SCHIFF STATEMENT ON INSURRECTION AT THE U.S. CAPITOL

Schiff Shares What It Was Like To Be There, What It Means To The Country, And Where We Go From Here

Washington, DC – Today, Rep. Adam Schiff (D-CA) released the statement below following the insurrection at the United States Capitol:

“Now that the dust has settled, all too literally, on the events at the Capitol on Wednesday, I wanted to share a few thoughts on what it was like to be there, what it means to the country, and where we go from here. For the many of us that were present in Congress during 9/11, it brought back a flood of painful memories, but this time, the damage to our country was self-inflicted, and this time, we are far from unified as a result.

“The storming of the Capitol was an act of insurrection, intended to disrupt the most fundamental act of our democracy – the peaceful transition of power. Both Houses of Congress and the Vice President gathered in a Joint Session in the Capitol to perform our duty under the 12th Amendment, to certify and count the electoral votes cast by the States.

“In preparation for the Joint Session, and at the Speaker's request, I had been working for months to study the Constitutional provisions and their history, to understand the role of the Vice President and Congress, and to foresee any objections that might be raised and how to handle them, and to help manage our effort on the floor along with Representatives Zoe Lofgren, Jamie Raskin and Joe Neguse.

“Shortly after the reading of the states began, a large group of Republicans, joined by the leadership of their conference, Kevin McCarthy and Steve Scalise, objected to counting the electors from Arizona and we divided into our respective houses to debate the matter.

“When I spoke on the House floor in opposition to this challenge to the votes of millions of Arizonans, I wanted to emphasize that these Republican objectors were violating their oaths to defend the Constitution, regardless of the outcome of their objection, and doing grave damage to our democracy:

‘Nor can we console ourselves with the intoxicating fiction that we can break that oath without consequence because doing so will not succeed in overturning the election. An oath is no less broken, when the breaking fails to achieve its end.

‘We must be mindful that any who seek to overturn an election, will do injury to our constitution, whatever the result.

For just as the propagation of a dangerous myth about this election made this moment inevitable, our actions today will put another train in motion. This election will not be overturned, but what about the next? Or the one after that?

‘What shall we say when the our democratic legacy is no more substantial than the air, except that we brought trouble to our own house, and inherited the wind?’

“Indeed, although I did not know it, there was another train in motion only miles away. Nearby on the National Mall, the President of the United States was inciting a crowd of his supporters. He knowingly spread lies about fraudulent votes, suggesting that the election was stolen, and asserted that the Vice President could unilaterally overturn the results of a free and fair election in which 155 million Americans had cast their ballots. And then, he implored his crowd to go to the Capitol and do something about it. Trump even said he'd join them.

“And so they did.

“The scene was everything you have seen on television and more. I was on the House Floor taking notes for a rebuttal speech I would make later, when the Speaker was whisked out of the room by security, followed immediately by the Majority Leader, Steny Hoyer. The mob had broken into the Capitol, we were informed, and were headed our way. Police were discharging tear gas, there were reports of gunshots, and we were told to take out the gas masks under each seat and prepare to put them on. One of my colleagues, a veteran, was yelling instructions — ‘breathe slowly under the hoods or you will pass out.’ That is when the mob reached the doors to the House chamber and started battering them and trying to break through. Capitol police pushed furniture in the way to barricade them out and drew their weapons. The mob broke the glass in the doors, and members were instructed by police to leave the chamber through the rear doors ASAP. We did.

“As bad as it was, it could have been worse. There were many in the violent mob who had every intent to attack people they judged to be their enemies, and several Democratic and Republican members told me to try to keep out of sight. As one Republican said, ‘I know these people and can talk to them. You are in a whole different situation.’ I don't think he meant that he literally knew people in the mob, who were still disembodied and angry voices banging to get



through the doors, only that he knew people like them and what they were capable of.

“Capitol police ushered us to a secure location. On the way, one of the Republican members was carrying a large wooden stand he had taken from the House chamber, the hand sanitizer still attached to its top. I could tell he meant to use it as a club, if he needed to. ‘You that worried about your safety?’ I asked him. ‘Yes,’ he said, explaining that he had heard gun shots. I didn't recognize him and only knew he was a member from the pin on his lapel. ‘How long have you been here?’ I asked, expecting him to tell me that he was in his second or third term in Congress. ‘72 hours,’ he said. ‘I just got elected.’ I wasn't sure what to say to reassure him, and merely deadpanned, ‘it's not always like this.’

“As we waited for police and National Guard reinforcements to arrive, I discussed with my colleagues what our next steps should be. I felt strongly that we needed to resume the proceedings as soon as it was safe to do so, that we could not let these thugs interrupt the transition of power any more than they had already. I was pleased to see that sentiment was widely held.

“When we did resume, now in the evening, we voted down the objections to the Arizona electors, but nonetheless an astonishing number of Republicans still sought to overturn the results. And after resuming the Joint Session, Republicans objected to counting the certificates from yet another state, Pennsylvania. It was incredible to me that after all this, after seeing the clear and violent implication of their conduct, these members were not finished with their oath breaking.

“Late in the evening, I spoke again on the floor. Remarkable on the fact that Franklin Roosevelt had given his Four Freedoms speech exactly eighty years earlier, highlighting the dangers of ‘poisonous propaganda’ to our democracy, I called on Republicans to stop. I emphasized the need for unity in the face of the attempted insurrection and a pandemic that is killing thousands of us every day.

WITH LARGEST ONE DAY TOTAL OF COVID-19 DEATHS, PUBLIC HEALTH OFFICIALS ADVISE RESIDENTS TO SEEK EMERGENCY CARE IF SYMPTOMS BECOME SEVERE

Sierra Madre cases jumped from 266 at the end of December to 338 as of Friday, January 8, 2021.

LA County Public Health reported over 200 daily deaths this week. For comparison, the County on average has approximately 170 deaths each day from all other causes combined, including heart disease, cancer, stroke, diabetes, car crashes, suicides, and homicides.

Of the 318 new deaths reported today, 114 people that passed away were over the age of 80, 107 people who died were between the ages of 65 and 79, 61 people who died were between the ages of 50 and 64, 24 people who died were between the ages of 30 and 49, and two people who died were between the ages of 18 and 29. Seven deaths were reported by the City of Long Beach and two deaths were reported by the City of Pasadena.

Public Health reminds everyone to talk to a health-care provider and get a test for COVID-19 if you have symptoms of COVID-19. If you have symptoms or test positive for COVID-19, isolate immediately from your family and others. COVID-19 symptoms include:

- Fever or chills
- Cough
- Shortness of breath/difficulty breathing
- Fatigue
- Runny or stuffy nose
- Muscle or body aches
- Headache
- Sore throat
- Nausea or vomiting
- Diarrhea
- New loss of taste or smell

If you are 65 years old and older or have a health problem such as a chronic disease or a weak immune system, it is particularly important to let your doctor know that you have these new symptoms. If you need help finding a doctor, call the Los Angeles County Information line 2-1-1, which is available 24/7.

You should seek immediate emergency medical attention if you, or a person you know, exhibits the following symptoms:

- Trouble breathing
- Persistent pain or pressure in the chest
- New confusion
- Inability to wake or stay awake
- Bluish lips or face

If you, or a person you know develop these symptoms, go to an emergency room or call 911.

There are 8,074 people with COVID-19 currently hospitalized and 20% of these people are in the ICU. The 3-day average for daily hospitalizations is 8,065; the highest the County has ever experienced.

VACCINATIONS AVAILABLE FOR ALL TIERS

The California Department of Public Health on Thursday announced that vaccinations can now expand to all three tiers within Phase 1A. Starting Monday, the registration system will include all frontline healthcare workers who qualify within Phase 1A. The aim is to have all persons prioritized in Phase 1A vaccinated by the end of January. In addition, vaccinations are proceeding rapidly with staff and residents at skilled nursing facilities. The federal partnership with CVS and Walgreens will begin vaccinating at other long-term care facilities starting next week.

Public Health is expanding vaccination sites. This week we opened 19 vaccination sites across the county for persons within Phase 1A to receive vaccination. Next week, we plan to open 75 additional sites for these priority groups, including four federally qualified health centers, a community hospital, and 70 retail pharmacies throughout the county to help administer vaccinations to healthcare workers within Phase 1A.

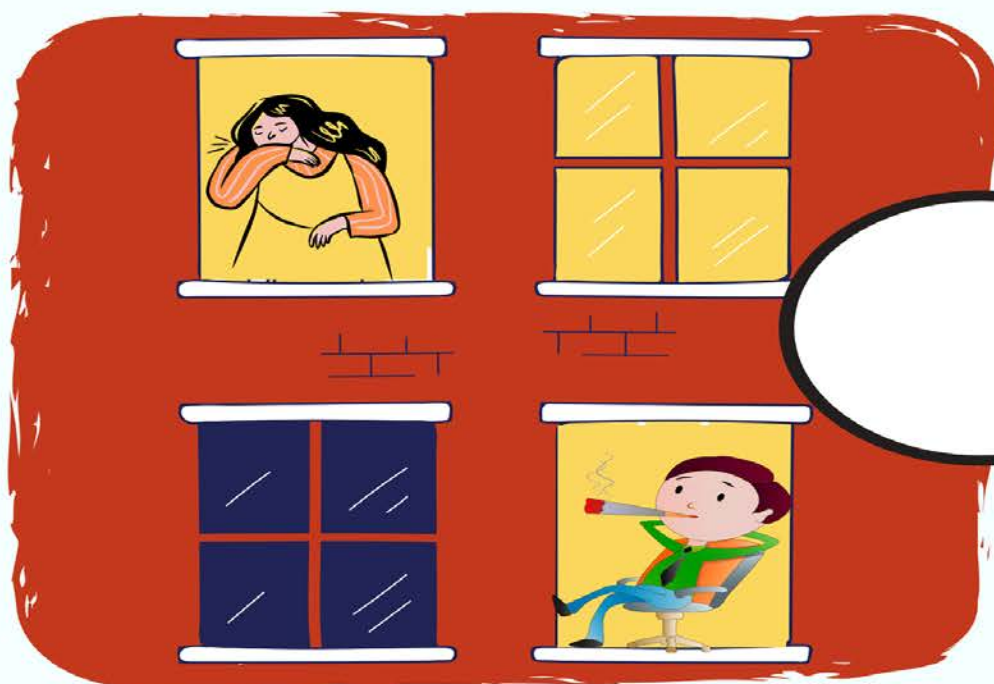

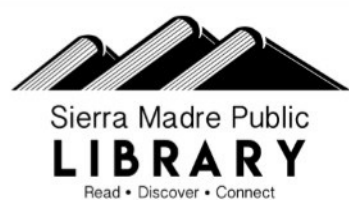
1630 AM EMERGENCY RADIO & Free on-air publicity for local events

Local Area News Brief

New Website With Pasadena COVID Vaccine Updates

Vaccine is likely to be available to the general public, spring/summer 2021.

The City of Pasadena has launched a new webpage with vaccine information to keep the community updated and provide a link for healthcare workers to learn about getting the vaccine.

Pasadena continues to distribute and administer the safe and effective COVID-19 vaccines as quickly as possible. Both the Pfizer and Moderna vaccine have been approved by the Food and Drug Administration (FDA), require two doses, and provide similar efficacy. Phases and tiers are subject to change but currently include: Phase 1A—Vaccinating now Healthcare workers providing direct care, and residents and staff of long-term care facilities
Phase 1B Tier One
People ages 75 and over
Those at risk of exposure at work in the following sectors: education, childcare, emergency services, and food and agriculture
Phase 1B Tier Two
People ages 65-74
Those at risk of exposure at work in the following sectors: transportation and logistics; industrial, commercial, residential, and sheltering facilities and services; critical manufacturing. Congregate settings with outbreak risk: incarcerated and homeless
Phase 1C
People ages 50-64
People ages 16-64 who have an underlying health condition or disability which increases their risk of severe COVID-19

Those at risk of exposure at work in the following sectors: water and wastewater; defense; energy; chemical and hazardous materials; communications and IT; financial services; government operations/ community-based essential functions

Pasadena has a disproportionately high number of long-term care facilities per 100,000 residents relative to neighboring jurisdictions. At PPHD's request, 13 of Pasadena's skilled nursing facilities (SNFs) and 97 assisted living and residential care facilities enrolled in the Pharmacy Partnership for Long-term Care (LTC) Program. The program has partnered with local pharmacies that will facilitate safe vaccination.

PPHD is also administering vaccines to staff of local skilled nursing and assisted living facilities and dialysis centers this week, and continues to vaccinate Pasadena Fire Department emergency medical technicians (EMTs) and paramedics. Partnerships with local pharmacies are also being coordinated to ensure access to vaccine for individuals who qualify for Phase 1A.

According to CDPH, the vaccine is likely to be available to the general public in spring/summer 2021. Council to Look at Heritage Square South

The Pasadena city council is set Monday to review predevelopment plans to redevelop six contiguous properties at the northeast corner of North Fair Oaks Avenue and East Orange Grove Boulevard with a 70-unit mixed-use project known as Heritage Square South. The project also includes demolition of the long standing Church's Chicken.

According to the staff report, the proposed project would include 69 Supportive Housing units for homeless seniors, one manager's unit, approximately 2,200 square feet of ground floor commercial space, and a 37-space surface parking lot. The site is located 710, 722, 730, 738 N. Fair Oaks Avenue and 19, 25 E. Orange Grove Boulevard, and totals 48,462 square feet.

The proposed project would be three-stories at approximately 36 feet in overall height, the report reads. The project also propose 17 parking spaces behind security fencing

for the residents and 20 additional parking spaces for the ground floor commercial use, as these have been determined necessary for the project, staff said.

Although the project proposes seven office/ personal services/retail, nine medical offices and restaurant/ restaurant, fast food, it was unknown if Church's Chicken would relocate to one of the spaces.

Heritage Square South is proposed to be a companion project to Heritage Square that is located immediately to the north, which provides 70 affordable housing for independent seniors. The two projects would be developed by the same group, Bridge Housing according to the report.

The report is intended to provide information only to the city council and no action will be taken.

The council will meet by videoconference/ teleconference at 2 p.m. and a livestream with captioning will be available at: pasadenamedia.org. Members of the public may

Mayor Gordo Nominates Council Members to Board Positions

Mayor Victor Gordo has announced this week the nomination of two City Council members to fill vacancies on boards to represent the city, which will be considered by City Council at their Jan. 11 meeting.

Vice Mayor Andy Wilson has been nominated to serve on the Arroyo Verdugo Communities Joint Powers Authority (AVCJPA), which consists of the cities of Burbank, Glendale, La Cañada Flintridge, Pasadena and South Pasadena, and the unincorporated areas of Crescenta Valley/Montrose within Los Angeles County. The city councils and county approved the formation of the JPA and have begun work on the 7-year funding plan for the JPA's Multiyear Sub-regional Programs (MSP). This includes the AVCJPA's plans to spend Measure M funds, a voter-approved sales tax measure to address homelessness.

District 6 Councilmember Steve Madison has been nominated to the Rose Bowl Operating Company. The mission of the Rose Bowl Operating Company is to return economic and civic value to the City of Pasadena by managing a world-class stadium and a professional quality golf course complex in a community-based environment.

"Each board and council member has a unique character and history, and the collaboration and communication will help us utilize our knowledge and expertise to maximize resources, achieve sustainable solutions, and advocate for our interests to improve the quality of life in our city," states Mayor Gordo.

Holden Reacts to Governor Gavin Newsom's Budget

Assemblymember Chris Holden released the following comments Friday in relation to Governor Gavin Newsom proposed 2021-2022 Budget.

"Today's [Friday] budget reflects the challenging times California continues to experience during the COVID-19 Pandemic. I look forward to working with Governor Newsom and my colleagues in the legislature to strengthen and improve the budget to save lives and our economy, while committing to shared priorities like education, affordable housing, and our environment. Our focus, however, at this moment must continue to be the health and well-being of all Californians during this COVID-19 Pandemic.

First, I am encouraged to see the Governor has taken my request to ensure the supplemental wage increase for developmental services are not suspended at the end of the year. We sent a letter to the Governor highlighting the Rate Study that shows the Intellectual and Developmental Disability community was underfunded by \$1.4 billion, and stressed the need to extend the supplemental wage increase until the rate methodology can be permanently fixed. The budget now reflects an extension of the sunset date to the end of 2022. Without this extension thousands of service providers would be at risk shutting their doors. Families losing care for their loved ones with intellectual and developmental disabilities community, especially during a pandemic, would be catastrophic.

Intellectual and developmental disability service providers have gone above and beyond to serve their clients – making sacrifices in their own lives while being paid menial wages due to an outdated reimbursement system. We stepped in to ask the Governor to make a decision in the budget to value and honor the work of these employees by extending the rate increase, and today, we are one step closer to ensuring the intellectual and developmental disability community has what they need to continue to provide much needed services to our loved



ones.

After almost a year of living through this Pandemic nightmare, it's clear that disadvantaged communities are disproportionately affected, whether directly through higher cases, hospitalizations, and deaths or indirectly through lower education quality due to lack of resources. I applaud the Governor for recognizing these discrepancies and look forward to working with him to ensure a just recovery.

The Governor's proposed \$372 million to speed up administration of vaccines across all of California's 58 counties is essential to getting us out of the Pandemic, which will allow us to adequately address all other issues.

The proposed \$14 billion investment in our economic recovery are urgently needed for those folks seeking relief from the loss of their jobs or business to the Pandemic.

The Governor is proposing a historic level of investments in education totaling over \$90 billion for K-12 in additional to a higher education tuitions freeze. We simply cannot let the Pandemic prevent us from investing in our future.

As we continue to experience the effects of climate change like catastrophic wildfires among others disasters, Governor Newsom's proposed \$1.5 billion comprehensive strategy to achieve the state's zero-emission vehicle goals by 2035 and 2045 shows his continued commitment to reducing our greenhouse gas emissions. The proposed additional \$1 billion fire prevention that maximizes technology and science-based approaches to protect state forestlands is vital to preventing extreme wildfire events."

Library Goes Fine Free

As of January 1, 2021, the South Pasadena Library no longer charges overdue fees for library materials. Overdue fees have not been charged due to the pandemic, but becoming officially Fine Free at the Library is a permanent step taken after multi-year considerations and processes.

Overdue fees have been shown to disproportionately impact library customers least able to afford them, such as seniors on a fixed income, kids, and teens. The elimination of overdue fees reflects a commitment on the part of the staff, the Library Board of Trustees, and the South Pasadena City Council, to fair and equal access to library materials and services.

Please note that borrowers will still be charged for lost or damaged items.

“This is the urgency that our new president must address, a virus that will claim more American lives than all our casualties during WWII. To meet that moment will require unity, not discord, will require an abiding faith in our country, in our democracy, in our government’s ability to function and provide for the needs of its citizens.

“We cannot continue debating the merits of an election that was fairly conducted, and overwhelmingly won by Joe Biden.

“Have we not brought enough damage to this House, to this country? It must stop!”

“But it didn’t stop. At around 3 am, we voted on the baseless objections to the Pennsylvania electors, and 138 members of the House (a large majority of the Republican Caucus and their leadership) as well as 7 Republican Senators, voted to reject the votes of millions of Pennsylvanians. Astonishingly, Republican members claimed that the ballots were fraudulent even though they had been elected on the very same ballots. Apparently, as I pointed out during the debate: ‘What value has consistency when measured against ambition?’

“On Thursday morning, I felt a mixture of sadness at what our country has gone through, embarrassment at how we appear in the eyes of the world, anger at the irresponsible actions of my colleagues who have spread lies about the election for months and brought this on themselves and the nation, fury over a president who instigated the rebellion, and a grave concern over the future.

“The actions of the mob and those who incited them, the President most of all, are despicable and outrageous, and those who committed crimes need to be held accountable. But we should not lose sight of the fact that what happened in the early hours of the morning, in a chamber with windows broken by bats and not far from statutes flecked with blood, was every bit as much an attack on our democracy as anything the mob tried to do. This assault on our Constitutional order was inspired by people wearing suits and ties, and cloaked in the genteel language of Congressional debate, but their purpose was no less ominous.

“Donald Trump lit the fuse which exploded on Wednesday at the Capitol. Every day that he remains in office, he is a danger to the Republic, and he should leave office immediately, through resignation, the 25th Amendment or impeachment. He should have been removed from office a year ago when the House impeached him and we proved in the Senate trial that he abused his power to cheat in the election. During the trial, we warned that if left in office, he would try to cheat his way into staying there. As I said at the time, the odds that he would do so again were 100 percent.

“And as much as I am pleased to see people resigning from his cabinet and former officials speaking out, where were they when they had a chance to stop this dangerous man from destroying the country, except by his side? As we read the sudden expressions of outrage from the likes of Bill Barr, Betsey DeVos, Mick Mulvaney and others, let us remember that these enablers wanted four more years of Donald Trump as president and worked hard to make that so. Their statements now are less about saving the country and more about saving what is left of their shattered reputations.

“Donald Trump has been the worst president we have ever had and should be confined to the dustbin of history where he belongs — for this failed insurrection, and everything before it.

“Yet even when he’s gone, the evil he has perpetrated will live after him. We can fortify the defenses of the Capitol. We can reinforce doors and put up fences. But we cannot guard our democracy against those who walk the halls of the Capitol, have taken an oath to uphold our Constitution, but refuse to do so.

“The work to repair and defend our democracy has never been more urgent or daunting. But we must never back down from this sacred task. I know I won’t.”

JEWISH FEDERATION TO HOLD EVERY PERSON HAS A NAME TO SERVE AS A REMINDER OF WHAT CAN HAPPEN IF HATE GOES UNCHECKED

Monrovia, CA – January 8, 2020 – Beginning on Saturday, January 23 at 7pm through Sunday, January 24 at 8pm, the Jewish Federation of the Greater San Gabriel and Pomona Valleys will be holding its annual Every Person Has a Name to commemorate UN International Holocaust Remembrance Day. Normally this event takes place on the steps of Pasadena City Hall, however due to COVID this year’s commemoration will take place virtually. The program will begin with a commemoration ceremony at 7:00pm and it will feature remarks from elected officials, including Congressman Adam Schiff, Congresswoman Judy Chu, LA County Supervisor Kathryn Barger, Assemblymembers Chris Holden and Blanca Rubio, a couple additional dignitaries, local clergy, and a special performance by the Jewish Federation’s Jewish Youth Orchestra.

Immediately following the ceremony, the program will transition into the reading of the names of people who perished during the Holocaust. Holocaust survivors and children of Holocaust survivors from around the community will begin by reading the names of their family members who were murdered during the Holocaust, and then will be followed by volunteers from throughout the community reading names.

“With every passing day, we are losing survivors. And when they die, so too do their stories. My concern is that their memories will be dying as well,” explains Jason Moss, Jewish Federation’s Executive Director. “This event was too important not to hold it due Jewish Federation’s Every Person Has a Name/Page 2

to COVID-restrictions so we conceived of a way to do it virtually. And we are adding a few additional aspects to this year’s event, including video vignettes of Holocaust survivors.” Moss continues, “An event such as this is not just a reminder of what can happen when hatred goes unchecked, but also allows the community to come together and to remember that each person that was killed was someone who lived and whose life was cut short. While our readers and those who listen may not know the people they are reading the names of; by listen as the names are read aloud... they are remembered.”

The utility box enhancement program, Art on the Box, extends the reach of public art into the community by sponsoring artists to improve the aesthetics of City owned utility cabinets.

The theme for the 2021 Art on the Box is Route 66 and there are five utility boxes available for painting (see the Application Page for locations). Submitted designs must reflect a Route 66 theme. Applications will be accepted between the months of January and March. It is anticipated that the selection will be made by the Art in Public Places Committee at their regular meeting in April.

ELIGIBILITY: The program is open to artists of all ages. All entries must be an original design and artwork of the entrant must be suitable for viewing by all ages. Monrovia Association of Fine Arts (MAFA) artists may be given preference if all else is equal.

APPLICATION: All requirements listed must be met or the application will be removed from consideration.

1. Artist Agreement and Disclaimer signed (Page 2)
 2. Application Form completed (Page 3)
 3. A Route 66 Concept Drawing Form completed (Page 3) that shows all four sides and top of the utility box. Please note that utility boxes do differ in size, so the diagram is for a concept drawing, not necessarily to scale. Drawings may be hand drawn or digital. The colors on the rendering should be representative of the final colors.
- Applications can be found at www.cityofmonrovia.org/art. Designs must be submitted on the template provided. Proposals need to be submitted electronically to kzessau@ci.monrovia.ca.us with the subject line reading “2021 Art on the Box Submittal.”

SELECTION CRITERIA: When making the selection for the Art on the Box Program, the Art in Public Places Committee will consider:

1. Artistic excellence, innovation, and originality
2. Creativity in reflecting this year’s Route 66 theme

ARTIST SELECTION: The Art in Public Places Committee will select the designs based on the criteria. Artists will be notified by the City if their designs are selected. Once selected, the box must be painted within 60 days and artist must notify the City when the project is complete. Artists will receive a \$700 stipend when the completed artwork is approved. In order

to receive payment, artists must submit an invoice and W9 form. Applications must be received no later than March 25, 2021 by 6:00pm. MATERIALS: Artists will be responsible for all the necessary materials required for the preparation and completion of the artwork as well as maintaining the integrity of the work for a period of 3 years. Artists will be given specific painting requirements that need to be followed to ensure the quality and longevity of the utility box. Artists will be supplied with the exterior UV protectant and anti-graffiti clear coat which much be applied once the utility box is completed. The removal of tagging and/or graffiti is NOT the responsibility of the artist.

No Cheeseburger Cheeseburger But Great Middle Eastern Food

Writing reviews on restaurants is subjective, as is drinking and wine . I love mom-and-pop restaurants that you’ve probably driven past 100 times. I always go to the restaurant at least three times before ink hits paper in the form of a review (I do take recommendations). I love Parkway Grill, Nick’s and Houston’s, but you know those already!

Sahara Restaurant in central Pasadena is one of my go-to spots for both takeout and sit-down dining. I used to eat at Sahara at least three times a month. I was born in Athens, Greece, and though Sahara leans towards Lebanese cuisine, Middle Eastern foods are universal in menu selections.



They don’t have Lebanese beer so I have my meals with Heineken. The interior is somewhat plain with pictures of Lebanon, and the tables and chairs could be from any diner in the area. But, the food is the highlight of this show. The kitchen is open so you can watch your food being cooking on mesquite, and it’s ably run by the new owners and their family.

They offer plenty of standard Middle Eastern dishes like kebabs, shawerma, and falafels. I love the lulu kebabs (ground seasoned lamb and beef (\$13.25), and for those of you who can’t decide, get the combination (\$17.75) which has a little of everything. For you vegetarians the falafel is a crowd pleaser (\$9.25). Order a side of babaghanouj (eggplant) (\$5.50) - they tell me it’s the real deal. My buddy Mike Bingley from the TV show Straight off the Menu swears by the by the chicken kebab. I like it but others seem to be juicer. All dishes come with feta cheese, a remarkable starter of pita bread, cucumber and your choice of lentil or cabbage salad. The cabbage is salad is great, and often I’ll put it aside for my next days lunch. Two enthusiastic thumbs up for Sahara! Is it as good as Raffi’s? Well it’s apples and oranges, they have raised prices since the original owners, but wages have increased. If you were a fan of Burger Continental 20 years ago, you will love Sahara.

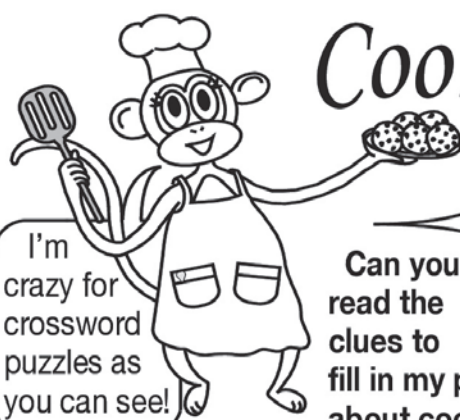

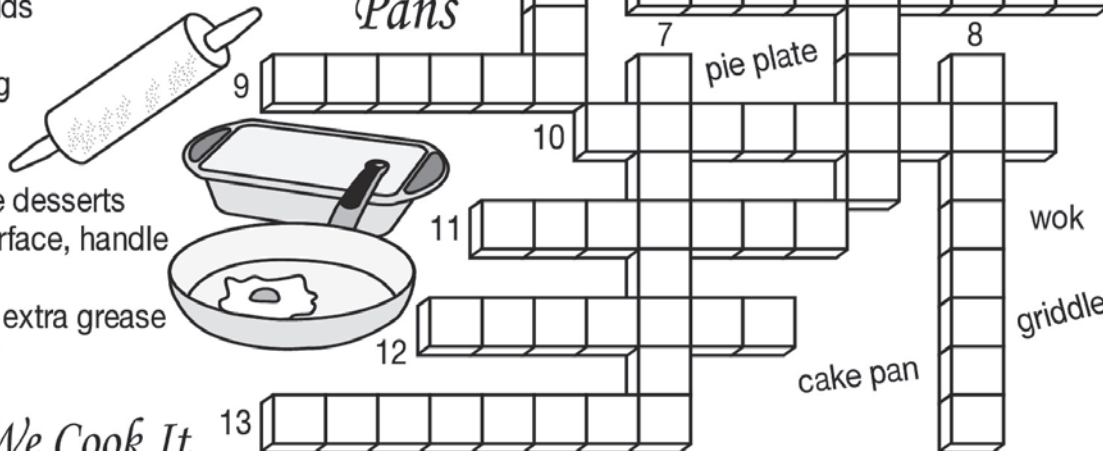

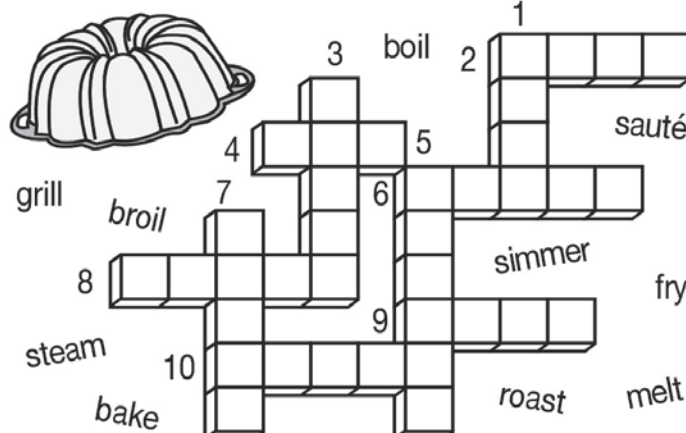

HOW SENIORS CAN MAKE THEIR BATHROOMS SAFER AND EASIER TO USE

Dear Savvy Senior:

What tips can you recommend for making a bathroom senior-friendly? My 78-year-old mother has mobility problems and fell getting out of the bathtub last month. I'd like to modify her bathroom with some safety features that can help keep her safe. Concerned Daughter



Dear Concerned:

Great question! Because more accidents and injuries happen in the bathroom than any other room in the house, this is a very important room to modify, especially for seniors with mobility or balance problems. Depending on your mom's needs and budget, here are some simple tips and product recommendations that can make her bathroom safer and easier to use.

Floor: To avoid slipping, a simple fix is to get non-skid bath rugs for the floors. Or if you want to put in a new floor get slip-resistant tiles, rubber or vinyl flooring, or install wall-to-wall carpeting.

Lights: Good lighting is also very important, so install the highest wattage bulbs allowed for your mom's bathroom fixtures and get a plug-in nightlight that automatically turns on when the room gets dark.

Bathtub/shower: To make bathing safer, purchase a rubber suction-grip mat, or put down adhesive nonskid tape on the tub/shower floor. And have a carpenter install grab bars in and around the tub/shower for support.

If your mom uses a shower curtain, install a screw or bolt-mounted curtain rod, versus a tension-mounted rod, so that if she loses her balance and grabs the shower curtain the rod won't spring loose.

For easier access and safer bathing, consider getting your mom a shower or bathtub chair so she can bathe from a seated position. In addition, you should also have a handheld, adjustable-height showerhead installed that makes chair bathing easier.

If your mom has the budget for it, another good option is to install a curb-less shower or a walk-in-bathtub. Curb-less showers have no threshold to step over, and come with a built-in seat, grab bars, slip resistant floors and an adjustable handheld showerhead. While walk-in tubs have a door in front that provides a much lower threshold to step over than a standard tub. They also have a built-in seat, handrails and a slip resistant bottom, and some have therapeutic features like whirlpool water jets and/or bubble massage air jets.

Curb-less showers and walk-in-tubs run anywhere between \$2,500 and \$10,000 installed.

Toilet: Most standard toilets are around 15 inches high and can be an issue for taller seniors with arthritis, back, hip or knee problems. If your mom has trouble getting on or off the toilet, a simple solution is to purchase a raised toilet seat that clamps to the toilet bowl, and/or purchase toilet safety rails that sit on each side of the seat for support. Or, you can install a new ADA compliant "comfort height" toilet that is 16-to-19 inches high.

Faucets: If your mom has twist handles on the sink, bathtub or shower faucets, consider replacing them with lever handle faucets, or with a touch, motion or digital smart faucet. They're easier to operate, especially if she has hand arthritis or gripping problems. Also note that it only takes 130-degree water to scald someone, so turn her hot water heater down to 120 degrees.

Doorway: If your mom needs a wider bathroom entrance to accommodate a walker or wheelchair, an inexpensive solution is to install some swing clear offset hinges on the door which will expand the doorway an additional two inches.

Emergency assistance: As a safety precaution, you should also consider purchasing a voice-enabled medical alert system like Get Safe (GetSafe.com) for her bathroom. This device would let her call for help by simple voice command, or by pushing a button or pulling a cord.

You can find all of these suggested products at either medical supply stores, pharmacies, big-box stores, home improvement stores, hardware and plumbing supply stores, as well as online.

PROP 19 EFFECTS PROPERTY TAX REASSESSMENTS ON INHERITED REAL ESTATE

Proposition 19 changes the way real estate may be passed down from parents to children in California. Here are 6 key things you should know about this new law:

1. Prop 19 eliminates the ability for children to receive property from their parents without a property tax reassessment unless (adult) children use the property as their own primary residence and the property has gained less than one million in value over the original assessed value.
2. Previously, a parent could transfer their primary residence and up to one million of assessed value of other real estate (residential and commercial) to their children without reassessment. Please note that Prop 19 does not impact capital gains taxes or eliminate the step up in basis for inherited properties - it only affects property tax reassessments.
3. Prop 19 goes into effect on February 16, 2021 and will impact properties transferred after that date. Because of holidays, however, the transfers must be recorded by February 11, 2021 to meet the deadline.
4. There is special Prop 19 planning available to avoid the consequences of Prop 19. This Special Prop 19 planning consists of transferring the property to an irrevocable trust before the deadline to preserve the lower property tax basis.
5. This special Prop 19 planning is best suited for those (a) who own a property with a high current market value and a low property tax assessed value, and (b) who plan to gift that property to their children upon death, and (c) whose children intend to keep the property for a rental, vacation home, or commercial building.
6. This special Prop 19 planning is not for everyone. There are many drawbacks and unknowns (the legislature has yet to write the details so there is much yet still to be determined) with this planning. For example, it would require you to give up all rights and use of your primary residence from now on, meaning your children could potentially kick you out of the home.

For commercial properties, you would have to give up all rights to the rental income and principal now, meaning your children would receive it from this point forward. Also, please be aware, properties with a mortgage generally will not qualify for this special Prop 19 planning because lenders often legally prohibit these types of property transfers. Finally, if the transfer is allowed, there is added expense in creating the irrevocable trust now and administering it into the future.

February 2, 1940-November 18, 2020



TONGVA ELDER BARBARA DRAKE

With great sadness, I report that on November 18 of 2020, Barbara Drake, a respected elder of the Gabrielino/Tongva passed away.

I met Barbara when I was lecturing at REI in San Dimas in the late 1980s. In my lectures, I showed native uses of plants, and how the past indigenous peoples of this area – her people – made fire with wood, and wove sandals, and created all their everyday needs from the plants, rocks, shells, and trees of the landscape.

Barbara and I became quick friends. She enjoyed my hands-on and visual way of teaching, and she tapped me to teach many workshops in the Title VII Indian Education programs that she organized at the time for San Bernardino Schools, where I participated in teaching students, and families in some cases, how to make traditional yucca sandals, how to use the native plants for food, and how to make fire with the hand drill.



I would visit Barbara up at Indian Springs Ranch, and interviewed her for my “Enter the Forest” book and for Wilderness Way magazine. One winter solstice, in the early 2000s, Barbara invited me up to Har-amokngna Indian Center, at Red Box in the Angeles Forest. About 70 Indians were expected, but because of the heavy snow, most chose to not come. Only a dozen people who actually showed up for the outdoor ceremony honoring the winter solstice in the cold snow. It was very special time for me, an intimate occasion in the snow, and around a fire.

Barbara actively participated in the Leadership in Environmental Education Program (LEEP), where she introduced hundreds of children to Tongva perspectives on the environment. She was one of the founding members of Mother Earth Clan, Cultural Keepers, and the Chia Cafe Collective. The Chia Café Collective eventually produced a book of that name, where Barbara and a handful of other native teachers shared their knowledge of cooking with traditional native foods.

When I attended Barbara’s various lectures on native culture at the Southwest Museum, Eaton Canyon, and elsewhere, I was often surprised that she would frequently call on me in the audience to answer questions, or to comment upon the current supply of native foods in the wilds. She typically began her talks by pointing out how Southern California seemed so park-like to the early Spanish explorers, who mistakenly believed the landscape was “natural” and “wild.” “Guess what?” Barbara would ask her audience. “We – our people – kept and preserved the land that way,” and she’d go on to describe the many methods of land management that were practiced by the early people of this area.

Helen and I had the great pleasure of visiting Barbara, and donating plants and tools to her project of the Tongva Living History Garden, located 15 minutes away from Pomona College at the Chaffey Community Cultural Center in Upland. The Garden explored three distinct eras and their plants of the Inland Empire: the Tongva Era, the Rancho Era, and the Citrus Era. Students worked closely with Barbara Drake in the garden, learning about traditional Native uses of plants.

As has been commented by so many, she was loved by all, never spoke ill of anyone, and always brought a positive light to her interactions with students, staff, and community members, always seeking to unite rather than divide.

Born in West Los Angeles in 1940 to Tongva mother Dolores Lola Lassos and Anglo father Charles Milton Scott, Barbara Drake (née Barbara Ann Scott) was raised exclusively on her mother’s traditional plant-based medicines until she was in her teens. Barbara was an enrolled member of The Gabrieleño/Tongva San Gabriel Band of Mission Indians and served as Tribal Secretary for many years. She worked in Indian Education Title VII for San Bernardino Schools, before coming to Pitzer College in 1993 to lecture on ethno-ecology. Her Tongva name was Kwi Tokor, meaning Acorn Woman.

Barbara Drake is survived by her husband of sixty years, Gary Drake, two children, and numerous extended family members.

A month before the first American died of the coronavirus, scientists already had designed the vaccine. In this darkest winter in recent history, the vaccines promise a spring.

They are a triumph of the Enlightenment, values of science, reason, and evidence-all now under assault in a new Dark Ages in which demagogues and conspiracy theorist spread disinformation and distrust. Despite various attempts to claim cred-it, the vaccine would not exist without international cooperation. Moderna’s vaccine employs technology created by Hungarian born scientists Katalin Kariko, and the company is run by a team of researchers and entrepreneurs from around the world. The Pfizer vaccine was created by second generation Turkish immigrants to Germany, Ugur Sachin and Ozlem Tureci, and has been pushed past the finish line by company CEO Albert Bourla, an immigrant from Greece. The pandemic of 2020 will not be the last crises endangering humanity. What we’ve relearned in this traumatic year is that all we hold dear is fragile, and that science, community, and empathy light the road forward. William Falk, Editor-in-chief “The Week”

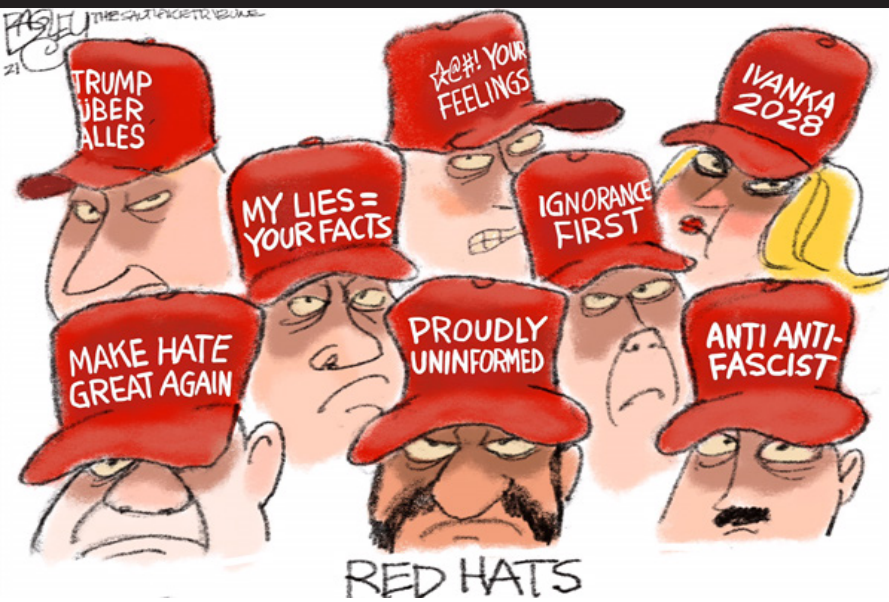
Forgetting about Trump, which I wish I could, my question is what did all those demonstrators think they were doing? What was all that homemade store bought body armor about?

LAYING BLAME FOR THE CAPITOL RIOTS WHERE IT BELONGS

You might have seen the photo by now. Of all the disturbing images of Wednesday's insurrection, this one lingers.

The photo, shot by Michael Robinson Chavez of the Washington Post, shows seven or so Trump supporters scaling the wall on the Senate side of the U.S. Capitol.

There's a certain irony in this photo, due only perhaps to the way my mind works.

On June 6, 1944, D-Day, a group of 225 Army Rangers scaled a 100-foot cliff at Pointe Du Hoc on the coast of Normandy in France. The soldiers used ropes and ladders as German gunfire rained down on them. It was chaos and carnage but they kept climbing and a handful made it to the top.

Most of the soldiers who made the climb are gone now, killed either that day, in subsequent days of fighting, or claimed by time.

If they were here, and we could ask them, I wonder what they would think of the photo from Wednesday. Would they simply shake their heads? What would they say?

I'm reasonably sure they would tell us they didn't scale that cliff 76 years ago for this – for the business of our Republic to be shamefully disrupted by extremists who wouldn't recognize the Constitution if it were stapled to their foreheads.

The soldiers who scaled the cliff at Pointe Du Hoc were fighting for an objective truth – "that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness."

On the other hand, some can justify any sort of abhorrent behavior in the name of what they believe to be a just cause.

The one thing far-left anarchists, neo-Nazis, Antifa, the Ku Klux Klan and the rioters who stormed the Capitol have in common is they believe they're on the right side of history. This is the problem with a worldview absent of objective truth.

Let's not confuse extremists who feel justified in committing violence with those with whom we disagree politically. The rioters involved in Wednesday's national embarrassment are no more conservative than left-wing radicals, who lay siege to American cities in the name of "justice" are liberal.

"What is the difference between the left-wing fringe, BLM, that lit police stations on fire, tried to light a federal courthouse on fire, occupied two cities, looted and engaged in violence, and what the people did yesterday in the Capitol? There's not much of a difference at all. It all needs to be condemned," Ari Fleischer, former press secretary for President George W. Bush, told Fox News.

What we saw on Wednesday was a violent, angry mob – not patriots – shamefully invited and incited by the President of the United States, engaged in what amounted to an invasion of the American Capitol, the likes of which has not been seen since the British set fire to the structure in 1814.

For six weeks, Trump had been telling his loyalists, and anyone else who would listen, that the election was stolen, that the fight must continue, that the election results must be overturned. On Wednesday, he worked his supporters, assembled near the Capitol, into a lather one more time as Congress met to certify Electoral College votes.

Yes, this is President Trump's fault.

Former Attorney General William Barr, who resigned last month after he refused to cave in to the president's demand to investigate unsubstantiated election fraud, told the Associated Press that "orchestrating a mob to pressure Congress is inexcusable." And, I would add, indefensible.

The president's behavior aside for the moment, what about the rest of us?

I've heard many times since Wednesday, from politicians and pundits, "This is not who we are as Americans." But maybe it is. It's clearly not who we should be but maybe it really is who we are. Maybe the fringes are creeping ever closer to the center.

But we say, "Come on now! I would never do something like that." Perhaps not but would we fire off a divisive tweet or post an angry Facebook entry? Would we bait our coworkers into arguments or fail to listen to those with whom we disagree? If we're really going to save the country, we need to admit who we are. There is one thing on which we should all agree as we look at that photo from Wednesday. Whatever America should be, this isn't it.
