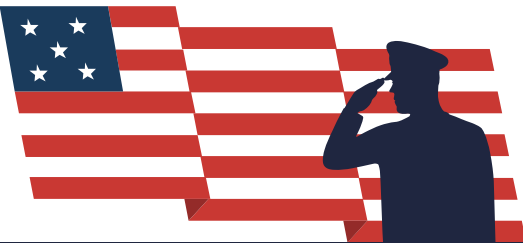

FY 2020-21 Street Improvement project to begin the week of June 1, 2021.

The FY 2020-21 Street Improvement Project is set to begin the week of June 1, 2021 and is anticipated to be completed by July 27, 2021.

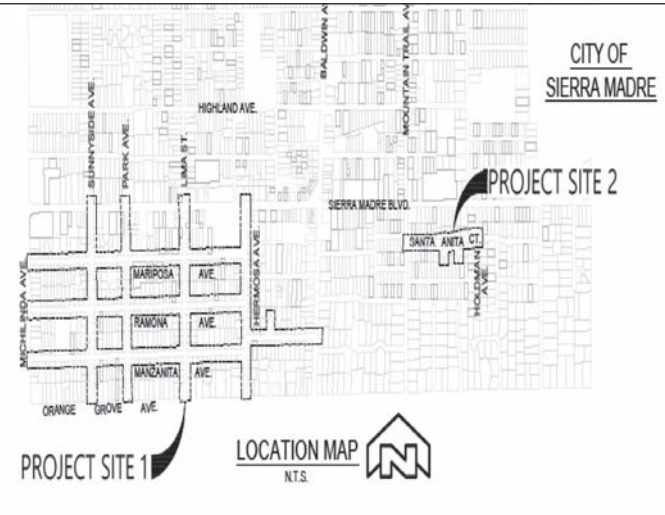
The City awarded the contract for this project to Copp Contracting, Inc. The project will consist of concrete improvements, asphalt repairs, pavement overlay, chip seal, slurry seal, and striping on the streets indicated in the attached map.

Construction work may be in front of or in the vicinity of residences or businesses. Working hours for the project will be restricted to 7 a.m. to 4 p.m., Monday through Friday. Street parking will also be restricted between the hours of 7 a.m. to 5 p.m. from Monday through Friday during construction.

Signs indicating "NO PARKING" will be posted at least 48 hours in advance of the parking restrictions. The City may tow any parked vehicles impeding the construction zone.

Thank you for your patience and cooperation during this project. Weather permitting, construction will be completed as planned.

LOST ON MT. WATERMAN

Just after midnight on Saturday May 15th the pages of the Sierra Madre Search and Rescue Team (SMSR) went off. A dozen team members had just crawled into sleeping bags in Joshua Tree National Park after an all-day navigation exercise. They would respond to the call after a few hours of sleep, but team members who were in town immediately responded to assist Montrose Search and Rescue in the search for a missing hiker on Mt. Waterman.

The search effort continued for 4 days. On Wednesday May 19th Dave Null was located by the Air Rescue 5 helicopter. He was alive and well, but deep in rugged terrain in Bear Canyon. He was far off track from the hike at Mt. Waterman that he'd started Saturday.

This was the third multi-day search near Mt. Waterman this spring. In March, Narineh Avakian's body was found 6 days after she left for a day hike and in April, Rene Compean spent an unexpected night out before being rescued.

They were lost.

All of these searches were for lost hikers. None of these hikers was injured and immobilized. They hadn't fallen down or gotten trapped at the bottom of a cliff. They were lost.

Without a basic map, even a simple unexpected trail intersection can get a hiker lost. And if a hiker loses the trail, strong navigation skills are needed to negotiate the San Gabriel mountains. During the Null search weather was a complicating factor. Clouds rolled up and down the Waterman drainages, wrapped around the peaks and rolled over ridges. One minute searchers were in the sun, and the next minute they'd be in a misty cloud bank.

Cloud cover like this can be very disorienting. It is easy to lose a sense of where you are when you cannot see any landmarks or the terrain around you. Even experienced field teams who are familiar with the area had to drop their packs during the search and spend time with their GPS and a map to verify their location and lock in a direction of travel on their compass.

Map and Compass

Members of SMSR carry a map, compass, GPS unit, and now often a phone with us at all times. While using Gaia or other apps on the phone can be very useful, we never rely on them (or their batteries) as our sole means of navigation. We do rely on the skills we've all tested at the Joshua Tree navigation exercise. At this exercise team members use nothing more than a map and compass to navigate to a point on our map where we'll find a small flag which has a clue for plotting our next point on the map. It is a difficult exercise, but it develops an essential skill.

SMSR encourages you to prepare for your hikes by carrying a map and compass and knowing how to use them as well as your GPS or cell phone. Read articles in Outside magazine, listen to podcasts like The Sharp End, learn from more experienced friends, take a class at REI, or read books like Staying Found. But start by purchasing a map. Tom Harrison and National Geographic both put out good maps of our local mountains. Carry them with you. Open them up and practice using them.

MEMORIAL DAY FACTS, TRADITIONS, MEANING, AND MORE

Memorial Day is Monday, May 31! Learn all about Memorial Day, including the true meaning of this day, how it differs from Veterans Day, and why the red poppy is a traditional symbol—with unexpected origins.

WHEN IS MEMORIAL DAY 2021?

This U.S. federal holiday is observed on the last Monday of May to honor the men and women who have died while serving in the military.

WHAT'S THE DIFFERENCE BETWEEN MEMORIAL DAY AND VETERANS DAY?

On both Memorial Day and Veterans Day, it's customary to spend time remembering and honoring the countless veterans who have served the United States throughout the country's history. However, there is a distinction between the two holidays:

Memorial Day commemorates the men and women who died while in the military service of their country, particularly those who died in battle or as a result of wounds sustained in battle. In other words, the purpose of Memorial Day is to memorialize the veterans who made the ultimate sacrifice for their country. We spend time remembering those who lost their lives and could not come home, reflecting on their service and why we have the luxury and freedom that we enjoy today. We might consider how we can support and safeguard their grieving families and loved ones who are left behind.

Veterans Day is the day set aside to thank and honor ALL who served—in wartime or peacetime—regardless of whether they died or survived. Veterans Day is always observed officially on November 11, regardless of the day of the week on which it falls. Read more about Veterans Day.

Remember: Raise the flag with honor and respect! See guidelines for flying the American Flag.

MEMORIAL DAY FACTS AND HISTORY

Traditionally, on Memorial Day (U.S.), people visit cemeteries and memorials, and volunteers often place American flags on each grave site at national cemeteries. A national moment of remembrance takes place at 3:00 p.m. local time. The custom of honoring ancestors by cleaning cemeteries and decorating graves is an ancient and worldwide tradition, but the specific origin of Memorial Day—or Decoration Day, as it was first known—is unclear. In early rural America, this duty was usually performed in late summer and was an occasion for family reunions and picnics. After the Civil War, America's need for a secular, patriotic ceremony to honor its military dead became prominent, as monuments to fallen soldiers were erected and dedicated, and ceremonies centering on the decoration of soldiers' graves were held in towns and cities throughout the nation.

After World War I, the day expanded to honor those who have died in all American wars.

A Lasting Legacy

No less than 25 places have been named in connection with the origin of Memorial Day, and states observed the holiday on different dates. In 1971, Memorial Day became a national holiday by an act of Congress; it is now celebrated annually on the last Monday in May.

Since it all started with the Civil War, you might want to brush up on your knowledge of this event by visiting the Library of Congress Civil War collection, which includes more than a thousand photographs from the time.

WHY IS THE POPPY A SYMBOL OF MEMORIAL DAY?

In the war-torn battlefields of Europe, the common red field poppy (*Papaver rhoeas*) was one of the first plants to reappear. Its seeds scattered in the wind and sat dormant in the ground, only germinating when the ground was disturbed—as it was by the very brutal fighting of World War I.

John McCrae, a Canadian soldier and physician, witnessed the war first hand and was inspired to write the now-famous poem “In Flanders Fields” in 1915. (See below for the poem.) He saw the poppies scattered throughout the battlefield surrounding his artillery position in Belgium.

The Poppy Lady

In November 1918, days before the official end of the war, an American professor named Moina Michael wrote her own poem, “We Shall Keep the Faith,” which was inspired by McCrae’s “In Flanders Fields.” In her poem (also shown below), she mentioned wearing the “poppy red” to honor the dead, and with that, the tradition of adorning one’s clothing with a single red poppy in remembrance of those killed in the Great War was born. Moina herself came to be known—and honored—as “The Poppy Lady.”

The Symbol Spreads Abroad

The wearing of the poppy was traditionally done on Memorial Day in the United States, but the symbolism has evolved to encompass all veterans living and deceased, so poppies may be worn on Veterans Day as well. Not long after the custom began, it was adopted by other Allied nations, including Canada, Australia, New Zealand, and the United Kingdom, where it is still popular today. In these countries, the poppy is worn on Remembrance Day (November 11).

Today, poppies are not only a symbol of loss of life, but also of recovery and new life, especially in support of the servicemen who survived the war but suffered from physical and psychological injuries long after it ended. Read the text of both poems below, and learn more about the inspiration for the poppy here.

“IN FLANDERS FIELDS”

by John McCrae, May 1915

In Flanders fields the poppies blow
Between the crosses, row on row,
That mark our place; and in the sky
The larks, still bravely singing, fly
Scarce heard amid the guns below.

We are the Dead. Short days ago
We lived, felt dawn, saw sunset glow,
Loved and were loved, and now we lie
In Flanders fields.

Take up our quarrel with the foe:
To you from failing hands we throw
The torch; be yours to hold it high.
If ye break faith with us who die
We shall not sleep, though poppies grow
In Flanders fields.

“WE SHALL KEEP THE FAITH”

by Moina Michael, November 1918

Oh! you who sleep in Flanders Fields,
Sleep sweet – to rise anew!
We caught the torch you threw
And holding high, we keep the Faith
With All who died.

We cherish, too, the poppy red
That grows on fields where valor led;
It seems to signal to the skies
That blood of heroes never dies,
But lends a lustre to the red
Of the flower that blooms above the dead
In Flanders Fields.

And now the Torch and Poppy Red
We wear in honor of our dead.
Fear not that ye have died for naught;
We'll teach the lesson that ye wrought
In Flanders Fields.

WALKING SIERRA MADRE - The Social Side

As Memorial Day will be so different again this year, I thought I'd dust off and refurbish my Memorial Day column from last year. Dear friends and neighbors this is my the memory of this day two years ago, and the hope that we will be able to experience it together, without masks, social distancing or fear next year.

It must be fought for, protected, and handed on for them to do the same, or one day we will spend our sunset years telling our children and our children's children what it was once like in the United States where men were free." We believe that a veteran, a person – anyone – has two deaths, once when their breath leaves their body, and the second time is when no one is able to talk about them or say their name. That is why it's important for communities to come out and honor those who paid the ultimate sacrifice. It's really getting the community around remembering those people and making sure that they are never forgotten." Rachel Charles, Acting Director of the National Memorial Cemetery of Arizona

"There have been so many pictures everywhere you look this past weekend (2018), leading up to Monday, Memorial Day, of small flags adorning graves, stretching as far into the horizon as the eye can see, as friends and family of those who gave all gather together to remember. There was one on Facebook that especially touched me of my grandchildren, Nicole, Blake and Luke Simon, at the Los Angeles National Cemetery, to visit the grave of their grandmother, Margaret Ineson, who was a Navy nurse. They were pretty small at the time the photo was taken, which made it so sweet to see.

There were families and children galore at Sierra Madre's own Memorial Day Observance at Pioneer Cemetery. Rev. Thomas Baker of St. Rita's Church, during his invocation said, "Their names may fade with the passing of generations, but never let what they have done be forgotten."

Congresswoman, Judy Chu, spoke with such pride about her father who served during WWII as an Army Radio Communications Sergeant at the Pacific front in Okinawa. She also spoke of her success in finally getting a Veteran's Health Clinic here in the San Gabriel Valley. Judy labored for seven years to achieve this goal and was thrilled to announce that the Department of Veteran Affairs (VA) officially opened a Veteran's healthcare clinic in Arcadia, called the San Gabriel Valley Community Based Outpatient Clinic (CBOC).

Even though this was just the first week of operation, the clinic already had a full schedule of patient visits, offering everything from primary care to telehealth (In case you're wondering what telehealth is, here's the definition: the delivery and facilitation of health and health-related services including medical care, provider and patient education, health information services, and self-care via telecommunications and digital communication technologies.), to basic laboratory services. This is the culmination, the fruition, of years of trying to achieve this goal; VA healthcare right here in the area which is home to more than 45,000 U.S. Veterans. Judy wanted to specially thank our Sierra Madre VFW Post 3208 for their donations and time spent in many meetings working as advocates, raising awareness for this health clinic. These folks were there with her every step of the way in making the VA clinic a reality.

Ms. Chu also presented Certificates of Congressional Recognition to Kenneth Anhalt WWII Veteran, Bud Switzer, Korean Conflict Veteran, Stanley Pinta, Vietnam Veteran, Dave Loera, Vietnam Veteran, and Cindy O'Hara, Post 3208 Commander. Ms. O'Hara quoted General George S. Patton, "It is foolish and wrong to mourn the men who died. Rather we should thank God that such men lived."


It was a beautiful day to be in our Pioneer Cemetery, where my beloved John rests, to thank these Veterans who are still with us and to remember those who have gone before us. As I saw somewhere else this past week, "before you slap burgers on the grill, remember Inchon and Heartbreak Ridge and Chosin Reservoir, where heroic Marines fought to their last breath against overwhelming odds. Remember Khe Sanh and Hamburger Hill. Remember Ramadi and Fallujah and Kandahar. It's easy to forget the fallen, especially on a day when the sun is shining and we are so blessed with the tremendous good fortune to live in peace." (Laurie Roberts, USA Today Network).

With Covid finally becoming less of a threat, we can hope and pray that next year we can meet again at Pioneer Cemetery to remember those who gave all.

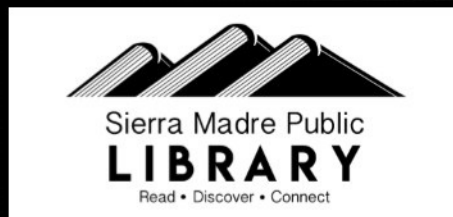

Arrests Made In Shooing of 10 Year Old



Pasadena police announced the arrests of two local men last week in connection with the shooting of a 10-year-old boy as he was playing in his front yard

After a lengthy investigation detectives said they executed search warrants at various locations in the Southern California area and arrested both Joseph Mekhi Knowles a 21-year-old Altadena resident and Tanaj Johnson a 22-year-old Pasadena resident for attempted murder.

According to police, on February 14, at approximately 3:00 pm. officers arrived, on scene, at in the 300 block of Parke St. and found 10-year-old Mario Gabriel Ramirez, who had been struck several times by gunfire.

Police said although conscious and alert when transported to a local hospital by paramedics, Ramirez was suffering from potentially life threatening injuries. He underwent multiple surgeries and was released from the hospital in March.

Preliminary investigation revealed that Knowles and/or Johnson exited a vehicle and fired multiple bullets, striking the victim. The two re-entered their vehicle and fled the area in what was described as a late model, light colored four-door sedan. There is nothing to indicate the 10-year-old was the intended victim police said.

On May 20, with the assistance of the U.S. Marshal's Pacific Southwest Regional Fugitive Task Force Knowles and Johnson were taken into police custody. Pasadena Police Department's Robbery / Homicide Detectives said they believed Knowles and Johnson to be responsible for what was deemed the Valentine's Day shooting.

Police also said that at the time of arrest, additional evidence and items were found connecting the suspects to the shooting were located and collected.

Detectives said the case was presented to the Los Angeles County District Attorney's Office Monday for review. Anyone with information about the shooting should contact Pasadena police detectives at (626) 744-4241.

AmericaFest Returns to the Rose Bowl

Pasadena Councilmember Steve Madison and Darryl Dunn, CEO and General Manager of the Rose Bowl announced Monday that the 95th annual AmericaFest, the largest fireworks event on the west coast, will return to the Rose Bowl Stadium on July 4.

The announcement came during a city council discussion on the financial struggles the stadium faces after not hosting any large scale events over the last year due to Covid-19. Dunn said the Rose Bowl stadium faces a deficit of \$30 million over the next five years. Dune added that the stadium was it debt before the pandemic.

Madison called the news of holding AmericaFest, a coming out for the Rose Bowl to welcome that back to the city.

Dunn said AmericaFest this year will cost \$350,000 something they have already budgeted for. Dunn said that after meeting with city officials earlier this month, in light of financial challenges, everyone was on board.

Councilmember John Kennedy also said that holding the event would give a sense of normalcy but cautioned they need to be cognizant of the cost as it relates to the city's General Fund.

In past years along with more than a ton of special effects fireworks launched from the stadium as part of the Rose Bowl daylong family-friendly event, there has also been freestyle motocross and live music. The Rialto-California based company Pyro Spectaculars by Souza has provided fireworks entertainment.

Officials said that all details still needed to be worked out, such as capacity limit inside the stadium and other Covid-19 health related restrictions. As of now, a free event is set for outside the stadium starting early afternoon with an evening ticketed event inside the stadium. The fireworks would begin at 9 p.m.

National Gun Violence Awareness Day kicks off Wear Orange Weekend, an event held annually in honor of Hadiya Pendleton, a 15-year-old who was shot and killed in Chicago in 2013, just one week after performing at President Obama's 2nd inaugural parade. Orange is the color that Hadiya's friends wore in her honor and is worn throughout the nation to raise awareness about gun violence.

The City of Pasadena encourages community members to wear orange June 4-6 in support of the gun violence prevention movement and to share photos on social media using the hashtag #WearOrange. Pasadena police officers will be wearing orange ribbons on Friday, June 4.

Many local groups are working together to encourage and support efforts to prevent gun violence and save lives, including San Gabriel Valley Moms Demand Action, Students Demand Action, Mothers of Murdered Children, and the All Saints Committee to End Gun Violence. Crowell Public Library

To start, the Library will be open Monday – Wednesday from 10:00 AM to 6:00 PM, Thursday from 10:00 AM – 7:00 PM, and Friday from 10:00 AM to 5:00 PM, though staff is working on a plan to return to normal Library hours very soon. Curbside pickup services will begin to be phased out and will end on June 15, 2021 to allow staff to focus on the Library's return to in-person services. Patrons will be required to wear masks at all times while inside the Library. Public-access computers, as well as furniture, will be spaced out according to the latest health guidelines. 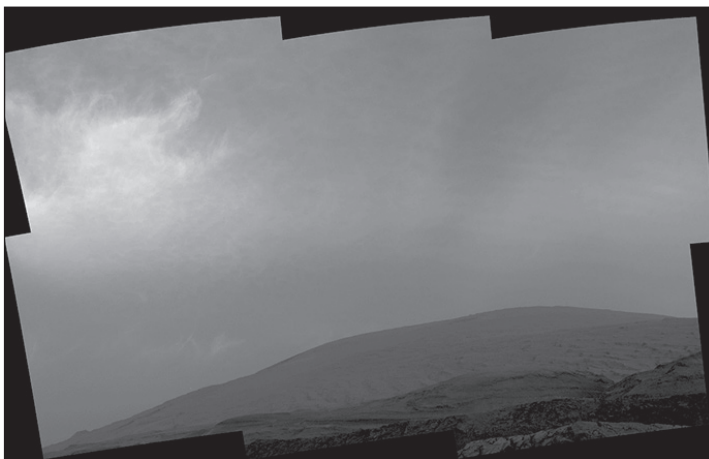

CURIOSITY ROVER CAPTURES SHINING CLOUDS ON MARS



The science team is studying the clouds, which arrived earlier and formed higher than expected, to learn more about the Red Planet.

Cloudy days are rare in the thin, dry atmosphere of Mars. Clouds are typically found at the planet's equator in the coldest time of year, when Mars is the farthest from the Sun in its oval-shaped orbit. But one full Martian year ago – two Earth years – scientists noticed clouds forming over NASA's Curiosity rover earlier than expected.

This year, they were ready to start documenting these “early” clouds from the moment they first appeared in late January. What resulted are images of wispy puffs filled with ice crystals that scattered light from the setting Sun, some of them shimmering with color. More than just spectacular displays, such images help scientists understand how clouds form on Mars and why these recent ones are different.

In fact, Curiosity's team has already made one new discovery: The early-arrival clouds are actually at higher altitudes than is typical. Most Martian clouds hover no more than about 37 miles (60 kilometers) in the sky and are composed of water ice. But the clouds Curiosity has imaged are at a higher altitude, where it's very cold, indicating that they are likely made of frozen carbon dioxide, or dry ice. Scientists look for subtle clues to establish a cloud's altitude, and it will take more analysis to say for sure which of Curiosity's recent images show water-ice clouds and which show dry-ice ones.

The fine, rippling structures of these clouds are easier to see with images from Curiosity's black-and-white navigation cameras. But it's the color images from the rover's Mast Camera, or Mastcam, that really shine – literally. Viewed just after sunset, their ice crystals catch the fading light, causing them to appear to glow against the darkening sky. These twilight clouds, also known as “noctilucent” (Latin for “night shining”) clouds, grow brighter as they fill with crystals, then darken after the Sun's position in the sky drops below their altitude. This is just one useful clue scientists use to determine how high they are.

Even more stunning are iridescent, or “mother of pearl” clouds. “If you see a cloud with a shimmery pastel set of colors in it, that's because the cloud particles are all nearly identical in size,” said Mark Lemmon, an atmospheric scientist with the Space Science Institute in Boulder, Colorado. “That's usually happening just after the clouds have formed and have all grown at the same rate.”

These clouds are among the more colorful things on the Red Planet, he added. If you were skygazing next to Curiosity, you could see the colors with the naked eye, although they'd be faint.

“I always marvel at the colors that show up: reds and greens and blues and purples,” Lemmon said. “It's really cool to see something shining with lots of color on Mars.”

L.A. COUNTY VACCINATIONS KEEP COVID-19 CASES AMONG HEALTHCARE WORKERS LOW

Healthcare workers were the first group in L.A. County to receive COVID-19 vaccinations in December 2020, and since then, COVID-19 cases among healthcare workers plummeted. During the peak, the last week of December, there were nearly 2,000 new cases of COVID-19 among healthcare workers. Last week, there were only 24 new cases among healthcare workers reported across the entire county. Since March, the County has seen less than 50 new cases a week among healthcare workers.

To date, 265 healthcare workers have tragically passed away from COVID-19. At the peak of the surge, the week of January 3, 2021, 24 healthcare workers passed away. In the past month, one healthcare worker has passed away from COVID-19.

Throughout the pandemic nursing facility staff have accounted for one-fourth of healthcare worker cases and fortunately, cases among nursing facility staff also dropped. The week of January 3, 2021 more than 1,100 nursing facility staff tested positive for COVID-19. For the week of May 8, a total of seven nursing facility staff tested positive for COVID-19. Currently, 82% of skilled nursing facility staff are fully vaccinated.

The low cases rate among healthcare workers at nursing homes and at all healthcare facilities reflects their high vaccination rates.

“To those mourning loved ones and friends who have passed away from COVID-19, I send my deepest sympathies,” said Barbara Ferrer, PhD, MPH, MEd, Director of Public Health. “With summer and full re-openings around the corner, there will be increased risk for COVID-19 to spread among unvaccinated people. Millions of people are fully vaccinated, but millions are still not. While substantially lower than the peak, the suffering and deaths that continue to occur among unvaccinated people are, for the most part, preventable because the vaccine provides superior protection. If you are already vaccinated, please encourage your friends and family that are not yet vaccinated, to get protected with the vaccine. Increasing the number of people vaccinated is the path to community immunity.”

COVID-19 vaccinations are available at County-run sites and many community sites without an appointment and many sites are open on weekends and have evening hours. Anyone 12 and older living or working in L.A. County can get vaccinated. Vaccinations are always free and open to eligible residents and workers regardless of immigration status.

CAL FIRE STRESSES SAFETY THIS MEMORIAL DAY WEEKEND

Public asked to take steps to prevent wildfire!

Sacramento – As we roll into the official start of summer, CAL FIRE is urging Californians to be extra cautious this Memorial Day weekend and take steps to help prevent wildfire, drownings, and other accidents.

Since January 1st, CAL FIRE has responded to 2,265 wildfires and more than 195,000 other incidents.

“Approximately 95% of all wildfires in California are caused by human activity, and each year we see disasters that could have been prevented” said Chief Thom Porter, CAL FIRE director. “The dry conditions and increased temperatures throughout the state have created a situation where a fire could easily spark, so we ask everyone to be cautious as they enjoy their time outdoors.”

If you plan on driving to your holiday destination:

- Ensure your vehicle is properly maintained with nothing dragging on the ground, which can cause a spark and potentially a wildfire.
- When towing, make sure trailer chains are properly secured.
- Never drive or pull over into dry grass, which can start a wildfire.

If you are staying around your home:

- If using equipment, check that spark arresters and equipment are in good working condition. Use it prior to 10:00 a.m., and avoid yardwork on hot, dry and windy days.
- Make sure you use the right tool for the job – lawnmowers are for cutting grass only.
- If grilling, never leave the grill unattended and always watch what you grill.

If you plan on going camping:

- Make sure to obtain a campfire permit and check for local fire restrictions.
- If you plan on having a campfire, make sure it is legal to do so. Clear grass, leaves, and other debris within a 10-foot perimeter of the ring.
- Make sure all campfires are completely extinguished before leaving.
- Buy your firewood where you burn it, that way you are not spreading dangerous insects and diseases.

Water drownings increase dramatically during Memorial Day weekend.

- Never swim alone and if you are not a strong swimmer, always wear a life jacket.
- Children should always wear a life jacket in or around water and be supervised by a responsible adult within arm's reach.
- Be particularly cautious of rivers and waterways with rapid currents and never underestimate calm water.
- Drinking while boating/swimming is just as dangerous as drinking and driving on the roadways.

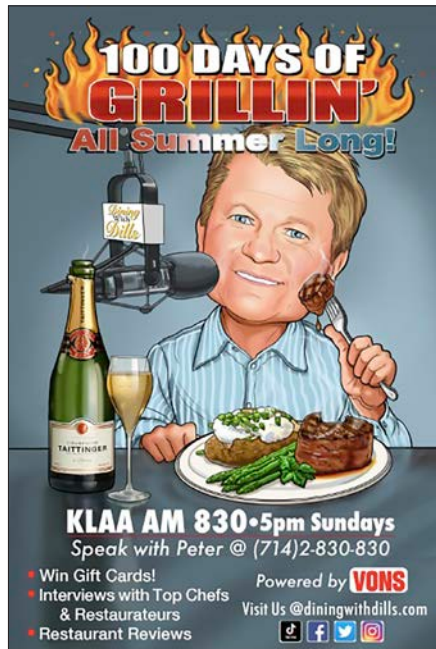

EXIT BURGERS BRING ON THE SEAFOOD

As much as I love a good burger, my waistband was expanding. I have never consumed so many burgers in one month as I did for May -- you know it was National Burger Month, right? Now, June is National Seafood Month and I hope to get some relief (at least my pants certainly do!!!) The Discovery Channel is full of great shows, and I turn to it when I have exhausted my usual programming, such as that critically acclaimed “Dining with Dills”. One show that has increasingly captured my attention is “The Deadliest Catch”. I’m not moving from restaurant reviewer to TV Critic mind you, but there is something about the show that just keeps my interest. I have no idea who the stars are but it appears to me the treacherous weather is one of them. The entire show is dedicated to the life-threatening pursuit of catching crabs off Alaska and the Russian Border, the Baltic Sea to be exact. The ships are equipped with every technical gadget in the business, but like so many things in life, it comes down to instinct, and in this case it is the captain's instinct that directs the ship to fortune, failure or even death. Unlike the “Bachelor,” here I don't have to wade through 10 episodes for the count or the discard, as nearly every episode they are pulling up crabs in five minute intervals. Crew members battle the crippling Eskimo-like conditions and sheer walls of mountainous sea to bring up a treasure chest of crabs that is as welcome as gold to the pirates of a distant age. The season is brief so each mistake, each lost moment of time is magnified as the crew must force themselves through fatigue and lack of sleep to race against the ticking clock. Maybe I find a special delight in the show since I love king crab, but it is more that the show turns my stomach in knots as I watch with childlike fear and anticipation as the crew of the boats challenge the harshest elements of nature. Here is a sample of the show's description: “Relive the dangers, adventures and disasters of the original miniseries. Meet the salty sea captains and greenhorns who risk their lives on the job to earn part of a 90-million dollar King and Opilio Crab payoff. Set sail and learn all about crab fishing.” Yea, that's the whole premise and I can't get enough of it!!! If they are willing to risk their lives for this, I feel obligated to support these courageous soldiers and their imprisoned catch. This week is dedicated to those crews and their delicious prisoners, so let's see where we can catch our own crab and not lose a life or wallet in the process.

King crab legs can be very expensive, so I suggest checking out Vons. Typically, they have a great selection at a very reasonable price. If you are a Costco member they have some of the freshest crab and some of the lowest prices anywhere. On sale you can expect to pay about (\$26.95) per pound. How about crab cakes? If done right they can be very tasty, but many restaurants do not use the traditional method or lack a quality in their crab cake to capture the heightened glory that this dish can achieve. The traditional method is done with Dungeness lump crab meat. Some places in our region are: Fleming's Restaurant, San Marino Seafood, and Ruths Chris. For this crab lover though, the very best crab cake by far is at The Front Runner Restaurant located at the Santa Anita Race Track in Arcadia. There they use real lump crabmeat with a light breaded cover. Sorry just couldn't add the Derby, it's not a snub they just aren't done right. HELPING SENIORS FIND DISCOUNTED HIGH-SPEED INTERNET SERVICES

Dear Savvy Senior:
Do you know where I can find cheaper high-speed internet services for my home? I'm 70-years old and live strictly on my Social Security and would like to find something faster and less expensive than I currently have. Surfing Susan

Dear Susan:
There are actually two new resources available today that can help you save money on your home internet services, but what's available to you will depend on your income level and where you live. Here's where to begin.

Internet Discounts
Depending on your financial situation, a good first step to reducing your home internet costs is through the new Emergency Broadband Benefit (EBB) program. This is a temporary federal benefit that provides a discount of up to \$50 per month towards broadband service for eligible households and up to \$75 per month for households on tribal lands.

Eligible households can also receive a one-time discount of up to \$100 to purchase a laptop, desktop computer, or tablet from participating providers if they contribute \$10 to \$50 toward the purchase price.

To qualify, you'll need to show that your annual household income is at or below 135 percent of the federal poverty guidelines, which is \$17,388 for one person or \$23,517 for two. Or, if you're receiving certain types of government benefits such as Medicaid, food stamps (SNAP), SSI, public housing assistance, veterans' pension or survivors pension benefit, or live on federally recognized tribal lands.

Households that experienced a substantial loss of income since February 29, 2020 due to job loss or furlough can also qualify for the EBB program, as long as their household income for 2020 was at or below \$99,000 for single filers and \$198,000 for joint filers.

To apply, go to [GetEmergencyBroadband.org](https://www.GetEmergencyBroadband.org) where you can apply online or print out an application and mail it in.

If you're already receiving assistance through the federal Lifeline benefit (see [LifelineSupport.org](https://www.LifelineSupport.org)), which is a \$9.25 monthly subsidy for phone or internet costs, you automatically qualify for the EBB program, and you can receive both benefits at the same time. You can apply your EBB and your Lifeline benefit to the same or separate services.

Or, if your broadband provider already has its own low-income or COVID-19 relief program, you may be able to qualify through this program as well. Talk to your broadband provider for more information.

Low-Cost Internet
If you're not eligible for the EBB program, another resource for locating cheaper high-speed internet is Aging Connected, which has a higher income qualification.

Created by Older Adults Technology Services from AARP (OATS) and the Humana Foundation, Aging Connected is a nationwide campaign created to help lower-income seniors find low-cost, in-home broadband options in their area.

Partnering with telecommunications companies, nonprofits and public entities, Aging Connected will help you search for services in your area that provide high-speed internet at a very low cost. Most participating companies charge around \$10 to \$15 per month, with no contract and no equipment fee.

Aging Connected also provides referrals to affordable desktop and laptop computers for under \$160.

To qualify, you'll need to show that your annual household income is at or below 185 percent of the federal poverty guidelines, which is \$23,800 for one person or \$32,200 for two. Or, if you're receiving certain types of government benefits similar to the EBB program.

To search, go to [AgingConnected.org](https://www.AgingConnected.org) and type in your ZIP code, name and email address, or you can call 877-745-1930.

Other Search Options
If you find that you're not eligible for either of the previously listed resources, you may still be able to save on your internet by shopping and comparing. The best way to do this is at websites like [InMyArea.com](https://www.InMyArea.com) and [BroadbandNow.com](https://www.BroadbandNow.com), both of which provide a list of internet providers in your area, along with pricing and download speeds.

IT'S MY TONGUE I'LL WAG IT IF I WANT TO



Like everybody else, I have my share of trouble. It's not that I want to get into trouble, but trouble always seems to be somewhere near where I am at the time. I regret that time when I was first introduced to trouble.

Some trouble I can't prevent. It just happens, and no matter what I do, trouble is in the room. I don't think there's anything I can do about that, but I hope the trouble will not be that bad.

I know some people in my family get into trouble on purpose. The grand goal of their life is to get into trouble on a variety of levels. Back in the day, when we had family reunions, this person, which will remain anonymous, did everything he possibly could to make trouble.

Most of the family just ignored him and forgot what he was doing. He wanted to be remembered as the family troublemaker. Actually, he was remembered as the family Goofball.

Another form of trouble is what people bring on intentionally. For some reason, they want to get into trouble, and get a lot of pleasure out of bullying.

I could never understand this bullying mentality. What does anybody get from bullying somebody else? I remember in school, several guys got a lot of fun out of bullying other kids.

That went on until Miss Ammon, the fifth-grade teacher, showed up. She had her way of unbullying anybody that crossed her path. If she caught you, you were in more trouble than you could handle.

Also, there is the trouble I get in by making a mistake. I didn't mean to do it, but for some reason, I did it, and as everybody knows, there are always consequences. Usually, the consequences aren't worth the trouble.

I've had experience in just about all levels of trouble in one form or another. The steps on the ladder of progress and growth are trouble. If you can handle trouble, you then are progressing in your maturity.

As terrible as all of these things are, one source of trouble outweighs all others. It has taken me a long time to understand the dimensions of this kind of trouble.

What I'm thinking about at this point is my "tongue."

This tongue of mine has been the most significant source of trouble and problems through out my life. As I get older, it seems to get worse.

A preacher friend of mine would talk about one of the older women in his church, and he said, "I often wondered if this woman ever had an unexpressed thought in her life."

I know what he means because I often wondered that about myself.

I have not yet learned that because I'm thinking about something, I do not need to speak it. Thinking doesn't get me in trouble; speaking gets me into deep trouble.

Sometimes when the Gracious Mistress of the Parsonage is speaking to me, I speak out loud without realizing it. Then comes the infamous, "What did you say?"

Whenever I hear this, I know I'm in some kind of trouble. Either I didn't hear it right, or I did hear it right, and I responded.

As a veteran husband, I should understand that she does not expect an answer whenever she asks a question. All she wants from her husband is a positive shaking of the head and a greasy smile.

I know this, but sometimes I forget. If only I could train my tongue when to speak and when not to speak. There are times when that old tongue of mine will wag and wag, getting me into deep trouble.

One morning right after breakfast, I was getting ready to leave when my wife said, "When will you be ready to do that job?"

I looked at her quizzically and said, "What job?"

She stared at me for a moment and then said, "You know. What we were talking about last night as we were watching TV"

I had no idea what she was talking about. I could remember watching TV the night before, but I had no idea what the conversation was about.

As I get older this seems to be more of a problem.

In my dilemma, I thought of a verse of Scripture. "Even so the tongue is a little member, and boasteth great things. Behold, how great a matter a little fire kindleth!" (James 3:5).

SHOULD YOU LEAVE MONEY FOR YOUR SPECIAL NEEDS CHILD IN YOUR WILL?

No, and let me explain why—when planning for a loved one with special needs, you must be extremely careful (and I recommend working with a lawyer experienced in this area), because if handled improperly, you can easily disqualify your loved one with special needs from much-needed government benefits.

Because individuals with special needs often require a lifetime of care, most of them rely on government programs to offset the exorbitant costs of such care. However, these programs have strict income limits, so if you leave money directly to a person with special needs, such as through your will, you risk disqualifying him or her for those benefits.

Instead, the government allows assets to be held in what is known as Special Needs Trusts or Supplemental Needs Trusts to provide complementary financial resources for a specific person for the rest of his or her life, while preserving their access to government benefits.

These trusts allow a beneficiary to receive inheritances, gifts, lawsuit settlements, or other funds without losing eligibility for certain government programs. The trusts are drafted so the assets held in the trust will not be considered to belong to the beneficiary, thereby protecting his or her eligibility for public benefits.

Just as the name implies, Supplemental or Special Needs Trusts are designed not to provide basic support, but instead to pay for extra goods and services that could not be paid for by public assistance funds. Therefore, the assets in these trusts typically pay for things like education, recreation, counseling, and medical attention which go beyond just the simple necessities of life. The beneficiary keeps his or her benefits but maintain a standard of living above that which benefits alone could provide.

However, the rules for these trusts are complicated and such trusts are considered advanced planning techniques, so if you have a loved one with special needs, be sure to do your research and consult with a trusted advisor to make certain that upon your death, your loved one with special needs would have the financial means they need to live a full life, without jeopardizing their access to vital government benefits.

SURVIVAL – FINANCIAL AND OTHERWISE- IN HARD TIMES

How does the average family stay alive financially in a prolonged period of “hard times”?

Hard times come and go, and as an insightful person once said, “No storm stays forever.” True, and yet it’s still a good long-term idea to live frugally and learn how to make many of the things we need. In so much of the “survival literature,” everyone talks about guns, knives, survival kits, food storage, solar power, and all manner of off-the-grid and self-reliant skills and gear. Which is good and necessary, but that’s not all there is to life.

DOES ANYONE “GET RICH QUICK”? For whatever reason, the survivalists rarely talk about the role of money in “survival.” Perhaps this is understandable, however, because there is a major industry out there of people who write books about every imaginable aspect of personal economics. You see them on the television shows and selling tickets to their seminars, telling you that they have a secret to getting rich quick and retiring young. Maybe. Maybe not. The seminars are not cheap, and the few that we’ve attended contained nothing that I’d call a secret. Just lots of practical advice about the changing market, mostly on-line, and if you lay down a few thousand dollars, they will personally guide you down the yellow brick road. I believe that the only ones getting rich are the ones holding the seminars.

So what follows is in no way trying to compete with professional money managers and investment specialists here. This is about some very very basic guidelines for personal economic solvency.

First, please note that everything I say here is about finding ways to live better on less. That means, among other things, getting more mileage out of each dollar. It also means that you should seriously think twice before every purchase. A lot of “stuff” you really will never need, and they will only clutter up your life and deflate your wallet. A deal and discount isn’t always a deal.

EARN MORE OR SPEND LESS There are two ways to improve your economic buying power: Earn more, or spend less. Yes, everyone says they want to do both. OK, good! Spending less is harder than most of us think, especially if we have children who are crying for the latest gadget, toy, and article of clothing that their friends have. Or one spouse of a married couple might be very disciplined, but the other “can’t live without” some trinket or gadget. We get it. We know it’s difficult.

Do whatever you can to cut expenses, and to pay off debt! Whatever!

BEGIN BY CUTTING COSTS First, make a list of all your expenditures, the big ones and the little ones. Write them down so you look at them, objectively as possible. Clearly, some you can eliminate outright! You know what I mean. You might have a 3rd car that just continues to cost money in insurance and storage. Sell it, or give it to charity. It’s a drain.

Most people can figure out the larger things to cut out in order to spend less. It takes a bit more discipline and attention to really cut out the smaller expenses, the ones you think are only a few dollars, but which add up and add up.

Now, let’s explore some ways in which you can generate some extra cash. Remember, these are just basic ideas, and you have to see what works for you, and run with it.

Things you can make and sell If you have the ability to make something that people want, you can probably always have some income from this. Lots of people make soap, and candles, and woven bags, and clothing, and leather goods, etc. As long as you make something that people actually need, you will always have a market for them.

I vividly recall a Native American woman – I believe she was Navajo – talking about how her mother taught her crafts, such as basketry and related crafts. She said that if you can make something and sell it, you’ll never go poor. But she added with a laugh, “but you’ll never get rich either,” alluding to the fact that people want to pay the lowest possible amount for most crafts.

Things you can grow. Food is one of major categories of products that everyone needs. You know, food, clothing, shelter. If you just have a small farm or a backyard garden, you won’t be competing with any of the big chain grocery stores or factory farms. But you can still create a niche product that could provide income for your family. The key is to get to know what’s out there. Be observant to what people are buying in the trendy stores, in the farmers markets, and even on-line. Do you have something that you can grow as a fresh vegetable, fruit, or herb? Can you pack and ship it? Do you know how to can vegetables and jams? You can market your canned goods under your family label, and create at least a local following and demand for your product. I didn’t say you’d get rich doing this – just that you can avoid being poor.

Services you can offer When you’re in the position of needing more income, and you don’t particularly want a full-time job working at someone else’s business, you should make a list of all your skills and talents. Just write them all out on a paper, whatever they may be, both hobbies and trained skills.

Write them all out so you can look at them objectively. What are some of the services that people need, things you can just go and do, assuming you have the skills? Dog walker, dog washer, auto mechanic, cook, can foods for later, gardener, tree pruner, wine maker, electrician, nurse, teacher, editor, musician, wood worker, handy work, roofing, cleaning, sewing and repairing garments, etc. etc. Everyone’s list will be different.

Your job is to decide which of your skills you can market, deciding first on those skills you’d really like to do more often.

Once you make your list of skills and talents, then you circle the top three that you want to pursue. Then, you make another list of at least three ways you can move forward in presenting your skills to the public with each of your chosen three talents. That means you must actually see where someone will hire you or pay for your services. Then you have to advertise in every way you can, preferably starting with all the possible free advertising.

How to sell your products in the neighborhood. Start your business enterprise in your own immediate neighborhood. You can talk to neighbors and give them a flier about what you sell and how they can acquire your services. Make it easy for people to say “yes.” We have engaged our neighbors in numerous home businesses, beginning with selling eggs door to door when we had many chickens. We’ve also sold potted plants, edible cactus, and fruits in this same manner. We’ve sold sewing and cleaning services this way. In addition, since we began organizing a local Neighborhood Watch, we got to know all our neighbors and began working with them.

One of my associates reported that when he lived in a small rural town, it was common to offer canned goods, produce, repair services, plumbing and electrical services, and auto repair at discounted prices to neighbors. Of course, the economics of a small town is very different than living in a city for some very obvious reasons.

opened his mouth which was probably filled with cheese burgers and diet Coke. I realize that I was completely absorbed by the spectacle of Trump.

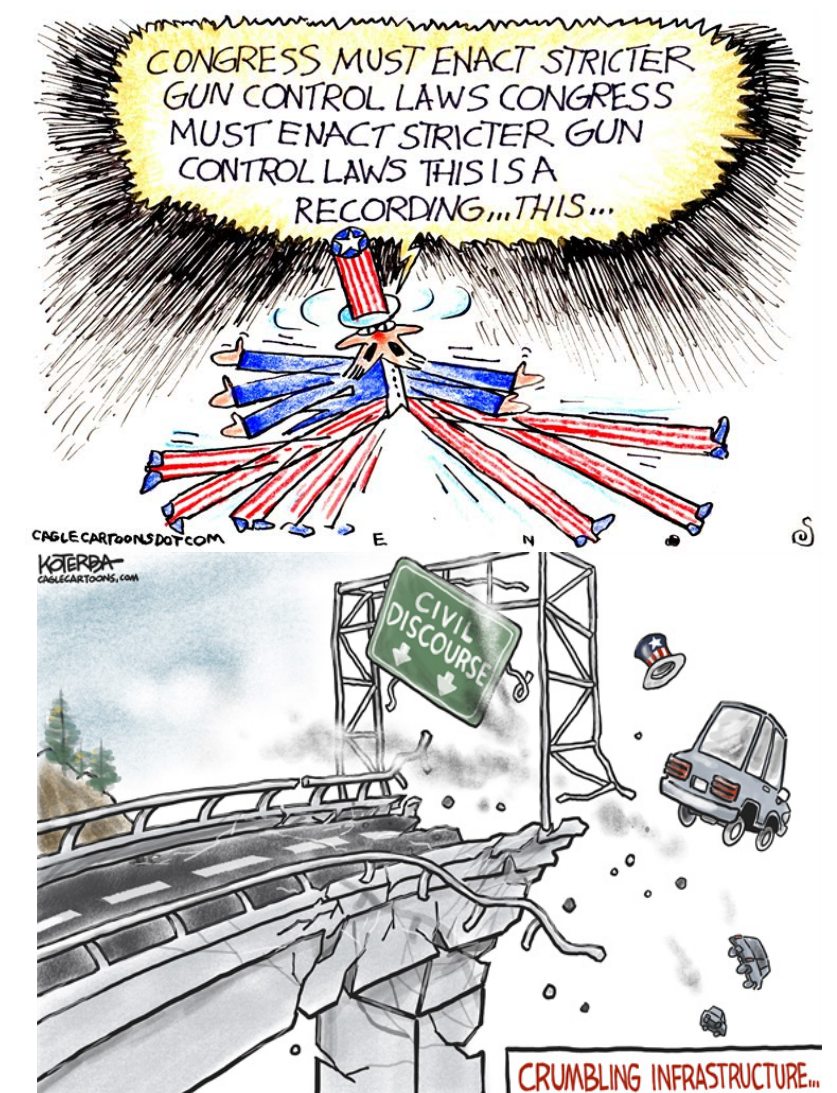
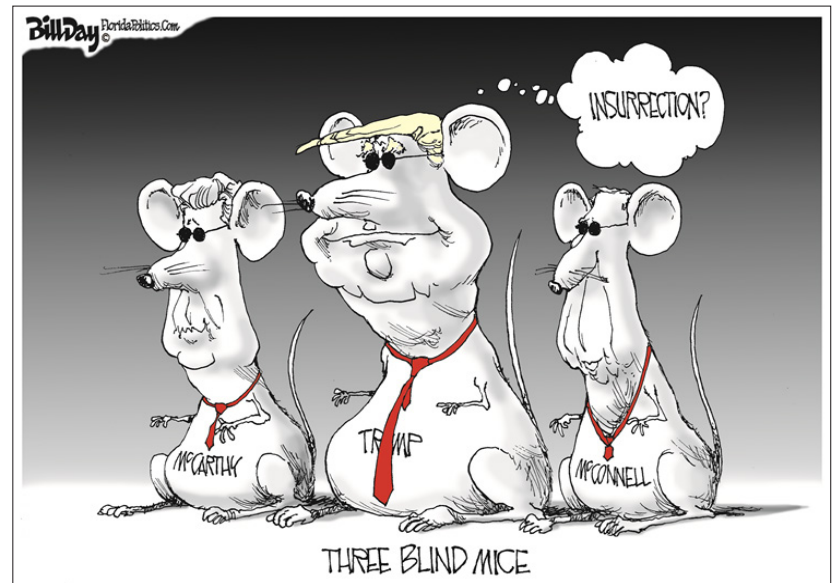

RIP JOHN WARNER, A REPUBLICAN WHO WORKED ACROSS THE AISLE. IMAGINE THAT.

John Warner, a Republican who served in the U.S. Senate for 30 years and died Wednesday at 94 in his home state of Virginia, said this about his Democratic colleagues: "We had political disagreements and fought on the Senate floor.

But at day's end we shared a drink, talked as friends, and we found common cause, solving problems and serving the American public."

Jeez. Now there's a sentiment that belongs in a time capsule, along with rotary phones and videocassettes.

He was fortunate to retire in 2009. Imagine how he would've felt sharing the chamber with insurrectionist goons like Ted Cruz and Josh Hawley. As a veteran of two wars who cared deeply about the credibility of Congress, imagine how he would've felt being forced to breathe the same air as Matt Gaetz and Marjorie Taylor Greene.

The species of Republican willing to work across the aisle has been dying and retiring for many years now - Arlen Specter, Richard Lugar, John Chafee, it's a very long list - but Warner deserves some special attention, not just because he's one of the last to depart, not just because he was a glamour guy who was married to Liz Taylor (husband #6), but because he stood up to the right-wing zealots when it mattered most.

It might be enough to simply point out that Warner, in retirement, recognized Donald Trump's twisted treachery from a mile away - and signaled early support for Hillary Clinton. But that was a comparatively easy call because in 2016 he was no longer had to face the voters. In truth, he indulged his country-over-party instincts decades earlier.

A former Navy Secretary under Richard M. Nixon, he won his Senate seat in 1978 and dutifully hewed to the GOP line most of the time. But in that era when it was still possible for a Republican to put country first, he did so without quaking in his boots.

When it became clear that gun violence was a national epidemic, he infuriated the rabid right by voting for gun-safety measures and trying (without success) to extend the federal ban on assault weapons. He voted for some restrictions on abortion, but accepted that Roe v. Wade was the law of the land.

Warner had supported George W. Bush's decision to invade Iraq, but in 2007 he called for Bush to start bringing the troops home, and he compelled Pentagon officials to testify about the torture of detainees at the Abu Ghraib prison. He opposed gay marriage, but when the chairman of the Joint Chiefs denounced gays in the military, Warner said: "I respectfully, but strongly, disagree with the chairman's view that homosexuality is immoral."

But arguably Warner's most laudable moment came in 1994, when it appeared that Oliver North would become his Virginia colleague in the Senate. North, you may recall, was the key Iran-Contra scandal operative who'd been criminally convicted for lying to Congress; naturally, Virginia right-wingers deified North as a hero and rewarded him with a Senate GOP nomination.

Warner refused to pledge tribal fealty and declared that North was unfit for public office. He helped save his Democratic colleague, Chuck Robb, by endorsing an independent bid by moderate Republican Marshall Coleman. That November, the GOP vote was split and Robb survived. Home-state conservatives hated Warner's blasphemy, and tried to oust him in a 1996 Senate primary, but he didn't bend and he didn't lose.

What he said was this: "I sure risked my political future, that's for sure. But I'd rather the voters of this state remember that I stood on my principle...That's the price of leadership."

If only the MAGA rabble in today's Senate could fathom the meaning of his words and honor his legacy. Or at least thank him for his service. I just did.
