coronavirus and die, your organs would probably not be used, however, this may change as treatments are developed.

Here's what else you should know about becoming a donor.

In the United States alone, more than 112,000 people are on the waiting list for organ transplants. But because the demand is so much greater than the supply, those on the list routinely wait three to seven years for an organ, and more than 7,000 of them die each year.

Organs that can be donated include the kidneys, liver, lungs, heart, pancreas and intestines. Tissue is also needed to replace bone, tendons and ligaments. Corneas are needed to restore sight. Skin grafts help burn patients heal and often mean the difference between life and death. And heart valves repair cardiac defects and damage.

By donating your organs after you die, you can save or improve as many as 50 lives. The United Network for Organ Sharing maintains the OPTN, a national computer registry that matches donors to waiting recipients.

Some other things you should know about being an organ donor are that it does not in any way compromise the medical care you would receive in a hospital if you are sick or injured, nor does it interfere with having an open-casket funeral if you want that option. And, most major religions in the United States support organ donation and consider it as the final act of love and generosity toward others.

How to Donate

If you would like to become a donor, there are several steps you should take to ensure your wishes are carried out, including:

Registering: Add your name to your state or regional organ and tissue donor registry. You can do this online at either OrganDonor.gov or DonateLife.net. If you don't have Internet access, call Donate Life America at 804-377-3580 and they can sign you up over the phone.

Identify yourself: Designate your decision to become an organ donor on your driver's license, which you can do when you go in to renew it. If, however, you don't drive anymore or if your renewal isn't due for a while, consider getting a state ID card - this also lets you indicate you want to be a donor. You can get an ID card for a few dollars at your nearby driver's license office.

Tell your family: Even if you are a registered donor, in many states, family members have the ultimate say whether your organs may be donated after you die. So, clarify your wishes to family. Also tell your doctors and indicate your wishes in your advance directives. These are legal documents that spell out your wishes regarding your end-of-life medical treatment when you can no longer make decisions for yourself. If you don't have an advance directive, go to MyDirectives.com where you can create one

LOST AN OLD 401(K)? HERE ARE 6 TIPS FOR FINDING IT!

The days of working for a single employer for decades until you retire are over. Today, you are much more likely to change jobs multiple times during your career. According to the Bureau of Labor Statistics, today's workers have held an average of 12 jobs by the time they reach their 50s.

Since people change jobs so frequently, it is easy to lose track of an old 401(k), especially if you only worked in a position for a short time. In fact, forgetting plans is quite common: it's estimated that roughly 900,000 workers lose track of their 401(k) plans each year. And when you forget

to cash out your 401(k) upon leaving a job, it may eventually be transferred to a bank, rolled into an IRA, or even sent to the state's unclaimed property fund.

If you're looking to increase your retirement savings, one way to start is to make sure you haven't lost or forgotten about any old accounts. Here are 6 tips for tracking down a missing 401(k).

1. Contact your previous employers: If your former employer is still in business, the easiest way to find an old 401(k) is to contact them. You can ask the human resources department or the plan administrator at the company to search their records to find out whether you participated in the plan, and if they still manage your account. Be prepared to provide the dates that you worked for the employer, your name, and your Social Security number.

2. Find the plan administrator's contact details: If your former employer has shut down or merged with another company, you can try to contact the organization that administered the plan to see if they still control your 401(k). If you have an old statement, it should contain the administrator's contact information. You can also contact former co-workers and ask if they have copies of old statements from the plan. 3. Review the plan's annual tax return: If you can't access your old plan statements, you can try to find the contact information for the plan administrator via the plan's tax return. Most plans must file an annual tax return, Form 5500, with the Internal Revenue Service and U.S. Department of Labor. Search the website www.efast.dol.gov by entering the name of your old employer to find this form. 4. Search unclaimed property databases: If you are unable to track down your account through your former employer or the plan administrator, you still have options. Depending on what happened to the company and how much money was in your account, there are a few different places to search. The National Registry of Unclaimed Retirement Benefits offers a database where employees can register names of former employees who left retirement funds with them. By entering your Social Security number, you can search this database for free to determine if you have any unclaimed retirement account balances. Additional online resources, such as missingmoney.com and unclaimed.org, similarly allow you to search for retirement assets in any states in which you've lived or worked. 5. Search for default IRA accounts: If your old account had a fairly small balance, it may no longer be in a 401(k). For 401(k) accounts with balances of less than \$5,000, a former employer might have rolled the funds into a default IRA account on your behalf. Default IRAs can be created when your former employer is unable to reach you to find out how you want the funds paid to you. You can search for such IRA accounts for free on the FreeERISA website. 6. Search for terminated plans: If your former employer terminated its 401(k) plan, this doesn't automatically mean your money is lost forever. The Department of Labor maintains a list of plans that have been abandoned or are in the process of being terminated. Search their database to find out whether the plan is in the process of—or has already been—terminated, and learn the contact details for the Qualified Termination Administrator (QTA) responsible for overseeing the plan's shutdown.

Keep track of your assets

The best way to keep track of your retirement accounts is to not lose them in the first place. Indeed, one of the most important parts of estate planning is to create a comprehensive inventory of all your assets, not just your retirement funds. By doing so, none of your assets will end up in our state's Department of Unclaimed Property, and your family will know exactly what you have and how to find everything if something happens to you.



Minutes ago I began this article thinking I wanted to write about my understanding of why so many people on all positions within the political spectrum are out there every night, risking their lives, demonstrating.



TOM SEAVER AND BASEBALL'S ALTERED GAME

Baseball fans will be a long-time mourning Tom Seaver's passing. "Tom Terrific" was an icon like Willie Mays, Mickey Mantle and Ted Williams who, for those who watched them play, will forever treasure the experience.

Baseball analyst Bill James argues that Seaver ranks among baseball's best-ever pitchers, equal to or better than Walter Johnson, Christy Mathewson or Bob Feller. More important when lamenting Seaver's death, however, is to remember his

character. When the National Baseball Hall of Fame announced Seaver's death, it referred to his dignity, sportsmanship, integrity and wisdom, qualities tooinfrequently found in famous athletes.

Since Seaver's stellar 1969 season when he led the "Miracle Mets" to a World Series victory, baseball has undergone transformative changes: three more expansion rounds, divisional realignment, radically altered on-the-field game execution philosophy, foolish rule changes and several added layers of postseason play.

One of the most dramatic shifts is the demographic composition in the player rosters from mostly native-born Americans to roughly 30 percent foreign nationals. On Seaver's 1969 Mets, the 25-man roster was 100 percent U.S.-born, which included five African-Americans. The 2020 Mets Opening Day roster includes nine foreign nationals, a mix of Cubans, Dominicans and Venezuelans, but no African Americans. In 2019, only 68 African-American players appeared on opening-day rosters, injured lists and restricted lists. During the same year, rosters listed 251 international players.

Fans wonder how, over a half century, foreign nationals displaced about 30 percent of American-born players. They question why such prestigious, generously paid jobs go, virtually by default, to international players.

Therein hangs a tale.

The short answer is the State Department's willingness to issue a variety of nonimmigrant visas that enable international players to freely enter the U.S. The most commonly used is the P-1, which remains valid for the duration of players' contracts, often for multiple years. Since 2006, even minor league players are P-1 qualified; before 2006, players received an H-2B visa, which meant they had to return home when the season ended. Unlike the H-2B, the P-1 has no numerical cap, so owners can no longer grouse about visa snafus that strand their international players.

The backstory is that MLB franchise owners, who preside over a \$10.7 billion industry, have business models identical to Microsoft, Apple and AT&T: hire cheap labor, and maximize profits. Caribbean players are cheaper to sign period! Dick Balderson, former Seattle Mariners general manager, once said that in the impoverished Dominican Republic, even a modest signing bonus represents a small fortune. Team owners can sign 20 penurious Dominicans, also incentivized by the prospect of coming to the U.S. legally, for the same cost as four Americans.

To hone Dominicans' skills, all 30 MLB franchises have development camps run by professional coaches and trainers. Owners scuttled plans to start similar camps in Venezuela when the political climate became too unstable. Not a single similar MLB-maintained academy exists in the U.S.

Instead of inking foreign nationals, owners could choose from an abundance of solid domestic players. The annual College World Series puts their talents on display. Yet, wrote author Ryan McGee in his book, "The Road to Omaha," for most college players, the CWS is the last organized baseball game they ever participate in.

Playing in the major league has to rate among the world's best jobs. The starting, average and the highest salaries are, respectively, \$565,000, \$4.4 million and Los Angeles Angels' Center Fielder Mike Trout's bank-busting \$35.5 million, a one-year installment on his \$426.5 million 12-year contract.

The international players are talented, and perhaps deserving of their place on an MLB roster. But, to repeat, playing MLB baseball is a job (although never considered such among its devotees).


Talented U.S. players should get priority for playing in the big leagues, and making the riches that follow.

TRUMP KNEW. END OF STORY. In American law, criminal negligence is conduct in which a person ignores a known or obvious risk, or disregards the lives and safety of others.

He knew exactly what he was doing, as evidenced by the smoking gun he fired on March 19, telling Woodward on tape: "Really, to be honest with you...I wanted to always play it down. I still like playing it down, because I don't want to create a panic."

He's fine with trying to create a panic in suburbia with his racist warnings about black people invading paradise. But leveling with the American people at the earliest opportunity? Helping them prepare for a deadly threat? Taking every conceivable transparent step to minimize the death toll? That's not how this guy rolls.

He infamously bragged that he could shoot someone on Fifth Avenue and not lose a vote. But while fully armed with foreknowledge about COVID-19, he has now shot and killed 190,000. Will that cost him votes? Are we so benumbed at this point that even the most flagrant smoking guns shoot only blanks?

Returning Your VBM Ballot

Voters are advised that they are responsible for how their Vote by Mail (VBM) ballots are returned and with whom they entrust their ballots. The Los Angeles County Registrar-Recorder/County Clerk recommends returning a ballot to either a mailbox, official drop box, or ballot box.

Voters who cannot return their VBM ballot can designate any person to return their ballot as long as there is no compensation involved for that individual, group or organization returning the ballot.

There are several recommended options for returning a Vote by Mail ballot during any election:



Return by mail.

Must be postmarked by Election Day. No postage required.



Drop-off at a Vote by Mail Ballot Drop-Off Location.


Drop-off at any Vote Center leading up to and on Election Day.

Signature Verification

Voters must sign the eligibility oath and date the VBM return envelope before submitting their ballot. Every signature is verified before the ballot is cleared for counting. If a signature is missing or if the signature does not match the one on file, the County will notify the impacted voter to allow the voter an opportunity to provide a valid signature



PORTRAITS OF OUR NEIGHBORS By Stuart Tolchin

Bob Jones is a very personable man who I met on the Azusa Greens Golf Course. We are both 76 years of age and have underlying medical conditions. During the entire time of our acquaintance he has been enduring arduous medical treatments which include radiation and the use of experimental treatments in order to cope with his advanced cancer conditions. He has stubbornly refused to abandon much of his regular activities. He adamantly explains "I will never alter my lifestyle out if fear." In between radiation treatments and medical consultations he continues to play golf a few times a week. He goes to Costco and Home Depot



regularly and has made few changes to his lifestyle. He maintains contact with his numerous children, grandchildren, and great grandchildren. He maintains a supervisory interest in the company he has started which provides computer

billing services to hospitals across the United States.

Bob at one time was superior athlete whose picture still hangs on the wall of San Gabriel High School honored as the best all-around athlete of 1962. Bob has never tasted caffeine, alcohol or tobacco. He has never indulged in drugs. In High School these prohibitions caused him to be recognized as an "outsider" who at times provided needed assistance to other students who were either too drunk or too stoned to drive home. As you may have guessed he is a Mormon who together with all of his five children have engaged in Missions all around the world. As a result of the missions to faraway places by his children Bob now has grandchildren of different colors and ethnicities. When I asked Bob if any of his children were ever rebellious he laughed and said they all were. To my surprise he explained that every athlete hated his Coach at one time or another in much the same way that God chastises and watches over his children on Earth. " It is only when one stops hearing God's cautioning voice that one should worry because God may have given up on you."

That explanation made little sense to me. I am a proud life-long sceptic who, nevertheless, admires the certainty and consistency and overall satisfaction that is a part of Bob's life. He is a good man, who cares about others, and engages in many philanthropic activities. Bob is a Republican who intends to vote for Donald Trump on November 3. Frankly, although I do not believe in the concept of sin, a vote for Donald Trump is to my mind an unforgiveable act which evidences a total lack of concern for the welfare of humanity in addition to an indifference to the unnecessary suffering resulting as direct consequence from Trump's actions and inactions. That is our dilemma and before you stop reading this please realize that hundreds of millions of Americans similarly are steadfast supporters of the President. Surprisingly, Bob and I still enjoy one another.

Does a person's politics, no matter their underlying behavior and the commendable way they live their lives make them absolutely unworthy of respect? I suggest that we attempt to consider the person. Politics is something like the frosting on a cake. Many of the frostings are too sugary, too comforting in the short run but clearly unhealthful in the long run. We all should be able to scrape off the frosting and that which may be healthful and substantial underneath the disagreeable topping. It is worth the effort to realize that political partisanship does not prevent friendship and that there are possible lessons to be learned from those with very different beliefs and standards. As a long practicing attorney who handled a sad number of vicious divorce cases I can testify to how frequently feelings can change. But for today, let us keep our wits about us and look for the healthy substance beneath the repellent, but to all too many, enticing frosting.

If I can ever get out of the house, I look forward to Bob and my next round of golf.



MEASURE P: The Pasadena City Services Protection Measure

On November 3rd, Pasadena residents will have a choice. Measure P allows for Pasadena voters to decide whether to maintain the longstanding utility transfer to the general fund. The elimination of these funds would result in the annual loss of approximately \$18 million that support emergency 911 response, fire, paramedic, public health programs for the community, senior services, homelessness and housing programs, street repairs, and other general services and programs.

As a full-service city, Pasadena relies on dependable, locally generated funds to effectively deliver quality City services to its residents, despite unforeseen emergencies and natural disasters. The City of Pasadena has experienced a \$30 million loss due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Despite those losses in revenue, the City used reserve funds, deferred infrastructure projects, and implemented other cost saving measures to maintain its current emergency response to the pandemic, public health programs, and critical services benefiting Pasadena residents and businesses during this unprecedented crisis.

If the Pasadena City Services Protection Measure does not pass, the loss of approximately \$18 million annually from the Light & Power Fund transfer will result in significant reductions. The reductions would impact emergency 911 response; fire, paramedic, public health, and senior services; homeless programs; street repairs; and the ability to maintain clean, healthy, and safe neighborhoods.

The Pasadena City Services Protection Measure is not a new tax, it does not raise taxes, and it does not raise utility rates—the charter amendment is meant to simply protect current funding levels that provide the services residents receive today.

If approved by a majority of Pasadena voters, the measure will also require annual independent audits with public disclosure, reduce and limit the Light & Power Fund transfer to not more than 12 percent, previously as much as 16 percent; and will be under local control with monies spent benefiting Pasadena residents and businesses.
