In addition, a second resolution was passed providing for the filing of rebuttal arguments for the initiative.

At the June 14th meeting, the council requested the city attorney to prepare "An Analysis of the Initiative’s Impacts, a Comparison with the Meadows Project, and an Evaluation of its Legality" according to existing election law. CLOSURE OF WESTBOUND 210 AT SAN GABRIEL RIVER BRIDGE

The California Department of Transportation (Caltrans) has rescheduled a five-day closure of westbound Interstate 210 (I-210) at the San Gabriel River Bridge in Irwindale for a bridge upgrade project partially funded by Senate Bill 1 (SB 1). Crews will divert traffic from westbound I-210 to eastbound I-210, which will be converted to three-lanes in both directions between Interstate 605 (I-605) and Irwindale Ave. during the closure.

The following closures will be taking place Wednesday, July 20, at 11:00 p.m. through Tuesday, July 26, at 5 a.m.:

- Westbound I-210 from Irwindale Ave. to I-605
- Westbound I-210 Irwindale Ave. ramps
- Westbound I-210 to southbound I-605 connector
- I-605 to eastbound I-210 connector
- Eastbound I-210 Mt. Olive on-ramps

A second five-day closure affecting eastbound I-210 will occur on Wednesday, August 17 at 11:00 p.m. through Tuesday, August 23 at 5:00 a.m. Caltrans advises motorists to expect major delays, use I-10 or SR-60 as alternate routes, use public transportation on the Metro L Line (Gold) or Metrolink during the closures and if possible, work from home. The closures scheduled are subject to change due to weather, availability of equipment and materials, and construction-related issues. Motorists are encouraged to plan ahead and check the Caltrans Quick Map for up-to-the-minute traffic conditions. More information and updates on this project can be found on the District 7 website or on Twitter. The work is part of a project to upgrade San Gabriel River Bridge on I-210 in Irwindale. The \$30 million project – which includes \$1.7 million from SB1, the Road Repair and Accountability Act of 2017 – will upgrade existing bridge hinges and railings and strengthen bridge decks to improve safety.

The laying of the first corner-stone took place on May 10th, 1909 and Mrs. George H. Letteau was President. With the club house completed on July 1st, 1909, Mr. Frances P Conrad had the honor of taking the first photo. Preserve Sierra Madre has always sought out the truth and tried to provide all of us with the facts to base our decisions on.

The following charts and information is from the City Council meeting last Tuesday the 12th.

The first chart shows the development potential for the Meadows project, starting with the 42 homes all the way up to the maximum based on the initiative by the Stop the Housing Project group. Council was unanimous in their decision to go with the track of 42 homes. That decision is curious when you look at the potential with ADUs/JADUs based on SB9 and SB10 which was used across the chart based on maximum gross floor area.

Regarding the Initiative Opponent’s 4 Legal Arguments below, Aleks Giragorian, our City Attorney stated in his staff report to the Council that with item #1, potential legal exposure is possible but that Items #2, #3 and #4 are significantly less.

Aleks Giragosian our City Attorney with the law firm of Colantuono, Highsmith & Whatley, PC (CHW) stated that since his statement on 92-12 he has softened his tone with the claim that reconstruction of the Monastery would not be permitted and now states with the benefit of what he now knows that statement is not true.

Preserve Sierra Madre looks back at the past council reducing the Planning Commission to 5 members, not informing us of SB9 & SB10, expressing concerns of law suits and not responding to the community with questions like the EIR, etc. etc. has caused a lot of conflicts in the community and caused organizations to form like the Stop the Housing Project group, Neighbors for Fairness and Citizens for Truth. The tension is high and people try to get involved. With incorrect information coming from the city attorneys office and council failing to inform on SB9 & SB10 its understandable people are concerned.

THE VERDICT IS IN

The city attorney’s scathing 32 page report came out last week which identifies the impacts of the ballot initiative to rezone the Passionists’ property to the Hillside Residential zone. It’s hard to believe but it is worse than even we imagined.

Our concern from day one has been that the rights of the Passionists will be violated due to overly restrictive spot-zoning. The report states that “The Initiative targets the Mater Dolorosa Property specifically.” This is not a general rule applied to all institutional properties, they are only going after the Monastery property. Yes, they are doing it in the name of “protecting the hillsides,” but as we will see they are also failing to do that, too.

The report continues, “The Initiative severely constrains the Passionists’ alternatives to develop their property for religious purposes.” This puts the city at huge financial risk and the taxpayers will be liable for any lawsuits the city loses. Depending on what the attorney fees are and damages the Passionists might get, it could be devastating to the city services we love. The first to go will be things like Community Services and the Library because the city is not mandated to operate those like Police and Fire. Imagine spending the \$10 million grant the city just got to upgrade the library only to not have the funds to operate it.

More from the report: “However, the Initiative’s conversion of the religious uses at the Mater Dolorosa Property to non-conforming uses may substantially burden the religious exercise of the Passionists. As explained above, the Initiative converts the Retreat Center and the Stations of the Cross into non-conforming uses that cannot be altered or enlarged. Further, the Mater Dolorosa Property’s non-conforming status would prevent the Passionists from establishing new religious uses, such as the reconstruction of the monastery or the construction of a chapel or shrine.” There is some question as to

how this would play out in any given circumstance. The city can’t say definitively at this point because permits have to be subjectively interpreted by city staff due to ambiguities in the ordinances.

What isn’t ambiguous is that the intent of the initiative is to prohibit all expansion of the Passionists’ buildings and Stations of the Cross. It also makes it clear that the city leaders have no power to circumvent the intent of the initiative.

While Sierra Madre Neighbors for Fairness is not for or against the Meadows project, we don’t want to see an initiative that will compel the Passionists to leave the city. The initiative rezones the entire property to a residential zone, not just the southern portion they want to develop for homes. In addition to infringing on the rights of the Passionists, the report states that “The Initiative Likely Increases the Residential Development Potential.” In other words, the initiative makes the property more valuable if it is all developed. This, along with making it harder to alter, expand, or change the use, would incentivize the Passionists to sell it all to be developed with homes. Big homes!

This is where we get to the worse part. Under SB9 the city attorney determined that sixty-eight (yes, 68!) 6,500 sq. ft. homes could be built on the property. Sure, they will be on 34 bigger lots, but to get the two units on a lot they need to be configured as a duplex, so you would have two 6,500 sq. ft. buildings placed together as a single 13,000 sq. ft. structure. We definitely are opposed to that sort of development in Sierra Madre. The city also has very little discretion over what is built under SB9. Plus we lose the park, the net-zero water offsets, and the hillsides in conservancy. The Initiative is literally a disaster waiting to happen.

LETTER TO THE EDITOR

THE FLAWED INITIATIVE IS STARTING TO CRACK

It was just five months ago when I wrote my editorial, “NIMBYs Seek to Vote Away Religious Rights.” Many people were upset with the title, but it is just as fitting today as ever. The initiative, created by three neighbors of the Monastery, have taken drastic measures to try and stop the Meadows project that only ends up making everything worse.

The legal opinion from the city’s report on the initiative is that it will likely violate the rights of the Passionists and possibly lead to even more development. It does this through overly restrictive downzoning of the Retreat Center while also increasing the development potential for homes. The downzoning will make all future expansion, and possibly any alterations, substantially burdensome. This is a clear violation of the Religious Land Use and Institutionalized Persons Act and makes the city vulnerable to a big lawsuit with no power to administratively rectify the problem.

The response I keep seeing is that the development of homes is not a protected religious right. No one ever said it was. How many times does this have to be repeated? There is a difference between the Passionists doing religious development where the Retreat Center is and their selling off the southern part of the property to develop homes? I’ve never seen anyone say the Meadows project is protected as a religious right. The issue is that the initiative rezones the Retreat Center and Stations of the Cross and makes them nonconforming uses violating the Passionists’ religious rights.

By the way, in my original editorial I mentioned the \$50,000 cost of putting an initiative on the ballot. That estimate came from an earlier conversation I had with the City Manager. He said he didn’t have the exact numbers but that it was probably a safe guess and that the city budgeted about \$125,000 for the election. For comparison, the simpler measure ALF initiative (The Kensington) cost over \$30,000.

This whole initiative fiasco couldn’t have been much more poorly designed by trying to turn the entire property into a residential zone in an attempt to stop residential development. Almost everything it is trying to prevent becomes worse, despite the proponents’ misinformation asserting otherwise.

The “Meadow” (or “last remaining open parcel of land in Sierra Madre”) will not be saved. Wildlife will still be displaced. The quiet solitude will be gone. All of this because homes are going to be built either way. What the proponents call a “natural firebreak” is actually a fire hazard that is lessened by the Meadows project. There is no telling how many trees will be removed, but it appears that Sunnyside Ave would still be realigned and that is about half the trees right there. The city’s ordinances do not prevent the removal of protected oak trees, it only requires that if removed they be replaced with even more trees.

All the benefits that come from the Meadows project will also be lost. The three acre park that benefits the entire city... GONE! The 45 acres of hillside placed in conservancy... GONE! The net-zero water offsets... GONE! Yes, those same net-zero water offsets that the proponents keep saying are not real, but where the developer is putting up over \$900,000 to guarantee. What are the proponents doing to save water if the initiative passes? Nothing! Who is going to offset the water usage of the 32 (or 68 if the entire property is sold) – SIX-THOUSAND, FIVE-HUNDRED(!) square foot houses that could be built on the property? No one! Tell me how the initiative is benefiting the city, again??

I’ve been fighting this initiative from day one because I saw that it would be horrible for the city. In February I didn’t know it would be this bad. It is bad... bad enough that our city council will be issuing a formal resolution opposing the initiative. The battle has only just begun. There are a little over three months until the election. Help spread the word to defeat this ridiculous rezoning that is bad for Sierra Madre. We have to preserve and protect Sierra Madre from bad development when no one else will.

Hanns graduated from South Pasadena High School in 1948 and received his BS in Civil Engineering from the University of California, Berkeley in 1953. Hanns then joined the Army and served from 1953-1955, as a company commander in the Army Corps of Engineers, stationed in Japan.

Hanns was married in 1953 to Sharon Lu Baumann, who traveled to Japan for the wedding. The couple raised two children, John Keelan and Kathleen Ann.

Hanns and Sharon moved to Emerald Bay in Laguna Beach in 1961, and more often than not spent their weekends there playing beach volleyball. Hanns and partners even won six gold medals in two-man beach volleyball in the CA Senior Olympics. The couple were avid bike riders, often taking off on their bike to ride for days at a time. They also hiked and camped in the Sierras of Central California, and traveled to Greece, Turkey, Europe, Argentina, Chile and other countries throughout their married life, often while Hanns was working on projects building housing overseas.

Hanns earned his Masters Degree in structural engineering at USC while working as a structural design engineer at Robert E. Scherrer Consulting Structural Engineering. In 1978, Scherrer retired and Baumann Engineering was formed. He was a practicing consulting engineer from 1956 until his retirement in 2017.

In 1981, Hanns formed Baumann Research and Development Corporation to assist inventors and other clients with developing their own construction industry products. Hanns received seven patents of his own, as well as sharing co-inventor status on two others. In 2005, he received the Lifetime Achievement Award from the Pre-Cast Concrete Association of America.

In 1986, Hanns formed Baumann International, Inc., which was eventually re-incorporated as BauTech, Inc. to market his BauGrid® invention.

Hanns is survived by his son, John, a retired teacher, who lives with his loving family, and a daughter, Katie Coburn, who lives with her husband Bill in Sierra Madre. Baumann's only grandchild, Keelan Coburn, also lives in Sierra Madre, CA. Sharon predeceased Hanns in 1997 following more than 43 years of marriage. Hanns' older brother Paul, who lived in San Francisco, passed away in 2017.

A celebration of Hanns' life will be held on Friday, July 22, 2022 at 11:30am at the Newport Beach American Legion Yacht Club, 215 15th St, Newport Beach, CA 92663. An honor guard ceremony will take place at noon followed by lunch. Hawaiian attire is encouraged.

Back in 1983, Guy Clark, one of the best songwriters ever, released his song, “Homegrown Tomatoes.” I love this song and I love homegrown tomatoes. “Only two things that money can’t buy, that’s true love and homegrown tomatoes.” If you look at today’s picture, you will see a glorious bowl of homegrown tomatoes. My grandson, Michael, who lives with his wife, Alexandra, and children, William and Catherine Sophia, in Pleasant Hill, CA, grew these glorious globes of deliciousness and brought them down to Sierra Madre to share with the family over the July 4th weekend. I was fortunate enough to end up with these and let me tell you, friends and neighbors, I relished every single bite. These were so good, so delectable, that I practically wept when I finished the last one.

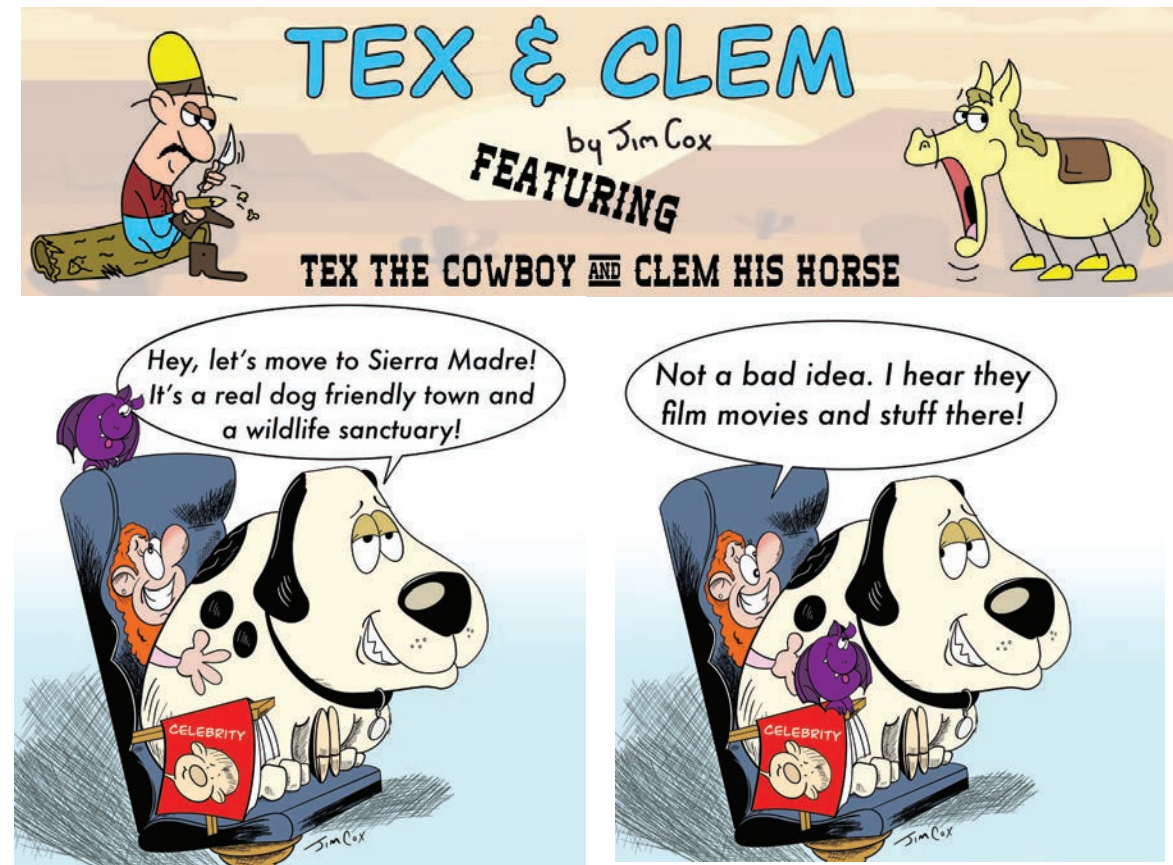

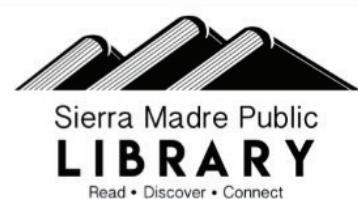

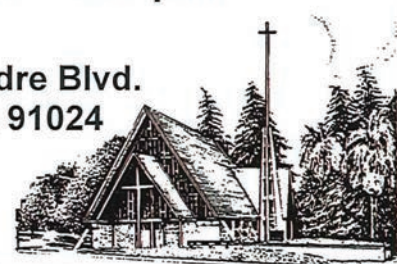

Pasadena Fire Station 31 to Relocate Temporarily

City officials announced that Pasadena Fire Station 31, currently located at 135 S. Fair Oaks Ave., will begin undergoing seismic retrofit construction and tenant improvements next week.

During construction, the 10-member station crew will be temporarily housed at 95 Alessandro Pl., just south of Huntington Hospital. The fire engine, fire truck and rescue ambulance will remain in service at the temporary location. There will be no interruption of service to the community. Construction work is expected to take six to eight months to complete.

Officials said Fire Station 31 was constructed in 1960 and requires structural retrofit in accordance with building code revisions and updates adopted since the initial construction. As the most active of all eight Pasadena fire stations, it's also in need of tenant improvements to maintain basic operational standards for the firefighters who live there during their shifts. The station houses firefighters 24/7, year-round; therefore, the wear and tear of the facility exceeds a typical household.

The scope of work includes replacing the roof, ceiling tiles, lighting, furniture and appliances; removal of office partition walls; floor upgrades; new paint; new HVAC equipment; and minor electrical improvements.

The various historical Pasadena Fire Department memorabilia, including the "Old Rig," will be safely housed in a secure storage facility.

New City Manager to Hire Police Chief

It will be up to newly hired Pasadena City Manager Miguel Márquez (pictured right) to select and hire the city's next police chief, Mayor Victor Gordo said Monday during a meet-and-greet at city hall for Márquez.

Gordo (pictured middle) told this newspaper that the process for hiring a new police chief would not be completed in the time before Márquez is set to start August 29.

According to Gordo, interim city manager Cynthia Kurtz had started the police chief recruitment process, just to get it moving, "ultimately Miguel will hire all of the [now vacant] permanent city positions [including police chief]," he said.

As to being new to Pasadena, Márquez simply said he is a "quick study."

"I will come up to speed quickly as I can," he said. "I'm

not going to rush things, we have to be thorough, listening to the community and all the different voices, then you get a sense you have heard enough, then move forward."

In his current role in Santa Clara, as the chief operating officer, Márquez said that having to deal with all issues, including hiring, within the Santa Clara County Sheriff's Office has given him experience and qualifications.

"Also from being on the court," he said as it relates to police and courts. "I have had to adjudicate dozens, if not hundreds of cases."

Márquez served as an associate justice of the California Sixth District Court of Appeal, as the county counsel for the County of Santa Clara, as the general counsel of the San Francisco Unified School District, and as a deputy city attorney in the San Francisco City Attorney's Office.

"I'm going to assume that the

pool we get [for police chief] is going to be filled with talented applicants and it's just a matter of finding the right fit," he said.

Márquez said he was not sure if Pasadena or the newly formed Community Police Oversight Commission had set guidelines for public input on the hiring.

"Whatever it is, I will make sure we work with the community... at all levels," he said.

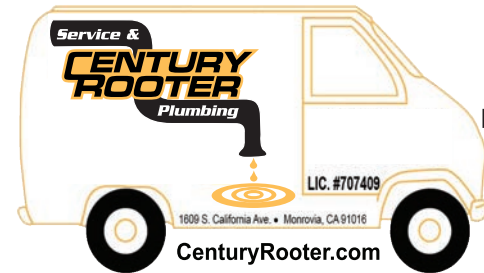

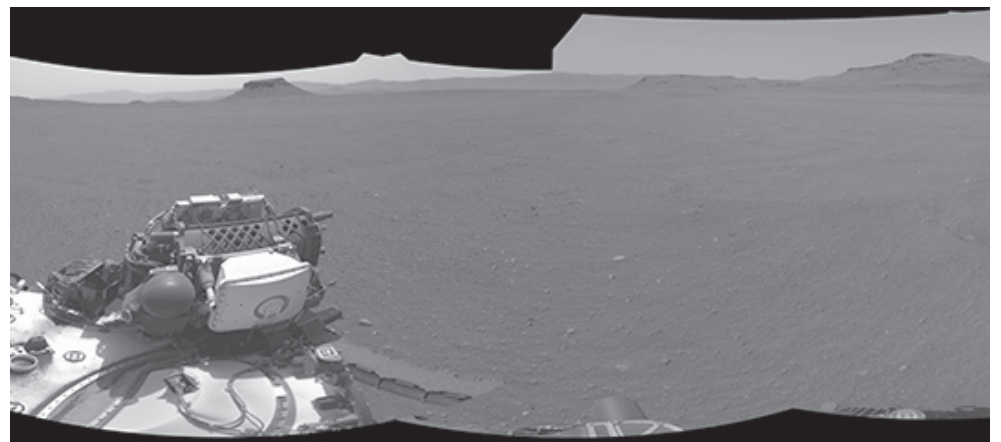
SOUTH PASADENA ELECTRIFICATION
PROJECT FOR THE FIRE DEPARTMENT

South Pasadena city officials announced the completion of the most recent step towards the fire department fleet electrification by completing the installation of a Direct Current Fast Charging (DCFC) Level 3 Electric Vehicle (EV) charger in the parking lot next to the Fire Department.

ROVER SCOUTS SAMPLE RETURN MARS
CAMPAIGN LANDING SITES

The six-wheeled explorer has inspected a stretch of the Red Planet to see if it is flat enough for NASA's next Mars lander.

NASA's Perseverance Mars rover is conducting its science campaign, taking samples at Jezero Crater's ancient river delta, but it's also been busy scouting. The rover is looking for locations where the planned Mars Sample Return (MSR) Campaign can land spacecraft and collect sample tubes. Perseverance has filled with rock and sediment. The sites being scouted are under consideration because of their proximity to the delta and to one another, as well as for their relatively flat, lander-friendly terrain.

Mars Sample Return is a historic endeavor that would retrieve and deliver samples of that faraway terrain for intensive study in laboratories on Earth to look for signs of past microscopic life on the Red Planet. The strategic partnership between NASA and ESA (European Space Agency) would involve multiple spacecraft, including a rocket that would launch from the surface of Mars.

Engineers planning a Mars landing prefer to work with flatter ground because rocks and an undulating surface are harder to land on. With that in mind, the MSR Entry, Descent, and Landing team is looking for a pancake-flat landing zone with a 200-foot (60-meter) radius.

"The Perseverance team pulled out all the stops for us, because Mars Sample Return has unique needs when it comes to where we operate," said MSR Program Manager Richard Cook of NASA's Jet Propulsion Laboratory in Southern California. "Essentially, a dull landing place is good. The flatter and more uninspiring the vista, the better we like it, because while there are a lot of things that need to be done when we arrive to pick up the samples, sightseeing is not one of them."

Flat-Out Inspirational

The first stage of MSR is already in progress: Perseverance has cored, collected, and sealed nine samples of Mars rock to date. The ninth, collected on July 6, is the first from Jezero Crater's ancient river delta. The plan is for Perseverance to drop, or cache, sample tubes on the surface to await later retrieval during MSR surface operations. Choosing an area that lacks large rocks

South Pasadena Two Day Outdoor
Watering Restrictions

The South Pasadena City Council has declared a Stage 2 Serious Water Supply Shortage given the extreme drought conditions in California. Effective immediately, outdoor watering is restricted to two (2) days per week, and water leaks must be fixed within 48 hours. The new watering schedule is as follows:

Addresses ending in an even number: Monday, Thursday
Addresses ending in an odd number: Tuesday, Friday

The following water conservation requirements are effective at all times, regardless of what water supply stage the City is in:

1. Watering between the hours of 9:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. is prohibited.
2. Excessive water run-off from sprinklers/

irrigation is prohibited.

3. Watering during periods of rain and 48 hours after is prohibited.

4. Washing down hard or paved surfaces is prohibited.

5. Vehicles must be washed with a hose equipped with a shut-off device.

6. Watering is limited to 15 minutes.

7. Using water to clean, fill or maintain levels in decorative fountains, ponds or other similar aesthetic structures is prohibited unless the structure uses a recirculating water system.

The new regulations are effective and enforcement began July 1. Violators will first receive notices of observed violations. Repeated violations are subject to fines. Go to: waterconservation@southpasadenaca.gov for more information

SUPERVISOR BARGER ANNOUNCES LA COUNTY CONTRACT WITH PASADENA HUMANE FOR ANIMAL CARE AND CONTROL SERVICES IN TARGETED REGIONS

Supervisor Kathryn Barger announced the unanimous approval by the Board of Supervisors for the Los Angeles County Department of Animal Care and Control to enter into a contract with Pasadena Humane to provide regional animal care services to the residents of Altadena, and unincorporated La Crescenta, East Pasadena, and San Pasqual.

"I am delighted that the County will be working with Pasadena Humane to provide these critical animal care and control services for the communities of Altadena and unincorporated La Crescenta, East Pasadena, and San Pasqual," said Supervisor Kathryn Barger. "The proximity of Pasadena Humane to these areas will help pet owners reclaim lost pets more quickly, and facilitate drop offs for residents who find lost pets. In addition, this partnership should help improve public safety responses as officers will be readily available to respond to calls regarding aggressive dogs, animal abuse or neglect, law enforcement assistance and other animal emergencies."

Under the contract approved by the Board of Supervisors today, residents in these targeted regions will continue to receive regionally uniform and localized animal care and control services 24 hours a day, 7 days a week from Pasadena Humane. The LA County Department of Animal Care and Control's closest animal care center is currently located in Baldwin Park - 18 miles from Altadena, 26 miles from unincorporated La Crescenta, and 14 miles from East Pasadena/San Pasqual. This distance is a burden for County residents who need essential animal and pet services such as retrieving lost pets, dealing with aggressive animals and animal emergencies. Currently, Pasadena Humane provides similar services to the adjacent cities of Arcadia, Bradbury, Glendale, La Canada Flintridge, Monrovia, Pasadena, San Marino, Sierra Madre, and South Pasadena. Its shelter is located at 361 South Raymond Avenue, Pasadena, California 91105.

BARGER ISSUES STATEMENT REGARDING PROPOSED CHARTER AMENDMENT SEEKING APPROVAL TO REMOVE ELECTED SHERIFF

Supervisor Kathryn Barger issued the following statement today regarding her lone opposing vote on a proposed Charter Amendment that would shift authority from the voters to the Board of Supervisors to remove the elected Sheriff:

"This proposed Charter Amendment sets a dangerous precedent and creates a slippery slope for the Board of Supervisors to override the will of the voters. The Sheriff of Los Angeles County, as in all other counties across California, is a constitutionally elected officer, democratically elected every four years. Considering that the current Sheriff is less than four months away from their election, the timing of this action seems highly political.

"If the goal of this Board is 'Promoting Accountability and Community Safety Through Checks and Balances,' then this action should include all County elected officials – the Assessor, the District Attorney and the Supervisors themselves. A Charter Amendment focused on only one office undermines the credibility of the Board and its underlying intentions.

"I remain concerned that this action, as approved by the Board today, dilutes the voice of Los Angeles County voters and deepens voter apathy."

LA COUNTY HEALTH UPDATE

LA County Enters High COVID-19 Community Level and Urges Residents to Take Precautions to Limit Spread of the Highly Transmissible BA.5 Variant

Yesterday, Los Angeles County entered the High Covid Community Level on the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) COVID-19 Community Levels framework after hospital admissions exceeded 10 new hospital admissions per 100,000 people. The county's admission rate, at 10.5 hospital admissions per 100,000 people, is an 88% increase when compared to one month ago.

If LA County remains in the High COVID-19 Community Level for two consecutive weeks, universal indoor masking will be implemented on July 29 to help slow the rate of transmission and protect those most vulnerable.

It is important to note that indoor masking is already a required safety measure in many places, including at all healthcare settings, public transit and transit hubs, long-term care settings, shelters and cooling centers, and correctional facilities. Indoor masking also continues to be required at worksites with outbreaks, and is required for all individuals during the 10 days after a COVID diagnosis or exposure when they are around others.

Businesses and employers are allowed to require masks at work, and many have done just that, either by maintaining an indoor masking requirement throughout the pandemic or reinstating one as cases began increasing.

If the county implements universal indoor masking, residents and workers need to wear masks in all indoor public spaces, including shared office spaces, manufacturing facilities, retail stores, and at indoor events. Indoor areas of restaurants and bars, children's programs, and educational settings, would need to institute universal masking as well.

Masking and testing are both powerful tools that can interrupt transmission thereby reducing risk. Masking lowers risk in two ways: It provides what some call "source control" meaning controlling the amount of virus entering the environment right at the source. When people who are infected wear a mask, they exhale far less virus into the air than infected people who do not mask. Masks also provide protection to the individual wearing a mask, by filtering virus from the air they are breathing. When everyone in a room is masked, safety is enhanced, as there is less virus circulating, and less likelihood that any virus circulating will penetrate the physical barrier of a well-fitting, high filtration mask.

Masks that offer beneficial protection provide both good filtration AND a good fit or seal around the edges. Well-fitting respirator-type masks such as N95s, KN95s, and KN94s offer the most protection because they are made with thicker materials that do the best job filtering out the virus. Note that individuals should not double mask with a respirator.

Testing to know your status is strongly recommended if exposed, if symptomatic, and right before gathering with others, especially if indoors and when gathering with anyone at higher risk of severe illness should they get infected. If attendees at a gathering have all tested negative prior to getting together, it is much less likely that anyone will be exhaling virus particles into the air. As a reminder, individuals can be contagious for COVID and not have symptoms – that can happen very early in their infection, before symptoms start, or it can happen if an individual has an asymptomatic case of COVID.

"I send my deepest sympathies and wishes of peace and comfort to the many families who have lost a loved one from COVID-19," said Barbara Ferrer, PhD, MPH, MEd, Director of Public Health. "I recognize that when we return to universal indoor masking to help reduce high spread, for many this will feel like a step backwards. For others, indoor masking will feel unnecessary because of the availability of powerful vaccines and therapeutics. The reality is that because we are living with a mutating SARS-CoV-2 virus, there remains uncertainty around the trajectory of the pandemic. The best way to manage the uncertainty and to reduce morbidity and mortality is to remain open to using both the sophisticated tools we now have, such as tests, vaccines, and therapeutics, and the non-pharmaceutical strategies, such as masking, ventilation, and distancing to layer on protections to respond to the conditions at hand. One thing I feel certain about is that, given the rich toolkit at hand, we should not settle for the existing high rates of morbidity and mortality that disproportionately affect those most vulnerable; we do need to continue to take care of each other. With the high rates of transmission fueling the increased risks, sensible safety precautions that can slow down the spread of the virus are warranted and that includes universal indoor masking."

Public Health has reported a total of 3,207,071 positive cases of COVID-19 across all areas of L.A. County. Today's positivity rate is 17.0%.

There are 1,223 people with COVID-19 currently hospitalized. Testing results are available for more than 12,255,903 individuals, with 23% of people testing positive.

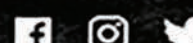

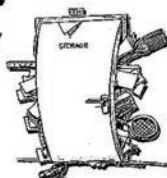

SHOULD YOU TAKE DAILY ASPIRIN FOR YOUR HEART?

Dear Savvy Senior:

I've been taking daily aspirin for almost 20 years now because I have a family history of heart disease. But I recently read that using aspirin is not recommended anymore. What can you tell me about this change in philosophy? Confused Aspirin User

Dear Confused:

There's no doubt that taking low-dose daily aspirin is beneficial to most people who've had a heart attack or stroke. But if you don't have heart disease, should you take it as a preventative measure? The answer for most people is probably not, according to new guidelines from the U.S. Preventive Services Task Force (USPSTF), a widely respected independent panel that develops recommendations on preventive health care. Here's what you should know.

New Guidelines

For years, aspirin has been a go-to pill Americans use to help ward off cardiovascular disease because of its blood thinning capability. But like most medicines, it can cause serious side effects. Aspirin irritates the stomach lining and can cause bleeding in the stomach, intestines and brain which can be life-threatening. And the risk of bleeding increases with age.

About one-third of Americans age 40 and older, and more than 45 percent of people over age 70 – who don't have cardiovascular disease – already take a daily aspirin to help prevent cardiovascular disease because it's been recommended for decades by many different health experts.

But in the past few years, new research has emerged showing that for many people without diagnosed heart disease, the risk of bleeding may outweigh the benefits of taking a daily aspirin. This research, along with the advent of other effective therapies in preventing heart attacks and strokes that don't cause bleeding – better blood pressure drugs and statins for lowering cholesterol – has narrowed the role aspirin plays.

Here's a breakdown of the updated USPSTF guidelines of who should, and shouldn't, take a daily aspirin, and for those who should, how to take it safely.

Who Should Take It?

There are two categories of people who can still benefit from using aspirin. People with established cardiovascular disease, especially those who have already had a heart attack or stroke. There's strong evidence that taking a daily low-dose aspirin significantly reduces the risk of a second cardiovascular event. And adults ages 40 to 59 with a 10 percent or higher risk for a cardiovascular disease over the next decade. They may see a small benefit to daily aspirin, but it should be an individual decision and discussed with your doctor.

Who Should Skip It?

People who are 60 and older – without established cardiovascular disease – who do not currently take a daily aspirin to prevent heart disease should not start now. This is particularly true for people with a history of bleeding, say from ulcers or aneurysms, or those taking medications such as blood thinners, steroids or anti-inflammatories such as ibuprofen or naproxen. If they already take a daily aspirin now, they should ask a doctor about how to proceed, because there may be a serious risk to suddenly stopping.

How to Use it Safely

The best approach is to talk to your doctor about the potential risks and benefits of aspirin specifically for you. Because the risk of bleeding raises with dosage, if aspirin is recommended, take the lowest possible amount, which for most people is an 81 mg baby aspirin. And if you experience any stomach pain, talk to your doctor.

You should also know that in 2016 the USPSTF suggested that daily aspirin use could also help lower the risk of colorectal cancer along with cardiovascular disease. But the group now says there's not enough evidence to support that claim.

ESTATE PLANNING FOR A CHILD WITH SPECIAL NEEDS - WHAT PARENTS NEED TO KNOW

Estate planning is an obvious concern for all parents, but if you have a child with special needs, it's crucial that you're aware of the unique considerations that go into planning for a child who may be dependent on you at some level for their entire lifetime. If your child has special needs, you must plan to provide for the emotional, physical, and financial needs of your child, in the event of your own eventual death or potential incapacity.

When creating your estate plan, there are two major considerations to focus on: 1) Who would care for your child if you cannot (also known as guardianship), and 2) How will your child's financial needs be met when you are not there to meet them.

Naming Legal Guardians for a Lifetime of Care

The first and most critical step in ensuring the future well-being of your child with special needs is to name both short and long-term legal guardians to take custody of and care for your child in the event of your death or incapacity. And as you well know, if your child will never become fully capable of independently caring for him or herself, your parenting responsibilities will continue long after your child reaches adulthood.

Although this lifetime responsibility likely feels overwhelming, we've been told repeatedly by our clients who have a child with special needs that naming legal guardians and knowing their child will be cared for in the way they want, by the people they want, creates an immense sense of relief. Not only that, but you may want to build in unique directives through which the named guardians are carefully instructed—and even incentivized—to give your child the same level of attention and care you provide.

Providing for Your Child's Financial Future: Special Needs Trusts

Beyond naming legal guardians for your child with special needs, you'll also need to provide financial resources to allow your child to live out his or her life in the manner you desire. And this is where things can get tricky for children with special needs.

In fact, it may seem like a "Catch-22" situation—you want to leave your child enough money to afford the care and support he or she needs to live a comfortable life, yet if you leave money directly to a person with special needs, you risk disqualifying that individual for much-needed government benefits like Medi-Cal and Supplemental Social Security Income (SSI).

Fortunately, the government allows assets to be held in what's known as a "special needs trust" to provide supplemental financial resources for a physically, mentally, or developmentally disabled child, without affecting his or her eligibility for public healthcare and income assistance benefits. However, the rules for such trusts are complicated so you should always work with a trusted lawyer to create a comprehensive special needs trust that's properly structured and appropriate for your child's specific situation.

Setting Up the Trust

Funds from a special needs trust cannot be distributed directly to your child, and instead must be disbursed to a third party who's responsible for managing the trust. Given this, when you initially set up the trust, you will likely be both the Grantor (trust creator) and Trustee (the person responsible for managing the trust), and your child with special needs is the trust's Beneficiary.

You'll then name the person you want responsible for administering the trust's funds upon your death or incapacity as the Successor Trustee. To avoid conflicts of interest, overburdening the legal guardian with too much responsibility, and providing a system of checks and balances, it may be a wise decision to name someone other than your child's legal guardian as a Trustee.

As the parent, you serve as the Trustee until you die or become incapacitated, at which time the Successor Trustee takes over. Each person who serves as Trustee is legally required to follow the trust's terms and use its funds and property for the benefit of your special needs child.

There are two ways to set up a special needs trust. In the first option, it is built into your revocable living trust, and it will arise, or spring up, upon your death. From there, assets that are held in your living trust will be used to fund your child's special needs trust.

In the other option, a special needs trust acts as a vehicle for receiving and holding assets for your child right now. This option makes sense if your child's grandparents or other relatives want to give him or her gifts sooner rather than later.

Finally, it is important to ensure that the trust will have sufficient funds to last throughout the life of your child. One common method to provide funding is for you (or another loved one) to name the special needs trust as the beneficiary of your life insurance policy. Another way is for family members and friends to make donations or gifts to the trust and/or include it as a beneficiary in their will.

MAKE NATIONAL PARKS FREE FOR ALL

For just one day this summer — and if you're planning a vacation, it's Thursday, August 4 — entrance fees are waived at the 110 national parks that normally charge admission. These include top tourist favorites such as the Grand Canyon, Yellowstone and Zion National Park, each of which collects \$35 per vehicle or \$20 per pedestrian.

With so many Americans eager for post-pandemic travel, but with gasoline prices damnably high, wouldn't this be a great time to give citizens free access to the parks that they do, after all, own? And not just on one weekday in August, but all summer long?

To be clear, the nation's national parks need all the money they can get. Most locations have what the Parks Service calls an "extensive maintenance backlog," with repairs and upgrades deferred year after year. The annual budget for all 423 park properties is a modest \$3.5 billion — and the contribution from entrance fees is a pittance, totaling less than \$250 million a year.

Visits to national parks fell slightly during the pandemic, but are expected to surge this summer. While \$35 per car doesn't seem like a lot, it's a regressive fee whose greatest impact is on those least able to afford it. Waiving admission these fees — at least during this period of economic, medical and emotional stress — would boost Americans' spirits while also stimulating business.

New government figures indicate that in 2021 park visitors spent \$20.5 billion in communities within 60 miles of the venues. The lodging sector gained \$7 billion while restaurant operators took in \$4.2 billion. It's estimated that these expenditures directly supported a total of 190,700 full and part-time jobs.

Not surprisingly, half of all visits to national parks occur at the 25 most popular locations, and that's where the highest admission prices are charged — with one notable exception.

The most popular national park, according to 2021 statistics, is Great Smoky Mountains National Park, stretching through portions of Tennessee and North Carolina, with just over 14 million admissions last year. Yet, this spectacular park charges no entry fee — not because the Parks Service doesn't want to, but because a tangle of local and federal laws prohibits it. The facility manages just fine, contributing \$1.3 billion to the local economy.

This would seem to confirm the eagerness of Americans to visit a major park if no fee is required. When fees are charged, attendance drops dramatically. The next most popular location is Zion National Park in southwest Utah, which had roughly 5 million admissions last year.

Admission to all national parks is free for active U.S. military and their dependents as well as for veterans.

Fees are also waived for the disabled. Seniors over age 62 can purchase a \$20 annual pass or an \$80 lifetime pass and, in an interesting educational program, all fourth grade students may enter for free. For the rest of us, the best deal is an \$80 annual pass.

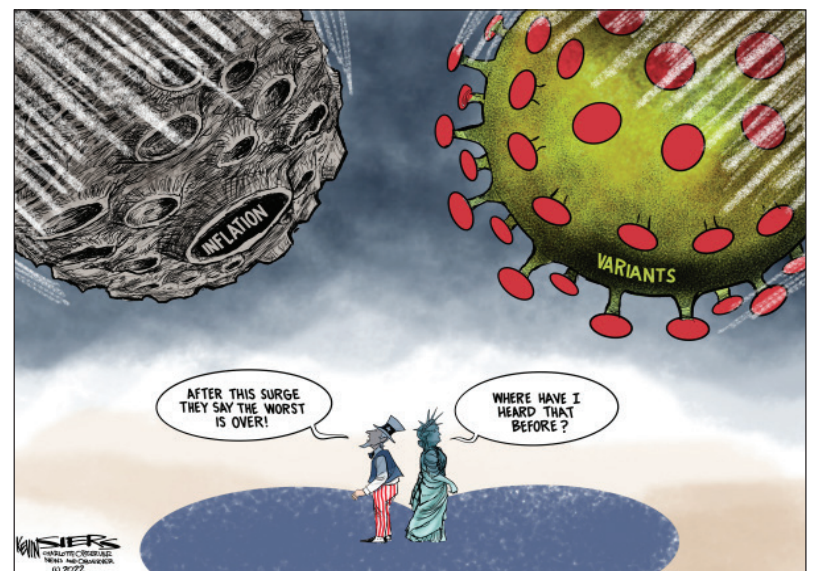
There are only five fully free days each year. In 2022 the dates are Jan. 17 (MLK Day); April 16 (the start of National Park Week); Aug. 4 (anniversary of the Great American Outdoors Act); Sept. 24 (National Public Lands Day), and Nov. 11 (Veterans Day).


