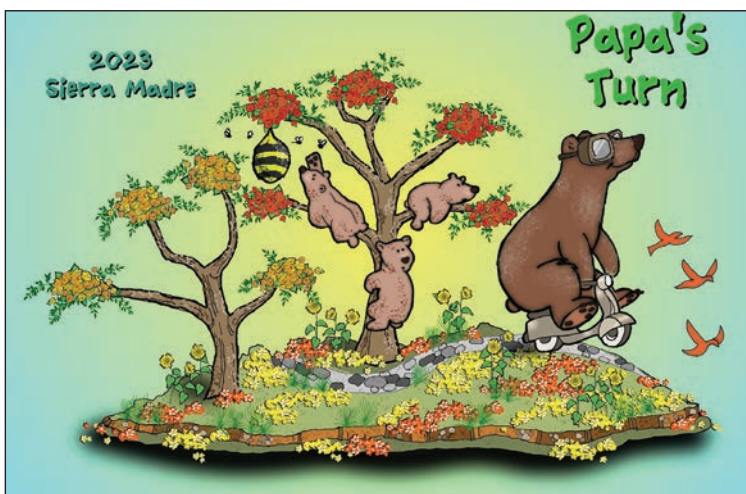

LEONORA MOSS CELEBRATES 25 YEARS AS SIERRA MADRE BUSINESS

Twenty five years ago, Leonora Moss opened up shop in Sierra Madre. To say it's been an incredible couple decades is an understatement!

Leonora Moss began in 1983 in a garage, where co-owner Judith Brandley worked as a florist for weddings and other events. During that time, her daughter, Lorie Westmoreland, joined her for a few years and the two kept talking about opening up a shop together.

In September 1997, it finally happened. The duo opened their first brick-and-mortar store at the historic Hotel Shirley building in Sierra Madre. Named for Judith's grandmother Leonora (with the Moss to represent a staple of every florist), Leonora Moss, a full-service florist, has offered flowers, gifts, decor, and always a bit of something extra. The store moved to its current location at 9 Kersting Court in fall 2003.

Leonora Moss remains a family business, as many might recognize Judith's husband, Ron, as the delivery person for their flowers. Ron also manages the business, navigates the flower market like an expert, and keeps the shop humming along, including supplying the champagne for the store's infamous Champagne Fridays!

Florist Jill Forder joined the shop 18 years ago, and has been invaluable ever since as a designer and friend. "She has become one of our family," Lorie says about Jill.

"So many customers walk through the door and exclaim, 'Wow, it smells so good in here,'" Lorie says. "And they soon find themselves discovering something delightful or out of the ordinary in various corners of our shop. We love creating a unique experience for our customers."

Through a recession, a pandemic, and more, the shop has remained a Sierra Madre institution, with incredible support from the local community. Even customers who've moved far away always come back to visit, and stay connected through social media.

"Everybody said we wouldn't make it when we first started out," Judith says. "We weren't afraid, though, if it didn't work because we'd still have our flower business. We didn't let things stop us and our customers have been really good to us throughout these 25 years. We've been blessed with good customers and good employees, many of whom are Sierra Madre residents!"

On Small Business Saturday, November 26, 2022, Leonora Moss will celebrate its 25th Anniversary at the Sierra Madre Winter Festival. They invite the community to join them at their booth out in Kersting Court and or stop by the shop for your holiday wares.

MORE ABOUT BEARS.....by Glenn Lambdin

For those that watched Tuesday night's Zoom meeting with the California Department of Fish and Wildlife (CDFW) discussing the current increasing problems of bears entering homes, school lockdowns, and bears routinely roaming and scavenging the streets of Sierra Madre, it didn't take long to realize the information presented was the same regurgitated nonsense and misleading euphemisms that were presented two years ago.

The presentation, while obviously avoiding and failing to even hint at how the failed policies of the CDFW created and continues to facilitate the urbanized bear population in Sierra Madre, it was a reckless display of misguided practices that attempts to convince, if not con, residents to think that "coexisting" with bears in historically urban residential neighborhoods throughout the Greater Los Angeles metropolitan area is a better solution than identifying and correcting the 22 years of the CDFW's failed wildlife management policies that created and facilitated the overpopulation of urbanized bears.

Coexist with wild bears? Seriously? For the life of me, I can't imagine how anyone could keep a straight face and try to convince Sierra Madreans that it is acceptable to "coexist" with wild bears in an urban residential neighborhood. I can't imagine any rational or logical thought process that could conclude that it is acceptable to allow bears to meander and scavenge in school yards and urban residential neighborhoods. What could possibly be more foolish or reckless? What could possibly go wrong?

The CDFW presenter, Jessica West, even went as far as to suggest that the overpopulation and exponentially increasing population of urbanized bears in Sierra Madre is the fault of the residents and their "attractants." And according to West, an unopened sealed can of beans in your kitchen pantry qualifies as an attractant. West also suggests that Sierra Madreans keep all doors and windows locked at all times unless you are in that specific room. She also suggested putting an electric fence around one's yard.

I believe we have reasonable expectations on how we live in urban neighborhoods. Being expected to no longer keep a door opened with just a screen door in order to get fresh air into our homes is not a reasonable expectation. Being told you should carry bear spray or bear horns to work in your garden or walk through your neighborhood is not normal or reasonable. It is reasonable to prohibit wild bears from freely roaming and scavenging for food in an urban residential neighborhood or schoolyard. To say residents need to change normal behaviors to accommodate the failures of the CDFW is not not reasonable. It is irresponsible and dangerous to allow the CDFW to continue on the path they have chosen; a path that has created a continuous pattern of hazardous situations and increasing threats to public safety.

The CDFW has refused to take any responsibility for their failures and has not been held accountable. They somehow continue to justify and hide their failures by placing the blame on typical residential lifestyles and Sierra Madreans in general.

SIERRA MADRE POLICE BLOTTER

Thanksgiving Holiday Closures Reminders

The City's Citizen Service Center (CSC) will be closed Thanksgiving Day and Friday. Individuals can contact the CSC via the web or by calling (626) 744-7311. Regular trash and recycling collection for Thursday, Thanksgiving Day, will occur on Friday and Friday's collection will occur on Saturday, Nov. 26.

The City's permit and payment centers will also be closed Thursday and Friday. Online permitting services are available 24/7 at: cityofpasadena.net/PermitCenterOnline.

Pasadena Transit and Dial-A-Ride buses will not operate on Thursday but will resume regular service on Friday, Nov. 25. All parking meters are free and parking time limits will not be enforced on Thanksgiving Day, but shoppers are advised that all regular meter enforcement will resume Friday, Nov. 25. Violations for overnight parking restrictions, red curb parking and blocking fire hydrants will continue to be issued on both days.

All Pasadena Public Library sites will close at 5 p.m. on Wednesday and will remain closed the following two days.

All recreation and community centers operated by the City's Parks, Recreation and Community Services Department will be closed on Thursday and Friday but all parks will be open for picnics, fun and play. No site reservations are accepted for the holiday.

Pasadena Rent Control Measure H Passes

In what organizers are calling a massive victory for renters, the Pasadena Tenants Union along side dozens of community groups announced Tuesday the passage of Measure H aimed at creating an appointed rental-housing board that will regulate rent increases for covered rental units and specify conditions under which landlords could terminate tenancies.

"This is a win for every renter, and every resident in Pasadena who is tired of watching their longtime neighbors getting priced out," said Measure H Field Director, Bee Rooney.

"We've talked to thousands of people across the city who are ready to keep fighting displacement and unfair evictions with us,"

As of Tuesday the vote was at 52.11 percent yes to 47.89

percent no.

According to Rooney rent control in Pasadena comes on the heels of multiple legislative rent control wins in California, but this win at the ballot box has significant implications. Measure H includes effective accountability measures for bad actor landlords through the creation of an independent rent board, and it cannot be repealed without another vote of the people.

In the midst of massive rent hikes and the end of Covid pandemic eviction protections, Measure H will protect tenants facing eviction from bad faith, often corporate, landlords who evict tenants just because they want to rent a unit for more money.

"The community support has been incredible, but not surprising," said campaign

organizer, Ryan Bell, "People are losing their neighbors, their friends, their classmates to eviction and skyrocketing rents. It's the time for rent control across all of California, and we hope this lights a spark for other cities to fight for their right to housing."

Pasadena City Attorney Michele Beal Bagnieris said in an impartial analysis of measure H that it may raise potential legal issues. If passed, and a legal challenge succeeds, the courts could void some or all of the Measure's provisions.

"An objective analysis of the Measure estimates startup costs of \$310,000, and annual estimated costs of \$5,453,460, based on approximately 26 employees needed to support the Board's activities" she also said.

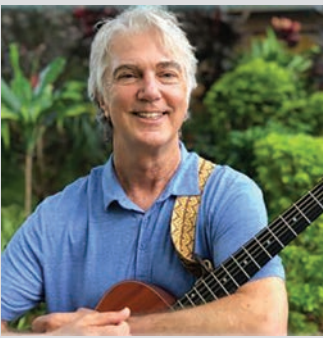

NASA Rover Investigates Intriguing Martian Bedrock

Exploring a sediment-rich location in this Mars delta offers tantalizing opportunities for the six-wheeler's science team.

NASA's Perseverance Mars rover has begun exploring an area the science team calls "Yori Pass" near the base of Jezero Crater's ancient river delta. They've been eager to explore the region for several months after spotting a rock similar to one Perseverance collected samples from in July.

The feature is so tantalizing to the scientists because it is sandstone, which is composed of fine grains that have been carried from elsewhere by water before settling and forming stone. Perseverance's samples are central to the first step in the NASA-ESA (European Space Agency) Mars Sample

Return campaign, which began when the rover cached its first cored rock in September 2021.

"We often prioritize study of fine-grained sedimentary rocks like this one in our search for organics and potential biosignatures," said Katie Stack Morgan, Perseverance deputy project scientist at NASA's Jet Propulsion Laboratory in Southern California. "What's especially interesting about the Yori Pass outcrop is that it is laterally equivalent with 'Hogwallow Flats,' where we found very fine-grained sedimentary rocks. That means that the rock bed is located at the same elevation as Hogwallow, and has a large, traceable footprint visible on the surface."

The hunt at Jezero Crater for biosignatures (any characteristic, element, molecule, substance, or feature that can serve as evidence for ancient life) is one of the Perseverance rover's four science objectives. Along with its 14 rock-core samples, the rover has collected one atmospheric sample and three witness tubes, all of which are stored in the rover's belly.

After it collects a sample from Yori Pass, Perseverance will drive 745 feet (227 meters) southeast to a mega sand ripple. Located in the middle of a small dune field, the ripple – called "Observation Mountain" by the science team – will be where the rover collects its first samples of regolith, or crushed rock and dust.

More About the Mission
A key objective for Perseverance's mission on Mars is astrobiology, including caching samples that may contain signs of ancient microbial life. The rover will characterize the planet's geology and past climate, pave the way for human exploration of the Red Planet, and be the first mission to collect and cache Martian rock and regolith.

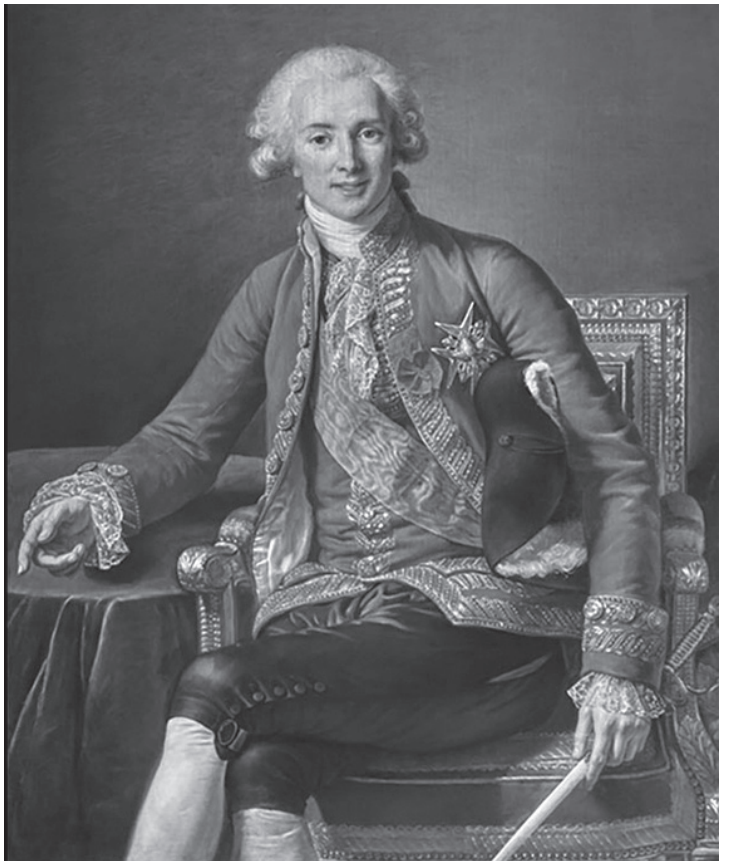
Subsequent NASA missions, in cooperation with ESA, would send spacecraft to Mars to collect these sealed samples from the surface and return them to Earth for in-depth analysis.

The Mars 2020 Perseverance mission is part of NASA's Moon to Mars exploration approach, which includes Artemis missions to the Moon that will help prepare for human exploration of the Red Planet.

JPL, which is managed for NASA by Caltech, built and manages operations of the Perseverance rover.

The Huntington Acquires Major Work by Élisabeth Louise Vigée Le Brun



The Huntington Library, Art Museum, and Botanical Gardens has acquired a major painting by Élisabeth Louise Vigée Le Brun (1755–1842), the most important female artist of 18th-century France. Portrait of Joseph Hyacinthe François-de-Paule de Rigaud, comte de Vaudreuil (ca. 1784) is the second masterpiece to come to The Huntington through a gift from The Ahmanson Foundation.

"We are enormously grateful to The Ahmanson Foundation for making this acquisition possible," Huntington President Karen R. Lawrence said. "Adding an important work by Vigée Le Brun helps us achieve one of our goals—adding more works by important women. Once again, The Ahmanson Foundation proves to be an invaluable strategic partner, allowing us to make a masterpiece accessible to Southern California audiences."

The Vigée Le Brun painting complements The Huntington's significant collection of 18th-century French decorative art, which was established by Henry E. and Arabella Huntington in the early 20th century. "This finely painted masterwork will go on display in the Huntington Art Gallery, the building that holds French tapestries and carpets that were once part of the French court's accoutrements at the Palais du Louvre and Versailles," said Christina Nielsen, the Hannah and Russel Kully Director of the Art Museum at The Huntington. "It will not only add rich context, but will also shine as a star French painting. While our collection of 18th-century British portraiture is one of the best in the nation, this is our first French portrait of this caliber."

The painting also has an interesting history. The painter and the subject were both part of the inner circle in the royal court, and they both greatly shaped Parisian salon culture. Their friendship has been celebrated by contemporary writers in poems and verse.

Vigée Le Brun was the

daughter of a portraitist and was painting professionally by the time she was in her teens. When she was 28, she was inducted into the French Royal Academy, with the support of Marie Antoinette, and she was one of only four female members. Vaudreuil (1740–1817) was an actor, socialite, and Vigée Le Brun's primary private patron. In her memoir Souvenirs, Vigée Le Brun reveals her affection for him, calling him "l'Enchanteur" (The Magician).

Painted to commemorate the day when Vaudreuil was made Knight of the Order of the Holy Spirit by King Louis XVI, the seated portrait shows off the sitter as well as the artist's virtuosity. Vaudreuil is dressed in an ornate brown coat with gold braids, trim, and beads and white silk lining. He wears a sheer lace jabot and cuffs. His shimmering blue sash and the silver badge on his coat represent the knightly Order of the Holy Spirit. The red silk rosette and ribbon are of the royal military order of Saint Louis, which he received from King Louis XVI in 1770. He clasps a fashionable tricorn hat with white plumes under one arm and holds the handle of a ceremonial sword.

Vaudreuil was the son of the governor and commander-general of the French colony Saint-Domingue on the Caribbean island of Hispaniola. In addition to a great inheritance, Vaudreuil's wealth also derived from his own Saint-Domingue sugar plantations, which were powered by enslaved people. "As with our recently acquired drawings of the Jamaican sugar plantation where the famous 'Pinkie,' from our British portraits collection, grew up, the Vaudreuil portrait provides us with an opportunity to shine a brighter light on the history of European colonization," Nielsen said. "We must, and will, reckon with the lives of the people represented on our walls."

The painting was slated to be installed in the Huntington Art Gallery this month.

ARCADIA CITY COUNCIL ELECTIONS MAKE HISTORY

ARCADIA, CA – Votes have been cast and the unofficial results of Arcadia's November 8, 2022, General Municipal Election are in. This year, voters turned out to decide three City Council seats and three ballot measures, and the results are history-making.

Data from the 2020 Decennial Census and 2021 American Community Survey show Arcadia's population is nearly 70% Asian and 53% female. Until this past election, the community's demographic profile was never well reflected on the City Council. This November, Arcadia voters opted for change. For the first time, the Arcadia City Council will have majority-Asian and majority-female representation.

On this year's ballot, voters were asked to select between nine City Council Candidates for seats in Districts 2, 3, and 5. Arcadia voters elected first-time City Council Members in all three districts, with Sharon Kwan winning 40.9% of the vote in District 2; Eileen Wang winning 62.5% of the vote

in District 3; and Michael Cao winning 42.3% of the vote in District 5 (percentages reflect the unofficial election results per the Los Angeles County Registrar-Recorder/County Clerk's Office, as of 3:30 p.m. on November 17, 2022).

The election of Kwan, Wang, and Cao usher in a historic era for the community. When asked about the significance of these changes on the City Council, Council Member April Verlato said, "I have found that the work of the City Council is only further enriched by new and different perspectives. I am thrilled to welcome more women to the City Council and look forward to collaborating for the betterment of Arcadia."

At the December 6, 2022, City Council Meeting, the current City Council will reorganize, and Mayor Pro Tem Paul P. Cheng will begin his tenure as Arcadia's Mayor. During this meeting, the three newly elected City Council Members will take their Oath of Office, and outgoing Mayor Tom Beck, Council Member Mike Danielson, and Council Member Sho Tay will be recognized for their service to Arcadia.

In addition to City Council elections, the November ballot had three important questions for Arcadians to decide. Residents were asked to cast their vote on modernizing and amending the City Charter (Measure CA), increasing the Transient Occupancy Tax – known as the Hotel Tax – from 10% to 12% (Ballot Measure HT), and establishing a Sports Wagering Tax (Measure SW). All three ballot measures were approved by voters.

Election results are unofficial until the final certification by the Los Angeles County Registrar of Voters, which is expected the first week of December. For more information on the results of the 2022 elections or the City of Arcadia Ballot, visit results.lavote.gov and ArcadiaCA.gov.

DUARTE PUBLIC SAFETY SUCCESS STORY



Dr. Louis Tuthill, Professor from Azusa Pacific University, has been the program evaluator for the Youth centered Public Safety Programs in the City of Duarte - in particular the DART (Duarte Area Resource Team) and A-Team programs.

Dr. Tuthill was able to provide a report covering the measurable positive results that have been experienced in Duarte. These results were measured against a control group - a city in the San Gabriel Valley with similar demographics, but no Youth centered safety programs.

Since 2010, Duarte Public Safety has been awarded \$2.6 million in grants for their programs. There have been over 1000 youth involved in 9 programs during that time and there has been a 97% drop in arrests. In 2018, there was a 62% drop in youth arrests in Duarte, while in the control city there was a 41% increase in youth arrests. Dr. Tuthill shared that this partnership has expanded between the City of Duarte and APU to include opportunities for training, mentoring and coaching for APU students and has most recently led to a partnership with the Psychology Department to provide mental health services to youth in Duarte. Participation in the DART program is seen as a positive status for kids - and they are proud to be a part of the program.

1 1/2 pounds fresh or frozen cranberries (6 cups)

1 cup pomegranate juice
2 cups fresh pomegranate seeds

My recipe would be that my husband always fixed the turkey. I really don't know how it began but, even when we had turkey a lot through the years, he always fixed it. So when he died 21 years ago, the men in the family thought I didn't know how to do it, which was fine with me. So, for this Thanksgiving, the family is going to Martin's in Arcadia. He is the youngest who was 27 when his dad died in October of '88. A few days before Thanksgiving that year he called to say he had the turkey but where should he fix it since he had a small apt in Arcadia at that time. Two of his sisters helped him do it and they brought it all to my sister-in-law's because I was living in Escondido yet, moving back to the area the first of that year. That Christmas, the oldest son took care of it, buying and fixing 2 turkeys. As long as the family doesn't run out of men, we have it made.

Dixie Countant's Easy Anti-marshmallow Yams

For those of us who don't like marshmallow on our yams, here's the family recipe for Candied Yams.

Ingredients:

Yams or sweet potatoes Butter Light Brown Sugar

Buy as many yams as you need depending on how many people are coming to dinner. I plan two medallions per person if I'm doing a full-blown dinner with all the trimmings.

Wash and slice yams (or sweet potatoes) into one-inch medallions. Steam medallions until barely done. (Not too soft) Skin the medallions by gently cutting the skin and lifting - it will almost fall off.
Arrange medallions in baking dish. (They can touch, but don't stack them) Put a small pat (aprox 1/4 tsp of butter on top of each medallion. Sprinkle light brown sugar over medallions. Cover and bake in 350 oven for 1/2 to 1 hour.

1/3	cup	Baby Bell Peppers - Yellow, Orange, Red - 1/8"
1-1/2	Tbsp	Extra Virgin Olive Oil
3/4	cup	Vegetable Broth, divided
1/4	cup	Apricot, Peach, Orange or Blackberry Brandy
3/4	tsp	Lindberg Porterhouse & Roast Seasoning (from Taylor's)
1	cup	Parsley, Finely Chopped
2	Tbsp	Lemon juice (fresh)
1	cup	Bread Crumbs - slightly dry
1/4	cup	Pecorino-Romano Crumbled Cheese

Clean Mushrooms. Remove Stems, set caps in lightly greased baking pan with holes up.

Dice mushroom stems into 1/8" bits.. You should have 2 cups diced mushroom stems. If not enough, add more mushrooms (if you have them) to make 2 cups.

Put olive oil & ½ cup broth in sauté pan, turn heat to medium. Add Seasoning. Add celery and carrots. Layer with diced mushrooms, then diced peppers. Cover and cook slowly about 5 minutes, stirring once to ensure mushrooms and peppers get mixed with broth.

Add Parsley. Simmer another 5 minutes. Taste and add more seasoning if needed. Remember - adding breadcrumbs will soften flavor intensity.

Drain broth from sauté pan into cup.

Add remaining broth with brandy and lemon juice to mushrooms, and return to heat until broth boils. Drain this liquid also into the cup. Reserve.

Add breadcrumbs and grated cheese to drained mushrooms. Mix well. If very dry, add 1 - 2 tablespoons of reserved broth.

Stuff mushroom caps. Place neatly in greased table-ready stove top / baking dish. Carefully spoon some of the reserved broth into the dish;

Simmer gently for 5 minutes ... Add more mushrooms as the others shrink. Simmer another 5 minutes & repeat. When adding the last mushrooms, drizzle any remaining broth lightly over all the mushrooms' stuffing for the final cooking.

Remove from heat and let cool. Serve room temperature. Or chill, and reheat just before serving. More fun to stuff the mushrooms with someone else - for sociability - after all, thanksgiving and social are what it's all about.

Paul Neiby's* CORN BREAD DRESSING

Ingredients:

2 - 6 oz. bags Mrs. Cubbison's Seasoned Cornbread Stuffing Mix
1 cup chopped, raw white onions
1 cup chopped raw celery
10 dried apricots cut into pieces
4 oz. Walnuts (they can be bought in a bag of about that size
6-8 oz. Sausage, sauteed brown, defatted & crumbled. (Jimmy
Dean brand sage flavored is good
2 cups heated Chicken Broth
4 tbsp. butter melted in with 1 cup of the chicken broth

Directions:

Toss the vegetables and stuffing mix in a bowl. Add 1 cup of the heated broth with the melted butter and toss again. Load lightly in a greased covered casserole and bake for 45 minutes in a 350 degree oven. Half way through, pour the additional cup of chicken broth over the dressing.

This recipe is modified from the one that appears on the Cubbison pack by the addition of the sausage, apricot, and walnuts. The additional broth added half-way through the baking, makes the dressing moist enough but still light and discreet.

Also from Paul Neiby:

CREAMED PEARL ONIONS

Ingredients:

Onions, small pearl as needed
Milk, butter,flour, Worchestshire Sauce,
Cayenne , Salt & Pepper

Directions:

Trim the bottoms of the onions but otherwise leave them unpeeled. Drop into boiling water for 3-5 minutes. Drain and peel when cool. Reserve the onion water.

Make a medium white sauce (2/2/1) using half milkd and half onion water. You may make a Mornay Sauce by adding shredded cheddar if desired. Flavor with Worchestshire, Cayenne and salt and pepper. The sauce should be fairly thick as the cooking onions will add liquor.

Pour the sauce over the onions in a casserole and bake covered in a medium oven for 30-40 minutes.

This is not a problem, put down that ladle and in just minutes, you can hand everybody an Eggnog-Brandy Muffin!

If you're truly feeling like Wonder Woman, whack up some bacon and an onion into small chunks, sauté them together, throw in some eggs, scramble it altogether, and serve the Thanksgiving breakfast they'll remember with delight all year long.

Eggnog-Brandy Muffins

2 cups flour
2/3 cup granulated sugar
1 TB. Baking powder
½ tsp. Salt
3/4 cup prepared eggnog
½ cup brandy
5 TB butter, (unsalted if you've got it...use a little less salt if you don't) melted
1 egg, beaten
½ tsp. Grated nutmeg plus a little more for sprinkling on top

Preheat oven to 400 degrees. Grease 12 muffin pan.

In a large bowl mix flour, sugar, baking powder and salt. Add eggnog, brandy, butter, beaten egg and ½ tsp nutmeg. Stir only till mixed. DO NOT OVERBEAT or muffins will be rubbery and tough.

Spoon batter into greased muffin cups and sprinkle tops of muffins with nutmeg. Bake about 20 minutes or until tester inserted into center of muffin comes out clean. Remove from tin, butter and enjoy.

They freeze nicely and are probably about 200 calories per muffin.

GOOD EATS ROAST TURKEY

Recipe courtesy Alton Brown

Prep Time: 15 min
Inactive Prep Time: 7 hr 0 min
Cook Time: 2 hr 30 min
Level: Easy
Serves: 10 to 12 servings

INGREDIENTS

1 (14 to 16 pound) frozen young turkey
For the brine:
1 cup kosher salt
1/2 cup light brown sugar
1 gallon vegetable stock
1 tablespoon black peppercorns
1 1/2 teaspoons allspice berries
1 1/2 teaspoons chopped candied ginger
1 gallon heavily iced water

For the aromatics:

1 red apple, sliced
1/2 onion, sliced
1 cinnamon stick
1 cup water
4 sprigs rosemary
6 leaves sage
Canola oil

DIRECTIONS

2 to 3 days before roasting:

Begin thawing the turkey in the refrigerator or in a cooler kept at 38 degrees F. Combine the vegetable stock, salt, brown sugar, peppercorns, allspice berries, and candied ginger in a large stockpot over medium-high heat. Stir occasionally to dissolve solids and bring to a boil. Then remove the brine from the heat, cool to room temperature, and refrigerate.

Early on the day or the night before you'd like to eat:

Combine the brine, water and ice in the 5-gallon bucket. Place the thawed turkey (with innards removed) breast side down in brine. If necessary, weigh down the bird to ensure it is fully immersed, cover, and refrigerate or set in cool area for 8 to 16 hours, turning the bird once half way through brining. Preheat the oven to 500 degrees F. Remove the bird from brine and rinse inside and out with cold water. Discard the brine.

Place the bird on roasting rack inside a half sheet pan and pat dry with paper towels.

Combine the apple, onion, cinnamon stick, and 1 cup of water in a microwave safe dish and microwave on high for 5 minutes. Add steeped aromatics to the turkey's cavity along with the rosemary and sage. Tuck the wings underneath the bird and coat the skin liberally with canola oil.

Roast the turkey on lowest level of the oven at 500 degrees F for 30 minutes. Insert a probe thermometer into thickest part of the breast and reduce the oven temperature to 350 degrees F. Set the thermometer alarm (if available) to 161 degrees F. A 14 to 16 pound bird should require a total of 2 to 2 1/2 hours of roasting. Let the turkey rest, loosely covered with foil or a large mixing bowl for 15 minutes before carving.

Prepare Ahead

It's hard to perfect a turkey when you've got endless side dishes to worry over simultaneously, so accept guests' offers to bring some favorites. Assemble accompaniments to your meal in advance, especially sauces and dips, which actually improve in flavor over time.

Remember, you only have so much space in an oven, so schedule cooking accordingly to ensure everything is ready at mealtime.

Work Smart

But knife sharpening doesn't need to be daunting. In fact, every home cook should get comfortable doing this regularly. With the right tools, your knives will last longer, and be safer and more efficient.

Generally, you should hone or polish knife edges after each use and sharpen knives regularly with a high-quality sharpener. Look for a sharpener that offers diversity. For example, Edgeware's adjustable knife sharpeners include coarse and fine sharpening slots for dull and damaged knives and regular maintenance respectively, and are ideal for sharpening a variety of knives from straight edge blades to serrated. Ready your bird for the oven by following the National Turkey Federation guideline on thawing: for every 4 1/2 pounds of frozen turkey, thaw for 24-hours in the refrigerator.

AUNT CATHERINE'S CORN PUDDING

I almost listed this as My recipe, but then I remembered that I actually got this recipe from my dad's sister and my favorite Aunt Catherine. For whatever reason, we only had this on Thanksgiving and you had to be quick if you wanted a serving. One pass around the table and that was it. (The same can be said for my household today. Susan Henderson)

INGREDIENTS

12 to 13 ears fresh corn, husks removed
1/4 cup sugar
3 tablespoons all-purpose flour
2 teaspoons baking powder
1 1/2 teaspoons salt
Pepper to taste. (You can spice it up with a little Cayenne pepper instead).
6 large eggs
2 cups evaporated milk (I use Half and Half instead but either is good)
1/2 cup butter, melted

DIRECTIONS

Preheat oven to 350°. Get a 13 x 9 baking dish and grease the sides with butter or butter flavored cooking spray - my Aunt did not tell me that!

Cut corn off the cobs into a large bowl (about 6 cups). You can substitute frozen corn if you like but canned corn really is only to be used if there is a blizzard and you cannot get to the grocery store. In a separate bowl or measuring cup, mix sugar, flour and baking powder together.

Next, whisk eggs until smooth then gradually add milk or half and half and butter in a large bowl. Pour the sugar mixture into the bowl with the eggs and continue whisking. Make certain the mixture is smooth and then stir in the corn. Abandon the whisk, use a wooden spoon and stir the mixture so that the corn is distributed evenly. Pour mixture into prepared baking dish and bake at 350° or until you can stick a cake tester in it and it comes out clean. Let it stand about 5 minutes before serving.

WHAT PARENTS SHOULD KNOW ABOUT RSV

As RSV cases continue to spike across parts of the U.S. — with some areas nearing seasonal peak levels — those typical “bugs” your child brings home may have you feeling on edge. With so much swirling around these days, it can be difficult to know what’s behind a constant cough, especially if your child is very young. RSV, or respiratory syncytial virus, can include symptoms similar to a common cold. However, the virus can develop into something more serious. RSV can infect people of all ages but is most severe for older adults and young children. Usually almost every child under the age of 2 has been exposed to RSV, but due to all the pandemic response over the last few years, kids have not been exposed as much to RSV. That is one of the reasons why we are seeing such a spike this year, as well as RSV in children older than 2.

Symptoms RSV symptoms may vary and typically begin four to six days after infection. The most common symptoms might include:

- Runny nose
- Low appetite
- Coughing
- Sneezing
- Fever
- Wheezing

For young infants with RSV, they might be irritable, sluggish or find it harder to breathe. Your pediatrician will be able to figure out whether it’s a common cold, COVID-19 or RSV, if you have concerns about symptoms your child is showing. They might perform tests, like chest X-rays, to see if pneumonia has developed.

When should you call a doctor? The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) notes an increase in RSV-associated emergency room visits. However, most cases will go away on its own in a week or two. Symptoms are typically at their worst on days three to five of infection. Only 3% of children with RSV will require a hospital stay.

If symptoms become severe, contact your pediatrician right away. This may include:

- Symptoms of bronchiolitis
- Symptoms of dehydration (only one wet diaper in 8 hours or more)
- Difficulty breathing
- Gray or blue lips, tongue or skin
- A significant decrease in activity or alertness

Even though RSV is common, and it might seem difficult to figure out how severe it will become, there are some risk factors parents should be aware of.

- Children who are born premature or are 6 months old or younger are most at-risk for RSV complications
- Children with chronic heart or lung disease, or a weaker immune system, can also be susceptible to RSV

Treatment There’s currently no vaccine to prevent RSV and no specific treatment for the infection. As stated, most cases will resolve on their own. However, there are a few things you can do to help relieve the symptoms:

- Manage pain and fever with over-the-counter medications (consult your pediatrician for guidance and never give aspirin to children)
- Drink plenty of fluids
- Nasal saline to help with breathing
- Cool-mist humidifier to help break up mucus

Talk to your health care provider before you give any over-the-counter cold medicine to your child.

The best way to avoid transmission of RSV is what we have been doing very well over the last few years: Scrupulous hand hygiene with washing our hands frequently with soap and water, and cleaning the surfaces small hands get to, like doorknobs and handles. Also, wear a mask if you have any respiratory symptoms.

With the knowledge of what RSV may look like — and how it is different from other viruses — you’ll be able to take steps to keep your child as healthy as possible all year round.

HARDY CALIFORNIANS PROMOTES NATIVE PLANTS

In recent weeks, you may noticed the activity on the empty lot on Sierra Madre Blvd., just east of Arnold’s Hardware. The yard is fenced, and inside are numerous tables full of local native plants.

This is the current site of Hardy Californians, a Native Plant Nursery and Landscape Design Studio run by local residents Parker Davis and Portia Besocke. Within their Christmas-tree style pop-up, they boast a wide selection of locally grown plants native to California which are uniquely adapted to our relatively low levels of precipitation(or rainfall) and extremely hot summers. Both of these naturalists have been growing, propagating, selling, and consulting about native plants for several years. Their current venture at 283 W. Sierra Madre Blvd. will run through December 13th, though they hope to re-open in January, given the positive reception they have received from local residents.

Parker and Portia believe that our futures must include native plants which use less water, and are evolved to thrive in our region. With concerns over drought and climate change, native plants offer a viable alternative to the otherwise ecologically-sterile imported bushes and trees, and the outdated colonial lawn.

“We specialize in locally grown native plants that are uniquely adapted to our climate, requiring little to no supplemental irrigation, while contributing the most ecological benefit in supporting our local birds, bees, and butterflies.”

Visitors to the Audubon Society center at Deb’s Park in Highland Park might remember Parker Davis, who, for several years, led volunteers in restoration efforts there, and guided visitors on interpretive walks. Subsequently, both Parker and Portia developed the Hahamongna Native Plant Nursery in the Arroyo Seco on Pasadena’s west side.

According to Parker, “Hardy Californians is one of the very few native plant nurseries which grows plants native to our community, and thrive in foothills of the San Gabriel Mountains with little to no maintenance or irrigation.” Parker pointed out that some of the beautiful natives currently available include the aromatic and ornamental “Woolly Blue Curls, and Encelia californica, a native sunflower. Other popular plants for sale include White Sage, Black Sage, Mugwort, and Yerba Santa, all of which are drought-tolerant, sustainable and boast great ecological and sociological benefits.

For example, many of our native plants are excellent medicinal and culinary herbs, and some provide food, just as they did with Native Americans. Some of the food plants include native species of grape, the Toyon tree with its beautiful orange-red fruits, and our local Elderberry.

Hardy Californians is open for business from Tuesdays through Sundays, from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. They also provide landscape design services for those residents ready to ditch their lawns for a habitat friendly garden that is uniquely Californian, and are currently offering free estimates to interested

customers.

The popup business also offer a selection of terra cotta pots, wildflower seeds and related books available, as well as gift items, such as t-shirts, and their popular “LA Plants” Dad Hats!

Hardy Californians will be in town until December 13th, so be sure and go by and pick up a gift for that special friend, family member or neighbor who has already joined the native plant revolution, or who maybe needs a bit of encouragement!

HOW TO CAPTURE YOUR LOVED ONE'S STORY

Dear Savvy Senior: I am interested in making a video of my 82-year-old parents' life story/legacy and how they want to be remembered. With the holidays approaching, I thought this could be a neat gift to my older siblings, but I could use some help. What can you tell me? Youngest of Five

Dear Youngest: A personal recording of your parents' life story could be a wonderful holiday gift and something you and your family could cherish the rest of your lives. Here are a few tips to help you get started.

What You'll Need
Your first step is to find out if your parents are willing to make a legacy video, which would entail you asking them a number of thoughtful questions about their life in an interview format in front of a video recording device. If they are, all you'll need is a smartphone or camcorder and a list of questions or prompts to get them talking.

Recording Equipment
If you have a smartphone, making a video of your parents' story is simple and free. However, you may want to invest a "smartphone tripod" to hold the phone while you conduct the interview, and a "smartphone external microphone," which would improve the audio quality. You can find these types of products at Amazon.com for under \$20.

Most smartphones today have good quality cameras and have the ability to edit/trim out the parts you don't want. Or you can download a free video-editing app like Magisto or Adobe Premiere Clip that can help you customize your video.

If you want a higher quality video, consider purchasing a HD camcorder. Sony, Panasonic and Canon are the top-rated brands, according to Consumer Reports. These can run anywhere from a few hundred dollars, up to \$1,000 or more.

Questions and Prompts
To help you prepare your list of questions for your parents' video interview, go to "Have the Talk of a Lifetime" website at TalkofaLifetime.org. This resource, created by



the Funeral and Memorial Information Council, offers a free workbook that lists dozens of questions in different categories. Some of these include: earliest memories and childhood; significant people; proudest accomplishments; and most cherished objects. This will help you put together a wide variety of meaningful, open-ended questions.

Old photos of your parents, their family members and friends are also great to have on hand to jog your parents' memory and stimulate conversations.

After you select your questions and photos, be sure to share them with your parents ahead of time so they can have some time to think about their answers. This will make the interview go much smoother.

Interview Tips
Arrange an interview time when your parents are rested and relaxed, and choose a quiet, comfortable place where you won't be interrupted. You may need several sessions to cover everything you want.

When you get started, ask your parents to introduce themselves and ask a warm-up question like "When and where were you born?" Then ease into your selected questions, but use them as a guide, not a script. If your parents go off topic, go with it. You can redirect them to your original question later. Think of it as a conversation; there's no right or wrong thing to talk about, as long as it's meaningful to you and your parents.

Also, be prepared to ask follow-up questions or diverge from your question list if you're curious about something. If you'd like to hear more, try "And then what happened?" or "How did that make you feel?" or "What were you thinking in that moment?" And end your interview with some reflective questions, such as "What legacy would you like to leave?" or "How do you want to be remembered?"

7 THINGS TO KNOW ABOUT DISABILITY INSURANCE

If you earn a good living now, but you worry about not having enough money for a future time when you cannot work due to illness or injury, disability insurance may be the answer. However, you need to make sure you are getting an insurance policy that will meet your needs and not waste your money. This article covers 7 things everyone should know when considering purchasing disability insurance.

Disability Insurance: Things to know
Knowing the answers to these 7 questions can give you the best chance of finding a policy well-suited for your particular situation.

01 - What is disability insurance?
Disability insurance pays benefits when you are unable to work because you are sick or injured. Most policies pay a benefit that replaces a percentage of your income. But disability insurance is not the same as health insurance—it will not cover your medical bills. Instead, disability benefits replace a percentage of the income you lose due to your inability to work, so you can cover your basic financial needs, such as paying bills, covering daily living expenses, and providing for your family, until you can return to work. To begin your search for disability insurance, first you need to get clear about your minimum financial needs, or what we call your "minimum to thrive" number, should you become unable to work.

Your "minimum to thrive" number includes your basic living expenses and should be the minimum amount of money you need to cover all the basics so you can focus on building the thriving life you were born to live.

02 - Should I get disability coverage?
If you are the breadwinner in your family and your income would stop if you became ill or injured and could not work, you should look into disability insurance. According to U.S. government's statistics, one in four 20-year-olds become disabled before reaching retirement age. Statistics like this make it important that you consider protecting yourself and your family with disability coverage.

03 - What's the difference between short and long-term disability insurance?
There are two primary types of disability insurance: short-term and long-term. Short-term disability insurance typically lasts between 3 to 6 months, and sometimes up to a year or more. These policies generally cover about 60% to 80% of your monthly gross income, and the premiums you pay generally range from 1% to 3% of your annual income. One major upside to short-term policies is that payouts usually happen within two weeks, which can be a lifesaver in an emergency. Long-term disability insurance can pay benefits for a few years or until your disability ends, even if that's when you retire. Most long-term policies cover 40% to 60% of your monthly gross income, but policies that pay up to 70% do exist. Long-term disability policies also cost 1% to 3% of your yearly income, but based on the benefits, they tend to be more cost-effective in the long run. That said, it can take up to 6 months to see a payout from a long-term policy, which may not be a realistic option if you need money immediately to cover your living expenses. Therefore, you may want to consider covering your short-term financial needs with emergency savings of 6 months, and then getting a long-term policy to cover your longer-term needs.

04 - What does 'portability' mean?
If you purchase your disability insurance through your workplace, ask if you can keep that insurance if you leave the company. If your insurance is non-portable, your coverage will end when you leave the job. Having a portable policy means that you will be covered no matter where you work. Although many disability policies purchased through an employer are not portable, it's something you should look into. If portability is important to you, consider purchasing disability insurance on your own, rather than through your employer.

05 - What are the renewal options for disability policies?
A "guaranteed renewal" policy allows you to renew, without making any changes to your coverage, but your premium can fluctuate. A "non-cancelable" policy means your coverage and your premiums cannot be changed, assuming you pay your premiums on time. Also, be sure to find out if premiums are waived during a qualified disability. Given these considerations, the best policies will be non-cancelable and guaranteed renewable. Obviously, such policies will cost more, so consider what's best for you.

06 - How do cost of living benefits work?
Cost of living benefits are not included in most policies, but adding this rider is something to consider under the current economic environment. Cost of living benefits are designed to provide financial stability by offering an increasing benefit to keep pace with an increased cost of living - which is especially important right now, as we are experiencing unprecedented levels of inflation. When choosing cost of living benefits, consider choosing policies which increase on a compounding basis. Compound interest is earned on the principal and the interest. This additional rider can help your benefits keep pace through inflation, even after your disability ends.

07 - Do I need a 'future increase' rider?
A future increase rider is another option to consider adding to your disability coverage. It's worth looking into particularly if you think your income may increase significantly over time. With this rider, you can increase the monthly benefit of your policy, regardless of your health status. Without it, your policy will not change to protect your future income, and your benefits will pay out according to your income when you first obtained coverage. That said, many insurance companies will limit the total supplementary coverage that can be implemented each year with a future increase rider, so even if you have this option in place, the benefits might not fully reflect your future salary.

Get help choosing your coverage
When shopping for a policy, it's often best to work with an insurance agent who can survey many different companies to help you choose the right policy for your budget, age, health, and other factors. And remember, you must have the policy in place before something happens—if you're already sick or injured, you can't buy disability insurance to make up for lost income.

PUT THE LIGHTS ON BELIEVING MAKE BELIEVE

Last weekend my wife and I visited the Monrovia Historical Museum which contained an exhibit displaying Indian artifacts discovered in this area. Thirty years ago, at the time my house was being built I personally discovered an arrowhead that was unearthed. I was just observing but I grabbed the artifact which I now hold in my hand. I have always wanted to do some research about the people who for thousands of years lived right here on my hilltop with its view of the mountains and the ocean. You know on a clear day I can see the ocean from my deck. A few hundred years ago there must have been many more clear days.

We entered the museum and a notice entitled "INSTRUCTIONS TO ALL PERSONS OF JAPANESE ANCESTRY" immediately caught my attention. The text of the Notice was in such small writing that it was impossible to read. I knew the substance of the Notice having read the Korematsu v United States while still in Law School. Up until then I was completely unaware that the Supreme Court had upheld the expulsion of Japanese Americans from their own homes during World War II.

This decision written by the great free speech advocate Justice Hugo Black is often cited as one of the worst Supreme Court decisions of all time. In retrospect I knew I had to do something to justify staying in Law School. I did not want to be part of the problem. I began doing volunteer work with the Lawyer's Guild, private lawyers who represented antiwar protesters, draft resisters, Black Panthers, and assorted others. I don't remember much of what I did but I was there every night. Along the way I learned enough to avoid the draft myself and how to construct a Legal Practice which I found fulfilling and satisfying for 52 years.

At the Monrovia Museum I was similarly absorbed by a need to do something positive. I was not happy as I moved on to look at the display of artifacts and, suddenly, there it was! An arrowhead almost exactly like the one I found thirty years ago. This may have been a transformative message telling me to begin my much delayed research.

Yesterday morning I tracked down our copy of Michele Zak's book subtitled "Seeking a Better Life in Sierra Madre" and learned that after the Spaniards arrived and had already begun to construct Mission San Gabriel in 1771 that a confrontation with the local Tongva Indians was threatened. In a biography of Father Serra the rape of two Tongva women by Spanish soldiers is described. The Tongvas in the area were so angered that they organized an attack upon the still unconstructed mission. As the Indian warriors approached, the Spanish Priests unfurled a painting of the Virgin now known as the "The Lady of Sorrows". According to the detailed story the Tongvas were so overwhelmed by the emotion expressed in the painting that "they threw down their bows and arrows and two Indian chiefs rushed to place at the feet of the pictured woman the beads they wore around their necks to show their great esteem." Wow, what a healing. That is what I yearn for; an inner healing that will calm people down and allow them to cooperate with one another. (Actually it did not work out so well for the Tongvas but you can't have everything.)

I continued reading and learned that the picture still existed and hung at the left side of the entrance to the San Gabriel Mission. Although I have lived here in Sierra Madre for over forty years I have never been to the mission. Off I went to find the Mission and hoping to experience the painting and its revealed depth of emotion that had brought about the kind of healing that I want for myself and the world. Even a rare attack of gout did not stop me. Eventually, after much limping, I found my way to the Mission but could find no pictures. I was directed to the Mission Director's office and was able to explain to the Director what I was looking for and why it was such a consuming need. She laughed and asked if I had not heard about the fire. At my age I forget a lot which is embarrassing so I pretended I knew the story which I did not. She explained that there had been a fire, perhaps caused by an arsonist and that many paintings had been destroyed. She also said that perhaps there had not been significant damage and maybe the painting, or one like it, might soon be returned to mission. Again she laughed and told me that the whole story about the effect of the painting was probably just a legend or a myth. She saw the defeated look on my face and said "well you never know. Maybe it all depends on what you believe or want to believe."

I hope she's right because I definitely want to believe that our planet, species, and overall peace, rationality, and security can be maintained. What will it take? Frankly I feel better already just by participating in my quest. Already my foot feels better and tonight I will be able to accompany my wife to the moonlit light show at the Arboretum for which she had already purchased tickets. Who knows where our quests will lead? You know, maybe that legendary first Thanksgiving never really happened but, nevertheless, enjoy your Holiday Turkey with the family. Perhaps sometimes it's best to believe in make believe.

If someone walks up to you and asked for an example of a palindrome you will be ready?

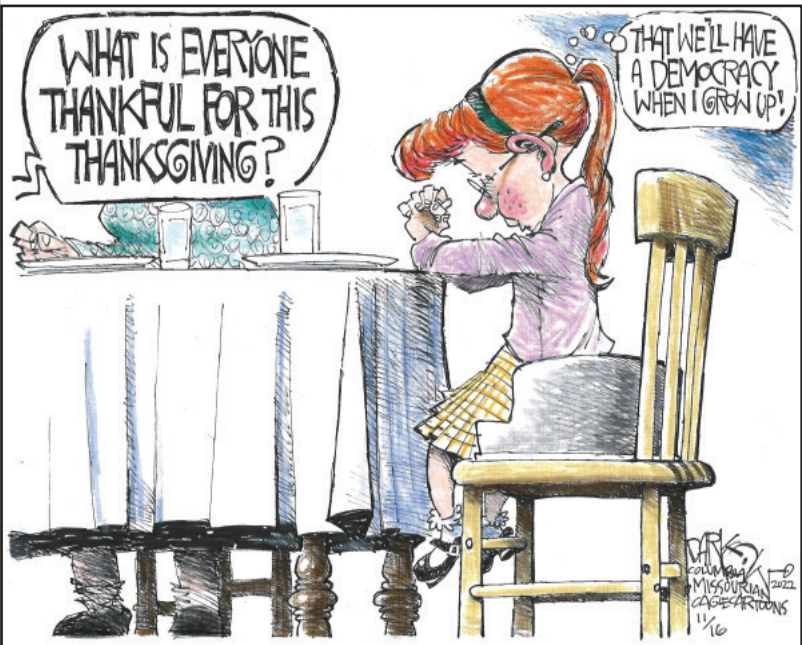
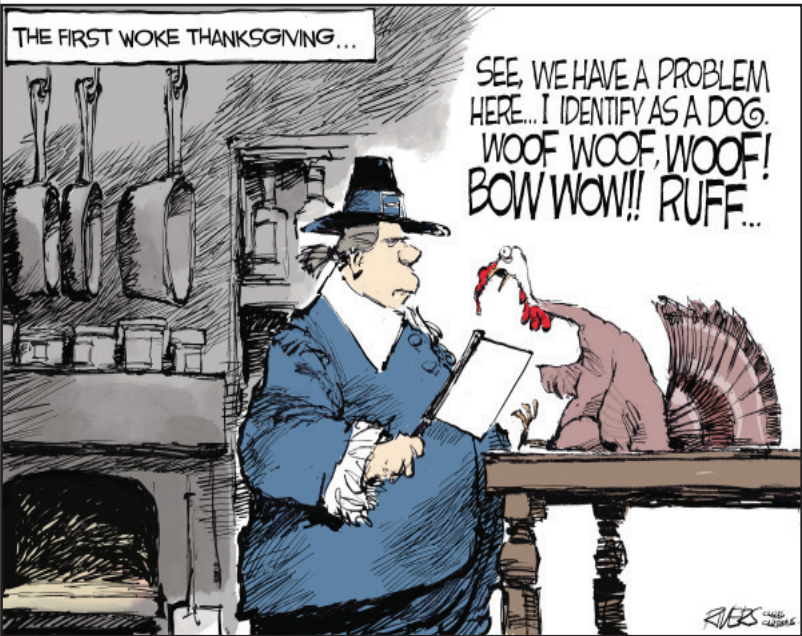
