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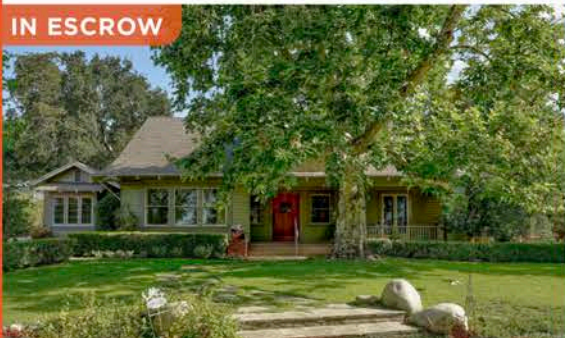
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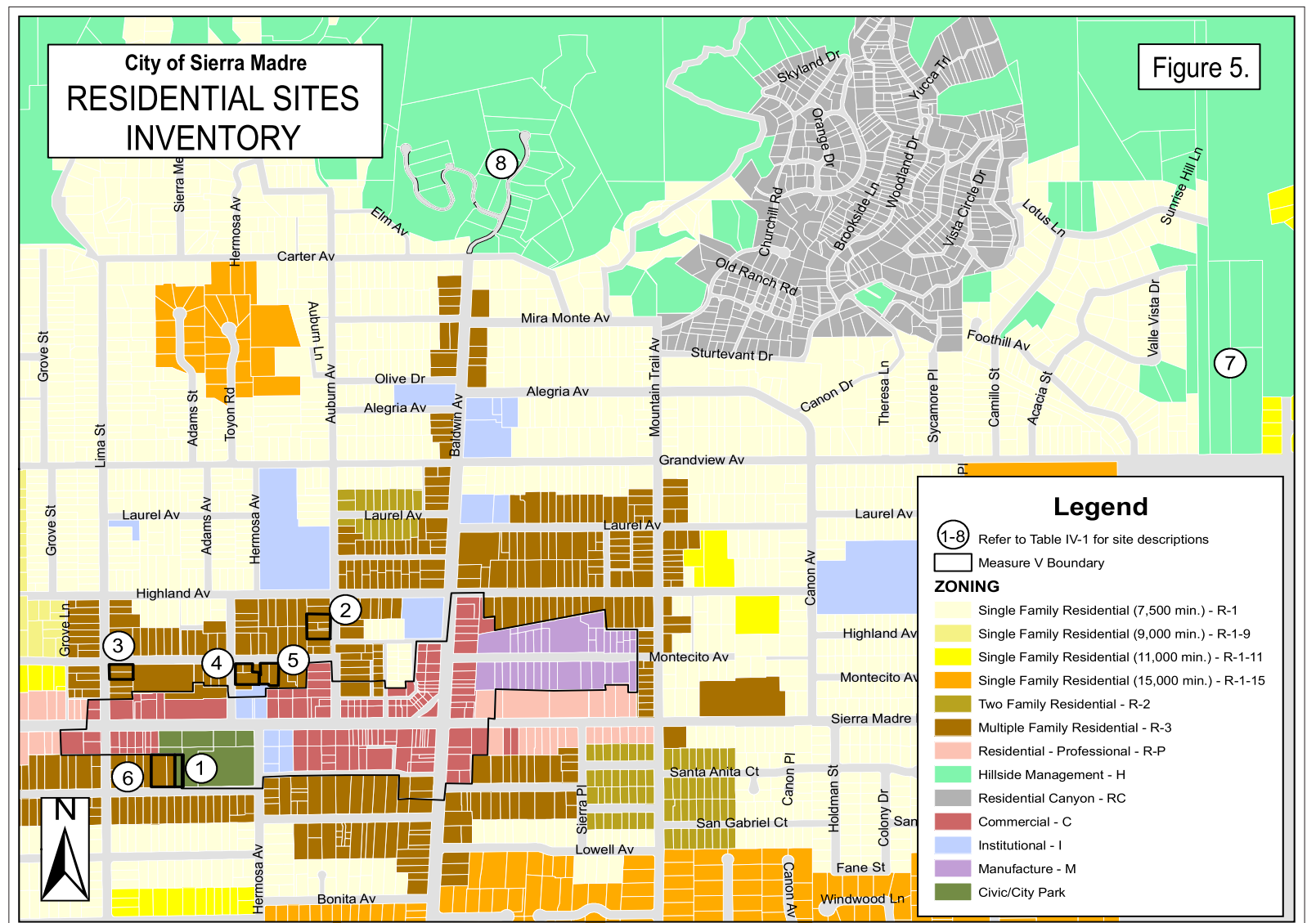
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TWO LAWS THAT COULD CHANGE SIERRA MADRE FOREVER ARE MOVING FORWARD IN SACRAMENTO



Areas on this map that range in color from pale yellow to orange are currently zoned for Single Family Homes. All that could change under SB9 and SB10.

While many residents are concerned with the size, quantity and scope of already proposed development projects such as The Meadows at Bailey Canyon (a potential of 42 single family homes on land that is currently undeveloped at the retreat center) or the seemingly never-ending legal entanglements of Stonegate (formerly 1 Carter) or even the rarely spoken of Stonehouse Development, elected officials in Sacramento are steadily eroding away Sierra Madre's ability to control its character when it comes to housing and density.

Local Authority over most Design/Review already usurped

Two laws which became effective and enforceable on January 1st, 2019 and January 1st 2020 have already diminished local government's abil-

ity to approve certain types of development such as transitional housing units, halfway houses, etc. These items no longer require approval of the city's planning commission or development department.

This Week SB9 and SB10 Approved in California Assembly

SB9 which will essentially eliminate R1 (single family zoning), has been described as an "effort to replace lots zoned for single family homes with lots that can accommodate up to 14 units - all without local Planning Commission review and neighbor input."

SB10 will allow jurisdictions to arbitrarily override citizen-approved local zoning ballot initiatives, Environmental Quality Act laws, and city

general plans that protect communities from overreaching land development.

This week, both SB9 and 10 passed in the Assembly with a few changes that have been predicted to be adopted by the Senate. It is anticipated that within days, the measures will be sent to the Governor for signing.

The question then has to be asked, what's next for Sierra Madre. In the map shown below, you will note that the majority of land use in Sierra Madre is for single family homes. Without local authority over land use, who can predict what Sierra Madre will look like in the next 10 years?

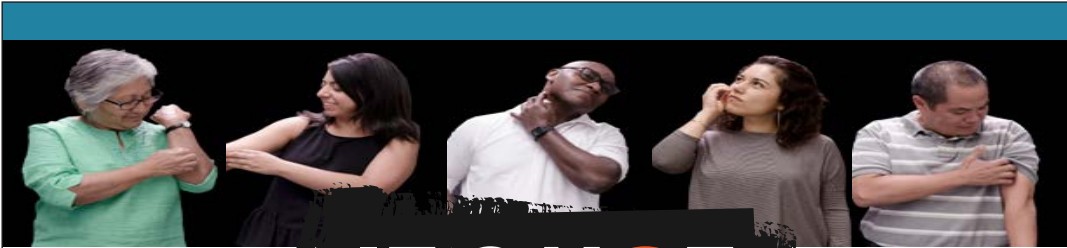

Two all-beef patties, special sauce, lettuce, cheese, pickles, onions on a sesame seed bun.

"Hold the pickles, hold the lettuce, special orders don't upset us, all we as is that you let us serve it your way. Have it your way! Have it your way!"

Could you ever forget Clara Peller, who at age 81 became the star of the Wendy's commercials demanding, "Where's the beef!"

My current favorite burger is a cheeseburger with bacon and a fried egg. With sweet potato fries and Ranch dressing on the side, Mayo on the burger and never, ever catsup! 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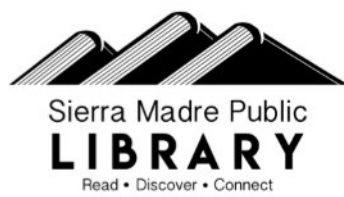

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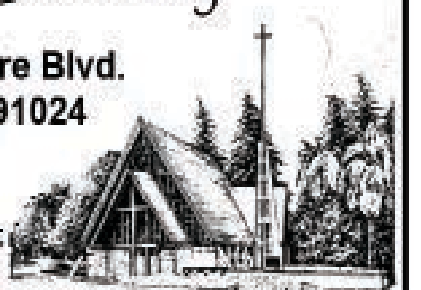

Construction Begins on New Park

City of Pasadena workers started construction last week on a new park and parking lot located at 701 E. Union St. in Playhouse Village. City officials have also turned to the public to officially name the park.

“It’s wonderful to finally see this project underway,” said Mayor Victor M. Gordo. “I’d like to congratulate all who have been involved in this project from beginning. This new park is a reminder that we in Pasadena value open space, and value the look and feel of our city.”

Just over an acre in size, the park will cover approximately two-thirds of the site, while the parking lot will cover the other third. The park itself will feature a shaded children’s play area, a dog run with separate areas for large and small dogs, a large central green grass area, and a restroom building that contains two all-gender restrooms. Designed with safety and security in mind, the park will also feature low shrubs, allowing greater visibility; benches and seating designed to discourage loitering; and ample lighting throughout.

The park’s parking lot has been designed to integrate with the park’s design and will give way to pedestrian traffic from Union Street. The parking lot will have 48 parking spaces, including four electric vehicle-charging stations.

The grand opening of the new park is slated to take place in the summer of 2022.

The park does not have an official name yet. Over the last few weeks, officials are encouraging community members to visit their website and submit their own recommendations. From these recommendations, city staff will compile a list of names that meet at least one of the four criteria outlined in the city’s Public Park and Recreation Facility Naming Policy and will share a second survey on September 6 asking the community members to vote for their preferred choice. After votes are tallied and reviewed by the Recreation and Parks Commission, a recommendation of the park’s official name will be presented to city council for consideration.

Back in 2012, the city council approved the purchase of the Banner Bank property, and \$3.15 million of Residential Impact Fees was appropriated for development of the park. The transfer of up to one-half of the Union and El Molino parking lot parcel was approved by the city council for park use in 2019.

The Pasadena Tournament of Roses announced Thursday the 18 equestrian groups to ride in the 133rd Rose Parade themed “Dream. Believe. Achieve.”

Equestrians participating in the Rose Parade showcase a variety of breeds, as well as unique tack and costumes. All riders must have previous parade riding experience. In addition to riding in the five and a half mile-long Rose Parade route on Saturday, these equestrian groups will also take part in Equestfest on Wednesday, December 29, at the Los Angeles Equestrian Center. During Equestfest, groups perform trick riding, drills, dancing and roping skills, and attendees can walk through the stables and speak with the riders.

Arrest Made in July 4 Shooting

Pasadena police announced Monday the arrests of two suspects wanted in connection with a shooting on July 4 into a occupied building just blocks from the Langham Hotel.

According to police, on July 4 at about 12:30 a.m., officers from the Pasadena Police Department responded to the 1300 block of Ridge Way regarding a “Shots Fired” call. Upon arrival, officers discovered evidence of a shooting and determined unknown suspects had fired into an inhabited dwelling. No persons were injured as a result of the shooting officers said.

Detectives from the Pasadena Police Department’s Robbery / Homicide Unit immediately began an investigation into this shooting incident. As their comprehensive investigation progressed, detectives identified two suspects believed to be responsible for the gun violence.

On August 19 personnel from Pasadena police officers executed a search warrant at a residence located in the City of San Dimas. During the operation, 34-year old Kimberly Ann Troncoso and 26-year old Jay Aaron Castillo were arrested in relation to the shooting. Items of evidence, including multiple firearms, were located and recovered during the execution of the search warrant. On Monday the Los Angeles County District Attorney’s office filed one felony charge against Troncoso and Castillo for Penal Code 246 – Shooting at an Inhabited Dwelling. Troncoso is being held on a \$250,000 bail and Castillo is being held on a \$260,000 bail.

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CalTech Town Hall: Return to Campus, Vaccination, More



Campus leaders discussed Caltech’s response to the COVID-19 Delta variant, outlined the return to campus plan, and addressed questions posed by community members at a virtual town hall meeting on Monday.

Almost 1,000 students, faculty, and staff, some connecting from as far away as Japan, Romania, Lebanon, and Germany, joined to hear the panel discussion, which was moderated by Provost David Tirrell.

In opening the town hall, President Thomas F. Rosenbaum said, “The pandemic continues to evolve and our response continues to evolve, which makes this virtual gathering so important.”

He went on to note that, while research labs on campus have been “running essentially at full occupancy and have been since the spring,” and that “the pace of discovery has continued with the characteristic Caltech warp speed,” it is the return of students to campus and the transition to in-person learning that will transform the campus once again.

“Our mission as an educational institution and the start of fall term is what sets the timeline for the broad return to campus for faculty and staff and students,” Rosenbaum said.

Tirrell addressed the Institute’s pandemic planning and response efforts, noting that the Delta variant has led to an acceleration of efforts to reach full vaccination status across campus. To that end, the Institute will require confirmation of full vaccination for entry to campus buildings, “a measure that we had not anticipated several months ago when infection numbers nationwide were significantly lower.”

Other impacts of the Delta variant, Tirrell said, required developing a plan to “reduce density in our classrooms in the fall, probably to less than half of what it would ordinarily be,” and to teach remotely those classes where density cannot be adequately reduced but with an in-person component in all instances. For example, in cases where larger lecture courses are remote, section meetings would be held in person. “The Institute position is that as many of our instructional activities as possible should be conducted in person, consistent with safety guidelines,” he said.

Tirrell said that despite changes to the details of the return-to-campus plan, September 7 is “the date by which the campus should be positioned for the start of an in-person academic year.” That said, he noted, the campus has been repopulating throughout the summer; card-swipe data shows that, while approximately 2,000 individuals were regularly accessing campus in the spring, approximately 3,300 are doing so now.

“I should also emphasize that we are expecting to allow some level of remote work in the fall,” he added, “and so, on any given day, there will be people working remotely, and the overall density on campus will not be what it was prior to the pandemic.”

Jennifer Howes, assistant vice president for student affairs and wellness, spoke about the Institute’s surveillance testing program for all students as well as for other unvaccinated community members and announced that the program, which operates from a campus laboratory, would be offered on an opt-in basis for vaccinated community members beginning on August 30. “We have had a lot of community interest, and we are now able to offer this more broadly,” she said, adding that “participation in the surveillance program is not a substitute for vaccination.”

In addition, Howes discussed the contact tracing process and the process for isolating those students who test positive for SARS-CoV-2, the response for those who are exposed to an infected individual, and plans regarding vaccine boosters.

“In line with the vaccination mandate, we anticipate that boosters that are recommended by the CDC will be required for all students and employees once they are readily available,”

she said. “The same exemption process that we have now will apply. ...The Institute is exploring options for on-campus clinics for boosters and will provide that information as soon as it’s available.”

Howes reminded those in attendance about the masking policies in residences and indoor spaces on campus. “It is also really challenging for folks who are in the public-facing positions, such as in our dining or library facilities, to constantly remind people to wear masks. We just ask that everybody continue to do so and treat one another with respect,” she said. “That’s one of our community values. That shared commitment is really important as we continue to fight this virus.”

Kevin Gilmartin, vice president for student affairs, spoke about the virus’s impact on campus life and the residential experience, emphasizing that, “as we return to fully populated undergraduate residences, our approach to any kind of formal program will be cautious and gradual.” Specifically, he said, Convocation will be entirely remote, and orientation and rotation will likely include hybrid events, “taking advantage of outdoor spaces wherever that is possible.”

“Both orientation and rotation are currently planned as in-person events that can be scaled up or down,” he added, “and, as the time approaches, we will assess public health conditions and campus infection rates, and make a final decision that will maximize the value of the student experience while still prioritizing community safety. In all of our planning, I should stress that the aim is to get our undergraduate students safely back into their residential communities after more than a year away. We want our students to be able to return to campus learning and research.”

In addition, Gilmartin noted that an increase in the number of outdoor spaces with seating and shading that has occurred over the past several months will allow for small unmasked groups to gather. “We are also working on plans to possibly create outdoor tented spaces so that students and other members of the community can have the chance to gather socially,” he said.

Julia McCallin, associate vice president for human resources, addressed questions regarding return to work for employees, with a focus on how groups across the Institute have been assessing and ultimately structuring their operations models to support the return of Caltech’s residential learning community. She noted that as we move into the fall, some types of hybrid work arrangements and staggered scheduling might be possible. “Over the last four to five months,” she said, “we have worked with our managers and supervisors to provide them the tools to evaluate their work requirements and for them to make informed decisions on whether remote work or a combination of remote and on-site work is feasible for the business needs of their organization.”

McCallin also pointed to the availability of the state’s “COVID sick leave” for individuals who either become infected or need to isolate or care for others with the virus. That leave pool is available through September 30, she said, adding that if the program is not again extended, Caltech has a generous sick leave policy and a Disability and Leave Administration Unit that can work with employees to address specific concerns.

In closing the town hall meeting, Rosenbaum said: “All of us hoped that we would not still be having these kinds of discussions but, just as before, I have every confidence that we will be able to pull together as a community and get through these challenges safely while successfully fulfilling our mission of discovery and education in service of society. We have done it before; we will continue to do it.”

The letter led by Reps. Schiff, Swalwell and Lieu is signed by 25 members of the California delegation, it reads, in part: Dear President Biden:

As concerned Members of the California congressional delegation, we write to express our urgent concern for the safe relocation of Afghan refugees and Special Immigrant Visa (SIV) applicants and voice our strong support for the placement of these vulnerable individuals fleeing Afghanistan in our state. We are indebted to our Afghan partners, many of whom aided the U.S. military and diplomatic efforts as translators, drivers, contractors,



and allies in the region. They saved American lives, and it is of the utmost importance that we utilize every tool at our disposal to protect them and provide them safe harbor.

Since 2001, over 60,000 Afghan national military and police have given their lives to protect our freedom. Countless Afghan interpreters, cultural advisors, journalists, and other partners have served alongside American troops over the past two decades, putting their lives at risk for our soldiers. Now those individuals face persecution and death threats from the Taliban because of their service with our country. It is incumbent upon us to protect our Afghan partners and their families by ensuring their safe and rapid evacuation from Afghanistan. Police Asks Public To Stay Safe Labor Day Weekend

No matter how you choose to celebrate the end of summer and Labor Day weekend, make sure you do so responsibly. Take the necessary precautions to protect yourself and your family by buckling up, ditching the distractions, following the speed limit, and never driving impaired.

To help keep our community safe during the busy late summer and Labor Day weekend travel season, Pasadena Police Department will have additional officers on patrol through Labor Day, Sept. 6, looking for drivers suspected of driving under the influence of alcohol and/or drugs. The increased efforts to address impaired driving are part of the national Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over campaign.

“Driving impaired is risky and puts yourself and others around you in serious danger,” Pasadena police Lt. Anthony Russo said. “If you are taking a road trip over the next few weeks, make good choices and drive like your closest friends and family are in the cars around you.”

Forty-five people were killed in crashes throughout California over the 2019 Labor Day holiday, and the California Highway Patrol (CHP) made more than 1,000 arrests for driving under the influence during the 78-hour Labor Day weekend enforcement period.

Driving while impaired is not just from alcohol. Prescription drugs, over-the-counter medications, and marijuana may also impair your driving. If you plan on drinking or taking medications with a driving warning label, let someone who is sober drive. If you see someone who is driving impaired, call 9-1-1.

NASA’s Perseverance Plans Next Rock Sample Attempt

The rover will abrade a rock this week, allowing scientists and engineers to decide whether that target would withstand its powerful drill.

In its search for signs of ancient microbial life on Mars, NASA’s Perseverance rover is once again preparing to collect the first of many rock core samples that could eventually be brought to Earth for further study.

This week, a tool on the rover’s 7-foot-long (2-meter-long) robotic arm will abrade the surface of a rock nicknamed “Rochette,” allowing scientists to look inside and determine whether they want to capture a sample with the rover’s coring bit. Slightly thicker than a pencil, the sample would be sealed in one of the 42 remaining titanium tubes aboard the rover.

Should the team decide to acquire a core from this rock, the sampling process would be initiated next week.

The mission attempted to capture their first record of the crater floor on Aug. 6 from a rock that ultimately proved too crumbly, breaking into powder and fragments of material too small to be retained in the sample tube before it was sealed and stored within the rover.

Perseverance has since trucked 1,493 feet (455 meters) to a ridge nicknamed “Citadelle” – French for “castle,” a reference to how this craggy spot overlooks Jezero Crater’s floor. The ridge is capped with a layer of rock that appears to resist wind erosion, a sign that it’s more likely to hold up during drilling.

“There are potentially older rocks in the ‘South Séitah’ region ahead of us, so having this younger sample can help us reconstruct the whole timeline of Jezero,” said Vivian Sun, one of the mission’s scientists at NASA’s Jet Propulsion Laboratory in Southern California.

The team has added a step to the sampling process for this coming attempt: After using its Mastcam-Z camera system to peer inside the sample tube, the rover will pause the

sampling sequence so the team can review the image to ensure a rock core is present. Once a sample is confirmed, they will command Perseverance to seal the tube.

Although the pulverized rock eluded capture in the initial sample-acquisition effort, the first sample tube still contains a sample of Martian atmosphere, which the mission had originally planned to acquire at a later time.

“By returning samples to Earth, we hope to answer a number of scientific questions, including the composition of Mars’ atmosphere,” said Ken Farley, Perseverance’s project scientist at Caltech in Pasadena, California. “That’s why we’re interested in an atmospheric sample along with rock samples.”

While atop Citadelle, Perseverance will use its subsurface radar, called RIMFAX – short for Radar Imager for Mars’ Subsurface Experiment – to peer at rock layers below it. The top of the ridge will also provide a great vantage point for Mastcam-Z to look for other potential rock targets in the area. More About the Mission

A key objective for Perseverance’s mission on Mars is astrobology, including the search for signs of ancient microbial life. The rover will characterize the planet’s geology and past climate, pave the way for human exploration of the Red Planet, and be the first mission to collect and cache Martian rock and regolith (broken rock and dust).

Subsequent NASA missions, in cooperation with ESA (European Space Agency), would send spacecraft to Mars to collect these sealed samples from the surface and return them to Earth for in-depth analysis.

The Mars 2020 Perseverance mission is part of NASA’s Moon to Mars exploration approach, which includes Artemis missions to the Moon that will help prepare for human exploration of the Red Planet.

JPL, which is managed for NASA by Caltech, built and manages operations of the Perseverance rover.

CITY APPROVES DROUGHT PLAN

Watering days will depend on even or odd numbered street addresses.

The Pasadena City Council unanimously approved a proposal last week to implement the Level 2 Water Supply Shortage Plan under the Pasadena Municipal Code and to establish a voluntary water reduction target of 15 percent which aligns with the state's reduction goal.

According to a statement, as part of the Pasadena Municipal Code, the Level 2 Water Supply Shortage Plan restricts outdoor watering to two days per week from April to October and one day per week from November to March.

To balance the water demand on the city's water system and to prevent all properties from watering on the same days, the following alternating watering schedule was approved:

Even-numbered street addresses are limited to watering only on Mondays and Thursdays with Odd-numbered street addresses limited to watering only on Tuesdays and Fridays

As the water supply situation throughout the state of California continues to worsen, with less rain forecasted and water sources dwindling, Pasadena is poised to take the necessary steps to preserve its limited water supplies to meet the community's drinking water needs.

"We are not looking for lawns to go brown. Often, over watering occurs when the homeowner does not realize they had

a broken sprinkler head or the duration of their watering is too long. We are hoping to educate customers that outdoor water use makes up more the majority of an average household's water use. A good amount of water can be saved by replacing leaks, using efficient sprinkler heads, or installing drip irrigation," said City Manager Steve Mermell. "Having our own water and power utility helps us to understand community needs. The City recently introduced the Water Savers Team, which consists of water conservation specialists who visit locations throughout town where there have been reports of water waste and help evaluate households on how they can improve their outdoor watering situation," Mermell added. In the past three months, the PWP Water Savers have reached more than 3,000 customers.

In addition to educating customers, Pasadena Water and Power (PWP) has plans to collaborate with its largest commercial water irrigation customer to determine if an efficient water use plan can be established to help meet the city's water conservation target.

Approximately 60 percent of Pasadena's water comes from imported water sources supplied by the Metropolitan Water District—which they also declare a Water Supply Alert. The move to "alert" status is a call for the region to safeguard storage reserves and for water agencies to do their part to reduce water use.

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L.A. COUNTY TO UPDATE HEALTH OFFICER ORDER TO BOLSTER CONTACT TRACING EFFORTS

During recent visits, STAT educators found that schools with significant safety enhancements have broad support within the school community for promoting/implementing masking guidance. They also have symptom pre-screening tools that allow for early detection of sick students, consistent COVID-19 screening testing programs, and signage campus-wide to remind staff and students about safety, mask-ing, distancing, and sanitation. Meanwhile, areas for improvement at many schools included preventing crowded situations, creating safety compliance teams, identifying space to use as isolation rooms, and implementing mealtime-specific prevention strategies. Additionally, teams noted the potential for im-proved communication with parents and faculty about testing and vaccination opportunities and case identification and contact tracing requirements. Many schools would also benefit from more signage, updated reopening protocols and sharing those with the entire school community, and increased disin-fecton in shared spaces.

Public Health teams plan to add additional support to schools to assist with contact tracing and appro-priate quarantining of students and staff. As a reminder, fully vaccinated students and staff at K-12 schools are not required to quarantine as long as they remain asymptomatic during the 14-day quarantine period. Public Health will be sending County staff to schools that identify large numbers of exposed students to help manage quarantining of students and staff, recognizing how stressful and disruptive quarantining is to a stable learning environment and to parents/caregivers.

Participating in contact tracing is critical for ensuring that close contacts get notified that they may have been exposed and need to quarantine to prevent infecting other people if they become infected. This week, Los Angeles County will update the County Health Officer Order to require everyone who receives an isolation order to call Public Health within 24 hours of receiving the order to participate in a case in-vestigation and contact tracing interview, unless they have already been interviewed by Public Health.

It is important to note that identifying close contacts of a confirmed case is always required in all set-tings, including workplaces, social gatherings, and places of worship, to try to identify and inform those who may be at risk of infection and of spreading COVID-19. Isolation and quarantine are very effective at reducing transmission if implemented in a timely manner.

In K-12 school settings countywide over the week of August 16 through 22, 3,186 new cases were report-ed, many from LAUSD, where everyone is tested weekly, with the second highest number coming from other K-12 schools in L.A. County. The overwhelming majority of school sites with cases reported only one case. However, 15 LAUSD and 48 other school sites reported 2 cases, and 84 LAUSD and 39 other school sites reported 3 or more cases.

It is worth noting that of the 14 school outbreaks that opened in August, half were associated with school sports. Because youth sports programs are high-risk environments for COVID-19 transmission, Public Health has issued requirements and best practices for youth sports leagues. L.A. County's current youth sports guidance attempts to align with CDC while not precluding those not vaccinated from engaging in high-risk sports or extracurricular activities and instead adding in layers of protection.

EVERYONE*, regardless of vaccination status, must wear a mask:

- In all indoor public settings, venues, gatherings, and public and private businesses in Los Angeles County
- On planes, trains, buses, ferries, taxis and ride-shares, and all other forms of public transport
- In transportation hubs like airports, bus terminals, train stations, marinas, seaports or other ports, subway stations, or any other area that provides transportation
- Healthcare settings (including long-term care facilities)
- State and local correctional facilities and detention centers.
- Shelters and cooling centers
- Indoors at any youth-serving facility (such as K-12 schools, childcare, day camps, etc.)
- In any outdoor location where it is the policy of the business or venue

Recommendations

- It is strongly recommended that you wear a mask at private indoor social gatherings with people outside your household, unless everyone at the gathering is fully vaccinated.
- It is strongly recommended that you wear a mask at large outdoor ticketed events when you are not in your seat. For example, while in line to enter, exit, use the bathroom, or buy food, or drinks.
- If you are not fully vaccinated, it is strongly recommended that you wear a mask in crowded outdoor settings.
- If you are in a setting where you are in sustained close contact with other people who may not be fully vaccinated, consider wearing a higher level of protection, such as wearing two masks (double masking) or a respirator (e.g., N95 or KN95). This is especially important if you are not fully vaccinated and are in an indoor or crowded outdoor setting.

Note: You are allowed to take off your mask while you:

- Actively eating or drinking as long as you are sitting or standing in a specific place such as a table or counter.
- Alone in a separate room or office.
- Showering or swimming.
- Performing or receiving personal hygiene or personal care services (like a facial or shave) that cannot be done without removing your mask.

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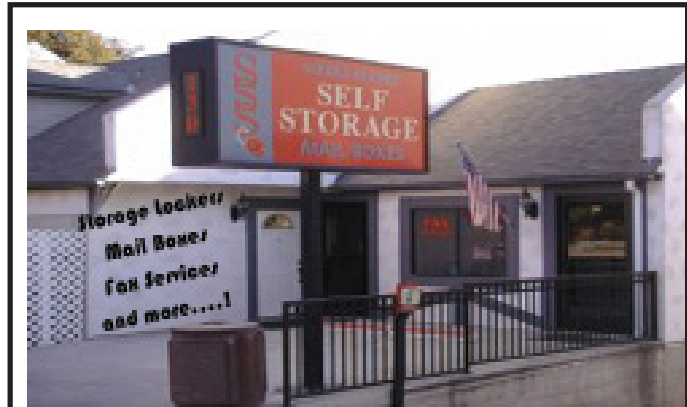
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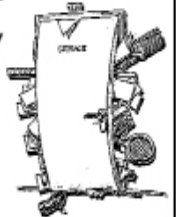
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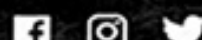
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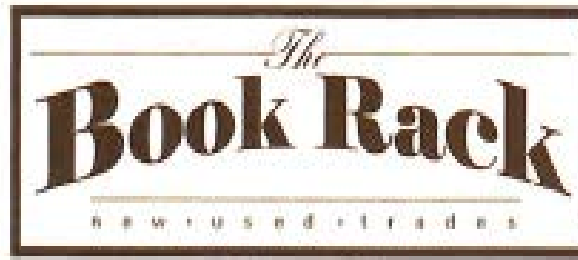
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PASADENA UNIFIED BOARD OF EDUCATION TAKES SWEEPING ACTION TO ADDRESS COVID

PUSD to Require Weekly COVID-19 Tests for Students Under Age 12,

Proof of COVID-19 Vaccine for Students 12 and older or Weekly Tests with informed con-sent from parents/guardians

Pasadena, CA --- At its regular meeting on August 26, 2021, the Pasadena Unified School District (PUSD) Board of Education took decisive action to bolster safety measures that protect students and employees from COVID-19. The Board of Education voted unanimously to ratify an existing testing plan that places mobile testing teams at schools for students and employee testing and now requires all students under age 12 to get weekly COVID-19 tests with informed consent from parents/guardians all student-athletes to get weekly COVID-19 tests with informed consent from parents/guardians; and take additional new actions and require that students age 12 and older show proof of vaccination or take weekly tests with informed consent from parents/guardians; and grant emergency authority through December 31, 2021, to Superintendent Brian McDonald, Ed.D. and/or his designee to take any and all actions as allowed by state law necessary to ensure the continuity of learning and ensure the health and safety of students and employees.

PUSD is implementing the State Public Health Officer Order of August 11, 2021 and requiring all employees to present proof of vaccination or take weekly tests.

COVID-19 Testing & Vaccination Plan

“I am gratified that the Board voted to support the recommendations of staff to improve our measures that mitigate the effects of the COVID-19 virus on our students, staff, school communities, families and community members,” said Board of Education President Scott Phelps. “As the L.A. County public health director said, “The most important focus should be on vaccinations for the 12-and-up group of young people, whose vaccination rates are much lower than that of older people. I think the Board’s action directly aligns with this.”

“Responding to new developments related to COVID-19 Delta variant has proven to be more challenging than ever before,” said Superintendent McDonald. “However, we have shown that we have been able to meet these challenges based on our strong safety protocols that kept our students and staff safe this past spring when some of our students returned to in-person learning. The Board’s actions position our district to further bolster safety measures that protect students and employees.”

In 1984, during the week of the Los Angeles Olympic gains, I was working for the City of Pasa-dena in the day camp that was conducted at Victory Park. At 1 p.m., Tuesday, August 14, 1984, I conducted a "rain-dance" ceremony with approximately 20 children in the day camp. By 5 a.m. the next morning, the L.A. area was bathed in a heavy and unseasonal rain. Was there any connection between the rain-dance ceremony and the rain?

I'd told many friends of the Tuesday rain-dance and I was receiving calls first thing Wednesday morning. "It's raining!! It's raining!!" I was excitedly told. "The children are going to be shocked." I was first shocked, then pleasantly surprised. This was the middle of August, after all, when the rainfall nearly always measures zero inches.

Before I went off to work at the day camp on Wednesday, I shared breakfast with a small group of other active students of my mentor Shining Bear. The rain was one of the topics of our discussion that morning. As we ate and conversed, I felt something -- a "magic" -- in the air. The air was fresh and the ground was moist and full of negative ions, and I felt as if I had awakened and interacted with an ancient faculty.

The Olympics lasted 16 days. The cleanup was on the 17th day, Monday, August 13. On Tuesday, I conducted the rain-dance. On Wednesday, there was rain. Would it have rained anyway? Or was the rain-dance -- without my conscious knowledge -- part of a larger drama that was being played out? Was the rain like the "final curtain" for the special dispensation of weath-er for this world-wide "gathering of the tribes" we call the Olympics?

On Wednesday afternoon, I called Dr. George Fischbeck, the local television meteorolo-gist. We'd met before, so it was easy to contact him. During our telephone conversation, he told me that he noted a storm off the California coast at 7 p.m. Tuesday. By Tuesday evening at 11 p.m., he knew that rain would fall, but not where. Due to winds that arose, the rain moved fur-ther west and north than he expected. Dr. Fischbeck believed there was no connection between the rain-dance and the rain, discounting the ability of what he called "prayer" to affect the weather. Still, Fischbeck told me that he recognizes and respects the sacred nature of the Southwestern Native American dances, having lived among the New Mexico Native Americans for two years as an anthropologist.

Tuesday was to be the last day I'd be working with some of the children, so I had a few special activities planned. Starting at about 12:30, did such things as learning about wild plants, practicing Indian sign language, and making soap with wild plants.

I had suggested the previous day that we'd do a rain-dance ceremony, and a few children were now asking about it with voices of eager anticipation.

I removed my hand-made clay pipe from its container, filled it with a mixture of tobacco and white sage, and carefully lit it. Once the pipe was smoking well, I stood in the center of the cir-cle and blew smoke to the six directions -- the four cardinal points, as well as the sky, and the earth. I explained to the children that I was offering respect

and thanks in an attitude of humili-ty. Next I passed the pipe around the circle for each child to take a puff. Each child nervously puffed on the pipe. In retrospect, I could tell they were a bit uncertain about the fact that I was letting young children smoke a pipe. A few counselors even looked about to make certain no parents or directors were approaching.

Once we concluded the pipe-passing, I directed half of the children to dance in an outer circle, while the other half clapped their hands. We reversed directions a few times, and then I led them in a simple rain chant. Finally, we let up a cheer for rain.

"Is it really going to rain?" a few children curiously asked me.

"Of course," I replied with the innocence of a child. "It'll rain within a few days." But I was just being positive. I'd not checked any weather patterns, nor had I planned the rain-dance until that morning.

Though it rained hard early the following Wednesday morning, there was only a drizzle by the time I arrived at day camp. Several of the children who had participated in the rain-dance looked at me quizzically that morning, and I could tell they wondered if our rain-dance of the previous afternoon had any connection to the rain. Several of them came up to me with their questions and comments.

A few yelled out, "We made rain! We made rain!" I quickly pointed out that "we" didn't make anything. Rather, our request was answered.

In an attempt to find the science in our rain-dance, I identified at least five important elements.

1. We washed ourselves before the ceremony.
2. We "requested" rain in an attitude of humility.
3. We shared the pipe of unity and friendship.
4. We sang, chanted, and danced our rain ceremony, not "by the book," but with feeling and in-nocence.
5. The ceremony was conducted by children young enough to still be uncorrupted by the limita-tions imposed by adult minds. They had never been told that they couldn't invoke rain. I believe that their innocence and lack of prejudice was a key factor in the apparent success of our rain-dance.

My subsequent research revealed that invoking the rain is still practiced today by many peoples. Among the North American Indians, Rolling Thunder occasional-ly invokes rain by use of a curious method (which involves a stink bug) described in a biographical work called Rolling Thunder by Doug Boyd.

Sun Bear, founder of the Washington-based Bear Tribe, describes rain-making in chapter 17 of his Path of Power. He writes, "The powers that I feel closest to in my medicine are my brothers, the Thunder Beings. When you're strong and centered in your medicine you can tune into the elemental forces. You can lock into their energy and have them respond to you, and the process is not the mysterious act of a magician.

This is really a deep topic, with lots of aspects and ramifications. Just the tip of the iceberg has been presented here. I hope this little taste will encourage you to look into it more, especially now.

HOW TO HANDLE YOUR MEDICARE COVERAGE IF YOU MOVE

Dear Savvy Senior:

My husband and I are moving to a different area of the country to be near our daughter. Will this affect our Medicare benefits? Will we need to adjust our cover-age or re-enroll in a new plan? Moving Away

Dear Moving:

Moving can indeed affect your Medicare benefits depending on the type of cov-erage you have and where you move to.

If you and your husband are enrolled in "original Medicare" Part A and Part B, you'll be happy to know that you won't need to change your plans when you move because they're the same throughout the U.S. You will, however, need to notify the Social Security Administration of your change of address, which you can do at SSA.gov/myaccount/change-of-address.html or by calling 800-772-1213.

But, if you're enrolled in a Medicare (Part D) prescription drug plan, or a Medi-care (Part C) Advantage plan and you move out of your plan's service area, you'll need to choose a new plan that serves your new area. Here's a breakdown of what you'll need to do depending on the type of coverage you have.

If you have a Part D plan: If you're in rolled in original Medicare and have a stand-alone Medicare Part D prescription drug plan, you'll need to contact your Part D plan to find out if it will work in the area you're moving to. If it doesn't, you'll need to enroll in a new plan that provides coverage in your new location.

You can make this switch the month before you move and up to two months af-ter the move. Otherwise, you'll need to wait until the next open enrollment (in the fall) and could be penalized for having no acceptable prescription drug coverage.

If you have a Medicare Advantage plan: If you're enrolled in a Medicare Ad-vantage plan, again, contact your plan to find out if it will serve your new area. If it doesn't, you'll need to enroll in a new plan that does. To shop for new Ad-vantage and/or Part D prescription drug plans in your new location, see Medicare.gov/plan-compare.

You can switch Advantage plans the month before



you move and up to two months after you move.

But be aware that if you relocate out of your Medicare Advantage plan's service area and fail to enroll in a new plan in your new area, you'll automatically be switched to original Medicare. This will happen when your old Medicare Ad-vantage plan is forced to disenroll you because you don't live within its service area anymore.

If you have a Medigap policy: If you're enrolled in original Medicare and have a supplemental (Medigap) policy, you'll need to notify your provider that you're moving, but you should not need to change insurance companies or plans. (Note: there also are Medicare Select plans, which are Medigap plans that are network-based and are available in a few states. These plans may require you to change.)

Medigap plans are standardized across the country; for example, Medigap Plan F offers the same coverage in one state as it does in another state (Massachusetts, Minnesota, and Wisconsin have waivers from the federal government allowing them to standardize Medigap plans differently, so plan designs are different in those three states).

But be aware that Medigap costs vary by location, so your monthly Medigap pol-icy premium may be higher or lower depending on the cost of medical care in your new area.

Call your provider and tell them the new ZIP code, and they'll let you know the cost. Sometimes you'll be pleasantly surprised that it's lower.

If it's not, you could look for a cheaper policy. However, you may have to under-go medical underwriting. Medigap policies come with their own rules for enrol-ling, and some states have different enrollment standards than others.

The recent election of Joe Biden as President and subsequent Democratic takeover of the Senate will likely result in the passage of new tax legislation that could have a significant impact on your family's financial and estate planning considerations.

Specifically, it's likely that within the next two years Democrats will pass legislation aimed at eliminating many of the tax cuts enacted through the 2017 Tax Cuts and Jobs Act. As part of this legislation, we're expected to see significantly lower federal estate tax exemptions, the elimination of the step-up in cost basis on inherited assets, as well as an increase in the top personal income and capital-gains tax rates.

One way you may be able to minimize the new taxes on both your tax-deferred retirement accounts and taxable investments is by investing in cash-value life insurance. Let's break down exactly what this strategy might look like.

The New Role of Life Insurance in Your Estate and Financial Planning
Given the new distribution requirements for inherited IRAs, you should consider whether it makes sense to withdraw funds from your retirement account now, pay the tax, and invest the remainder in cash-value life insurance. From there, you can access the accumulated cash-surrender value of the life insurance policy income-tax free during your lifetime via tax-free withdrawals and/or loans. And upon your death, the payout of your life insurance policy would be income-tax free for your heirs.

This strategy could not only minimize the income taxes you pay over your lifetime, but it could also significantly reduce the tax bill imposed on your designated beneficiaries after your death, since life insurance proceeds are income-tax free.

Additionally, by investing a portion of your investable assets in cash-value life insurance, you can offset the effects of the proposed loss of income tax basis step-up upon your death, which we're likely to see enacted through Democrat-backed legislation. What's more, this strategy would also minimize your current income taxes on what otherwise would have been taxable income from your investments, as growth on investments inside a life insurance policy are not subject to income tax, including any capital gains.

Finally, if you stand to be affected by the proposed decrease of the federal estate-tax exemption, which is currently set at \$11.7 million, by placing the life insurance policy inside an irrevocable life insurance trust, you can remove the death benefit paid out to your beneficiaries from your taxable estate. In doing so, you would still be able to access the cash value of the insurance policy during your lifetime, either via a so-called "spousal access trust," if you are married, or via a traditional irrevocable life insurance trust, if you are not married.

Rethink Your Planning
Although the SECURE Act and the proposed new legislation stands to have an adverse effect on the tax consequences for your retirement and estate planning, investing in life insurance may offer you a valuable tax-saving opportunity. That said, you can only take advantage of this opportunity if you plan for it.

You want more? Okay, I can give you more.

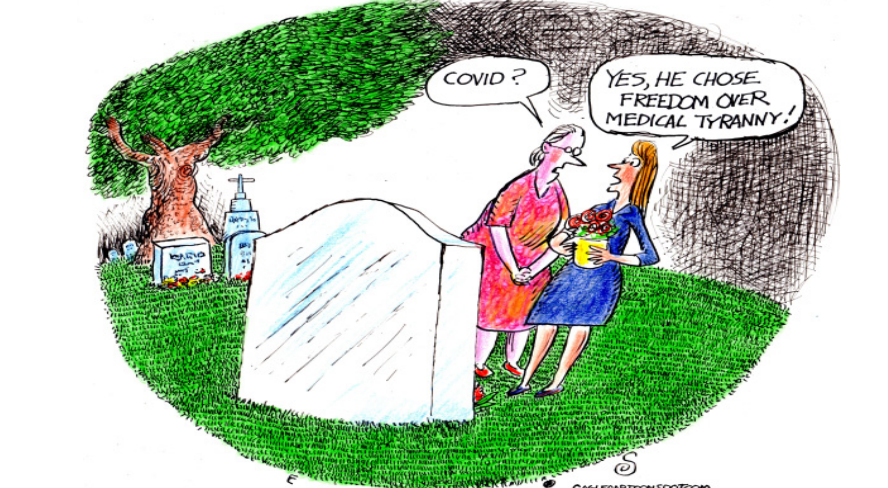
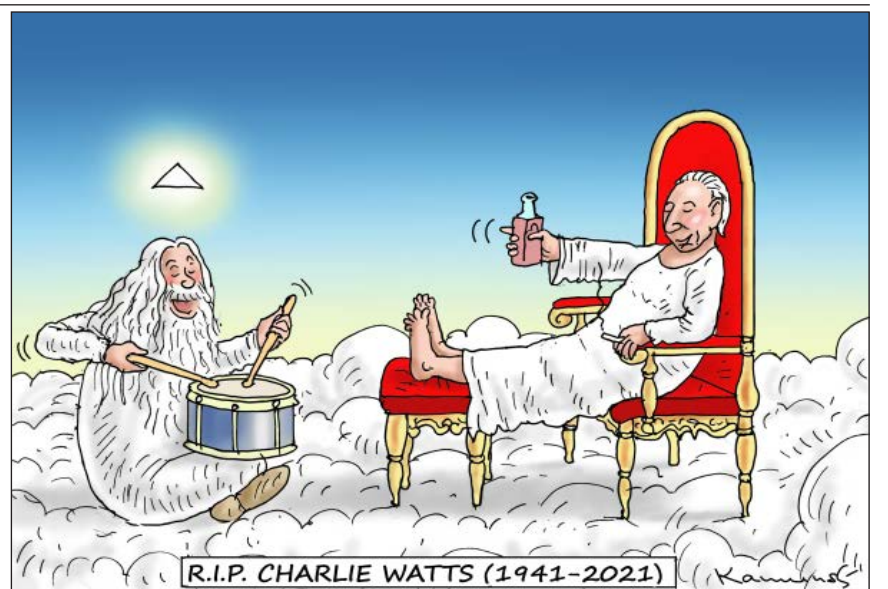
If writers write why don't fingers fing; or grocers groce and hammers ham?

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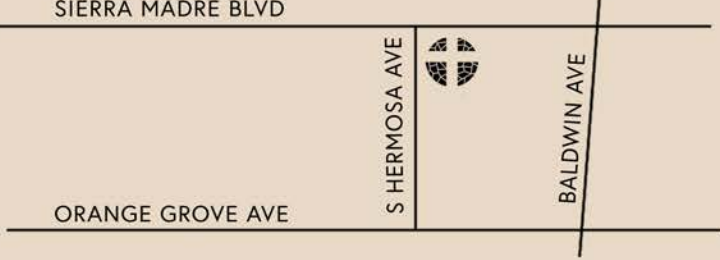
