TWO KEY SIERRA MADRE DEPARTMENT HEADS RETIRING AFTER YEARS OF DEDICATED SERVICE



PUBLIC WORKS DIRECTOR 'CHRIS' CIMINO TO RETIRE AFTER 37 YEARS OF SERVICE

Cimino began his career as a Maintenance Worker and steadily rose the ranks, eventually becoming Director in 2017. During his tenure with the City, he was a part of many innovative and impactful projects, including the advanced technology SCADA system, award-winning Grove Reservoir with the innovation of a tank within a tank concept, rebuilding of the Mira Monte Pumping Station and 2 water reservoirs. Over the years he has overseen the installation of over 25 miles of water main and rehabilitated over 20 miles of street and sidewalks. Mr. Cimino's final project will be the downtown street project and sidewalk enhancement.

Said Cimino, "I am incredibly fortunate to live and work in my hometown of Sierra Madre. I have enjoyed working with the community, my neighbors, and life-long friends and I know that I will miss my colleagues."

City Engineer and Deputy PW Director Armulfo Yanez promoted to Director. Mr. Yanez will assume his new role as the City's Public Works Director on December 1, 2023. Yanez joined the City in 2022 and previously held positions with the City of Monrovia and Ventura County.

DIRECTOR OF PLANNING & COMMUNITY PRESERVATION VINCENT GONZALEZ ALSO RETIRING



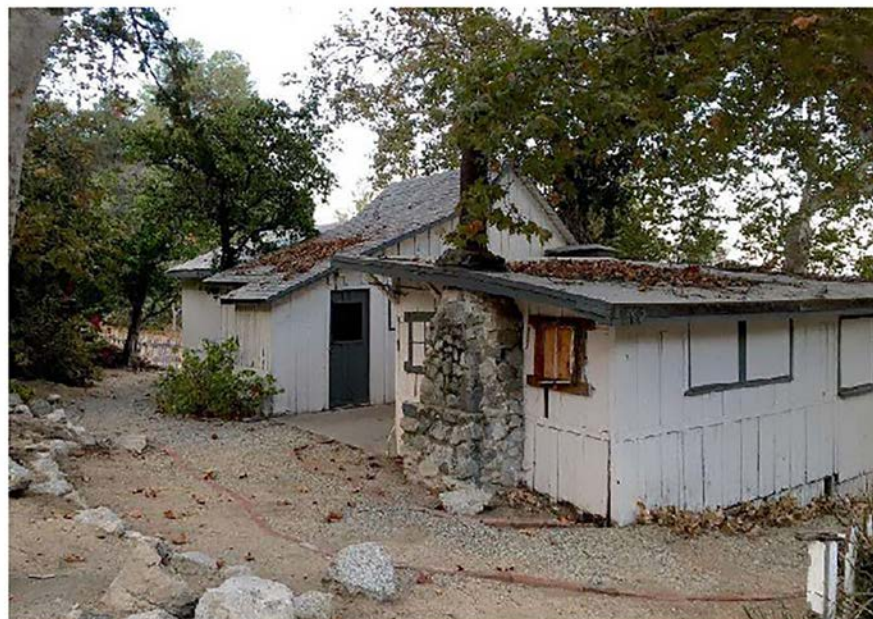
Vincent Gonzalez, Director of Planning and Community Preservation will retire on December 31, 2023. Gonzalez was hired by the City in 2015. During his tenure, he had the opportunity to work on numerous projects, including the

Housing Element Update, the adaptive reuse of the former First Church of Christ Scientist into moderate-income housing units (the Highland Mews), the 42-unit housing development -The Meadows at Baily Canyon, and seeing the fruition of the first homes being developed at Stonegate, a 29 lot subdivision. After 8 years with the City of Sierra Madre and 33 years in the field, he has decided to retire from Public Service.

The City also announced the promotion of Clare Lin to Manager of the Planning and Community Preservation Department. Ms. Lin will oversee the department and its staff upon Mr. Gonzalez's retirement.

ESTABLISHMENT OF HERITAGE SQUARE AT MOUNT WILSON TRAIL PARK ON COUNCIL AGENDA

Historic Macomber Cabin To Be Demolished and Rebuilt



Macomber Cabin

On the agenda for Tuesday's City Council meeting is Resolution No. 23-69 which, if adopted, will include the development agreement for the Macomber Cabin.

The staff reports notes, "City staff proposed the idea of a "Heritage Square" at Mount Wilson Trail Park that includes Lizzie's Trail Inn, The Richardson House, and the Macomber Cabin." "To accomplish the City's objective of establishing a "Heritage Square", the Macomber Cabin will need to be demolished, a replica constructed, and the replica relocated to Mount Wilson Trail Park."

According to an article in the Sierra Madre Historical Preservation Society's Newsletter in 2016 written by Architect Joe Catalano, "The George Macomber Cabin, built in 1864, is reputedly the first settlement cabin in this part of the foothills. And, after Carter acquired the property in 1881, he built a barn and the two-story Victorian house with sweeping views over what is now Sierra Madre." It is of great historical significance to Sierra Madre, is currently located in the development area known as 'I Carter' or 'Stonegate'. The ultimate fate of Macomber Cabin has been in limbo since the property changed ownership and plans for a housing development were approved in 2007.

If approved, the Cabin will join Sierra Madre's two museums in Mt. Wilson Trail Park. S. Henderson/MVNews

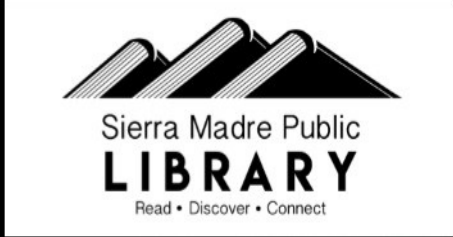

The City of Pasadena and the County of Los Angeles move one step closer to providing needed health services and affordable housing to the community

The City of Pasadena took formal ownership Tuesday of property, vacated by Kaiser Permanente more than 10 years ago, located at the southeast corner of Lake Avenue and Villa Street – the deal was done in partnership with LA County.

Pasadena Mayor Victor Gordo reiterated his vision for the future of the 2.5 acre property to provide affordable housing and health care services within a community-focused mixed-use Transit Oriented Development. "This project, in partnership with Los Angeles County, is an opportunity to bring much-needed health care and mental health care services to our residents at one location. It also is an opportunity to develop quality affordable housing and improve the overall economic vitality of this part of our city," Gordo said. "Now that the

city has taken ownership of the property, the hard work of developing the site begins. Knowing that LA County is in true partnership with us to address critical community needs and improve the quality of life for our residents makes all the difference. This type of partnership is precisely how government at all levels should work."

Supervisor Kathryn Barger said she was thrilled that they have reached the finish line and closed the deal. "Forging partnerships sounds like an easy task, but it takes a lot of work to get the details right so that all parties are satisfied. Ultimately, our North Star was improving the quality of life of north Pasadena residents by anchoring a variety of health, housing, and support programs in a property with much potential. I'm a proud partner in this revitalization effort and look forward to breaking ground soon."

Michelle Gaskill-Hames, president of Kaiser Foundation Health Plan and Hospitals of Southern California and Hawaii said "today, we celebrate the final real estate transfer of the 2.5-acre site from Kaiser Permanente to the City of Pasadena. This

collaborative effort enables the City of Pasadena and the County of Los Angeles to revitalize this property, with a strong emphasis on improving mental health accessibility and affordable housing. We look forward to witnessing the positive impact of this partnership, which will undeniably transform our community for the better."

City Manager Miguel Márquez expressed his gratitude and support for the ongoing city and county collaboration. He indicated that a Request for Proposals for the development of the site should be released in about 90 days.

Professor gets Award From American Physical Society

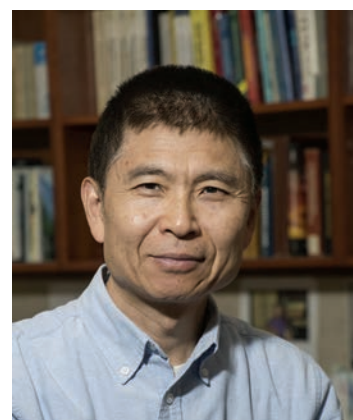
Zhen-Gang Wang, Caltech's Dick and Barbara Dickinson Professor of Chemical Engineering and executive officer for chemical engineering, has been selected to receive the 2024 Polymer Physics Prize by the American Physical Society (APS). According to the society, the prize "recognizes outstanding accomplishment and excellence of contributions in polymer physics research." The APS Polymer Physics Prize is considered the most prestigious international prize in polymer physics research.

Wang's work seeks to explain the behaviors and properties of long-chain molecules based on their atomic constitutions and interactions using the method of statistical mechanics by a combination of theoretical and computational techniques.

"I feel incredibly honored and humbled to receive this prize," Wang says. "It is heartwarming to have the support and appreciation from the community."

Wang joined the Caltech faculty after earning his bachelor's degree in chemistry from Peking (Beijing) University and his PhD in chemistry from the University of Chicago.

Wang is a fellow of the American Physical Society and has received many other awards and honors, including the Camille Dreyfus Teacher-Scholar Award (1995), the Alfred

P. Sloan Award (1996), the Braskem Award for Excellence in Materials Engineering and Science from the American Institute of Chemical Engineers (AIChE) (2018), and the AIChE Alpha Chi Sigma Award (2023). In 2008, Caltech awarded Wang with its highest teaching honor, the Richard P. Feynman Prize for Excellence in Teaching.

"Zhen-Gang is a world-class scholar and teacher," says Dennis Dougherty, the George Grant Hoag Professor of Chemistry and Norman Davidson Leadership Chair of the Division of Chemistry and Chemical Engineering. "This award from the APS recognizes that his work is making important and lasting contributions to his field."

NASA Analysis Finds Strong El Niño Could Bring Extra Floods



An analysis by NASA's sea level change science team finds that if a strong El Niño develops this winter, cities along the western coasts of the Americas could see an increase in the frequency of high-tide flooding that can swamp roads and spill into low-lying buildings.

El Niño is a periodic climate phenomenon characterized by higher-than-normal sea levels and warmer-than-average ocean temperatures along the equatorial Pacific. These conditions can spread poleward along the western coasts of the Americas. El Niño, which is still developing this year, can bring more rain than usual to the U.S. Southwest and drought to countries in the western Pacific like Indonesia. These impacts typically occur in January through March.

The NASA analysis finds that a strong El Niño could result in up to five instances of a type of flooding called a 10-year flood event this winter in cities including Seattle and San Diego. Places like La Libertad and Baltra in Ecuador could get up to three of these 10-year flood events this winter. This type of flooding doesn't normally occur along the west coast of the Americas outside of El Niño years. The researchers note that by the 2030s, rising seas and climate change could result in these cities experiencing similar numbers of 10-year floods annually, with no El Niño required.

"I'm a little surprised that the analysis found these 10-year events could become commonplace so quickly," said Phil Thompson, an oceanographer at the University of Hawaii and a member of NASA's sea level change science team, which performed the analysis. "I would have thought maybe by the 2040s or 2050s."

Ten-year floods are those that have a one in 10 chance of occurring in any given year. They're a measure of how high local sea levels become: The extent of flooding in a particular city or community depends on several factors, including a region's topography and the location of homes and infrastructure relative to the ocean. Ten-year floods can result in what the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration classifies as moderate flooding, with some inundation of roads and

buildings, and the possible need to evacuate people or move belongings to higher ground.

NASA's coastal flooding analysis finds that by the 2030s, during strong El Niño years, cities on the west coast of the Americas could see up to 10 of these 10-year flood events. By the 2050s, strong El Niños may result in as many as 40 instances of these events in a given year. Watching Sea Levels Rise

Water expands as it warms, so sea levels tend to be higher in places with warmer water. Researchers and forecasters monitor ocean temperatures as well as water levels to spot the formation and development of an El Niño.

"Climate change is already shifting the baseline sea level along coastlines around the world," said Ben Hamlington, a sea level researcher at NASA's Jet Propulsion Laboratory in Southern California and lead for the agency's sea level change science team.

Sea levels are rising in response to planetary warming, as Earth's atmosphere and ocean are heating up and ice sheets and shelves melt. This has already increased the number of high-tide, or nuisance, flooding days coastal cities experience throughout the year. Phenomena like El Niños and storm surges, which temporarily boost sea levels, compound these effects.

Missions that monitor sea levels, including the Surface Water and Ocean Topography (SWOT) satellite and Sentinel-6 Michael Freilich, help to monitor El Niños in the near term. SWOT in particular, collects data on sea levels right up to the coast, which can help to improve sea level rise projections. That kind of information could aid policymakers and planners in preparing their communities for rising seas in the next decades.

"As climate change accelerates, some cities will see flooding five to 10 times more often. SWOT will keep watch on these changes to ensure coastal communities are not caught off guard," said Nadya Vinogradova Shiffer, SWOT program scientist and director of the ocean physics program at NASA Headquarters in Washington.

Judy Chu Statement on Israel's War with Hamas

Congresswoman Judy Chu last week released a statement calling for humanitarian pauses in Gaza:

"Hamas killed more than 1,400 people and took more than 200 civilian hostages, including Americans, in an unconscionable, barbaric attack on October 7th. I am horrified by the stories I've heard about seniors, young music lovers and children being murdered and kidnapped by Hamas. Israel has a right to defend itself and, with our support, secure the safe release of these hostages.

"At the same time, the desire for short-term vengeance must not come at the expense of long-term peace. Palestinian civilians in Gaza, who have long too been victims of Hamas, have a right to their own security and must be provided every opportunity to seek safety and obtain humanitarian aid. I have been heart-broken by the reports of thousands of civilian casualties, especially the thousands of innocent children, who have died. The images coming from Gaza are absolutely heart wrenching. Israel's bombings of the Jabalya Refugee Camp, which targeted a Hamas leader but resulted in many innocent civilians' deaths, cannot be simply accepted as the cost of war.

"For these reasons, I join President Biden to call for humanitarian pauses that will provide the opportunity for the safe return of hostages, for civilians to flee harm's way, and for humanitarian assistance, including medical supplies and other necessities, to flow into Gaza. I commend President Biden for the multilateral work he has already done to inject humanitarian assistance into Gaza and secure the safe passage of refugees fleeing violence, while also steadfastly supporting the Israeli people as they seek to bring Hamas to justice and secure hostages' release. Humanitarian pauses will allow Israel to continue to work toward achieving these goals while alleviating the horrific conditions facing the innocent people in Gaza.

"I recognize that Hamas will undoubtedly take steps to prevent civilians from reaching safety during any pauses and will cynically use them to whatever advantage they can manage. This reality, however, does not negate the responsibility to protect innocent life."

Last but not least do consider a Cabernet, a favorite side kick of Prime Rib for years, our own Maddalena has an outstanding one and the price of \$15 is perfect for the holidays, who does Prime Rib on Thanksgiving? I must admit the Dills household has been doing it for years.

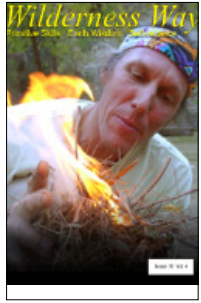

GROWING A PERENNIAL GARDEN

I don't think that I am actually what is called a "lazy gardener," though I prefer to do only the minimal amount of work to produce food in my own yard. If certain plants require too much work, or they always die, I generally quit trying to grow that plant. It may be that they are inappropriate for my environment – such as coffee. I grow coffee, but I know in the back of my mind that come the next freeze, they will die.

I love being able to grow certain plants that will more or less take care of themselves, year after year. I don't mean trees, which are obviously perennial and are a great choice for long-term food production.

I'm referring to those garden vegetables that can be planted once and then as long as I enrich the soil and make sure everything is watered, they will produce "forever."

ONIONS

For example, all member of the onion family – such as onions, garlic, shallots, etc. – are perennial if you eat only the greens and leave the bulbs in the ground. That means, they will produce and divide year after year.

ASPARAGUS

Asparagus seems to have fallen out of favor with gardeners, but there was a time when asparagus was in everyone's garden. You can plant them from seed, or buy the roots, and then plant them in good soil. The plant can actually live up to 50 years and longer, and every spring you can cut the tender shoots and cook them.

POTATO

Sprouted and therefore inedible potatoes get tossed away all the time. Right? Most people quickly toss these into the garbage and wipe up the offending mess on the shelf.

But I take what remains of the sprouted potato outside, dig a hole in my designated potato patch, and plant it all at least four inches underground. Then I cover it with mulchy soil.

The above-ground part will grow and eventually flower. It arises rarely more than a foot out of the ground. When the plant dies back in a few months, you can dig down and be amazed to find a dozen or so home-grown potatoes. It's very easy to do, and I've done it for so long that I take it for granted that everyone grows their own potatoes.

Of course, we eat the underground root, so we cannot really say that the potato is perennial. However, when you harvest your potatoes, always keep a few of the little ones in the ground and you will have a forever potato patch.

JERUSALEM ARTICHOKE

This plant is not from Jerusalem, and it is not an artichoke, but otherwise it is an appropriate name. This is a member of the Sunflower family native to the eastern U.S. This sunflower does not produce seeds, but rather reproduces by its constantly growing underground tubers, which resembles ginger.

When you grow one of these – also called sunchokes – they will produce tall sunflowers and then die back in late summer. You can then dig some to eat like potatoes. Always leave some in the ground and you will soon have more than you can possibly eat.

NEW ZEALAND SPINACH

I had grown regular spinach from time to time, and I enjoyed it. It was good! You plant it, let it grow, then you harvest it for dinner one day. Then you start all over.

But then I learned about New Zealand spinach.

New Zealand spinach is a sprawling perennial spinach. If you plant it in an appropriate spot, it will spread and spread and you will literally have spinach year-round, year after year. When you want to harvest some, just pinch back the tender tips. The plant continues to grow where you pruned it back, often sprouting out two or three stems where there was only one. I had one patch that lived for nearly 30 years before I moved away.

BEETS

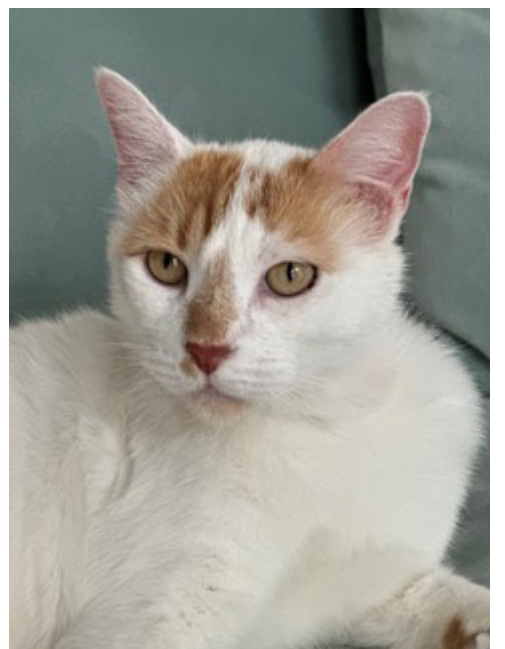
Did you know that beets are related to Swiss chard? You can take a beet that has started to sprout, and plant either the whole beet, or just the top part with the greens. We've done this many times and we get years of chard-like greens from the root, often for many seasons.

HOW SENIORS CAN GET HELP PAYING FOR EVERYDAY NEEDS

Dear Savvy Senior:

What types of programs are available to help seniors struggling with their everyday bills, and how do I go about finding them? Since I lost my husband last year, my Social Security survivor benefit is barely enough to get by on. Searching Senior

Dear Searching:

I'm very sorry for your loss, but you'll be happy to know that there are dozens of different financial assistance programs and government benefits that may be able to help you with your everyday costs.

To locate these types of programs, your best resource is BenefitsCheckUp.org. This is a free, confidential online screening tool designed for older adults and people with disabilities. It will help you find federal, state and local benefits programs that can assist with paying for food, utilities, health care, medications, housing and many other needs. This site – created by the National Council on Aging in 2001 – contains nearly 2,000 programs across the country.

To identify benefits, you'll first need to type in your ZIP code and choose the types of benefits you're interested in. Then you'll need to answer a few questions regarding your personal and financial situation. Once completed, you'll get a list of programs to choose from, followed by a personalized report that explains each program, and tells you where you can get help or how to apply.

If you need some assistance or you don't have internet access, you can always speak with a benefits support specialist by calling 800-794-6559. You can also get help in-person at any of the 85 Benefit Enrollment Centers located across 41 states. See NCOA.org/article/meet-our-benefits-enrollment-centers to search for a center in your area.

Types of Benefits

Depending on your income level, location and circumstance, here are a few of the many different benefits you may be eligible for:

Nutrition assistance: Programs like the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) can help pay for food at the grocery store. The average SNAP benefit for 60-and-older households is around \$105 per month. Some other nutrition programs that are



available to seniors include the Senior Farmers Market Nutrition Program and the Commodity Supplemental Food Program.

Utility assistance: There's the Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) that provides assistance in lowering home heating and cooling costs. And for broadband assistance, the Affordable Connectivity Program provides a \$30 monthly subsidy that can be applied toward your home internet costs.

Health care and medicine: Medicare Savings Programs and Medicaid can help or completely pay for seniors' out-of-pocket health care costs. And for assistance with medications, there's a low-income subsidy program called 'Extra Help' that helps pay premiums, deductibles, and co-payments on Medicare (Part D) prescription drug coverage. You can also search for prescription drug help through patient assistance programs or your state pharmaceutical assistance program at Medicare.gov.

Supplemental Security Income (SSI): Administered by the Social Security Administration, SSI (see ssa.gov/ssi) provides monthly payments to very low-income seniors, age 65 and older, as well as to those who are blind and disabled. In 2023, SSI pays up to \$914 per month for a single person and up to \$1,371 for couples.

In addition to these benefits, there are dozens of other programs [BenefitsCheckUp](http://BenefitsCheckUp.org) can help you identify, like housing assistance, property tax reduction, home weatherization assistance, tax relief, veteran's benefits, senior transportation, caregiving support, free legal assistance, disability services, job training and more.

CHOOSING SHOES by Michele Silence

feet cool and dry during intense workouts, reducing the risk of blisters and discomfort. Find those with advanced cushioning systems that absorb shock from your movements, reducing strain on your joints while enhancing your comfort during workouts.

In addition, look for lightweight shoes that allow you to move freely and efficiently, along with those that provide good traction. Whether you're on the track, the court, or the field, superior traction can help prevent slips and falls, ensuring your safety during athletic activities.

Support is another key factor in preventing injuries and maintaining proper alignment. Many shoes now come with features like arch support, which is especially important for flat or high arches.

Choosing the wrong athletic shoe can lead to various problems. Namely overuse injuries, strains, sprains, and other foot-related issues. For example, running in shoes not designed for running can result in shin splints or plantar fasciitis. Maybe this all stems from a refusal to recognize and to adapt to changing conditions? He was not the kind of man he explained who would "volunteer" and do jobs for nothing but now he was happy being paid to enjoy his life. For once I held my tongue and did not mention that he probably would live a shorter life no matter how happy he was. Really I'm not sure of anything anymore. Stress and anxiety and prescribed medications probably have as much effect on shortening lifespan as does smoking.

My stress in retirement cannot be doing me any good but I am not about to start smoking or incur additional expenses just to force myself to get another job. Anyway, who would hire me anyway? My ADHD has become so noticeable that one reader of my articles told me he had gotten whiplash just trying to follow my thinking. I did not take offence. His reaction is much like my own as I try to write my articles.

Yesterday I heard that Hamas explained that the October 7th attack on Israel was necessitated because Israeli negotiations between Israel and Saudi Arabia could lead to a peace that would therefore threaten the identity of Hamas. Hamas continues to be a terrorist entity that requires war in order to maintain its identity. It is an "existential" threat that justifies every kind of action. Alas, Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu uses this kind of existential explanation to defend his refusal to cease hostility. To him the preservation of a welcoming Jewish State justifies every kind of action. It would be nice to imagine that he just fears any kind of change. This past weekend, as Hamas gunmen from Gaza invaded Israel, killing and assaulting hundreds of civilians, my heart ached for people like Shani Louk, a 30-year-old woman who had been attending a dance music festival when she was kidnapped and paraded through the streets semi-naked in the back of a pickup truck.

My immediate response was incredible compassion for the pain and terror this poor woman suffered before she was killed — my heart breaks for her and her family.

The immediate response from many others around the world, however, was coldhearted and purely political — that her suffering was Israel's fault because the country supposedly had this terrorist attack coming.

Not only do we live in a time in which everything is political all the time, we live in a world where people with whom we disagree are no longer seen as fellow human beings who have differing thoughts, but as evil entities that must be stopped by any means.

Why have our hearts become so much harder? One of the key reasons is the way we now receive and process information.

Dr. Helen Riess, author of "The Empathy Effect," says empathy's decline has to do with social media.

A Street Roots report on her book says "many of the neurological keys to feeling empathy are missing from the exchange" when we communicate through texts, email and social media posts.

When communicating electronically, not face to face, there's no chance of paying attention to body language and facial expressions — or to make eye contact, which is a really important component of empathy.

Psychology Today cites research, published in the journal Computers in Human Behavior, that a simple lack of eye contact enables an anonymity that fosters rudeness and encourages online trolling. Unfortunately, the magazine reports, the era of smartphones and social media — of nasty tweets and Facebook insults — is making rudeness "our new normal."

Riess continues that without emotional cues that we can see, we're left with only words (and images) on a screen, which leads to detachment and creates emotional indifference.

An increasing number of people treat those with whom they disagree this way — which contributes to the general decline of empathy in our civil discourse. Though Riess says empathy is being blunted, she emphasizes to Forbes that it can be learned.

Her thinking is seconded by an interesting New York Times article that identifies specific actions we can all take to restore empathy in our own hearts.

The simple truth is that we need to stop hiding behind our electronic devices and actively engage with people face-to-face. We need to set politics aside now and then to embrace our common humanity — and relearn how to sympathize with suffering when humans are at their worst.

Who is considered the greatest player in the history of the National Basketball Association (NBA)? Easy! Michael Jordan. So, what did Mr. Jordan do at the peak of his career? February 7, 1994? NBA titles.

In 1988, Jordan became the first NBA player to win both the NBA Defensive Player of the Year and the Most Valuable Player award in the same year. And as of 2023, Forbes Magazine estimates Michael Jordan's net worth at \$3 billion dollars.

Risking failure is a critical element in achieving success. Here's another example: In 1968, Spencer Silver, a research chemist for 3M (Minnesota Mining and Manufacturing) was attempting to create a new super-strong super glue. But Spencer couldn't make the glue work right. The objects he glued could easily be peeled off leaving no residue or damage. The project was shelved. A failure.

3M, a smart company, has a policy for publishing failures as well as successes in research. They made Chemist Silver publish his failure...the glue that wouldn't stick very good. I mean, what good is glue that doesn't stick?

9 years later, in 1977, someone in another division of 3M came up with an idea called "Press and Peel Pads". The problem these inventors faced was the glue used in the pads stuck too good. Test marketing was an unmitigated failure. About to shelve the project, someone came across Spencer Silver's published account of his glue failure.

And by 1980 "Post-It Notes" were generating \$1 billion a year, hailed as one of 3M's greatest products. As of 2023, more than 50 billion Post-It Notes are produced by 3M every year!

So, dream, risk, take a chance. Just remember this important sequence distinction: "Ready, aim, fire", not "Ready, fire, aim". "Capeesh?" "Capiche!"
